go out for coffee, and you end up with an amazing send off from McKenzie and Huntingdon, as well as proclamations from both Mayor Jill Holland from McKenzie, Tennessee and Mayor Joseph Butler (Carroll County Mayor), well that makes for quite an incredible morning!

“Thank you to everyone who put this together and came out to see me off, and to all those who couldn’t make it but sent good luck messages. I am so proud to call this community my home, and am beyond blessed.”

Kirsten and Amy compete in the paratriathlon August 27 at 6:34 p.m. Central Time at Odaiba Bay, a course the duo is lucky enough to have raced in the past. Because of COVID-19 protocol rules, no spectators are allowed at the Paralympics. NBC networks will broadcast the games.

Their mutual story began in 2017 when Kirsten first met Amy Dixon, her partner in the race. Kirsten had always been interested in guiding paratriathlon athletes.

Amy Dixon, a para athlete from San Diego, was in need of a guide after her original guide was ruled ineligible for their upcoming race in Yokohama, Japan, and all of her substitute guides were unable to race. The two racers found each other through friends of friends, both knowledgeable of each others’ successes in triathlons. Kirsten and Amy first met a few days before the competition in Japan and immediately bonded. They also raced in Edmonton, Canada, and Rotterdam, Netherlands, that year.

Since 2017, Kirsten and Amy have earned four World Cup places and first through seventh place in over seventeen races. For-

tunately, the two have competed on the same course in which they will compete later this month.

As a guide, Kirsten acts as Amy’s “eyes”. Amy has lost 98% of her vision due to a rare autoimmune disease. However, her motto is: “You don’t need to have sight to have vision.” In their division they will race against other legally blind athletes including those who are completely blind.

In paratriathlons, athletes swim 750 meters, bike 20 kilometers, and run 5 kilometers. While swimming, Kirsten and Amy are tethered together with a bungee cord. The two bike on a tandem bike with Kirsten in the front and Amy in the back. They are also bungee-corded together while running. Kirsten informs Amy of upcoming obstacles, leads her in the right directions and tells her their placement.

The Paralympic preliminaries began four years ago. There is a point system established for competitors. They have to win enough races to get onto the national team. From there, they continue to

move up in points based on races and where they finish.

Kirsten and Amy’s final qualifying race was June 27, where they claimed ninth spot in the world in paratriathlon rankings. Kirsten attributes her dad, the late Dr. Volker Winkler, for her experience and success in triathlons.

Growing up, she said her dad made her and her five siblings run one 5K, just once in their lives, and they would never have to run one again. Kirsten started running again when she attended the University of Western Ontario in Canada, and her roommate invited her to start swimming that same year. Shortly after moving off-campus, Kirsten bought a bike to make commuting easier. One day while at the school’s pool, she unknowingly asked the triathlon club coach how many laps it took to swim a mile. After that conversation, the coach invited Kirsten to join the triathlon club.

Since her first race, Kirsten Sass has become a champion triathlete. She was the USA Triathlon Overall Amateur Female

Triathlete for 2013, 2015, 2016, and 2017. She won the USA Triathlon Open Amateur Female Triathlete of the Year in 2018. She won the USA Triathlon Overall Amateur Female Duathlete of the Year 2015, 2016, 2019. She is the 10X World Champion Gold Medalist, a 5-time World Champion Silver Medalist and a World Champion Bronze Medalist in Triathlon, Duathlon, and Aquathlon.

Kirsten holds 23 national championships in the Triathlon and Duathlon, and in 2016, she was awarded the Ironman Louisville Overall Female. In March, she was honored for her international athletic accomplishments by the City of McKenzie with three roadside signs noting her achievements. March 4, 2021 was designated as Kirsten Winkler Sass Day in the city of McKenzie.

During the celebration on Thursday, August 12, Kirsten received proclamations for her success from both Mayor Holland and Mayor Butler. Butler proclaimed ‘Kirsten Sass Day’ in all of Carroll County for August 12.

Bateman is New Trezevant Councilman

Bateman is a retired barber and previously served

public hearing concerning the possibility of allowing sales of beer on Sunday. The Beer Board convenes at 6 p.m. on September 14, followed by a public hearing at 6:15 p.m. and the regular city board meeting at 6:30 p.m.

Data for the tri-counties was updated most recently on Friday, August 13.

Carroll County had 158 active cases with 14 new cases for the day. The county has had a total of 84 deaths during the pandemic.

Henry County had 222

active cases with 28 new cases for the day. The county has had a total of 76 deaths during the pandemic.

Weakley County had 167 active cases with 19 new cases for the day. The county has had a total of 70 deaths during the pandemic.

The state updated vaccination data on Sunday, August 15.

Tennesseans have re-

ceived 5,859,022 total vaccinations, 109,106 in the last week. 46.9 percent of the population has received at least one dose, while 40.3 percent (2,752,375 people) have been fully vaccinated.

In Carroll County, 21,777 vaccinations have been administered. 41.79 percent of the county population has received at least one dose, while 34.94 percent are fully vaccinated.

In Henry County, 24,729 vaccinations have been administered. 40.82 percent of the county population has received at least one dose, while 35.05 percent are fully vaccinated.

In Weakley County, 19,852 vaccinations have been administered. 31.64 percent of the county population has received at least one dose, while 26.75 percent are fully vaccinated.

McKenzie remains the largest populated municipality with a new population of 5,529, up 219 from the 2010 population of 5,310 and 5,295 in the 2000 census 20 years earlier.

Huntingdon now has a population of 4,439, up 454 from the 2010 population of 3,985. The growth represents a positive shift from the loss of population experienced from 2000 (4,349) to 2010.

Atwood showed a gain of two residents over the past decade. The new population is 940, up from 938 in 2010 and down from 1,000 in 2000.

Bruceton has a new population of 1,507, up 79 from the 2010 population of 1,478 and down from the 2000 population of 1,554.

Clarksburg has a new population of 379, down 14 from the 2010 census of 393, but up from 2000’s number of 285.

Hollow Rock has 683 residents in 2020, compared to 718 in 2010 and 963 in 2000.

McLemoresville has 288 residents, down 64 from 352 in 2010, but up from 259 in 2000.

Trezevant has 799 residents, down 60 from 859 in 2010 and 901 in 2000.

Overall, Carroll County recorded a population of 28,440 in 2020, which is down 82 from 28,522 in 2010 and 29,475 in 2000.

Camden recorded a population of 3,674 in 2020, up 92 from 3,582 in 2010 and down from 3,828 in 2000.

Dresden recorded a population of 3,019 in 2020, up 14 from 2010 of 3,005 and 2,855 in 2000.

Gleason recorded a population of 1,369 in 2020, down 76 from 2010 of 1,445 and 1,463

in 2000.

Greenfield recorded a population of 2,031, down 151 from 2,182 in 2010 and 2,208 in 2000.

Henry recorded 446, down 18 from 464 in 2010 and 520 in 2000.

Jackson recorded 68,205, up 2,994 from 65,211 in 2010 and 59,643 in 2000.

Lexington recorded 7,956, up 304 from 7,652 in 2010 and 7,393 in 2000.

Martin recorded a population of 10,825, down 648 from 11,473 in 2010 and up from 10,515 in 2000.

Milan recorded 8,171, up 320 from 7,851 in 2010 and 7,664 in 2000.

Paris recorded 10,316, up 160 from 10,156 from 2010 and 9,763 in 2000.

Sharon recorded 935, down 9 from 944 in 2010 and 988 in 2000.

Metro Nashville is the most populated area with 689,447 population, up 88,225 from 601,222 in 2010 and 545,524 in 2000.

Memphis is the second most populated area with 633,104, down 13,785 from 646,889 in 2010 and 650,100 in 2000.

Cottage Grove in Henry County is the least populated municipality in Tennessee with 66 residents, down 22 from 88 in 2010 and 97 in 2000.

Benton recorded 15,864 in 2020, down 625 from 16,489 in 2010 and 16,537 in 2000.

Gibson recorded 50,429 in 2020, up 746 from 49,683 in 2010 and 48,152 in 2000.

Henry recorded 32,199, down 131 from 32,330 in 2010 and up from 31,115 in 2000.

Madison recorded 98,823, up 529 from 98,294 in 2010 and 91,837 in 2000.

Obion recorded 30,787, down 1020 from 31,807 in 2010 and 32,450 in 2000.

Weakley County recorded 32,902, down 2,199 from 35,021 in 2010 and 34,895 in 2000.

at the location. This caused shortfalls and poor range to the radio system used by the department forcing the police to use their retired analog radios versus the digital ones donated by the county.

The Council approved the appropriation of the City’s five acres of land adjacent to McKenzie High School to be used for all emergency services. When the land was donated by Ray Morris, he stated the land was to be used by the fire department, the council felt it was necessary to allow all emergency services to use the land. It was addressed before the Council as the reasoning for the lack of ambulance service by Baptist Hospital through Priority Ambulance Services.

The board learned the ambulance bays, located at the former McKenzie Regional Hospital, used by the ambulance service were in disrepair and condemned. Baptist Hospital, which contracts with Priority Ambulance, owns the property and has no intention of improving the housing area. The Council decided it was necessary for the City of McKenzie to open negotiations with Priority Ambulance in allowing the organization to constructed a modular structure to house two ambulances to serve McKenzie. In the agreement, the City of McKenzie would own the land and Priority Ambulance would purchase a modular structure. The City of McKenzie would be subservient or connected to Baptist Hospital-Carroll County through the arrangement. If the agreement between Priority Ambulance and Baptist Hospital were to end, the City of McKenzie would allow the new provider the same arrangement as Priority Ambulance.

Another safety issue brought before the Council was the ongoing problem of speeding in residential areas and on city streets. While some residents recommend speed bumps, it was determined the deterrent brought too much liability to the city. The police department’s response was to purchase “speed calming devices.” In other words, the purchase of mobile radar stations would inform drivers of their speed. The council granted the police department to received bids on the possible purchase of three to four devices.

It was recommended additional signage be installed along Stonewall between Woodrow and Brooks to remind drivers the area was a school zone. The police department also was assigned the task to contact the Carroll County Bus Shop there are complaints logged about speeding and eradicate driving.

In other business, the Council approved the park signage to include the Tennessee Code Annotated guidelines concerning smoking in public parks. In accordance, “No Smoking” signs or the international no-smoking symbol must be placed at every entrance to a public place or place of employment where smoking is banned. The ban includes e-cigarettes and vaping.

The Relax Inn, formerly Avery Properties, formerly McKenzie Budget Inn, has had an increased number of police calls. From the explanation of Lieutenant Ryan White, there have been multiple incidents where the property was listed as the perpetrators’ address. The location of the property is zoned B-2 which prohibits prolonged stays over 29 days.

The Solid Waste Department request for a new knuckle boom truck was granted by the Council. The new Peterson hydraulic truck is valued at \$157,1552.52 should be ready in two to three months. Once received, the old truck will be used as a backup or used for more “messy jobs.”

Under new business, Shirley Martin was appointed to the Library Board. The use of Phil Thomason and Associates to revamp the Historic Guidelines Manual was approved by the Council; grant money was allocated to update the manual.

In other points of discussion, the Council was informed of Duane Patrick’s possible use of the City Park for the construction of his Eagle Scout Project. The project would be building a Gaga Ball Pit; Patrick was not at the meeting nor did he provide a written plan. Council members said they needed to see project plans before approving and would like for Patrick to work with Interim Park Director Jeremy Allen before the submission of the plans.

Gaga combines dodging, striking, running, and jumping, to be the last person standing. Players hit the ball at each other with their hands, and are eliminated if the ball strikes them on or below the knee (occasionally the waist). The game can be played by a group of individual players or with teams, as well as in one-on-one matches. Rules, ball types, pit surfaces and pit sizes can vary widely at different venues.

Under financial matters, the Council agreed to issue payment for \$38,941 for playground equipment and \$7,979.98 for a metal mobile performance stage. The playground equipment was installed at Mulberry and the City Park.

During department reports, the Council was informed of the completion of the City’s paving projects on Cherry Avenue, Elm Street and Mulberry Street. A unit from the Tennessee National Guard surveyed and began drafting plans for the city’s future soccer fields.

The next regular meeting of the McKenzie City Council is Thursday, September 9 at 6 p.m. at the McKenzie City Hall.

Frozen Strawberry Dessert

1 cup flour
1/4 cup brown sugar
1 cup sugar
2 cup frozen strawberries
1/2 cup melted butter
1/2 cup chopped pecans
2 beaten egg whites
2 teaspoon lemon juice
1 cup cool whip
Mix flour, brown sugar,

melted butter and pecans. (Save 2/3 cup crumbs)

Set aside. Spread mixture in 9x13 pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Cool. Combine eggs whites, sugar, strawberries and lemon juice. Beat until stiff. Add the cool whip. Pour on top of baked mixture. Put 2/3 cup reserved crumbs on

top. Freeze. Take out of freezer a few minutes before serving.

8 ripe peaches
2 eggs, well beaten
Sugar
1 -12oz. can apricot nectar
3 cup milk
1 large can evaporated
3 cup milk
Combine peaches with small amount of milk in blender. Combine all ingredients and freeze. 15 to 20 servings.

Homemade Vanilla Ice Cream

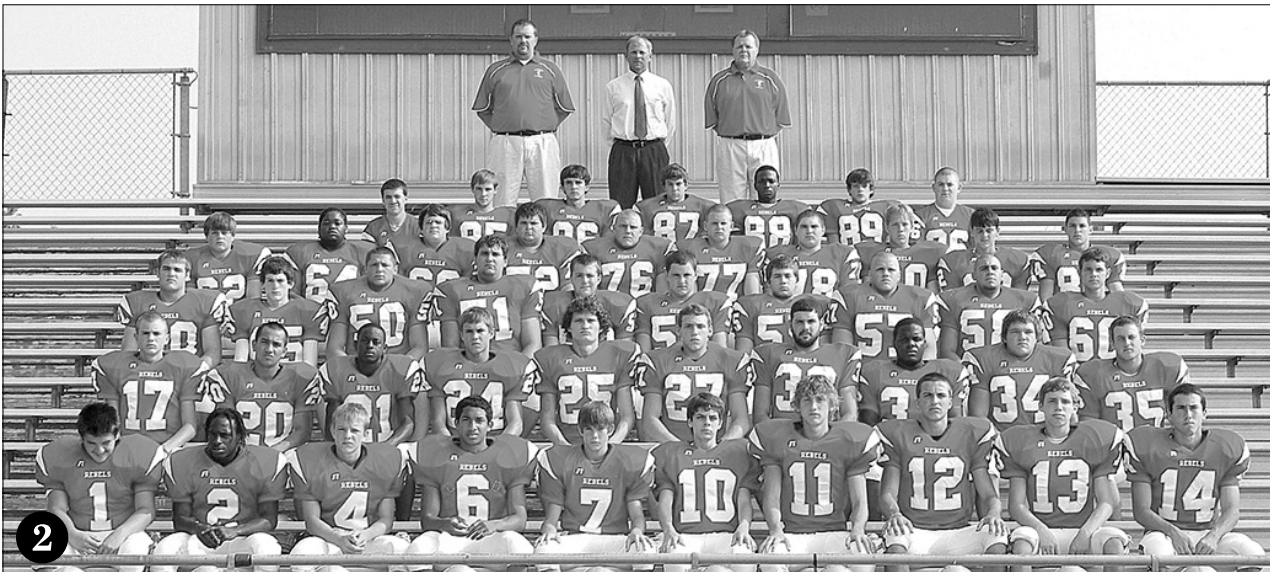
Put 8 junkets in 1/4 cup water. Set aside, to add very last. Beat 8 eggs well. Add 3-1/2 cup sugar, 2 Tablespoon flour, 2 Tablespoons vanilla. Warm 3/4 cup gallon milk and 3 containers of pure whipping cream to take off chill. Mix beaten mixture grad-

ually with warm milk mixture. Stir in junkets. Pour quickly into container. Let set up. Freeze. If using Butterfinger candy bars, crushed, cut back on sugar to 3 cups. If adding fruit, may need to add 1/2 cup more sugar.

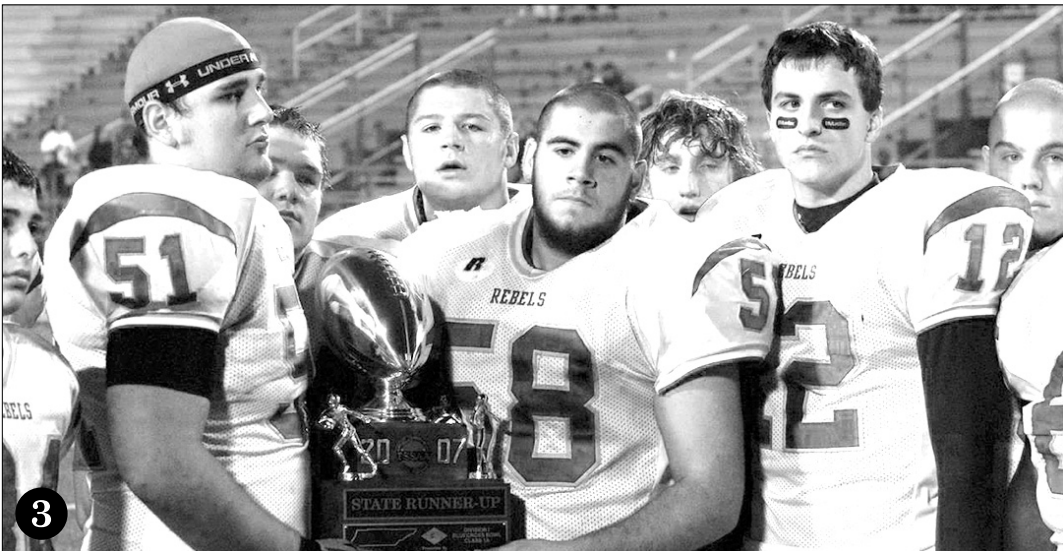
Sausage Rice Casserole

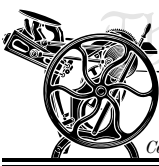
1-1/2 cup rice

The 2007 Rebels

The Season to Remember

For the last couple weeks, the Banner staff has been hunkered down prepping for the upcoming football season. Each year we publish our gridiron guide along with a host of football programs for area schools. While it is a painstaking process, we take pride in what we do and feel honored to help the schools.

For the last six years, I've helped to gather content and other aspects of the "pre-season." Like clockwork, as we roll into week one, I think back on various football seasons, either spent on the sidelines or in booths as a member of a team's staff or the newspaper's staff. I can recall from my high school days all the way to last season, local teams saying, "This is going to be the year."

Going through the books last week, I found a recap from McKenzie's 2007 TS-SAA State Championship Runner-Up season. This was their most prolific season to date. Looking at some of the names of the boys/kids in the story, it's impressive to see how they continued to be successful with football

after high school; especially Derick Carr and Tyler Reeder.

Here is the story of the 2007 Rebels most of which can be attributed to Terry Howell.

14 years ago, the McKenzie High School Rebel football team etched its mark in the history books with the school's most successful season ever: a 13-2 record and a state championship appearance.

They came up short in the title game, falling 52-20 to the speedy Pirates from South Pittsburg at MTSU's Johnny "Red" Floyd Stadium in Murfreesboro, to finish as the Class A Runner-Up and a Number 2 state ranking.

The road the Murfreesboro began with the Rebels opening the newly-renovated home side at Rebel Field and trouncing the Dresden Lions, 41-0. It was the first of five shutouts on the season, tying a school record.

In Week 2, the Rebels traveled to Bruceton to face the favored Central Tigers, shutting out the Region 7A rivals, 35-0.

The team traveled again in Week 3 and found themselves trailing late to the Trenton-Peabody Golden Tide.

The McKenzie comeback

failed and the Tide scored again to hand the Rebels their first and only regular-season loss, 34-24.

McKenzie bounced back in a big way in Week 4, hosting the Union City Golden Tornadoes. The Rebels were again behind the eight ball, trailing by a dozen in the fourth quarter. Three scores down the stretch and just enough defensive stops sealed the Rebel comeback, 42-39.

To follow up that dramatic win, the Rebels traveled to Huntingdon and beat the Mustangs, 28-19. It was the first time McKenzie had beaten their fiercest rivals in two consecutive seasons since 1955.

Week 6 was Homecoming for McKenzie, and the Rebels celebrated with a 36-0 shutout of Gleason.

Touted as a potential region upset, Greenfield opened Week 7 with a quick score and two-point conversion, but the Rebels responded with 41 unanswered points for the win.

Week 8 saw McKenzie earn its second-largest victory in history, a 68-0 shutout of the West Carroll War Eagles.

The dominance continued the next week when McKenzie hosted the Lake County Falcons for a 50-0 win.

The Rebels closed out the season with another big win, 48-7 over South Fulton.

McKenzie hosted all four of its playoff contests leading up to the neutral-site title game.

First, the Rebels bested the Halls Tigers, 47-7, in McKenzie's most lopsided playoff victory ever.

A week later, the Fayette Academy Vikings fared only marginally better, losing to the surging Rebels, 28-7.

The quarterfinal round brought Trinity Christian Academy to Rebel Field. A close game at the half, McKenzie blew away the Lions down the stretch for a 48-21 win.

Win or lose, the semifinal against Mt. Pleasant was the historic team's final game at home, and it took all the Rebels had to secure a spot in the championship. Tiger Marco Dailey, the reigning Mr. Football, had 294 yards and three touchdowns on the ground in addition to a long touchdown pass. The Rebel offense matched the visitors score for score, led by quarterback Derek Carr with 140 yards and four touchdowns on 8 of 11 passing. Rusty Chapman caught a pair of touchdowns, while Kyle Kirk and Jacob Fussell each had another. Tyler Moore ran in for the go-ahead score late, and then Clint Kee had two interceptions to stifle any Tiger comeback. When the dust settled, the Rebel faithful celebrated a 35-32 win and began making plans for a monumental trip to Middle Tennessee.

The enormous contingency of Rebel fans that made the journey to the title game left disappointed, but proud.

It was a rough first quarter that dashed McKenzie's championship dreams as South Pittsburg scored twice on its first four snaps. Then, in the second frame, with the Rebels trailing, 21-0, a promising drive turned into a Pirate touchdown on a controversial (and clearly incorrect) call. Rusty Chapman caught a pass and was working for extra yards when he was tackled while lurching forward. Several seconds after his knee went down, he stretched the ball



forward, and it came loose. During the confusion of the officials, a Pirate defender picked up the ball and ran it in for a touchdown.

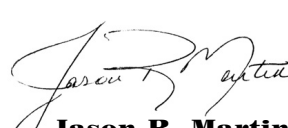
At the half, McKenzie trailed, 34-0, and South Pittsburg added two more scores in the third.

Facing sure defeat, the Rebels didn't quit in the final frame and put up 20 points against The Pirates' first defensive unit. Carr had touchdown passes to Tyler Moore, Rusty Chapman and Kyle Kirk, making for a more respectable final score of 52-20 and giving the loyal fans something to cheer about before a long trip home.

Carr threw for a season-high 301 yards on 19 of 37 passing with three touchdowns. He threw eight passes to Rusty Chapman for 88 yards and a touchdown. Clint Kee caught four for 70 yards, and Shabree Payne had four catches for 65. Kyle Kirk caught three tosses for 54 yards and a touchdown, and Tyler Moore's lone catch was a 24-yard score. Jacob Fussell led the Rebel's ground game with 40

yards on five carries. Tyler Moore rushed ten times for 28 yards. Carr also did the punting, kicking five for 197 yards with a long punt of 44 yards.

John Campbell led the defense with eight tackles (seven solo) including one for a loss. Jacob Fussell had five, all solo, with one for a loss, and Quinton Bowden had four solos, one for a loss. Tyler Reeder and Austin Winstead each had three solo tackles.

"I pulled Suzie Cozart's hair. And sometimes if we finished our reading assignment early, Miss Dorothy would let us do some clay modeling at the table in the back. And I really liked it when it was my turn to dust the erasers."

We had a break in the test as Jessica explained to him the ins and outs of clay mod-

eling and dusting erasers. I spent the free time thinking about the gap we were trying to bridge here. It went way past a simple modern day exercise for returning second graders.

It was like different worlds. Eons apart. We could not have conceived in 1954 of wearing a mask to school. Unless, of course, it was The Lone Ranger day. And Max, in his wildest imagination, could never picture us hunkered beneath our desk with our head stuck between our legs carrying out an atomic bomb drill.

I wondered if they still had the alphabet hung on the walls above the blackboards. Max sure didn't seem to recognize Dick or Jane.

"What did you eat for lunch in the cafeteria?"

That question went di-

rectly to my point. "Max, we didn't have a lunchroom in the second grade. Everyone carried their meal to school." I didn't feel led to entangle his little mind with Hopalong Cassidy Lunchboxes, thermos bottles with screw on tops or those appropriate sized brown paper sacks that we had to carefully fold up and take back home each day. "Most of the time Mother would mash peanut butter and bananas together into a gooey glob and smear it between two slices of Wonder Bread."

"You didn't have pizza on Wednesdays, KK?"

The gap may be even wider than I thought!

He read the next question on his list, "What was your favorite TV show?"

"Max, we didn't have a TV. I didn't know about any of the shows."

I could hear him rolling that little tidbit around in his wonderful young and

It took a minute but he moved on. "Who was your best friend in the second grade?"

"Bobby Brewer."

I didn't hear the next question. I was thinking about the pillow fights when Bobby spent the night with me. We'd leap off the top bunk and torpedo my little brother on the single bed across the room. We'd whisper late into the night long after Mom had turned off the light and told us to go to sleep.

We fought those elementary school wars side by side. Maybe Max and I had found some common ground here. We didn't think about social interaction in Miss Dorothy's classroom. We were so young and innocent and wide-eyed about life; and not so sure of all that

was taking place around us. We made friends because we found ourselves sometimes sinking in the same boat.

What's that old saying, a friend in need...

Bobby Brewer had emailed me from Oregon just a few hours before this test began. College, years, miles and life had separated us...but they couldn't keep us apart.

School is so important. And I pray Max learns, grows, enjoys and makes the most of his second grade year. But if he could find his Bobby Brewer in that classroom....PRICELESS!

"KK, KK...are you still there?"

"Yes Max, I'm sorry, what was the question again?"

"What kind of computer did you have in the second grade"...

Inglenook Book Club August News

The Inglenook Book Club met in June at Lakeside Senior Living Community with Zia Locke and Sally Sutton as hostesses. They had prepared a Hawaiian Luau theme with tables decorated with pineapples, miniature palm trees, and other Hawaiian symbols.

Members celebrating August birthdays are Juanita Finley and Donna Ward. Both received birthday cards from the club, with special recognition to Juanita who turns 92 this year.

President Moore announced she delivered the boxes of Kleenex tissues for the school teachers. Members brought spiral notebooks for today, and next month's item is earbuds.

Our program was presented by Suzanne Russell whose subject was Beatrix Potter, most famously known as the author of the Peter Rabbit series of children's books. However, she was an accomplished scientist and artist as well.

Beatrix Potter was born into an upper-class household in Kensington, London in 1866. Her parents were artistic, interested in nature, and enjoyed the countryside. The family spent holidays in Scotland and the Lake District where Beatrix developed a love of landscape, flora and fauna, all of which she closely observed and painted.

Beatrix and her brother, Walter Bertram, had numerous small pets which they observed closely and drew endlessly. These included mice, rabbits, a hedgehog, and some bats, along with collections of butterflies and other insects which they drew and studied.

One of the tutors of Beatrix was Anne Moore who was just three years older than Beatrix. They remained lifelong friends, and Anne's eight children received many of Potter's delightful picture letters. It was Anne who suggested that these letters might make good children's books.

As a way to earn money in the 1890s, Beatrix and her brother began to print Christmas cards and cards for special occasions with their own designs. Mice and rabbits were the most frequent subjects of their fantasy paintings. As a result, over the ensuing years many of Potter's drawings were purchased by several different publishers. She was pleased by this success and determined to publish her own illustrated stories.

Beatrix Potter's artistic and literary interests were deeply influenced by fairy tails and fantasy. She grew up with Aesop's Fables, the fairy tales of the Brothers Grimm, and Hans Christian Andersen. Most of her illustrations were fantasies

involving her own pets.

While on holiday or vacation, Potter often sent letters to young friends, particularly to Anne Moore's oldest son, Noel, who was often ill. One of these was a story about four little rabbits whose names were Flopsy, Mopsy, Cottontail, and Peter. It became one of the most famous children's letters ever written and the basis of Potter's future career as a writer-artist-storyteller.

In 1902, The Tale of Peter Rabbit was published and was an immediate success. It was followed the next year by The Tale of Squirrel Nutkin, and The Tailor of Gloucester, which had also been written a picture letters to the Moore children. In all, Potter wrote 23 children's books.

Beatrix Potter was interested in every branch of natural science except astronomy. Her interests centered, however, on the study of fungi. Because she was a female, Potter's work and drawings in this area were not accepted by the male-dominated world of scientific research. One paper on the subject of fungi submitted to the Linnean Society in 1897 has been recently rediscovered along with rich artistic illustrations and is only now being properly evaluated. In 1997 the Linnean Society issued a posthumous apology to Potter for the sexism displayed in the handling of her research.

In 1913, at the age of 47, she married William Heelis, a respected local solicitor. They would go on to purchase several farms and raise Herdwick sheep, becoming major sheep farmers in the country. Beatrix and William Heelis enjoyed a happy 30-year marriage.

Beatrix Potter died of complications from pneumonia and heart disease in 1943. She left almost all of her property to the National Trust and included over 4,000 acres of land, 16 farms, cottages, heads of cattle and sheep. It was the largest gift ever left to the National Trust.

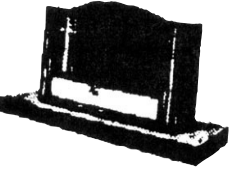

Former Governor Bill Haslam Speaks to WestStar

JACKSON (August 11) — On Wednesday, Former Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam addressed alumni of the WestStar Leadership Program at the Southwest Development District office in Jackson, Tennessee. Haslam spoke briefly about his career and new book, “Faithful Presence: The Promise and the Peril of Faith in the Public Square,” as part of the leadership program’s “Lunch-Learn-Leadership series.”

Speaking to a room full of community leaders and government officials, Governor Haslam stated the reason for the book was in hopes to help create healing in a divided nation. He stated, “Our country is divided now more than ever in modern history. The nation has become contemptuous towards the other side.”

He added in today’s political spectrum, the two major political parties are more divided than ever. The atmosphere is charged to such a degree that there is more tension and distrust than with the religious factions in the Middle East.

“People of faith need to be the answer/solution when in positions of leadership. The works and words of Christ teach us how to rise above the fold.”

He went on to quote his political mentor, Senator Howard Baker, Jr., “You should always go through life working on the assumption that the other guy might be right.” Haslam believes the best approach to an argument is to get the right answer, not necessarily to win it. With such a great division it is even more difficult to find the right answer and make a

difference.

“Government has a chance to make a difference. Leaders should work to make a difference,” said Governor Haslam.

People of faith should focus on solving problems. Haslam quoted Jeremiah 29:5-7 “Build houses and settle down. Plant gardens and eat their produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters. Take wives for your sons and give your daughters in marriage, so that they too may have sons and daughters. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.” It was the Lord saying we have to make our society a better place so we can make it home. Thus, people of faith, especially those in leader-

ship roles must be present, be faithful in their engagement.

Haslam reminded the audience they have to hold fast to their Christian morals as he quoted Ephesians 4:15 “But speaking the truth in love.” Meaning, an individual can state their belief in what is true but it must do so in a compassionate way.

Before closing his presentation, Governor Haslam provided a few anecdotes of his time in office and on the campaign trail.

One such story dealt with his feeling of vulnerability as a gubernatorial candidate. Then a friend reminded him that everything is going to be okay regardless of the outcome. He learned that candidates have to realize the story is not about them; we (the leaders or elected

officials) are only part of the story. Success comes when you consider others greater than yourself.

In closing, one of his greatest successes was as governor was mentioned. In 2013, Haslam launched the Drive to 55 with Randy Boyd to increase the number of Tennesseans with a postsecondary degree or credential to 55 percent by 2025. This allowed for a first-time freshmen enrollment increased of 25 percent at community colleges and 20 percent at technical colleges in one year, and the college-going rate in Tennessee increased to a high of 62.5 percent in 2015.

He and his wife, Crissy, have been married for over 40 years and have three children and 10 grandchildren.
