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McKenzie Chamber of Commerce, Industrial Board Relocate to the Rail Yard Workspace

The McKenzie Chamber of Commerce and Industrial Development Board moved offices from the train depot to the newly developed Rail Yard Workspace in December. Monica Heath, executive director of the McKenzie Chamber of Commerce and Industry, said the decision to relocate was prompted to make downtown management easier.

The Rail Yard Workspace building at 9 Broadway Street was sold to the Industrial Board in January 2020 by Overflow Church. Construction began in July 2020, and the workspace opened February 2021. The fully-furnished co-working facility—which boasts seven private offices, a meeting room.

a break area with free coffee and utilities, Wi-Fi, a color copier, printer, scanner, and fax machine—was developed to invest in McKenzie's downtown. Heath recalled attending several economic conferences where she learned about the new concept of co-working buildings in larger cities, and she wanted to develop one in a rural community.

The workspace is COVID-friendly with partitions to provide privacy. Mrs. Heath has observed many achievements since the Rail Yard's opening. Following the tornado destruction in Weakley County, several Dresden employees have taken advantage of the open office spaces. Out-of-town residents have rented offices to work while

Carroll County Commission to Discuss Rural Solid Waste Problem

HUNTINGDON (January 3) — Carroll County commissioners will discuss the ongoing problem of the collection and disposal of solid waste for its rural residents.

Since early October, 2021, the weekly collection of solid waste at roadside bins at each rural residence has either been sporadic or non-existent after the contractor, Red River Waste filed for bankruptcy and immediately ceased operations in rural Carroll County. The successor company, Republic Services, has not been able to adequately meet the demands of the weekly curbside collections since it entered into a 90-day emergency contract with the county for collection and disposal.

The county's Resolutions Committee approved an agenda for the 7 p.m., January 10, 2022 meeting at the Civic Center that includes

Christmas and New Year brings a lot of things including family get-togethers, plenty of gifts and of course plenty of holiday basketball action including the annual Huntingdon Point Guard Christmas Tournament which usually features a number of good Girls and Boys teams.

December 28: Quarterfinals

The tournament tipped off at 9 a.m. last Tuesday, December 28 with a girls' contest between South Gibson and Dyer County. It was a close low scoring affair which the Lady Hornets won 47-43 to advance in the winner's bracket. An even lower scoring close boy's game followed with USJ clipping Waverly 38-36.

West Carroll's Lady Eagles gave Chester County all they wanted before losing a 43-38 in the noon contest.

The first contest with a double-digit margin came with South Gibson's Hornets taking the sting out of the Greenfield Yellow Jackets 62-50. Camden's Lions posted a lopsided 60-44 win over Riverside's Lady Panthers setting up a rematch with a team they have already faced twice during the regular season. Riverside's Panthers came up on the short end of a 73-51 barrage from Chester County's Eagles. The nightcap games involved both Huntingdon teams and both Collinwood teams.

Fillies 67, Collinwood 51

The Fillies played host to the Lady Trojans which started off a bit slow with Huntingdon leading 14-8 at the end of the first period. Collinwood got hot and tied it several times early in the second period. Both teams were applying full court pressure to each other creating turnovers. The Fillies led 32-26 at halftime.

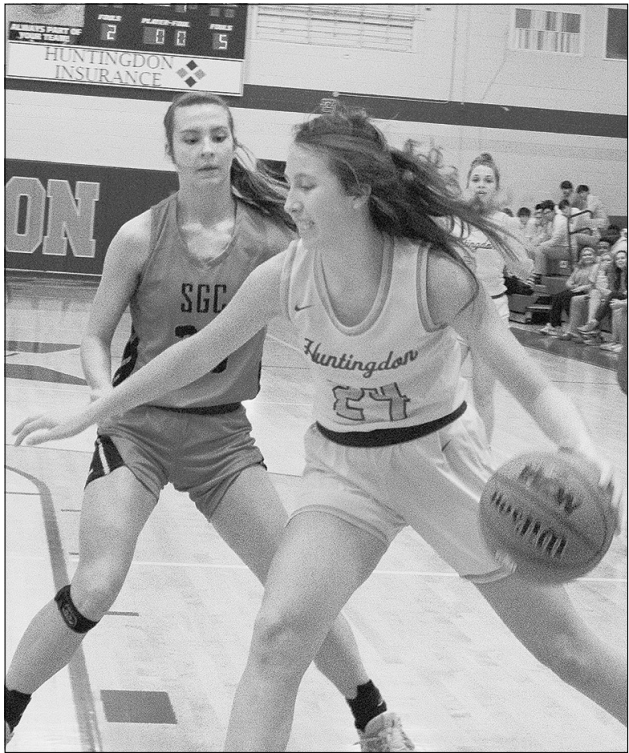
Huntingdon came out in the third period outscoring Collinwood 12-9 adding to their 44-35 lead going into the final period. Both teams came out hot in the final period with the Fillies outscoring the Lady Trojans 23-16 to secure the win.

The Fillies had three in double figures led by Lilly Kee with 25 points followed by Delaney Byars with 14 points and Sophie Singleton with 12 points. Sydney Anderson added seven points. Lia Fuller and Josey Stokes had four points and three points respectively while Ashlyn Rich chipped in two points for Huntingdon.

Collinwood had several players contribute points but only one in double figures. Harlee Haddock had 11 points followed closely by Alyssa Gay and AC Whitehead with nine points each. Tessa Statam had eight points. Hayley Siems had seven points along with Kaycee Luker with four points. Danley Bray and Cimmie Willis chipped in two points and one point respectively.

Mustangs 49, Collinwood 45

The nightcap game between the Mustangs and Trojans was a barn burner from the tip until the end. Both teams got off to a slow start with no score until Collinwood nailed a three-pointer with just under five minutes remaining in the first period. Huntingdon answered with a basket of their own and it went back and forth

until the Mustangs took a 10-6 lead at the end of the first period.

Huntingdon extended the lead to 17-11 by the halfway point in the second period but Collinwood roared back and tied it 19-19 with a minute left until the half. Both teams swapped baskets and were tied 24-24 at halftime.

The scoring remained slow in the early part of the third period as both teams swapped baskets and were tied 32-32 with 1:30 left in the period. The Mustangs went on a 6-0 streak to finish the third period with a 38-32 lead.

In the fourth period, points were again hard to come by as the Mustangs stretched the lead to 41-34 with five minutes remaining. The Trojans came right back over the next two minutes and made it a 41-40 game with three minutes remaining. The two teams swapped three-pointers with just over a minute to play with Huntingdon leading 46-45. The Mustangs sealed the win taking care of business at the free throw line.

December 29: Semi-Finals

The first day's contests set up interesting matchups for the second day in boys' and girls' action. Dyer County's Lady Choctaws and West Carroll's Lady Eagles tipped things off with a lopsided 78-27 contest in favor of Dyer County. Riverside and Collinwood girls had the first close contest of the day with the Lady Trojans winning 62-55. Waverly's Tigers rolled over Greenfield's Yellow Jackets 67-32. South Gibson's Lady Hornets defeated Chester County 57-29.

The closest game came on Wednesday afternoon with USJ's Bruins squeaking by South Gibson 33-32.

Fillies 67, Camden 43

Huntingdon went into action starting with the Fillies playing the Camden Lady Lions for the third time this season. They split the two earlier games with Huntingdon winning at home and Camden winning at home.

The Fillies built an early double digit lead but Camden erased it by the end of the period making it a one point game 18-17 after one period. In the second period, Huntingdon rebuilt their double digit lead taking a 35-25 lead with 1:30 left until halftime. They led 37-25 at the half.

Huntingdon kept a comfortable lead through the third period leading 42-30 at the halfway point and 51-32 at the end of three periods. Things got chippy between the two teams in the fourth period with technical fouls being called on both teams while the Fillies outscored the Lady Lions 16-13 during the period to finish the win 67-43.

Three Fillies were in double figures with Sophie Singleton leading the way with 19 points with a bunch of her points coming from 10-14 shooting at the free throw line. Josey Stokes and Annabelle Singleton added 15 and 13 points respectively. Sydney Anderson and Delaney Byars had five points each while Lilly Kee and Lia Fuller had four points each. In the first period, neither team scored until the 5:30 mark. Chester County took a lead 12-4 at the end of one period. The Eagles outscored Huntingdon 18-11 in the second period to post

a 30-15 lead at halftime.

After halftime, the Mustangs came out hot outscoring the Eagles 15-8 during the third period to make it a 38-30 game heading into the final period. It was the fourth period players and fans alike became frustrated with the officials which resulted in several technical fouls and a fan being removed from the game.

Both teams put up a bunch of points in the final period with the Eagles barely outscoring the Mustangs 24-22 during the period. Chester County went on to win 62-52.

After suffering two losses in the tournament so far, The Lady Eagles stepped up defeating Riverside's Lady Panthers 65-52. The seventh place boys contest was a tight one with Greenfield nipping Collinwood 55-54. Dyer County's Lady Choctaws handed Collinwood a lopsided 79-44 loss for fifth place while Waverly's Tigers rolled Riverside's Panthers 81-52. Camden's Lady Lions defeated Chester County for third place 49-39.

South Gibson 67, Huntingdon 44

Huntingdon's Mustangs faced South Gibson for third place with the Hornets opening up an 11-3 lead in the first half of the first period. The Mustangs outscored the Hornets 12-7 in the final four minutes making it an 18-15 game by the end of the period with South Gibson still holding a lead.

The Mustangs went scoreless in the first four minutes

of the second period while South Gibson widened the lead to 23-15. Both teams played evenly the remainder of the half but the Hornets still maintained a 29-20 lead at halftime.

Huntingdon was still in striking distance halfway through the third period trailing 37-26 however the Hornets outscored the Mustangs 12-3 during the remainder of the period to blow it open to a 49-29 lead by the end of the period.

South Gibson outscored Huntingdon 18-15 in the final period to secure the 67-44 win.

Several Mustangs contributed in scoring but none scored in double figures. Kaleb Pearson and Ty Kelley led the way with nine points and seven points respectively. Ethan Ramsey had six points while Jeremiah Irvine had five points. Jeb Atkinson and Landon Gordon had four points each. Girls Championship: Huntingdon vs South Gibson

South Gibson led for three periods before the Fillies got hot in the final period erasing a 12-point deficit and winning the Point Guard Title.

The Lady Hornets opened with a 10-5 lead in the first four minutes of the game and stretched it out to 22-13 by the end of one period. The Fillies closed it to a 25-20 deficit with a little over four minutes left in the half and trailed 38-31 by halftime.

South Gibson outscored Huntingdon 12-7 in the third period putting the Fillies in a 50-38 hole headed into the fourth period.

It apparently didn't rattle the Fillies because they started the final period with back to back three-pointers

enroute to tying the game 50-50 with five minutes to play. The Lady Hornets broke the tie with a basket 52-50 but the Fillies answered with a big three-pointer to take the lead again 53-52 with 3:45 to play. The Fillies got a steal and scored making it 55-52 with just under three minutes to play. The two teams swapped baskets over the next minute making it 57-54 at the two minute mark.

Huntingdon had three named to the Class AA FCA All-State Teams including, Aden Hutcherson, Darius Gordon, and Cade Wood. Other locals named to the AA team include Westview's Ty Simpson, Garner Anderson, Hayden Smith, and Quincy Hamilton along with Union City's Carter Bondurant.

In Class AAA there was no one nearby named to the team but in Class 4A Milan's Hayden Sullivan was named to the All-State Team.

Three players from Henry County were named to the Class 5A team including Luke Brown, Aiden Harrod, and Lewis Hudson.

Bruceton Woman Arrested After Mother's Body Found in Home

BRUCETON — A Bruceton woman was arrested on Christmas Eve after the remains of her mother was found in a home they shared.

Court documents say that the Bruceton Police Department responding to a 911 call on College Street regarding a deceased and decomposed body in a home.

When police arrived they were met by the grandchild of the deceased woman. He reportedly told police he was in town to check on his mother and grandmother.

According to the affidavit, the grandson asked his mother, Belinda Evans, where his grandmother was and she replied “She’s in her own bedroom and don’t go in there.”

The grandchild told police that he had to remove the door from its hinges to access the room. He then discovered his deceased grandmother lying in the floor, near the door.

The court documents say Belinda Evans told a TBI agent, that he had not seen her mother alive in approximately a month.

Evans told investigators that she had not called any one or asked for a welfare

check on her mother.

Police noted in the report that Evans’ bedroom was next to her mother’s bedroom in the home.

Documents say that the deceased woman, Social Security income was Evans’ only source of income.

Evans was arrested and charged with Failure to Report Discovery of a Dead Body.

The body of the deceased has been sent for autopsy.

The case remains under investigation.

Evans was booked and released in lieu of \$1,000 bond.

City of McKenzie Annexes Profile Metal Property

The City of McKenzie Board of Mayor and Council met Thursday evening with a short agenda. Two public hearings dealing with the annexation of Profile Metal occurred during the meeting. February 23 Snowmageddon 2021

Winter Storms Disrupt Area Travel, Business

Two waves of a brutal winter storm disrupted travel, business, schools, and events on February 15 through 21.

Temperature observa-

tions at Jackson through the National Weather Service, indicated 10 days of temperatures below the 32 degree freezing point. Temperatures on February 11 were 27 to 31 degrees and down to three degrees on February 20, which also had a temperature high of 42.

Area schools were closed February 15, a scheduled holiday, to February 22 because of extremely cold temperatures and up to eight inches of accumulated snow.

County's Dispatchers Make Sacrifices, Serve the Public

HUNTINGDON — Carroll County’s emergency services dispatchers went beyond the call of duty last week as they chose to remain at the Dispatch Center around the clock instead of traveling home during their off-hours.

Jamie Verner Summers said the Carroll County Sheriff’s Office Dispatch Center answers all 911 lines for the whole county, several administrative phone lines for the Sheriff’s Office and dispatches for the Carroll County Sheriff’s Office, and police departments of Bruceton, Hollow Rock, Clarksburg, Trezevant, Carroll County Emergency Medical Services, Carroll County Rescue Squad and 20 fire departments - city or county.

Like some businesses, some dispatch employees cannot travel the hazardous roads, but unlike some other businesses, the dispatch center must continue to operate around the clock, regardless of the weather. Summers said plans were made to maintain staffing of the dispatch center.

In addition to the regular calls, the snow created a batch of weather-related calls. Calls came in from citizens checking the road conditions, health care workers needing a ride to and from work, cars off of

the roadway, wrecks and other emergency calls.

March 2 Heavy Rains Close Highway 22

CARROLL COUNTY (March 1) — Heavy rains on Saturday and Sunday caused flooding in the neighboring counties of Henry, Weakley and Obion Sunday evening. Murray and Mayfield Kentucky also reported some flooding after five to six inches of rain fell. Last week, TVA started lowering its water levels on rivers in anticipation of the forecasted rains. The measure is part of its mission in flood prevention.

In Carroll County, there was some minor damage caused by flooding. State Route 22, between McKenzie and Huntingdon in the Crooked Creek area was closed on Monday because water covered the roadway.

TEC Receives Grant For Fiber Expansion

BRADFORD — TEC, a leading rural fiber broadband provider in Tennessee, will provide Fast Fiber Internet to parts of Carroll, Benton, and Henry counties and bridge the digital divide for rural Tennesseans. TEC was one of 386 competing companies in the recent Federal Communications Commission (FCC) auction, which awarded \$9 billion for the provision of broadband internet to unserved and underserved areas throughout the United States. TEC won \$285,692 in funding to build internet access to parts of Camden, Eva, Buena Vista, Huntingdon, McLemoresville, McKenzie, Paris, and Henry. TEC will provide additional funding of \$2,598,231 for a total build-out construction project of \$2,883,923; this increased access will improve the quality of lives for these local communities.

HCMC Observes Rising COVID Cases

PARIS (December 29) — Henry County Medical Center reported being in a red state of transmission regarding the COVID-19 virus. Areas are labeled red if they have more than a ten percent positive test conversion rate. On December 29, Henry County Medical Center was at 15.38 percent positivity.

The hospital saw volume increases within the Emergency Department

over the past week. More than ten percent of patients admitted to the Emergency Department present respiratory symptoms.

Of the six COVID-19 patients hospitalized, none of them are fully vaccinated. ER visits on Wednesday totaled to 48, with nine patients testing positive for COVID-19.

48.88 percent of Henry County residents have re-

ceived at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.

Currently, Henry County has 118 positive cases. Weakley County’s positive results have risen to 128, and Carroll County has 111 positive cases.

Henry County Medical Center and Plumley Rehab report 12,446 tests completed. The testing rate in Henry County has more than doubled within two weeks.

The chamber is planning an open house event in January to showcase the facility.

The Chamber of Commerce, Industrial Development Board, and the Rail Yard Workspace have a common mission statement: To promote business, enhance economic and community development of McKenzie, and serve as a catalyst for improving the overall quality of life of all citizens in McKenzie, Carroll County, and West Tennessee.

Growmckenzie.com is a website that launched along with the chamber in July 2021 and provides information regarding the Chamber of Commerce, Industrial Development Board, and the Rail Yard Workspace. The website will soon provide a community events calendar as well as a payment option for Rail Yard and chamber members’ fees.

Because it is funded by the Industrial Development Board, the McKenzie Chamber of Commerce has a different structure from other chambers of commerce. There are no overhead costs or salaries, and all chamber funds are redistributed to business and community development. Each chamber member receives business referrals, advertising through the chamber’s website and social media, yearly decals, their own listing on growmckenzie.com with links to their websites and social media, ribbon cuttings and open-house events.

The Chamber will host an annual June banquet

and fundraiser to recognize and award McKenzie’s businesses.

The McKenzie Chamber of Commerce board has nine members. Josh Crawford is the Chamber’s chairman, Jan Latimer serves as the vice chairman, and Jay Phipps is the secretary/treasurer. Other board members include Ashley Little, Myra Carlock, Emily Young, Victor Vela, Jason Martin, and Barbara Robertson. Joel Washburn serves as the Industrial Development Board representative.

The chamber currently has ninety members, but Mrs. Heath’s goal for 2022 is to expand membership to 150. Membership to the chamber is as little as \$60 per year and open to anyone who wishes to be involved-including business-owners, individuals, retirees, et cetera.

Other 2022 goals include promoting retail and tourism in McKenzie, hosting a McKenzie Golf Tournament, providing networking opportunities such as bimonthly coffee and after-hours meetings and “Lunch and Learns.”

The Industrial Development Board has also seen their fair share of accomplishments in 2021. In a joint effort between Huntingdon and McKenzie, VP Racing Fuels recently occupied and began renovating the only empty industrial building left in McKenzie’s South Indus-

trial Park. Stanley Black and Decker bought the adjacent MTD as a distribution center, and Profile Metal expanded and added a state-of-the-art stamping press. The Industrial Board gained access to Rochelle Road and Hill Road, and they are working with TDOT to widen the road for truck traffic. The Rail Yard Workspace, Haven Steel, and Cachengo are new successes to the community.

Republic-Allegion has expanded close to 200 employees, and VP Racing Fuels plans to add 150 jobs between its new McKenzie plant and the existing Huntingdon plant.

Despite having many accomplishments, the Industrial Development Board still has several plans in place for 2022. A Ford Motor Company plant is being built in Brownsville, which could provide new opportunities for McKenzie. The plant needs supplies and housing for contractors and employees. The McKenzie Industrial Board has open-land,a pad-ready site and acreage at the airport that could support the needs of an industrial plant to supply Ford.

The Industrial Development Board’s nine members include chairman Gary Simmons, vice chairman Joel Washburn, secretary/treasurer Keith Priestley, Matt Merrick, Larry Smith, Randy Webb, Dennis Coleman, Ricky Price, and Letha Basford.

The board’s main focus is to recruit more McKenzie businesses. There are already several plans in the works, some of which will be announced within the first quarter of 2022. What is most important to Monica Heath in the new year, however, is growth and “retaining what we already have.”

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Gene Hickerson

Trezevant's NFL Lineman

Once upon a time in the NFL, when face masks were optional and penalties were few and far between, roamed a breed of football player like no other. One of those legendary figures was Cleveland Browns lineman and NFL Hall-of-Famer Gene Hickerson. The story of Gene Hickerson starts in Trenton, Tennessee but transitions to Trezevant in Carroll County.

Robert Eugene Hickerson was born near the family's Gibson County farm on February 15, 1935. His father, Danielle Allen (1888-1972), was a farmer, and his mother, Mary Elizabeth Cotham (1893-1966), was a homemaker. The pair had fourteen children, nine boys and five girls.

Between 1945 and 1950, the Hickerson made their way to Carroll County, settling near Trezevant. The move allowed Gene to begin playing football at Trezevant High School. It wasn't until his senior year that Gene was talked into playing football by his brother.

As a 226 pound fullback, Hickerson made a name for himself on the field with his speed and agility. He was not highly recruited, but Ole Miss coach John Vaught got wind of the young man's size and speed. In March 1955, Hickerson decided he wanted to be an Ole Miss Rebel.

"They started me with the fullbacks, but I got tired of running all of those sprints in that sweltering August Mississippi heat. So I asked to change positions. I said, 'I want

a position where I don't have to run as much.' They said, 'What do you have in mind?' I said, 'Make me an offensive guard or a defensive end. Let me play somewhere that I don't have to run in all this Lord-awful heat.' That is how I became a guard."

After redshirting as a freshman, Hickerson played football at Ole Miss from 1955 to 1957. By the 1956 season, Hickerson was a starting lineman and the following year, he was named co-captain. In 1957, the Ole Miss had a 9-1-1 record with a #7 ranking by the Associated Press. The Rebels finished the season with a 39-7 victory over Texas in the Sugar Bowl.

Hickerson was named All-American, All-SEC, and All-South, as a tackle. He finished his collegiate career by playing in the 1958 Senior Bowl and the 1958 College All-Star Game. In the 1957 NFL draft, Hickerson, a junior, was selected in the seventh round by the Cleveland Browns; the Browns' first-round selection was Jim Brown.

According to Bobby Franklin, Hickerson's former college and NFL teammate, said Hickerson "was such a great athlete that the Browns drafted him his junior year. I don't think they drafted a year ear-

ly unless it was someone real special. They thought he was real special. Everybody knew how strong Gene was, had great feet, tremendous speed."

He joined the Browns in 1958 negotiating his first contract with a salary of \$10,000. Hickerson was moved from tackle to right guard/pulling guard. In his rookie season, he played four games. In 1959, he was started over Chuck Noll (future NFL Hall-of-Fame Pittsburgh coach). Hickerson suffered a broken leg in the 1961 pre-season opener. He fractured the leg again later in the year when he was hit on the sideline.

By 1962, he was back playing and guard. In 1963, he started all fourteen games. The following season, the Browns won the NFL Championship and Hickerson was named All-Pro/second team by the Newspaper Enterprise Association.

In 1965, Hickerson received in first of six consecutive Pro Bowl invitations. By the time Hickerson retired following the 1973 season, at the age of 38, his accomplishments on the football field were unquestioned. During his tenure, the Browns never experienced a losing season. According to the

Tennessee Athletic Hall-of-Fame, "Prior to Hickerson joining the Browns, there had been just seven runners in the entire history of the NFL to reach 1,000 yards rushing in a season. With Hickerson paving the way, the Browns featured a 1,000-yard rusher in nine of Hickerson's first 10 pro seasons."

Much of the accolades Hickerson deserved for his career went unnoticed following his retirement. Later in life, his name began to repair as the history of the NFL was being chronicled. Hickerson's contribution to the running game led to him being recognized as part of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1960s.

He was also included on the All-Time Sugar Bowl Team and was chosen by the Ole Miss fans as part of the Team of the Century (1893-1992) by the university in 1993. He was inducted into the Mississippi Sports Hall-of-Fame in 1979, the Ole Miss Sports Hall-of-Fame in 1988 and was inducted into the Tennessee Sports Hall-of-Fame in 2008.

In 2007, he received the ultimate recognition as he was enshrined in the NFL Hall-of-Fame in Canton, Ohio. Hickerson was pushed in a wheelchair across the stage by three

running backs, for whom he helped pave the way into the Hall-of-Fame: Jim Brown, Leroy Kelly and Bobby Mitchell. Kelly, once asked by a reporter what he learned from years of playing behind Brown, answered: "I learned to follow Gene Hickerson's big butt any chance I got."

That night Hickerson stared blankly as his friend, Bobby Ray Franklin, presented him for enshrinement. At the time, Hickerson was suffering from the later stage of Alzheimer's. His son, Bob Hickerson, accepted for him on his behalf.

On October 20, 2008, Gene Hickerson died. He was laid to rest at Elmhurst Park Cemetery in Avon, Ohio.

Me and Ricky, Buddy and Yogi looked like geniuses year after year. And we did it with the same old

We figured the way things went the previous year was just about the way they were going to go in the upcoming one.

And we certainly helped keep our predicting score up by shying clear of any thoughts of what Leon might do in the coming months. That would be like predicting which way one of Archie Moore's cows was going to jump when we'd bounce a crabapple off his backside.

Certain things did get by us; we sure didn't "see" that Sputnik satellite blasting off in 1957. Talk about a shocker! We just couldn't conceive of something like that happening. It was dou-

bly embarrassing because it was the Communist that beat us to the punch!

But most of the time our "regular" predicting was spot on. Even if we guessed, like any noted forecaster is prone to do, the ordinariness of each subsequent year kept us in pretty good stead.

We had the benefit of normal years.

Me and Ricky, Buddy and Yogi graduated from elementary school and got out of the predicting business altogether. Junior high teachers didn't seem to care what we thought "might happen" when we got back from the Christmas break. At least, they never asked us to comment on it.

They "retired" us well before major league baseball expanded, Kennedy was assassinated, the Viet Nam War commenced,

a president lied on TV, the European Union was formed, the Beatles came to America, global warming became a two-word phrase, Simon and Garfunkel told us there was a "Bridge Over Troubled Water," politics went "big time" and Indian Jones chased down the Lost Ark.

I've got 15-year-old grandchildren that have never had the benefit of a normal year!

The added complexities make the predicting business a little less certain to say the least.

Take baseball for instance. We had 16 teams when I got into the forecasting game. No free agency. No steroid problems. No long-term contracts with opt out clauses. I knew every player on every team.

It was rather easy to keep up. And predict.

There are 30 teams today. And it's not about batting average and RBIs anymore. They've complicated the game by focusing on

"wins above replacement," "on base plus slugging," "launch angle," "exit velocity"...

How in the world do you predict something like that! Elvis has left the building. And so has the sure-fire hit record predicting business. Too many singers with an assortment of talent ranges muddy the waters.

The only thing predictable about a world-wide pandemic is its unpredictability. And, believe me, there is an infinite myriad of other situations that fit in that same category.

And I'm thinking our current political leaders didn't get their start like General Ike. Nor are they as beloved. Most folks, including many in their own party, are more interested in where they'd like to send them...than how they came to be on the scene.

Anything remotely connected to any political agenda (which today, of course, means most ev-

erything) is a touchy subject; fraught with intrigue, clandestine meetings, back-room bargaining and a fair amount of public "selling" on TV.

If a good, sober, well-meaning politician can't predict what his, or her, own party is going to do in the New Year, what chance do we have?

You need to understand one other thing, our elementary school "picking" was never personal, ever. I'm not so sure it works that way today.

This predicting stuff, in any category you care to break it down in, has moved to a whole new league. And I am so thankful my grade doesn't depend on it anymore.

There is one ray of good news. My wife just came home with a pound of bacon. I can FINALLY predict that the price of hogs is definitely going UP!
