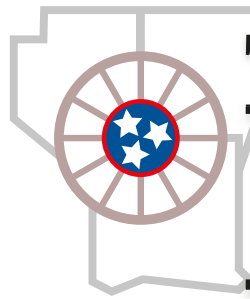

Bethel University Reaffirmed For 10-Year Accreditation

MCKENZIE — President Walter Butler announced Bethel University has earned its 10-year reaffirmation of accreditation through the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). The SACSCOC committee found Bethel in compliance and offered no further recommendations.

Reaccreditation is a multi-year process involving collaboration within the university's three colleges, its employees, and its students.

The university was reviewed by two com-

mittees: one off-site in November 2017, and one on-site campus visit in March 2018. The reviews were designed to assess the school's ability to provide quality educational opportunities while aligning with the school's mission. The On-Site Committee sent its report to the SACSCOC Board of Trustees, which reviewed the report and reaffirmed Bethel's accreditation during its annual meeting. Regional accreditation allows Bethel University to participate in federal (Title IV) and state

Carroll Lake Slated to Open Spring 2020

MCKENZIE — There's light at the end of the tunnel for local fishermen who, despite the arrival of the county's big lake in the

Leach community, remain partial to McKenzie's Carroll Lake.

After nearly six years dormant, the lake is scheduled to open in the spring of 2020, according to Tim Broadbent, Regional Fisheries Manager for the Tennessee Wildlife Resource Agency.

In June 2014, extreme heavy rains caused flooding at the lake, which left the flood gates heavily damaged. The lake had to be emptied, and it remained that way for 32 months until the gates were repaired, and

UTM Graduate Vows to Assist Others Despite Her Own Limitations

Jackson is a deaf-blind student and plans to use her degree to assist children and families with various disabilities. Cepparulo and two other interpreters have worked with Jackson throughout her time at UT Martin.

MARTIN — Ashley Jackson, of Nashville, is dedicating her career to helping young people overcome life's difficulties — something the deaf-blind professional knows well.

Jackson, a recent graduate of the University of Tennessee at Martin, majored in child and family studies and intends to use her training to help children and their families find the opportunities and resources they need to succeed in the classroom and in life.

"(A career counselor) told me about a position called an education assistant, and you work with a child who needs special attention in a special needs classroom. She suggested it might be something I would like to start off with," said Jackson.

She most recently completed an internship at Bridges for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing in Nashville, where she spent almost four months working with the after-school program and with children who have adverse childhood experiences. She led several classes where parents learn communication methods such as sign language and body language to interact with their deaf and hard-of-hearing children.

U.S. Postal Service Announces New Prices for 2019

WASHINGTON — The United States Postal Service filed notice with the Postal Regulatory Commission (PRC) today of price changes to take effect Jan. 27, 2019.

The proposed prices, approved by the Governors of the Postal Service, would raise Mailing

Services product prices approximately 2.5 percent. Shipping Services price increases vary by product. For example, Priority Mail Express will increase 3.9 percent and Priority Mail will increase 5.9 percent. Although Mailing Services price increases are based on the Consumer

Price Index (CPI), Shipping Services prices are primarily adjusted according to market conditions. The Governors believe these new rates will keep the Postal Service competitive while providing the agency with needed revenue.

If favorably reviewed by the PRC, the new prices will include a 5-cent increase in the price of a First-Class Mail Forever stamp.

County Highway Committee Votes to Purchase Backhoe

HUNTINGDON (December 13) — Carroll County Highway Committee voted unanimously to purchase a new Caterpillar 420 backhoe to replace an aging 1995 model.

Scotty Bailey said the new top-of-the-line backhoe is \$95,565 based on a "state bid" price. It is four-wheel-drive, air-conditioned cab, has an extend-a-bucket, and ride stabilizers to smooth the ride as it travels roads.

Bailey said the Highway Department has the budget for the new equipment and will sell the old backhoe on a government website, govdeals.

Counties and municipalities can use the state bid price on automobiles and other equipment without the need to seek bids locally.

A request to post speed limit signs along Roy Fields Road was denied. A resident on that road wrote a letter to Commissioner Larry Spencer asking for the signage. The Committee chose not to post the signs because most rural roads have no signage indicating speed.

from 50 cents to 55 cents. The single-piece additional ounce price will be reduced to 15 cents, so a 2-ounce stamped letter, such as a typical wedding invitation, will cost less to mail, decreasing from 71 cents to 70 cents.

First-Class Package Service, a lightweight expedited offering used primarily by businesses for fulfillment purposes, will move to zone-based pricing to better align with the cost of service and improve value based on distance.

The Postal Service has some of the lowest letter mail postage rates in the industrialized world and also continues to offer a great value in shipping. Unlike some other shippers, the Postal Service does not add surcharges for fuel, residential delivery, or regular Saturday or holiday season delivery.

the process of refilling began in January 2017.

Once the water reached a certain level, the TWRA began incrementally stocking the lake with a variety of species. When it reopens in 16 months, fishermen will be angling for Northern and Florida largemouth bass, catfish, blugill and redear sunfish. The TWRA also recently introduced walleye, a species good for winter fishing.

The lengthy delay in opening is intended to give the fish the opportunity to reach a sustainable

population.

In an interview with The Banner, Broadbent noted that state law prohibits any unauthorized stocking of the lake.

Carroll Lake's bait shop, which had previously been operated by a concessionaire, had to be torn down due to asbestos. Officials are looking into options for such a vendor and for a licensing system, and a decision will be announced closer to the 2020 opening.

Addressing concerns recently voiced by residents that the water seemed to be receding and that there was an odor of rotting vegetation, Broadbent said that the lake was at normal level during this time of year. He stated that the gates were opened temporari-

ly due to high water but are now closed. He attributed the odor to gases from vegetation degradation and exposure. "These are normal processes within a lake and at times can be quite noticeable. We will investigate the area and see if there are any unusual conditions that need to be addressed," he said.

Broadbent also reported that there had been some issues with vandalism at the lake. He advised that citizens take a "see something, say something" approach and report any suspicious activity to the TWRA during business hours at 731-423-5725 or to the Carroll County Sheriff's Department.

Fishing is allowed below the spillway while the lake is closed.

"I want to understand enough (about children) to be able to talk with the parents about how to understand their children better and how to communicate with them. I want to be a mediator between the parents and children who have special needs or are at-risk," she said. "I want to help with showing opportunities for the child ... whatever skills they need help with, whether it's for school or life at home or mobility skills."

Jackson's experiences as a deaf-blind person have given her unique insight into what children with vision, hearing and related mobility challenges face every day. She also has an advantage when helping parents and families understand the opportunities available for children facing similar struggles.

Her condition is one that developed over time, starting with the removal of ocular tumors formed by retinoblastoma – a type of cancer of the eyes. Her struggle to hear began with a series of severe ear infections as a young child.

"After my first birthday is when (my hearing) really started getting worse. ... It wasn't dramatic, but I still declined," she said.

In 2012, Jackson, her audiologist and other experts on her medical team began discussing cochlear implants. The clock was ticking,

as medical insurance would not cover the implants after her 21st birthday. Cochlear implants allow an external processing unit to communicate with electrodes in the brain to translate sound waves into discernable noises. But sometimes the operation is unsuccessful, and the person can lose all hearing ability.

"That's one of the biggest changes in my life, and one of the scariest ones too, because if it didn't work for me, I would be completely lost," she said. "I would have no hearing and no vision, so if it didn't work, that would have been a disaster. I wouldn't be able to be a part of society the way that I want to be. I'm just glad that it turned out the way that it did. ...

"We have people all over that are deaf-blind, and some people don't identify themselves that way because they don't know that deaf-blind is OK to be," Jackson said. "There's nothing wrong with being that way; it's just a good description of what you have."

Jackson has found ways to overcome her challenges and says the UT Martin community has supported her goals from the beginning.

"Sometimes the teachers will collaborate together to figure out a plan for how to help me and how I can help them. That's how we learn from each other, and we know what we can do for future reference... I can't do pictures and things that are more visual, so we have to talk about modifications that will allow me to do homework

along with the other students," she said.

Jackson uses a system of electronic aids to help her, including special software to read online documents aloud and Bluetooth braille translators for her iPhone and laptop. All her assignments were done electronically, with the translator changing on-screen text to braille and back again. She completed exams in the Student Success Center, where staff members fed an emailed file into a braille embosser, which then created a textured surface for Jackson to read.

With bachelor's degree in hand, Jackson plans to continue on to earn a master's degree in either public speaking or communications at Gallaudet University in Washington, D.C.

"It's a deaf university, but it also has people who are hearing," she said. "They get to learn about deaf culture and learn about American Sign Language. So it doesn't just have to be for deaf people. It can be for anyone who is interested in deaf culture."

While Jackson's time at UT Martin has come to an end, she hopes to have left the path a bit smoother for those who come behind her.

"I try to make things accessible for others who may be walking in my shoes later on," she said.

Jackson crossed the UT Martin commencement stage Dec. 15 to receive her Bachelor of Science degree in family and consumer sciences.

Dr. Walter Butler lauded the individuals and teams who worked to ensure the university's successful outcome.

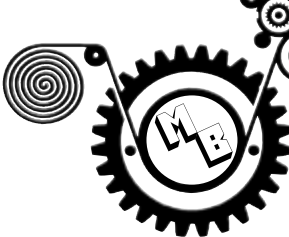

“In order to affect global change, education must evolve and expand to prepare all young people to create a brighter future,” says Professor Freeman. “We both understood what needed to be done to help solve for this deficit and we felt up to the challenge. Even in this new age of technology, where ideas, money, and goods can be transported around the globe in mere seconds—the term “global citizen” is still commonly misunderstood.”

According to Oxfam Education, “a global citizen is aware of and understands the wider world and their place in it. They take an active role in their community, and work with others to make our planet more equal, fair, and sustainable.” At Bright Light Volunteers (BLV), it is believed global citizens and leaders are created through high quality, rigorous education coupled with sustainable, international service. Through an innovative partnership with Bethel University (BU), together, they provide a ground-breaking global service learning and citizenship program where high school students enroll in a Global Service Learning and Citizenship course, for college credit or a certificate of global citizenship, prior to volunteering abroad. This unique, multifaceted approach to global citizenship education results in the deep global competence required of tomorrow’s leaders. Greenberg reports the BLV-BU partnership is working. Since inception, students who participate in Bright Light Volunteers’ Global Service Learning and

Citizenship programs report:

- Improved understanding of local, national, and global challenges
- Improved understanding of the interconnectedness of the worlds’ countries and people
- Willingness to act effectively and responsibly on a local, national, and international level
- Increased appreciation and respect for diversity
- Improved critical thinking skills for problem solving, peacemaking, and social responsibility
- Increased empathy for others and the environment

In addition to these findings, 100 percent of BLV high school participants graduate and attend college. This is especially encouraging in the rural, Title One schools where Freeman and Greenberg are creating opportunities. By all accounts, this dynamic duo really is reshaping the educational landscape and challenging the status quo when it comes to access to global education. “We’re determined to make the world a brighter place,” Greenberg smiles. “One student at a time.”

Bright Light Volunteers is a 501(c)(3), non-profit organization, designed to empower program participants and community partners through education and service. Specifically, our programs adhere to global service-learning best practices, which combine community service with both experiential learning in the field and online coursework through our university partner. 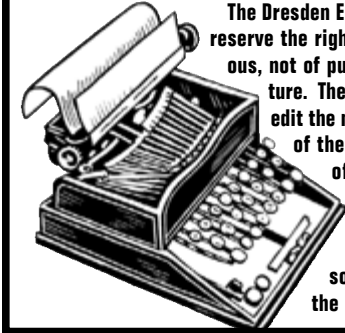

SPRINGVILLE, Tenn. — Imagine watching hundreds of waterfowl rising from the lake, birding behind sanctuary gates, sailing aboard a 100' yacht as eagles soar above, or enjoying the rock star speakers and legendary guides. Wings of Winter Birding Festival on Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley is an exceptional opportunity for serious birdwatchers, new birders and outdoor enthusiasts. Slated for January 18-20, 2019, registration has been extended through December 31.

Headquartered in Paris, Tenn., the event focuses on the 150-plus migratory bird species that winter in Kentucky and Barkley Lakes in West Tennessee and Western Kentucky. "The Wings of Winter's guided trips feature some of the most storied birding locations in the Southeast, as well as stellar guides," said Joan Howe. Destinations include Cross Creeks National Wildlife Refuge, Tennessee National Wildlife Refuge's Units at Duck River Bottoms and Big Sandy, Kentucky Dam and Harmon Creek Wildlife Management Area, Paris Landing State Park, Land Between the Lakes and the Nature Station, and Ft. 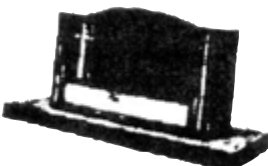

WHITE FUDGE

3 pounds sifted powdered sugar
 7/8 cup of evaporated milk
 1/2 pound margarine (solid Sticks preferred)
 1 teaspoon salt
 Melt margarine in a saucepan and add evaporated milk and salt (melt on very low heat). Gradually pour in powdered sugar, stirring well. Put waxed paper in a pan and pour contents of saucepan into pan. Let cool and harden.

OLD FASHIONED
TEA CAKES

1 cup margarine
 2 cups sugar
 3 eggs
 2 tablespoons buttermilk
 5 cups self-rising flour
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Cream margarine, add sugar gradually. Add eggs one at a time then continue to beat. Add buttermilk and flour. Stir in vanilla. Chill the dough for several hours or overnight. Roll dough 1/4 inch thickness on a lightly floured surface. Cut into rounds using a three inch cutter. Place 1 inch apart on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees for 6-7 minutes. Be sure your oven rack is positioned high enough, so the cookies will not burn on the bottom. Yields 4 dozen.

CHESS CAKE
SQUARES

1 box Duncan Hines Yellow Cake Mix
 1 stick butter
 2 Eggs
 1 8-ounce package Kraft Cream Cheese, softened
 1 box Confectioner sugar
 Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix cake mix and butter as for pie crust and pat into 9x13 inch pan. Combine eggs, cream cheese and confectioner sugar. Pour over cake mixture and bake for 30 minutes or until golden brown. Cool and slice into squares.

5 cups regular oats, uncooked
 1 cup sunflower seeds
 1 cup flaked coconut
 1 cup chopped pecans
 1 cup sesame seeds
 1 cup soy flour
 1 cup nonfat dry milk solids
 1 cup wheat germ
 1 cup honey
 1 cup milk
 1 cup salad oil
 Combine first 8 ingredients, and mix well. Combine honey, milk, and salad oil; pour over dry mixture, and stir until well blended. Spread mixture on cookie sheets; bake at 300 degrees for 1 hour; stirring often.

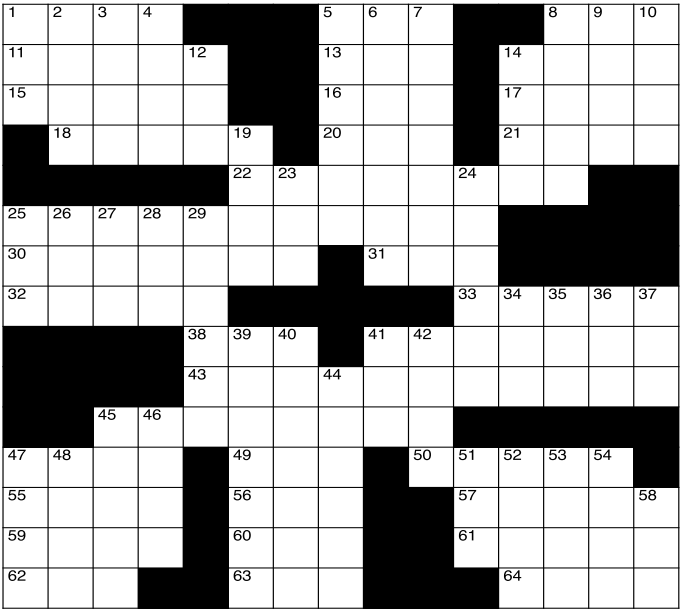

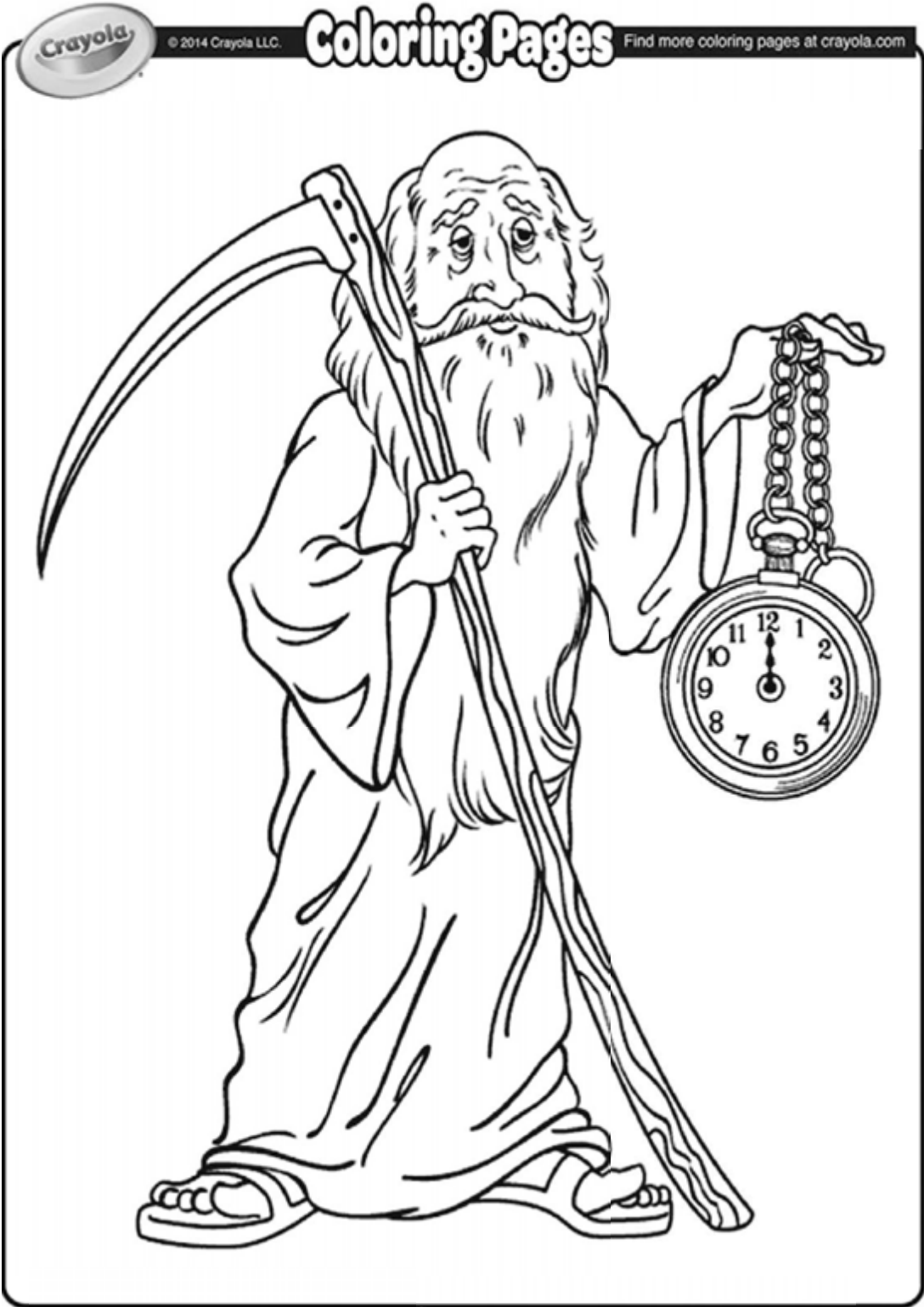
