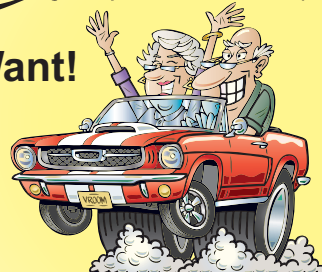

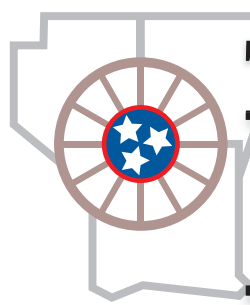

Community Healthcare Meeting is September 11

McKENZIE — Representatives from McKenzie Medical Center (doctors' clinic), Baptist Hospital of Carroll County, and McKenzie Regional Hospital will address the services offered in McKenzie and the county in the wake of the planned closing of McKenzie Regional Hospital.

The meeting is at the downtown Park Theatre, Tuesday, September 11, 6 p.m. The public is encouraged to attend.

McKenzie Regional Hospital (MRH)

will discontinue most patient services, including the emergency department, by September 15. The 45-bed hospital has notified the Tennessee Department of Health of its planned closure.

An asset purchase agreement was signed with Baptist Memorial Health Care, which operates Baptist Memorial Hospital-Carroll County, to purchase the assets of MRH including the hospital's real property and ambulance service. Baptist intends to

operate the outpatient diagnostic imaging center and sleep center located inside McKenzie Medical Center. Baptist plans to transition ambulance services to Priority Ambulance, its contract service partner. An ambulance base and helipad will remain in McKenzie.

Local representatives of industry were invited to a meeting last week to hear from

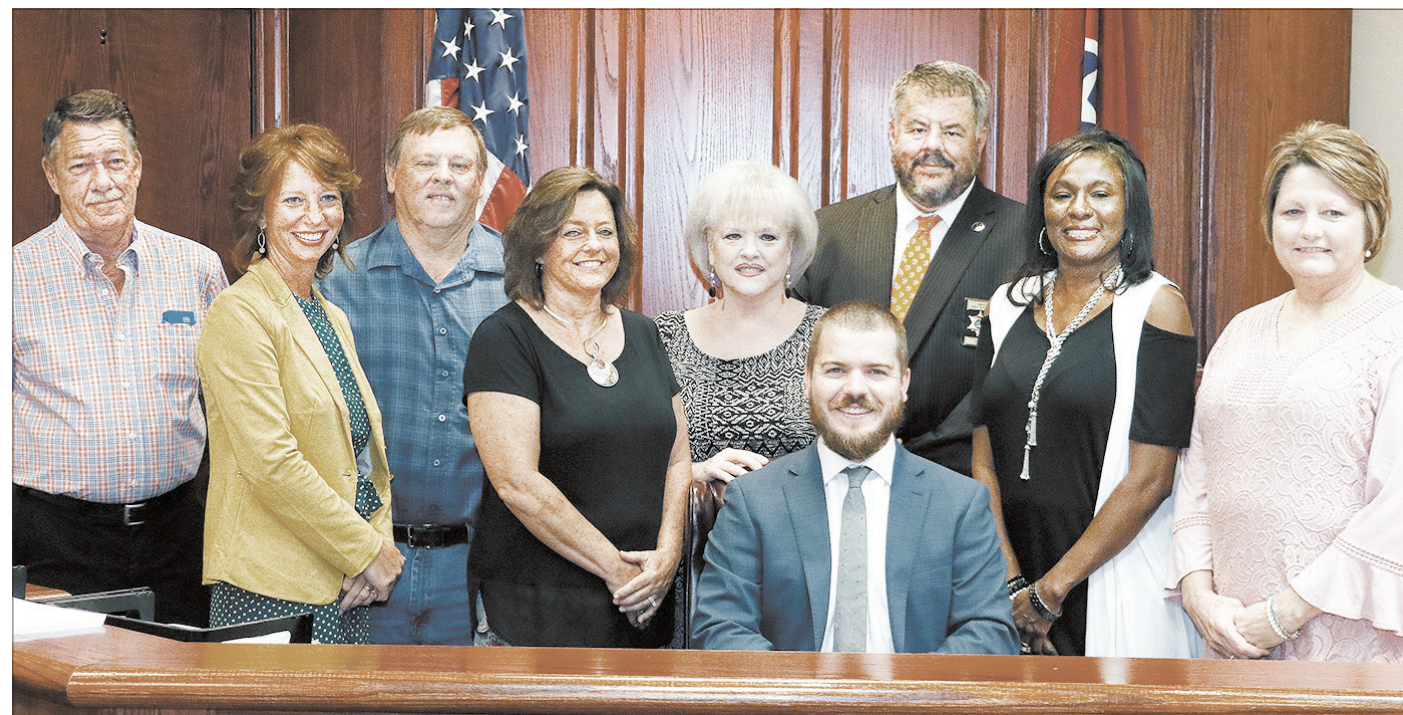
Paving, Construction Bids Approved

Arrow Paving Company's bid of \$90.50 per ton of asphalt was approved for various paving projects within the city. The lone other bid was Martin Paving at \$92.25 per ton.

HUNTINGDON (August 31) — The oath of office ceremony for the new term of all elected county officials was Friday, August 31, 2018 at 9 a.m. at the Carroll County Courthouse in the large courtroom on the second floor. Family and friends mostly filled the courtroom to observe.

General Sessions Judge Larry Logan administered the oath of office to Mayor Joseph Butler, 20 of the 21 county commissioners, County Clerk Darlene Kirk, Property Assessor Rita Jones, Trustee Paula Bolen, Register of Deeds Natalie Porter, Circuit Court Clerk Sarah Bradberry, Sheriff Andy Dickson, and Road Supervisor Ricky Scott and Road Supervisor Scotty Bailey. Butler and Bradberry are newly elected.

Joseph Butler, new county mayor, follows in his father's career path. Walter Butler, president of Bethel University, was county mayor 1994-1996. He resigned to accept a position in Governor Don Sundquist's cabinet. Walter also served as county trustee, 1978 to 1994.

Trezevant Board Discusses Problems with Water, Police

Trezevant City Council met in regular session Tuesday, August 14 with a short agenda and several challenges. Vice-Mayor Bobby Blaylock presided over the meeting in the absence of Mayor Dennis Mitchell.

Board member Pam Bryant spoke on two subjects and recommended two proposals. The first proposal was forming a committee to explore options on what to do about the water department. The water plant

needs an overhaul and now is in need of a new supervisor. One option mentioned was to sell the water department to an outside source, which wasn't very popular among the board members.

The other proposal concerned the police department. There have been complaints that citizens have been told to contact the sheriff's department when they contact city police personnel. It was noted Trezevant has \$169,409 budgeted for the police department mostly for salaries. Bryant proposed another committee to review

the situation with the police department including even potentially eliminating the police department and using the money for other needs. No action was taken on either proposal.

It was announced Trezevant did not receive a \$500,000 grant needed to refurbish the water plant. It was also announced Water Department Supervisor Danny Connell had resigned and taken a job in Milan.

There was discussion over the recent

Thursday Night: adult bingo and cake auction. The proceeds of the cake auction go to the Gleason Community Benevolence Fund.

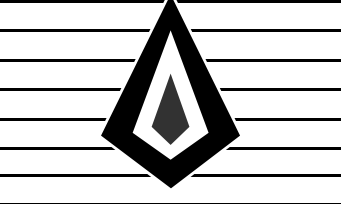

Carroll County Agenda Includes Committee Assignments, Electric Board Appointment

Carroll County Commission convenes Monday, September 10, 7 p.m. for its first meeting during the Mayor Joseph Butler administration. On Labor Day, the Resolutions Committee approved the agenda for the September 10 meeting.

Commissioner Paula Watkins, current chairman pro-tempore, will serve as chairman until commissioners select the new chairman, which has always been the county mayor for approximately the last 28 years.

In addition to committee assignments of commissioners, the commission will select a chairman and chairman pro-tempore, and vote on one resolution concerning the appointment to the Carroll County Electric Board.

Commissioner Lori Nolen has been recommended by Butler to serve as the County Commission's representative to the Carroll County Electric Board. If appointed by the commission, she will replace Commissioner John Mann.

Nolen is a recent graduate of the Delta Regional Authority's Leadership Institute. She participated in a 10-month Executive Academy, which helps further their skills in community leadership and policy development to promote regional collaboration and local economic growth across DRA's eight-state region. The participants engaged in policy and program development, advocacy training, case-study discussions, and on-the-ground experiences aligned with DRA's priorities for the region.

Rotary Club Hears About Allegion’s Progress

McKENZIE (August 28) — Chad Brawner and Monte Bowers were the featured speakers at the August 28 meeting of the McKenzie Rotary Club.

Bowers is the plant manager and Brawner manager of environmental, health and safety at Allegion in McKenzie, formerly Republic Builders, manufacturers of steel doors.

Bowers said Republic Steel of Niles Ohio located the door manufacturing company in the Henry County portion of McKenzie 1977. In 1985, Republic sold

the company to Desco, a privately-owned company, which owned the company all but a brief time up to January 2017 when Allegion purchased the company.

Allegion has several operating companies operating in the door and door hardware business.

The McKenzie operation has 250,000 square feet on 33 acres. It leases another 20,000 square foot building from the McKenzie Industrial Board. Republic has a total of 200 employees in McKenzie and at regional distribution centers. Payroll in McKenzie is approximately \$5 million annually.

Allegion believes in the Republic-made products, said Bowers.

It has invested in plant upgrades and plans to build a supermill in McKenzie.

Brawner said the investments include a new roof on the facility, new LED lighting, all new, safer forklifts, an employee break room with greater food choices and digital informational panels – including weather announcements, and a new \$860,000 wastewater treatment upgrade to allow the company to pre-treat some of its waste.

The number of injuries has declined by 70 percent with the new emphasis and training on safety, said Brawner. The goal is to continue to improve the employee safety record.

Chamber of Commerce Touts Economic Impact of Fishing Championship

The Carroll County Chamber of Commerce recently released figures related to the economic impact of the Fifth Annual Mossy Oak High School and Junior National Fishing Championship. The Chamber report revealed the tournament’s economic impact to Carroll County was approximately \$300,000.

“During the course of the tournament, we had 147 hotel room stays in Carroll County,” said Brad Hurley, President of the Carroll County Chamber. “We had 54 teams from 34 different states and Canada fishing the Carroll County Thousand-Acre Recreational Lake.” Each team is comprised of two anglers and one boat captain.

The High School and Junior High National Championship began on July 30 with 1,500-plus fishermen, parents and coaches coming to Bethel University in McKenzie for registration, rule briefing and a banquet.

“Bethel University was excited to have 1,500 visitors on our campus for the registration and banquet; it was a great opportunity to showcase our great university,” said Dale Kelley, Athletic Director for Bethel University. “The Bethel Bass team is the top collegiate bass-fishing team in the United States this year.”

The Junior Tournament started fishing on Tuesday with the final weigh-in on Wednesday. The High School Tournament began on Thursday at Kentucky Lake with the final weigh-in on Saturday in Paris.

“The Carroll County Chamber is pleased to be a part of this tourism initiative that brings visitors and dollars to Carroll County,” said Hurley. “The impact was felt at convenience stores, hotels, restaurants, etc. This tournament truly creates a positive economic impact all across the county.”

The partnership between Bethel

University, Villages of Paris and Henry County, TN Department of Tourism and the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce is a great example of regional partnerships that work.

The National Champions for the junior division were Trey McKinney and Carter Wijangco with a two-day total of 17 pounds, six ounces. The two took home \$2,000 in scholarship money along with Abu Garcia rods and reels. Second place winners Jeremy Monda and Will Boyd took home \$1,000 in scholarship prizes along with Abu Garcia Veritas rods.

The teams were able to start fishing at the Carroll County Thousand-Acre Recreational Lake on Saturday and concluded on Wednesday. The five days of activities associated with the tournament provided opportunities for Carroll County businesses.

Three Carroll County Schools Rank Among the Top in Tennessee

Three schools in Carroll County ranked five out of a possible five on 2018 Tennessee Value-Added Assessment System test. McKenzie, Huntingdon, and West Carroll all hit the top mark.

The Tennessee Value-Added Assessment System (TVAAS) measures student growth year over year, regardless of whether the student is proficient on the

state assessment. In calculating a TVAAS score, a student’s performance is compared relative to the performance of his or her peers who have performed similarly on past assessments.

The Tennessee Value-Added Assessment System (TVAAS) measures the impact schools and teachers have on their students’ academic growth. TVAAS mea-

sures student growth, not whether the student is proficient on the state assessment. TVAAS helps educators identify best practices and implement programs that best meet the needs of their students, as well as make informed decisions about where to focus resources to ensure growth opportunities for all students.

Watershed Authority Hears Updates on Projects

HUNTINGDON (August 28) — Carroll County Watershed Authority members were given an update on projects, events, and grants involving the Carroll County 1000-Acre Recreation Lake.

A state Local Parks and Recreation Fund grant in the amount of \$250,000 was awarded for the construction of walking trails on the dam/RV park side of the lake, a picnic pavilion at the RV park, and a parking lot for the walking trail. The grant is a 50/50 match between the state

and the Watershed Authority, which can use local labor for an in-kind match.

The first Dixie Triathlon is Saturday, September 15 at the lake and the surrounding roadways. It is named in memory of the late Dr. Volker Winkler, who was an avid athlete. The event is expected to have over 200 participants.

Bassmasters held its junior high bass-fishing tournament on the lake. Carroll County Chamber of Commerce indicates 147 room-nights were booked in the

county’s two motels, the Best Western of McKenzie and the Heritage Inn in Huntingdon.

Lakewood Capital Group, real estate developers around the lake, recently had a public sale of 18 parcels of land at the lake in the Angler’s Point subdivision. All lots sold within 11 minutes.

A recently acquired triple-wide office building was moved from Toone, Tennessee to the lake, where it is being renovated and porches added. It will be used for meeting space.

Mitchell’s first term as alderman. He was reelected in 2014 to a two-year term and again in 2016 to a four-year term.

Blaylock had served as an alderman since 2000.

Mitchell’s letter to the aldermen reads in part, “After much prayer and thought, I have made this decision as I feel I can no longer give the town the attention it deserves. As you all know, in June of 2017 I received a new job assignment at my full-time job. It has taken more of my time that I realized, and I feel it is in the best interest of the town and its citizens for me to allow someone else to hold this important position. It has been an honor and pleasure to

serve on this board with all of you these past years.”

In an interview with The Banner, Mitchell elaborated that his new assignment with the Milan Police Department is a partnership with the FBI on violent crimes against children that spans all of West Tennessee. “It’s an opportunity to help kids and also to advance my skills.”

He also expanded on his message to the aldermen and to the citizens of Trezevant. “I was very passionate about my mayoral duties, and I regret that I felt I needed to resign.”

He said that he would have liked to complete his term (2020), but given his new responsibilities, he thought Blaylock would be more able to devote the time that is necessary and deserved by the citizens. “I’ll miss the involvement,” he said. “I may run again when

I retire from law enforcement.”

He continued, “I love Bobby dearly, and I know that he knows what needs to be done. I told him I’m here for him in any way I can help.”

Mitchell also expressed hope that more people would get involved in local government. “I encourage anyone in town to get involved, even if it’s just for a short time.”

He said that he has “great confidence” in the remaining board members.

The promotion of Blaylock to mayor complicates an already tricky situation for the Trezevant board. With expiring alderman terms set to leave two vacancies after the November election, Blaylock’s seat opens up a third.

The board will address the issue at a special called meeting Thursday, September 6 at 6:30 p.m. at the community center.

loss of Connell and the reasons behind the loss. The discussion carried over to a current employee, Mary Jo Hall, who was initially hired to work with the Parks and Recreation Department and more recently has been doing more tasks for the city. Hall received a number of compliments from board members and discussion was

centered on giving her a raise. A motion was made and approved to nearly double Hall’s pay to 15.00 an hour.

In other council action, the board approved the renewal of the waste management contract with Republic for five years. The new contract calls for the rates to remain the same for the first year and increase three percent each year for the next four years.

City Attorney Charles Trotter advised the board that the court order approved by the board last month has been served to property owner Ricky Nelson.

The court order is to allow the city temporary rights to conduct a preliminary survey to determine what needs to be done about the ongoing drainage issue which is holding up a project between the city of Trezevant, TDOT, and CSX railroad. Trotter told the board he expects to hear from Nelson before the next board meeting.

The board also heard from Trotter that inspection of the McCrae property has been completed and that McCrae has been very cooperative through the whole process.

representatives of McKenzie Medical Center and Baptist Memorial Hospital-Carroll County.

The McKenzie Medical Center plans to extend the hours of its walk-in clinic to evenings and weekends and provide extended-hour diagnostic services provided by Baptist Hospital

through the on-site diagnostic center. LabCorps, a private medical lab, is expected to also extend its hours of service at MMC.

Representatives of Baptist Hospital of Carroll County said it is evaluating its services, personnel and adding personnel to its emergency room during traditional peak times. The hospital plans to add other services as needed.

McKenzie Medical Center recently closed its obstetrics

services because of the closure of McKenzie Regional Hospital. Baptist-Carroll County does not provide those services. Henry County Medical Center is reaching out to the McKenzie-area community to provide the OB services in Paris.

Several rural counties in Tennessee have experienced the closing of all services by hospitals. Carroll County is experiencing the loss of one of two of its hospitals.

I Could'a Been On The Grand Ole Opry

I was driving back from Cleveland, Georgia, kicking myself for not buying an old Seth Thomas Canadian Railroad clock from a friend there and wondering why the state bothered to put up speed limit signs when I passed the Crossroads Café. I did a double take and slowed to make sure I'd read the sign correctly.

Listen, I was still in Georgia. And it's mostly in America. You can name a restaurant anything you want to here. But this particular Crossroads Café was located in a strip mall set a good ways off the main thoroughfare... There was not an intersection, cross street or side road coming into the highway in any direction as far as the eye could see!

My mind shifted from antique clocks to crossroads that didn't involve streets, traffic, stop signs, red lights or roundabouts.

Maybe the requirements to eat in this place were shirts, shoes and a life changing decision that was weighing heavily on the mind... Like the young college graduate who couldn't decide if he needed to stay in Cumming or seek fame and fortune in Atlanta; or perhaps the grizzly auto mechanic who was still dreaming of dancing on Broadway; or the beautiful lass who twirled the coffee around in her cup as she dithered between teaching school in the neighborhood she grew up in or taking the job offer in Cocoa Beach.

Maybe it was an eating place for those adventurers who couldn't decide "For Whom the Bell Tolls." Hemmingway's book set during the Spanish Civil War reminded us of John Donne's epic seventeenth century

writings, "No man is an island." We live on the mainland. What we do and say interacts with, and impacts, others. We need to choose the path we take not foolhardily or unwisely.

I could picture desperate folks inside wolfing down fried baloney, biscuits smothered in gravy and banana pudding while they deliberated joining Weight Watchers. The young man in the corner hadn't touched his liver and onions but he had decided to tell his father he wasn't going into the family business.

What we munch on today...we may have to regurgitate for years and years. Leave it to Georgia to figure out a one stop shopping house that can feed your stomach and your soul at the same time.

I wondered how many high school graduates had sat in a "Crossroads Café" with sweaty palms and frightened hearts. I don't care how much you think you know, what you've been told, what the guidance teacher says or how much your folks have saved for your future... Somewhere between the main course and dessert, you've got to do some soul searching. And the available paths are many and varied, complicated and stretch out before you in all sorts of weird directions...with no guarantees whichever way you choose!

Come to think of it, they ought to franchise these Crossroads dining halls all over America!

Can't you just see the handsome Georgia boy in the back booth, eager to begin a family, who can't make up his mind between Sally Ann Pennington and Misty Rhodes.

You talk about a crossroads! Sally Ann was pretty enough in the right light, plus her father owned the bank, a feed store and 200 acres of bottom land down by the river. It would be a stable and secure life.

But Misty had that "can't guess what I've been up to" look, a smile that could illuminate an underground dungeon at midnight and she sported the largest Willie Nelson record collection east of the Mississippi River. Fun and a bucket sized bait of uncertainty reflected off her dime store earrings. It's no wonder the young man had been eating here everyday since he started shaving!

Driving by a Crossroads Café that wasn't on an intersection will make you ponder your own decision making history. And possibly throw on an illuminating switch—NO WONDER I made all those mistakes!

Our eating out places back home were named City Café, Steak House and Dixie Coffee Cup. I reckon entrepreuneuring restaurant owners didn't read much Hemingway in our neck of the woods...

It just never occurred to us to stroll into a local eatery and ask Mr. Red Melton or Jack Cantrell's advice on cowboying in Eastern Montana versus going to Harvard Law School. Mr. Red and Jack were about the smartest we had...and we just sat there in silence, enjoying the cheeseburger and listening to Johnny Horton on the jukebox.

If we'd a'had a Crossroads Café...I might have slung that ole guitar over my shoulder and split for Nashville...

Trent Scates to Head Bethel University's PA Program

McKENZIE — Trent Scates, former admissions director and full-time faculty member in Bethel University's Physician Assistant Program, has been named Program Director of the school's PA Program.

Scates earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Physician Assistant Studies from Trevecca Nazarene University in 1999 and a Master of Science in Medical Science with a specialization in Rural Primary Care from Alderson-Broadus College in Philippi, West Virginia.

He is a lieutenant colonel in the Tennessee Army National Guard and graduated from the prestigious United States Army War College in July of this year. Scates will continue to serve as Battalion Commander of the National Guard's 230th Engineer Battalion until Sept. 30.

"I'm very excited about the opportunity to lead the PA program," Scates says. "I'm moving into a new role, and I have a lot to learn, but we have a great staff and faculty who are highly skilled and very supportive. We've outlined a number of short- and long-term goals, and our entire team is focused on reaching or exceeding them."

Those goals, says Scates, include "first, making Bethel's program the best in Tennessee. In the long-term, we plan to be recognized as one of the strongest PA programs in the country."

The 27-month Physician Assistant program has already made significant strides toward both goals. In 2017, the program boasted a 100% pass-rate on the rigorous Physician Assistant National Certifying Exam (PANCE). The average national pass-rate is approximately 95%.

Scates credits the program's success to first selecting top candidates from the large pool of qualified applicants. Only 50 students are admitted to the program per semester. Requirements for the program include a bachelor's degree from an accredited university, the successful completion of the Graduate Records Exam (GRE), and the completion of a number of prerequisite courses, including biology, chemistry, anatomy, physiology, genetics and psychology.

"We then provide these students with an excellent core medical knowledge during their didactic year and reinforce that knowledge with application during their final 15 months of clinical studies," Scates says.

During those final 15 months of the program, students benefit from a "hub-and-spoke" system which typically allows students to conduct rotations at multiple locations across the Southeast.

"Students initially focus on a general practitioner approach, gaining experience in a wide variety of medical settings," Scates says. "However, they may ultimately choose to emphasize within a particular field of medicine, ranging from family practice to emergency medicine." Students who successfully com-

plete a minimum of 450 hours in a specific field can obtain a Certificate of Emphasis.

Scates, who began teaching in the Bethel University program in September of 2014, specializes in Clinical Medicine instruction with an emphasis on Renal and Genitourinary systems. He and wife Beth have three children: daughter McCall (22) and sons

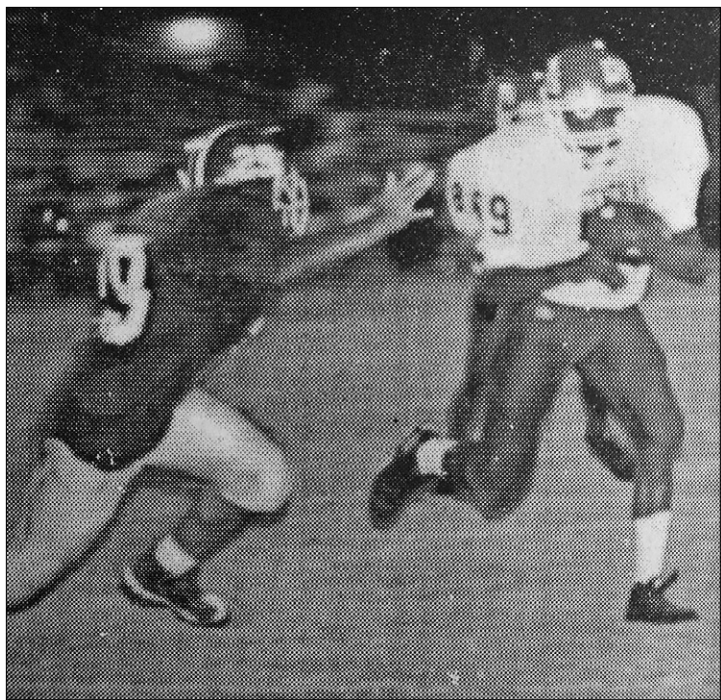

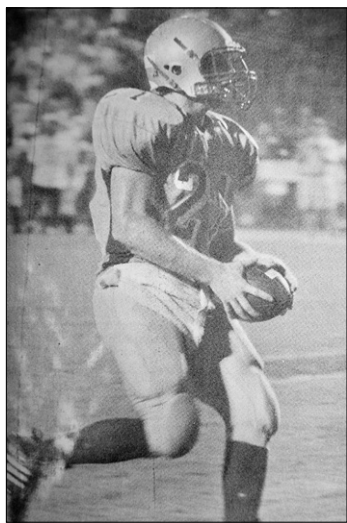
