BACK TO SCHOOL

McKenzie, Huntingdon, West Carroll Release Preliminary Enrollment

Three Carroll County schools released preliminary enrollment numbers for the first week of school. The three directors noted enrollment often changes during the early weeks of a new school year.

In McKenzie, the school recorded 485 students at McKenzie Elementary School, 378 students at McKenzie Middle School (grades 5-8) and 355 at McKenzie High School.

Lynn Watkins, director of schools, said the enrollment numbers are "steady" as compared to last year and there is no significant gain or loss. Total enrollment was 1,303 at that moment of reporting.

In Huntingdon, the Primary School has 404 students, up from 378 last year; Middle School has 523, equal to last year; and 412 at High School, up from 402 last year. Total enrollment is 1,339.

At West Carroll, the Primary at McLemoresville had 228 enrolled, down 10 as compared to one year earlier. The Elementary School in Trezevant had an enrollment of 238, down 18 from the previous year. West Carroll Jr/Sr High School has an enrollment of 455, up 10 students compared to last year.

West Carroll Approves Budget, COVID Plan

ATWOOD (August 5) — West Carroll Special School District Board of Education approved a \$9,051,084 budget for the fiscal year 2021-22, beginning July 1, 2021. It is funded by a local tax rate of \$1.2207 per \$100 assessed value on real property within the district.

Preston Caldwell, director of schools, said it is the same rate as the previous year. The budget provides a four percent raise for all employees of the school system. The budget also includes an annual payment of \$330,000 to the long-term loan.

On a separate budget is the ESSER 3.0 money allocated to the system by the federal government of \$2.3 million, to be spent to respond to COVID-19. Caldwell said the funds can be used

The order, which expires on August 31, allows for the Tennessee National Guard to continue to assist in public health and vaccination efforts as the COVID-19 pandemic continues.

For months, guardsmen have assisted in facilitating COVID-19 testing and vaccinations at health departments and other public health facilities across the state.

Baitfish Released In 1000-Acre Recreation Lake

Approximately 12,500 threadfin shad were released on Tuesday at the Carroll County Thousand Acre Recreational Lake.

Officials from the Carroll County Watershed Authority, County Mayor Joseph Butler, Huntingdon Mayor Dale Kelley, and Chamber President Brad Hurley joined several local anglers in watching the release of the fish.

The threadfin shad were paid for by the Carroll County Chamber Fish Care Account. As soon as more funds are secured, more orders for threadfin shad will be made.

The shad are baitfish for the bass population, which is numerous in the lake, but lack adequate baitfish to flourish.

The lake hosts the Bassmaster Junior Bass Tournament on the lake each year along with other tournaments and daily fishing.

Additional Key Highlights from the 2020 Report:

In the first two months of 2020, Tennessee's leisure and hospitality industry was on a record track. COVID-19 was the largest crisis to hit the leisure and hospitality industry in history.

In 2020, tourism shifted away from business and solo travel to longer, leisure-oriented family trips.

4 cup ground unpeeled cucumbers

1/2 cup ground red sweet pepper

3 cup onion

1/4 cup salt (canning salt)

2 cup white vinegar

1 tablespoon mustard seed

1 cup ground green sweet peppers

3 1/2 cup sugar

1 tablespoon celery seed

Optional: Add 1/2 cup shredded carrots and cut back on celery and mustard seed to 1/2 Tablespoon)

McKenzie School Board to Decide COVID-19 Policy on August 17

McKENZIE (August 3) — What is the school’s policy for COVID for the 2021-22 school year? That will be discussed and decided during a special meeting on Tuesday, August 17, 5:30 p.m. at the Board Office, located on Bell Avenue.

After a long discussion during the August 3 board meeting concerning quarantines, social distancing, vaccines, and virtual schools, the board decided to gather more information, stakeholders’ input, and monitor the number of COVID infections in the county and area.

In lieu of a new COVID policy for 2021-22, the school is continuing with its 2020-21 COVID policy, sans the mask mandates, which were eliminated during the final weeks of the last school year.

A proposal was postponed which would have allowed students, who have contact with a person who tests positive for COVID, that contact person would have to remain asymptomatic, wear a mask, and not participate in any extracurricular activities. Board Member Misty Aird said administrators and teachers were vaccinated to avoid being quarantined.

The Tennessee General Assembly voted to prohibit schools from having virtual schools and also prohibits schools from requiring vaccines. Schools can still require other vaccines, unless there are health counteractions or religious objections.

In other business, McKenzie Mayor Jill Holland addressed the board concerning the contract between the City of McKenzie and McKenzie Special School District for the use of two ball fields at the McKenzie City Park. The contract

price increased from \$2,000 annually to \$3,500. Mayor Holland said the \$2,000 price was unchanged for 10 years while the cost of providing services increase. She provides an itemized lists of services, which are estimated to cost the city \$6,040 annually. The school pays \$3,500 to use the two fields for both fall and spring sports.

The board approved amendments to school board policies to comply with new state laws. One is student-athletes must compete on teams according to his or her birth gender. In other policies, the school approved a policy to assure the school complies with cyber infrastructure to guard against cyber attacks. The school must offer advanced courses to all students, according to state law. Lynn Watkins, director of schools, said the school offers dual enrollment through Bethel University and TCAT-McKenzie for all students.

A new policy is a policy

concerning family life education. All schools must teach family life. The school is awaiting guidance before establishing a formal policy. Parents can opt out for their children.

The school must provide career guidance to seventh and eighth graders after providing a career aptitude test. Watkins said the school is already providing that service.

A policy concerning truancy was also approved. It is designed to encourage the student to attend and remain in school through levels of intervention and parent meetings.

A policy added indicates home-school teachers must either have a high school diploma, GED or HiSET. The local LEA must monitor students, who are home schooled within their districts.

Jaden Barton, a senior at MHS, was administered the oath to service as the student representative to the board. She serves in an advisory, non-voting position.

to install or enhance heating and cooling systems, and pay for nurses, school custodians, or purchase technology, or enhance the physical plant of the school, such as the removal of carpet. The funds must be spent over the next three years or forfeited. The school must present its ESSER 3.0 plan in late August for approval of the expenditures.

COVID-19 is again a concern for area school systems as the number of cases have resurged. The board approved a four-phase plan to deal with COVID-19 according to the level of spread of the virus in the community and school. Presently the school is in Phase 3 (minimal spread). Caldwell said the county of Carroll (countywide) recorded 22 positive cases for the period July 7 through 14 and 90 cases for July 21 to August 3.

Caldwell said each school district cannot operate its own virtual school as it did last year. West Carroll chose to attend school Monday to Thursday and be virtual on Fridays during the 2020-21 school year. This year, students return to the usual five-day week.

Phase 1 (High/Substantial Spread) — Schools Closed and students would revert to virtual learning.

Phase 2 (Moderate Spread) — No visitors at school with the exception of lobby, office. There would be no assembly programs, TSSAA guidelines for sports, masks would be highly encouraged. Social distancing would be practiced. Hand sanitizing stations would be set up throughout buildings. Water fountains would be used as hand-free bottle filling stations. The school would be deep cleaned with hospital-grade disinfectants. Employee temperature checks would be daily. Students would be checked

daily for body temperatures. If the temperature is 100 degrees, the student would leave the school. If COVID is suspected, the student must be quarantined for 10 to 14 days and the last three days must be asymptomatic and fever-free without use of medication.

If a student is exposed to COVID due to exposure, the student must be tested. Masks are highly encouraged. Restrooms and all common areas will be disinfected frequently.

Also under Phase 2, pre-packaged food and beverages will be distributed to each student, students will eat breakfast in classroom, students will be seated at assigned desks, students are encouraged not to bring lunch from home. Students will sanitize hands when entering and leaving a classroom and students will walk on the right side of the hallways. For bus transportation, students will await the announcement of their bus number before leaving the classrooms.

Phase 3 (minimal spread) — The phase currently observed. Visitors are allowed at administrator’s discretion. Workers can enter with limited access and prior authorization. Masks are highly recommended. Assemblies and programs can proceed at the building administrator’s discretion. Sports will follow TSSAA guidelines. Everyone is encouraged to social distance and use the hand sanitizing stations throughout the building. Students will sanitize hands before entering and leaving an area. Schools will be deep cleaned. Employees’ temperatures will be checked daily. Students will be subject to daily temperature checks and if COVID is suspected, the student will quarantine for 10 to 14 days. If a student is exposed and is asymptomatic, the student must remain out of school and in quarantine for 10 to 14 days. Masks are encouraged, but not required.

Food-breakfast – students will be assigned seats and social distanced in the waiting line and while eating.

Students will sanitize hands when entering and exiting classrooms, desks will be sanitized when a child becomes ill in class, students will have assigned desks. Students will walk along the right side in hallways and observe social distancing. The restroom and bus policy is the same as Phase 2.

Phase 4 (low or no spread) — No restrictions.

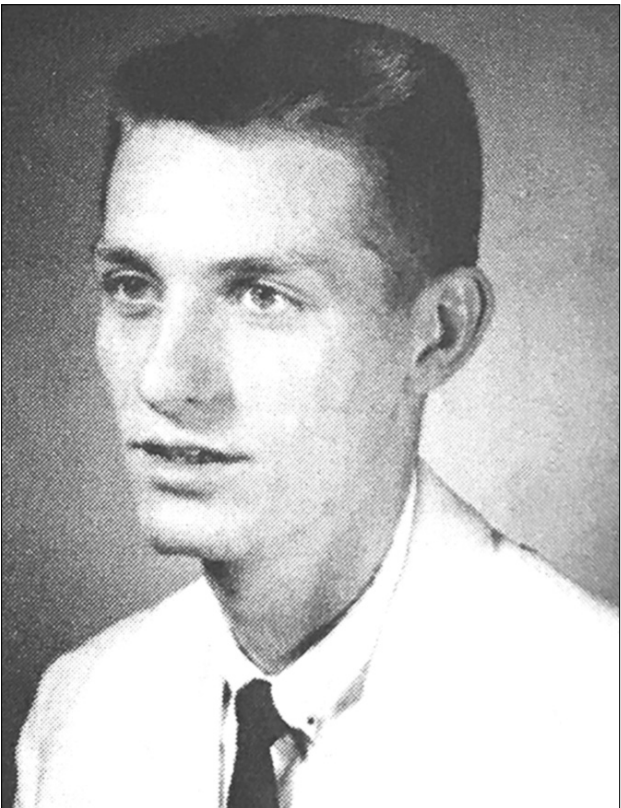
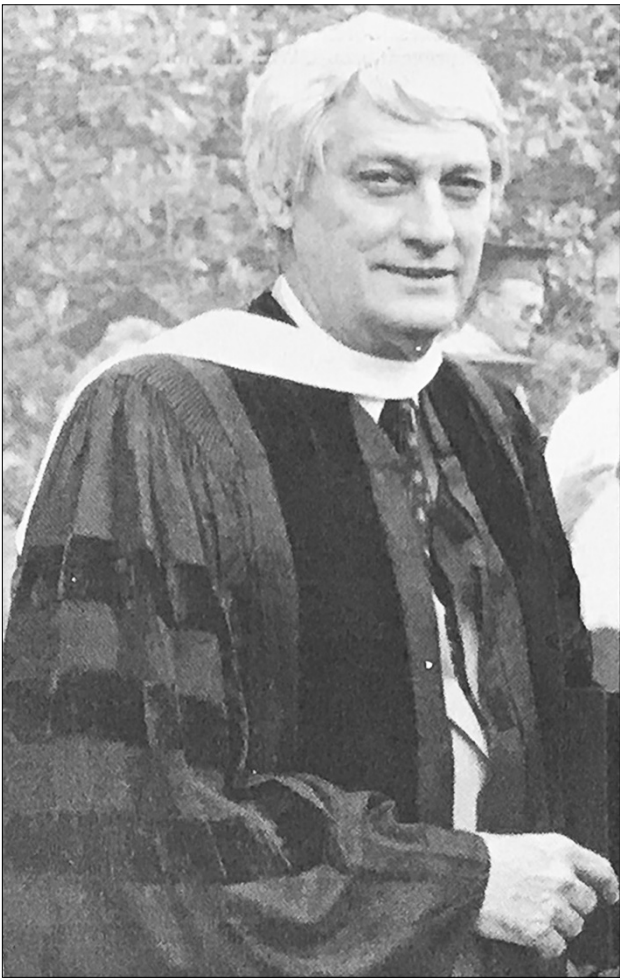
Persons wishing to address the Board of Education while its in session must seek permission prior to the meeting and must address topics on the agenda. The Board normally has two readings (two votes) on changes to policy, however, on a motion by Patrick Lindsey, the board voted to waive the second reading.

The board approved to seek of bids for the purchase of a dish machine at the West Carroll Junior/Senior High and approval of bids to make repairs at the field-house and the visitors’ side fence and walkway at the football field.

The schools’ Beta Clubs were honored for succeeding in the national Beta Club conventions in Florida. School staff members Brittany Fowler, Cindi Wilbanks, and Sally Arnold introduced the students during the meeting and told of their accomplishments.

The School Food Service Staff was honored for its commitment to serve the students meals even during the pandemic. A total of 420,719 meals were served from March 2020 to the opening of school this year.

The school board was notified of the resignations of eight professional, licensed staff members including Anthony Blackmon, Bryant Comer, Cory Essary, Wendi Ford, Kirsten Goggin, Amber Liggins, Jason Martin and Amanda Wilkes. More than 30 professional staff members have resigned since May.

Celebrating McKenzie's oldest business and historical record

James T. Wooten

Bethel's Star Journalist

It's not often, a small private school in rural America can claim an award-winning journalist and television correspondent as an alumnus. Yet, Bethel University has that distinction with James Terrell Wooten.

Since graduating from Bethel College in 1958, Wooten received numerous awards for his portfolio of work including the Ernie Pyle Memorial Medal, Overseas Press Club Award, the Joe Alex Morris Award from Harvard University, the Blue Pencil Award from Columbia University, Overseas Press Club Award, and the Robert F. Kennedy Award. Outside the awards, he had an impressive career as a

journalist, including serving as a White House correspondent for the New York Times and holding several positions with ABC News.

It was not the original plan for Wooten to attend Bethel. He was set to attend Purdue University and study architecture after graduating from high school in Owensville, Indiana. On the day of graduation, he and his girlfriend were in a serious wreck that totaled his father's vehicle. Feeling responsible for the accident, Wooten purchased a replacement vehicle from the money he had saved for his tuition at Purdue.

Just sixteen years old at the time, Wooten made an alternative plan to join the Navy when he would turn

seventeen. His parents, not wanting to see him start a military career, persuaded him to enroll at Bethel College. His father, J.R., was a Cumberland Presbyterian minister and through his affiliation with the church, the school offered discounted tuition.

It was arranged for Wooten to work for Clara Dishman. His job was washing dishes for two meals and running the "hot water heater" for the gym.

"With the tuition break from my father's ministry, that seemed doable," Wooten said in a 2004 interview. He also starched and ironed shirts for a quarter each, something he learned from his mother, Clara.

In his second year at Bethel, he earned a full-ride scholarship to play basketball. With a double major in history and English, he graduated in 1958. During his senior year, he decided to become a minister based on his father's desires. Following graduation, he married Joanne Richardson and attended the seminary.

After seminary school in Memphis, he had a short stint as the pastor of a church in Waverly. Realizing his calling was not

with the church. He became a high school teacher in Greenville, Kentucky. While in Greenville, he worked for the newspapers in page layout, writing and sports photography. His work led to an offer to become an editor for the Weakley County Press in Martin.

By the mid-1960s, the Wootens and their two daughters, Karen and Kris, were moving to Huntsville, Alabama. Working as a reporter, Wooten was in the deep south watching the Civil Rights Movement unfold.

"We were not the only paper in Alabama not in chains to George Wallace," he said, describing his paper as "an activist newspaper, which is the best king."

"We were young reporters; we thought we were changing the world and we were having an adventure called journalism."

Looking back he said, "that was the oven in which my journalism bread was baked; without that kind of experience, which was rich in terms of stories, rich in terms of real history being made with George Wallace's politics and Martin Luther King, Jr. ... without that, I don't think I would have had any

skills other than ordinary skills."

From Alabama, his career took off with stops at the New York Times and the Philadelphia Enquirer. He and Joanne had two more daughters, Katie and Elizabeth, before her death in 1978.

By 1979, he moved to television with ABC News, where he remained for over 25 years.

"It took about a year before the light bulb went on how to write for TV; everything has to be compressed into a minute 40 or two minutes long. You learn to compress information into small chunks and let pictures do at least half of the work. And you learn to live with the unfortunate fact that you can never tell the entire story. It's frustrating, but you get better."

"I've covered a lot of wars, everything from the revolutions in El Salvador and Nicaragua to Grenada... the October War of 1973, Israel, Syria and Egypt... Bosnia and Kosovo, Desert Storm, Afghanistan, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, Somalia and Ethiopia... and I've covered presidential campaigns in national politics since 1968."

He remarried in the mid-

1980s to Patience O'Connor, and they had a daughter, Lacie.

In 1990, Bethel honored Wooten win an honorary doctorate of humane letters.

In 2005, he retired from ABC News. Now in the twilight of his years, Wooten still has not fully retired as he focused on writing books.

"And I plan to spend more time with my grandchildren, my children and my wife. I'll always be writing books 'til they put me under the ground."

Just this past week an Olympic announcer was discussing one of the athletes in Tokyo. He said this particular participant was "lucky to be here." And he went into some long, extraneous dialogue as to all the reasons for his good fortune...

It took just seconds for my mind to throw up the "this is all BUNK" signal.

He is in the Olympics for goodness sakes! He didn't get there by accident. He worked his tail off. He, or she as the case may be, sacrificed like we normal folks can't understand. Sure there is talent ingrained. God given. But that only gives you ground for a starting place.

I saw those swimmers go eight laps, down and back, in one race. I don't know how many yards or meters or half miles that is. But I couldn't swim, on my best day, half a lap in any size pool without stopping to catch my breath.

It's hard for an average mind to comprehend the training and discipline and gut wrenching work that would prepare an individual for such an ordeal. I guarantee you, there ain't no luck involved in it!

And while we are on water sports, those Olympic performers can even make synchronized swimming look entertaining. Whew brother! That takes a way lot more

than luck...

We had a game saving goal line stand late in a football game in 1969. Someone remarked to me after the game, "Coach, we sure got lucky there at the end."

The gentleman meant well and he was as equally proud of the win as I was. But I don't think we were watching the same game.

He saw luck. I saw 11 sixteen and seventeen year old young men diving over each other to keep the other team out of our end zone! I saw 11 guys who didn't blink, flinch or turn aside. They didn't wimp out or look for a rabbit's foot. They didn't depend on anybody or anything else to get the job done.

We had rehearsed, and practiced against, that power slant off the strong side tackle in every goal line drill for the entire season. Every offense ran that play inside the five yard line. Preparation trumps luck by any measuring stick you want to use!

On fourth down in that particular game, our defensive tackle on the goal line, Adrian Gant, jammed the offensive tackle into the ground and pinned him between his knees. With a left arm shiver he played off the slot back who looped inside to open up the running lane Adrian was standing in. He tossed the fullback off to his right in the same manner and met the tailback head on for a one yard loss. And a turnover on downs. And a victory for our side.

I watched that play on film over and over with tears in my eyes. I still see it in my mind to this day...with tears in my eyes.

Early in that season Adrian looked up at me after a particularly tough tackling drill with sweat streaming out of every pore in his body, "Coach, I can't do this no more."

"A-Buddy, your grammar is OK, but obviously you are not familiar with that song, 'We've Only Just Begun!'"

Let's be careful not to sell anybody short by confusing effort, work, grit and determination with luck.

And I'm not saying here that unmerited good fortune doesn't fall on all of us at one time or another. I dated Barbara Jean Dalrymple for one whole summer. She was beautiful and nice; her dad owned a bank, lots of bottom land down near Paris Landing and a hardware store.

I thought it was a match made in Heaven...for which I had done nothing to secure, foster or maintain.

All my high school friends thought I was the luckiest guy around. "It can't be nothing but luck" is the way Yogi put it. And Buddy. And Phil. And everybody else! If I had been a sensitive lad, they could have hurt my feelings!

But they were right, of course.

So I have seen both sides of the coin. I deeply admire those that worked hard, sacrificed, went the extra mile to accomplish all that they have. And I have been the recipient on many occasions of pure, unadulterated, flat-out luck.

Let's be smart enough to recognize, and give credit, to each in its appropriate place...

Tennessee Launches Additional Food Benefits for Children

NASHVILLE (August 5) — The Tennessee Department of Human Services (TDHS) wants Tennesseans to know additional benefits will be available for families who need help purchasing food this summer.

The state’s fourth round of benefits made available as part of the Summer Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) program will provide hundreds of dollars in benefits to qualifying families so they can immediately begin purchasing food.

“Research shows well-nourished children are healthier, more attentive, and have better mental performance,” said TDHS Commissioner Clarence H. Carter. “The launch of this additional round of support will enhance the well-being of Tennesseans by providing benefits to families who didn’t qualify for earlier rounds of P-EBT, as well as by providing additional benefits to those families who still need our help. We are grateful we can provide this additional assistance to our fellow Tennesseans.”

Summer P-EBT is an extension of Tennessee’s successful P-EBT program, which provided food benefits to approximately 800 thousand children who received free and reduced meals at school.

There are two categories of children who are eligible for Summer P-EBT benefits:

- School-aged children who qualified for the National School Lunch Program as of the last day of July. Beginning August 6, 2021, eligible school-aged children will receive a single disbursement of \$375 in food benefits on their existing P-EBT card. Children who qualified for Summer P-EBT in June or July will receive their deposit by the end of September.
- Children under the

age of 6 whose family received benefits through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in June and/or July. Eligible children under 6 who qualify through their family’s SNAP participation will receive a disbursement of \$375 on their regular SNAP EBT card later this month.

Qualifying children who don’t already have a P-EBT card will be issued one. Parents can check to see if they’re eligible for Summer P-EBT and verify their mailing address on the Parent Portal on this website. Parents with incorrect addresses on the portal and those who need additional assistance are encouraged to call the P-EBT Hotline at 833-496-0661.

P-EBT cards are used like a debit card to purchase food at participating local establishments, online with Amazon, Walmart, Aldi, Food Lion, Publix, H.G. Hills, or at Superlloo in Memphis. to receive Summer P-EBT.

P-EBT benefits were provided to more than 765,000 children during the first round of P-EBT for the spring 2020 school semester and 368,000 children were mailed cards for the second round that ended in September. The third round of P-EBT covered the remainder of the 2020/2021 school year, with benefit cards being sent to more than 576,000 students.

The Families First Coronavirus Response Act of 2020 (PL 116-127, the Consolidated Appropriations Act 2021 (PL 116-260), and the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (PL 117-2) provides the Secretary of Agriculture authority to approve state agency plans to administer P-EBT. Approved state agencies may operate P-EBT when a school is closed for at least five consecutive days during a public health emergency designation when the school would otherwise be in session.

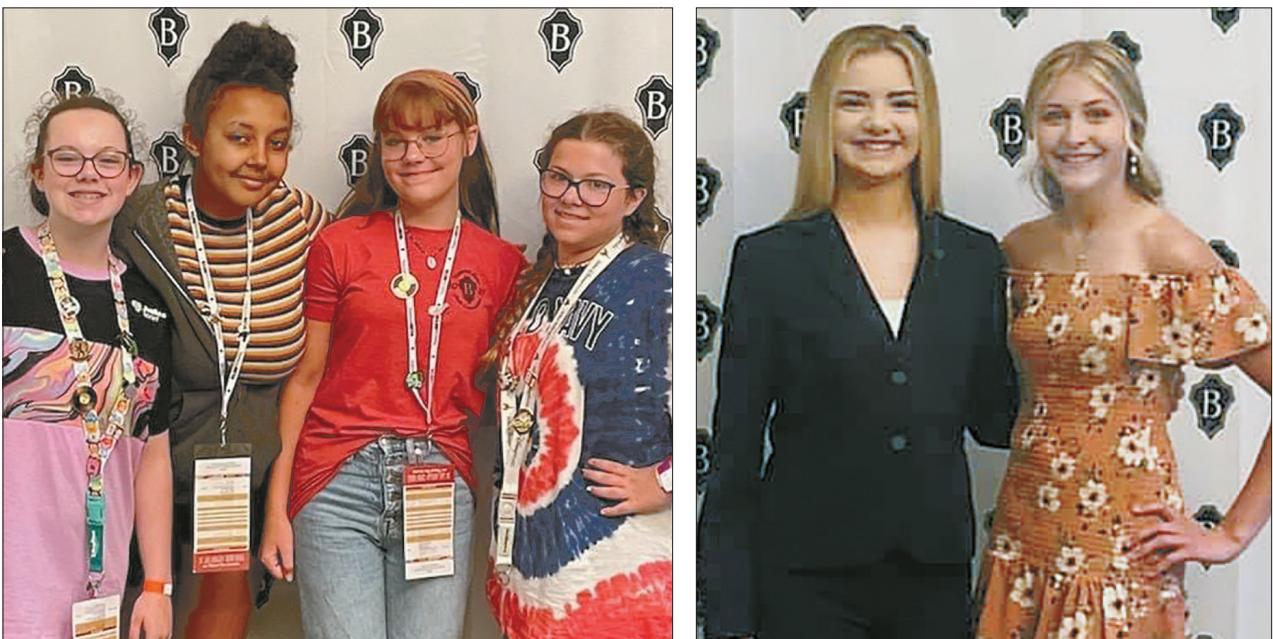
West Carroll Elementary/Junior Beta Club: National Runner-Up in Marketing and Communications while Jack Robinson placed 9th in the Academics Division in Math.
