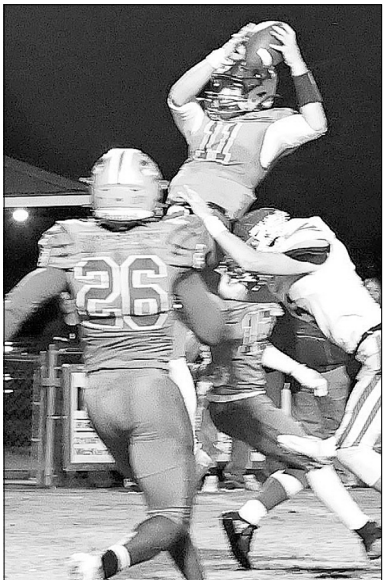
The Rebels are now 4-6 on the season while the Mustangs are 8-3.

# Rebels Blank Cornersville

Sometimes it's the offense that's key to the game. Sometimes its defense or special teams or it's a combination of two or three of them. McKenzie's defense played absolutely lights out against Cornersville tallying numerous tackles for no gain or loss and intercepting two passes. The Rebel offense fed off of the defensive play and took care of business on the scoreboard enroute to a 28-0 win over the 9-2 Bulldogs who finished second in their region this year.

Cornersville won the toss and elected to defer to the second half giving McKenzie the ball first to start the game. Etijay Tharpe took the kickoff at the Rebel 9 and got a great return to the Bulldog 41 where he almost broke it for a touchdown until a Bulldog defender got him by the jersey.

Three plays into the drive, quarterback Jackson Cassidy called his number and went 22 yards to the Cornersville 17-yard line. Marquez Taylor got the call three of the next four plays and moved the ball inside the Bulldog 10 where a bad snap cost the Rebels 11 yards. That didn't phase the Rebels as Cassidy threw a hard 15-yard touchdown pass to Taylor on the very next play. Zach Aird was good on the extra point with 6:56 left in the first quarter.

Cornersville got a dose of what they were in for the whole night as their first possession after the kickoff went three yards and were forced to punt. A McKenzie fumble on first down gave the ball right back to the Bulldogs at the Rebel 28. Cornersville was able to move the ball to the Rebel 13 before a Cornersville penalty caused a 4th down and 8 play. The Rebel D stuffed it for no gain and got the ball on downs.

The Rebels went three plays and had to punt just as the first quarter clock expired. Cornersville took over near midfield and went nowhere in three plays and punted it back to McKenzie.

Marquez Taylor ripped off a 15-yard run to open the next possession but a 15-yard penalty against McKenzie effectively killed the drive and had to punt a few plays later. Cornersville took the ball from their own 35 and lost yards on the first play. On second down, Trey Cook sacked the Bulldog quarterback for a loss back to the Bulldog 29.

A Cornersville penalty cost them more yards and they were forced to punt on a 4th and 22 play.

McKenzie got the ball in good field position at their own 41 and started a drive that mixed runs and passes effectively. The big plays during the drive were a pass completion from Cassidy to Zack Aird for 13 yards and a Cassidy run for 12 yards putting the Rebels at the Cornersville 13. Cassidy found Taylor for a 13-yard touchdown pass with 25 seconds left in the half. Aird's extra point was good for a 14-0 lead heading into halftime.

Cornersville got the ball first to start the third quarter and worked on their first sustained drive that stalled on a holding penalty against the Bulldogs. They punted back to the Rebels a few plays later.

Marquez Taylor started McKenzie's first possession of the second half with a 12-yard run from the Rebel 12. McKenzie lost six yards on the next play setting up a 3rd and long when Jackson Cassidy found an open Zach Aird for a 36-yard pass into Cornersville territory. A holding penalty against the Rebels stalled the drive and McKenzie punted and downed it at the Cornersville 10-yard line.

McKenzie got the ball back quick when Jackson Cassidy jumped high and picked off a Bulldog pass giving the Rebels the ball back at the Cornersville 20. Three plays later, Taylor had his third score of the night on a 6-yard touchdown run with 1:33 left in the third quarter. Aird hit his third extra point making it a 21-0 lead for the Rebels.

Cornersville attempted to go to the air again on their next possession. They got one pass batted down and the next pass was intercepted by Jackson Cassidy at the Bull-

dog 30. McKenzie took over the ball and got two plays off before the end of the third quarter. The Rebels started the fourth quarter keeping the ball on the ground going to Taylor three straight times for 19 yards. Two plays later, Cassidy took it himself 15 yards for a touchdown with 9:14 left in the fourth quarter. Aird was good on his fourth extra point for a 28-0 lead. The two teams swapped possessions for the remainder of the game. McKenzie had the ball at the close of the game in Cornersville territory and took a knee to run out the clock on the win.

The numbers were impressive for McKenzie on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Rebels rolled up 317 yards with 215 yards rushing and 102 passing. The McKenzie defense held Cornersville to a paltry 34 total yards offense, 18 yards rushing and 16 yards passing. One interesting stat that loomed large was McKenzie running 58 plays to Cornersville's 34.

Jackson Cassidy had another good night with 82 yards rushing on 19 carries for a touchdown and completed six of seven passes for 89 yards and two touchdowns. Marquez Taylor had 98 yards rushing on 19 carries and a touchdown and caught three passes for 37 yards and two touchdowns.

Next week, the Rebels (12-0) travel to meet the defending Class A champions Fayetteville (11-1). The trip is approximately 3 hours according to Google. There are two ways to get there. The first is to drive straight south to Adamsville where Hwy 22 crosses Hwy 64, turn left and Hwy 64 goes to Fayetteville. The easier route is take I40 to 840 which goes South and crosses I65. Go South on I65 to the Hwy 64 Exit which will take you to Fayetteville.

# West Tennessee Must Be Ready for Community Growth

JACKSON (November 10) — We are the cusp of something great, said Dr. Keith Carver, Chancellor of the University of Tennessee at Martin. He was speaking of the announcement of Ford Motor Company's Blue Oval Project to members of the WestStar alumni. Dr. Carver said the project has the potential to reshape West Tennessee.

Ford will locate in the Memphis Regional Megasite to build an all-new electric vehicle. It is Ford's first all-new production facility since the 1960s. It is expected to employ all 5,000 persons with a supplier network that will

create 30,000 jobs in the area.

Gabby Bruno, government relations manager for Ford Motor Company, said Ford cannot afford any delays in construction nor workforce development. It is imperative that the counties and communities of West Tennessee prepare for the location of the new assembly plant. After construction, the company will rely on area communities to provide the workforce. To accomplish that, communities must provide a well-educated workforce, housing and other amenities for the people. It will take a cooperative effort among the communities, said Bruno.

Brooxie Carlton, assistant commissioner of the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community

Development, said Tennessee allotted \$5 million of strategic planning for area counties and cities. Each governmental entity will have access to a regional plan of development. She said those funds, coupled with the money from the American Rescue Plan and the recently passed federal infrastructure bill should provide lots of funding for broadband, roads and bridges in the area. The Delta Regional Authority also has more funding opportunities for communities.

Bruno said the counties and cities should assure there is adequate residential units, industrial parks, healthcare, childcare and good schools. She said Ford will conduct listening sessions in the communities.

MCKENZIE (November 13) — The Bethel Wildcats closed their regular season with a record-setting day at Wildcat Stadium. The Cats beat Campbellsville 46-21 to close out at 7-4 overall and 4-3 in MSC play.

Bethel had a 487 to 299 advantage in total yards. Bethel had a balanced offensive attack with 206 yards on the ground and 281 yards in the air.

Bethel's De'Ontay Tate had 135 yards giving him 1,098 on the year. He became just the 13th Wildcat to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season.

He finished his career with 3,427 yards which is 4th all-time in Wildcat history.

Nolan Chowbay had three touchdowns in the game, giving him 30 on the year. He passed Sam Castanova who had 28 in 2018.

Chowbay finished the year with 3,232 passing yards which is the most in a single season for a Wildcat.

Before this season only one Wildcat had 1,000 receiving yards in a single season, Isaiah Hookfin.

Freshman James Dixon entered the game Saturday with 961. Dixon caught four passes for 155 yards. He finished with the year with 1,116. Dixon had 14 touchdown

same district leading to unanimous approval during the November meeting.

The legislative districts must be reapportioned every 10 years following the U.S. Census to achieve equity of population within each district. Population in a few districts in McKenzie and Huntingdon areas grew while some other lost population. The districts with population growth were downsized geographically while those with population losses were enlarged geographically to achieve equity.

The boundary lines for the three legislative districts for the Carroll County Board of Education remain unchanged from the previous redistricting 10 years earlier.

The boundary lines of the

two Highway Commission districts were change to reflect equity of population of both districts. Commissioner John Mann and Joel Washburn voted against the redistricting. Presently, the district lines reflect an equal amount of miles of rural roads for each commissioner, not population equity. Mann said the mileage equity is more important than population equity, which is reflected in the redistricting.

The Town of Atwood's request to enter an inter-local agreement with the County of Carroll to become part of the county's rural fire department was tabled after Commissioner Randy Long requested the Atwood mayor appear at a commission meeting to explain the reasoning for the move. Atwood would provide certain equipment to the county in exchange for designating the town as part of the county's fire department.

Two resolutions were

approved for a change in zoning specifications in the Carroll County Lake Zoning. The changes allow boat storage facilities and recreational storage facilities in the MR-C district (mixed residential and commercial districts). Another change allows home occupations in the zoning area.

Appointments include Dana Cobb to the E911 Board to fill the vacancy of Natt Moore, who resigned and Terry Bray to the Carroll County Library Board.

The Commission approved the 90-day emergency contract with Republic Services to collect and dispose of rural residential garbage. The county is expected to have a revenue shortfall of \$250,000 over the 90-day period because the county forgave one month of billing to rural customers coupled with the increase of expenses by Republic Services as compared to the previous contractor, Red River, that filed for bankruptcy.

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# Celebrating 200 Years

## The Story of Carroll County Part 3

I find it interesting how many institutions, colleges and preparatory schools have called Carroll County home over its 200 years of existence. Currently, Bethel College/University is the only four-year accredited institution of higher learning in Carroll County, not to take anything away from McKenzie's branch of the Tennessee College of Applied Technology.

Over the years, there have been numerous local and private schools including McTyeire College which wasn't a college but rather a preparatory feeder school. McKenzie was home to all important Webb School during segregation and the "separate but equal" period of our history.

McLemoresville couldn't be outdone with Bethel College jumping ship in 1872. When Lewis S. Mitchell came to town in 1885, he began organizing the McLemoresville Collegiate Institute. In the fall of the following year, the school was opened on the second floor of the Cumberland

Presbyterian Church.

The property that housed Bethel College was purchased and became the home of the new institution. The school was noted for having a "reputation of being one of the best schools in the country, high grade preparatory and collegiate work was done here and scores of young men and women received all the training they ever had within its historic walls and went out to battle with the problems of life."

The West Tennessee Seminary Institution, which was chartered by the Methodist Church in 1875, moved from Huntingdon to Hollow Rock finally landing in McLemoresville as part of the McLemoresville Collegiate Institute in 1887.

In 1913-1914, the old building was demolished and a new building was constructed. The Methodist Board of Education and the Methodist Episcopal Church aided in the funding of the school. The arrangement continued until 1927 when the Methodist Church withdrew the aid and public transportation for all schools in the county was established.

The institute transitioned into a public high school until 1946 when high school students were bused to the larger school at Huntingdon and Trezevant.

Then there is the Southern Normal University which transitioned into the Industrial and Training School later becoming Huntingdon High School. In 1890, a location was sought for a "well-equipped college which would draw patronage from all over the South and the West." The normal school in essence would serve mostly as a preparatory high school and a "teacher-training college" or "teachers' college".

Eventually, Huntingdon was selected as the site from a long list of locations in West Tennessee that included Paris, Jackson and Memphis. The campus sat on 12 acres of elevated land with buildings valued at \$30,000 at the time of construction (a \$1 million cost in 2021).

Opening in October 1891, the following comes from the archives of the Carroll County Democrat:

"Last Tuesday was a red-letter day in Huntingdon. It was a day that has been looked forward to with much anxiety since it has been an assured fact that the Southern Normal University would be located here. It was the occasion of the opening of that institution of learning. Its friends and everybody here are its friends, feared that the postponement of the opening from the first of September to the fifteenth of October would greatly insure it, but



it seems that those fears were not well-founded for the opening was a success.

"Tuesday morning at nine o'clock 300 students had entered the university hall and reported for matriculation. Of this number fully 100 are nonresidents of Huntingdon. Students are still coming and by Christmas, there will be between 150 and 250 boarders.

"The public exercises at the university hall were largely attended, the crowd being estimated at from 800 to 1,200 people.

By the end of October 1891, it was noted over 840 students were enrolled in the Southern Normal University.

After 11 years in operation, the school was heavy in debt and saw no way out of the red. To keep the school in Huntingdon, the town purchased the property. By 1902, the Town of Huntingdon made sure the properties were properly maintained.

In 1908, J.H. Bayer bought the properties and reopened the school as the Industrial and Training School. The school was a member of the Association of College and Preparatory Schools. The following comes from the school's 1910-1911 catalog:

"This institution is located in the town of Huntingdon, Tennessee, a beautiful town of about 2,000 inhabitants and the county seat of Carroll County. It is located on the Nashville and Chattanooga Railroad, about midway between Nashville and Memphis. Huntingdon is one of the most beautiful and cultured towns to be found anywhere. The loyal support it gives the school is excellent, a fact thoroughly verified by all students who have ever attended school here.

"The site of the Industrial and Training School is a beautiful one and receives the admiration of all who see it. The large rolling campus, with its beautiful shade trees in front and handsome imposing structure in the distance, presents a picturesque that is within itself an inspiration.

"The school is on the eastern border of the town and may be reached from the depot going one block north on Harrison Avenue (now Thomas Park on East Main Street)...

"The term 'industrial' conveys the idea of work — physical as well as mental. At present, the industrial features are limited to those that are practical

and directly beneficial to the school. Labor is dignified. The trained hand and the willing heart, as well as the educated mind, are respected. These would go hand in hand."

In 1918, J.H. Bayer left the school. Instead of shuttering the facility it became Huntingdon High School. John Hendrickson was the first superintendent from 1918-1919 followed by Dr. D.W. Moody from 1919-1938. The buildings remained in use before being declared condemned and forcing construction of a new school in 1935.

West Carroll quarterback Xander Moon missed half of the second quarter and the third quarter after taking a hard hit, but he did come back in the fourth quarter.

"I think this season, we exceeded expectations," Morris said. "We didn't have an offseason, so credit the kids. The kids stuck together. The kids battled. Moving forward, the seniors laid a good foundation, and we know what to expect. I am really excited about the future of the program."

West Carroll graduates six seniors, including Moon and three starting linemen in Wyatt Hays, Hayden Hilliard and Hunter Lindsey.

## Huntingdon Mustang Football Season Ends in Nail Biter

MEMPHIS (November 12) — The Huntingdon Mustangs bowed out of the TS-SAA Playoffs Friday night after facing the Tigers of Memphis Academy of Health Sciences (10-1) in an 8-7 nail biter. The Mustangs struggled to move the ball against the highly athletic Memphis team who allowed only 64 points in 11 games.

Huntingdon won the coin toss and deferred to the second half. MAHS was able to move the ball to midfield and were in four-down territory before Ashton Hutcherson picked off Demetrius Visor's pass.
