During these years, the first grand-child, Carter Cary, was born and so she decided to come home. After being in school for 51 years (a long time from that bus ride into first grade) it was time to do other things.

So she came home to do what she could for her church and community. She began to work with program develop-ment at the Dixie where she would spend 15 years as ei-ther a volunteer or employee doing whatever was needed at the time. She continues in her role as a volunteer.

During her years in Huntingdon, Brooke has served in varied capacities including serving as pres-ident of the Girls Softball League, president of the Jr. Woman's Club, president of the Book Club, President of Delta Kappa Gamma Teach-er's Sorority, and member of the Huntingdon Garden Club.

Additionally, she worked with a distinguished group of Huntingdon High School graduates to start the Huntingdon Alumni Associ-ation and served as its first president. She still serves as a member of the board.

Lucas moved to Huntingdon and farmed in the Lankford School commu-nity. In 1957, Parnell moved his family to Northwood Drive.

Lucas and Lola Routon Taylor had 3 children: Par-nell, Russell, and Majorie. Russell and Melba of Bru-ceton had 3 children; Mary James, Susan, and Jimmy. Marilyn and Brian, both of Huntingdon were the chil-dren of Majorie and C D Ca-ton. After a short time in the Army, Parnell married Chris-tine Crawley of Bruceton and had 2 children: Robert Lucas and James Vincent, both life-long residents of Huntingdon.

With the help of his father-in-law, Lloyd Crawley, Parnell

opened Taylor-Crawley Ponti-ac Company on E Main St in 1948. In 1955, Parnell became the sole owner of Taylor Pon-tiac Co. and remained at that location until 1982. He and his sons bought the Chevro-let franchise from Gordon Wilder. Christine, Robert and Vince worked with him in the dealership until it was sold in 1989.

Parnell was a member of the First United Methodist Church, the Huntingdon Ro-tary Club, and was a Mason. He served on the Hunting-don School Board and was a member of numerous local organizations and served in the state legislature from 1972-1974. He attended sev-eral state and national inau-gurations and was a repre-sentative at one Presidential Convention.

Parnell enjoyed farming and raising cattle, horses, and hunting with his bird dogs. His idea of fun was feeding his animals, driving his tractor on the farm and of course, spending time with his grandchildren.

Robert and Vince continue to live on the family farm. Robert and Phyllis have 2 children and 4 grandchil-dren; Robyn, Taylor, and Jackson of Spring Hill, Tenn. and Lucas (Lauren), Griffin, and Parker of Greensboro, North Carolina. Vince and Glenda have 1 daughter and 1 granddaughter; Morgan and Tinley of Huntingdon. Rob-ert and Vince are members of the First United Methodist Church. They have continued in their father's tradition of loving Huntingdon and Carroll Co. and in being of service to the community. Robert and Vince both are lifelong Mustangs and ac-cepted the award on behalf of the family.

the board approved entering into a letter to proceed with the study.

The board approved changes to policies regarding Homebound Instruction and a new Virtual Education Program. The change to the homebound instruction policy clarifies that students receiving homebound instruction may receive instruction remotely if they are quarantining due to

COVID-19. The virtual education program stems from an updated state board of education regulation which differentiates between virtual schools and virtual education programs. This virtual education program only applies to homebound students. The board approved both policy changes.

The Board acknowledged the resignation of board member, Dr. Tim Tucker, who has served on the school board since 2010. Director of Schools Jonathan Kee presented Tucker with a gift. Tucker said "I appreciate the opportunity to serve on this board. I like what the board

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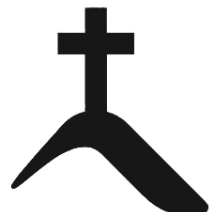
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Carmack's Fish Barn

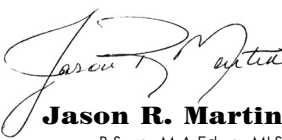
In the last seven years, it seems I find myself on Como Road more frequently as I have become a husband and father telling stories about

COTTAGE GROVE — A local landmark was destroyed by fire Sunday night.

Carmack's Fish Barn, located at 2165 Hwy. 140, is a total loss.

The initial call to the Como/Ore Springs Volunteer Fire Department came in around 8 p.m.

According to the fire department's Facebook page, when firefighters arrived, they found fire burning through 2/3 of the roof. Firefighters set up a dump tank peration and made a defensive attack on the fire.

"We are sadden to say that it was a total loss. Our deepest sympathies go out to the owners Kaylene Radford and Corey Radford for this very unfortunate incident," said the Facebook post.

We were on scene for 4 1/2 hrs. Engines 1 & 2,

Tankers 1, 2, & 3 responded along with 21 firefighters from Cottage Grove.

Mutual aid was provided by Como OreSprings fire, (1 engine, 2 tankers, and 5 personnel) Paris Fire, (1 tanker/pumper and 2 personnel) Gleason Fire, (1 tanker and 2 personnel) and EMA, (drone thermal imaging footage and 2 personnel). Also Sheriff's Department deputies directed traffic.

Carmack's Fish Barn opened in 1984 and quickly became one of the area's most popular restaurants, known for its catfish, beans, slaw and hush puppies. It included an outside area to pet and feed farm animals outside of the restaurant which was especially popular with children and families.

Employees of the restaurant closed the restaurant at 3 p.m. Sunday.

Once upon a time Mr. Bill Thompson delivered our mail. He drove all the way out to the house everyday except Sunday. Without fail. Some of the mail was addressed to Leon Colbert at 1162 N. Stonewall. Some was addressed General Delivery. And sometimes it was simply Leon Colbert, McKenzie.

Mr. Bill got it to us anyway. And this was way before zip codes, automatic sorters and tracking numbers.

I reckon the only piece of mail that didn't get through to us was that one where we won the million dollars Clearinghouse sweepstakes.

It was like that story I heard Roy Clark tell one time about selling White Rose Salve. If you sold so many tins of White Rose, the company would reward you with an authentic Gene Autry Guitar with the accompanying book on "how to play the guitar" in 10 easy lessons.

Roy got busy going door to door hawking that stuff. He said it wasn't easy as a young boy, "A lot of folks didn't want White Rose Salve!" But he finally sold enough, and the White Rose folks mailed him a Gene Autry Guitar. But he

never got the lesson book.

Roy said he just couldn't understand what happened...until he saw his postman about a year later playing a guitar on TV!

It wasn't that way with Mr. Thompson. They didn't have any more money than we did. I think it musta been one of those sectional workers in Memphis that intercepted our Clearinghouse check.

We have lived broke ever since.

I worked at the local Post Office the summer I graduated from high school. I was amazed how dedicated Porter Dunlap, Hot Shot Lewis and Oscar Owen were in seeing that everyone got their mail in a quick and orderly manner.

But I never really understood the importance of a piece of mail until I went off to college. You talk about alone, lost and lonely...I'd run each day to the little campus post office to check Box 57. A letter from home was like manna from Heaven. Listen, I was thrilled to get the "Dear John" letter. At least, someone knew I was there!

I moved to Port St. Joe years ago and Mr. Herb Burge and Johnny Linton took a personal interest in handling my infrequent correspondence with great care and integrity...as they did for everybody in town.

The names have changed over time in our little Post Office, but the service from one and all is still the same. Please understand I have no beef with any of the local "Postables."

But somewhere in the modern system someone has lost sight of the promise, "Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds."

I told you about my mailed check not getting to the IRS; or the IRS not acknowledging receipt of the same. It apparently went the way of Clearinghouse winnings and guitar lesson books. So I paid my income tax twice, the second time plus penalties and interest.

But that is only money. I've got bigger fish to fry with that sectional worker in Memphis this morning. I mailed a vintage Seth Thomas 89E clock movement to Cleveland, Georgia. I paid extra for the 3 day Priority Mail delivery with tracking. I learned my lesson from the IRS fiasco.

First off, you've got to understand the importance of this circa 1900 clock. It is a really good one. And Seth Thomas didn't make many of them. It can not be replaced! I only trusted it "in the

mail" because it needs a bushing that I don't have and can not put in. But there is a great clock man in Cleveland that can work miracles.

I mailed it over a week ago. I'm thinking one stop in Atlanta and it will be on to Cleveland. The less people that handle the fragile package, the better off the clock movement will be. On the third day my tracking number finally spoke to me. The rare and precious 89E was in New Orleans, Louisiana...366 miles in the exact opposite direction!

I'm blaming the whole thing on zip codes, automatic sorters and tracking numbers. I couldn't help but think of Mr. Thompson and Porter Dunlap, Oscar Owen and Johnny and Herb. We might have lost the human touch in this process.

And, in retrospect, I guess the whole thing is my fault. I should have mailed it in the middle of a rainy snow storm during the darkest gloom of night...

CDC Approved Booster Dose Recommendations for Certain Populations Available at Carroll County Health Department

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Department of Health is offering booster doses of COVID vaccine to certain populations, beginning Friday, September 24. The booster, just as the initial vaccines, is free of charge.

A single dose booster of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine can be administered for individuals who met these criteria:

- People 65 years and older and residents in long-term care settings should receive a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after their Pfizer-BioNTech primary series.
- People aged 18-49 years with underlying medical conditions may receive a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after their Pfizer-BioNTech primary series, based on their individual benefits and risks, and people aged 18-64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmis-

sion because of occupational or institutional setting may receive a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after their Pfizer-BioNTech primary series, based on their individual benefits and risks.

More information on the CDC's recommendation for a booster dose is available online.

Local health departments across the state will be administering the booster dose. Information on appointment availability can be found at <https://covid19.tn.gov/covid-19-vaccines/availability/>. Appointments are

not required. The Federal Pharmacy Partnership (FPP) for Long-Term Care (LTC) Program is facilitating on-site vaccination for residents in long-term care facilities. Additional vaccine providers offering the Pfizer vaccine can be found by visiting <http://www.vaccines.gov>. Patients do not need to prove their diagnosis or health condition to be eligible for the booster dose.

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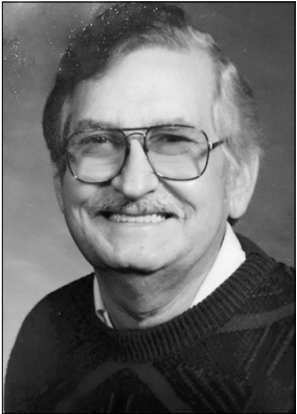

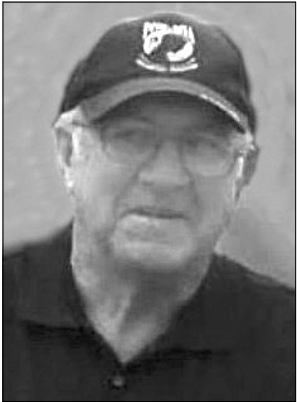

HUNTINGDON (September 24) — Huntingdon (5-1) trampled Milan (1-4) Friday night at Paul Ward Stadium, rushing for 537 yards in a 63-33 win.

Mustang tailback Aden Hutcherson enjoyed a big night, running for 301 yards and seven touchdowns on 32 carries. Cade Wood added 203 yards and a pair of touchdowns on 16 carries. He also had nine tackles, two tackles for loss and two sacks.

After going three-and-out on their first possession, the Mustangs jumped out to an 8-0 and never trailed. Huntingdon punted just one time all night.

As expected, the Bulldogs fought back and kept it close until the second half.

Wood gave his team the lead with 5:16 in the first with a 36-yard run but Milan answered with an effective eight-play drive capped by Hayden Sullivan's 16-yard pass to Trey Spinks to make it a 8-6 game.

It took the Mustangs just three plays to extend their lead to 15-12 as Hutcherson scored just 55 yards away. But Milan answered again when Sullivan, who threw for 273 yards and a pair of TDs, scrambled past the goal line on third down to make it a 15-12 game. That's as close as the Bulldogs would get as Huntingdon outscored them 48-21 the rest of the way and led 27-12 at the half.

The Mustangs scored on the first play of the third

Bethel travels to Williamsburg, Kentucky Saturday to meet the Patriots of the University of the Cumberlands.

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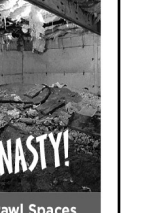
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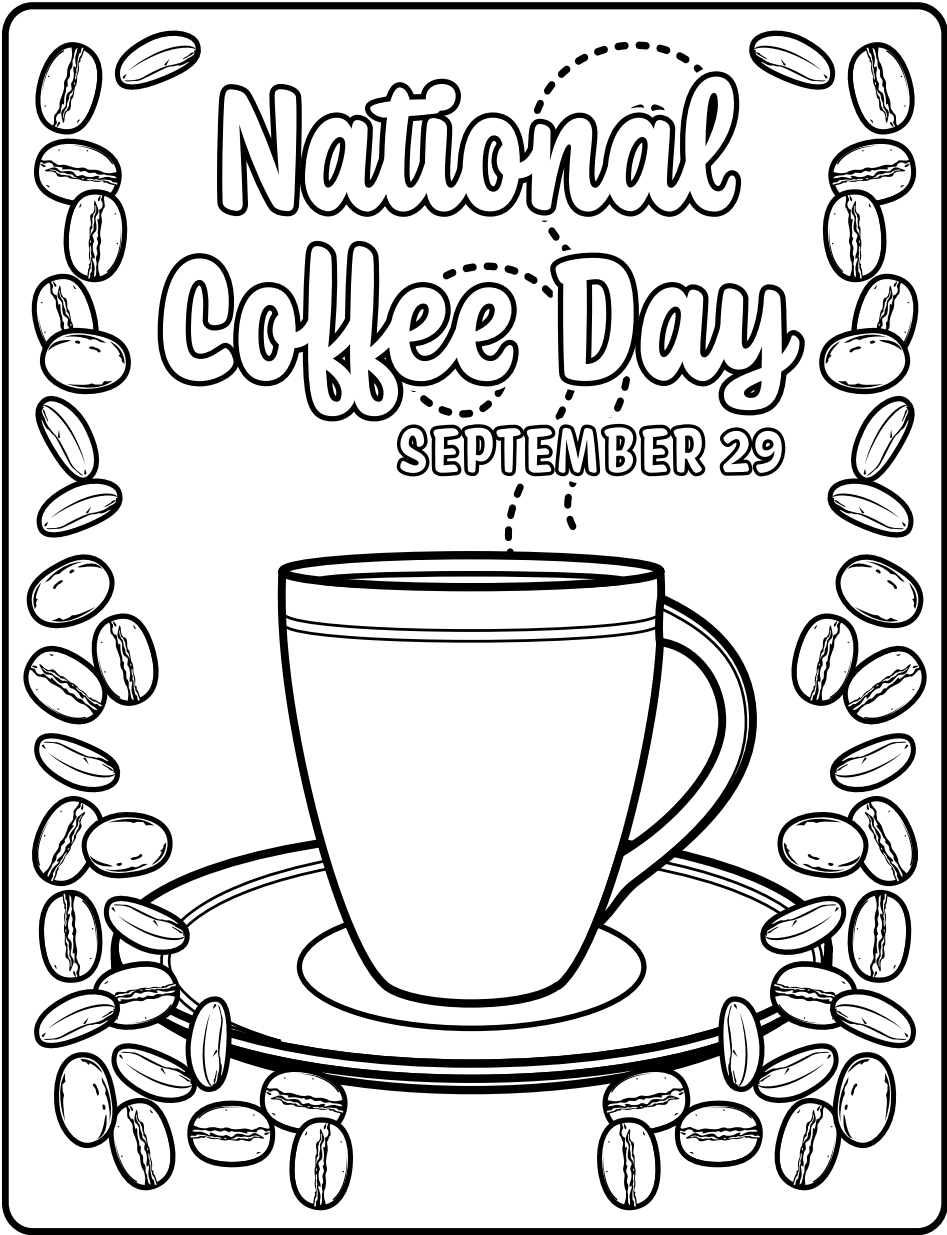
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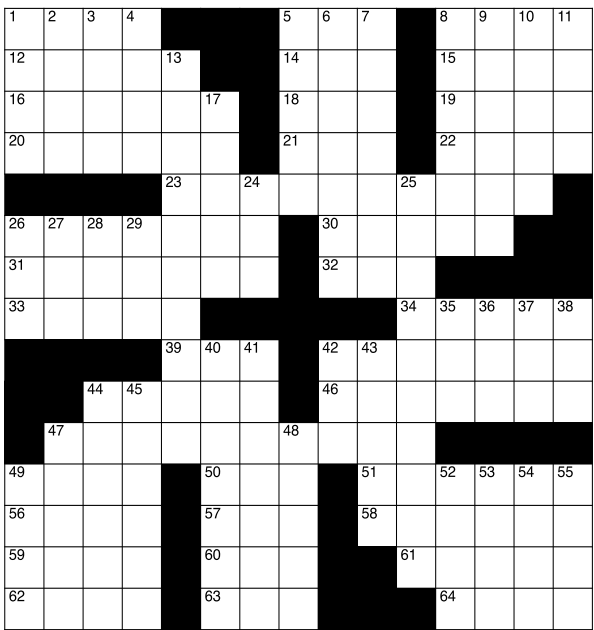

Then on to the traditional crowning of the Homecoming Queen prior to the game Friday night. Sadie O'Brian was crowned this year's football Homecoming Queen.

On to the game, the Rebels played host to undefeated cross-county rival West Carroll. The War Eagles won the toss and elected to receive the ball first. The Rebel defense was stiff as West Carroll lost yardage before having to punt from deep in their territory.

McKenzie wasted no time moving the ball from their own 35 starting with a screen pass that went for 13 yards. Running back Marquez Taylor got loose down to the War Eagle 30. Quarterback Jackson Cassidy went to the air for a 30-yard touchdown strike to Zay Webber. Zach Aird was good on the extra-point giving the Rebels an early 7-0 lead.

After the Stafford Roditis kickoff was received by Malik Lee, the War Eagles started their second possession from their own 30 and didn't gain much before having to punt again. McKenzie was penalized for roughing the kicker which gave West Carroll a new set of downs from near midfield. The Rebel defense continued making it difficult for West Carroll to move the ball as the War Eagles had to punt away their ensuing possession. Seth Edwards got off a long punt that gave McKenzie possession at their own 19. The Rebels were in West Carroll territory after double digit runs by Jackson Cassidy and Rashad McCreary. Cassidy completed a pass but the ball came loose with West Carroll recovering the ball. A few plays later West Carroll fumbled it back to the Rebels at their own 46.

McKenzie went back to their ground game and scored a few plays later on

a 5-yard run by Marquez Taylor with 5:54 left in the second quarter. Aird was good on his third extra point attempt extending the Rebel lead to 21-7.

McKenzie got the ball back quickly when Camden Allison intercepted a Xander Moon pass on the first play following the kickoff. Two plays later, Taylor was in the endzone again on a 44-yard touchdown run. Aird's extra point attempt was blocked leaving the score 27-7.

West Carroll moved the ball to near midfield on their next possession thanks to a Xander Moon pass catch that went 38 yards. The Rebel defense allowed nothing after that forcing the War Eagles into a fourth down play. A West Carroll throw landed incomplete which gave McKenzie possession near midfield. A few plays later, Cassidy connected with Andrew Cole for a 26-yard touchdown pass. Aird's extra point was good for a 34-7 lead at halftime.

McKenzie took the kickoff to start the third quarter and wasted no time moving downfield behind double digit runs by Marquez Taylor and Rashad McCreary. A touchdown pass to Zack Aird was nullified by a penalty but Jackson Cassidy scored on a 10-yard run shortly after. Aird's extra point attempt was blocked giving the Rebels a 40-7 lead.

McKenzie scored again on their next possession after forcing West Carroll to go three plays and punt. Marquez Taylor took the ball off the right side for a 57-yard touchdown. Aird was good on the extra point making the score 47-7. The mercy rule went into effect with the clock running constantly the remainder of the game.

The Rebels struck again when Andrew Cole picked off a pass and took it 20 yards for McKenzie's final score of the night. Aird was good on the extra point for a 54-7 lead.

Both teams played their younger players in the fourth quarter as the clock wound down. McKenzie remains unbeaten at 6-0 and plays host to Dresden in a district contest. West Carroll is 5-1 and plays host to Lake County in a key district contest for the War Eagles.
