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Mills Pleads Guilty in Carroll County Murder

Jason Mark Mills, 34, of Camden pled guilty to 2nd Degree Murder in the February 2020 death of his estranged wife, Ryan Bennett Mills, of Bruceton. He has been sentenced to 36 years in prison where he will serve 100 percent of the sentence except for time

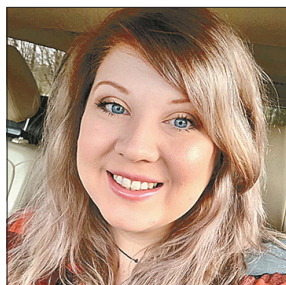
served between February 2020 and November 22, 2021 in the Carroll County Jail.

The case began shortly after midnight on February 8, 2020 when first responders were called to a house fire on Spruce Street in Bruceton. The body of Ryan Bennett Mills, mother

Dresden Devastated by Tornado

A multi-state tornado Friday night left much destruction in its path, totally destroying some areas and leaving widespread damage in others.

In Carroll County, the damage was limited to a barn destroyed, the roof ripped off Bobo's driving range building on State Route 22, McKenzie and trees down along with a power outage. Carroll County Sheriff Andy Dickson said Carroll County was fortunate to have minimal damage

compared to all the surrounding counties.

Nearby Dresden sustained heavy damage in downtown and the adjacent areas.

Other geographic regions, such as Mayfield, Kentucky, sustained loss of life and mass destruction within the city.

Totally destroyed or heavily damaged were: Kountry Korner on State Route 22, Dresden 4x4, Vaughn Brothers Hardware, Poppi's Pizzeria, all the buildings on the City Hall-side of the Court Square, Dresden Enterprise, Woodmen of the World,

Dresden Cumberland Presbyterian Church, United Methodist Church, Delta Imaging, Anderson Eye Care, Hometown Healthcare, Weakley County Election Commission, plus numerous houses in the downtown area. In total, approximately 100 structures were damaged.

Mayor Jeff Washburn was in his downtown Dresden home during the tornado. He and his family were in the basement when the tornado hit his home, damaging it beyond

Air Conditioning in Two Gymnasiums Begins Soon

McKENZIE (December 7) — The installation of air conditioning in the gymnasiums at the elementary and middle schools' gymnasiums. Federal funding, known as ESSER, provides the needed funds to install the heating and cooling units at the two schools. The announcement came during the December meeting of the McKenzie

Board of Education.

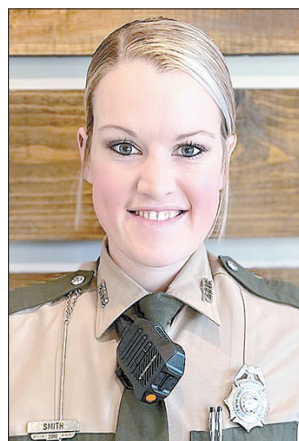
The McKenzie Middle School gymnasium was constructed in the early 1950s and was initially heated by boilers. The unused boiler room is being repurposed to house the heating and cooling units. The ventilation ducts will be run through the current fan vents.

The McKenzie Elementary School was first built in the 1960s as McKenzie Junior High. The gym was built as a combination gymnasium and

cafeteria. Lynn Watkins, director of schools, said the heating and air units have been ordered for installation soon after arrival.

In other business, the board approved the 2022-23 academic calendar. All five of the county's special school districts and the Carroll County Technical Center utilize the same schedule.

Brenna Smith is Trooper of Year

BELL BUCKLE, Tenn. (December 1) — Trooper Brenna Smith was named Trooper of the Year for District 3 of the Tennessee Highway Patrol. The McKenzie High School graduate was honored during a ceremony in Bell Buckle Tennessee on December 1. Brenna was also honored in a separate ceremony in Nashville on December 8 by Mothers Against Drunk Drivers. Brenna was credited for removing 26 impaired drivers from the roadways in the year 2020.

In the Trooper of the Year ceremony, Smith was touted as a dedicated professional law enforcement officer with several years of experience in public safety and law enforcement. Trooper Smith is one of the leaders

McKenzie Looks At Vehicle Lease Program

McKENZIE (December 9) — Two meetings were held at McKenzie city hall. The first was a workshop presented by Mary Elizabeth Roe, an account executive at Enterprise Fleet Management about leasing city vehicles. Leasing city vehicles through Enterprise could save McKenzie over \$200,000 over the course of the next 10 years. Enterprise stated dealing with the new 2021 vehicle market can be tricky when attempting to get vehicles for the right price. Roe informed the City on ways to become more structured when it comes time to replace vehicles.

The city currently has 35 vehicles which 28 of those are older than 10 years. Enterprise's plan would allow the city to get 22 new vehicles within the next 3 years when it would normally take the city about 23 years to receive all new vehicles.

The regular monthly meeting of the City of McKenzie Board of Mayor and Council followed. There was discussion and approval over employee Christmas bonus of \$100. The bonus is for full-time employees and is part of this year's budget.

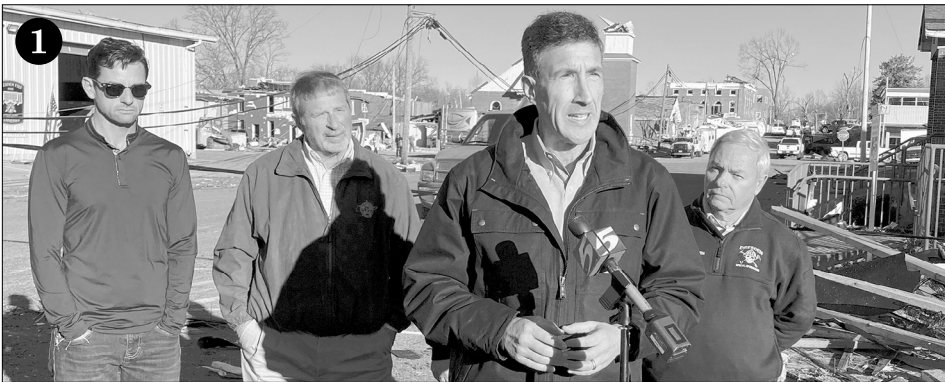

repair. He resides across the street from the fire station, which was heavily damaged during the tornado. Firefighters had earlier removed the fire trucks and staged those around town for quick response in case of heavy losses. That move proved to be brilliant as the fire station was totaled.

Dresden Police Officer Bryan Chandler, a McKenzie native, was in City Hall when the tornado ripped through the building and the roof was ripped from the structure. His family safely moved to the basement while he remained on the main floor of the building. A timber struck him in the head. He was transported to the hospital for outpatient treatment. Chandler said he told the doctor he had to get back to Dresden to help others.

On Sunday, the downtown was filled with the sound of chainsaws and heavy equipment clearing the roadways. Blue tarps were being stretched over roofs in anticipation of rains later this week.

Washburn praised the city and county first responders and area agencies for their assistance on Friday night. They were quick to respond and begin a door-to-door search. He said dump trucks and roll-off dumpsters were to arrive Monday to help with debris removal. The city hall will temporarily relocate and post contact information online.

Washburn announced a curfew for the city of Dresden in effect from dusk until dawn until further notice.

Dresden City Hall temporarily relocated to the McWherter Civic Center. The Dresden Mayor and Council will meet there Thursday, 6 p.m. to discuss what to do concerning the City Hall and Fire Station.

Henry County Emergency Management Director Ron Watkins stated, "The national weather service indicated Sunday afternoon the damage in Henry County was caused by an EF3 tornado with wind speed estimated between 136 and 165 mph. Five persons were treated for injuries at Henry County Medical Center. Two

persons were transported emergency by Henry County AMR EMS from Elkins Road just north of Hwy 140 and Shady Grove Road when their home was destroyed by the tornado. Both persons were home when it hit. Sixteen homes were destroyed with another four with heavy damage. Forty-three houses were listed as light to moderate damage ranging from shingles and siding to some part of roof decking missing.

The Tennessee State Emergency Operations Center is operational today with State of Tennessee personnel supporting response efforts and resource requests in areas impacted from the severe weather and tornadoes Friday and Saturday.

The State of Tennessee remains in a State of Emergency as local and state officials begin and continue the damage assessment process in approximately 20 affected counties.

Tennessee had four, weather-related fatalities: two fatalities in Lake County; one fatality in Obion County; and one fatality in Shelby County.

The Crisis Cleanup Line, 800-451-1954, is active and accepting calls from Tennesseans in the storm damaged counties who need volunteer assistance with cleaning up from the storms.

The National Weather Service will continue its field surveys today in Tennessee, in Burns (Dickson County), Stewart County, Nashville (Davidson County), Mt. Juliet (Wilson County), Hendersonville (Sumner County), and Smith County today.

NWS teams yesterday and today confirmed six tornado touchdowns in Tennessee:

Perry County to Bucksnort in Hickman County, EF-1, 100 mph winds, 250 yards wide, 12.2 miles long.

Hickman County at I-40, EF-0, 85 mph winds, 100 yards wide, 4.66 miles long.

Dickson County, EF-2, 135 mph winds, 500 yards wide, 8.34 miles long.

Dickson County in Burns, EF-1, 110 mph winds, 175 yards wide, 5.3 miles long.

Cheatham County in Kingston Springs, EF-2, 125 mph winds, 400 yards wide, 10.5 miles long.

Davidson County at Percy Priest Lake to Mt. Juliet in Wilson County, EF-1, 105 mph winds, 100 yards wide

7.6 miles long.

Local jurisdictions will continue damage surveys in the affected counties today with TEMA personnel assisting officials with their assessments and to help ensure all life-safety needs are met. There are no preliminary damage numbers to report currently.

Boil water advisories remain in place in Dresden, Kenton, and Samberg due to impacts to water systems.

Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee is requesting federal emergency assistance today for nine counties impacted in the tornado outbreak that began in the state the evening of Friday, December 10, 2021, and would eventually claim four lives when it was finally over on Saturday, December 11.

"Our emergency officials, first responders, and law enforcement brought hope where there was none in the aftermath of these storms," Gov. Lee said. "Our effort now will be to bring as much relief as possible to these devastated communities."

Gov. Lee is asking President Joe Biden for an emergency declaration to make federal assistance available to Cheatham, Decatur, Dickson, Dyer, Gibson, Lake, Obion, Stewart, and Weakley counties for debris removal and emergency protective measures.

If the emergency declaration is granted, the Federal Emergency Management Agency will reimburse jurisdictions for eligible work or provide direct operational assistance.

Gov. Lee indicates Tennessee will seek a Major Disaster Declaration for qualifying jurisdictions after local officials are able to complete a thorough assessment of storm damage to make FEMA's Public Assistance and Individual Assistance programs available to the declared counties that qualify for federal help.

Tennessee experienced two lines of severe weather beginning Friday evening and into Saturday morning as a mass of warm, unstable air moved across the state. The storms produced at least seven tornadoes across west and middle Tennessee, claimed four lives in the state, and left more than 150,000 people without power at the severe weather's peak.

During her tenure, Brenna had the privilege of attending training at the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) in Quantico,

Virginia, annual Tennessee State DARE Training Conferences, as well as International DARE Training Conferences in Atlanta, Georgia, Cincinnati, Ohio, Grapevine, Texas, and New Orleans, Louisiana. She served as the webmaster for the Tennessee DARE Officers Association website and was a writer for Teens Ask Teens, a blog sponsored by DEA in conjunction with DARE America. She was the keynote speaker each year at DARE graduations across the state. During her senior year, Brenna attended the National Narcotic Detector Dog Training Conference held in Paris Landing, Tenn. She participated in Scholastic Shooting Sports, where she was the 2015 Female Rim Fire State Champion. Brenna graduated with honors from McKenzie High School in 2015.

Brenna attended Middle Tennessee State University (MTSU) in Murfreesboro. During her first semester, she participated in and graduated from the Murfreesboro Police Department's Citizens Police Academy. During her senior year at MTSU, Brenna completed internships at both the Murfreesboro Police Department and the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) in Nashville. She was hired by the TBI where she worked as an administrative assistant in the Sex Offender Registry Division. Brenna graduated with honors from MTSU in May, 2018. She holds a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice Administration and a minor in Leadership Studies.

With graduation behind her, Brenna's next goal was the Tennessee Highway Patrol Trooper Academy. She applied on her 21st birthday and was accepted after a lengthy application process. After a 20-week rigorous and intensive training program, Brenna graduated from the THP Trooper Academy on December 14, 2018.

She is the daughter of Larry and Kim Smith of McKenzie.

Classes begin August 2 with one-half day. The first semester includes holidays on September 5, October 10-14, November 23-25, and December 19 through 30. The second semester begins Tuesday, January 3, 2023, with holidays on Monday, January 16, Monday, February 20, March 13-17 (Spring Break), and April 7. The school year ends Friday, May 19.

Watkins announced the Tennessee Department of Education approved the local district's spending plan for the \$2,500,000 ESSER 3.0 federal appropriation for the district. The local board approved the allocation in

August and submitted it for state approval. It includes \$1,056,700 to address learning loss. \$899,393 for facilities repairs, including new HVAC for MMS, and other HVAC units, MMS dressing room remodel, new restroom stalls, additional full-time maintenance person, staff bonuses, six-person driver's education van, building upgrades, MHS STEM lab, MHS theatre projector, additional speech/language pathologist at MES, sensory room for MES, new tables, chairs, easels, additional teacher training, and other items.

The board approved a pay raise for substitution teachers to a new rate of \$75 daily.

The board also praised the MHS Football Team for earning runners-up in the state championship and to

the MMS Lady Rebels for earning the title of county champions.

Watkins announced the hiring of additional non-licensed personnel.

Michael Pershell, Middle School Education Assistant; Katey Holder, Elementary School Education Assistant; Misty Moon, MES Cafeteria; Kayla Lassiter, MHS Cafeteria.

Additional substitute teachers include: Dean Brush, Charlene Gilbert, Melissa Harris, Amy Hollowell, Tim McBride, Kathryn McDonald, Jordyn Mil-sap, Jonathan Moore, and Janice Neary.

Two educational assistants resigned, Jessica Chandler and Valerie Blyler-Gurley.

The next meeting of the board is February 1, 2022.

of two children, was found and other authorities including District 24 District Attorney's Office and TBI

Special Agents were alerted and assisted with the investigation. Information and evidence developed identified Jason Mills as the individual responsible for the death of the victim. He was arrested shortly after and held without bond. Mills was initially

charged and indicted for First Degree Murder, Aggravated Arson, Tampering With Evidence, and Abuse of a Corpse. The plea agreement changed the murder charge to Second Degree Murder and dropped the other charges.

Dixie Carter

McLey's Southern Belle

Over Carroll County's 200 years of existence, we have been fortunate enough to have a few locals make it to the national stage, most have been athletes. Yet, the most noted and probably admired has to be the late Dixie Carter. She was a southern lady to her core and never forgot the roots of her raising no matter how big of a name she made on Broadway or in Hollywood. While I never had the privilege to meet Dixie in person, I did meet her husband Hal Holbrook on more than one occasion. To know one, was to know the other.

After Dixie's death, I had the opportunity to listen to Holbrook speak to students in Carroll County about the importance of living in the present and showing gratitude to those in their lives. As he went on, Holbrook told of his love and appreciation for Dixie, and how they loved their home

in Carroll County. His eyes would fill with tears at the mere mention of her name as he missed the love of his life, his Dixie.

This edition of the Weekly 150 is dedicated to the memory of Dixie Carter and Hal Holbrook.

Dixie Virginia Carter was born May 25, 1939, in McMormoreville, Tennessee to Esther Virginia Hillsman (1909-1988) and Halbert Leroy Carter (1910-2007). Dixie's father was a well-respected store owner in Carroll County. The original store, Harvey and Carter, sold groceries, dry goods, and hardware. Later it became H.L. Carter (Horace Leroy Carter) and Son.

Hal and his father expanded their business to several stores around West Tennessee. With the conclusion of World War II and returning stateside, he reconfigured his Huntingdon store and created a self-service department store, with the newly renovated Ben Franklin Variety Store in the basement. In 1950, Carter moved the

family to Huntingdon.

Dixie graduated valedictorian from Huntingdon High School in 1957 and enrolled at Memphis State. She went on to graduate from Memphis and in 1959 competed in the Miss Tennessee pageant, where she placed first runner up. It was in Memphis where she began her acting career taking the stage in a production of *Carousel*. It wasn't long before Dixie moved to New York City to further her career in singing and acting. In 1963, she earned a role in a production of Shakespeare's *The Winter's Tale*.

In 1967, Dixie married Arthur Carter and they had two daughters, Ginna and Mary Dixie. She began an eight-year hiatus from acting, to focus on raising two daughters.

In 1974, she returned to acting taking various roles in soap operas that included *One Life to Live*, *The Edge of Night* and *The Doctors*. She was awarded the Theater World Award in 1976 for *Jesse and The Bandit Queen*. The following year, Carter decided to make some changes to her life and career. She divorced Arthur and moved to Los Angeles to pursue prime-time television roles.

Dixie quickly found work as she appeared as a regular in series such as *Out of the Blue*, *On Our Own*, *Diff'rent Strokes*, *The Greatest American Hero* and as Carlotta Beck (a stuck-up and conniving socialite) on *Filthy Rich*. It was during this time, she was married to George Hearn (m. 1977-1979).

She was married a third time on May 27, 1984, Hal Holbrook. She and Holbrook met on the set of the TV movie *The Killing of Randy Webster* in 1980. Holbrook talked Dixie into riding on the back of his motorcycle. According to her, it was the first and last time.

Dixie's work on *Filthy Rich* led to her earning the role of Julia Sugarbaker in *Designing Women*. Linda Bloodworth Thomason, who created *Filthy Rich* and *Designing Women*, wanted to build a show around Dixie and a fellow cast member Delta Burke. Holbrook had a recurring role as attorney Reese Watson on *Designing Women* and her daughters had guest star roles as Julia Sugarbaker's nieces Jennifer and Camilla in the episode "The Naked Truth" in 1989.

Over the years, Dixie maintained her love for the stage starring in several Broadway musicals and plays while still appearing on television. From 1999-2002, she portrayed Randi King in the legal drama *Family Law*. In 2004, she made a guest appearance on *Law & Order: Special Victims Unit*, playing a defense attorney named Denise Brockmorton in the episode called "Home", in which she defended the paranoid mother of two children (Diane Venora) who had manipulated her older son to kill the younger son after breaking her home rules.

In 2006, Carter found a resurgence in her career portraying Gloria Hodge, a disturbed and scheming mother-in-law on *Desperate Housewives*. Her final film was *That Evening Sun*, which she filmed with her husband in East Tennessee in summer 2008. Holbrook modeled his role after Dixie's father.

Dixie and Hal made their home in Beverly Hills and spent time at her birth home in McMormoreville. The couple shared their homes with Dixie's dad until his death in 2007. They considered the McMormoreville home as their refuge.

They made it a point to visit McMormoreville on July 4, the Cotton Festival in October and at Christmas. Hal was remembered as loving the little children and the people of the community. It wasn't uncommon during the July 4 downtown cakewalk to see Hal in line and trying to win a cake. Many Carroll Countians have various stories of seeing and talking to Holbrook at Younger's Grocery (Hometown Grocery) and shopping at Walmart.

"When they were home, people did not bother them," said McMormoreville Mayor Phil Williams. Each year at Christmas, the family sent poinsettias and lilies to the First United Methodist Church of McMormoreville. When they were home, they attended church there. Occasionally, Dixie would sing.

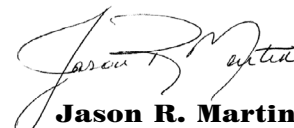
They had staff members (Bill Hargrove, Janice Vinson, Joyce Cole and Allison Coleman) who cared for them when in town and for the home when they were away.

As a tribute to Dixie, in December 1999, Huntingdon Mayor Dale Kelley (high

school classmate of Dixie) unveiled plans for The Dixie Carter Performing Arts and Academic Enrichment Center, which was to be located on the Court Square in Huntingdon. In 2005, the dream was realized as the center was opened with the theatre named in Holbrook's honor. Holbrook was an active part in overseeing the development of the theatre, providing his insight on the design of the stage, lights, and sound system. The building also houses The Dixie Carter and Hal Holbrook Museum.

On April 10, 2010, Dixie died of complications from endometrial cancer and was laid to rest at McMormoreville Cemetery alongside her mother and father. On January 23, 2021, Hal died and interred next to his Dixie.

Dixie and Hal will always be remembered for their love of children as they helped support "The Dixie" by providing guest appearances and performances.

I don't want to mention any names here. So as not to "throw off" on any one person, place, time or thing. This is just another generic Christmas story... that might or might not have taken place. And it might or might not have adjusted my whole thinking about gift getting and giving...

Billie Jean looked me right in the eye—we were standing on her front porch on East Paris Street in downtown Huntingdon, Tennessee, just after returning from the Court Theatre where we had seen Elizabeth Taylor in "Cleopatra"—and said, "I want you to buy me a Scarab Bracelet for Christmas."

Many thoughts raced through my mind as I stood there, foremost of which was, what is a Scarab Bracelet? And did Queen Cleopatra have one on in this movie? Where do you get such a thing? And was it too far down in December to order one from the Sears and Roebuck Catalogue?

This was 1963. We were both sixteen. And I don't remember if we were going steady. But we had been "seeing" each other for a few months. And for sure this was the first December that I had a real girlfriend.

My Christmas gift giving up to this time had been limited to a pocket knife of some kind for David Mark and the latest, and hottest, Doo-Wop record for Leon. I'd never thought about a gift for a perfect stranger...now, Billie Jean and I were not exactly unacquainted, but you know what I mean...

I still remember the premonition "that my Christmas shopping might have gotten a lot more complicated" overwhelming me as I backed off her porch and headed to the car. Boy howdy!

Mother pointed me towards Pate's Jewelry. It was right uptown beside Wrinkle's Hardware but I'd never been inside. Mrs. Pate was very polite. And she knew what I was talking about. She just didn't have a Scarab Bracelet in stock and she couldn't get one before Christmas.

I wondered if Billie Jean would be just as satisfied with a Doo-Wop record.

I ended up in Paris at Moon's Jewelry. I drove 20 miles to look for a Christmas gift I'd never heard of. Or seen! Or cared anything about! This was big time Christmas shopping for me.

The first thing I saw was the price tag. \$26, plus tax! You've got to be kid-

ding me! Did some little Scarabs give their lives for this thing? It looked like different colored lady bugs trapped in a 14 karat gold chain. When the clerk dropped the curved stones with small ridges cut across the top in my hand, it felt like I was holding a bale of miniature turtle shells.

Twenty-six bucks was more than I had spent on ten years' worth of knives and Doo-Wop songs! I didn't have enough cash for a down payment or enough time for the installment plan.

I can guarantee you I didn't leave there singing, "Deck the halls with boughs of holly..."

Dad came through with the money. Which was, and is to this day, a big deal to me. As a matter of fact, I have remembered his help, when money was kinda scarce around our house, way longer than I remembered anything else about that Christmas.

I proudly gave Billie Jean her gift a week and a half later as we sat in the swing on that same front porch. She looked very pleased, but not necessarily surprised. She gave me a bottle of Russian Leather cologne. I smelled like some KGB agent after an all-night stakeout in an underground sweat lodge

in Vladivostok.

The irony did not escape me. I bought her a gift that SHE liked. And she bought me a gift that SHE liked. It was enough to make you want to choke Rudolph.

You live and learn. And Billie Jean, bless her sweet heart, truly taught me a valuable yuletide lesson. The next year I was dating the banker's daughter from Gleason. We had spent the summer and fall almost inseparable—until the second week of December. I broke up with her.

The only Christmas gifts I had to worry about that year were Case knives and Ben E. King records.

As a matter of curiosity I checked this morning on vintage Scarab Bracelet sales on eBay. There is one from the early 60's that is the spitting image of the bracelet I bought over at Moon's Jewelry that long ago December. It had the same seven turtle shaped colors and a 14 karat gold chain. They were asking \$675 for it!

In retrospect, I should have bought a half dozen of those things and put them in a safe place...and given Billie Jean a bottle of Russian Leather...

She was the office manager for Carroll Insurance in McKenzie, Tenn., since 2006.

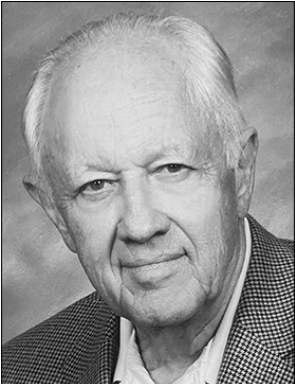
Jennifer was born February 24, 1972, to the late Mike Atchison and Betty Smith Atchison, who survives, of Paris.

JAMES 'JIM' CANNON BURNS, JR. 1921 — 2021

JACKSONVILLE — James Cannon Burns, Jr., was born at home, upstairs and across from the south side of the Methodist Church in McKenzie, Tenn. on May 24, 1921, to the late James Cannon Burns and Mary Bobo Burns. Jim died peacefully on December 1, 2021, at the Penney Retirement Community, outside Jacksonville, Florida. Jim was 100 years of age.

Jim was predeceased by his loving wife, Mildred "Mena" Anderson Burns, who recently died November 17, 2021. Jim and Mena had been married for over 70 years. Jim is survived by his sister, Betty Burns Raffield McCarty, and his children, Linda Burns Bayles (Brad), Bob Anderson Burns (Cathy), Ben Anderson Burns (Christina), Kent Anderson Burns (Susan) and Mary Anderson Burns Murray (Jack); his beloved grandchildren, Amanda Burns Cody (William); James Anderson Bayles; Taylor McKenzie Bayles, Benjamin Burns Bayles, Cannon Anderson Burns, Kendall Elizabeth Burns, Morgan Magdalene Burns, Anderson William Burns; Mary Jordan Anderson Burns, Virginia Anderson Burns; Ashton Burns Murray Tingas (Arthur), James Kirtis Murray, IV (Emma), Kaitlin Sandra Murray, and Cody Madison Murray; and his extended family of nieces and nephews.

Jim was a member of the Methodist Church in Shelbyville, Tenn. until he moved to Orange Park, Florida in 1998. Thereafter, he was a Presbyterian in the winter when he was in the Jacksonville Florida area, and was a Methodist in the summer when he was in the mountains of North Carolina. Jim taught Sunday school for over 30 years.

Jim attended all years of high school at Dickson County High School in Dickson, Tenn., where he was president of his senior class and valedictorian. Jim attended Vanderbilt University starting on September 1, 1939, the day after Hitler went into Poland. He graduated three years and four months later in December 1942. Jim was a member of Alpha Tau Omega social fraternity and Omicron Delta Kappa, a men's honor fraternity. Jim was vice president of his ATO chapter, co-manager of the baseball team and business manager of the school yearbook. Jim

won the Founder's Medal in Oratory at Vanderbilt.

Jim volunteered for the Army and was called to active duty on January 26, 1943. He was in World War II for three and a half years. He received his commission in the Army Air Corps at Yale University in October 1944, and went overseas to Tinian Island in 1945. He served there and in the Philippines until the summer of 1946. Jim was recalled to active duty on April 1, 1951, during the Korean War and served 18 months.

Jim graduated from Vanderbilt Law School in August 1948, after having passed the Tennessee Bar Examination in February of 1948. Jim practiced law in Shelbyville, Tennessee, from August 1948, until being recalled to active duty as an electronics engineer in April 1951.

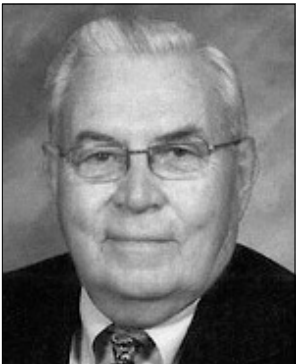
Jim married his wife, Mena on June 16, 1951, in Jacksonville Florida, having courted her by auto and train from October 1950. Jim and Mena lived, and he practiced law, in Memphis for three years after Jim finished his Korean War service. They moved back to Shelbyville in the fall of 1955 and Jim began law practice for the third time. Jim practiced law in Shelbyville until October, 1998, when he and Mena moved to Florida.

While Jim lived in Shelbyville, he was a member of the Jaycees of which he was president of the local club and was Tennessee vice president. Jim was also a Rotarian for more than 30 years and was local president in 1966-67.

Jim was in various businesses in Tennessee, Alabama, and Florida from 1957 through 1997, and was engaged in farming in a cow/calf operation from 1961 through 1997. After disposing of his businesses and farming interests, Jim was primarily engaged in the apartment ownership and rental business in Nashville, Tenn., Jacksonville, Johnson City, Tenn. and St Augustine, Florida.

Jim was always close to his relatives on both sides of his family and felt he was blessed to be buried next to his great grandparents in McKenzie who had moved to West Tennessee in 1820 and 1832 respectively. West Tennessee was open for settlement after Andrew Jackson entered a treaty with the Indians in 1820, whereby the Indians were removed from West Tennessee to the West. In that year, Jim's great grandmother, Margaret Patton Burns, moved to Carroll County (which was made a County in 1821). Jim's grandfather, J. T. Burns, moved to McKenzie in 1875, and entered the mercantile business under the name of the Moore and Burns Company, which business operated until around 1929. His other grandfather, Foster Bobo, Jr., was in a similar competing business in McKenzie from around 1900 until around 1931. Jim and his parents moved to Nashville in 1934, and then to Dickson, Tenn. in 1935, and then back to Nashville in 1940. Jim and Mena spent their later years in a retirement community in Penney Farms Florida, just South of Jacksonville. The family especially thanks the caregivers at Penney Retirement Community for

their care and love of Jim over the years. A private graveside service will be held by the family at Mt. Olivet Cemetery, McKenzie. It's been said in other stories about what a year 2021 was for the McKenzie Rebels football team and it certainly was. We're going to take a look at broken records and superlatives that were set this year.

First of all, a big salute to Coach Wade Comer as he starts approaching the 200-win mark with a record of 181 wins and 88 losses in 22 seasons as Head Coach here in McKenzie.

SUPERLATIVES

Most Points Scored in a Season (A) – 637 – previous was 571.

Best Record in a Single Season (A) – 14-1 – previous was 13-2 (2007)

Tied the Best Home Record in a Single Season (A)

– 9-0 previous was 9-0 (2007)

Most Points in a Game (McKenzie) Class A or AA – 72 points – previous was 69.

RECORDS

Single Game Rushing Yards: Marquez Taylor is second with 18 carries for 220 yards in a 40-14 win over Obion County. The record holder is Sherman Nolen with 221 yards in a game.

Single Game Rushing Touchdowns: Marquez Taylor is tied for first with five touchdowns in a 57-16 win over Gleason. Taylor is tied with Punk Akers who set the record in 1947 with five touchdowns in a 41-0 win over Gleason.

Single Game Passing Yards: Jackson Cassidy is top 15 with a 202-yard performance in the 24-21 loss to South Pittsburg. The record holder is Drew Hayes with 528 yards in a win over Lake County.

Single Season Rushing: Marquez Taylor is second with 193 carries for 1676 yards and 33 touchdowns.

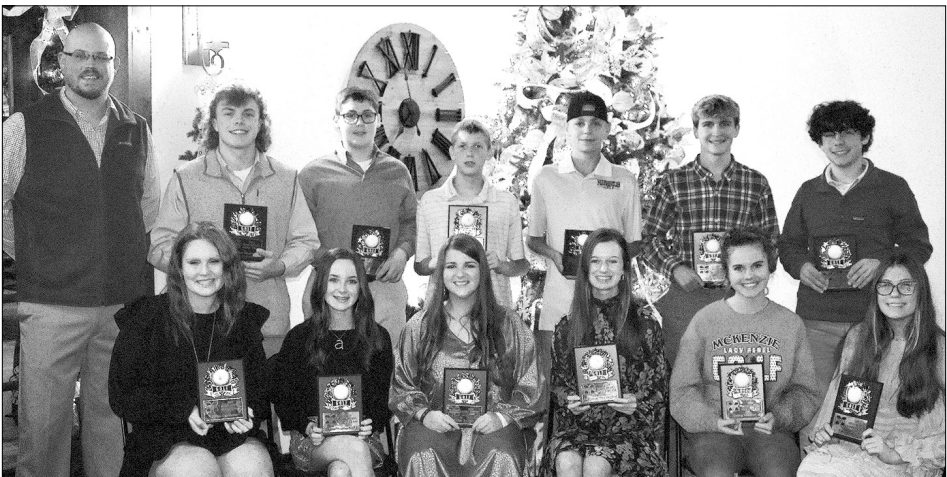
The record holder is Cody Cook with 318 carries for 1697 yards and 15 touchdowns.

Single Season Scoring: Marquez Taylor broke this record with 252 points. The previous record holder was Drew Hayes with 232 points set in 2005.

Single Season Kicking: Zach Aird broke the record hitting 76 of 81 extra points and was 5-5 on field goals for a total of 91 points. The previous record holder was Harris Laughery in 2007 hitting 67 of 72 extra points and 5-7 field goals for 82 points.

One defensive stat of note is Jackson Cassidy is tied for fourth in single season interceptions with five for the season.

These are just the records and superlatives that have been confirmed. There might be others that aren't confirmed yet along with individual honors that will be coming for members of the 2021 Rebels.

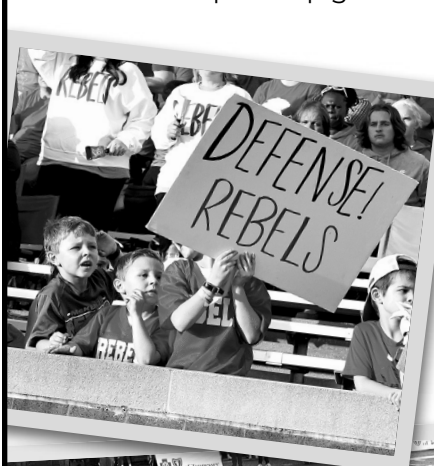

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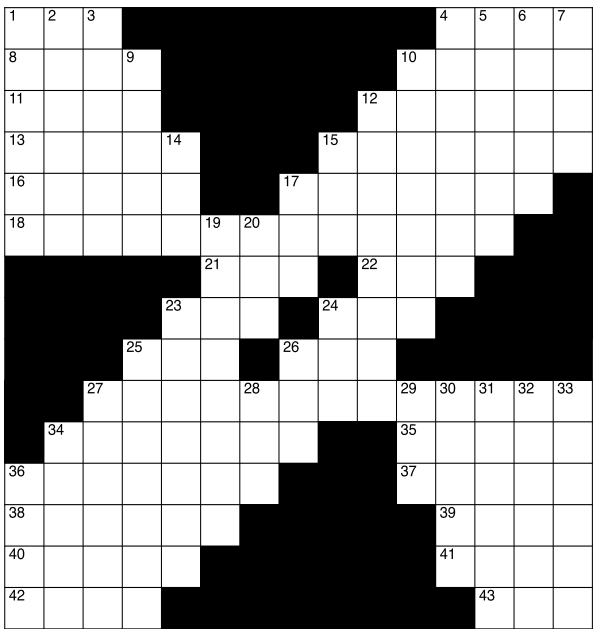
