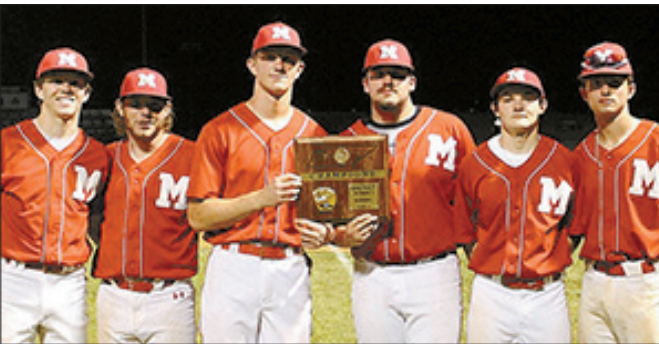
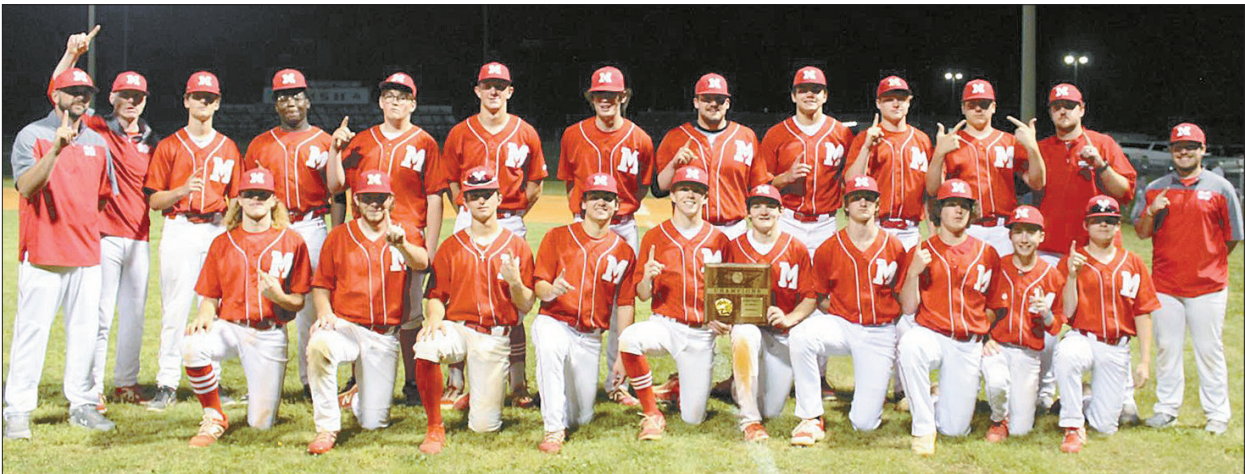
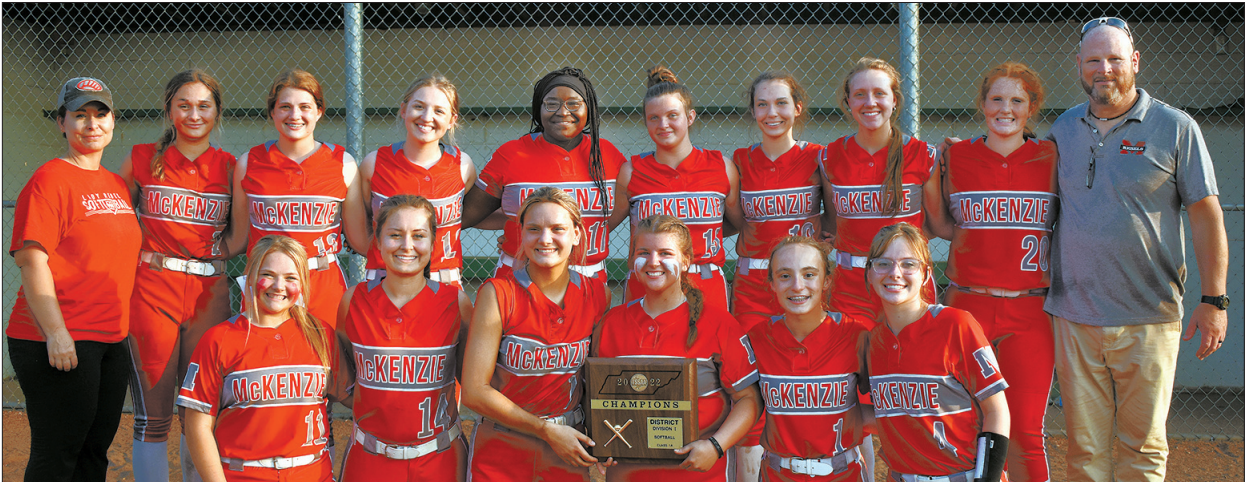

ERIN — The McKenzie Lady Rebels wasted no time taking command of the District 11A Softball tournament defeating Big Sandy 4-1 while McEwen defeated host Houston County to set up the District Championship game between McKenzie and McEwen on Wednesday, May 11.

After a scoreless first inning for both teams, McKenzie scored first with a run in the bottom of the second inning to lead 1-0. The Lady Irish took the lead 2-1, after a scoreless third inning,

with a pair of runs in the top of the fourth inning. The Lady Rebels tied the game 2-2 with a solo run in the bottom of the fifth inning. After holding Houston County scoreless in the top of the sixth inning, the Lady Rebels scored two runs to take a 4-2 lead and held the Lady Irish scoreless in the top of the seventh to earn the win and the District Title.

Payton Ognibene and Briley Auvenshine shared time on the mound. Ognibene pitched the first four innings giving up three hits, two runs, walking three batters and striking out three batters. Auvenshine came in the fifth inning giving

up two hits, walking one and striking out four batters earning the win.

Savannah Davis led the Lady Rebels at the plate with three hits getting a bunt, a single, and a triple driving in a run and scoring a run. Jaden Barton got a base hit driving in a run while Briley Auvenshine got on base with a single. Anna Robinson hit a single and scored a run. Kassidy Brown got a base hit driving in a run and Taylor Rawls drew a walk and later scored.

Following the game, plaques were given for District Runner-Up and District Champion. Four Lady Rebels were selected to the All-District team including

The Leapfrog Hospital Safety Grade is the only hospital ratings program based exclusively on hospital prevention of medical errors and harm to patients. The grading system is peer-reviewed, fully transparent and free to the public. Grades are updated twice annually, in the fall and spring.

"An 'A' Safety Grade is a tremendous achievement, of which this community should be extremely proud," said Leah Binder, president and CEO of The Leapfrog Group. "I thank the leadership and workforce of Baptist Carroll County for its commitment to prioritizing patients and their safety, especially during these trying times."

for 25 years. Initially, the contract was for two 90-day emergency service agreements to perform weekly curbside collection of household garbage for rural residents outside the municipalities. The first 90 days did not go well as Republic Services had to increase its workforce and equipment to manage the new contract to serve 6,000 homes. After paying \$18 per month for the past 13 years, the new rate is \$25 per month beginning June 1. Commissioners hope to maintain that rate for five years, concurrent with the new five-year contract with Republic Services. Republic can increase its rate in line with the consumer price index during the contract period. The county hopes to hold the customers' rate at \$25 during the period. In October, November, and December 2021, the county waived the \$18 monthly charge because of inconsistent or no collection service before and immediately after Republic started its emergency contract in November. Lana Suite and Randy Long voted against the price increase. Suite asked for clarification, noting she thought the county had already approved the five-year contract. County Attorney

Robert Keeton, III, said the new resolution added the rate of \$25 monthly. Employees of the County of Carroll will receive a bonus of \$2,000 for full-time and \$1,000 for part-time. Also, three employees who died from COVID - Frank Rezac, Randy Butler and Deanna Spellings - will also be memorialized through a payment to their families of \$2,000. All died during the 2021-22 fiscal year. The \$430,000 expenditure is funded through a federal grant known as the American Rescue Plan. Carroll County Rescue Squad was granted \$60,000 to add a bay to its headquarters. That bay will house a rescue response truck that is too large to fit in the building. Commissioner Joel Washburn stated that each rural fire department must fund all their building needs. He cited Macedonia Fire Department hosted many fundraisers to construct a new fire station. Washburn said he hopes the Commission will consider the building needs of the rural fire departments in future financial appropriations. Mayor Joseph Butler said the county would receive \$5,393,414 in American Rescue Plan funds. To date, the county has committed \$1,540,000 of those funds. The commitment includes \$430,000 for employee bonuses, \$60,000 to the Rescue Squad, \$500,000 for broadband development, \$500,000 to help local municipal and

public utilities with system upgrades and repairs and \$50,000 to purchase poll books for the Carroll County Election Commission. He also noted the county would retire two long-term debts totaling \$910,000 for the county's reserve funds, not American Rescue Plan money. The new Emergency Operations Center's note was retired recently and the debt on the courthouse renovation was retired shortly after May 15. The lone long-term debt is for the construction of the jail. The McKenzie Lady Rebels and teammate Miss Basketball Savannah Davis were honored during the meeting. Commissioner Paula Watkins read two proclamations, one celebrating the state champion Class 1A Lady Rebels on a historic season and Savannah Davis, a sophomore on being named TSSAA Miss Basketball in Class 1A. On August 31, 10 of the 21 commissioners are leaving office. Those not seeking reelection are Steve Parker, Vince Taylor, Johnny Blount, Jeremy Fowler, Gerald Scarbrough, Lori Nolen, Joel Washburn, Paula Watkins, Ronnie Murphy, and John Mann. Seeking reelection are: Darrell Ridgely, Larry Spencer, Jimmy McClure, John Austin, Barry Mac Murphy, Manuel Crossno, Willie Huffman, Jay Phipps, Randy Long, Lana Suite and Hal Eason.

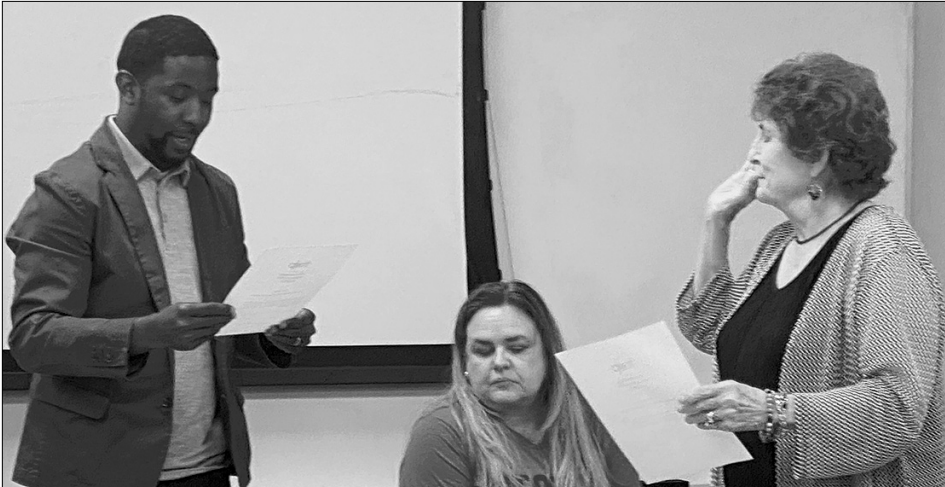
Feb. 28 league meeting, but he was unable to attend due to other obligations. Mulligan was later advised that a little over \$8,000 was miss-

ing from the league's account at a local bank. Bank records indicated numerous questionable transactions were made on that account by Coleman, who was the former league president.

between June 17, 2021, and January 28, 2022 in amounts between \$100 and \$300. The case was presented to the Carroll County Grand Jury during the May session, and the Grand Jury delivered a true bill against Coleman after hearing the evidence against him.

Tuesday to the printers. Effective May 31, the deadline for the submission of news is 5 p.m. Mondays instead of noon Mondays. How does the time change affect readers? First, The Banner will be on the streets late Tuesday afternoons, not Tuesday noon as it is now. Secondly, The Banner will include the latest news of meetings, sports and obituaries. Local print subscribers should still receive their newspaper through the mail on Wednesdays. Those residing outside the local area will experience a one-day delay in mail delivery of the

newspaper. Weekly release of the on-line e-edition remains at 4 p.m. on Tuesdays. Paid subscribers have access to the full contents of the newspaper via the e-edition at 4 p.m. Tuesday. Each issue of The Banner is archived on the site and is available to subscribers. The Banner's reading audience is larger than ever in its 152-year history through the printed and online pages. 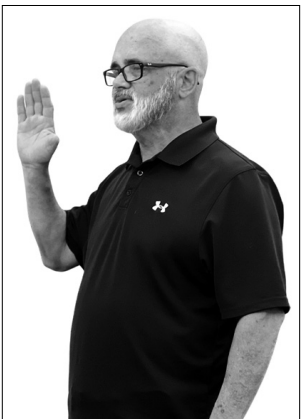


TCAT Students (L to R): Paul Prescott, Nathan Nanney and Logan Green received proclamations during the state competition at Skill USA in Chattanooga.

Garrett Burns and Steve Watson are the first seats subject to the at-large system in the November general election. The remaining three seats held by Jesse Townes, Charles Pruneau and Josefina Batton will be on the November 2024 general election ballot. The McKenzie Police Department was granted the ability to offer signing bonuses of \$3,000 to certified officers. Currently, the department is down five officers and having difficulty recruiting certified officers. The recruitment tool would be paid out over a year to the new hire. By enticing certified officers, it would save the City money as new recruits (non-certified) receive a salary and benefits while attending the academy at approximately \$17,000 not factoring in the cost of the academy fees. Municipalities like Memphis are offering bonuses of upwards of \$15,000 as they are short about 700 officers. An amendment was made to the agenda in regards to the replacement of the Police and Fire Departments' communication console. The current console is at least 25 years old and is outdated not allowing for new equipment to configure properly. The average price of a new unit is \$75,000. Mayor Holland asked the Council for a motion to make a request to Carroll County 911 Board to purchase a new console for the City since McKenzie is the secondary/backup dispatch. If the Carroll County 911 dispatch center went offline or became inoperable McKenzie would become the active center for all county dispatch calls.

Ordinance 545 was approved in its first reading. The ordinance focuses on accessory buildings defining them as "private garages, carports, gazebos and sheds." The structures can not be "utilized for habitable space. No mobile home, manufactured home, modular home, travel trailer unit, or tractor-trailer shall be utilized as an accessory building. All accessory buildings shall be located a minimum of five feet from any property line." Ordinance 546 was approved in its first reading. This pertains to areas zoned as R-1 (residential-low density), setting the lot area requirement minimizing size at 10,000 square feet. Bethel University President Walter Butler addressed the Council about the agreement between the university and the City of McKenzie concerning a 25% discount on tuition for full-time employees. President Butler and Jackie Puckett, Professional Development recruiter, also announced starting June 2, any adult can take the first class for free through the university's College of Professional Studies. Butler stated this is part

of Bethel's way of celebrating Carroll County's 200th birthday and giving back to the community. Mayor Holland presented proclamations to Nathan Nanney, Logan Green, Dakota Hall and Paul Prescott for representing TCAT-McKenzie in Chattanooga at the state level of the Skills USA Competition. The four gentlemen earned the chance to attend the national competition in Atlanta. Discussion on McKenzie employee incentives was tabled for further discussion. A workshop will be scheduled at a later date. During citizens' input, Ruth Umstead of Oaklawn Drive urged the City to look into possible ways of slowing drivers in her neighborhood. She stated she was worried a pedestrian or child riding a bicycle would be run over. Umstead added the individuals speeding are not living in the neighborhood but folks using Oaklawn as a way of traveling between Hinkledale Road and Highway 124 (Greenfield Highway). The next regular meeting of the City of McKenzie Board of Mayor and Council is June 9 at 6 p.m.

Those interested in the program must also have a high school diploma or G.E.D. No entrance exams or fees are required, and prospective students will be entered into an expedited application process to be completed at the first class meeting on June 7. The on-site process includes application, on-site financial aid guidance and academic advisement. Bethel recently announced a 25% tuition discount to City of McKenzie employees. Those employees who reside in Carroll County can still enroll in the first class for free and apply the 25% city employee tuition discount to future courses. The free tuition offer has a value of over \$1,000 and is aimed at prospective learners who may have been hesitant in the past to apply to college due to financial constraints. "These degree programs have classes that meet one night per week on the McKenzie campus and are designed to be manageable for adult learners with work and family responsibilities. We encourage all Carroll County residents who have been hesitant about enrolling in college to use this opportunity to give college a try, risk free," said CPS Vice President Kimberly Martin. This innovative approach to support residents who desire an advance degree comes at a time of rising costs from consumer products to gasoline, but also with a keen eye toward growth—and plentiful job opportunities—in West Tennessee upon completion of Ford's Blue Oval City and other develop-

ment expected to follow. The project will create more than 5,800 jobs in the immediate area and many more across the region once parts and materials suppliers set up shop in nearby counties in support of supply chains. According to the State of Tennessee's website, "the impact of the project will hit every community in West Tennessee and beyond." Bethel's move to make education more affordable also comes at a time when tuition rates remain at all-time highs despite an across-the-board average decline when adjusted for inflation. According to

an article at CNBC.com, tuition rates at four-year, private institutions rose by 2.1% during the 2021-22 academic year. 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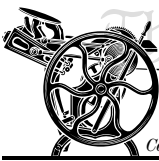

What struck me as interesting besides the cost of groceries and clothing was the civility of the campaigns that ran for various offices.

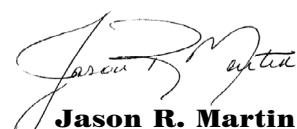
Vaughn Lawrence ran against Bobby McDonald for Mayor of McKenzie. The presiding mayor, Swat Scarborough, decided to not seek re-election and ran for Sheriff of Carroll County against Doug Brandon.

Huntingdon's Dale Kelley entered into the political arena by running for Carroll County Property Assessor. Mr. Kelley would go on to become a state representative and the Mayor of Huntingdon.

I found an article about McKenzie's Jim Alexander not seeking the Democratic nomination for governor. That one came as a surprise as I didn't know he ever considered it.

Of course, there were numerous photos of weddings and engagements. Two front-page death announcements of prominent citizens caught my eye; Charles Covington of Covington Drug Store which later became Super Drugs

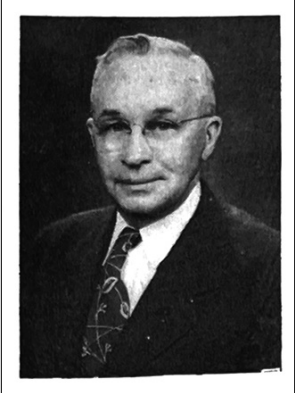
and J.W. Atkins who was the owner of Tri-County Motor Company. Next week, I will share more of my finds.

McKenzie Police Reports

Theft — Fred Morris, owner of Homefinders, contacted McKenzie Police stating that one of his recently evicted tenants had stolen items from the house he were evicted from.

Upon the death of his father in 1985, Crais was inspired to create Elvis Cole, using elements of his own life as the basis of the story. Resulting

with the novel "The Monkey's Raincoat" which won the Anthony and Macavity Awards and was nominated for the Edgar Award.

The novels of Robert Crais have been published in 62 countries and are the best-sellers around the world. Crais is a caring, thorough person who says "I'm going to do what I'm going to do", "You know I'm a writer, I'm a storyteller, I'm using characters to explore things I want to explore. I just hope that books are entertaining."

Robert currently lives in the Santa Monica mountains with his wife, two cats, and many thousands of books.

Charlotte Had Those Strong Cowgirl Hands

Our high school auditorium was old even before I got there. It actually creaked at times. It was "big and wide" with a smell and a feel that was unique, yet comfortable. And it was oh, so versatile.

It had been a basketball court. But that was also before my time. The PTA held the annual Halloween carnival there. The junior and senior class plays were performed on its big stage. The Tennessee Highway Patrol would come once a year and give a safety driving talk and show a movie of wrecked vehicles, I assumed that was aimed at slowing us down.

I remember the famous lady who played the piano and sang for us in that old auditorium. Her name was Norma something or other.....We'd slip down between classes and watch a little of the World Series on the big floor model TV, with the small black and white screen, that claimed a spot on the far right side of the stage.

It was on that same TV where we watched in silent horror on the Friday afternoon in November as the live updates of President Kennedy being shot unfolded in front of us. I remember, like it was yesterday, the grainy face of Dan Rather reporting from Dallas.

That auditorium was big enough to hold the entire school if we had some important program or Mr. Warren wanted to talk to all of us at once. And, of course, we held every school dance that I ever attended in that room.

Me and Buddy would sit in there sometimes by ourselves and do a "hello check" just to listen to the echo. And it once housed a cow overnight. But I can't tell that story because Leon wasn't

sure about when the statute of limitations might run out on a deed like that.....

And that venerable old auditorium—so familiar, so accommodating, so important to so many—played host to thousands of seniors on graduation after graduation..... You talk about a legacy and a half!

Miss Polly lined up the Class of 1965 in the hallway just outside the doors. I'm not sure any of us really understood the significance of where we stood in life. We had just advanced "one grade at a time" through the process.

I had known most of the seventy-two students since the first grade. It had been a great ride. And I would not have dared to do it with anybody else!

We were laughing and "carrying on" out in the hall, just like always! We were going to enjoy this....

Except something happened when Billy Rutledge hit the first note of the Processional, the dressed up crowd quieted, and we started to march into that auditorium for the final time. Charlotte Melton was squeezing my hand so hard I was losing the feeling in it. Buddy looked a little white around the gills. I couldn't think of anything funny to say.

In less than a heartbeat, we were all taking a new look at life. We weren't sure (and I am still not till this day) whether we were graduating FROM something or TO something! But things were going to be different. We were not adults by any stretch of the imagination, but we were taking some kind of step for sure in that direction.

Anne Alexander started across the stage to accept the

first diploma and I thought how much she had encouraged and even "pushed" me in the classroom. LaRenda Bradfield and I had danced the twist back in junior high. Bobby Brewer spent so much time at my house I thought he was an extra brother.

Kenny Butler was a heck of a first baseman. Pam Collins told me what to do.... with some authority to it! Phil Cook was simply one of the best people you could ever know. Suzie Cozart was in near 'bout every class I ever attended.....

I went through them one at a time as each walked across that stage. I might not see some ever again. That's sobering. And somewhere between the aforementioned Processional and Billy playing us out of that meeting, I fell in love with the whole class....all over again!

And that feeling has remained steadfast throughout the years. It's why I am still writing about them fifty-seven years after the fact.

Graduation is certainly a celebration of past accomplishments and a definite springboard to the future. It is especially great when you enjoy it with your best friends.

I don't know one person graduating from McKenzie High School this year. But I feel a kinship with them. I congratulate them. They are Rebels for a lifetime.... It can't get any better than that!

They tore the old auditorium down years ago. It's all gone. The stage, basketball goals, piano, the old TV set....

But they didn't take the memories.....

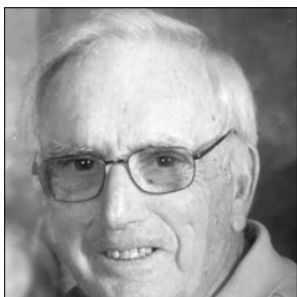

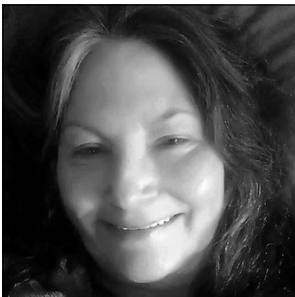

Macaroni and Cheese Casserole

1 1/2 cups uncooked elbow macaroni
1/2 stick butter or margarine
2 tablespoon flour

2 cups milk
2 tablespoons mustard (yellow or Dijon)
8 ounce cream cheese, cubed
12 ounces Velveeta cheese, cubed
Salt and pepper to taste

2 tablespoon dried parsley flakes
Crushed Ritz crackers
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In large saucepan, cook macaroni according to package directions and drain. In medium saucepan melt butter and add flour, stir well. Add milk, mustard, cream cheese, Velveeta, salt and pepper. Stir until cheeses melt and mixture is smooth (you may have to use a whisk to get it smooth). Combine this mixture with cooked, drained noodles. Pour mixture into large, buttered casserole dish. Top with cracker crumbs and bake in oven for 25-30minutes.

Cheese Grits Casserole

1 cup cooking grits (prepared as directed)
1 (6 ounce) roll garlic

cheese
1 stick butter
2 eggs, beaten
3/4 cup milk
Cook grits as directed on package. Add cubed cheese and butter and stir until blended. Let cool, then add milk and eggs. Pour into 6 cup casserole dish or 9x11 long baking dish. Bake uncovered for 1 hour at 375 degrees.

Corn Casserole

1 can cream style corn
1 can whole kernel corn, drained
1 onion, chopped
1 bell pepper, chopped
2/3 cup milk
1 egg, beaten
1 cup cracker crumbs
1 cup grated cheddar cheese
1/4 cup melted butter
2 tablespoon sugar
Mix all ingredients together. Bake in 350 degree

oven for 1 hour. Note: This may be made and refrigerated until ready to bake.

Florida Cabbage Slaw

1 pound bacon
1 head cabbage
3 medium bell peppers
1 large white onion
4 small salad tomatoes
Worcestershire sauce
Fry bacon and save grease. Cut cabbage, pepper and onion into bite size chunks. Put in a big pot and stir in bacon grease. Put a little salt and pepper in and stir. Put lid on and cook. About 5 minutes before it is to be done, add Worcestershire sauce (as much as you want to taste). When you remove from heat, add quartered tomatoes and crumbled bacon and serve.

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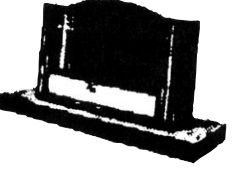

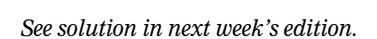

Missing Rifle Scope — On Feb. 9, Huntingdon Director of Public Safety Walter Smothers reported that a 4.5 x 14" Leopold rifle scope valued at \$750 has come up missing from a box in a storage room at the Huntingdon Police Department.

Smothers said the scope was transferred from the evidence room to the storage room about a year ago, though he said the scope might have been misplaced.

Multiple Charges — Desmond Jamone Stewart, 24, of Milan was charged with felony evading, aggravated assault on a first responder (two counts), and reckless endangerment, and Caitlyn Madison Armstrong, 19, of Humboldt was charged with felony evading, all following a high-speed pursuit in Carroll, Gibson, and Crockett Counties.

According to the report by Deputy Dakota Meier, he attempted to pull over a Ford Fusion driven by Stewart with multiple passengers, including Armstrong, after observing suspicious behavior; detecting the odor of marijuana, and seeing the vehicle swerve across the centerline. The vehicle sped away on Little Grove Road, and Meier and other deputies pursued the vehicle along Little Grove Road, Terry Road, Highway 104, Highway 220, Highway 70, Highway 79, Highway 77, and Peggy Lane. Unsuccessful attempts were made to spike the vehicle's tires by other deputies. The pursuit continued into Gibson County, and a Tennessee Highway Patrol Helicopter observed three people get out of the Fusion and get into a white car, which was later pulled over by Humboldt and Crockett County officers with six occupants being detained. Meier went to the scene and spoke with Stewart, who admitted to being the driver of the Fusion. Officers searched the Fusion, which smelled of marijuana, but no illegal substances were found.

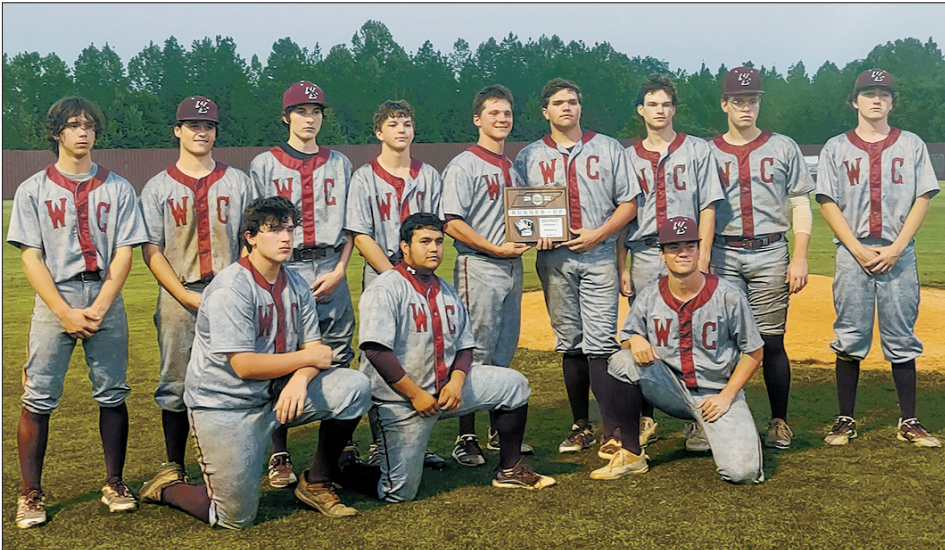
