Huntingdon Wins Home Opener Against South Side

HUNTINGDON (August 27) — The Huntingdon Mustangs picked up a big win Friday night at home against the Jackson South Side Hawks. The Mustangs took an early first quarter lead on the Hawks and never looked back picking up the 44-13 victory.

Huntingdon’s running game dominated picking up 441 yards on 46 plays. The Mustangs picked up 24 yards passing. Leading the ground game was Cade Wood with 177 yards and two touchdowns followed by Aden Hutcherson with 133 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, the Mustangs proved themselves keeping South Side to 326 total yards and picking up five interceptions on the night. Interceptions were created to Brady Warbritton (2), Blane Fields (2) and Hutcherson (returned for touchdown). Leading tacklers for Huntingdon were Matthew Pelonero (9), Blake Reeves (6) and Cade Wood (5).

The Mustangs won the coin toss and deferred to the second half. South Side received the opening kick-off and were left deep in their own territory. After an offensive holding penalty on second-down, Cole Britton took to the air on third-down only to be picked off by freshman Brady Warbritton.

Working from the Mustang 38-yard line, on second-and-nine, Hutcherson broke loose scoring the 62-yard touchdown. Blake Reeves’ extra-point was blocked. Huntingdon led 6-0 with 9:12 to play in the first quarter.

The Hawks showed promise in their next drive moving the ball down field and across mid-field. After picking up two first downs, Britton teamed with Braylon Anderson on third-and-long. Anderson was brought down just short of the first down marker. On fourth-and-short, South Side came out in a jumbo set looking to pick up the first down up the middle. The Mustangs held running back Malcolm Lacy at the line of scrimmage as the Hawks turned the ball over on downs.

With four minutes remaining in the opening quarter, Huntingdon took over on downs from the Mustang 32-yard line. Kaleb Pearson, Hutcherson and Wood moved the ball across mid-field and into the red zone to start the second quarter. On third-and-twelve, Ashton Hutcherson scored from 12 yards out on the counter sweep. The two-point conversion

was no good as Huntingdon increased the lead 12-0 with 11:36 to play in the half.

South Side picked up their first points of the night as a run by Chuck Stokes put the Hawks second-and-one. Anderson made a leaping catch reeling in the pass from Britton for a 63-yard TD. Christian Lo split the up-rights as South Side cut Huntingdon’s lead 12-7.

A back-and-forth battle ensued between the Mustangs and Hawks over the next couple possessions. Huntingdon turned the ball over on downs. Then Britton was intercepted a second time by Warbritton. The Mustang’s fumbled on the next possession deep in Hawk territory. South Side’s ensuing drive was finished by Britton’s third interception of the night as Fields cut off the receiver to pick off the pass.

With less than two minutes to play in the half, Huntingdon added the last points of the half to the scoreboard. Wood crossed the goal line 15 yard and a Mustang touchdown. Following a second failed two-point conversion. Huntingdon led South Side 18-7.

The second half continued in Huntingdon’s favor. Gray Eubanks scored on a 46-yard rushing touchdown

and Reeves added the PAT. Huntingdon led 25-7.

South Side’s opening drive of the half was three-and-out.

Huntingdon tacked on its fifth touchdown Hutcherson scored from 60-yards out. The blocked PAT gave the Mustangs a 31-7 lead with 6:53 to play in the third quarter.

On back-to-back possessions, the Huntingdon defense picked off Britton. The first INT was created to Fields, his second of the night. The second INT was pick-six by Hutcherson. The score at the end of the third quarter was 37-7.

By the fourth quarter, fatigue was setting in and multiple rounds of substitutions came into the game. At the mid-point of the quarter, Tayshawn Rivers picked five-yards and a touchdown. Reeves’ kick capped the Mustangs lead at 44-13.

The final points were picked up by South Side with three minutes to play. Stokes crossed the goal line from 36 yards out. The final score from Paul Ward Stadium was 44-13.

Next Friday, the Mustangs celebrate Homecoming 2021 and open region 7AA play against the Camden Lions. Kickoff is 7 p.m.

West Carroll Bests Gleason 27-21

ATWOOD (August 27) — West Carroll War Eagles (2-0) claimed its second victory on the season, defeating Hollow Rock-Bruceton Tigers in Bruceton in week 1 and Gleason (1-1) at War Eagles Stadium on Friday. The War Eagles claimed a 27-21 victory in a back-and-forth scoring contest.

The difference was West Carroll scored 20 unanswered to beat Gleason.

After struggling offensively in the first half, in which Gleason went into the locker room with a 14-9 lead. West Carroll found its push in the second half as the War Eagles rattled off 20 straight points.

West Carroll is 2-0 for the first time since 2018 and have won eight straight over the Bulldogs.

“Offensively, we started seeing how the blocking schemes fit together, and the ball carriers were making good decisions on when to cut out, when to bounce

out or when to follow the pullers,” West Carroll coach Clayton Morris said. “Looking back at film, I think we are finally understanding schematics and where we want to be offensively.”

A bad snap on an attempted punt deep in Gleason territory led to a safety by Eagle Shooter Nelson for two points.

Trailing 14-9 at halftime, West Carroll came out with back-to-back touchdowns in the third quarter to jump back in the lead.

Jay Long scored on a two-yard touchdown run, and Xander Moon scored on a 47-yard touchdown run for the 21-14 lead.

Moon scored again with 9:35 remaining to go in the game to put the War Eagles up 27-14.

Gleason scored with 6:07 remaining on Kolton Crockett’s second touchdown of the game from eight yards out. Crochet led Gleason’s offense with 159 rushing yards.

“Defensively, we did a lot of good things, we just weren’t tackling the way we know how,” Morris said. “Part of that credit goes to

Crochet because the kid is hard to tackle as he drives his legs. The arm tackling, especially in the first half, is not West Carroll; it’s not us.”

Long and Nick Andre had three solo tackles and an assisted tackle each. Moon led the West Carroll offense with 283 yards of offense. He rushed for 226 yards and three touchdowns, and he threw for 57 yards. Malik Lee rushed for 129 yards.

In the Region 7-1A opener on Friday, West Carroll gets Humboldt, a team that has shown speed and agility in the first two weeks of the season.

“Humboldt opened the playbook more against Bruceton than Grace Christian,” Morris said. “I was impressed with their strides from the first game to the second game.”

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Carroll Electric Department Approves 10-Day COVID Pay

HUNTINGDON (August 26) — Employees of the Carroll County Electric Department were granted up to 10 days pay if they are diagnosed with COVID or must quarantine because of contact with a person with COVID.

After considerable discussion, the Carroll County Electric Department Board of Directors chose to add the extra pay to encourage infected or possibly infected employees not report to work where they might infect fellow employees. The provision is valid for four months - through December 31.

The extra pay is in addition to the employees’ sick pay, which starts at 10 days annually after one year of service to the department. Numbers of sick days increases with years of service.

The main thing is to reduce the amount of spread of the virus, said Danny Brawner, general manager.

The department operates a maintenance crew in both McKenzie and Huntingdon. Any positive cases at either location could force a crew of lineman to quarantine. The majority of lineman are not vaccinated, according to information coming out of the meeting.

Any employee who utilizes the extra COVID pay must provide necessary documentation. Any abuse of the extra pay could result in disciplinary action.

The Board also re-elected its current officers. Terry Howell is chairman, Mary Hurley is treasurer, and Lori Nolen is secretary.

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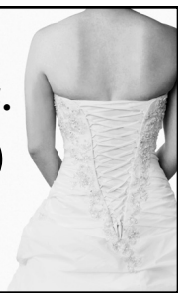

the resignation of Billy J. Smith. State Senator John Stevens' responsibility is to recommend a person to fill the vacancy to the State Election Commission.

In 2018, the Republicans held its first primary in recent history. Both parties previously chose candidates through a caucus. In 2022, the county Democrats will join the Republicans in holding a primary.

Candidates can choose to run on the party tickets or as independents.

Included in the county primaries are the following district seats: District Attorney General (eight years), Public Defender (eight years), Chancellor

(eight years), and two Circuit Court Judges (eight years), and County General Session Judge (eight years)

County elections include: (all four-year terms) — Sheriff, County Mayor, Assessor of Property, Trustee, Circuit Court Clerk, County Clerk, Register of Deeds, two Road Supervisors (districts 1 and 2), 21 county commissioners, county school board members.

The 2022 August election also includes Huntingdon, McKenzie, South Carroll, West Carroll, and Hol-low Rock-Bruceton school board elections.

Federal election includes Congressman, District 8, and state elections for governor, and state representative.

All municipalities will also hold elections in 2022, either in August or Novem-

ber.

Hamlett also said the county needs to upgrade its aging voting machines. An attempt to get the Budget Committee to appropriate approximately \$400,000 for those three years ago was not approved.

She also alerted commissioners the county needs to convert to Poll Pads at each of the precincts on election day to assist poll workers in register in voters. Now, poll workers must search computer printouts for the names. According to Hamlett, the electronic Poll Pads would speed the search for the voter's registration information.

In other business, commissioners voted to increase their pay to \$100 per meeting - the same pay as county commissioners receive.

Town of Huntingdon Rezones Property, Offers Property For Sale

HUNTINGDON (August 24) — The Huntingdon Mayor and Council approved the first of two reading to rezone a parcel of land and voted to allow Mayor Dale Kelley to negotiate the price of a city-owned property during its August 24 meeting.

Following the oath of office ceremony to induct Will Atkins as the new

councilman, the council voted to rezone two adjacent properties at 22000 East Main Street from B-2 General Business to M-2 Heavy Industrial. A land-scaping business is interested in purchasing the property from owner Ray Smith.

Mayor Dale Kelley was authorized to negotiate a purchase price on the former Reminice Inn, which

was razed and is now an unimproved parcel owned by the city.

A resolution to support the improvement to State Route 22 and the entrance to the Huntingdon Industrial Park South was also approved. The resolution requests the Tennessee Department of Transportation make the improvements.

HCMC Suspends Surgeries Because of COVID-19 Load

PARIS (August 27) — Two days after what she called the hospital's "most significant crisis day,"

Henry County Medical Center CEO Lisa Casteel provided an update about the impact COVID-19 continues to have on the hospital, as well as the community.

"This week has certainly been crisis mode at Henry County Medical Center," Casteel said on Friday afternoon. "Wednesday was our most significant crisis day. We incurred 65 Emergency Room patients within a short time frame requiring us to shift providers and clinicians from other services to the ER."

Because of the number of COVID19 inpatients (currently 19 inpatients) and its impact to safety, HCMC has suspended surgeries at the main hospital for a short time for the safety of those surgical patients. However, Casteel said that emergent and urgent surgical cases would be conducted in the hospital as needed. Surgery cases will continue at the Surgery Center.

Surging cases of the virus are not limited to the hospital as area physicians and urgent care clinics continue to see so many more patients who are COVID-19 positive. Said Casteel, "I think what everyone needs to understand is that COVID-19 is occupying the majority of services that healthcare has the ability to offer. This means surgeries are on hold as well as routine

and annual physician office visits are held pending appointments."

Casteel is urging the community to be patient with the hospital and its overworked staff as it works through this crisis. And, she encourages everyone to wear masks, social distance, and, most of all, get vaccinated if they haven't already done so.

"The FDA gave full approval for the Pfizer vaccine this week," Casteel explained. "Henry County has 42.48% of its population vaccinated with at least one dose. The State of Tenn. is 48.8% vaccinated with at least one dose."

She also addressed a common question that continues to arise within the community regarding the number of patients that HCMC can treat in its facility. Though the hospital has 80 patient beds, the nursing staff shortage has resulted in 14 unstaffed beds.

"We would need 12 nurses to staff these beds 24 hours a day, seven days a week," Casteel explained, adding that HCMC is actively searching for nursing help and is accepting applications."

Henry County Medical Center provides daily COVID-19 updates on our website and social media sites. Additionally, HCMC is vaccinating every Friday in September in Classrooms 2 and 3. From 8-10 a.m., HCMC will offer Moderna and from 2-4 p.m., we will offer Pfizer.

Walk-ins are welcome, but appointments are encouraged by e-mailing kwinston@hcmc-tn.org or by calling 731-336-6155.

Also, HCMC Medical Clinics will offer a drive thru Pfizer COVID-19 Vaccination Pod at Central School on Wednesday, September 1, 2021 from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Those receiving a vaccine will receive gift cards, a free t-shirt and other goodies at the event.

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Walter Montgomery

Bomber Pilot, Consultant

Back in the days of the Great Depression, it was commonplace for barnstormers to travel to various cities and small towns charging residents for a scenic ride in their planes. In this area, they were stationed at the Holland Farm in McKenzie. During the pilots' lunch hour, Walt Montgomery, who was 5 years old, along with Charlie Russell, who was 7 years old, had the job of keeping the cows away from the canvas wings. Their reward was a ride.

The Holland Farm was a place familiar to the Montgomery family as it was Walt's birthplace in 1924. He was born in a small one-room building behind the Holland's home, to Walter Sr. and Ruby Berryhill Montgomery. He along with four siblings helped work the farm with their mother and father.

Walt graduated from McKenzie in 1942 and enrolled at Bethel. The summer of working the fields and the time in the air left its mark on young Walt. As he grew older, he remained entranced with airplanes. After one-quarter of college, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps.

Around the time of his enlistment, Walt recalled how it grew increasingly difficult to meeting the requirements to become a pilot. Half of those who entered pilot training washed out to be transferred into other military occupations. Montgomery succeeded and was commissioned on May 23, 1944.

He was assigned to the 15th Air Force, 99th Bombing Group where he would

pilot a B-17 Flying Fortress. The bombing group consisted of four squadrons of seven bombers, flying in a staggered box formation for maximum gun range. Gunners in each ship (bomber) could fire in every direction except sideways, with the outermost plane responsible for covering the side of the formation.

Late in the war, Walt's squadron received orders to bomb a Axis oil refinery. For three days, the squad dropped their cargo on the plant but failed to destroy their supposed target as reconnaissance photos revealed no major fires that would coincide with a bombed refinery. On the fourth day, after being misguidedly by their navigator, they dropped their payload on a supposed fertilizer plant.

No photos were necessary as the facility exploded launching flames 20,000 feet into the air. They had inadvertently found and destroyed the oil refinery. The squadron received the Silver Star. Walt was quoted as saying, "nobody even knew it was a refinery, it was just a damned accident."

After five years and 51 missions, Walt left the military. His initial plan was to stay in for 20 years and then teach agriculture. His colonel advised him of the difficulties he would face on future promotions due to competing against West Point graduates.

Walt returned to college at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. He earned a degree in agriculture and made plans to be like his hero McKenzie agriculture teacher Otis Cox. His plans would change. While he worked on his degree, he

managed a store on campus and provided flying lessons. This led to him taking a position with Ralston-Purina in Louisville, Kentucky in the regional and national marketing division.

Walt made numerous trips home from Louisville to visit his parents. He would also visit his high school sweetheart Mary Belle Key in Huntingdon when she was in town. Though both went their separate ways after high school, they kept in touch.

Walt had married in 1944 and had two children, but the marriage ended in divorce. Mary Belle moved to California after high school to attend college and worked

for Douglas Aircraft before her child's illness forced her to stay home.

Walt and Mary Belle met again at her father's funeral. They rekindled their relationship and were married in 1964. They decided start an agriculture consultant firm, Walt Montgomery and Associates. The firm worked with agriculture companies all over the world in areas of mergers and acquisitions, executive talk searches and management consulting.

After 30 years, Walt and Mary Belle decided they had earned some time to enjoy themselves and share the responsibilities of managing the company. The Mont-



gomerys offered shares to be purchased in the company and established a board of directors. The company name was changed to The Montgomery Group.

Health scares in the late 1990s side-lined Walt, but he recovered and resumed his position within the business. Over the years, the family became interested in relocating old log cabins to preserve history. Walt and Mary Belle's first cabin relocation was to their backyard in Louisville. Soon they moved cabins to various locations in Indiana, Kentucky and Georgia.

In 2008, Walt died at the age of 83 and was buried at Oak Hill Cemetery in Huntingdon. In 2009, the Montgomery family established the Walter Reece (Walt) Montgomery Scholarship Fund at Middle Tennessee State University. The scholarship is to be awarded to students "interested in pursuing a career in a

field related to aviation and preference will be given particularly to students from Carroll County, Tennessee and its surrounding counties of Benton, Henry, Weakley, Gibson and Henderson in Tennessee."

Mary Belle died in 2011 and was buried next to Walt.

A Storyteller's Storyteller

John Milton wrote, "When I consider how my light is spent." Shakespeare penned, "Love all, trust a few, do wrong to none." Charles Dickens began one book, "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times." And Tom T. Hall gave us, "I remember the year that Clayton Delaney died, Nobody ever knew it but I went out into the woods and I cried..."

Geniuses all! Tom T.'s earnest love and admiration for his music mentor is stated so simply and so brilliantly. Goodness gracious alive, Mr. Hall made a career out of touching our senses with simple, and yet, compelling storylines...

A lot of writers, including me, would have waxed on and on, explaining the relationship in vivid detail, interviewing neighbors and recalling specific conversations. Maybe adding background on Clayton's grandparents and looking up the name of the city hardware where Clayton might have bought his first guitar.

Sometimes the story can become too complete, too thorough...leaving out room for thought provoking self-imagery, imagination, personal connection and that much needed uncomplicated, straight-from-the-heart, introspective look into one's own soul.

Tom T., like all the great ones, didn't clutter his stuff.

"He was the best guitar picker in our town, I thought he was a hero and I used to follow Clayton around." Tom T. paid homage in the most judicious and sincere way he knew how. He got off by himself and wept.

We've all lost a friend. It's no wonder that we grasp a line with such a telling message from the inside out!

Thomas Hall grew up the son of a Methodist minister in Olive Hill, Kentucky. Quite possibly those long sermons each Sunday turned him toward the openness, honesty, and simplicity that marked his future writings. I'm sure it influenced his brevity!

And I'm telling you, a liberal dose of God's blessings in the literary department didn't hurt him either.

He wrote a song in 1971 about the time he almost starved to death in Roanoke, Virginia. He entitled it, "Ode To A Half Of Pound Of Ground Round." I get stark raving hungry every time I hear it. And, of course, ask myself 10 times a day why can't I write like that...

In the "Ballad Of Forty Dollars" they "hired me and Fred and Joe to dig the grave and carry up some chairs." Turns out he had more than a passing interest in the funeral as we find out in the end, "I hope he rests in peace, The trouble is the fellow owes me forty bucks."

When "The little lady preacher from the limestone church" ran off with "a guitar picker by the name of Luther Short, A hairy-legged soul lost out in sin" Tom T. was most charitable, "Lord if I judge' em let me give' em lots o' room."

Course, that didn't keep Tom T. from asking a mind bogglingly question that still reverberates in my head today, "I've often sat and wondered who it was converted whom."

"I love little baby ducks, old pickup trucks, Slowing moving trains and rain...I love winners when they cry, losers when they try..." Good sounding words just tumbled in impeccable order from his lips.

He could be funny, wry,

dead serious and downright whimsical at times. But never as simple as some of his songs might suggest. Look a little under the surface. He was always mostly way past skin deep.

He was a poet of the first order. And the proof is in the depth of songs like, "Old Dogs, Children and Watermelon Wine," "You Show Me Your Heart (and I'll show you mine)," "I'm Not Ready Yet," and "The Old Side Of Town."

He has entertained us, enlightened us, rattled our memory banks and made us stop and ponder. Brother, that's getting into your kitchen!

"The Homecoming" takes me back to 1162 N. Stonewall Street before Tom T. hits the second chord. And I think I dated a girl once just like "Ravishing Ruby."

I will tell you something about him that you may not know. When he shook hands with you, he'd lean in to hear what you were saying. He looked right at you with that East Kentucky sideways grin. And seemed genuinely interested in whatever the chat was about. I'm not so sure all literary giants shared that wonderful down-home quality.

Tom T. Hall passed away last week. He was 85 years old. He has joined Clayton Delaney's All-Star Heavenly Five Piece Band.

There is nothing I like better than a good story brought to life by a bona fide storyteller. And he was the master. I wrote this small tribute to him just as soon as I heard the news.

And then I went out into the woods and I cried...

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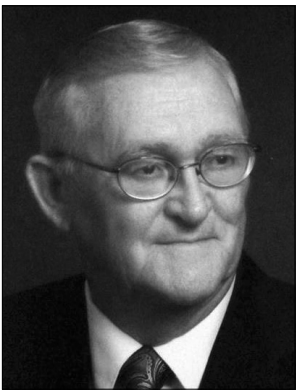

Marinated
Pork Chops

1 boneless pork loin, cut into pieces 1 inch thick
Place chops into a dish or pan 2 inches deep
3/4 cup honey
1/2 cup white vinegar
1/4 cup soy sauce (or Worcestershire)
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1 clove of garlic, minced for substitute

Mix all ingredients and bring to a boiling point and pour over loin chops. Refrigerate 4-6 hours (turn once if convenient). Remove chops and save marinade. Sprinkle both sides of chops with meat tenderizer and let set for 30 minutes. Place on grill (low to medium heat) and grill to a doneness that suits your fancy. Take 1/2 of save marinade -add 1/2 stick oleo and 1/2 teaspoon black pepper and bring to a boil (be sure to bring to a boil). Use this to baste meat a little during grilling. Also makes good gravy.

Alternate: After pork chops are marinated, leave in dish in the marinade and sprinkle with tenderizer.

Cover with lid or foil and bake in oven at 325 degrees for 1 hour.

Rotel Potatoes

5 pounds red potatoes
1 pound Velveeta
1 can Rotel, diced
1 can cream of mushroom soup
Wash and slice potatoes. Leave peeling on. Boil on top of stove until done; let cool. Melt Velveeta and Rotel in microwave. Add cream soup. Layer potatoes in a casserole dish and pour Rotel mixture over potatoes. Bake at 30-45 minutes at 350 degrees.

Super Macaroni
Salad

1 pound curly macaroni
4 carrots, shredded
1 scant cup sugar
1/2 cup cider vinegar
1 green pepper, chopped
1 medium onion, chopped
2 cup mayonnaise
1 can sweetened condensed milk
1/4 teaspoon pepper
Cook, drain and cool

Broccoli Salad

1 bunch broccoli, chopped
1/3 cup chopped onion
1 cup tomatoes, chopped
1 head of cauliflower, chopped
2 hard boiled eggs, chopped
Mix in one bowl. Sprinkle with bacon bits. In another bowl, mix 1 cup salad dressing, 1/3 cup sugar, 2 tablespoon vinegar. Mix and pour over and mix together. Serve. May chill first.

Bean Salad

1-1/4 cup vinegar
1-1/4 tablespoon oil
Salt and pepper
1/2 head cauliflower, broken
1 onion, chopped
Sweet red pepper for color
1-1/4 cup sugar
2 cloves garlic
2 cans green beans
1 can water chestnuts
Celery
Optional: 1 can of peas may be added.
Mix all ingredients together and chill. Serve cold.

Rebels Blank Eagles, 36-0

HENDERSON — McKenzie's Rebels (2-0) headed south to 4A Chester County last Friday for the first of three straight road contests after a season opening win at home over the Huntingdon Mustangs.

The Eagles won the toss and elected to defer to the second half so McKenzie got the ball first on the kick-off. After a quick pass to Andrew Cole for 20 yards, the Rebels stalled and had to punt away on their first possession. After a 42-yard punt by the Rebels, Chester County drove to the McKenzie 33 where they stalled and lost yards on two straight plays setting up a short Eagle punt to the McKenzie 28.

The Rebels started mixing short runs and passes driving to midfield where they converted a fourth down on a three-yard keeper by quarterback Jackson Cassidy. They continued into Chester County territory where Marquez Taylor bounced to the outside and scored on a 26-yard run with 3:02 left in the first quarter. McKenzie converted a 2-point conversion with a pass but was nullified by a penalty. Zach Aird connected on a PAT kick giving the Rebels a 7-0 lead.

The Eagles took the ensuing kickoff and got a first down on two quick plays. Jake Cassidy sacked the Chester County quarterback for a four-yard loss

. A rare 20-yard run gave the Eagles a first down in Rebel territory. Ty Anderson sacked the Eagle quarterback for a loss to close the first quarter. Another quarterback sack, this time by Gage Moon, opened the second quarter. The two sacks set up a fourth down and long for Chester County. They punted into the end zone giving the ball to McKenzie at the 20 yard line.

McKenzie got a first down and stalled setting up a punt during which a personal foul occurred gave Chester County possession deep in their own territory. Three plays later Jackson Cassidy stepped in front of an Eagle pass at the Rebel 18 and took it 82 yards for a touchdown. Drew Chappell ran it in for a two-point conversion extending McKenzie's lead to 15-0.

Following the kickoff, McKenzie recorded their third quarterback sack causing a fumble and recovering the ball in Eagle territory. A few plays later Jackson Cassidy connected with Zay Webber for a 60-yard touchdown pass. The PAT kick was no good leaving the Rebels with a 21-0 lead which ended up being the halftime score when McKenzie recovered another Chester County fumble to end the first half.

The third quarter opened with Chester County's quarterback and tailback both injured in the first half and didn't return to the contest. The Eagles got the ball first and their drive was ended with another quarterback

sack by Gage Moon. A short punt left McKenzie with good field position at the Eagle 40. A few plays later, Jackson Cassidy scored from 3 yards out. Tate Surber added a 2-point conversion run to open the Rebel lead to 29-0.

Chester County went three plays and out on their next possession with McKenzie blocking the punt. Two plays later Marquez Taylor took it 22 yards for his second score of the contest. Zack Aird's PAT kick was good giving the Rebels a 36-0 lead. The Eagles fumbled the ball two plays into their next possession with McKenzie recovering the ball. McKenzie's second offense took the field to close out the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was quick with a running clock due to the mercy rule. The two teams swapped possessions through the quarter until late in the period when Chester County got a scoring opportunity following a McKenzie fumble. The Eagles set up for a field goal on fourth down to avoid a shut out only to have McKenzie block the attempt to secure the 36-0 victory.

Jackson Cassidy threw 7/16 passes for 148 yards and a touchdown while rushing for ten yards and another touchdown. Marquez Taylor ran 8 times for 65 yards and two scores. Zay Webber had one catch for 60 yards and a touchdown.

McKenzie hits the road again this week for their first region contest against South Fulton.

Bethel Women's Basketball Season Schedule Released

MCKENZIE — Seventeen home games highlight another loaded schedule for the Bethel University Lady Wildcats as the 2021-22 schedule was unveiled this week.

After dominating play in the Southern States Athletic Conference with an all-time regular season record of 112-18, the Lady Wildcats moved to the Mid-South Conference this past season.
