War Eagles Soar in Win Over South Fulton

ATWOOD (September 10) — Keeping West Carroll senior quarterback Xander Moon out of the end zone is turning out to be a tough task.

One week after scoring six touchdowns in a game, Moon scored five in one half of play as the War Eagles beat South Fulton 57-14 in Week 4.

“The kids came out and executed the game plan,” West Carroll coach Clayton Morris said. “They took care of business and left the dramatics out of it.”

This was the first game that West Carroll (4-0) has won by more than six points. The War Eagles handled business so well that Morris started taking starters out midway through the second quarter.

Being able to play some younger or inexperienced players is important to Morris.

“For a small school like West Carroll, it is hard to get the second-team and third-team guys ample reps,” Morris said. “They got to get into a game situation and feel the flow of the game.”

West Carroll scored 57 unanswered points with Moon scoring five of the first six touchdowns.

Moon now has scored 15 touchdowns on the season. And with a 233-yard performance against South

Fulton, he has rushed for 827 on the season.

“Xander busted onto the scene last year, and he was a person everyone knew about,” Morris said. “But he has amplified his game. He is not just an athletic quarterback. His leadership is better, how he manages the game is better and he is hard for defenses to stop.”

Moon scored on runs of 31, 22, 43, 73 and 46, and Jayden Milton scored the other touchdown on a 15-yard run for the 44-0 lead at halftime.

In the third quarter, Connor Kothe had a 49-yard fumble recovery for a touchdown and Jaxon Mims threw a 7-yard touchdown pass to Nate Wykoff for the 57-0 lead. Kothe had nine total tackles (seven solo, two assisted) to go with the fumble recovery.

Jay Long added eight total tackles (four solo, two assists and two tackles for loss) on West Carroll's defensive effort.

Conner Allen scored the final 14 points of the game for South Fulton.

Huntingdon Picks Up Third Win Against Riverside

PARSONS (September 11) — The Huntingdon Mustangs returned to action Friday night picking up their third win of the season following last week's COVID-19 forfeiture by Camden. Huntingdon's second non-region win came against the Riverside Panthers, 26-14; the Panthers came into the game undefeated at 3-0.

While the Panthers dominated by air with 226 yards and two touchdowns, Huntingdon pounded Riverside into submission with its ground game. The Mustangs picked up 305 yards rushing with four touchdowns. Aden Hutcherson had 23 carries for 171 and three touchdowns, Cade Wood carried the ball 11 times for 81 yards, Gray Eubanks had carries 16 for 53 and one touchdown.

Huntingdon's defense held strong shutting down Riverside's running game holding them to negative

yardage. The Mustang defense forced three interceptions and recorded seven sacks; Blake Reeves (2), Elijah Flowers, Tayshawn Rivers, Nathan Ricketts, Seth Hughes and Eli Mota. Hutcherson and Reeves (2) were credited with the interceptions.

The opening series did not go as planned for the Panthers. On their opening offensive play, Bryce Hernandez fumbled the snap and Huntingdon's Reeves recovered the play on the one-yard line. On first-and-goal from the one, Eubanks handed off to Hutcherson for the touchdown. Hunter Britt's PAT was good as the Mustangs took the early 7-0 lead.

Riverside came out looking for revenge on the next series moving the 75 yards down the field on a series of passes. On second-and-ten from the Huntingdon 30-yard line, Hernandez found open

receiver Trent Smith for the touchdown. The game was tied 7-7 following the successful PAT by Chase Brock with 8:57 to play in the first quarter.

The second quarter opened with Huntingdon matriculating down the field. Hutcherson picked up his second TD on the night from 38 yards out. Britt's extra-point up put the Mustangs up 14-7.

With 5:47 to play in the half, Hutcherson crossed the goal line from 68 yards out. The PAT was no good as Huntingdon led at half-time 20-7.

At the 1:03 mark of the third quarter Huntingdon, added Huntingdon's final points of the game making the score 26-7.

Riverside put up the last seven points of the game with 9:15 left to play.

Next Friday, Huntingdon travels to Erin, Tennessee to battle region foe Houston County. Game time is 7 p.m.

mask mandates. The Henry County medical community serves a number of patients from McKenzie. Dr. Finley is a 2002 graduate of McKenzie High School. They were joined by other members of the Henry County medical community as well as a physician assistant and optometrist in McKenzie, all encouraging masks for the students and staff. All persons representing the medical community were wearing masks during the meeting.

The doctors said the hospital is full of patients. That mirrors other hospitals, mainly because of the delta variant of COVID-19. With hospitals in Jackson, Nashville, and Memphis full, there are no options to transfer patients. The variant is more contagious and affects the population more aggressively than previous versions. Younger people are being affected at a higher rate than previous versions.

Dr. Finley said medical personnel are working 60-80 hours weekly. She provided charts to illustrate that masks do help to limit the spread of the virus.

"We are tired and we need the community's help," said Finley. Speaking of mask mandates, the doctor said, "We will never know if we did too much, but we will know if we do too little."

Dr. Higgins said she treated more young patients in August than in any month of the last 10 years. The children are getting sick, emphasized Higgins. She noted her own children wear masks.

Melissa Herris, a parent of three children in McKenzie Special School District, advocated for no mask mandate. She said her family has had COVID. People wearing masks rebreath carbon dioxide. She said masks are about control. Students learn through facial expressions and other body language, said Herris. She said it is not the responsibility of the public school system.

Board members Karen Fowler and LaShonda Williams advocated for the mask mandates and daily temperature checks of students. Fowler said the school system has a responsibility to children with disabilities to keep them safe. She said we are asking teachers to stand in front of a classroom of students, some of whom are sick. The virus can circulate up to 35 minutes in the air, said Fowler.

Board Member Misty Aird said the school recommends masks and teachers have that option to wear a mask. Aird proposed a 30-day trial of a mask mandate to monitor the changes in the number of infections and quarantines. The board did not consider the trial period.

Board member Greg Barker said he respects the opinion on both sides of the issue. He questioned

if the proposed mandate was truly a mandate if the parents can opt out, according to an executive order by Governor Bill Lee. That executive order expires October 5. Barker said some medical professionals have different opinion concerning masks. His comment elicited a response from the medical personnel, "where are they?"

The conversation and verbal exchanges remained cordially during the meeting.

In a related matter, the Henry County School Board voted to retain its mask mandate during a Thursday evening meeting in Paris.

In another COVID-related matter, the board voted to grant up to 10 days additional sick pay to school personnel for COVID-related absences. The pay is retroactive to July 1, 2021.

In other business, the board approved:

- *An overnight trip for the Beta Club to Cape Girardeau, Missouri.
- *Elected Jon Davis as chairman, LaShonda Williams as vice-chairman, Greg Barker as treasurer, Karen Fowler as the member of the Tennessee Legislation Network and Misty Aird as the alternate member.

In the Director's report, Lynn Watkins noted he employed substitute teachers Jordyn Milsap, Janice Neary, and Michael Perschell.

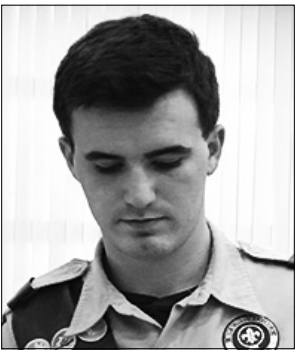
Melodie Marr, an educational assistant, resigned and Natalie Jones was hired as an educational assistant.

vicious dog" failed. Mayor Jill Holland presented the board a copy of TCA 39-17-1363 - Offense of owning, possessing, or having custody or control of a potentially vicious dog or a vicious dog. City Attorney Laura Keeton advised the council of how the legislature wrote the code based in regards to convicted violent felons. The law was written to be enforced at the state level, not city court thus there was no need to adopt an ordinance repeating the state law.

The Council approved the request by Duane Patrick to build a Gaga Pit at McKenzie City Park. Patrick's \$900 construction plan is considered his Eagle Scout Project. The scout proposed a 20-foot octagonal pit measuring 30 inches in height with a possible completion

Gaga combines dodging, striking, running, and jumping, to be the last person standing. took over after being forced to the fringes for 20 years.

Kustoff said he was appointed as a U.S. attorney in 2006. One of President Bush's biggest concerns was a repeat of terrorism. The Taliban hate the U.S. and Afghanistan will again become a breeding ground for terrorism.

Another concern of the citizenry is the amount of spending by Congressman,

\$3.5 trillion creates 'cradle to grave' burden on the taxpayers and will necessitate tax increases.

He also said the enhanced unemployment benefits providing more money for the unemployed than they would make as if they were employed. The situation made it difficult for employers to find the necessary number of employees.

An enhanced child tax credit is also pumping money to the pockets of families. He indicated the Democrats would love to extend those benefits beyond the December 31 authorization. Mod-

erate Democrats don't want to see all the added benefits, said Kustoff.

He expressed his gratitude to teachers for adapting during the times of COVID. He said children should be in school.

Soon, an ad hoc redistricting committee will redraw legislative districts. In the Eighth Congressional District, the overall population of his district decreased. The geographic region of the 8th District will expand to equalize the number of constituents in each of Tennessee's district.

Furthermore, Hunt improperly received a total of \$4,025.73 in water, sewer, and garbage services by not paying her personal utility bill in a timely manner. Hunt's personal utility account carried a past due balance for 55 of the 68 months analyzed. The town's policy states that customers who have not paid their bill by the 3rd of each month should have their service cutoff on the 11th of each month. Hunt had access to the town's utility accounting software and the authority

to remove names from the service cutoff list. This allowed her to remove her name from the monthly cutoff list and conceal that she was not paying her personal utility bill. After officials discovered Hunt's past due account in March 2019, she made three payments totaling \$537 to pay her balance in full. Angela Hunt voluntarily resigned her employment with the town on December 28, 2020. In September 2021, the Weakley County Grand Jury indicted Angela McElhiney Hunt on two counts of theft over \$2,500, one count of theft of services, and three counts of official misconduct. The investigation further

revealed that the Town of Gleason paid employees at least \$15,444 in questionable annual leave compensation. This occurred because town employees were allowed to accrue leave balances in excess of the town's policy. "Our investigation discovered a number of oversight and policy weaknesses within the Town of Gleason," said Comptroller Jason Mumpower. "A few of these deficiencies include: policies were not followed; bank statements were not reconciled; money was not deposited within three days of collection; timesheet records did not match with payroll records; and the town's credit card policy is inadequate."

Ruth Brashear

A Teacher to the End

I think every kid in school got excited about getting a substitute teacher back in the day. It was usually a guaranteed movie day or possibly a day with extended recess, at least in the elementary school days and before common core or standardized tests with repercussions. But there is always an exception to every rule, it was not going to be a free day if Miss Ruth showed up.

Miss Ruth Brashear was a sweet substitute who

loved us all, but you were not going to watch Charlotte's Web and play on the swings for hours. It was business as usual because we all soon learned she wasn't the everyday substitute she was a real teacher who was retired in title only. And it was no use trying to play stump the teacher because she knew all the tricks.

Ruth was born in 1919 in the Cherrywood Community to John Robert (1866-1959) Lucinda Mabel Chandler Brashear (1887-

1971). She had three older brothers, Willie Geneva (1893-1894), Robert Thomas (1895-1984) and John Raymond (1906-1967). Having such older siblings, her playmate was her niece Virginia (1919-2002), daughter of brother Robert.

After graduating from high school in 1937, she headed off to Bethel College to begin her training to become a teacher. She said in a 2000 interview, "Ever since I was young I wanted to be a teacher."

Upon completing her degree at Bethel she took a position at Withthorn School near Lavinia. There she taught all eight elementary grades and assumed the duties of the principal. She even helped fix the children's lunches in the school lunchroom.

The following year she transferred to Atwood and taught second grade for six years. In the fall of 1947, she began her first trek at McKenzie.

After seven years, she resigned to take a posi-

tion working for Ray and Katherine McAlexander at Mack's Variety Shop. She and Katherine expanded the operation by opening a ladies' wear and hat shop on the balcony overlooking the store's main floor. The entrepreneurial endeavor lasted ten years.

She finished out the 1964 school year in Hollow Rock before returning to McKenzie to teach first grade.

With the death of her father, Ruth and her mother moved to town.

In 1986, she retired from full-time teaching. The following year, she was back on campus serving as a substitute teacher up into her 80s.

Over the years, she noted many changes in the schools but always found the reward in the progress children made in reading.

"It's altogether different to what it was," she said. "I've enjoyed teaching and working with the boys and girls. It's a challenge - something different every day." She noted

how schools began offering more education opportunities and great involvement in school activities.

Ruth was given a surprise birthday party in 2000 where she was greeted by over 30 guests that included family, friends and former colleagues. Former student and colleague Catherine Argo toasted Ruth by saying, "As far back in my life as I can remember, Ruth Brashear has been a wonderful presence and positive influence for my family and me. My first memories of Miss Ruth are of elementary school, her friendships with my mother and my aunts and her being my teacher in second grade. My daughter Ellen, who she also taught, will join me in saying that Miss Ruth is a perfect example of all that is good and true and right in the teaching profession. Through the years, our personal and family ties with Miss Ruth have increased. Now, when I think of Ruth Brashear, it's always wishful think-

ing... I wish I could be the teacher she always was... I wish could be as helpful to everyone as she is... I wish my yard, especially my pansies and tulip tree, would look like hers... I wish I could cool the way she does!"

Ruth died in June 2007 at age 87. She was buried near her father and mother in Mount Olivet Cemetery.

Carroll County Sheriff's Reports

Stolen Items Recovered, Two Arrested — Two Trezevant men were arrested on Sept. 4 when stolen items were found to be in their possession.

McKenzie Remains Undefeated

TROY — McKenzie wrapped up three weeks of road games with a trip to another set of Rebels at Obion Central. They left with another win, 40-14, after trailing 14-7 at the end of the first quarter. This was the second 4-A team the Rebels have defeated having shut out Chester County 36-0 two weeks ago.

McKenzie won the toss and elected to defer to the second half which gave Obion Central the ball first. They came out with a punishing run game driving into McKenzie territory where a 35-yard pass completion gave Obion a first down inside the McKenzie 10. Two plays later, Obion was on the board first with a 1-yard touchdown run with the extra point good leaving the McKenzie Rebels trailing early 7-0.

McKenzie answered with a ground game of their own using the feet of Jackson Cassidy and Marquez Taylor. Cassidy converted a third and long play with a 38-yard romp for a first down. Taylor scored on a 14-yard run with 4:51 remaining in the first quarter. Zach Aird was good on the extra point to tie the game 7-7.

Obion went back to their run game and drove back into McKenzie territory scoring on a 20-yard run to retake the lead. Their extra point was good for a 14-7 lead near the end of the first quarter.

Drew Chappell got a kickoff return to the Rebel 40-yard line where a 13-yard pass completion from Cassidy to Aird put the Rebels in Obion territory on the final play of the first quarter. Three plays later, Cassidy took off for a 39-yard touchdown run less than two minutes into the second quarter. Aird's extra point kick was good to tie the game at 14-14.

Obion went three plays and out on their next series and had to punt for the first time. McKenzie took the ball and drove into Obion territory

where they reached a fourth down and long play. Zach Aird connected on a 28-yard field goal to give the Rebels their first lead of the night. Zach Aird intercepted an Obion Central pass with under a minute to go until halftime. Aird made two nice

catches to set up his longest field goal attempt of the season at 39 yards away with a little over a second left until the half. Aird's kick was good as the clock ran out on the first half giving McKenzie a 20-14 lead.

McKenzie opened up the second half with possession at their own 20-yard line. They drove deep into Obion Central territory where they capped off a nice drive with a 7-yard touchdown run by Marquez Taylor. Aird's extra point was good to extend McKenzie's lead to 27-14 halfway through the third quarter.

McKenzie's defense kept Obion hemmed up deep in their own territory following the ensuing kickoff. An Obion punt gave McKenzie good field position near midfield. The Rebels went to the air with three pass completions to put them in scoring position. Cassidy went 9 yards for the score. Aird missed the extra point leaving the Rebels with a 33-14 lead near the end of the third period.

Obion got their offense rolling again driving all the way to the McKenzie 1 where Tate Surber broke up a potential touchdown pass and the Rebels held on fourth down to take over the ball inside their own 1-yard line. McKenzie went back to the feet of Marquez Taylor for two 10-plus yard runs and then he was gone for a 74-yard touchdown run. Aird's kick was good for a 40-14 lead.

Obion took the next drive into McKenzie territory again where they were held by the Rebels again on fourth down. McKenzie ran the clock out on the contest for their fourth win of the year.

McKenzie ran up an impressive 522 offensive yards with 414 of that coming on the ground. Marquez Taylor ran 19 times for 219 yards and three touchdowns. Jackson Cassidy ran 7 times for 139 yards and two touchdowns. Cassidy also was good for 8 of 15 passing for 108 yards. Zach Aird led the receiving with 52 yards on four catches.

The Rebels come home for the next three weeks playing host to Perry County in a region matchup.
