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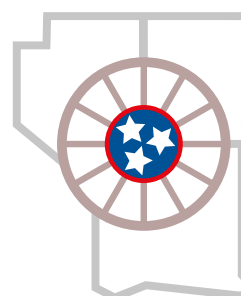


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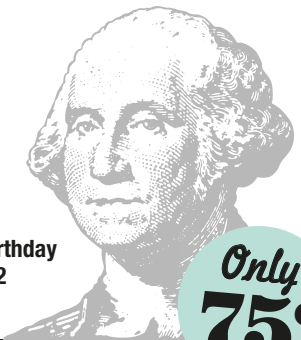

McKENZIE (February 11) — After a multiple weeks of workshops and discussion, the McKenzie Police Department will receive a \$3.00 hourly pay increase. Police department officials and members of the McKenzie City

Council addressed an internal crisis of the high turnover rate within the department. The conclusion was low moral focusing around low pay in the department. Councilman Jason R. Martin made the

motion of a \$3.00 pay raise citing McKenzie was nearly \$4.00 below the state average and putting a low dollar amount was not going

VP Racing Fuels to Locate New Operation in Huntingdon

NASHVILLE — VP Racing Fuels announced last week it will locate new operations in Huntingdon. The race fuel manufacturer and distributor will create 40 new jobs and invest approximately \$4.6 million in Carroll County.

The announcement comes in a six-month period of four industrial announcements — Granges in Huntingdon announced it is adding to its employment base beyond

the number originally announced, V-Line announced it was locating a distribution center in Bruceton, and Pottery Direct announced it is constructing a new facility in McKenzie, adjacent to the Carroll County Airport.

VP is expanding its U.S. operations by locating a new manufacturing and packing facility in Huntingdon.

VP, a race fuel manufacturer and dis-

tributor, is recognized by many as the world leader in race fuel technology, with a catalog of more than 70 fuel blends and a growing roster of VP-fueled champions across the entire spectrum of motorsports. In recent years, the company has expanded its product portfolio to include small engine fuels, diesel products, appearance

ATWOOD (February 13) — Penny Schwinn, Tennessee's new commissioner of Education, was well pleased following her visit to two local schools in Carroll County. Both are among the limited number of Reward Schools in the state.

While a tight schedule did not allow her time to visit with media representatives at McKenzie, she did have comments following her afternoon visit at West Carroll Junior-Senior High in Atwood.

She said, "This is an incredible school. There are a few things that made it incredible. One, I saw teachers who love what they do, passionate about what they do, and passionate about the kids. I heard from kids who know what they want to do and how they are going to get there. And most importantly, they felt like they are home. When they came to school, they felt just like they are

home. There is something special about that. I don't think we talk enough about feeling that level of community when you are at school. I was very moved and impressed by that. I met leaders who knew their kids, they had vision for comes next. You need leaders who know where they are going, you need teacher-leaders who care deeply about the content and the child, and you need students who are excited about learning. I saw all that."

She continued, "Part of the work of being commissioner is to make sure you know what is happening in classrooms across the state. She said she uses that to help develop the policies across the state."

Trezevant Holds Public Hearing On Water System

TREZEVANT — The Town of Trezevant held a public hearing last Tuesday evening, February 12, concerning the town's water/sewer department. The Mayor and Board of Alderman was in attendance along with several concerned citizens to hear the situation and comments.

Alderman Pam Joyner presided over the hearing opening the session with an introduction outlining the basic three choices the town has in regards to what to do with the Water and Sewer Department. Joyner broke it down into three options. The first being keep ownership and not do anything at this time. Option 2 is keep ownership but hire an outside source to manage

McKenzie Council Approves Water Tanker, Glass Honored with Proclamation

McKENZIE (February 11) — During the February meeting of the City of McKenzie Board of Mayor and Council, along with the police department raise (see McKenzie Police Department to Receive Substantial Raise), a new water tanker was approved for the fire department. The fire department needed a new tanker to haul water on out of city fire calls. The current tank is a homemade 1987 model. The requested tanker is 1994 with 8,898 miles (761 hours) with a cost of \$34,900.

In order to finance the new vehicle, Chief Brian Tucker said he could will be purchased through \$25,000 from contract sales; sell the old tanker for \$5,000; sell of the department's Chevy Blazer \$2,500; deduction from training budget \$1,900; and utilities budget surplus of \$4,000. The council unanimously voted in favor of the purchase.

McKenzie High School golfer Maggie Glass received a proclamation from Mayor Jill Holland and the council. Glass was recognized as Low Score Medalist in 20 of 29 High School match-

es during her first two years of high school play, was a District and Regional medalist during her first two years of high school play; qualified for TSSAA state tournament during her first two years of high school play; received eleventh and tenth place at the state tournament during her first two years of high school play; was chosen for the Jackson Sun newspaper's All West Tennessee First Team during her first two years of high school; and was selected as the Jackson Sun newspaper's 2018 Female Golfer of the Year.

The council approved the standards and regulations of small cell towers. Recommendations for the standards came from the McKenzie Regional Planning Commission. The new relations follow the guidelines set by the State of Tennessee and were patterned towards the ones set by Dyersburg.

Confirmations of Neil Haywood, Bill Davis and Monica Heath were made to the McKenzie Regional Planning Commission along with Daniel Hollowell to the Parks and Recreation Board.

During the citizens input portion of the meeting, Juanita Jones provided the board with information on a com-

munity program Keep My Hood Good. The program was developed in Jackson, Tenn. for at risk children from ages 8-18. Arthur Kapeller asked to present a signed petition against the issuance of a beer license to Rene Enang d/b/a Red Cave Café & Hookah Lounge. Mr. Kapeller was informed the Alcohol Board would not meet that night due to the failure of giving public notice of the meeting. The meeting was rescheduled to February 24, 2019 at 12 p.m.

Under department reports Public Works Supervisor Johnny Mercer stated his department was continuing work on brush and leaf pick up; servicing and prepping bush-hog; looking at water drainage issues in Richardson Subdivision.

Parks Department Director Mike Beasley was not present due to illness. Water and Sewer Department Superintendent Billy Wood said his department was working on leaks and trying to stop sewer over flows from heavy rains.

Codes Officer Phillip Morrisett stated he was dealing with condemnation hearings.

er stated for the month of January there was a 32 total incidents, 7 were from motor vehicle accidents and the department assisted Gleason twice on fire calls.

Police Department Chief Craig Motes noted 1166 calls for the month with 549 security checks, 154 investigations and 156 vehicle stops.

Mayor Holland provided the Main Street report with an update on the Chocolate Tour; reminded board of

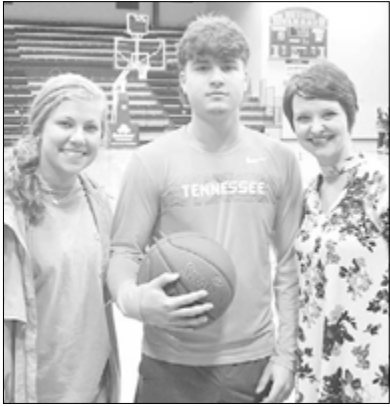

The first firefighter on the scene, Captain Doug Pruitt, said the house was fully engulfed upon his arrival. All of the occupants, Ms Whitney Costa and her four children were outside of the home. Capt. Pruitt reported the north end of the home appeared to be the point of origination. The structure was totally destroyed. The resident and her children escaped with only the clothing they were wearing. It seems that several pets did not escape the fire.

Upon being informed of the tragedy, the Huntingdon Church of Christ began immediate efforts to collect clothing for these children and their mother. Ages of the children are 10, 12, 14, and 16. Other churches and individuals have offered to assist and have contacted Walter Smothers,

Huntingdon Approves Adjustments To Wastewater, Recreation Projects

HUNTINGDON (February 12) — Members of the Huntingdon Town Council approved change orders for construction projects at the recreation park and wastewater lagoon during its February 12 meeting.

The first change order was with Miller Contractors for a final price of \$198,738 to make improvements to the chlorine contact basin. Miller was the

cheapest of three bidders. A review of the bids by the engineer indicated Miller's offer saved \$61,262 off the original bid.

A second change order approved was on the 2016 LPRF Kelley Sports Complex, Phase II concession building. No contractors participated in the bidding for a metal stairs work. Jones Electric and Automation, LLC of McKenzie agreed to complete the construction at a cost of \$109,187, which was \$29,397 higher than originally budgeted.

Mayor Dale Kelley announced several railroad crossings are under review for improvements by the Tennessee Department of Transportation. TDOT is scheduled to complete a design phase for repaving between Court Square and Rosser Circle.

Kelley hopes that the Norandal Drive - at the Jail, and Dr. Howard Johns Drive, near Co-Op can be upgraded at the railroad crossings since both are in close proximity to State Route 70.

Trezevant Approves More Funding for CSX Crossing Study

TREZEVANT — Trezevant's board of aldermen met in regular session last Tuesday, February 12, following a public hearing regarding the town's water department. The agenda was short with not a lot of actions taken but there was much discussion on several items.

Mayor Bobby Blaylock informed the board of more expenditures that needed to be approved regarding the North Park Street Project. Boardmembers reluctantly approved \$8,800 for a preliminary engineering agreement between CSX railroad and Trezevant followed up by another \$6,500 to A2H Engineering for

the same project. This followed discussion centered around how much more money the town was going to be spending on this project before it was completed.

The Board heard Dale McCrae, who was in the process of tearing down unrepairable items around his home and was communicating with the town on what was being done. According to town employee Mary Jo Hall, the Grimes family has indicated they are out of financial resources. They were asked to move items from their front yard out of site but nothing has occurred as of the board meeting. Discussion ensued on how much time to give them before taking some kind of action.

Board members spoke of their opinions regarding the water department issue. Most are not

in favor of selling the system at this time. City Attorney Charles Trotter advised board members to "hear everyone out" before deciding especially since Alderman Pam Joyner put together the public hearing and is working to get people to come to the March meeting to advise the board on their options. In new business, citizen Latonya Carter had approached the town about extending a sewer line to her residence since she was told by the state she couldn't have a septic tank being so close to the bypass right of way. It was determined not cost effective to run the sewer and recommended to reject Carter's request.

The state would then have to buy her property. The recommendation was approved by the board.

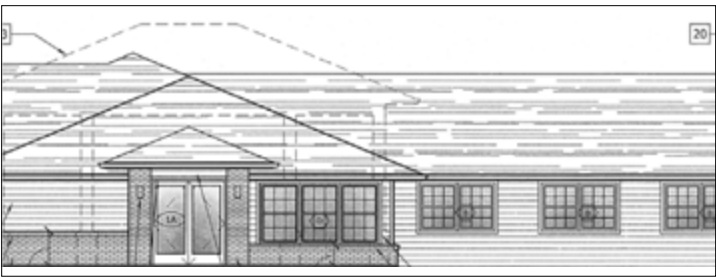
Christian Care Center Expansion Approved

McKENZIE (February 13) — Christian Care Center expansion was approved Wednesday, February 13 by the McKenzie Design Review Commission. Steve Drummer, a representative with Ken Ross Architects, submitted a building composition detail/site plan for a proposed addition to the existing Christian Care Center of McKenzie formally known as Oak Manor.

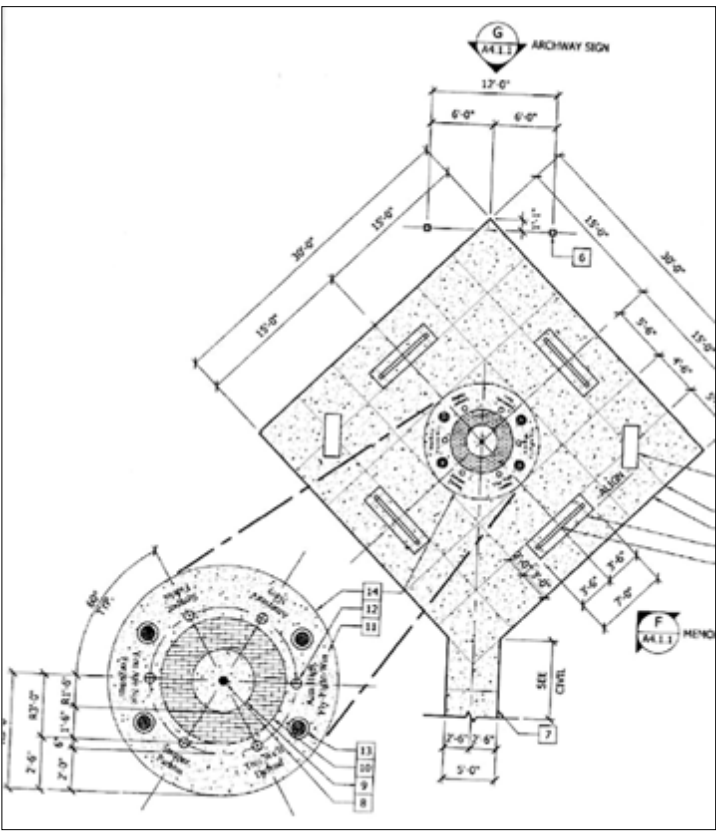
In a prior meeting of the commission, it was recommendation to amend the plans to provide additional brick or similar material other than vinyl siding on the eastern elevation (side view) of the proposed building in order to meet the zoning ordinance.

In addition to the revised plans, Ken Ross Architects submitted plans that exceed the material demands that fall within the compliance. The revisions not only comply, but exceed requirements at 40% versus the minimum 25% of brick to the facade.

The submitted site plan consists of a new addition Highway 79, it will be positioned in the northeastern most corner of the subject property. The addition will have a finished floor elevation of 487.12 feet. A new parking lot facility is shown with 16 regular and four (4) ADA accessible parking spaces. The parking lot facility will be paved and will also contain a sidewalk. Drainage will follow the natural pattern established on the site. It will collect through a proposed storm-sewer manifold pipe that will discharge water at a point along the western right-of-way of Oak Manor Road located south of the proposed driveway entrance. The site plan depicts landscaping throughout the site. The plans also include a Veterans Memorial Garden.

Commissioner Schwinn also previously served in other state and district roles as an Assistant Secretary of Education in the Delaware Department of Education and as Assistant Superintendent of Performance Management for the Sacramento City

Unified School District. She is also the founder and former superintendent of Capitol Collegiate Academy, at the time one of the county’s highest performing charter schools serving low-income students from a region of Sacramento where she grew up. it. Option 3 is to privatize the system, in other words, sell it out right.

Joyner introduced Mr. Don Reed who is the water supervisor for McLemoresville. Reed gave the audience a run down on how McLemoresville’s Water System is set up. Reed told the audience McLemoresville provides water but not waste water. He indicated they have 150 meters with 130 of them active. He said six years ago they got a grant to upgrade the whole system to meters that could be read remotely and not require a meter reader. McLemoresville was the first town in the county to have that capability.

Alderman Tim Rogers spoke next about Atwood’s Water System. Atwood has three wells and a water plant that can be remote controlled. Atwood provides water and sewer to approximately

540 customers. They still manually read the meters at this time. He indicated the town installed new water lines during the 1980’s, all PVC pipes. Rogers also indicated the town has an organized maintenance program for the water system.

Rogers stated, “I’m not for selling our water system. I believe we can get this straightened out.”

Tim Fullington, Certified Licensed Water Operator for Cedar Grove and Trezevant, described the water system as being mainly two basic parts. One part sends water to the plant and the other part delivers from the plant to the customer. There are 383 manually read meters. He indicated a lot of equipment is older and will need to be upgraded.

“I’ve talked to TAUD (Tennessee Association of Utility Districts) and other sources and they aren’t keen on seeing a city sell their water system,” said Fullington.

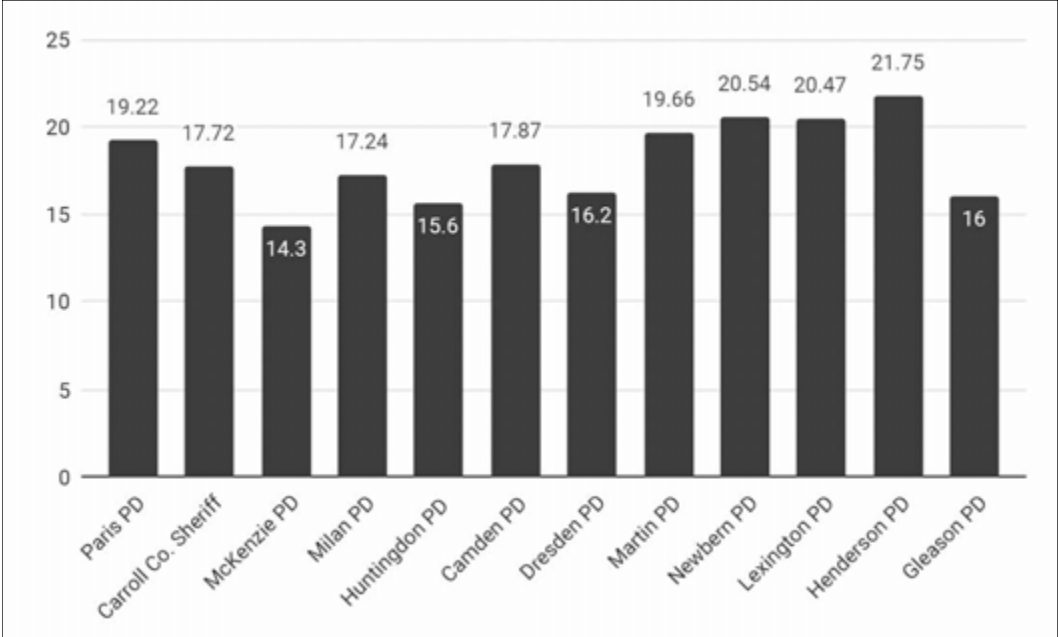
Trezevant Financial Officer Jeff Goad told the board and

audience that as of January 31, the water department was slightly over \$14,000 over budget due mainly to unexpected repairs to Water Department equipment and if nothing else breaks they might break even financially.

The public was given an opportunity to ask questions. One question was if the Water System was up for sale. Alderman Joyner answered saying we want to address Options 2 and 3 at the March meeting inviting people to talk to us about these options.

Another question asked was how the water department got into its current situation. City Attorney Charles Trotter summarized the issue saying multiple ongoing problems got the town to this point. A citizen asked if the town owed money on the water department for upgrades the answer was Trezevant is currently debt free.

Mayor Bobby Blaylock summarized the whole session saying, “The system is fine right now but plans need to be made now for the future.”

to fix the problem.

“If we give a \$2 raise to our officers, then we are not going to stop this problem. Slightly raising their pay will lead a neighboring towns like Huntingdon and Dresden to raise the pay a dollar or so, and we are right back on the roulette wheel recruiting uncertified officers,” stated Martin.

Included in the motion is the financing of the raise; all funds allocated will derive from fines paid through traffic cameras, if there is a shortfall then remaining balance must come from 2018-2019 police department budget through capital gains section. Also there will be a review in July of the police department budget that will include a step plan for future raises and provide an update on retention from February to the end of June.

The second was provided by Councilman Charles Pruneau who concurred, “it is time for the City of McKenzie to take care of its officers.”

During discussion, Councilman Jessie Townes raised the question if the city could afford the pay raise. Assistant Police Chief Ricky Sawyers explained the camera funds should cover the expense and there is extra money in the budget that can be used.

Councilman Brian Winston added the city must be good stewards of the people’s tax dollars, but added something has to be done to stop the high turnover rate.

At the close of discussion, the council unanimously approved the pay raise.

The McKenzie Police Department has replaced 17 officers in the five years. Within the last eight months, five officers have left for higher wages.

The high turnover rate is putting a strain on police budget due to excessive overtime and increased training costs. This

has lead to safety issues with the lack of backup available for more serious calls and forced to dependence on county sheriff’s office. Slower response times have occurred along with poorer police service to the community.

The cost to replace the five officers who left in the last eight months has cost the city \$155,000 in training along with equipment for the new officers. Now McKenzie is forced to put more inexperienced officers on duty, and there is a loss of institutional knowledge.

The average patrol officer in Tennessee is earning a salary of \$18.05 an hour; McKenzie would have paid that same officer \$14.30 an hour. Prior to the pay raise, the McKenzie Police Department rated the lowest in salary for patrol officers in 12 police agencies within a 40-mile radius of McKenzie.

The \$3 raise will cost approximately \$115,970 a year. The money accumulated from traffic cameras and less spent on training should level out the pay increase within one calendar year.

This is a great complement to our strong portfolio in Northwest Tennessee,” said Christine Hillard, President and COO of Forever Communications. “My partners, Donald Alt, Kerby Confer and I have a strategy to continue growing Forever Communications’ community impact in Kentucky and Tennessee while we help local businesses grow.”

WHDM was first started in McKenzie in the 1950s with studios in the former Hotel, located at the intersection of Main and Cedar streets (where McKenzie Banking Company is located). The call letters stood for H - Huntingdon, D - Dresden, and M - McKenzie. Mike Freeland secured the first FCC license for the station. Earl and Gladys Nolting bought and operated the station in the

early days.

The studio was relocated to Main Street, behind The McKenzie Banner. Ed Perkins owned the station at that time and had the first community TV broadcast of in-studio events, such as gospel singing on Sunday morning. It also featured a 24-hour weather TV station, that showed a live view of weather gauges. The station remained on Main Street until purchased by Benton-Weatherford Broadcasting. The studio was then relocated to Paris. Up to the 1990s, the transmitter was located at 570 Tower Road, but now stands on property adjacent to the railroad on the former “egg plant” factory location.

Through the years, the station was owned by Mike Freeland, Earl Nolting, Ed Perkins, Frank Schweitzer, who moved in from Colorado, and Dick Bennett. When Bennett died, his wife took the station off the air until it was purchased by Benton Weatherford.

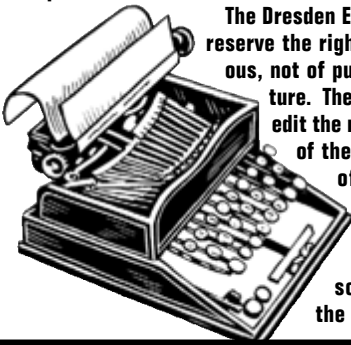

Hope it's Not Too Late

Nonnie got a call from our nine year old granddaughter. Hannah was excited about being out of school because of the snow. They talked way past "for a while". I just shook my head and wondered what in the world was happening to this younger generation.

When Ed Perkins gave us the news over WHDM radio on a snowy morning when I was nine that school was closed for the day—the last thing on my mind was my grandmother! I was tearing out the back door pulling that wool cap down tight. We had a whole complete entire "free" day waiting! I loved Granny "a bushel and a peck and a hug around the neck", but there is a time and place for everything!

I raced David Mark down to the high bank on the other side of the road past Aunt Jessie's house. We didn't have a fancy sled, we just flung ourselves over the edge and rolled and tumbled all the way down to the big ditch. We didn't waste time with snow angels. But we did flatten out lots of snow patterns as we fought our way back up the embankment.

We'd scrounge up a cardboard box or a garbage can lid, make a quasi sled out of it, and see who could slide the greatest distance down the bank. We'd build snow-forts fifteen feet apart and throw snowballs, dirt clods, rocks, pitch forks and our shoes at each other till our arms gave out!

If the snow was deep enough we'd chase rabbits. Having to hop up to clear

the snow really slowed them down. We'd run'em from up near the back of the swimming pool all the way out the Como Road. We never actually caught one, but I'm telling you with my hand up, we've come awful close.

It was an extra bonus when the little stream in the big ditch froze over. You talk about Olympic speed skating! And, although the stream was very narrow and we didn't have sticks, helmets, skates, pucks, nets or official looking oversized gloves, we'd play hockey for hours on end. We didn't score much. It was hard to control a Pet milk can with a tree limb while you were slipping and sliding in those old brogans. But we had some fights that would make the Chicago Blackhawks sit up and take notice!

I'd skip lunch (you could always make it up on a school day) and head over to Forrest Avenue. Ricky Hale had a genuine store-bought sled and if it was really cold and the snow stopped, the street would glaze over with a perfect icy layer. We'd come down that big hill where Forrest curves into Main Street doing ninety miles an hour...and praying nobody would be foolish enough to be out driving a car in this terrible weather!

There was no slowing down, steering or getting off once you left the top of the hill. And the only way to stop was the crash landing when we hit the curb on the far side of Main. It was not a trip for the faint of heart. I've seen guys flying over

hedges, flailing into mulberry bushes and ramming into leafless dogwoods.

Only a complete idiot would make that trip twice!

We'd do it over and over until we thought about the traffic light up town. We'd pile up a stash of snowballs and hide behind the World War I Monument and wait for an unsuspecting vehicle to slide to a halt. While the occupants waited for the green light, snowballs from "out of nowhere" would drop in, on and around the car. I can still see those faces today peering skywards out of a foggy window.....with the most quizzical look!

The memory is almost as much fun as it actually WAS in 1956.

First thing Mom would say as I rushed into the kitchen eight seconds before dark was, "Where's your hat?"

I didn't even know it wasn't still on my head. It could have fallen off in the first fight with David. Or the twenty-third time we hit the Main Street curb...

The point is I've got to make an emergency trip to Tennessee. Hannah's in dire need of a "snow-day" tutorial! They've built so many houses down by Aunt Jessie our bank is gone, it's doubtful Ricky still has the sled, but I know that Monument up by the light is still standing stately on the square...

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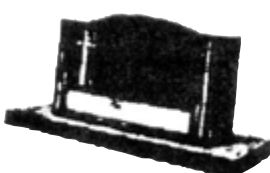

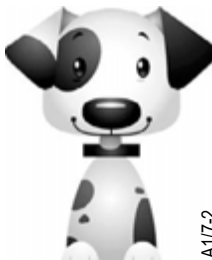

HCMC Encouraging Friends, Family To Avoid Visiting Due to the Flu

PARIS — HCMC announced a need for friends and family to limit their visitation of patients due to the increased number of cases of flu in the community and within the hospital. HCMC is also asking that family and friends, especially those under 14 years of age, do not visit the HCMC Women's Center and Critical Care Units. Pregnant women are also being encouraged to not come to the emergency room unless truly emergent. Last week, HCMC experienced an influx of patients in the ER testing positive with Flu Type A. It is estimated that about one in five patients are receiving this diagnosis in the ER and there are many flu patients within the hospital. Additionally, hand sanitation stations have been set up throughout the facility with sanitizer gel and masks. We encourage all visitors who meet the criteria below to follow the visitation guidelines: • Immediate family only will be allowed on the units. • No one that has been sick or exposed to the flu will be allowed on the units. • No one, immediate family included, who is experiencing, or has been around anyone with these signs and symptoms will be allowed on the units: - Fever Cough Sore Throat - Body Aches Headaches Chills - Fatigue Diarrhea Vomiting • No one under 14 years old will be permitted on the units unless the child is a brother or sister of your new baby AND the child has not been sick, not experiencing any of the signs & symptoms listed above and has not been exposed. "We appreciate the community following these guidelines for the safety of our patients as well as our visitors," said Jacki O'Brien, Director of Infection Control at HCMC. "With the continued increase in prevalence of flu and stomach bug, we want to make sure that our patients get well, and taking out risk is the most important thing for our patients."
