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Candidates Begin Qualifying for November Municipal Elections

Three weeks have passed since June 20, the first day Carroll Countians could obtain petitions to run for local municipal office. As the August 18 qualification deadline nears, qualifying candidates have begun compiling in the county.

In order to qualify, candidates must pick up a petition for their office, gather 25 signatures, and file the petition with the Carroll County Election Commission. Signatures must be from registered voters eligible to vote for the office the candidate is seeking.

In the city of McKenzie, voters will elect five offices: one city mayor, three councilpersons at-large for a four-year term, and one councilperson for Ward IV for a two-year unexpired term. Mayoral candidates who have filed qualified petitions, as of July 7, are Joshua Wheat Filtz and Mary Jill Holland. Ryan Delano Griffin and Timothy T. McBride have also picked up petitions for McKenzie mayor. Of the two councilpersons at-large candidates, Bobby L. Young has filed a qualified petition. Timothy T. McBride has also picked up a petition. Gerald David Mer-

chant picked up a petition for councilman for Ward IV.

In McLemoresville, voters will elect one mayor and five aldermen, all for four-year terms. Sharron Dawn Holland has filed a petition for City of McLemoresville alderman. John Thomas Newsome and Don T. Reed have picked up petitions for the office. There are no candidates for the mayoral office and two remaining alderman offices.

Voters in the town of Atwood will elect one mayor and two aldermen, all for a four-year term. Qualifying mayoral candidates who have filed petitions are Fridie Algee Jr. and Thomas Michael Tolley. Ricky G. Long has also picked up a petition. Randall D. Long has picked up a petition for town of Atwood alderman.

In Bruceton, voters will elect one mayor and two aldermen. Jack R. Blocker and James A. Butler picked up alderman petitions. Robert T. Keeton, III picked up a petition for mayor. None of the petitions have been filed.

In Hollow Rock, voters will elect one mayor, three aldermen for a four-year term, and an alderman for a two-year unexpired term. Angela C. Stockdale picked

up a petition for alderman. Robert Vincent Brotherton and Matthew Townsend have picked up mayoral petitions. No petitions have been filed.

Huntingdon voters will elect three four-year council members and one council member with a two-year unexpired term. Neither office currently has candidates.

In the town of Trezevant, voters will elect two four-year aldermen and one alderman for a two-year unexpired term. Steve Robert Richardson has filed a petition for alderman. Donald M. Barger and Pamela D. Joyner have picked up petitions for alderman.

The local municipal election is November 8, along with the state and federal general election. The voter registration deadline is October 11, and the absentee deadline is November 1. Early voting is October 19-November 3.

The state general elections include the District 8 Representative on the United States Congressional House of Representatives, the District 76 and 79 Representatives on the Tennessee House of Representatives, and the Tennessee Governor.

Man Sentenced for 2019 Beathard Death

NASHVILLE (July 6) — A Nashville jury found 25-year-old Michael Mosley guilty on all counts for the fatal stabbing of Franklin natives 22-year-old Clayton Beathard and 21-year-old Paul Trapani III. Mosley was sentenced to serve two consecutive life sentences plus up to 40 additional years in prison following Wednesday’s conviction.

The incident occurred December 21, 2019 outside the Dogwood Bar & Grill in Midtown Nashville. Mosley stabbed and killed Beathard and Trapani, critically injured A.J. Bethurum, leaving him blind, and assaulted another. Metro police reported the incident resulted from an argument over a

woman that began inside the bar and turned physical when the parties went outside.

Mosley was convicted of first-degree murder in March 2022 in the stabbing deaths.

At Wednesday’s sentencing, Mosley received two life sentences to be served consecutively for the first-degree murders of Beathard and Trapani. He was also sentenced between three and 40 additional years for attempted first-degree murder, to be served at 85 percent, and felony assault.

Mosley’s criminal record including jail assaults, aggravated assault, and robbery were important elements in deciding the

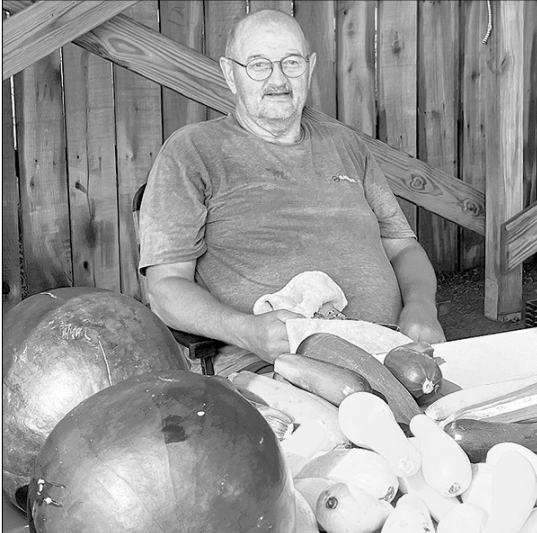
severity of his sentence, according to Davidson County Criminal Court Judge Angelita Dalton.

Mosley is housed in Nashville’s Metro jail and awaits transfer to a permanent facility with the Tennessee Department of Correction.

Clayton Beathard was the son of former McKenzian Susan Beathard and country music songwriter Casey Beathard of Thompson Station, the brother of NFL quarterback C.J. Beathard and country musician Tucker Beathard, and the grandson of NFL Hall of Famer Bobby Beathard. He was also the grandson of Cindy Summers of McKenzie and the late Jerry Connell.

Henderson Pipeline Loses 200,000 Gallons of Oil

HENDERSON — A pipeline crossing eight states burst in Henderson, Tenn., leaking more than 200,000 gallons of crude oil into the rural town. This is the second-largest crude oil spill in Tennessee’s history.

The leak sourced from the Mid-Valley Pipeline Company, a line spanning roughly 1,000 miles. The Department of Transportation’s Pipeline and Hazardous Safety Materials Administration (PHMSA) reported the pipeline dumped close to 4,800 barrels of crude oil into the surrounding area in Chester County.

PHMSA reports a worker ruptured the pipeline with a lawn mower.

The spill occurred on June 29 at 12:34 p.m. and the release was stopped on June 30 at about 11:40 a.m. through the installation of a clamp on the damaged pipe, according to the National Response Center report.

The pipeline company is federally required to submit a report to PHMSA within 30 days, which will reveal

how fast the pipeline operator shut down the flow of oil after the leak was detected.

“Until they shut those valves down, oil is going to continue leaking out of that pipeline. When you have a spill of this size, it often means it was not shut down very quickly,” said Bill Caram, director of Pipeline Safety Trust, a watchdog group.

Officials with the PHMSA said the oil spill flowed into Horse Creek, which flows into the South Forked Deer River. The river flows into the recharge zone of the Memphis Sand Aquifer, Tennessee’s largest aquifer.

Emergency responders closed dams and placed buoys to catch the oil in the creek before it reached the river, according to officials.

The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) is helping clean the spill along with the Environmental Protection Agency. TDEC will monitor water quality weekly for pollutants like benzene, toluene, ethyl ben-

zene, xylene and extractable petroleum hydrocarbons. TDEC reports the state may order additional water quality monitoring as the clean-up progresses.

While the spill may have narrowly avoided the aquifer, it will impact the local ecosystem along Horse Creek.

“Creeks have delicate ecosystems, and a spill like this can be really devastating. It can take a very long time for a creek to recover, and it many cases it may never fully recover,” Caram said.

The Mid-Valley Pipeline Company transmission route starts in Texas, passes through Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky and Ohio, and ends in Michigan. It is owned by Energy Transfer Partners.

The largest crude oil spill recorded in Tennessee was an approximately 357,000-gallon spill in Clarksville in 1988, also on the Mid-Valley Pipeline Company system.

Lexington Man Charged with Arson, Aggravated Burglary

BUENA VISTA — An investigation by special agent fire investigators with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation has resulted in the arrest of a Lexington man accused of arson and burglary.

On July 7, TBI agents joined the Carroll County Fire Department, Carroll County Sheriff's Office,

Henderson County Sheriff's Office, and Office of 24th Judicial District Attorney General Matt Stowe in investigating a residential fire that occurred in the 600 block of Buena Vista School Road in Buena Vista. Investigators determined the fire had been intentionally set. During the investigation, information was quickly

developed identifying David Ables (DOB: 12/3/56) as the individual responsible for the fire.

Yesterday afternoon, Ables was taken into custody and booked into the Carroll County Jail on charges of Arson and Aggravated Burglary. He was released on \$50,000 bond yesterday evening.

Trezevant Receives \$88,500 Water Improvement Loan

NASHVILLE (June 30) — Gov. Bill Lee and Commissioner David Salyers of the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) announced an \$88,500 loan for the Town of Trezevant to improve water infrastructure.

The loan is one of seven approved by the Tennessee Local Development Authority, with five loans for the Hamilton County Water and Wastewater Treatment Authority and one loan for the Town of Smyrna totaling \$3.7 million.

"We are pleased we can assist communities with these loans as they make infrastructure more affordable," Lee said. "It is important that Tennesseans receive reliable services, and we are grateful to the local officials working to

provide them."

"Water infrastructure is crucial," Salyers said. "We are glad we can make these loans available, and we look forward to the results that will come from this assistance."

The loan for the Town of Trezevant comes from the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program. The loan addresses improvements to the water treatment system and has a five-year term at 0.1 percent interest.

Through the State Revolving Fund Loan Program, communities, utility districts, and water and wastewater authorities can obtain loans with lower interest rates than through private financing. These low interest rate loans can vary from zero percent to below mar-

ket rate, based on each community's economic health.

This fiscal year, TDEC has awarded \$26,192,400 in drinking water loans and \$82,825,220 in clean water loans to meet the state's infrastructure needs. During fiscal year 2021, TDEC awarded \$7,171,000 in drinking water loans and \$77,568,000 in clean water loans for a total of \$84,739,000.

Tennessee's Clean Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program has awarded more than \$2 billion in low-interest loans since its inception in 1987. The state's Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program has awarded more than \$300 million in low-interest loans since its inception in 1996.

School Board Association (TSBA) policy dealing with transfers within the school system. School Director Preston Caldwell indicated that this policy doesn't really apply to West Carroll but needed to be placed in the Policy Manual due to it being a TSBA policy.

Crystal Polinski presented a Fiscal Year 2023 Consolidated Application for IDEA/ESEA funds. IDEA is the Individuals with Disabilities Act while ESEA is the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. ESEA is the nation's national education law primarily responsible for funding primary and secondary education. The board approved the proposed application.

Director Caldwell presented several updated

handbooks for the board's approval. They included the WCSSD Student-Parent Handbook, Acceptable Uses for Chromebook Devices, West Carroll Primary School Student Handbook, West Carroll Elementary School Student Handbook, West Carroll Junior-Senior High School Student Handbook, West Carroll Junior-Senior High Athletic Handbook, and West Carroll Junior-Senior High School Coaches Handbook. All of the handbooks were approved by the board.

The board discussed changing the August board meeting date since the date falls on August 4 which is the opening week of school. The board agreed to move the meeting to the next week on August 11 at 6 p.m.

Peg Hamlett, Administration of Elections in the County of Carroll, advised members of the Election Commission of the complaint during the July 7 meeting of that commission. The complaint questions the eligibility of Mr. Filtz, owner of Magnolia Mercantile, to seek office.

According to the McKenzie City Charter, "to be eligible for the office of Mayor, a person must be twenty-one (21) years of age or older and have been a resident of the City of McKenzie for at least one (1) year immediately preceding the election in which the Mayor is elected."

Keeton said Filtz is apparently not domiciled in McKenzie, but rather a resident of Gibson County. He does own real estate on Stonewall Street and Broadway Street and is a registered voter in the city, but that, in itself, does not provide the qualifications to seek the office of mayor.

Filtz picked up his petition at the Election Commission on June 20, 2022 - the first day to qualify. He submitted the petition with the signature of at least 25 registered municipal voters on June 23. The Election Commission indicates he had the necessary signatures to seek office.

Filtz said he owns multiple properties in McKenzie, a farm outside of McKenzie, and property in Gibson County. Prior to seeking the office of Mayor, Filtz said he contacted legal counsel and advised he was 'good to go.' He noted he has the neces-

sary documentation in place and can prove his residency. "We are fully ready to present the case," said Filtz.

Most of the questions about his residency come from his political opponents, said Filtz. He said they are focusing on the question of his residency instead of the issues.

Hamlett advised commissioners of the Election Commission they would serve as 'jurors' in the hearing. Mark Goins, attorney for Tennessee elections, will probably also sit in the hearing. Commissioners Julia Blanks, Mike Corrado, Michael Tate, Ronald Reiter (chairman) and Linda Wallace will listen to evidence presented by Attorney Keeton, who represents the citizens of McKenzie. Hamlett said she will contact Goins to better understand the role of the local commissioners during the hearing.

Hamlett said Filtz swore an oath that he was domiciled in the city of McKenzie. Any violation of the oath is subject to a penalty of perjury.

Keeton said this is her first complaint with the Election Commission and is uncertain of all the procedures. It is up to the Election Commission to set a time of the hearing. Hamlett advised that the 'quasi-judicial' hearing must be before the ballots are printed.

In other business during the Commission meeting, Hamlett recommended commissioners attend the July 26 meeting of the Carroll County Purchasing Committee. The purchase of election poll books will be considered during the meeting.

She noted the Carroll County Commission did not fund the purchase of new

voting equipment on the 2022-23 fiscal year budget. She said she was hoping to get the new voting equipment before the November 2022 elections. New voting machines, with a paper trail, are mandated by January 2024. Following the November 2022 elections, the next election cycle is in the year 2024.

The current machines are more than 20 years old and do not have a paper trail.

New member Michael Tate said the County received more than \$5 million in American Rescue Plan funds, but appropriated nothing for new machines for fair elections. He noted the County Commission appropriated federal ARP (COVID funding) to area water systems and high-speed internet providers, but the Election Commission did not receive the needed funding for voting machines. He said he was afraid if a complaint was made with the Department of Treasury, the County would have to refund some of those ARP Funds back to the Treasury.

Hamlett said the Commission is in position to seek proposals from vendors of voting equipment.

From the audience, Joel Washburn, a county commissioner, advised commissioners to attend County Commission meetings. He said the Election Commission has yet to choose a vendor for the equipment.

Hamlett said the Commission follows Robert's Rules of Order and declared Washburn out of order for speaking up. She said they had selected a vendor, however, the Commission is seeking bids from all the state-approved vendors.

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Congressman Ed Jones

A Southern Statesman

Today's political climate resembles a category five hurricane due to the highly charged division between the two political parties. Yes, both parties are to blame as neither truly looks for a middle ground. For most of my adult life, I have studied politics and government and in the last five years or so I've even thrown my hat into the political arena.

Yet, in recent months, I have grown a great disdain for party politics as the Republican and Democratic parties have failed to work together for the betterment of society.

It has always mattered to a great degree about party politics at the national level, but eventually, there comes a time to stop seeking blood for the betterment of our nation. In the 1980s, President Ronald Reagan and Democratic Speaker of the House Tip O'Neill were brutal adversaries but at the end of the day, they could take the boxing gloves off and share a drink.

Leading people and/or a nation is not about party affiliation, it is about doing what's right for all the

people, not just a select few. There comes a time when we have to cross the aisle and come to terms with one another. There is no room for the games and total dispersion of decency.

Now, let me put my soap box back under my desk.

This week, I would like to dedicate a little time remembering the late Tennessee congressman, Mr. Ed Jones. Congressman Jones represented the seventh and later the eighth Tennessee congressional district for over thirty years. He was a staunch Democrat but would cross the aisle when necessary for the betterment of humanity.

The story of Ed Jones starts in the small town of Yorkville, Tennessee. He was the eldest of three boys born to Will Frank Jones (1884-1971) and Sibbie Hortense Pipkin (1888-1974). His father was a laborer who worked odd jobs for local farmers. Will installed a strong work ethic into his son along with a love for agriculture. At an early age, he was required to work after school and on Saturdays.

When his father was unable to pay his medical bills, Ed began doing odd jobs for Dr. Finis Ewing Wyatt,

the local country doctor. He would later marry Dr. Wyatt's daughter, Llewellyn (married 1938). After high school, he attended and graduated from the University of Tennessee Junior College (UT Martin) in 1932 and attended the University of Tennessee Knoxville, majoring in agriculture.

In 1934, Jones began working as a dairy inspector for the State of Tennessee. He stayed in that role until 1941 when he transitioned as a supervisor for the Tennessee Dairy Products Association. In 1944, he became an agricultural agent for the Illinois Central Railroad, a job he held until 1969, except for the four years when he served in Governor Gordon Browning's administration.

In 1949, Governor Browning appointed Jones Commissioner of Agriculture of Tennessee. He is the youngest person to serve as a commissioner. His education, public role, and business experience provided a foundation for helping to guide farm policy for Tennessee during a time of rapid technological change and social changes as many people left the rural farms.

His challenges included the transition of Tennessee agriculture from small family farms to commercial business operations. Jones created an assistant commissioner position to oversee the administrative operations so that he could focus on strategic issues involving animal health vaccination and inspections, artificial insemination for breeding dairy cattle, the establishment of a surplus food distribution program for schools, food safety in-

spections, and agricultural disaster response. Jones' role as commissioner made him a public figure in West Tennessee.

As a former commissioner and dairy farmer, Jones' knowledge was revered. So much so that in 1961, President John F. Kennedy appointed him chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service state committee for Tennessee. He held that position until his election to Congress in 1969.

In 1951, Ed and Llewellyn inherited her family's farm after the death of her mother, Ora Blanche Turner Wyatt (1877-1951). The Joneses renamed it "Oak Haven Farm" and called the property home for the duration of their life.

In March 1969, Jones won the Democratic nomination for a special election to replace Robert "Fats" Everett, Congressman from the 8th District in Northwest Tennessee, who had died while in office. The election was unusual in that it was contested not only by the Republicans but also by the American Independent Party (the party of segregationist George Wallace). Jones won with a substantial plurality and was sworn in as soon as the results were certified.

Jones was re-elected to a full term with less opposition in 1970. In 1972, Jones' 8th District was merged with the Jackson-based 7th District held by Democrat Ray Blanton. The district retained the 7th moniker and its storied Democratic Party ties. To avoid a primary election, Blanton unsuccessfully ran for the United States Senate against Republican Howard

Baker. Jones retained his seat easily even as Richard Nixon won 90 of Tennessee's 95 counties, including most of his district. He was re-elected with no opposition in 1974.

In 1976, Martin businessman and state representative Larry Bates ran against Jones in the Democratic primary. This was the first and only serious challenge of any sort for Jones. Bates had a very conservative record as a state representative. His campaign platform was far right of the moderate Jones. Bates also spent a large amount of money by the standards of rural West Tennessee at the time. However, he made no real inroads in Jones' support and was heavily defeated.

After the 1976 election, Jones coasted to five more terms and chose to run for a 10th full term (11th overall) in 1988. The Jackson Sun reported on February 14, 1988: "Jones says he's retiring simply because the time has come. He wants to spend more time with his wife, Llew, and with his granddaughter, Meghan."

In 1984, he chaired Albert Gore Jr.'s first U.S. Senate campaign.

During his time in Congress, Jones served on many agriculture-related boards and committees, all the while continuing to operate his farm near Yorkville. He was the second-ranking Democrat on the House Agriculture Committee, where he chaired the Conservation, Credit and Rural Development Subcommittee. Many of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's program authorities today were authored by Jones in the areas of soil and water con-

servation, farm and rural business credit, commodities trading, rural development and agricultural trade.

In 2011, he was inducted as the thirteenth member of the Tennessee Agricultural Hall of Fame in recognition of his service to Tennessee.

His Congressional papers (1969-1988) are housed in the special collections of the Paul Meek Library at UT Martin. They include 121 linear feet of paper files organized in five series, Correspondence, Legislation, Projects, Committees, and Public Relations. The collection includes over 250 audio tapes from two periods, (1969-72) and (1987-88).

After retiring from Congress, he farmed, did some public relations consulting work and was active in civic and volunteer groups in Tennessee. He had served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Bethel College in McKenzie.

On December 11, 1999, Jones died at age 87, in Dyer, Tennessee. He was buried at Yorkville Cemetery. His wife, Llewellyn, died on November 25, 2007, and was interred next to Ed.

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Organization of School Superintendents Board of Directors met on July 7, 2022 and voted unanimously to provide this public statement refuting the disparaging statements about public educators made by the President of Hillsdale College, Larry Arnn in Franklin, Tennessee released last week.

Tennessee Superintendents/Directors recognize the profound value of Tennessee teachers and celebrate their indispensable role in creating a brighter future for Tennesseans.

The following statements made by Mr. Arnn demonstrate the disdain he obviously holds for Tennessee educators.

- "The teachers are trained in the dumbest parts of the dumbest colleges in the country."
- "They are taught that they are going to go and do something to these kids."
- "Do they ever talk about anything except what they are going to do to these kids?"
- "You will see how education destroys generations of people. It's devastating. It's like the plague."
- "Here's a key thing that we're going to try to do. We are going to try to demonstrate that you don't have to be an expert to educate a child because basically anybody can do it."

In a speech at the Sorbonne in Paris on April 23, 1910, Theodore Roosevelt said the following:

"It is not the critic who counts: not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles or where the doer of deeds could have done better. The credit belongs to the man who is ac-

tually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood, who strives valiantly, who errs and comes up short again and again, because there is no effort without error or shortcoming, but who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions, who spends himself in a worthy cause; who, at the best, knows, in the end, the triumph of high achievement, and who, at the worst, if he fails, at least he fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who knew neither victory nor defeat."

Tennessee teachers are "in the arena" every day, and the Tennessee Organization of School Superintendents has supported and will continue to support public educators.

Tennessee public school students, past and present, practice the benefits they receive from teachers in public classrooms. They do research in world-class scientific institutions. They build automobiles. They grow the food that feeds the nation and, indeed, the world. They dispense justice and defend the defenseless. They heal the sick. They fuel commerce through entrepreneurship. They minister to congregations. And, yes, teachers prepare children in classrooms for all of these, and countless other professions.

Public schools and teachers in Tennessee accept every child regardless of ability, background, or disability. The goal is to make every student an educated, productive citizen. Teachers do far more than provide quality instruction to their students. They also provide food, clothing, counseling,

tutoring, protection from abuse, medical assistance, and assurances of safety. Special educators, in particular, provide exceptional services for every imaginable disability, including children ranging from the exceedingly gifted to those with profound disabilities.

Unfortunately for Mr. Arnn, a public school critic, a public school education also confers the ability to listen, analyze, discern, and comprehend. It is clear that the motive for Mr. Arnn's criticism of public schools and public school teachers is driven by his desire to expand his charter school empire into Tennessee. And from all indications, he has the assistance he seeks in this endeavor.

The value of public education and public school teachers cannot be adequately stated in any single writing.

Rather, the value of public schools and public school teachers is demonstrated in the daily lives of Tennesseans who worship, work, give of their time and resources, assist their neighbors, and vote. The Tennessee Organization of School Superintendents gives its profound thanks to all of those in public education who strive daily to make this state a better place to live for all of its residents.

Rest assured, the Tennessee Organization of School Superintendents will work diligently to resist the efforts of misguided critics who are not "in the arena" and whose supercilious opinions are worthy only of collective disdain.

And when she realized I could only afford the forty-nine cent card, she "made up the difference" for the more expensive "perfect" card out of that little black coin purse she carried in her big black purse.

When I reached driving age, she insisted I bring any serious "friend" by her house for cookies, lemonade...and inspection! In about fifteen minutes she knew more about the girl than I did! She didn't disapprove of any of them. But when Cathy "took her turn" she smiled and nodded with about as much certainty as I've ever seen.

The amber bowl she gave us for a wedding gift sits on our dining room table today...a reminder that I don't need. People that have touched a life like Miss Mitchum touched mine are never very far out of reach. I think it's part of that timeless thing.

Or maybe she WAS an angel from Heaven...

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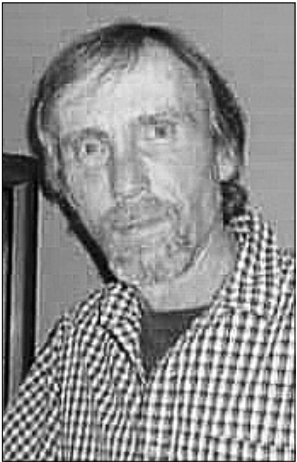

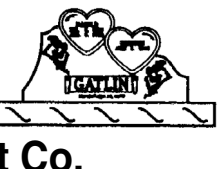

Mix well. Top with 2 cups finely crushed potato chips. Bake at 450 degrees for 15 minutes or until bubbly.

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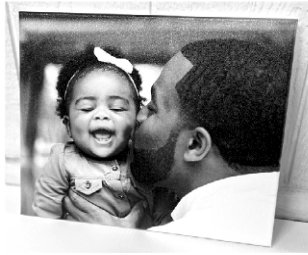

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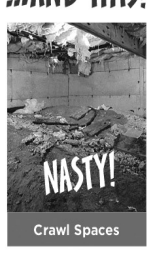
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Carroll County Sheriff's Reports

According to the report by Deputy Cody Coleman, deputies responded to an address on Reedy Creek Road after receiving a call about a man acting like he was under the influence of something. Upon arrival, deputies made contact with Dailey, who was unsteady on his feet and could not be still. When asked if he had been using drugs, Dailey became hostile, said he didn't want to talk to them anymore, and walked away into a nearby wood line. After discussing the matter and deciding that Dailey represented a possible danger to himself and others, deputies approached Dailey in the woods and placed him under arrest without incident.

Multiple Charges — Cody Lee Hart, 24, of Hazel was charged with DUI (first offense), possession of a hand-

gun while under the influence, and violation of implied consent, and Michael Keith Davis, 24, of Jackson was charged with possession of a handgun while under the influence, all during a July 3 traffic stop in McKenzie.

Deputy Cody Coleman reported he pulled over a black Dodge Challenger driven by Hart with Davis as a passenger due to failure to exercise due care and excessive noise. While speaking with Hart and Davis, Coleman detected the odor of marijuana and an intoxicating beverage and observed two handguns in plain sight near the center console. Coleman had Hart and Davis to exit the vehicle and conducted a probable cause search of the car, finding two nine-millimeter pistols, multiple magazines, ammunition, and several empty or almost empty THC vape cartridges and a small amount of marijuana. Hart performed poorly on field sobriety tests and refused to submit to a blood or breath test. Hart and Davis were placed under arrest, and the firearms, magazines, and

ammunition were seized as evidence.

Theft — Deputies are looking into the recent theft of a well tank and pump from private property in Cedar Grove.

Gregory Allen Heath of Medina told deputies on July 5 his water well tank and pump were stolen from a rental property he owns on Mill Creek Road. Heath said the items came up missing around the same time a former tenant was evicted from the property, though Heath said he did not have any direct evidence as to who took the items.

Theft from Vehicle — Deputies are investigating the recent theft of parts from a vehicle on church property.

Deputy Cody Coleman reported on July 6 deputies were advised the catalytic converter had been illegally removed from a church van at Enon Missionary Baptist Church on Highway 79 in McKenzie. No one was certain exactly when the part was taken from the van. The cost of replacing the part was estimated at \$1,000.

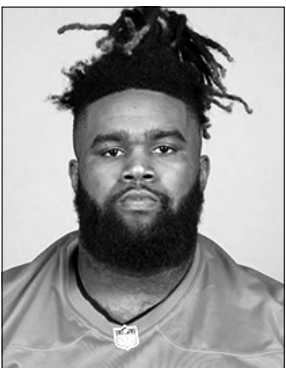

Milan No-Till Field Day to Feature Hemp Production Education

MILAN, Tenn. — New varieties, research programs and recommendations are just some of the topics to be discussed in the Hemp Economics, Production and Disease Management Tour at the 2022 Milan No-Till Field Day on Thursday, July 28. With the growing popularity of hemp, the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture is beginning research and making rec-

ommendations for producers. The tour is led by three UTIA faculty: Aaron Smith, Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics; Zachariah Hansen, Department of Plant Sciences; and Mitchell Richmond, Department of Entomology and Plant Pathology. "I hope people takeaway that UT has some applied research in fiber, grain, dual-purpose and floral hemp," said Richmond, "We have

several trials geared towards potential questions that farmers may have if opportunities develop for fiber and grain production in Tennessee. That includes evaluating various planting dates, cultivars and retting time, as well as comparisons for no-till and conventional tillage hemp." Since hemp production is relatively new to the state of Tennessee, Richmond hopes to gain knowledge from the same producers he will be teaching. "It will be very nice to present some of our preliminary findings, but most importantly talk to producers about what interests and ideas they have. It is our goal to incorporate those ideas into our programs to better serve Tennessee."
