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Unemployment Down In Tri-Counties

Unemployment fell in the tri-counties between July and August.

In Carroll County, unemployment fell from 4.9 percent to 4.4 percent. Out of a total labor force of 11,784, 11,265 were employed while 519 were unemployed.

In Henry County, unemployment decreased from 4.7 percent to 4.2 percent over the period. 563 were unemployed and 12,987 were employed out of a total labor force of 13,541.

Weakley County unemployment decreased the biggest amount from 5.5 percent to 4.1 percent. 14,491 were employed and 619 were unemployed out of a labor force of 15,110.

Across the state, the unemployment rate decreased in 93 counties while increasing in one county and one county's rate remained the same. Seven West Tennessee counties were listed with the top ten highest unemployment rates

including Shelby, Lauderdale, Lake, Haywood, Hardeman, McNairy, and Decatur counties. No West Tennessee counties were listed in the top ten lowest unemployment rates. Williamson, Moore, and Cheatham counties had the top three lowest unemployment rates in the state.

Statewide, the unemployment rate fell from 4.7 percent to 4.3 percent in August.

McKenzie's City Council met for their regular monthly session Thursday, October 12, passing two ordinances on the first reading and discussing possible future ordinances.

Mayor Jill Holland updated the council on the progress of information concerning a motel/hotel occupancy ordinances. She discussed the situation with city attorney Laura Keeton. Keeton could not find anything on the local level or state level preventing the city from enacting the necessary ordinance.

According to Mayor Holland and Police Chief Moates, there have been

Tractor Fire Near Long Heights Baptist Church

MCKENZIE (October 14) — McKenzie Fire and Rescue responded to a tractor fire at 260 Old Paris Road on Long Heights Baptist Church's property on Thursday at 3:01 p.m.

Responding units were McKenzie Engine 918, Tanker 924, Brush 922 and Rescue 925. The tractor caught fire while bush-hogging the field

and burned approximately one acre of the field. The tractor was a total loss and later reignited at 7:38 p.m., over four hours after the initial call. Responding units to the re-ignition were McKenzie Car 100, Engine 918 and Tanker 924. Officials determined that fire/heat remained in the rear wheel hubs and ignited the left rear

tire causing the second blaze.

The fires were close to the Highway 22 northbound off ramp to US-79, but did not affect the Long Heights Baptist Church structure or the highway.

Local Vaccination Rates Trail State Rates

NASHVILLE (October 15) — The percentage of local citizens who have received the COVID-19 vaccination is lower than the state average, according to the Tennessee Department of Health.

In Tennessee, 53.6 percent of the eligible population has at least one dose of the vaccination and 47.8 percent are fully vaccinated.

Carroll County has a higher percentage vaccinated than either Henry or Weakley. Carroll has 49.28 percent with one dose and 43.56 percent fully vaccinated. Since the pandemic began, Carroll had 100 persons die from COVID-19 and a total of 5,649 contracted the virus. The good news is the total case count is decreasing in the county. On October 15, there were 10 new cases and a total of 134 active cases. The new data indicates a significant decline from the high on September 11 when there were 75 new cases.

Henry County has 46.16 percent with at least one dose and 42.13 percent who are fully vaccinated. A total of 84 persons have died from COVID-19 and 5,423 contracted the virus since the pandemic began. On October 15, there were three new cases and 85 active cases.

Weakley County has 37.9 percent with at least one dose and 33.72 percent who are fully vaccinated. A total of 87 persons have died of COVID-19 and 5,951 have contracted the virus. On October 15, there were 9 new cases and 126 active cases.

Madison County has 63.71 percent with at least one dose and 57.22 percent who are fully vaccinated. A total of 297 have died of COVID-19 and 17,400 have contracted the virus.

Vaccinations are available free of charge at the county health departments, Walgreens in McKenzie, Phipps Pharmacy in McKenzie, Walmart in Huntingdon and Paris, and Gleason City Drugs to name a few locations.

Trezevant Board Approves Sunday Beer Sales

The Trezevant City Board met for their monthly session last Tuesday, October 12 passing the second reading of an ordinance governing Sunday beer sales. The ordinance will now allow beer sales on and off premises between the hours of 12 noon and 12 midnight on Sundays.

There was a brief discussion regarding a derelict property on Crooked Street owned by Lucinda Davis. The residence on the property is partially burned and the city has been attempting to get her to clean it up. Since meeting with the city several months ago and asking for more time to clean it up, Davis has not responded to multiple requests from the city updating her efforts to rectify the problem. It was recommended that the city send another letter setting a deadline to get the work done before the city takes further action.

The board suspended the rules to discuss and deal with a situation with a city employee testing positive for COVID. It was advised that there was nothing in the city's employee manual covering that situation. After some discussion, board members approved a motion that the employee needed to stay off the recommended time stated by their doctor and return to work with a doctor's approval statement.

Board member Lloyd Bateman brought up an issue with a problem property on Park Street. Bateman told the board that he had spoken with property owner Ricky Nelson and learned that the asking price for the property was \$6,000. He recommended the city buy the property and do what needs to be done to the ongoing drainage issue. It was brought up that the engineer would have to redraw the map for the new

sewer line planned for that area, which currently goes around the Nelson property, for an estimated \$3,000 and someone would have to be hired to clean up the property for an estimated \$2,500. A motion was made and passed to purchase the Nelson property.

In other action, board members passed a motion to apply for a loan from the State Revolving Fund program. The loan is for \$88,000 which the city only will have to repay slightly over \$44,000 at 1 percent interest over a 5-year period. The funds will be used to upgrade the city's water plant.

Before adjourning, it was announced that there would be a street sign dedication for T Willie Lane on Sunday, October 17. It was also announced that there would be Trick or Treat at the walking track on Saturday, October 30, from 6-8 p.m.

NASHVILLE — Tennesseans have faced over the past two years – COVID-19, devastating floods, tornadoes, a Christmas Day bombing – show us that if a disaster can happen, it will happen," said TEMA Director Patrick Sheehan. issues with drug activity, shots fired and domestic assault incidents requiring police attention at the Relax Inn. It was learned some residents are using the motel's address as their permanent address, which according to Mayor Holland, is against zoning regulations. The zoning regulations do not permit individuals staying for extensive periods of time. Moates indicated the motel owner was cooperating with authorities regarding the activities occurring at his place of business.

The potential future ordinance would prevent guests from staying at a local motel for no more than 29 or 30 days out of a possible 90 days and no more than 15 consecutive days unless there are circumstances such as construction workers or contract workers that are working

on local industries or homes damaged by storms. Discussion on the subject centered around what to do with guests who violate the law within that first 29 days. It was recommended to adopt a two or three strike rule in the new ordinances resulting in a guest being evicted from the motel. No action was taken on the matter, and Mayor Holland said she would discuss the matter further with the city attorney.

Council members approved on the first reading to update an ordinance concerning parking violations and penalties. The ordinance, had not been updated in more than thirty years and originally called for fines of \$3 dollars for parking violations if they are paid within ten days and \$5 dollars after ten days. The updated ordinance calls for the fines to be increased to \$20 dollars if paid within ten days and \$25 dollars after ten days.

The second ordinance focused abandoned prop-

erty. According to Mayor Holland, the state has changed some rules giving municipalities more options on how to dispose of abandoned or unclaimed personal property. According to the ordinance, the property can include bicycles, vehicles, electronics, jewelry, phones, clothing, furniture, appliances and other items that come into city possession by abandonment or other means.

The city has four options on how to dispose of the abandoned property; they can sell it at a publicly advertised public auction, sell it by sealed bids also publicly advertised, sell it by Internet auction, or donate the property to non-profit organizations. Before the city can take any action on the abandoned property, it has to be kept for 60 days allowing the owners time to claim it.

After department heads reported on current activities, the meeting was adjourned. The next regular meeting is November 11 at 6 p.m.

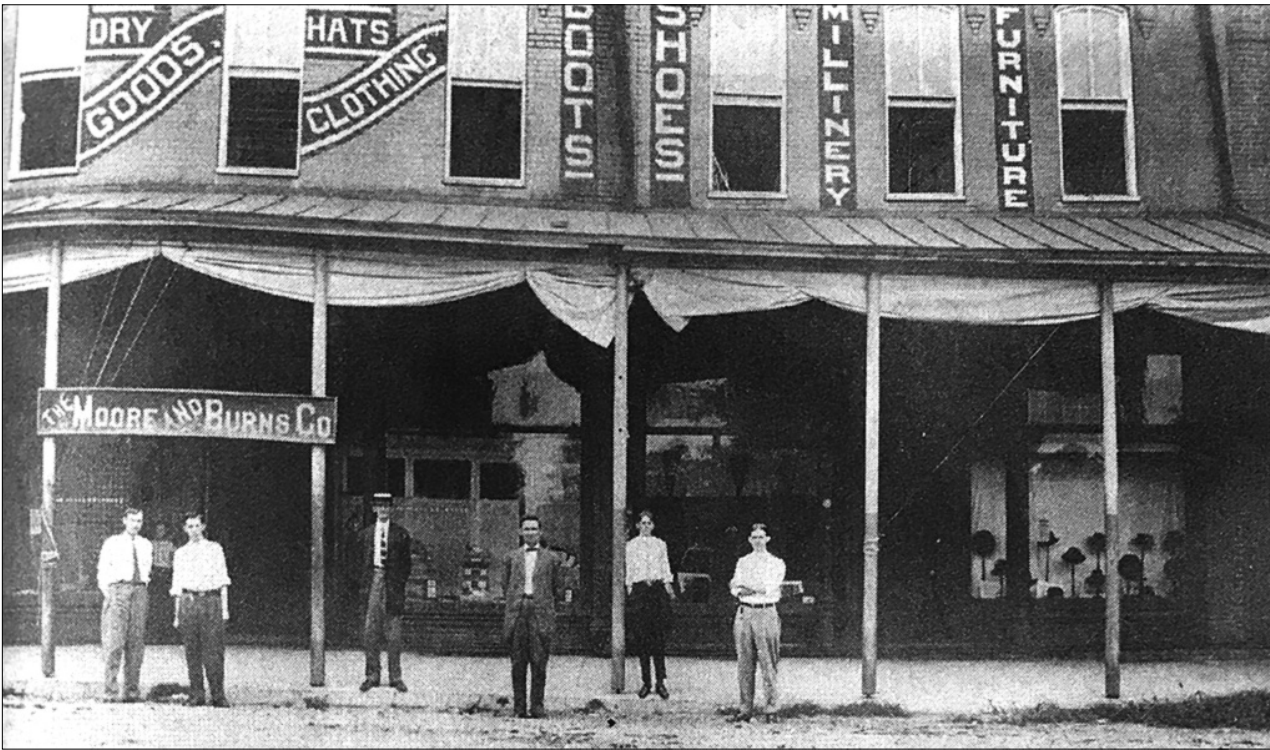
Baker's military career began in December 1980 when he enlisted as a cavalry scout with Troop B,

Baker dedicated 41 years of service to support the men and women in the Tennessee National Guard," said Maj.

Gen. Jeff Holmes, Tennessee's Adjutant General. "His spirit and passion serving those around him is contagious; we thank him for his commitment to the Guard and wish him luck in his new position."

Throughout his career, Baker earned numerous recognitions, including the Bronze Star, Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, and the Combat Action Badge.

The Tennessee National Guard held a ceremony for Baker's retirement at Joint Force Headquarters in Nashville on October 17.

continuous history of the community.

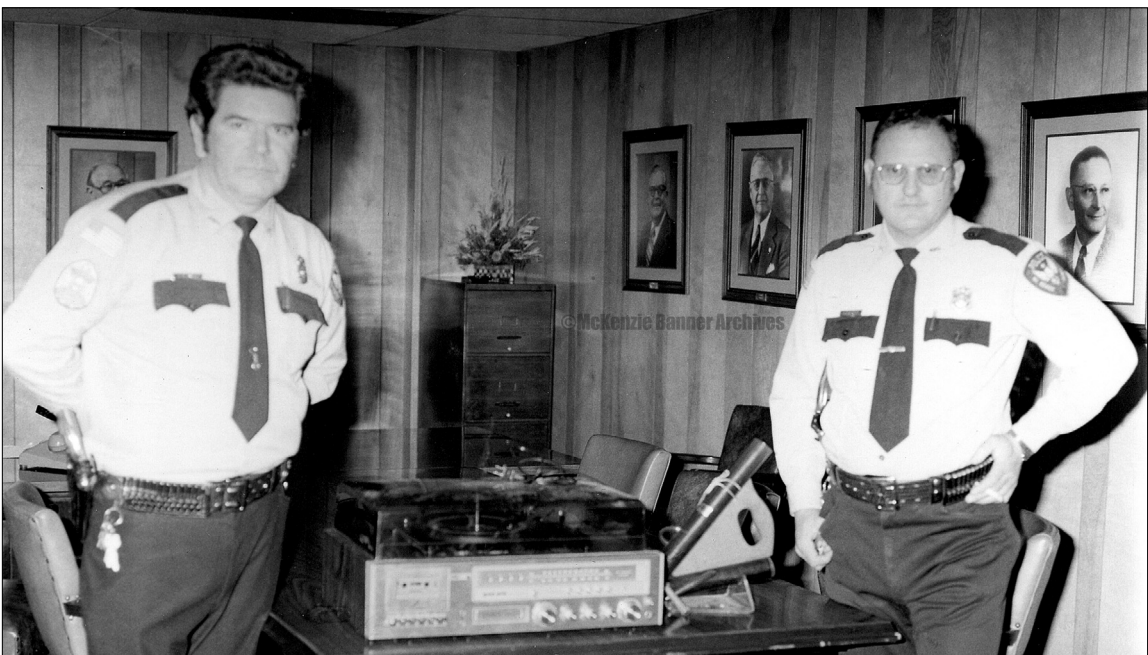

National Park Service Awards \$3.3 Million Contract For Fort Donelson Visitor Center Rehabilitation

DOVER, Tenn. (October 8) — The National Park Service has awarded a \$3.3 million contract for the extensive rehabilitation of the Visitor Center at the historic Fort Donelson National Battlefield in Dover. The rehabilitation includes an addition and upgrades to the almost 60-year-old facility to meet current accessibility standards and provide modern enhancements while still maintaining the historic character of the building's original design.

"I am incredibly pleased to announce the award of this construction contract. The park community has been extremely patient with the national battlefield as we've navigated through abandonment and default of the original project, extensive and beneficial design and engineering improvements, compliance, and of the federal funding and contracting process. We're excited that this long-awaited project is finally underway," said Superintendent Brian McCutchen.

"The rehabilitation of the visitor center is a substantial investment by the NPS to provide visitors from around the world with modern and accessible opportunities for exploration, learning and enjoyment," McCutchen said. "Additionally, the project will not only return access to what has been an important piece of the community identity since 1962, it will also greatly improve upon an already beneficial tourism des-

ination and contributor to the area economy." In 2020, visitors to Fort Donelson contributed more than \$19 million to the park's gateway region.

The construction contract was awarded to AACON General Contractors, LLC of Louisville, Kentucky, and includes construction of a multi-story steel and glass addition, a bookstore and a main-level observation area for visitors to view both outdoor activities and interior displays. The project provides accessibility enhancements compliant with Architectural Barriers Act (ABA), which are standards for Federal buildings like those found in the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Such ABA enhancements include elevator access to the building's three levels and additional accessible restrooms. The project also includes fire suppression and emergency egress, backup systems, and leading-edge environmental systems for sustainable and climate-control for the building's exhibits and interior environment, all of which the building previously lacked.

In addition, the project will restore key features of the original 1960s design, including the impressive glass-facade, allowing visitors to experience an open, bright, and expansive main interior, while also maintaining the historic appearance of the theater and other character defining features of the building. Finally, prior to opening, the mu-

seum's exhibits, networking, audio and visual projection systems and lighting will be enhanced to further provide for an exceptional visitor experience.

Finalizing of planning and logistics to begin on-site work is underway, so a firm start date is not yet available. The park's website (nps.gov/fodo) and Facebook page (@fortdonelsonnps) will be updated with project milestones, advisement of any necessary modifications to the Visitor Center parking area or of other potential temporary interruptions to current park operations.

Until the rehabilitation is complete, park guests are invited to visit the Rangers at the interim visitor center for visitor orientation, interpretation, the park bookstore, and historical exhibits. The center is located to the left of the primary facility, at 120 Fort Donelson Park Road, Dover, Tennessee, and is open daily from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. (CT), except for Thanksgiving, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day.

"Like so many that have also been waiting for this major step forward, we at Fort Donelson are excited for what is to come, returning to the public what will be principally a new, modern and accessible visitor experience, while utilizing the historic and distinctive building for future generations," McCutchen said.

It might seem odd to you but I still celebrate it. I call Paula and we cry. And we laugh. And we remember. And we thank our lucky stars.

It wasn't always easy to be his little brother, especially in the early years. I blame that on World War II. Leon was born in October of 1942. Dad left for the army a month later. His tour through basic training, amphibious landing practice and eight island invasions in the South Pacific didn't get him back home until December of 1945.

Leon should have been a couple of years older than me. It turned out to be five. That was not an unusual occurrence at the time. One of the effects of war that doesn't make the front pages...

Let me tell you, those five years made a serious difference when we were kids wrestling in the backyard. I didn't have a chance!

And with no TV, no close neighbors and not much prospects, we wrestled a lot. And boxed some; and threw a few dirt clods at each other. We'd sword fight with broom handles and straightened out bailing wire. He'd beat me every time.

He'd pin my shoulders to the braided rug in the living room and let a drop of spit slide almost out of his mouth aimed at my left eye....oh, I couldn't stand that. I'd fight with all my might but his five years of added weight and strength were more than I could budge.

Then he'd smile...and that wonderful laugh would break out all over him. He'd roll over on the rug and laugh even harder as I jumped on his head and went to flailing away at him.

He took me and our little brother to see "The Creature from the Black Lagoon" in 1954...and on the way home he slipped off and left us alone in the woods behind the swimming pool. I was scared out of my gourd. David was about to squeeze my arm off. I didn't see the smile....but my heart leaped for joy when I heard the laughter.

He threw an arm around each of us as we walked, safe now, toward the house. As he hugged us close, he went into this long dissertation on the difference between real and imaginary things.

He laughed a lot of knowledge into us back in those days. Leon was the first person

ever to place a baseball in my hand. And a football. He showed me how to hold each. And we'd toss them back and forth for as long as I wanted. For a guy always in a hurry, he could show you the patience of Job if the need arose.

He kidded me about girls and warned me not to use too much Vanilla Extract as cologne, "They will be all over you"....until he saw I'd met one I cared about. His whole demeanor changed. He sat me down on the porch and, as serious as could be, explained a bit about special relationships.

You have no idea how I idolized him.

He would mess with me a little, that was a big brother's right; but he made darn sure no one else ever did!

And he made every day of our lives an exciting adventure when hum drum was the norm. He concentrated on what we had and the unending possibilities...and he saw things nobody else could even imagine!

I met Paula when I was 13. She has truly been the sister I never had. She reminds me every year of how Leon would leave work early on Friday afternoons when I was a senior in high school. They were living in Pocahontas, Arkansas, a five-hour drive from the football field in McKenzie, Tennessee. She laughs NOW at the harrowing drive he would take them on to make the eight o'clock kick-off.

He didn't miss a game. I thought at the time it was nice of him to show up and cheer me on. I realized as the years rolled into decades, he had been cheering me on my entire life!

When I'd be leaving after a visit, for a day, or two, or a week, it didn't matter to Leon, he'd walk out by the car, give me a big hug and say loud enough for the whole world to hear "Love you like a brother!"

I don't pretend to know how life and death work. But I know Leon is more real to me this morning than he's ever been; still leading and still guiding!

And now, I can see the smile - even in the dark or from miles away - right before the laughter envelops my ears...and my heart.

She is a New York Times best-selling author of The School of Essential Ingredients, The Lost Art of Mixing, and Joy for Beginners. Peggy's book contribution in the club this year is The Scent Keeper, published in 2019. The School of Essential Ingredients is a group of interrelated stories about eight students at a cooking school whose owner, chef Lillian, dabbles in a bit of culinary witchcraft to help each one. Blend a bunch of strangers, add a pinch of romance, a dollop of culinary expertise, and see what happens.

The Lost Art of Mixing, published in 2013 is a sequel to Essential Ingredients and picks up the threads of the characters we have already met and adds some new stories to the mix. This book brings to life the adage, "be kinder than necessary, for everyone you meet is fighting some kind of battle."

Joy for Beginners, 2011, tells of Kate, a woman recovering from cancer. In a party where six of her friends are gathered to celebrate her recovery, Kate challenges them to do one thing that has always terrified them. The reader will be challenged to change the way she thinks. Many of us let the voices in our head prevent us from scaling great heights or doing things we enjoy. The book is a deep and satisfying read focusing on the celebration of life.

bration of life.

The Scent Keeper shows how scents provide some of our most potent memories, a strong sense of time and place. It might be perfume worn by someone you love, a baked treat from childhood, or the smell of the air after a rainstorm—an illustration of a life lived through embracing one of our strongest senses. The story revolves around Emmaline, a young girl who is raised by her father in a cabin on a remote island. She ultimately finds a world far beyond any she had imagined, where she can use her sense of smell professionally, and she finally feels like she belongs. But she confronts on of her father's most powerful pieces of advice: "People lie, but smells never do."

Erica Bauermeister was born in Pasadena, California in 1959, and is a graduate of Occidental College in Los Angeles. After college she moved to Seattle, married husband Ben, and received a Ph.D. in literature from the University of Washington, where she taught literature and creative writing. She and Ben have two children, a son and a daughter, and other than two years in Italy with her family. She has lived in the Pacific Northwest for four decades.

She credits her father for her gift for writing. She says of him, "...he was a brilliant man, an engineer and musician who loved me but rarely knew how to show it. Dementia made him less able to use his astonishing mind and he began to live more from his heart. I learned a lot about dignity and empathy and forgiveness being with my father as he slid into death, and in the process, it profoundly changed the book I was writing.

In a 2006 novel, the character said "Sometimes our greatest gifts grow from what we are not given." The novel was published three years after her father's death, after dementia robbed him of his beautiful brain, even as he watched. During this time she discovered that the gift her father had given her was to be a writer. She says, "I am a writer. It is a gift from my father." Although he was nowhere in the story, the book was for her father (Essential Ingredients).

West Carroll Defeats Greenfield 28-8

After losing back-to-back games heading into a bye week in Week 8, West Carroll got back in the win column on Friday with a 28-8 victory over Greenfield in Region 7-1A play. "Our No. 1 goal going into the bye was to get back in the 'W' column and do what we do best," West Carroll coach Clayton Morris said. With the win, West Carroll (6-2, 3-1 7-1A) is still in the running for the regular season region title when the War Eagles play Peabody in Week 11. "There is still a lot of unfolding to do in the region," Morris said. "There are a lot of scenarios that could play out that will have some huge implications on seeding. Greenfield isn't out. We could throw a mon-

key wrench, if we could pull off a win at Trenton." All of the scoring happened in the first half as Jay Long scored two touchdowns for West Carroll, while Xander Moon and Jayden Milton each scored once. "Moving through the back half of the schedule, it is important to show that we have more than just Xander," Morris said. "We have playmakers, and it is time for them to shoulder some of the load. I thought we did a good job spreading the ball around." With 8:07 left in the first, Moon scored from one-yard out for the 8-0 lead, but Greenfield responded with a Chandler Finch touchdown with 4:26 left to tie the game 8-8. The big play man in the game was Long as he had two pivotal plays in the second quarter to help the War Eagles pull away. Long scored on a 78-

yard touchdown run with 6:51 remaining in the half, and then he had a 37-yard interception return for a touchdown with 4:07 remaining for the 22-8 lead. Carroll County Sheriff's Reports
