serve in the absence of the mayor and to assume the position of mayor if it becomes vacant.

A \$100 Christmas bonus was approved for each full-time employee of the city.

The board acknowledged the general debt obligation of \$350,000 to pay for the recent paving of University Drive, Forrest Avenue-Extended, Cherry Avenue, Magnolia, and Carroll streets.

The board approved the invoice of \$,7300 to Pepper's Automotive Group for the installation of a replacement Jasper engine

in a Dodge patrol car; and \$5,300 for the replacement of a portion of the self-contained air packs for firefighters.

In department reports, Water Superintendent Bill Wood said PRI Pavement Restoration has been patching the streets where the Water Department made cuts to make repairs.

Johnny Mercer, Street Department superintendent, said the leaf truck's vacuum system had to have a new impeller and is back in service. The department is making repairs to a sidewalk on West End Avenue.

Mike Beasley, Parks Department superintendent, said his staff replaced the roof on the dugout that was damaged during recent winds. Also, they started installing the fence at the new dog park, funded by the Randy

Boyd Foundation.

Brian Tucker, fire chief, said the department had a total of calls of 19, but only three fires – one vehicle, one commercial, and one residential. He said the department is using Crestview Motors to make the repairs for the larger equipment. He said the 1987 model water tanker needs major repairs because it was never designed to transport 2,000 gallons of water. It is also a straight shift, which some of the younger firefighter cannot drive.

Mayor Holland complimented Tucker for constructing the grand marshal's sleigh and for he and the Street Department personnel painting it. She also complimented the Parks Department for decorating the downtown park for the Christmas festivities.

An agreement for Community Development Partners, LLC to provide administrative services for the 2018 CDBG Sewer System Improvements grant project was approved. The total cost for administrative services is expected

to be \$30,000. This Community Development Block Grant project includes flow monitoring in the main basins of the sewer system and replaces pumps and controls at the Hwy 22 and Williams St. sewer pump stations.

An engineering agreement with Tegrah Engineering relating to the 2015 Safe Routes to School Grant was approved by the council. Funds for the Clark Street Sidewalk Phase I project was given on January 24, 2017

in the amount of \$23,500. An amendment to the agreement became necessary due to additional services and changes to services of the engineer relating to the project. The amendment amount is \$5,500 for a total adjusted agreement amount of \$29,000.

Prior to adjourning, the council voted to cancel the next meeting which falls on December 25. The council will meet again on January 8, 2019.

citizens of Gleason, who have signed my petition. We are petitioning you to hire Officer David King as our new chief of police for our city. We feel that Officer King is the most qualified for this position. He has been in law enforcement for 25 years and has been employed in Gleason for 13 of those years, serving and protecting us. He has been assistant chief of police for eight of those years. He has exemplified professionalism, common sense, concern, and compassion to all of the citizens of Gleason.

"During his service, Officer King has done many things beyond the call of duty," Vaughn continued. "Most of us have no idea the things he has done for others, including helping those who have fallen and needed assistance. He came on his day off to help with the 5K charity run. He has been to our school many times, sometimes carrying his dog Ruin, our drug dog, to meet with our children and grandchildren. This helps them understand that our officers are their friend and not someone to fear. He did these things out of care and concern and respect for us, and not because he needed a pat on the back. Officer King was the handler and caretaker of Ruin, and at the time, drugs were not such a prominent problem in our town.

"Most of us in this room also consider David as a friend. We the citizens, business owners and landowners, request you vote to appoint David King as our next police chief."

The board was asked if Officer King has been doing a sufficient job since working for the City of Gleason.

Alderman Doug Johnson replied, "As far as I'm concerned he has done a good job."

The audience member stated King should have been appointed chief, just as soon as Chief Hazlewood retired.

Alderman Phelps' motion to appoint David King as Gleason's

new police chief was seconded by Alderman Doug Johnson. Both Phelps and Johnson voted yes, while Mayor Diane Poole and aldermen Jerry "Bubba" Dunn and Keith Radford voted no.

Next, Alderman Dunn made a motion to hire Paul Eddlemon as Gleason's next police chief, which was seconded by Alderman Radford. Those voting to hire Officer Eddlemon as chief of police for the City of Gleason were: Alderman Dunn, Alderman Radford and Mayor Poole. Aldermen Phelps and Johnson voted against. The motion passed by a vote of 3-2.

Members of the audience and others insisted that the mayor talk about the board's decision not to hire Officer King for the job of chief.

Mayor Poole loudly struck her gavel telling the audience to "stop it."

When Alderman Dunn was reminded that he was elected to carry out the wishes of the people, he said, "If you want my seat, come and get it." He stated he would be willing to offer his resignation, if that's what the people wanted.

Although he was criticized for not voting as the citizens wished, they made it clear they didn't want his resignation.

A member of the audience stated, according to the labor laws, if an employee is written up for any reason, they must be confronted by their employer with whatever infraction they may have committed, and it has to be signed.

Assistant Chief King laid his file on a table and offered to let anyone look at his record for themselves if they wished.

After the audience continued to insist the board offer an explanation for their actions, finally, Alderman Radford said, "I like David. But, I didn't offer David the job. If the police department had done their job for the last so many years, we might not have as many drugs in this neighborhood. But we have them. We had people living behind my house that law enforcement knew about, but nothing was done about it un-

til we showed up and knocked it down. For these reasons, I made my comments and made my decisions. Drugs might not have been in my family, if we as citizens had all done what we should have many years ago. But we deal with it today."

Alderman Dunn stated he made his decision based on the applications and interviews with prospective officers seeking the job of police chief. Dunn added that he respects everyone, but feels it might be good to bring someone in from the outside to deal with the drug problem.

A gentleman in the audience said, "I retired from the Sheriff's Department about a year ago. In all of the cities around here, we have drug problems. The drugs are here. Many times, I called that man over there (Officer King) and he backed me up. He was right there. We need somebody who knows the people. If I have to put my life on the line, I'll pick that man (Officer King) seven days a week and twice on Sunday."

Mayor Poole finally gave the reasons for her vote, saying, when she first got elected, "I told Officer King to work with Chief Hazlewood to have the best police department in Weakley County and from what I've seen, that has not taken place." She mentioned there have been too many people speeding and not enough tickets written.

When the meeting finally adjourned, Sheriff's Deputy Danny Browning, who was working as a part-time officer for the City of Gleason, showed his support for Officer King by tossing his police uniforms on the mayor's desk and walking out, indicating that he is resigning as a Gleason police officer.

After the meeting, Alderman Phelps was asked about Officer Eddlemon's background. He replied that the officer is from Gleason, and previously worked at the Weakley County Jail for about six to eight months. He has also worked in the private sector, and Eddlemon has served as a policeman in McKenzie for the past year or so.

Farm Bill Passage, Great for Area

Washington, D.C. (December 12) — Congressman David Kustoff (TN-08) released the following statement following the passage of the conference report for H.R.2, the Agriculture and Nutrition Act of 2018. Also known as the 2018 Farm Bill, this bipartisan legislation supports our nation's farmers and foresters by reauthorizing farm programs and directing the nation's agricultural policy for the next five years.

Congressman Kustoff said: "When I ran to represent West Tennessee, I promised to listen to our farmers and fight for their priorities. Across the nation, farmers and ranchers have been struggling as incomes have dropped nearly 50 percent over the last 5 years. I have visited farms all throughout West Tennessee and heard directly from those farmers about how this Farm Bill would make a huge positive impact on their operations.

"That is why I am proud to have voted in favor of the Farm Bill that provides stability for some of the hardest working families in America. The Farm Bill has

wins for rural communities including protections against natural disasters and unfair foreign trade practices. It also stimulates rural development programs like broadband, research, and extension of USDA's ability to support those who work hard to put food on our tables and clothes on our backs."

Among many important provisions, the 2018 Farm Bill:

- Supports the cotton industry by addressing overly restrictive family farm eligibility requirements and allowing and full access to the marketing loan program;
- Maintains and strengthens the Crop Insurance program;
- Preserves the Administration's regulatory flexibility on SNAP benefits, including USDA's ability to reign in states who abuse the waiver process;
- Creates new broadband standards and provides new incentives for borrowers to develop high-speed broadband networks; and
- Provides all rural communities access to guaranteed lending programs that finance critical infrastructure projects.

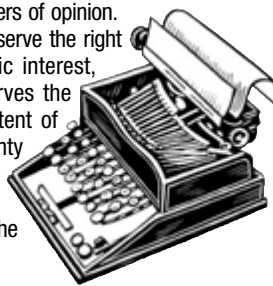

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Carroll County Senior Choir Enjoys Christmas Outing

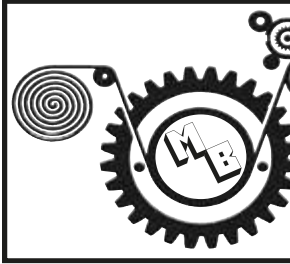

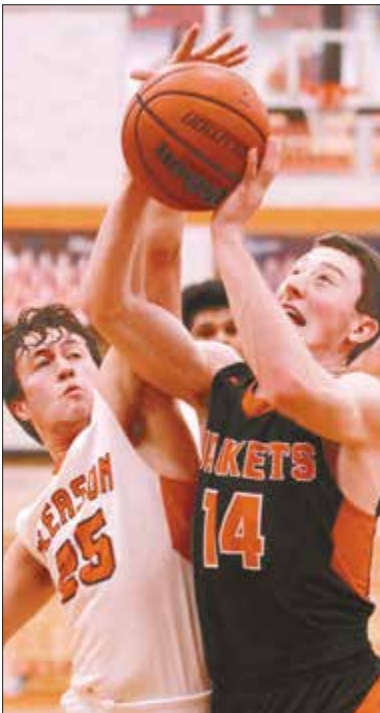
Both teams utilized the full-court press throughout the contest. The first points of the contest were scored at the 5:42 in the first quarter by Tess Darby.

Bethel University Hall of Famer, Former Huntingdon Coach Dies

MCKENZIE — There are times we are reminded it is not really important who won or lost the game or who scored the most points. The Bethel University family and the Matt English family mourn the loss of Matt who was one of the great basketball players ever at Bethel College/University. Matt died Monday morning, December 10, at the age of 45 after a courageous fight against cancer.

He graduated from Bethel in 1996 and was inducted into the Bethel Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006. English remains Bethel's all-time career leader in points with 2, 530. He had the most career field goals in Wildcat history with 944. He is the leader in career rebounds with 1, 531. As a matter of fact his name is in almost every category in the Bethel record book.

As great as he was on the basketball court he was and is known as even a greater person. His legacy is greater than just records. Ask any Bethel supporter or follower through the years and his name always is one of the first if not the first spoken.

After his Bethel career he coached boys' basketball and was a girls' softball assistant at Huntingdon High School during the 96-97 and 97-98 school years. The girls' softball team won the district, region and finished 3rd in the state 97-98 while he was an assistant. He left Huntingdon and returned to his home in Indiana.

Huntingdon High School Principal and current Mustang Basketball coach Jonathan Kee played for English as a freshman and sophomore. Kee has fond memories of English and credits his coaching with him being able to play at the college level. He remembers English being a tough individual and being very detailed in his coaching. "I received a handwritten letter from Coach English after he left following my sophomore year. The letter encouraged me to stay with it and keep working hard on the court," said Kee. "I had contact with English as recently as a year ago."

English returned to Indiana and spent the remainder of his years coaching basketball in his home state. He joined the Beech Grove City Schools in 2008, when he started his career as a Hornet and as a classroom teacher at Beech Grove High School. In 2012, he was named the high school's athletic director. In September, the Beech Grove City School Board voted to name the high school basketball court in Matt's honor.

Matt's "We Before Me" mantra resonated in everything he did — as a coach, teacher, mentor, husband, father, son, colleague, and friend. He bravely stood tall throughout his illness and showed up for his "boys" and other Beech Grove High School students and staff by always offering kind and encouraging words. Matt's life demonstrated his commitment, love, dedication, and strength to everyone in which he came in contact.

Former Bethel Coach Mike Nienaber expressed his thoughts and emotions about Matt and his legacy. "Matt was

up down there in McKenzie. Needless to say, I wanted him to know how much our short period of time together meant to me 20 plus years later.

"Even during that hard time, after he knew the odds were against him and his time was limited, he never mentioned himself. He mentioned the memories, the team, and the impact Bethel had on us all. It gave us a chance to be together, to compete together, and to make memories together. He, along with Scott Hamm and Dave Moore kept us together while we were all hundreds of miles away from home playing at Bethel. They were the guys that didn't let the younger players get home sick, they created a family atmosphere and led us on and off the court. I was fortunate to "lace em" up with those guys and not a day goes by that I don't think of each of them."

Kelley summed up his thoughts with this post to social media: "Open gym upstairs(in Heaven) just got a new player from what they say. There is this new kid standing on the sidelines calling "next game". Initially you will think he is undersized for his position, he can't be that athletic, looks like he can't jump...not the flare some of the others here may have. Well let me fill you all in up there, it's best to jump on that new guy's team. He will be everything you could ever want in a teammate, leader, friend, and coach. He will allow the team to jump on his back, he will fight the bully and do all the dirty work. If you need a bucket when its close, go to him. When you miss shots, he gets offensive rebounds. When you hit shots, he pats you on the ass and tells you great job. If things get loud, he calms the place. If things seem stagnant, he gets loud. Most of all, when you play on his team you win. Scoreboard may not always show it, but I promise you he never lost. I am happy he's in his new home town looking for a game. You guys are lucky to have him around joining you. Your game just got a lot better."

Dave Moore: "You will always be the teammate I looked up to the most. You will always be my friend I could rely on the most. You will always be the best player I ever played with. You and Scott used to win every sprint in practice and I never understood how you did it until much later. It was your Heart, your determination, and your toughness that made you a great player. It was your heart, your compassion, your loyalty, and your spirit that made you a great person, son, father, husband, friend, teacher, coach, brother. I will grieve for you and your family in this very difficult time. But I also know that your spirit will live on in every person you have touched throughout your life. You will always be that person that reached out to a lonely 18 year old kid in his first night in McKenzie and made everything cool!"

Visitation for English was held Friday, December 14, at the Beech Grove High School Gym in Beech Grove, IN. Services were held Saturday, December 15, at Park Chapel Christian Church in English's hometown of Greenfield, IN. He was laid to rest at Washington Park East Cemetery in Indianapolis, IN.

used at Paris Vet Clinic. Vouchers expire one month from purchase. You can use these for your cat or the neighborhood stray. You can buy the vouchers for others to use for their cats. This is an ongoing program. Cats just need to weigh two pounds, which is usually at around eight weeks of age.
