Carroll County Humane Society Raises \$16,000 at Banquet

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MCKENZIE (November 10) — Members of the community again showed enormous generosity at the Carroll County Humane Society Annual Banquet held Saturday at First Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Approximately \$16,000 was raised to help improve the lives of the less fortunate animals of Carroll County.

Just over a hundred attended the event, which featured a delicious meal by Church Street Catering of Waverly, desserts by Patti Hill, a silent auction and a live auction.

Attendees bid throughout the evening on over 140 items in the silent auction.

CCHS President Caty Clark welcomed guests, and Hill delivered a blessing.

After dessert, Clark returned to the podium and thanked all of the organization's supporters. She explained that the shelter spends around \$150,000 annually to house, feed and care for the animals. The shelter took in 944 animals in 2017 and adopted out 880. Clark said that they are quickly approaching those numbers again this year.

Clark introduced the other members of the Board of Directors: Vice-President Ellen Nunner, Treasurer Lisa Langford, Secretary Laura Martin and at-large members Cindy Hess, Beverly Wilson and Brandy Nunner.

Next, the traditional video, compiled by Dr. Sarah Kidd, was shown. It featured a collection of photos and facts set to music, including animals that were adopted, the animals that sadly succumbed to health issues and injury, the many in need of serious medical attention, animals transported to the shelter's many rescue partners, the many unwanted litters and some of the animals still waiting to find their "forever homes."

Wilson then led the live auction, which included several highly-sought-after items.

The first item up for bid was a handmade quilt donated by Lucy

Christian. Her grandmother, the late Gertrude Christian, crafted the quilt 35 years ago. The granddaughter would take it home again as she came out with the high bid of \$180. Those funds were earmarked to fund flea prevention for CCHS cats.

The second item was a wooden American flag, crafted by an unnamed veteran. Ben Britton's high bid of \$125 will fund heartworm prevention for CCHS dogs.

Next, a wooden table handmade by Danny Arnold was won by Patti Hill for \$300 and a wooden Jack Daniels serving tray was won

by Lisa Langford for \$200. Funds from those two items went to the Donald Hill Memorial Spay and Neuter Fund for dogs.

Hill donated a pair of cakes to be auctioned. A German chocolate cake brought in \$45 from Margaret Hopper, and a coconut cake earned \$150 from Troyce Taylor.

The final and most sought-after item of the live auction was a pair of tickets to see the Broadway sensation "Hamilton" at the Orpheum in Memphis next July, along with a one-night stay at the Courtyard Marriot. When the dust settled, Mike and Paula Neal claimed the tickets with a bid of \$1,000. That sum is dedicated for the Martha Highfill Memorial Cat Spay and Neuter Fund.

\$1,000 raised from the sale of table centerpieces went to the Billy Gene Stafford Memorial Dog Heartworm Treatment Fund.

At the conclusion of the live auction, guests scrambled to place final bids on coveted silent auction items.

As the items were claimed and guests departed, Langford thanked them all for attending and for their generosity.

The Carroll County Humane Society is a No-Kill Animal Shelter and will not euthanize to make space, nor will they limit the amount of time an animal can stay. A 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, CCHS funding comes entirely from private contributions, bequeaths, fundraising and grants. The organization cares for approximately 250 animals at one time in the shelter and in foster homes. Its goal is to utilize adoption and spay/neuter as the community's animal population control - not euthanasia. CCHS volunteers hope to ensure that all companion animals have a warm, safe, loving home and to assist and educate the public about proper pet care, while also giving shelter to abused animals and assisting law enforcement to prosecute their abusers.

Demolition Begins on Paris Landing Inn

New Hotel to Open in 2020

Buchanan, Tenn. — Demolition of the Paris Landing Inn has begun. Workers are dismantling the building, beginning at the back with the portion of the building that faces Kentucky Lake. Workers on Saturday were working with forklifts atop a section of the Inn and demolition debris was being loaded on the ground. Fencing and barriers

were erected around the Inn over recent weeks, with a hurricane fence erected in the back of the Inn last weekend. New Park Manager Zach Tinkle told WENK/WTTPR earlier that all the furniture and other items have been removed from the facility and given to other parks in the state. The Inn is being demolished and will be replaced by a more modern, but smaller, facility. State officials estimated the new Inn will be built by 2020.

In early August, on the last Sunday the Inn was open, crowds were there to eat breakfast, lunch and dinner in the popular dining room

for the last time. Actually, people had come to the Inn for the past several days to visit "one last time." They were posting photos of themselves and their families making those last sentimental visits. A spokesperson for the Inn told WENK/WTTPR demolition the furniture and other items from the interior are being transferred to other state parks in Tennessee. The Paris Landing Inn will be demolished and replaced with a more modern, but smaller facility. The sign at the entrance to the Inn welcomes visitors yesterday with the message, "See you again in 2020."

Reggie Bigham Awaits Heart Transplant

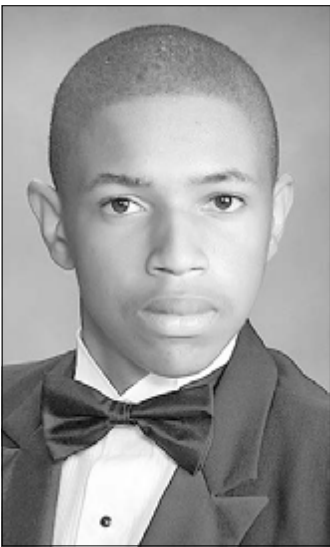

It is that time of year when we all as individuals and families think about what we are thankful for. For one Huntingdon family, there is a lot to be thankful for and hopefully a lot more to come. The mother, Regina Bigham, is thankful to still have her son with her after being told he might not even live to see his teen years much less be a young adult which he is now.

The son, Reggie Bigham, is a local 22-year old Huntingdon native and current Bethel student who has spent his entire life fighting battles related to his health primarily his heart. A 2015 Huntingdon graduate Reggie was born with heart issues and had the first of 12 open heart surgeries at just 3



months old. He has had three pacemakers, now a mechanical heart valve, and a defibrillator too.

His early surgeries were done at LeBonheur Hospital in Memphis until they got too complicated and was then

referred to St. Louis for more care and surgeries. He is now being treated at Vanderbilt Hospital where he just returned home from a 33-day stay.

Regina has had to quit her job in order to care for Reggie while they wait for a heart match. Reggie went on the heart transplant list on July 13th after his heart started holding fluid due to congenital heart failure. He is an O positive blood type which should give him a better chance of getting a match quicker since O positive is the universal blood type.

Due to his health, he was forced to withdraw from Bethel University where he has completed two years of studies and participates in the Renaissance program. They are in the process of raising funds to help with his care and currently have a gofundme account. Anyone interested in helping Reggie can contact his mother Regina at 731-358-7459.

Water Disposal Loan and Grant program to renovate the outdated wastewater treatment plant.

The renovation will include replacing equipment, facility improvements and line repairs throughout various parts of the system.

McKenzie Police Department Reports

Aggravated Assault — Ms. Cindy Howard notified police on Monday evening, November 12, that she was visiting her ex-husband at his residence on Haynes Street when Ms. Christina Donald came through the door and Howard informed her Mr. Howard wasn't feeling well and she couldn't stay. An argument occurred between the two which turned physical. Howard told police that Donald grabbed a kitchen knife off the counter and cut her left arm and then washed off the knife at the sink.

According to the police report filed by Officer Trey Boucher, Donald came to the police department later and gave her side of the story during which she told the officer she thought Howard had a gun and feared for her life which was why she grabbed the knife. Mr. Thomas Howard was interviewed and told police he witnessed part of the incident and that Ms. Donald caused the problem. Ms. Donald was charged with aggravated assault with a \$1,500 bond and transported to Carroll County Jail.

DUI — McKenzie Police were called about an individual sitting in a gray car at the Exxon gas station on Hwy 79, Sunday, November 11. The clerk told police the individual had been there several hours and was concerned about him being there.

According to the report filed by Officer Kyle Beauchamp, he and two other officers responded finding a man, later identified as Stedman Pettigrew,

passed out (asleep) sitting in the driver's seat with his seat belt on and the engine running. It took several attempts to get Pettigrew awake and then had him perform several sobriety tests which he did poorly on. A search of his vehicle turned up a plastic baggie with white residue that field tested positive for cocaine along with an open bottle of liquor.

Pettigrew was arrested and charged with DUI-First Offense and transported to Carroll County Jail.

Simple Possession/Casual Exchange — An employee of Little General contacted McKenzie Police on Sunday evening, November 18, and reported a suspicious dark-colored truck parked at the side of the building with a middle-aged white male asking if anyone needed drugs.

According to a report filed by Officer Trey Boucher, they responded and found the vehicle and driver, identified as Donald Long from Union City, a computer inquiry found that he had a warrant out of Weakley County and was immediately arrested. Long refused permission to search his truck after which Deputy Michael Krouse came and had a K9 check the truck. The dog alerted on the truck and a search did turn up a plastic bag with a substance believed to be marijuana in it. He was taken to Weakley County Jail and cited into Carroll County General Sessions Court for simple possession of a scheduled VI drug.

Vandalism — Shortly after midnight on Tuesday, November 13, McKenzie Police received a 911 call in reference to a disturbance at a Winston Avenue residence. Matthew Fourman told police that Trisha Pollock was chasing him around with a bat. He claimed she was having a mental breakdown. He told police she was trying to leave with her two children and he believed she was not in the right state of mind to do so. He indicated to police that he thought she was currently on opioids and was afraid to let her leave with the children. According to Fourman, she picked up a bat and began damaging things in the house when he refused to allow her to leave.

Pollock was placed under arrest for vandalism and transported to the Carroll County Jail. The two children were left in the care of Mr. Fourman.

Driving on Suspended License — McKenzie Police investigated a minor two-vehicle accident in the parking lot of Little General, Saturday, November 17. According to a report filed by Officer Cody Coleman, one of the drivers, Alan Rawlins of Wonder Lake, Illinois, was found to be driving on a suspended license from that state. Rawlins also could not furnish proof of insurance. He was cited into General Sessions Court for driving on a suspended license and violation of the financial responsibility law.

vice-mayor along with discussion and action on Christmas bonuses for city employees. After a brief discussion regarding the term of the potential vice-mayor which was agreed to be the same as Mayor Blaylock who will be in office until the next general election in 2020. Boardmember Pam Bryant nominated newly re-elected boardmember Pam Joyner to be vice-mayor which was unanimously approved.

Christmas bonuses were discussed and currently full-time employees get 150 dollars while part-time employees get 50 dollars. After some discussion about raising the bonuses since the city did have a little extra money available, a motion was made to increase both the full-time and part-time bonuses by \$50 dollars to \$200 for full-time employees and \$100 for part-time employees and would be paid with the first paycheck in December.

The board approved the contract from A2H, Inc. to perform the engineering work for Park Street and determine a remedy for the hazard on that street which also involves the railroad crossing.

The board also voted to allow Mr. McRae to continue making progress cleaning up his property to the city's satisfaction and make periodic reports to Kathy Edwards at City Hall rather than have to show up to board meetings. An update on the Grimes property was postponed until the next meeting. Board member

Joe Fowler gave a brief report on the city's insurance program and indicated Blue Cross Blue Shield would be their best bet and promised to have more details including numbers at the next meeting.

Teresa Goodrum updated the board on a community petition to Dollar General asking them to reconsider their recent decision not to put in the additional grocery and produce items that has been included in the makeovers done to several local stores including McKenzie. Goodrum said there were 450 signatures on the petition which went to Dollar General Corporate and was told it would be two-three months before a decision would be made.

Mayor Blaylock recommended a payraise for Tim Fullington, who has been filling in at the Water Department since Danny Connell's resignation. He currently is paid \$500 twice a month and uses his gas to drive back and forth to work and also is frequently on call. The board

unanimously approved a raise to \$750 twice a month for Fullington.

Board Member Eddie Granger brought up an issue with the board regarding the street between Dollar General and Centennial Bank being too narrow. Granger believes since it is part of the state right of way TDOT would come in and widen it and make it safer. No action was taken.

In other action, the board approved a motion to take applications for a part-time employee who can operate a backhoe and help with on-call situations during the winter months. The board also approved a recommendation to add Veterans Day to the list of city holidays. They approved motions to schedule the annual Christmas dinner for December 11 and have it catered. It was announced the annual Christmas Parade is scheduled for December 10 at 7 p.m. Line-up is at 6 pm at the elementary school parking lot.

City of Paris Receives USDA Water, Wastewater Infrastructure

PARIS — Nov. 13, 2018 — USDA Rural Development State Director Jim Tracy joined the City of Paris Mayor Carlton Gerrell today in announcing a water system improvement project totaling over \$8.2 million.

"Thanks to a change in agency regulations, we are now in a position to assist the City

of Paris in meeting its water needs," Tracy said. "This project will allow the Paris Board of Public Utilities to better serve their customers."

The city is receiving a \$7.2 million loan and a \$1 million grant through the Water and Waste Disposal Loan and Grant Program for the construction of

a new water treatment plant. The new plant will replace the outdated existing plant which was constructed in the 1950s. This project will serve all 5,060 active users and three wholesale customers of the Paris Board of Public Utilities (BPU) water system in Paris and Henry County.

and sewer system, partially paid through \$6 million in grants. Those upgrades include lagoon improvements, pump replacements, well and water tank maintenance, liftstation repairs, and the extension of utility lines. The mayor noted some of the infrastructure was installed in the 1930s.

on the commission.

Commissioner Paula Watkins asked why the resolution was returning to the commission after previously failing? She added that she wanted the county to receive some monetary value.

Commissioner Manuel Crossno said the lake is owned by the Carroll County Watershed Authority, which allows only one entry point to launch a boat or to use the lake. He said the road is a liability to the taxpayers and is no longer maintained.

Commissioner Darrell Ridgely said he could not support the gifting the road unless it contained the right to reopen the road if needed at a later date. He noted the people are "raw" about having to pay a wheel tax to support the lake.

Commissioner Jeremy Fowler questioned if the county is a liability should someone drive off the county road into the lake.

Ridgely responded the county

is no more liable than on any other county road. The county has barricades and signage indicating the road is closed. Anyone can sue for anything, said Ridgely.

Commissioner Steve Parker said he doesn't like the idea of fencing off the lake for private developers nor giving the road away.

Commissioner Gerald Scarbrough stated, "I feel the people have met their obligation on the wheel tax." The approved public referendum states 30 percent of the cost of development of the lake will be paid by local citizens through a \$10 monthly wheel tax.

The wheel tax is expected to continue to at least the year 2034, according to an estimate of time released by the Watershed Authority in the year 2016.

Walt Reaster told the commission during a previous meeting, citizens stop on the road and litter.

Natt Moore and Max Anderson were both appointed to the E911 Board. Both are longtime law enforcement officers.

A resolution to reappoint Kenny Jackson of Huntingdon as a judicial commissioner was approved. The lone other judicial commissioner, Dan Bradfield of McKenzie, declined an additional term as the other judicial commissioner representing the north end of the county.

24-year old Megan Cox, a senior commuter student from Camden, was driving a 2011 Suzuki SUV westbound on Hwy 70 when her vehicle started slipping on ice causing the rear to slide into the eastbound lane and was struck in the passenger side by a 1989 F250 pickup truck driven by 59-year old William Foster, Jr. of Hollow Rock. Foster was injured in the accident.

The other vehicle was driven by Kevin Hilt, age 38, driving a 2015 Impala sedan.

According to the Tennessee Highway Patrol report, both vehicles were northbound when Hilt struck the Jeep in the rear end, causing the Jeep to roll over. The passengers were ejected from the Jeep and the Jeep came to a final rest on top of the ejected passengers.

Neither driver was injured. The accident report does not indicate to which hospital Sheyenne Glisson was airlifted and no condition report was available.

The Blue Plate Special Really Was!

Life's lessons are not always gently taught. Or easily swallowed. And the idea that "absence makes the heart grow fonder" might work in the perfect world. But it didn't mean didley-squat sitting in the back booth of the Monteagle Diner on November 25, 1965.

Being eighteen years old and away from home didn't help either. And then you add that I'd just survived the worst three months of my life and you'd understand my heart wasn't "growing fonder," it was scattered in a million little pieces and rolling across the wooden slats that made up the flooring at the only eating place open on this Thanksgiving Day in Monteagle, Tennessee.

It all seemed different back in May. I was graduating from high school. The University of the South located all away across the state seemed like a dream place.....even romantic if one was disposed to wax eloquently on the subject. I was all grown up, had my whole life in front of me, couldn't wait to shake the dust of my little hometown off forever and take the college scene by storm.

Things didn't go right—right from the start! The University is located in Sewanee, which consisted of one café, one Texaco Station and Jip Long's small hardware store. It was an all-boy's school back in the sixties. I don't remember them telling me that in May.

They lined the freshman up at football practice and used us for tackling dummies. The professors all talked Greek to me. The formaldehyde smell in the biology lab followed you around wherever you went. And it started snowing in September.

You don't know lonely till it's chiseled into your heart on the freezing cold, windswept, fog infested Cumberland Plateau as you waddle through Paradise Lost, the writings of Sinclair Lewis and The Rise and Fall of the Roman Empire.

Nothing was open in Sewanee on Thanksgiving. I hitchhiked the eight miles to Monteagle and silently slid into the back booth. The waitress didn't bother with a menu. She set my tea down, proclaimed "turkey and dressing" to be the special and was gone before I nodded my consent.

They would be sitting down for the Thanksgiving meal about now. I could hear Pa plain as day blessing the family, life and meal in his sincere way. Aunt Ruby Nell would be talking a hundred miles an hour about everything... and nothing.

Uncle Clifford would be reporting on the weather and his Polled Herefords. Aunt Beatrice would be passing the rutabagas to Uncle Womack. Mom would be taking it all in, wearing her "all's right with the world" face.

What's that about not missing the water till the well runs dry.....

I'd never really given thanks at Thanksgiving! Mostly I complained about having to wait till the adults finished before we could eat! I'd fight with Leon or Dave over the biggest chicken leg or the last piece of pecan pie. I'd argue over what game we were going to play as soon as the cousins finished their cornbread and buttermilk.

I stared at the piping hot dressing the waitress slid in front of me. Food was the last

thing on my mind. I should have paid more attention at those Thanksgiving dinners! Listen, I had the greatest family on earth around me... how could I be complaining? I'm telling you, if Leon was to walk through the front door of the Monteagle Diner right now, he could have this whole meal. If I had another dollar and fifteen cents I'd buy him another one!

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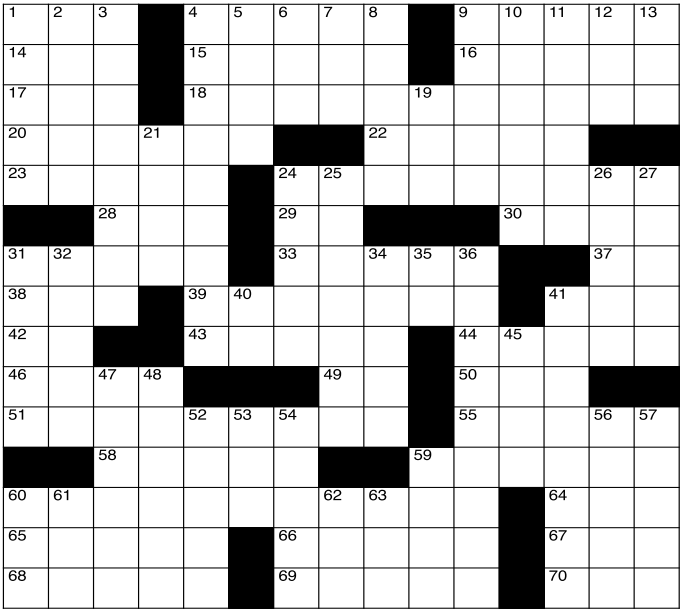

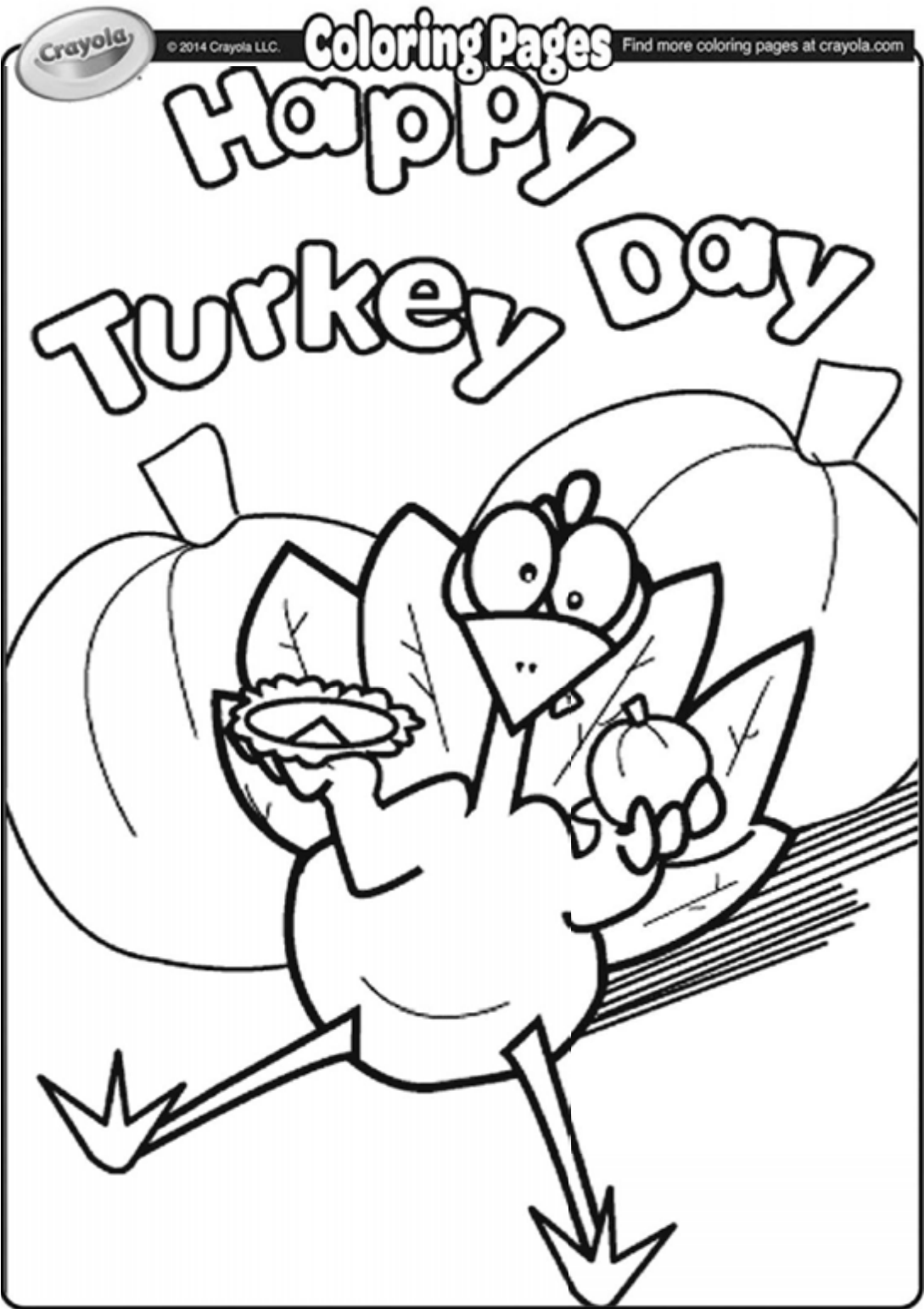

Mustangs Fall to Cornersville

HUNTINGDON (November 16) — This was a rematch game that was on Huntingdon's calendar since a 21-20 loss to Cornersville last year. This game also had similarities to a heavyweight prize fight. Both teams brought their 'A' game with the prize to advance to the semifinals of the state playoffs. The Bulldogs took over the ball just as the first quarter came to a close with no score for either team. The second quarter began much like the first quarter with Cornersville finding yards hard to get and having to punt back to the Mustangs. Huntingdon got into Bulldog territory quickly on a 19-yard Hunter Ensley to Dallas Willis pass completion but then found themselves in a fourth down and three and were swarmed for a ten-yard loss as the Bulldogs blitzed on the play.

Cornersville took over at their own 45 and on second down Cameron Whitaker got loose for 48 yards putting the Bulldogs first and goal at the Mustang 7 yard line.
