West Carroll School Board Approves Roof Repair Bid

ATWOOD (November 1) — West Carroll's School Board met in regular monthly session last Thursday taking action on a variety of items. Board members unanimously approved a \$500 bonus for employees of the school system. The board approved a \$15,351 bid from JM Roofing of Jackson to perform gutter and roof repairs to the Junior High/Senior High building. They also approved a request from school director Dexter Williams to purchase a storage building to go to the Junior High/Senior High school as long as the purchase includes the addition of a concrete pad for the building.

Several trips were approved for school groups. A trip to the High School Beta Club Convention was approved for November 14-18. An overnight trip request was approved for West Carroll's Softball team to participate in a tournament in Columbia, Tenn. March 29 and 30, 2019. A trip to the FCCLA Cluster meeting in Louisville, Kentucky. November 9-11.

Board members approved the second reading of a board

policy update regarding testing programs and tabled a request to add additional fencing to the backstop at the softball field to explore other options.

West Carroll Principal Tim Stratton told board members he got a phone call during October from the mother of a McKenzie student who got stranded and was assisted by a group of West Carroll students returning home from their game at Fulton City, Kentucky, including Celia Townsend, Thalia Townsend, CJ Ray, Makenya Gasken, Trace Fuller, Luke Blankenship, Darrell Williams, Hunter Wadley, Dalton Harriott, PJ Odom, Jeremiah Bryant, and Cody Wilredge.

Dana Carey, director of special programs, told the board that the district's Plan for Family Engagement needs to be updated and requested any information they could give on the existing plan and input on updating the plan.

Stratton also introduced West Carroll student Makenya Gasken who qualified to participate in the State Cross Country meet. He, along with other West Carroll principals, spotlighted their student interventionists. All of the principals indicated



their interventionists go above and beyond in their jobs. They were Primary interventionist Brandi Tolley and Primary School counselor Debra Keeton, Elementary interventionist Lauren Hays, and Junior High Senior High interventionist Crystal Polinski. Director Dexter Williams spotlighted the school system bookkeepers who have been instrumental in West Carroll not having any adverse audit findings for two consecutive years.

Fire Department Responds to Industrial Fire

McKenzie Fire Department responded to a fire at Cutting Specialists, Incorporated on Highway 22 north on Friday afternoon.

Firefighters found one of the heat-treat salt baths on fire. The in-house fire-suppression system activated and suppressed the fire. Firefighters remained on the scene and assured the fire was extinguished.

According to an official at CSI, “In the heat-treating process hot parts are submerged in oil to rapid cool and change the microstructure of the steel. Something went wrong in this stage of the process and the oil caught fire. The cause is still under investigation.”

Three Carroll County Bands Place in State Competition

MURFREESBORO (November 3) — Carroll County and Gibson County bands earned one-half of all the awards at the annual Division I (small bands) state marching competition in Murfreesboro on Saturday.

The day-long event featured 23 marching bands from throughout Tennessee competing at Riverdale High School. Competition began at 9 a.m. and ended with the trophy presentation at 9:30 p.m.

Of the 23 bands, the top 10 bands competed in a second, final round to earn placement as Tennessee’s 10 best small schools’ bands.

Earning first was Gibson County, second was Goodpasture, third was Cascade High, fourth was Trenton, fifth was Fayette Academy, sixth was Huntingdon, seventh was Houston County, eighth was McKenzie, ninth was Trousdale County, and tenth was West Carroll.

Huntingdon, McKenzie, and West Carroll from Carroll County and Gibson County High and Trenton from neighboring Gibson County took one-half of the top 10 honors.

McKenzie’s Cianna Haney earned over \$50,000 in Division One Scholarship from Bethel University and other schools.

McKenzie’s Zack Roy was the best overall soloist in finals competition.

CBD, a product used in medicines. The company lacks a few more days of harvesting the plants, and the operations in

McKenzie will finish by December 31.

Large propane heater units pump warm, dry air into the building through a network of flexible hoses. The air helps remove as much as 1,000 gallons of moisture from the plants. The large heaters run around the clock and create a low hum noise.

Overall, the farming and drying operations hires up to 100 employees for the seasonal work. Presently, about 60 to 65 are employed, said Michael.

Hemp is subject to lots of testing by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture.

Construction is also well underway at Granges, formerly Norandal, which is expanding its facility and is expected to add jobs in the future.

Henry County remained steady with an unemployment

rate of 4.3 percent in September, the same as August, but higher than 3.9 percent one year ago. From a labor force of 14,100, a total of 13,500 were employed and 600 were unemployed.

Weakley County had the biggest unemployment drop in the tri-counties with an unemployment rate of 4.3 percent, down from 5.0 percent in August, and down one percent from one year earlier. From a labor force of 15,900, approximately 15,210 were employed and 690 were unemployed.

Five of the top 10 counties in unemployment were in West

Tennessee, including Hardeman, Obion, McNairy, Haywood, and Lauderdale, which had the highest unemployment rate at 6.5 percent.

Northwest Tennessee had the highest overall unemployment at an average of 4.7 percent.

Williamson, Sevier, Davidson, Cheatham, and Rutherford counties were the top five counties with the lowest unemployment rate in the state.

Overall, Tennessee had an unemployment rate of 3.6 percent and the U.S. had a rate of 3.7 percent.

pay for the care of the rescued animals. Bond was originally set at \$391,994. The court ruling reduced the bond to \$50,000, according to Animal Rescue Corps.

Volunteers at Animal Rescue Corps have been caring for the

animals, including food, shelter, vet care and other expenses while the court case is ongoing.

Organizers of Monday’s protest said, “Someone needs to speak out for the ones that don’t have a voice. Please come to share our outrage for the poor animals that have to suffer and may be returned to the monsters that were mistreating them in the first place. We as volunteers

and donors shouldn’t stay quiet! These animals need to be neutered and spayed and find forever homes.

The Legal system needs to change and stop greedy monsters from having innocent puppies, cats, rabbits or anything with a heart beat.”

Each delay simply costs more to house the animals, said the two protestors.

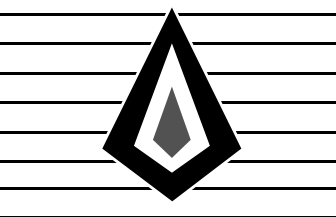

DRA's priorities for the region. Those priorities include: enhancing transportation and basic public infrastructure, supporting workforce training and development, and promoting business and economic development.

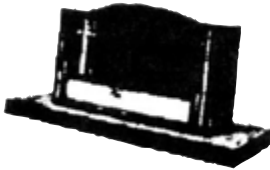

Derek Fields Performs at City Florist

McKENZIE (November 3) — Derek Fields of McKenzie said he was honored to have a sold-out gathering at the intimate Cooper's Café inside the new City Florist and More in downtown McKenzie. On Saturday evening, Fields, on guitar, and Steve Cunningham on percussion, performed music written by the artist himself. Many of the tracts are on the CD "Without Permission," while others had never been performed in public, said Fields. A long journey took a huge turn for singer-songwriter and lifelong McKenzie resident Derek Fields two years ago when he was asked to play at a gathering at the home of the late Dr. Volker Winkler. The local physician was so impressed with the musician that he offered to help him advance his career. Dr. Winkler would soon fulfill that offer by funding the studio time for Fields to record his debut album of original songs, Without Permission. In an interview with The Banner, Fields said that it's hard to put a label on his music, but settles on Americana. Influenced heavily by artists such as The Band and John Prine, his songs are a mix of blues, country, rock and soul, with an emphasis on the latter. He calls himself "a songwriter first," but spent many years only performing covers before finally dedicating all of his time to his original songs. Prior to playing that fateful set at the Winkler gathering, Fields had won a songwriting contest at Bethel University, earning him the right to record one song in the school's studio. After that, he had begun saving money for more time. With Winkler's contribution, Fields hit the studio immediately and began laying down the tracks

that would become Without Permission. He co-produced the album with John Buteyn, who also did the mixing and played bass, keyboards, saxophone, harp and tambourine. Other musicians included Joni Boyd (harmony vocals), D.J. Culp (percussion and drums), Sophia Chambers (violin and cello), Ken Nolen (drums), Aaron Holman (banjo), Jake Riggins (upright bass), Jeremiah Cole (upright bass), Christian Pipkin (B3) and Keith Hennis (Rhodes piano). Besides the lead vocals, Fields also played the guitar. The album was mastered by Cameron J. Henry at the Nashville recording studio Welcome to 1979. The title Without Permission is a nod to the fact that Fields didn't

have to earn the approval of or submit to the whims of a record company. He would regularly see Winkler, who would ask about the progress and told Fields, "I can't wait to hear it." Fields assured him, "I'll make sure you're the first to hear it." It's a promise that became impossible for Fields to keep as Winkler died in February from injuries sustained while riding an elliptical. "It's a heartbreaking thing that he never got to hear it," Fields told The Banner. The recording was done, but the songs had yet to be mixed. "I really want people to know what he did for me," he added. The album's liner notes

include: "Without Permission is dedicated to the late Volker Winkler, who believed in me and my music enough to give me this opportunity." Fields says that for now, music is still a hobby, but hopes that the album may help him build a fan base. "If I can get enough of a return on this, I can continue." Without Permission is available now to stream or purchase at derekfields.hearnow.com and on all major streaming sites. Fields can be contacted at robinsonleverearecords@gmail.com. The 41-year-old has worked at AT&T for 22 years. He and his wife, Lauren, have four children. Derek is the son of Jim Fields of McKenzie and Diane Conley of Trezevant.

War Eagles Top Hillcrest to Earn Rematch at Lake County

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MEMPHIS (November 2) — The West Carroll War Eagles opened the TSSAA Class A Football Playoffs on the road against the Hillcrest Vikings at Booker T. Washington High School. The War Eagles blanked Hillcrest to lead by two scores at the half. The Vikings opened the second half with a quick touchdown, but West Carroll stayed at least two steps ahead the rest of the way for a 47-28 win.

The win sets up a daunting Region 7-1A rematch for the War Eagles as they will travel to Tip-topville Friday to face region champion Lake County at 7 p.m. The Falcons traveled to Atwood a month ago and defeated West Carroll 36-7. However, the War Eagles have not lost a game on the road this season (6-0).

West Carroll won the toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff.

A squib kick gave the War Eagles good field position at their own 45. Jeremiah Bryant took the first snap for 12 yards on a keeper. Trace Fuller kept the next snap for five yards. Jarrius Weatherford moved the chains with a seven-yard carry, then Fuller kept again for two. Weatherford gained just a yard on second down, but Fuller found a gap on third down to move the chains to the 13. Bryant gained nine, then Fuller punched it in from four yards out. The point-after kick missed, but West Carroll drew first blood for a 6-0 lead with seven minutes to play in the first frame.

A penalty against Hillcrest on the kickoff return started the drive at the 30. The War Eagle defense forced a three-and-out with a tackle by Garrett Brooks and back-to-back passes tipped by Armoni Bonds and Luke Blankenship, respectively. The punt went out of bounds at the West Carroll 29.

Weatherford started the drive with a two-yard run, then lost two. On third-and-ten, Bryant threw to Zach Perry for a 32-yard gain. Weatherford followed with carries for eleven and five yards, then Fuller kept for five more and a first down at the Viking 19. After a short gain by Weatherford, a penalty cost West Carroll five yards. Weatherford made another short gain, then Fuller kept for eight to bring up fourth-and-four at the 13. Weatherford gained five for a first-and-goal at the 8, then made a short gain. Fuller pushed it to the 3 on a keeper as the opening quarter came to an end. Weatherford gained just a yard on third down to start the second. Fuller went into the end zone on fourth down, but a holding penalty negated the score. From 12 yards out, Fuller threw incomplete to turn the ball over on downs.

Viking William Harris started with a 19-yard run to the 31. From there, the War Eagle defense stifled the drive. Bonds, Fuller and Devin Nash made respective stops, and the Hillcrest punt was downed at the West Carroll 34.

Fuller threw incomplete, then Weatherford ran to the outside for 16 yards to midfield. Two consecutive penalties pushed the War Eagles back to a first-and-23 at the 38. Bryant kept twice to make it third-and-ten. Fuller's pass was dropped, then Nash's punt was downed at the Viking 10.

Hillcrest managed two first downs, but stalled again. On fourth-and-ten from their own 45, the Vikings' punt went low and moved the ball just a yard to the 46.

Bryant gained just a yard, but repeated for nine to move the chains. Fuller made a short gain, the Weatherford ran for 15. He

then lost a yard, followed by a short gain by Bryant. A penalty made it third-and-13, but Bryant gained eleven down to the 12. On fourth-and-two, Fuller kept for eight to set up first-and-goal at the 4 with a minute to play in the half. He repeated for two yards, then Weatherford lost four. With 20 seconds and the clock running, Fuller kept for the touchdown. Nash added the PAT, and West Carroll led 13-0.

Hillcrest made a solid return to midfield, but the half ended on the first snap as a keeper by quarterback Defavus Ross was stopped for no gain by Bonds.

The Vikings received the second-half kickoff, which sailed out of bounds to start them at their own 40. Ross threw to Harris for six yards, then a penalty moved Hillcrest back to the 41. Ross threw to Nicholas Mathis for a 59-yard touchdown, then threw to Harris for the two-point conversion. Early in the third, the West Carroll lead was cut to 13-8.

Weatherford returned the ensuing kickoff all the way to the Viking 25, and a Hillcrest penalty on first down pushed it to the 20. Bryant gained three, then Fuller kept for a one-yard loss. He gained six on the next attempt to move the chains. Bryant had consecutive seven-yard carries to give West Carroll a first-and-goal at the 1, and Weatherford punched it in. Nash added the point-after, and the War Eagles were again up by two scores, 20-8.

Nash again kicked out of bounds, but Ross threw three incompletions for another Viking three-and-out. A high snap resulted in a low punt that bounced off of a Hillcrest lineman for a ten-yard loss.

The disastrous punt gave West Carroll great field position at the Viking 35. Weatherford lost four, but then gained 19. Bryant kept for 15, then repeated for a five-yard touchdown. A bad snap

resulted in a missed PAT, but the War Eagles were ahead 26-8 with just under six minutes to play in the third.

Viking Sammie Kuykendall returned the ensuing kickoff 60 yards for a touchdown. Ross threw incomplete on the two-point attempt, and the West Carroll lead was cut to 26-14.

Hillcrest made a false start on the kick and had to retry from the 35. An onside attempt traveled just three yards to give the War Eagles another favorable starting position at the Viking 38. Fuller kept for 21 yards, then Bryant kept for five. Weatherford was dropped for a loss on second down, but Bryant kept on third-and-long for a 20-yard touchdown. Nash split the uprights, and West Carroll had opened up a 33-14 lead with about four minutes on the third-quarter clock.

After the ensuing kickoff return, the Vikings were flagged for a late hit and forced to start from their own 14. Ross threw for five yards, then kept for two. Harris ran for seven to move the chains, then Ross threw to Mathis for eight yards. Two straight incomplete passes

brought up fourth-and-two, but Ross found Braevion Straughter wide open for a 63-yard touchdown. Ross passed for the two-point conversion, and the score was 33-22 with just over a minute left in the third.

West Carroll added a score on a drive that extended into the final frame. The drive looked to be stopped at the Viking 38, but on fourth-and-inches, Bryant took it all the way to the 3. From there, Weatherford needed three tries, but punched it in. Nash added the PAT, and the War Eagles led 40-22.

The Vikings made a strong return to start at their own 42. Ross threw incomplete on first down, then tossed to a running back, who threw an interception to Bryant.

Starting at the Hillcrest 35, Fuller was stopped for no gain. Weatherford ran for 30 to the 6, then ran for three more. Fuller took it in on the next play, but the touchdown was negated by a holding penalty. Bryant lost six, then a delay of game penalty pushed West Carroll back to a third-and-goal at the 23. Fuller threw to Blaine Howell in the

end zone for the touchdown, and Nash's kick made it 47-22 with just under four minutes to play in the contest.

Starting deep, Ross completed consecutive passes for gains of 19 and 25 yards. After missing on two throws, he connected with Harris for a touchdown. Ross was sacked on the two-point attempt, and the War Eagle lead was 47-28 with two and a half minutes to play.

Weatherford started the last drive with a three-yard run, then Fuller kept for five. Weatherford moved the chains on the next play, and time expired.

West Carroll had 426 yards of offense, including 372 yards on the ground. Jeremiah Bryant led with 154 yards on 19 carries, including a pair of touchdowns. 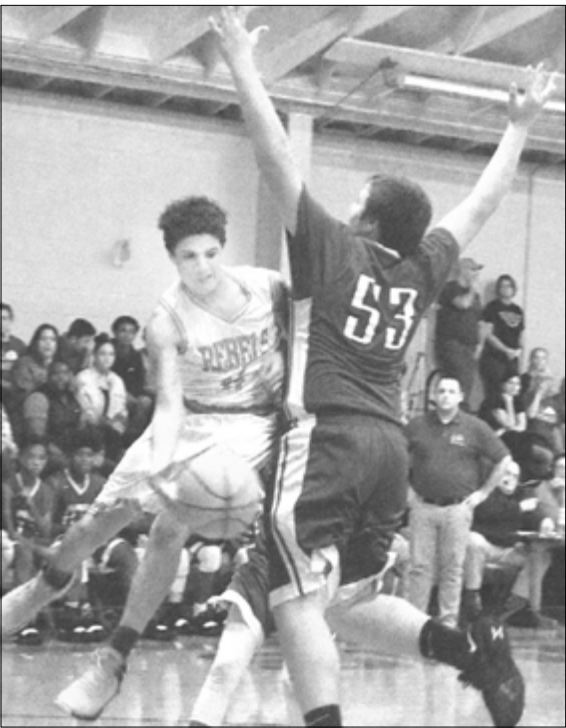

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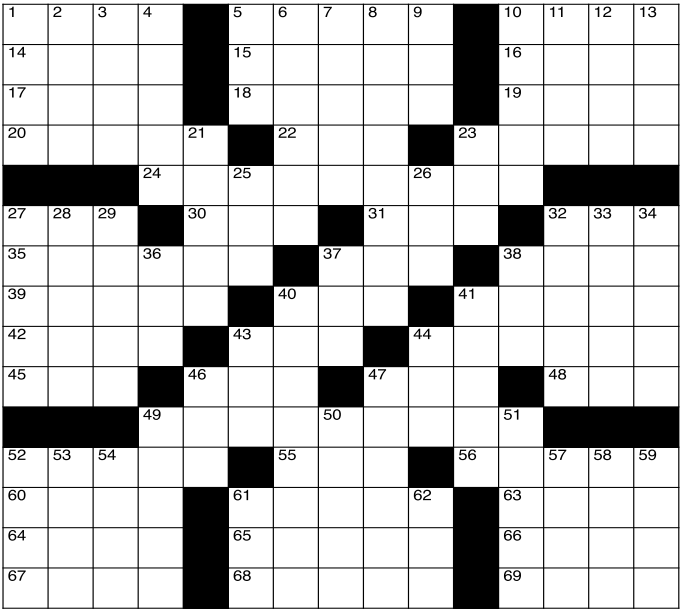

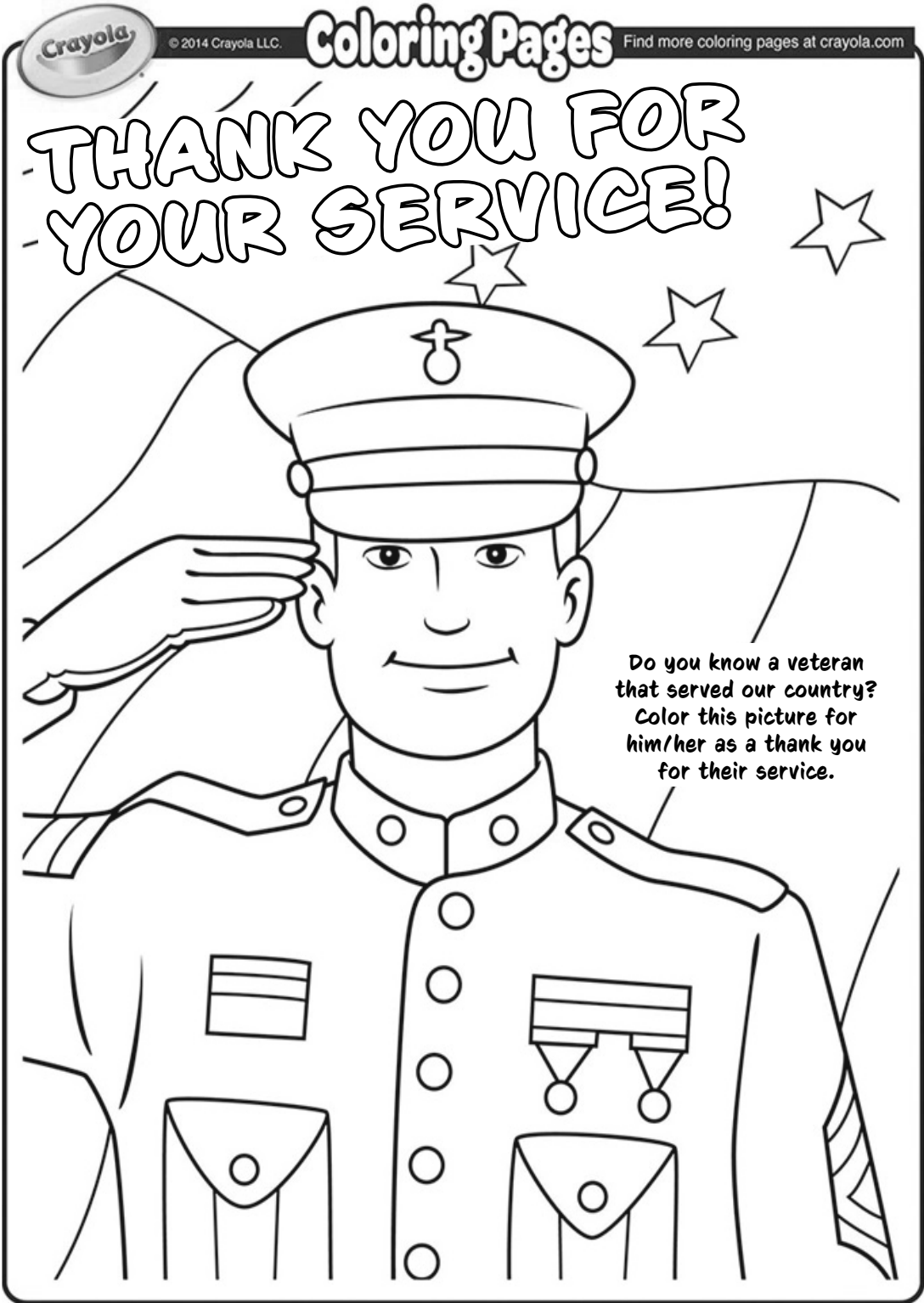
