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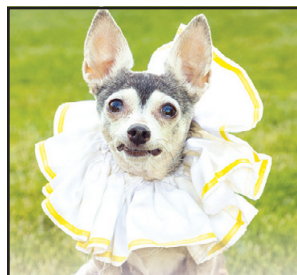

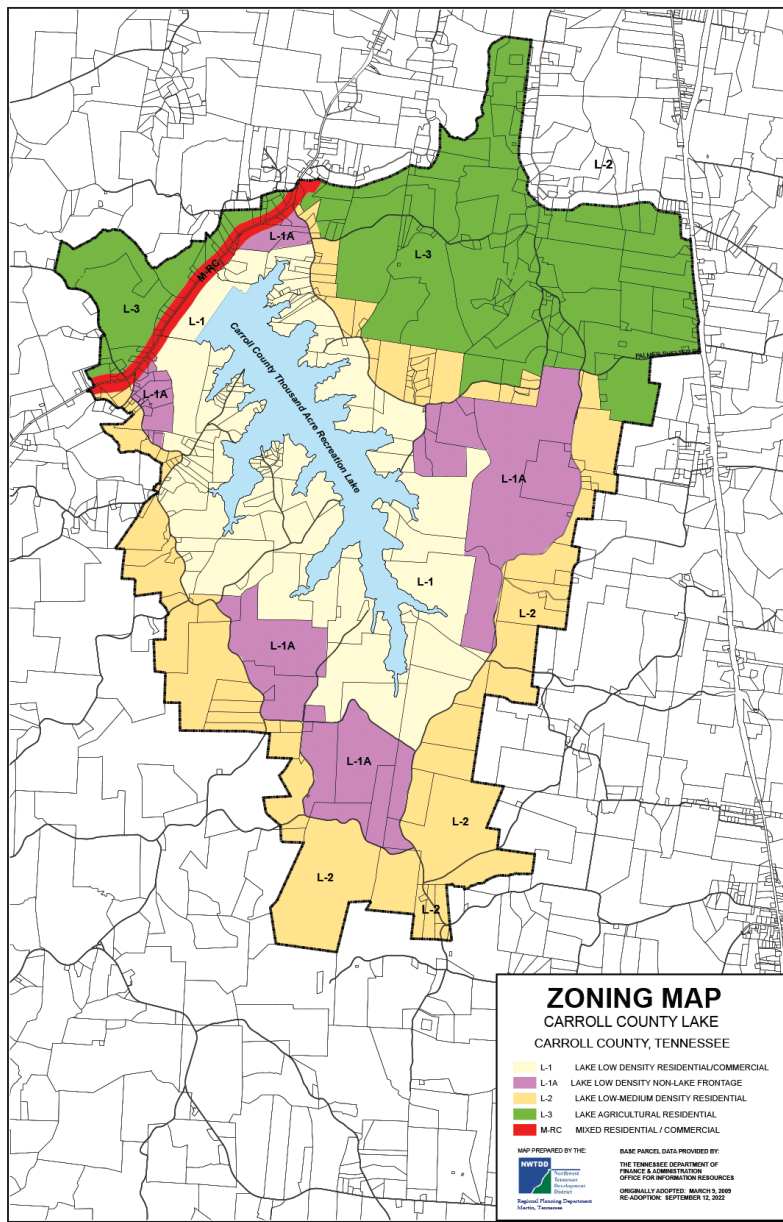

Zoning Vote Stirs Emotions at County Board Meeting

HUNTINGDON (September 12) — The September meeting of the Carroll County Commission opened with a public hearing to discuss the possibility of zoning changes near Lake Halford formerly known as the Carroll County 1,000 Acre Lake. In what was a standing-room-only crowd, members of the legislative body along with County Mayor

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Trezevant Board Approves Lake Resolution

The Trezevant Board met in their monthly session with a light agenda to deal with. The Board became one of the first municipal organizations to introduce and pass a resolution opposing the naming of the 1000 Acre Lake to Lake Halford. Curtis Halford is a state representa-

tive serving part of Carroll County and Gibson County. The resolution commended Halford's efforts in the state legislature but since he resided in another county that the lake should be named for someone/something in Carroll County. With little discussion, the resolution was unanimously passed. During reports from Board members, it was

announced the police department has hired a part-time officer. Brad Hardin, a semi-retired police officer, accepted the post recently. The board approved board reports, department reports and the minutes from the previous meeting on August 9 prior to adjourning the meeting. The next board meeting is scheduled for October 11 at 6:30 p.m.

Joseph Butler listened to Carroll County residents. Though the purpose of the hearing and later Resolution 09-01-2022 was to be solely based on zoning, residents expressed their concerns about the possibility of a development that would include a drug rehabilitation center in the Leach community. Those speaking to the commission provided a united front against the zoning resolution. Mayor Butler reminded the crowd numerous times that the purpose of the meeting was to discuss zoning not the development.

Michael Boggs was the first to address the commission during the hearing. He questioned the benefits of placing a drug rehabilitation center in Carroll County and asked if there was a need for a second airport in the county.

Crystal Price spoke passionately about the Leach community's history and family ties. She mentioned how family members lost their land due to the construction of the lake and wanted to know what the long-term effects would be of the zoning changes. Price added she believed the reason for the proposed zoning changes was based on the wishes of the developer.

Alan Jackson, the developer in question, stated he would be more than happy to speak to those who had questions about his proposal.

As tempers began to flare and emotions overtook some in the audience, Sheriff Andy Dickson asked two members of the audience to take their heated exchange into the hallway. Mayor Butler closed the meeting as it became apparent decorum was lost.

During the meeting, the citizens' forum portion of the meeting reopened the debate on zoning. Questions and comments were more focused on the development than the actual zoning resolution.

Carol Battles told the commissioners the rehabilitation center would be built in her backyard. She was concerned about the possible negatives that loomed with such a facility so close to her home.

Others expressed how the community would lose its

sense of self and ruin its feel as a rural community. There were concerns about the amount of traffic traveling Highway 70 and how the access road (Humphrey Road) could not handle that many vehicles.

Jackson was allowed to speak and stated members of the community were subjected to misinformation from a Huntingdon news source. He continued by stating his facility would do things correctly as originally promised. Jackson added the multi-million dollar development would house a high-end treatment facility.

Wrapping up the forum was Michele McCarthy who listed a series of questions that included quandaries of FFA regulations, decibel laws, lack of public transportation and the effects of future zoning.

Resolution 09-01-2022 creates an L-1A Zone (Lake Low-Medium Density Residential District), an L-2 Zone (Lake Low / Medium Density Residential District) and an L-3 Zone (Lake Agricultural / Residential District). According to Donny Bunton, Carroll County's community planner through the Northwest Tennessee Development District, L-2 would make regulations looser allowing for RV parks and accessory building; L-1A would resemble L-2 except for required silt fencing; L-3 would meet up with Huntingdon's future growth map and in essence be unregulated with certain expectations.

Following the motion and second, Commissioner Darrell Ridgely recommended doing away with the proposed L-2 zone and merging L-2 and L-3 into one unregulated zone. Commissioner Jimmy McClure recommended tabling the discussion allowing for the new commissioners a chance to look closer at the zoning propositions. From further discussion through comments by commissioners John Austin and Jay Phipps, the commission would vote in favor of the zoning resolution.

When called for a vote, the commission voted 13-7 in favor of Resolution 0-9-01-2022. The following commissioners voted against: Philip Moore, Walter Smothers, Cyril Ostiguy, Willie Huffman, Daniel Thomas, Randy Long and Jason Martin. Commissioner Manuel Crossno had left the room before the vote (he later returned and apologized stating he would have voted

"No"). Voting in favor of the zoning charges: Barry Murphy, Joey Darnall, Jimmy McClure, Jap Phipps, John Austin, Spiro Roditis, Darrell Ridgely, Jimmy Halford, Lana Suite, Daniel Willman, Joey Simmons, Larry Spencer and Lin Smith.

The commission recognized the retirement and issuance of service weapons to Becky Keith and David Bunn from the sheriff's office. Keith and Bunn had 64 years of combined years of service. Both requested to retain their rifle as their chosen service weapon.

In other business, the commission approved Resolution 09-02-2022 reappointing Lori Nolen to the Carroll County Electric Department Board; Resolution 09-05-2022 opting out of statewide building code standards for one-family and two-family dwellings. Resolution 09-06-2022 pledging \$130,000 of American Rescue Plan Funds for maintenance and repair to the courthouse.

The highway department's request for authorization of an application for a loan with the Tennessee Municipal Bond Fund of \$268,000 for two International custom dump trucks was approved. Along with Resolution 09-08-2022 allocating American Rescue Plan Acts Funds to transfer to or collaborate with municipalities and utility districts within the county. Huntingdon receives \$140,000; McKenzie \$145,000; Bruceton \$155,000; Trezevant \$235,000; Atwood \$145,000; McLemoresville \$266,903.47; Hollow Rock \$54,966.88; Clarksburg \$78,553.67; South Carroll Utility District \$260,869.57; Cedar Grove Utility District \$2,128,181.82. Each group received an additional \$50,000 from the county except for the South Carroll Utility District which received \$39,130.43.

In other business, Mayor Butler was elected chairman and Commissioner Darrell Ridgely as chairman pro tempore of the Carroll County Legislative Body. The following were elected notaries: Kathie Abbott, Kelly Fahy, Jeanene Jones, Candance Lowe, Debra Reeves, Nathan Smothers and Tammie Utley.

The next regular meeting of the Carroll County Commission is Monday, October 10 at 7 p.m.

McKENZIE AUTO PARTS — June 15, 2021 marked 50 years since Marvin Newman and Charles Hudson began McKenzie Auto Parts on 15385 Highland Drive. Marvin Newman was born and raised in Huntingdon. He joined the Army after graduating from Huntingdon High School. After leaving the Army in 1963, Marvin began working at Standard Auto in McKenzie with Charles Hudson. In 1971, the two men began contacting other parts distributors and opened McKenzie Auto Parts on June 15 of the same year. Marvin was in charge of management and sales, while Charles was a salesman on the road. When McKenzie Auto Parts opened, it was the fourth automotive parts distributor in McKenzie. The business first distributed with Goldstar and converted to Carquest in 1974. Marvin Newman bought Charles Hudson's share when Hudson retired in 1984. Since then, McKenzie Auto Parts became a Newman family business. Marvin is married to Mary Newman, and they share five children: Rusty, Nina, Amanda, Carey and Joseph. Through the years, Marvin, Joseph, Rusty, and Carey operated the store and Carolyn Seavers served as bookkeeper for 40 years.

Marvin Newman has always actively supported summer youth activities. McKenzie Auto Parts sponsored T-ball teams from 1980 to 2019. Marvin was a member of the Rotary Club and on the Chamber Board. In 1999, McKenzie Auto Parts began providing electronics through Radio Shack. Today, the company sells cables, batteries, computer mouses, keyboards and more sourced from various suppliers after the Radio Shack corporation's closure. McKenzie Auto Parts is closing and selling its inventory and building.

a main priority of the mayor and council. Ryan White will be acting chief and I have complete confidence that he will continue to do a great job in this role.

"The city also plans to begin the replacement search process immediately to determine the best possible fit for this role. There is a lot of support for our law enforcement in the community and I know the officers and dispatchers will continue working hard to serve and protect our community well during this change. If anyone in the community should have any questions, feel free to come speak with me at city hall as my door is always open," concluded Mayor Holland.

The city authorized a review of the Police Department conducted by the Municipal Technical Advisory Service. MTAS is also the group used to accept job applications when Moates was hired.

He was one of three finalists and the final selection.

When Moates was hired, he resided in Eagleville, where his wife continued to reside while he was chief in McKenzie. He served three years as chief in Nome, Alaska. He also served as chief in Kotzebue, Alaska, a village of 3,201 people, and 33 miles north of the Arctic Circle before returning to Tennessee.

He started his law enforcement career at the Smyrna Airport and was

with the Franklin Police Department 1980-1999. He worked as the lone officer in Pleasant View during his career.

During the September 8, 2022 meeting of the McKenzie Mayor and Council, the Council was made aware of the recent promotion of the police department's Ryan White from lieutenant to assistant chief. McKenzie's police department has faced a high turnover rate despite being one of the highest-paid forces in the area.

Dale R. Kelley

The Legend Comes Full Circle

Dale Kelley said, “Some men like to hunt or fish. I chose officiating basketball as my personal pursuit.”

Over the next fifteen years of his officiating career, he logged over 20,000 miles a year either driving or flying. On average he officiated 80 college games a season. He either worked or officiated in several Division I conferences including the SEC, OVC, the Metro Conference, the Atlantic Conference, the Southwest Conference and the Sunbelt Conference.

In his fifth year, he was invited to officiate in the NCCAA Division I tournament. His first nationally-televised game was in Atlanta, Georgia between UCLA and Tennessee.

“Within my seventh year of officiating, I became the SEC representative to the Final Four, held at the Checkerdome in St. Louis in 1978. I was 38 years old. The tournament officials were selected by grades assigned to previous games, and I received an outstanding score in the East Regional title game between Duke and Villanova the previous Sunday afternoon. Only one official from each of the regional games is selected to referee the Final Four and grading is based on the mechanics of officiating, rapport with players and coaches and consistency of situational calls.

“Assigned to the Duke and Notre Dame semifinal with 18,000 in attendance and several million more watching on television, I must confess to a fair amount of nervousness before the game. The apprehension dissipated, however, as soon as we tossed the opening jump ball into the air and play began. Following the game, sports commentator Al McGuire states this seminal proved to

be one of the best-officiated championship games he had witnessed.”

Dale went on to work nine consecutive NCAA playoffs and three Final Fours (1978, 1980 and 1981). He later stated, “Although the excitement and responsibility of being a Division I basketball official was reward enough, I discovered that officiating helped me overcome a characteristic shyness that remained since childhood.”

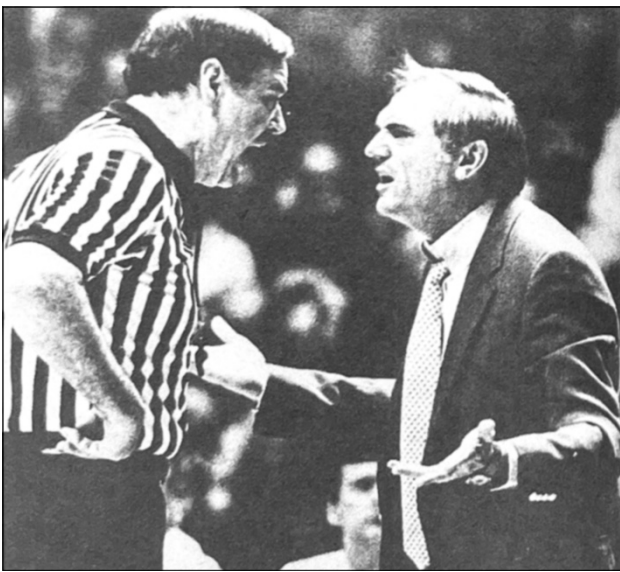
In 1974, Dale decided to reenter the political arena, this time running for a seat on the Huntingdon Special School District Board of Education. He followed it up two years later with a seat on the Huntingdon Town Council.

“Although my pursuit of NCAA basketball officiating took me from one major city to another across the United States, my heart remained with my hometown of Huntingdon and my fellow residents of Carroll County. Public service through political involvement became the means by which I could address the needs of my community as a whole as well as the people I came in contact with on a daily basis.”

In 1978, Dale decided to run for the Tennessee State Legislature. This proved somewhat of a difficult task as Carroll County was still divided into two separate districts. Instead of running in the 74th District which contained Huntingdon, he decided to run in the 72nd District.

In his autobiography, Kelley explained, “Although I and my family continued to reside at our home on Tara Lane where my children spend most of their childhood, I resigned my position on the Huntingdon school board as well as the town council and changed my voter registration to the Palmer Shelter precinct based upon

my ties to family property in that area. Although questioned by my opponent, it was a legal move as state law solely dictates residency in the county to represent either district rather than maintaining a resident with the 72nd or 74th.”

After all the votes were tallied, Dale was declared the winner by a mere 112 votes. In January 1979, took his seat in the legislature while Lamar Alexander was “secretly sworn into the governorship.”

He spent six years in the state legislature representing the 72nd District. He sat on numerous committees of influence during this time and supported numerous pieces of legislation. Gerryandering by the Democratic Party led to Dale's decision not to run for a fourth term. Instead, he took an appointment in Governor Alexander's cabinet.

His first appointment was to the position of Commissioner of Employment Security (handled unemployment insurance and benefits for state residents). Dale's commissioner status quickly moved from Employment Securities to the Department of Transportation.

“As Commissioner of Transportation, I was in an enviable position to help my local community of Huntingdon and Carroll County, and I did not hesitate to do so. Good roads are valuable for potential employers... I brought blacktop to as many miles of gravel roads as possible through

the county, and I doubled the percentage of county road miles designated as part of the state road system in order to acquire state funding for upkeep and bridge work.

“One of the first projects on the list for our area was the widening and straightening of Highway 22 stretching from Huntingdon to McKenzie. Statistics revealed this to be one of the most dangerous stretches of roads within the state of Tennessee based upon accidents per usage reports. Within the limits of Huntingdon, I widened Main Street from Thomas Park eastward to the outskirts of town and procured funding to complete the US-70 bypass that encircled the town. I also procured funds for providing a 300,000-foot paved access road to the Carroll County Industrial Park developed north of Huntingdon.”

In 1986, as Commissioner of Transportation, Dale announced plans for the construction of SR-840 which would serve as an alternative route south of Nashville. Construction began in 1991 and was not completed until 2012.

It was around this time, Dale's court-officiating shifted to an administrative role. He became the coordinator of officials for five NCAA conferences after the 1984-1985 season. His first act as coordinator was the recruitment of good officials. Dale along with hired observers took notes at numerous games

to evaluate game officials. This led to the creation of officiating clinics for current and new referees.

With his time in the Tennessee State Legislature, serving as Commissioner of Transportation and his position in NCAA officiating, Dale looked at the idea of bigger things. In 1987, he considered launching a run for the United States Senate against Jim Sasser.

“While I considered running for the Senate, I had no selfish goals. Public service was my intent. My failure, however, to create a message for the people of Tennessee that differed from the one already offered by incumbent Jim Sasser did not set me apart from the crowd. The Democratic Party in this time period remained strong throughout the state and voters continued to support Sasser as their senator. Campaigning against him would prove an uphill battle. Although a team of analysts developed a ‘Run and Gun’ campaign strategy that found me talking with people in one small town after another, listening directly to my constituency, and interacting with the electorates as much as possible, I had no distinctive message or platform to distinguish myself from my opponent.

“My timing was wrong for election to the Senate, so I dropped out of the race in January of 1988.”

When Dale left Nashville following the end of Alexander's second term in office, he returned to Huntingdon. Unhappy with the fiscal and aesthetic shape of Huntingdon, he began to miss his service in politics. This led to five years on the Carroll County Commission before campaigning for Huntingdon Mayor in 1992.

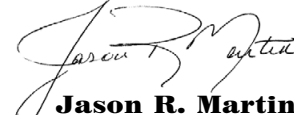
Some feared Huntingdon was not ready for someone like Dale Kelley at its helm. “I would be aggressive as I initiated changes necessary to run Huntingdon from economic decline to a viable and stable community,” once stated about taking office as mayor.

Kelley served as mayor of Huntingdon from 1992 until he died in 2022. This thirty-year led to numerous changes and improvements for Huntingdon. This includ-

ed the construction of the Dixie Carter Performing Arts Center (named for Dale's high school classmate), various downtown facade improvements, and the development of the Carroll County Watershed Authority that parlayed into the construction of Tennessee's second-largest man-made lake.

After various bouts of health issues, Dale Kelley died at his home on August 20, 2022. He is buried at Oak Hill Cemetery, in Huntingdon.

Other honors and distinctions held by Dale include: serving as a member of the Tennessee Higher Education Commission under Governor Don Sundquist; and Senior Advisor and Special Assistant to Governor Bill Haslam; past president of the West TN Mayor's Association; served on the TN Municipal League Board of Directors, TN Municipal League Risk Management Pool Board, and TN Municipal Bond Fund Board; recognized as the 2008 Tommie Goodwin Mayor of the Year Award for the State of Tennessee presented by the Tennessee Municipal League; member of the Bethel Athletics Hall of Fame, the TSSAA Hall of Fame, the Carroll County Sports Hall of Fame, and the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame; 1985 Bethel College Outstanding Alumni Achievement Award winner; first recipient of the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce's Carroll Countian of the Year honor; former Deacon at Huntingdon First Baptist Church; and Athletic Director at Bethel University.

“Finding Chika” is about a five-year old Haitian girl at the Haitian mission and orphanage, called Have Faith, located in Port-Au-Prince, Haiti. Have Faith is now run by Mitch Albom's umbrella charity and has been since the horrible 2010 earthquake that killed a hundred thousand people. Mitch and his wife, Janine, adopted Chika after her mother died in childbirth delivering Chika's baby brother. Chika suffered from an inoperable brain tumor and several specialists in the U.S. tried to find a cure, but were unsuccessful. Chika died after only two years with the Alboms.

Albom was born to Jewish parents, Rhoda and Ira Albom, in 1958 in Passaic, New Jersey. He wanted to be a “garbage man” at the age of five, thinking it would be a “cool” job. Wanting to be a cartoonist, Albom switched to music, learning how to play piano and playing in bands in his teen years.

Earning a bachelor's degree in Sociology from Brandeis University in Waltham, Mass, he stayed with music and worked as a performer for several years. Beginning at age 20, he studied journalism earning a masters degree and an MBA in Business. Albom became a nationally acclaimed sports journalist, and prolific writer/author.

Four of Albom's books were turned into movies, “Tuesday's with Morris”,

“The Five People You Meet in Heaven”, “One More Day”, and “Have A Little Faith”.

Carolyn concluded her presentation saying, “Mitch Albom is a truly remarkable individual who has deeply impressed me”.

Book passing was completed by Mary Newman. The next book passing date is September 28.

The next meeting is October 12, 2022, at 3 p.m. at Lakeside with hostesses Gail Mack and Donna Ward. The program will be presented by Geneva Johnson.

The Benediction was recited and the meeting was adjourned.

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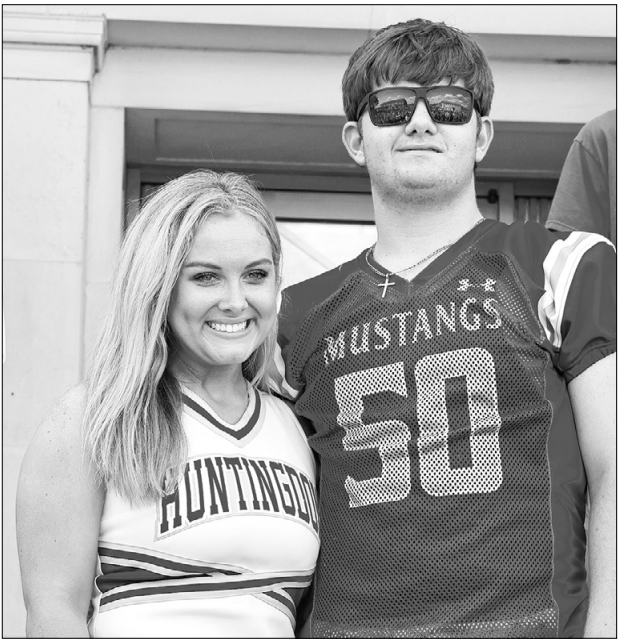

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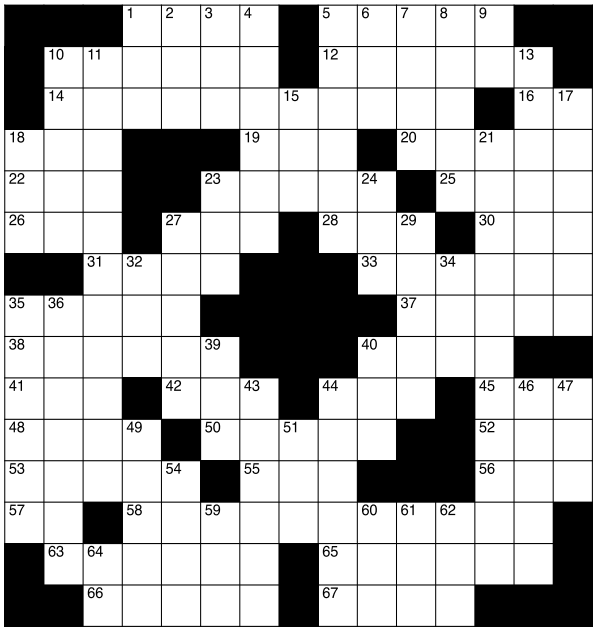

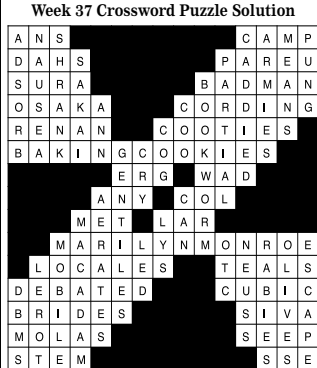

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Carroll County Sheriff's Report

Evading Arrest — On September 9th, Michael L. Wynnyk, 44, Jackson, was charged with a DUI and evading arrest.
