Huntingdon Town Council Honors High School Athletes

Gray Eubanks Awarded Pinnacle Of Excellence

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HUNTINGDON (July 22) — During Tuesday’s regular meeting, the Huntingdon Town Council and Mayor Chad Edwards honored local high school athletes for their achievements in spring sports, including awarding the town’s Pinnacle of Excellence to Mr. Baseball winner Gray Eubanks.

Mayor Edwards welcomed the capacity crowd to the meeting room. “It’s a pleasure to see so many of you here to celebrate the achievements and dedication of our athletes. Each individual has constantly gone above and beyond, demonstrating exceptional performance and commitment and passion.”

He presented a certificate to each athlete, beginning with Gage Foster, who led the Mustang soccer team to a region championship and sectional appearance. Foster was named an All-West Tennessee Soccer goalkeeper.

Honored next were track and field Head Coach Bryan Dickens and state competitors Shawn Simpson, Cole Chafin, Carson Watters and Blaine Todd. The four finished third in the 4x800-meter relay. In the 3200-meter run, Todd finished second and Simpson finished sixth.

The Mustang baseball team was honored for their TSSAA State Championship Runner-Up finish. Present certificates were Head Coach Alan Eubanks, assistant coaches Brandon McCormick, Kade Pearson and Daniel Eubanks, and team members Owen Kreuziger, Silas Sharp, Easton Byars, Aiden Hilliard, Owen Huguely, Colt Luther, Broox Bennett, Wesley Williams, Brady Warbritton, Wyatt Bradley, Braylin Dearmon and Gray Eubanks.

Coach Eubanks thanked the mayor and council, adding, “I want to thank the town too... When we played

for the state championship that day, it was a real moment... It’s like the whole town was there.”

Edwards then presented the Pinnacle of Excellence to Gray Eubanks. The Class AA Mr. Baseball winner was unable to attend in person, but was present via video call as the mayor recited the inscription on the plaque: “On behalf of the Huntingdon Town Council and the Town of Huntingdon, it is our honor to present the 2025 Pinnacle of Excellence award, an accolade recognizing individuals who have reached the highest levels of achievement and embody the spirit of the town of Huntingdon’s values: dedication, teamwork, sportsmanship and hard work. This individual’s journey has been marked by achievement and success not only in baseball but football. He has proven to be a leader both on and off the field. His unwavering commitment and determination have had a significant impact on the Huntingdon mustangs.”

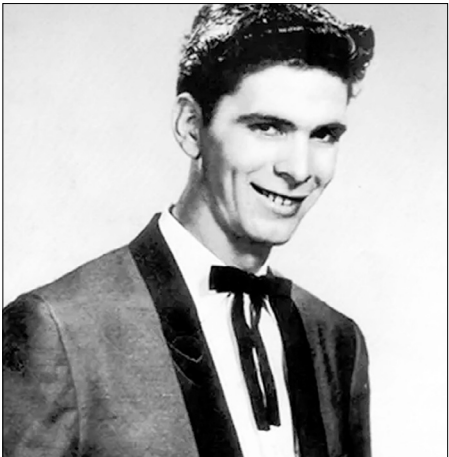

Huntingdon Council Approves Signage Honoring Carl Mann

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HUNTINGDON (July 22) — During their regular monthly meeting Tuesday, the Huntingdon Town Council approved the installation of signage honoring Rockabilly Hall of Fame member Carl Mann.

Born in Huntingdon, Mann was a child musical prodigy who began recording at age 15. He signed with Sun Records and, at 16, reached #25 on the Billboard Hot 100 with his cover of “Mona Lisa.”

He performed and recorded for over six decades until his death in 2020 at age 78. Mann was inducted into the Rockabilly Hall of Fame in 2006.

Mann’s niece, Andrea Salazar, addressed the council on behalf of Carl’s family to request the signage and offer to cover the costs. Also present were Salazar’s sister, Sabrina Bailey, and Mann’s son, Richard Mann.

Salazar said, “Carl Mann was a rockabilly pioneer and spent a lifetime per-

forming for fans all over the United States and Europe. He was the last and youngest artist signed with Sun Record label. He was a guest performer on the Dick Clark show multiple times. Carl spent time touring with Johnny Cash, George Jones, Carl Perkins, Brenda Lee and was personal friends with Loretta Lynn and with Patsy Cline. He had many musical accomplishments, and he is a gold record recipient.

“He was somewhat disappointed that the town of Huntingdon never seemed to recognize him for all that he did. He would be a little hurt when he would go to McMoresville and see the welcome sign with Dixie [Carter]’s name on it, or he would go to Parsons and see the highway named after Little David Wilkins, or he would go to Jackson and see ‘Home of Carl Perkins.’ And there was never a sign in honor of him here in his own hometown.

“On behalf of his sister and the whole Mann fami-

ly, we would love to see his legacy live on. Therefore, we would like a sign to be put up at the entrance of town to recognize him. We feel as if it’s 50 years overdue.”

Mayor Chad Edwards referred to discussions he had previously had with the family and suggested Highway 70 coming into town from Leach as a good place for the signage as much of the Mann family lived in that area.

The mayor offered that the council could consider the proposal and revisit it, but councilmember Chad Barnhart countered that it could be a brief discussion right away. Councilmember Daniel Eubanks doubled down on that sentiment and made a motion to approve the signage. Kelly Eubanks seconded, and the motion was approved unanimously.

The family will come up with a design for the sign, which will come before the board for final approval, according to Mayor Edwards.

The new rate is a reduction from the previous year’s rate of \$1.2478, based on the county-wide property reappraisal conducted this year, but represents no change in overall revenue to the town.

The council also approved a change in language to the ordinance that sets sewer rates for customers outside of corporate limits. Rather than billing based on a set usage (6,000 gallons), bills will indicate a flat rate of \$74.57. The change is purely semantic and does not represent a change in the rate. Action on the matter was prompted by comments from several residents of Lake Halford during last month’s regular meeting.

Council members unanimously approved a contract with Alexander Thompson Arnold (ATA) for audit services, but not before some discussion. The fee for this year is \$34,150, plus an additional \$4,250 if an addi-

tional audit is necessary. Councilmember Andrew Maddox voiced his interest in seeking bids for the services next year. Mayor Chad Edwards and City Attorney Robert Keeton explained that finding reputable firms willing to take on new clients is difficult and that changing firms can be a risk, but agreed, along with several council members, that it was worth looking at next year.

Councilmember Maddox was the lone dissenter in a 6-1 vote to enter into an agreement with J.R. Wauford & Company for engineering services for an Asset Management Plan. The plan is required by the state and is funded 80/20 by a Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) grant with a match amount of \$19,000.

The council authorized a PILOT (Payment In Lieu of Taxes) agreement between the Industrial Development Board and INTOCAST, a new industry coming to Huntingdon.

A resolution was approved to authorize the town to be a member of

the HGACBuy Cooperative Purchase Program, which will give the fire department more options for equipment purchases. The membership was utilized immediately as the council approved the purchase of a commercial pumper from Fouts Fire for \$499,500. The two pumpers currently in the department’s fleet were manufactured in 1993 and 1999.

A request for use of Edwards Park on Saturday, August 2 for a community event was approved.

Mayor Edwards made two announcements regarding The Dixie Carter Performing Arts Center. The bank note on the 2004 construction of the center will be paid off in full in October rather than by May 2026 in order to save on interest payments. Also, the money donated to The Dixie by the Hal Holbrook estate has been moved to a different account which will accrue more interest while retaining more access to the funds.

The meeting adjourned in 40 minutes.

...From Front Page vehicles in the Holly Hills subdivision were targeted by egging in the late hours of Tuesday, July 22. Egging, or the act of throwing eggs at people or property, is a form of vandalism and can irreversibly damage property under the right conditions. Thrown eggs can leave dents or break property. Egg whites can deteriorate certain types of paint, and egg yolks can be difficult to remove once dried. Vandals can be charged with a misdemeanor or a felony depending on the level of damage they inflict. The vandals’ targets were seemingly random.

Residents shared photos of egged windows, house columns, doorsteps, truck bumpers, and more. One resident, who posted a photo of their house’s egged second-story window, said it looked like an egg had cooked on their window. This was the second egging to hit the Holly Hills neighborhood. One victim of the July 22 event said their truck was also egged during Easter weekend. Holly Hills wasn’t the only neighborhood affected. Police Chief Ryan White confirmed the McKenzie Police Department received a call about eggs being thrown at the city’s pickleball courts. A resident near Stonewall Street also reported an egging on July 22. At least seven victims posted about the July 22 incident on social media;

three of the seven were local schoolteachers. Residential security cameras captured videos of the perpetrators’ vehicle, helping the Carroll County Sheriff’s Department identify the teenage pranksters on Thursday, July 24. Upon identification, the sheriff’s department called the victims to ask if they would like to press charges. One Holly Hills victim said they will have the teenagers do manual labor for them instead. The Carroll County Sheriff’s Department asks that victims outside of McKenzie city limits contact them at 731-986-8947 and ask for Investigator Angel Furr. Victims inside McKenzie’s city limits are urged to call the McKenzie Police Department 1-731-352-2265 and speak with Investigator Kyle Beauchamp.

night before. Booths and clothing racks were labeled by clothing sizes and types, from boys/girls 4T to men’s 3XL. In an adjacent hallway, barbers and hairdressers set up stations to give young students fresh hairstyles going into the new school year. Shoppers were allowed three outfits, one pair of shoes, a backpack and other supplies per student. The drive supported students in kindergarten through eighth grade. Three years ago, Kim Bell Webb said God gave her a vision to give back to the community through a back-to-school drive. “The economy’s high,” she said. “Parents who make \$7 an hour can’t afford to get school clothes for three kids.” As the program has grown, so have its supporters. “This year the Lord has really, truly blessed us with people wanting to come aboard and partner with us,” said Webb. The Webb Alumni Association received donations ranging from \$20 to thousands of dollars in preparation for this event.

Carlton Townes, a senior at McKenzie High School, was one of the youngest volunteers at the event, representing both the First Baptist Church and Webb alumni. A descendant of Webb alumni, he grew up in the Webb community and attended Headstart at Webb School. “I never regret anything I do when it comes to this stuff,” said Townes. “When you come across these people, you never know the impact that you have on them.” McKenzie Mayor Ryan Griffin said, “I’m very grateful for our community to come alongside those that

maybe can’t afford to go back-to-school shopping or maybe need that fresh start, that fresh haircut, to start off the new school year.” Typically, Webb School alumni and the First Baptist Church have separate back-to-school events. Webb alumni host theirs in the Webb School gymnasium, and First Baptist Church members have theirs in Mulberry Park. This year, due to construction at the park, the two organizations joined together to help the community. McKenzie’s 2025-26 school year begins with a half-day on August 5.

Fordon’s tasks included readying water for the canines, caring for the canines during breaks and setting up shelter from the heat. In the two weeks he stayed in Kerr County, he said temperatures ranged in the low to high 90s. “Like humans, a dog’s nose is working constantly. They need breaks, too,” Fordon said. Though they traveled into Texas together, Tennessee’s first responder team dispersed when they reached the disaster site. They vetted with members from the Texas task force team to see where they were most needed and combined forces with the 2,000 first responders from across the nation. Fordon, a career first responder, joined Tennessee Task Force 1 in February 2024. He had been a firefighter at Illinois’ Elk Grove Village Fire Department for 31 years before retiring and moving to Carroll County in October 2023. He continued his service as a first responder at the Huntingdon Fire Department, being sworn in as Huntingdon’s fire chief in April 2025. He remains an active member of the Illinois task force. Fordon was first deployed with the Illinois task force in 2005 following the devastation of Hurricane Katrina. His mission in Kerr County was his eleventh deploy-

ment overall and his first with Tennessee. Responding to natural disasters can be “very humbling,” said Fordon. “I’m doing what I can to help something I have no control over,” Fordon said. “It makes you realize how precious life is and how quickly it can be taken away with little to no warning.” First responders bear witness to immense levels of devastation. Brandy Baumgardner, a member of the Tennessee Disaster Mental Health Strike Team, said, “We have found that, over the years, the victims, first responders and citizens usually have some form of trigger/symptoms when a disaster like this pops up... The buried cars, the huge mudflow debris piles... even if someone has been making it okay, they can suddenly be in a downward spiral after seeing the media coverage of an event three states away.” While Fordon and Baumgardner have not crossed paths in deployment, they share similar experiences. Fordon said that sometimes the only way to get through his emotions is to talk with fellow first responders. “You know what you’re getting into when you sign up for this type of work,” Fordon said. “You know that when you meet people in this profession, they’re having a really bad day. Once the mission is over... whatever challenges you endured, you have to work through them. You can do that by talking to people

and being understanding and respectful.” Although the work is grueling, it’s an undertaking that Fordon and thousands of Americans accept to help victims of mass destruction. Different disaster events demand different types of responses. In some events, volunteers are necessary for recovery. In others, donations can do the heavy lifting. “Depending on what the event is, sometimes it’s best to just step back and let first responders do what they need to do,” Fordon said. In Kerr County, it was rumored that almost 800 volunteers showed up each day to help with search and rescue. Fordon advised that there are certain channels to follow if interested in volunteering. Counties in need have volunteer areas in which they group people for tasks based on their capabilities. July’s flooding event impacted over 100 miles of land throughout Texas. At least 135 people were found dead, with most found along the Guadalupe River in Kerr County, according to an Associated Press report. In a statement, Kerrville City Manager Dalton Rice credited search and rescue operations for the “remarkable progress” in locating missing people amid the destruction. Three weeks into the search, more than 160 people previously unaccounted for have been found. Three people remain missing.

I'd Trade Places with Him in a Heartbeat

No attempt at humor today. I'm sitting in a hospital waiting room. Waiting. Time has slowed to a lazy snail's pace. Minutes have crept into hours. Morning has crawled into afternoon. It is open heart surgery. And the patient is the only brother I have left.

You talk about time to think. And pray. And remember....

We drove a hundred thousand miles together on our knees in the dirt under our house. We built roads, bridges, tunnels, and service stations out of twigs, match sticks, and cut up tin cans. I drove a cattle truck most of the time. David Mark's rig was a Texaco oil tanker. We'd never heard of CB radios, but we talked to each other all the way to Joplin, Missouri, and back.

One of us would get hungry so we'd pull into a restaurant to stand up, stretch our legs, and check the menu. Waitress Mom would whip up hamburger steaks with mash potatoes and gravy, and we'd talk trucking till the food arrived. It tasted like peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, but we laid imaginary money on the kitchen table without complaint and headed back to our trucks. We needed to get across the ferry at Tiptonville before dark.

David hit me once with a hoe handle that rattled my teeth. I don't recall the leadup to this particular incident, but there is no doubt that I was at fault. He is 18 months younger, and you can bet the proverbial farm that I flaunted my superior age at every opportunity.

That "year and a half" makes no difference now but when we were five and six it was a mountain I was fixed upon, and a hill he was continually climbing. We fought renegade In-

dians on the "plains" behind Aunt Jessie's house. And Japanese down at the big ditch. We were important soldiers. We had those multicolored ribbons and bronze metals pinned to our white t-shirts. I don't think Daddy ever noticed they were missing.

We learned teamwork playing football against our older brother. It was always me and David against Leon. He was five years bigger and stronger. But Dave would hit him low and hold on like a bulldog. I would go for his throat.

We got those identical Western Flyers the same Christmas. We biked all over creation. We raced up and down Stonewall Street. He stripped his down to the bare bones when he realized it would give him a couple of more miles per hour.

We walked to school together every weekday. And to the Park Theatre every Saturday for the afternoon double feature. We both worked at the swimming pool. We were both known around town as Leon's little brother. We shared those brown beans and cornbread suppers together, seemingly night after night after....

He was, at different times, my confidant, lone playmate, Rook partner, mortal enemy, teammate, punching bag, advisor, taste tester, holder of the "other end" of whatever we were holding, scapegoat, and mentor.

He was my Tonto, Dr. Watson, Little Beaver, Hardy, Costello, David Brinkley, Robin, Jerry, and logical Spock, with the tall ears. As we grew older, these rolls reversed on occasion.

He was always and forever my best friend.

David bought a car when he was 15. The kids made fun of me riding to school

with my "little" brother. Shoot, that didn't bother me one bit. Neither of us were walking! One December I got the transmission hung up on that 1956 Chevrolet. I had to walk back to the house and get Dave. He laid down in the snow, ice, and water, slid under that car and fixed it. I was mortified. He never said a word....just taking care of his helpless brother.

When I went off to college, he gleefully proclaimed that for the first time in his life, he had a bedroom all to himself. But as we were loading up the car, I pretended not to notice the small tears in his eyes.

I will never forget the day he came back from Vietnam. I met him at the airport. I didn't know whether to hug him or shake his hand... I said, "I don't care about all that Green Beret training crap, I can still take you down anytime I want to."

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McLeese Enters Guilty Plea to Sexual Battery, Providing Alcohol to Minor

PARIS (July 21) — At a plea hearing held at the Henry County Jail this afternoon, Travis McLeese of Paris entered a 'blind plea' of guilty to all three charges before Circuit Court Judge Bruce Griffey: two counts of sexual battery and one count of purchasing alcoholic beverages or beer for a minor. A 'blind plea' is entered by

a defendant without a plea agreement with the prosecution, leaving the sentencing decision entirely up to the judge. McLeese is the former director of the Paris-Henry County Chamber of Commerce. He was indicted by a grand jury in March on those charges. Sentencing was set for

September 22 and he was ordered to remain in jail until then. Bond had been denied at his last court appearance after he was arrested for DUI in June. The DUI case is being heard in General Sessions Court. At today's hearing, Morgan Greer appeared for the state and McLeese was represented by Daniel Taylor.

In 2023, the City of McKenzie moved a freezer from Hudgins Appliance Repair and a drink cooler from Coke into the old train caboose. Park Theatre employees began working at Red Caboose Concessions during the day.

The Red Caboose offers ice cream sandwiches, fudge bars and Dilly Bars

at \$1.25, popsicles at \$0.75 and cold drinks at \$2.50.

The Red Caboose is open from noon to 5 p.m. and only accepts cash payments. Profits go toward purchasing chemicals to upkeep the Splash Pad.

Women Find Community at the Refinery's Morning Bootcamps

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At 5:45 a.m., before the sun has a chance to rise, the Refinery gym parking lot is full. On weekday mornings, the McKenzie gym becomes the most popular establishment in town. While some are in the main room of the gym, working out on the treadmills or by the benches, many find themselves in the back garage, nervous for whichever exercises trainer Melanie Sawyers has in store for them.

When the door to the Refinery's back room opens, the women know how to start their day. Some go straight into stretches. Some stand and chat for a few minutes. But the class officially starts when Sawyers begins reading the day's exercises from the whiteboard.

Most of the women are as scared of Sawyers as they are admiring. The room's speakers blare loud music, but everyone's eyes and ears are focused on Sawyers as she explains and briefly demonstrates the exercises. When she finishes her instruction, the women disperse and get to work, periodically checking the whiteboard for assistance.

Sawyers, more coach than instructor, floats around the room. As she walks past the women exercising, she checks their form and takes photos to document their progress. Sometimes, if she doesn't think they are challenging themselves enough, she'll add more weights to their exercises.

Every participant has their own story, their own testimony, as to why they joined. They also have their own ways of measuring their progress. While body weight is sometimes a contributor, their reasoning goes much deeper. They want a gym community. They want to feel like themselves again. They want to feel young. They want to be healthy. They want to be able to show up for their kids.

When Lacie Watson signed up for bootcamp in March 2025, she and Sawyers messaged a bit about each other's expectations. During that conversation, Melanie asked her, "What is your 'why?'"

"I told her that I wanted to feel good again," Watson said. "I wanted to get stronger. I did want to lose a little bit of weight, too."

During the week of spring break, Watson, a Dresden schoolteacher, decided to take a chance on the class. Her friends were out of town that week, and she

thought, "If I'm going to do this, it's now or never." This was her chance to prove she was strong enough to go to the classes, with or without friends.

Sawyers texted her every day that first week. Her messages would vary from "I'm proud of you!" to "You're showing up!" or "You're doing things!"

"I think a lot of women are very hesitant," said Sawyers, "because they think everybody in here has it all figured out...I just work with everybody and try to meet 'em where they're at so they feel comfortable in this space just as much as somebody who's been here for two or three years."

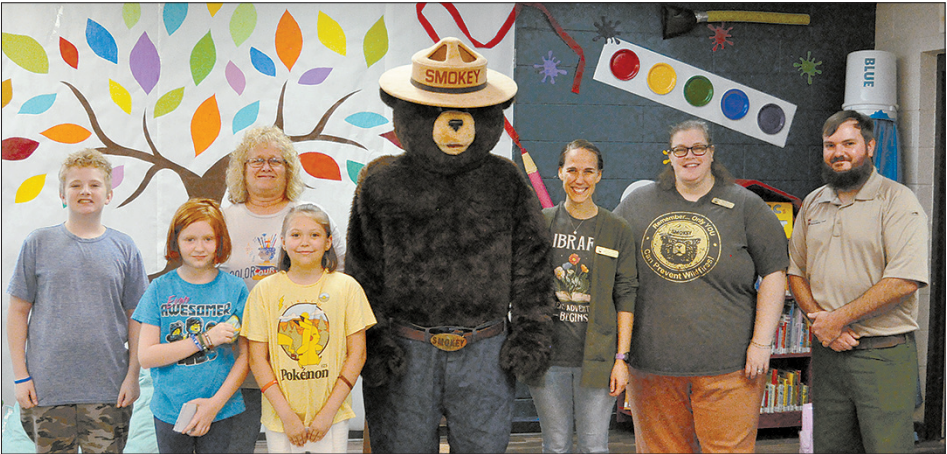
Sawyers, a professional trainer from Gleason, has amassed a large following of women since the day Refinery co-owner Josh Crawford recommended she start teaching morning bootcamp classes.

The classes, which started as two mornings of high-intensity interval training (HIIT) each week, began in January 2024. Now, she teaches four classes, 45 minutes each, from 5-8 a.m., Monday through Thursday. Mondays are dedicated to upper body strength exercises, Tuesdays and Wednesdays are focused on lower body exercises.

Sawyers' coaching has inspired over one hundred local women like Watson to begin their workout journeys. Whether they are signed up for the current session of bootcamp or not, the women stay connected through the bootcamp's Facebook group. They've become a community, even if some barely know each other.
