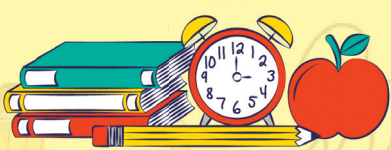

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Back-to-School is Just Around the Corner

Though it feels like summer just began to students and educators enjoying their break, the start of the 2021-22 school year is just weeks away.

The McKenzie Special School District released its 2021-22 calendar. Students begin session with a half-day on Tuesday, August 3. In-service begins a week earlier on July 26 for school staff.

The first holiday is Labor Day on September 6. Students are out of school September 20 for a staff

Kirsten Sass, Amy Dixon to Compete in Tokyo Paralympics

MCKENZIE (July 6) — Fresh from the news of her qualification in the 2021 U.S. Paralympic Triathlon Team sat McKenzie native Kirsten Winkler Sass in The Banner office, donned in a red USA Triathlon jacket. Kirsten will race as a guide in the Paralympics August 24 through September 5. The news came after the June 27 paratriathlon race in Pleasant Prairie, Wisconsin. Their story began in 2017 when Kirsten first met Amy Dixon, her partner in the race.

Kirsten had always been interested in guiding paratriathlon athletes. Amy Dixon, a para athlete from San Diego, was in need of a guide after her original guide was ruled ineligible for their upcoming race in Yokohama, Japan, and all of her substitute guides were unable to race. The two racers found each other through friends of friends, both knowledgeable of each others' successes in triathlons. Kirsten and Amy first met a few days before the competition in Japan and immediately bonded. They also raced in Edmonton, Canada, and Rotterdam, Netherlands, that year. Since 2017, Kirsten and Amy have earned four World Cup places and first through seventh place in over seventeen races.

As a guide, Kirsten acts as Amy's "eyes". Amy has lost 98% of her vision due to a rare autoimmune disease. However, her motto is: "You don't need to have sight to have vision." In their division they will race against other legally blind athletes including those who are completely blind.

Tennessee Adds Sales Tax Holidays for Food, Gun Safety

In addition to the traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies and computers, the Tennessee General Assembly has approved sales tax holidays for food and for gun safety.

The traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies and computers begins at 12:01 a.m. Friday, July 30, 2021, and ends at 11:59 p.m. Sunday, August 1, 2021.

During the holiday, clothing, school supplies and computers may be purchased tax-free, with some restrictions. Items sold online are also eligible. Items must be purchased

for personal use, not for business or trade.

Clothing items that are exempt include general apparel that costs \$100 or less per item, such as shirts, pants, socks, shoes, dresses, etc. Not exempt are apparel items priced at more than \$100. Items sold together, such as shoes, cannot be split up to stay beneath the \$100 maximum. Items such as jewelry, handbags, or sports and recreational equipment are also not exempt.

School and art supplies with a purchase price of \$100 or less per item, such as binders, backpacks,

crayons, paper, pens, pencils, and rulers, and art supplies such as glazes, clay, paints, drawing pads, and artist paint brushes are exempt. Not exempt are school and art supplies individually priced at more than \$100. Items that are normally sold together cannot be split up to stay beneath the \$100 maximum.

Computers for personal use with a purchase price of \$1,500 or less are exempt, including laptop computers and tablet computers. Not

Employment Remains Little Changed in May

NASHVILLE — Unemployment in the tri-county area of Carroll, Henry and Weakley were little changed in May as compared to April 2021. Two weeks ago, a job fair was held in Carroll County. There were 400 jobs with immediate openings or soon-to-be available.

Carroll County recorded a 4.7 percent rate of unemployment in May compared to 4.8 in April. The rate compares to the 8.5 percent rate one year earlier. From a labor force of 12,024, there were 11,456 employed and 568 unemployed.

Henry County recorded a 4.5 percent rate of unemployment in May compared to 4.4 in April. The rate

96% of Doctors are Fully Vaccinated Against COVID-19

The American Medical Association released results from a recent survey showing over 96% of practicing physicians in America are fully vaccinated against COVID-19. Of the remaining physicians, 45% do plan to get vaccinated.

The survey was conducted June 3-8 and yielded a 20% increase in physicians who have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19 compared to a similar poll conducted in May by Medscape.

"Physicians and clinicians are uniquely positioned to listen to and validate patient concerns, and one of the most powerful anecdotes a physician can offer is that they themselves have been vaccinated," said AMA President Susan R. Bailey, MD. "You can take it from your doctor: the COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective. With COVID-19 vaccines readily available and approved

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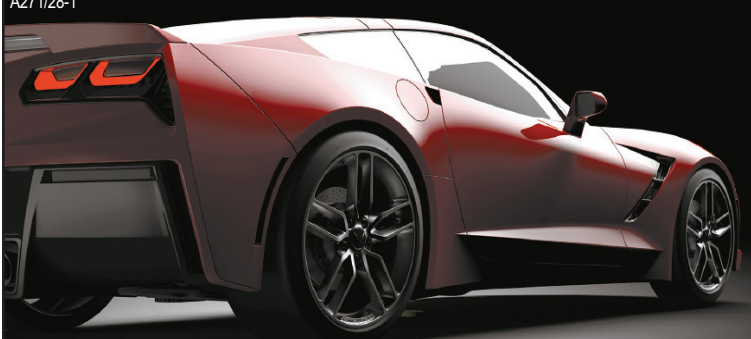

Governor Lee Visits Southern Border: ‘This is a National Security Crisis’

NASHVILLE — Over the weekend, Tennessee Governor Bill Lee traveled to the U.S. Southern Border to meet with Tennessee National Guards troops and receive briefings regarding the skyrocketing rate of illegal crossings and criminal activities.

“Tennesseans serve on the front lines of the Southern border crisis, and it has rapidly escalated to not just a matter of public safe-

ty but a threat to our country’s national security,” said Gov. Lee. “Americans owe these troops a debt of gratitude for their service, and the federal government owes Americans a plan to restore both our border security and our standing as a global power.”

Tennessee Adjutant General Jeff Holmes accompanied Gov. Lee and First Lady Maria Lee to spend time with troops and thank

them for their service. Gov. Lee and Major Gen. Holmes also participated in a series of briefings regarding illegal crossings with origins from 56 countries, drug seizures and other exploitive crimes like human trafficking.

“What I saw at the border is unsustainable for our country and should be number one priority for national security,” said Gov. Lee. “Tennessee will always step up and serve, but we need immediate reinforcements, like a finished border wall, to ensure our men and women in uniform have the tools they need to do their job.”

Tennessee National Guard serve at the Southern border in the following support capacities:

269th Military Police Company – Routinely augments law enforcement by conducting training and providing a presence along the border

913th Engineer Company – Capabilities lend to myriad road building efforts and border wall projects

2-151 Aviation Battalion – Provides an aerial platform to assist Customs and Border Protection with a number of their logistical and operational priorities.

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Huntingdon Police Reports

Multiple Burglaries — Christopher Grasty, 24, of Huntingdon was recently arrested for allegedly burglarizing and/or attempting to break into multiple businesses and facilities in the Huntingdon area dating back to March of this year.

According to multiple police reports, Grasty broke into Discount Tobacco on June 23 by busting out a glass door and causing \$1,200 in damage, attempted to break into Cornerstone Eatery and the Strop CPA firm on May 24, tried to break into Huntingdon City Hall on June 9, broke into Praters Taters on June 17 by breaking out a glass door, burglarized Jackson Clinic on June 17 causing \$850 in a damage to the back door and taking \$150 in cash, attempted to break into Joe BBQ on June 23, broke into Block City Piza by prying open the back door on June 23, burglarized the Carroll County Electric Department on June 25 by breaking out the back basement door window and then stealing \$25, burglarized Mi Pueblito Mexican Restaurant on March 14 and stole a large

In paratriathlons, athletes swim 750 meters, bike 20 kilometers, and run 5 kilometers. While swimming, Kirsten and Amy are tethered together with a bungee cord. The two bike on a tandem bike with Kirsten in the front and Amy in the back. They are also bungee-corded together while running. Kirsten informs Amy of upcoming obstacles, leads her in the right directions and tells her their placement.

The Paralympic preliminaries began four years ago. There is a point system established for competitors. They have to win enough races to get onto the national team. From then, they continue to move up in points based on races and where they finish. Kirsten and Amy's final qualifying race was June 27, where they claimed ninth spot in the world in paratriathlon rankings.

Kirsten attributes her dad, the late Dr. Volker Winkler, for her experience and success in triathlons. Growing up, she said her dad made her and her five siblings run one 5K, just once in their lives, and they would never have to run one again. Kirsten started running again when she attended the University of Western Ontario in Canada, and her roommate invited her to start swimming that same year. Shortly after moving off-campus, Kirsten bought a bike to make commuting easier. One day while at the school's pool, she unknowingly asked the triathlon club coach how many laps it took to swim a mile. After that conversation, the coach invited Kirsten to join the triathlon club.

Kirsten recalls calling her dad about joining the club. He was ecstatic because he knew she would be home from school just in time to run the Memphis in May triathlon. This triathlon was her first ever race. She came in "dead last" in her division, but she remembers everyone encouraging her as if she had won first place. It was then she knew she loved the triathlon environment. Kirsten continued competing, becoming faster and better with every race.

Since her first race, Kirsten Sass has become a champion triathlete. She was the USA Triathlon Overall Amateur Female Triathlete for 2013, 2015, 2016, and 2017. She won the USA Triathlon Open Amateur Female Triathlete of the Year in 2018. She won the USA Triathlon Overall Amateur Female Duath-

lete of the Year 2015, 2016, 2019. She is the 10X World Champion Gold Medalist, a 5-time World Champion Silver Medalist and a World Champion Bronze Medalist in Triathlon, Duathlon, and Aquathlon. Kirsten holds 23 national championships in the Triathlon and Duathlon, and in 2016, she was awarded the Ironman Louisville Overall Female. In March, she was honored for her international athletic accomplishments by the City of McKenzie with three roadside signs noting her achievements. March 4, 2021 was designated as Kirsten Winkler Sass Day in the city of McKenzie.

Although she competes as Amy's guide, Kirsten still races in individual competitions. In May, she raced in the Duathlon National Championships. She will compete in a Nashville race at the end of July and at the Age Group National Championships at the beginning of August. She assured us she still plans to race in the Dixie Triathlon in Huntingdon, her eyes lighting up with glee as she called it her favorite race.

In her free time, Kirsten enjoys supporting local amateur athletes. At the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, Kirsten hosted a bike skills clinic for

a number of area riders who had picked up cycling when unable to use gym facilities, including a number of firefighters. Kirsten and her family reside in the Pea Ridge Community outside McKenzie where they operate Somerset Getaways. It is a place to relax or take in professional athletic training. One Friday per month, Kirsten holds a cycling event known as a "Time Trial" for local riders. The "Time Trial" is a great opportunity for local riders to test their cycling and socialize with others who love to ride. She also gives swimming lessons and is a USA Triathlon certified coach.

To amateur athletes, she said, "If you have a dream or passion or something you love to do, stick with it. Give it your all. If you love it and you're willing to work for it, do it. Anything can happen."

She thanks her husband, Jeff Sass, and their two kids, Bella and Sebastian, for their support and encouragement. Kirsten, a physician assistant at Christian Family Medicine, says her co-workers and the management have been absolutely wonderful in working with her to accommodate time off for travel and racing. "Nothing I have been able to do [as a triathlete] would have been possible without my friends, family and community and their help along the way,"

Kirsten and Amy will compete in the paratriathlon August 27 at 6:34 p.m. CT. Because of COVID-19 protocol rules, no spectators are allowed at the Paralympics. NBC networks will broadcast the games.

Kirsten believes tuning in gives people a great opportunity to learn about the Paralympics. "These incredible para-athletes have great stories. It's amazing to learn about them and what all they have overcome."

Weakley County Community Input Needed For Use of Emergency Relief Funding

Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief (ESSER) Funds totaling nearly \$9 million are the latest allocation of monies set aside by Congress to address the impact of the pandemic on education in Weakley County. To fashion the most comprehensive plan for use of the funds, Weakley County Schools has added an ESSER 3.0 Director and is seeking community input.

The Coronavirus Aid Relief, and Economic Security or CARES Act passed by Congress on March 27, 2020, created the first installment of ESSER funds. The \$939,000 received by Weakley County went to covering the increase in substitute teachers, creation of the Monitored Distance Education virtual option, Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and materials needed for the Summer Scholars program in June that sought to lessen learning lost, explained Betsi Foster, former director of federal funding and now assistant director of Weakley County Schools.

In December 2020 additional funds were set aside for ESSER 2.0. Weakley County has now received \$3.8 million which will be used to further address learning loss, add educational assistants and reading/math interventionists to schools, provide laptops for every 3rd-12th grade student and iPads in kindergarten through 2nd grade classrooms, supply teachers with updated instructional technology and cover the costs of the summer meal program.

Planning is currently underway to determine how ESSER 3.0 funds will be used.

"Overseeing governmental regulations as to how such a substantial amount of money will be budgeted, distributed, and reported over the next sev-

eral years will require organization, self-motivation, and initiative," said Foster. "We think we have that in Angie Rushing. As the new ESSER 3.0 Director, she brings a wealth of knowledge from a variety of facets in education to her role."

Rushing, who has spent 28 years in the Weakley County Schools' system, began on July 1. To fulfill grant requirements and ensure that previously gathered information reflects the community, she has devised a brief survey which is now online.

"We know that the most recent allocation of funds is intended to help with learning loss and address the social-emotional and mental health needs of all students, particularly underrepresented students," said Rushing. "We would like to hear from our stakeholders – teachers, students, families, staff, businesses and organizations – regarding ideas for how we can best achieve our priorities."

Administrators have identified three priorities in each of the four categories for funding: academics and materials, student readiness, educators/staffing, and foundational elements.

For academics and materials, priorities are experiential learning such as those found in Science/

Technology/Reading/Engineering/Arts/Math (STREAM) programs, tutoring, and math textbooks and manipulatives. (Weakley County adopted new English Language Arts curriculum prior to the pandemic.)

Student readiness will focus on credit recovery and remediation for high school students, student mental health and engagement – for instance more social workers and teacher advisors – and phonics/foundational learning in lower grades.

Staffing priorities encompass special education teachers and technicians, training, and increasing payments for noncertified roles.

Foundational elements to be covered by funding will include facility improvements and additions such as HVAC, awnings, and playgrounds, retrofitting buses to be used for mobile STEM labs and reading enrichment, and the provision for Rushing's role.

"We have already seen that our teachers and communities can be very creative when faced with adversity," noted Rushing. "So, we are looking forward to receiving the results of our survey and initiating specific plans to make up for lost time in the classroom, reduce the risk of future virus transmission, promote learning growth among students, purchase more educational technology, and provide mental health services and supports."

compares to 8.8 percent unemployment one year earlier. From a labor force of 13,583, a total of 12,976 were employed and 607 unemployed.

Weakley County recorded a 4.0 percent rate of unemployed compared to 3.8 in April. The rate compares to 6.3 percent one year earlier. From a labor force of 15,649 a total of 15,023 leaving 626 unemployed.

The three counties are among 67 counties with unemployment rates of 5 percent or less. No county had a rate higher than 10 percent.

Tennessee's May rate

was 5.0 percent unemployment, which was unchanged from April. The rate in USA is 5.8 percent for May, down from 6.1 one month earlier.

Six west Tennessee counties rank among the top 10 in unemployment. Those are Shelby, 6.8, Hardeman, 6.5, Haywood, 6.3, Lake, 6.3, McNairy, 6.3, and Lauderdale, 6.3.

The counties with the lowest unemployment include Moore, 2.7, Williamson, 2.7, Cheatham, 3.4, Wilson, 3.5, Knox, 3.6, Chester, 3.7, Rutherford, 3.7, Sumner, 3.7, Sevier, 3.8, and Hickman, 3.8.

On July 1, Tennessee ended the participation in the federal subsidy on unemployment, which added \$300 weekly to the unemployment checks of Ten-

nesseans.

exempt are storage media such as flash drives and compact discs, individually purchased software, printer supplies and household appliances.

The sales tax holiday for food, food ingredients and prepared food begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 30, 2021 and ends Thursday, August 5, 2021 at 11:59 p.m.

This includes qualified sales of prepared food by restaurants, food trucks, caterers and grocery stores. Sales of alcoholic beverages are not included in items exempt during this period.

Gun safes and safety devices sold at retail are exempt from sales and use tax during a holiday period beginning at 12:01 a.m. on July 1, 2021 and ending at 11:59 p.m. on June 30, 2022.

A "gun safe" is defined as a locking container or other enclosure equipped

with a padlock, key lock, combination lock or other locking device that is designed and intended for the secure storage of one or more firearms. A "gun safety device" is defined as any integral device to be equipped or installed on a firearm that permits the user to program the firearm to operate only for specified persons designated by the user through computerized locking devices or other means integral to and permanently part of the firearm.

The World Health Organization reports 4,031,725 worldwide deaths caused by COVID-19 since January 2020. 601,867 Ameri-

cans died from the virus. As of July 8, a total of 3,078,787,056 coronavirus vaccines have been administered worldwide.

In the week of July 2 through July 8, the Tennessee Department of Health reported an average of 1.1 positive COVID-19 cases reported per day in Carroll County. In that week, the county averaged 13.1 tests per day.

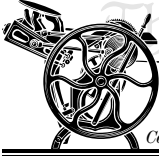

Mike Snider

Gleason's Grand Ole Opry Star

Most communities have a claim to fame and even a favorite son. For Gleason, the town is Tater Town U.S.A. and they too have a favorite son, banjo champion and Grand Ole Opry star Mike Snider.

Born William Michael Snider on May 5, 1961, to Billy and Ruby Snider. At the age of 16, Mike picked up his first banjo, a gift from his father. The young man's interest in music started when he was six years old and the family dogs dragged up an old bugle. This led to Mike learning how to play the trumpet.

But a Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs' record Billy brought home turned him onto the banjo. They listened to recordings of Scruggs' three-finger picking style of the banjo. "Daddy loved the banjo," Mike said in a 2005 interview. "He'd say, 'Boy, ain't that fine!'" After Billy bought Mike the banjo, that's all the boy cared about.

"Mama said I needed to stick with the trumpet. But I had lost interest in it."

"It was two days before my birthday," Mike said of his father bringing the banjo home. "It was brand new and it was a good one, too, and it was in tune and everything."

He began taking lessons from Gene Harkey from Sharon, who came to the Snider home a day or two later and agreed to teach Mile how to play.

"He was real nice to teach me everything he knew; it took me about two years," Mike recalled. "He was a good teacher and after I got better I helped him learn something he wanted to know."

He admits learning the banjo didn't come easy, "It was really hard and it took like what seemed like forever before I could do anything. But I would not let up. I knew I could do it, deep down. I could hear it in my head and I knew what it would feel like if I could just do it right."

Mike's days and nights were filled with practicing his beloved instrument.

"I had to go to school and work on the farm, so I played before breakfast, then I played 'til the school bus came. After school, I'd play, then go do what I need to do. And come back and play along toward midnight...Lots of times, I carried my banjo to the field with me."

Between music, farming and girls, Mike had very little interest in academics.

"All I wanted from school was to get out," he reminisced. "I already knew how to read, write and spell and enough math that I could do in my head and be able to handle money. I thought I'd be a farmer, I never thought I'd play the banjo for a living."

In the spring of 1982, Mike asked Sabrina Goodwin out on a date. It was then he knew she was the one.

"On our first date, I knew. I don't know why but I knew." After a few more dates, he built up his nerve and asked her to marry him. On December 12, 1982, they were married. The following year, he was

contemplating retiring his banjo after winning the state banjo contest two consecutive years.

He was encouraged to enter the national banjo contest in September 1983. Mike said of entering, "I thought, well before I put it away, that would be nice to show the grandkids someday. I lucked up and won that thing, then came back home."

Still convinced he was bound for the fields, it wasn't until Gordon Stoker of the Jordanares was in Gleason to visit family, that things began to change for Mike. Gordon's brother, Wayne, encouraged Mike to play for the famed musician. Mike visited him one afternoon and played a few songs for him.

"Me and him kind of made friends right there," he said. "When he asked what he could do to help, I said, 'Well I'd like to be on the Grand Ole Opry one time,' and he said, 'I believe I can get that done.'"

Gordon was a man of his word as Mike was invited to perform on the Opry. They also invited the entire town of Gleason, sending 1500 tickets, to watch him on stage.

After the tickets ran out, 500 more locals purchased tickets. On January 21, 1984, Mike made his Opry debut with 2,000 friends and family from the Tri-County area in the audience. His stellar performance earned him an appearance on Ralph Emery's Nashville Now Show.

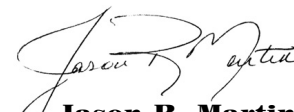
"Everybody laughed at everything I said, and I wasn't trying to be funny,"

Mike said. His easy-going demeanor and strong country accent drew in the audience.

Over the next 30-plus years, Mike's star continued to shine in Nashville. From being in the cast of Hee-Haw to becoming a regular member and a host on the Grand Ole Opry, Mike never forgot his roots. His stardom didn't affect his home life.

"When I'm gone for a show, it's not a vacation, I've got getting there, getting done and getting back on my mind, my favorite place to be is home." The talks of his success always bring him back home, "I'm mighty grateful towards the people of Weakley and Carroll counties for supporting me and coming to see me when I was on the Opry and other shows. Without the help of everybody around here I'd never made it in the music business."

Now semi-retired, Mike still calls Gleason home.

It didn't make any sense. Then, a lot of things with me don't.

It was July 3rd. 6:45 in the morning. I was running around Lake Junaluska. Somewhere in the mountains of North Carolina. The houses surrounding the lake were adorned with red, white and blue bunting. Signs along the route advertised the fireworks display set for the next day.

I should have been dwelling on Crispus Attucks, Bunker Hill, Betsy Ross, Paul Revere, Valley Forge and the Continental Congress. And maybe John Phillip Sousa.

But my mind chose to dial up Charlotte Melton.

You can not believe how beautiful Lake Junaluska is early in the morning. By my second loop the sun was rising over the mountains to the east...the distant fog slowly fading into a disappearing mist. The water was so still and serene your heartbeat slowed to accommodate it.

A lone fishing boat at the far end of the lake turned the scene into a once in a lifetime snapshot.

It would give you pause to count the blessings of living in the greatest land on earth. Make you thankful for the early sacrifices of men like Dr. Joseph Warren, Samuel Adams and George Washington, who laid their very lives on the line for an idea, a concept and a country.....whose future wasn't as assured as the past we celebrate today.

Charlotte Melton, at this moment in time, drowned out the patriotic noise.

I kissed her over by the monkey bars. We were 12 or 13 at the time. It was my first. And by the quickness of the deed and the redness that rose up her cheeks, I'm pretty sure it was the initial one for her too.

We didn't repeat if for nearly two years. But we enjoyed "going steady" in the interim. The Melton farm was "on out" the highway from us. I hauled a lot of hay for her father, would help him feed his horses from time to time...and most always visited with his youngest daughter "since I was there."

Charlotte was a barrel racer. And a good one! Their home was filled with blue ribbons and trophies she'd won at nearly every horse show, rodeo and riding event in West Tennessee back in the day.

Mr. Melton kept a close eye on us. At least, I thought he did. He was a big man and rough as a stucco bathtub. Listen, when he pulled that straw cowboy hat down low and squinted at you,

he could make John Wayne look like Don Knotts!

He didn't exactly scare me away or hover around us. But when Charlotte and I rode off over the hills together I made sure my horse was a goodly measured distance from hers.

Charlotte and I were always better friends than serious daters. We had long talks about life, high school, teachers, sports, the world as we understood it and whether Butterfingers taste better than a Baby Ruth.

She cheered for me at football games like both of our lives depended on it.

We fought those high school, growing up, roller coaster teenage years side by side. Sometimes a real friend is better than a girlfriend. We promised each other on graduation night we'd stay in touch forever.

Forever, on this earth, didn't last too long.

Charlotte died when she was 25.

Cancer.

I peered across the beautiful North Carolina Mountains, with Lake Junaluska shimmering in the foreground, on this spotless July morning and my heart ached because my friend never had the opportunity to see this.

Pictures of so many places Charlotte missed.....and

I didn't...rippled through my mind.

A ride down the Columbia River Gorge is a sight like no other. The sun dropping into the water off Cape San Blas will awaken senses you didn't know you had. The Grand Canyon is aptly named.

There is a small cabin, built years ago by a man named Cunningham, still standing just a few miles north of Jackson Hole, Wyoming. He picked the perfect spot. From there you can see the snowcapped Teton Mountains filling the whole Western sky. It is another indescribably beautiful scene.

And oh, how Charlotte loved the West.

She talked so often of riding in rodeos in Cheyenne, Oklahoma City, Calgary, Pendleton, Oregon...

It wasn't to be.

A childhood friend is a gift from God that death cannot destroy.

We live in a world today that often majors on the minor. And looks for flaws in others rather than the goodness.

Maybe it would behoove us to dwell a bit more on the Charlotte Meltons in our lives.

And realize just exactly all the things they are missing...and comprehend on a little higher plane all the things that we are not!

Last Vol State Race Runs Through Area

The Last Vol State Race, the annual 314 mile race across the state of Tennessee, began July 8. The race starts at Dorena Landing, Missouri, with a ferry ride across the Mississippi River to Kentucky and ends at "the Rock" atop Sand Mountain in Castle Rock, Georgia.

Racers endure miles and miles of empty road with no aid stations and account for their most basic needs: food, water and shelter. The race organization provides transportation to the start of the race, parking at the end of the race, and a bailout for anyone wishing to vacate their attempt.

Friday, July 9, we stopped Norm Bittner, 51, as he ran through McKenzie, 56 miles into the race. Norm, a racer from Maple Shade, New Jersey, traveled with a group of friends to participate in the race across Tennessee. This year's Vol State Race is his first, following several previous 100 mile races and

Iron Man races.

From past experience in races, Norm knew to be prepared for extreme weather changes. On the starting day of the race, Norm's group experienced heavy rain about a mile and a half from the Dresden Farmer's Market. Norm said he was the only one in his group with a poncho, and everyone was soaked as they "got dumped on" by the sudden storm. However, the race goes on—rain or shine.

Norm split from his group early Friday morning, planning to finish the race as soon as he can to go home and see his three children.

The course, an approximately five-and-a-half hour drive, is estimated to take runners four-to-ten days to finish. Norm theorized the winner of the race will finish in three-and-a-half days. His goal is to finish in five.

The race yields no real prizes other than the satisfaction of making it to "the Rock." Norm's motto, "Make it happen," along with the camaraderie he has gained and the support he has received from passing communities motivates him to finish the 314 mile trek.

The race, estimated to finish July 18, is the fifteenth annual Last Vol State Race using this course.
