Reedy Creek Baptist Celebrates Installation of Historic Marker

McLEMORESVILLE (April 7) — Reedy Creek Missionary Baptist Church celebrated another milestone on Sunday with the dedication of a historic marker that tells the history of the church.

The church family celebrated 150 years of worshiping and service to Jesus in December 2017. The church and the church family have a storied history of slaves who worshiped in the church. The history includes a fire that destroyed the church and the splitting of the church congregation into two in 1957 with a court chancellor helping in the dissolution of assets. Both Reedy Creek and New Reedy Creek still survive. Both are in McMoresville.

The marker is a tribute to the first pastor, once enslaved, the Reverend Levi Price, whose family includes the Tharpes, Gilberts, and Grays of Carroll and Henry counties. Sam Tharpe, former mayor of Paris, Tennessee and retired principal at Grove School in Paris, spoke on behalf of the family.

Other speakers included Senator John Stevens, McMoresville Mayor Phil Williams County Commissioner Ronnie Murphy, and Pastor N.C. Falls.

The History

Saturday, before the first Lord's Day in September 1836, there were a group of people who met and organized a church and named it Reedy Creek Baptist Church. They held their worship services in homes for the rest of the year.

On February 13, 1837, these individuals purchased a parcel of land from R.E.G. Daughtery. The deed is recorded in deed book "D", page 139 in the Carroll County Register of Deeds office. This land was furnished with a building which was renovated into a church. They worshiped there until the end of the Civil

War. Believe it or not, there were slaves that joined Reedy Creek Baptist Church. According to the Carroll County History Book, the name of the church was briefly called McMoresville Baptist Church.

In 1867, the white members moved to Trezevant and sold their rights to the black members; and that is when the church became Reedy Creek Missionary Baptist Church. The first pastor was Rev. Levi Price. As slaves, Rev. Levi Price and his wife, Lizzie Price were slaves who were members of Reedy Creek Baptist Church. In 1867, Reedy Creek Missionary Baptist Church was the only black church in the area.

Not long after, it became Reedy Creek Missionary Baptist Church, the brick church was burned, but that did not stop our founders. They moved down the hill and built a log cabin. The membership got so large that they had to build a larger building. On the third Sunday in May 1877, they moved into the new building and had communion services. For fifty years, the third Sunday in May was one of the biggest days for the church. It was called homecoming for people near and far made their way home on this day. The building

lasted until 1957. In 1957, the church moved up the hill to the present location.

As with some things in life, differences of opinions began and these differences were not secured without delay. These differences lead to a division, which ended with a decision being made in the Carroll County Chancery Court. A copy of this deed can be found in deed book 110, page 71 in the Carroll County Register of Deeds office. This deed was recorded on February 25, 1957.

On the third Sunday in December 1957, Rev. Alvandon Taylor and Union Grove Missionary Baptist Church, Puryear dedicated this building. Rev. Taylor's message on the third Sunday in 1957 was taken from the 4th chapter of Joshua. He talked about the 12 stones and how the Lord opened up Jordan for the children of Israel to cross and how the stones were to be memorials to the people of Israel forever. He stated that your children will ask you why there are two churches with the same name--"you tell them that two wives can't live in the same house."

HCMC Adds Pulmonary Clinic

Kids Fly Free This Saturday at Carroll County Airport

McKENZIE — Area young people ages 8-17 will have a chance to take to the skies on Saturday, April 13, as Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) Chapter 734 hosts a Young Eagles Flight Rally at Carroll County Airport.

The rally is part of the EAA Young Eagles Program, created to interest young people in aviation. Since the program was launched in 1992, Volunteer EAA pilots have flown more than 2 million young people.

"Free airplane rides are just part of the Flight Rally," said Bill Stoner, local EAA Chapter 734 president. "We hope to give a new generation a chance to learn about the possibilities that exist in the world of aviation." Pilots at the event will explain about their airplanes allowing young people to discover how airplanes work and how pilots ensure safety before every flight. The flights will be over McKenzie in general aviation aircraft which are much smaller than the jets often associated with flying.

Following the flight, each young person, will receive a certificate making them an official Young Eagle. Their name will then be entered into the "World's Largest Logbook" with over 2 million flight logged. It is on permanent

display at the EAA Air Adventure Museum in Oshkosh, WI. The Logbook is also accessible on the Internet at www.young eagles.org.

To attend the flight rally on April 13 come to Carroll County Airport on Highway 22 between McKenzie and Huntingdon. Registration and flights are between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. A parent or legal guardian must sign the registra-

tion form but will not be flying.

Household Hazardous Waste to Be Collected in Weakley County

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) mobile household hazardous waste collection service will be in Weakley County on Saturday, April 13.

Tennesseans are encouraged to bring household hazardous waste – including cleaning fluids, pesticides, batteries and more – to a designated drop-off location. A person does not need to live in the county to participate.

The drop-off location is: Weakley County Convenience Center, 608 County Maintenance Rd., Dresden, 8 a.m.-noon. The local contact is Michelle Nichols at (731) 364-6798.

"We encourage all Tennesseans with eligible materials to participate in this no-cost program," said TDEC Commissioner David Salyers. "This is a way to dispose of common hazardous materials in an environmentally responsible way."

Since the program's inception in 1993, 350,000 Tennessee house-

holds have properly disposed of more than 22 million pounds of material.

Household hazardous waste materials are considered flammable, toxic, reactive and/or corrosive and should not be placed with regular garbage. Typical items to dispose of include cleaning fluids, pesticides, mercury thermometers and thermostats, fluorescent lamps, lithium and button batteries, aerosols, adhesives, medications, brake fluid, swimming pool chemicals, paint thinner and used needles in sturdy containers. Items not accepted include ammunition, explosives, alkaline batteries, paint, electronics and any empty containers that should be disposed in normal trash.

While household waste may be disposed for free, there is a cost for disposal of Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator Waste (i.e. wastes from non-household sources such as businesses, schools, farms,

churches, etc.) An appointment is also necessary. Call (615) 643-3170 to request a price quote and schedule an appointment.

Many counties and municipalities meet the needs of local residents by providing collection of batteries, oil, paint, antifreeze and electronic scrap – or BOPAE, as it is sometimes called. When handled correctly, these BOPAE materials are minimally hazardous, but inappropriate for collection at household hazardous waste events. Tennesseans are encouraged to contact their local city or county solid waste department to find BOPAE collection sites in their area.

When transporting materials to the site, place containers in sturdy boxes lined with newspaper to prevent spills and cross-contamination in the trunk of a car or back of a truck. Be sure to keep materials away from children and pets.

- Follows written/verbal work instructions that they have been trained.
- Other duties as directed.
- Operate press break machine.

- Check machine for defects and repair if necessary.

- Read drawings and blueprints.

resulting in multiple injuries. The driver from one car emerges with a head injury and discovers that her passenger has been thrown onto the hood and is unresponsive. The driver of the other car stumbles out and is helped up by a passenger. Both have minor injuries. Two other passengers remain trapped in the car. First responders arrive and begin assessing the scene. The passenger on the hood is pronounced dead and covered with a sheet. The first driver is interviewed by an officer, then given a field sobriety test and arrested for drunk driving. During the process, the father of the deceased arrives and angrily confronts the driver. He is also arrested. The other driver, who had been texting, and one passenger are treated on the scene. The other two passengers are extracted and taken on stretchers to an ambulance. The deceased teen is placed into a body bag and taken to the middle of the field, where

first responders and the mother surround him to mourn. During the enactment, statistics on impaired driving and laws are read, along with a poem from the perspective of a teen as she dies following a crash. Following the mock crash, all of the county juniors and seniors traveled to McKenzie High School to hear a guest speaker, Erica Ross of Gleason. During lunch at their respective home schools, students were asked to sign a “prom promise” to not drive impaired or distracted. In an interview with media, including The Banner, Khrystian Bynum, Carroll County Prevention Coalition Coordinator, said, “Especially with prom season coming up, we really want to make sure they see potentially what the most serious consequences can be. It's all about prevention, just making sure they're educated and informed. The most we can do is help them make a good decision.” Mandy Drewry, Director of Carroll County Coordinated School Health, added, “Hopefully it made it more real for them, hopefully for them to make a choice not to drink and drive or text and drive and to be safe.” Volunteers and participants

\$25 million in the first year for the ESA, is new allocated funds and is not taking away from the \$6.4 billion allocated to public schools. David Duncan, director of schools for Hollow Rock-Bruce-ton, said the \$7,000 per student allocation will not get students into a private school, which is overwhelmingly \$9,000 to \$30,000 annually. Holt said competition of schools can help reduce the overall costs. He said Central Christian Academy in Martin is

approximately \$5,300 annually. Overall, public schools in north-west Tennessee are excellent, said Holt. Another teacher said she is a Republican but does not support state funding for schools in which the teachers will not be held to the same standards as those in public schools. ESA students would have fewer requirements of testing, said the teacher. Holt said public schools must administer too many tests and he hopes public schools have fewer mandates. He said eastern and western Europe has forced a part of government in every part of education. In other subjects, Holt said Tennessee is the best managed state in the union, has no debt

on its highway system, and its economy is booming. He noted the state's great fiscal position is a product of years of good management. “There is not another state better managed,” said Holt. He said the state is facing recurring expenses with recurring revenues. As for the northwest Tennessee area, Holt said it is doing better at keeping pace now than in previous years. Northwest Tennessee has lacked the state in several areas of development. Holt serves as chairman of the Finance, Ways, and Means Subcommittee and a member of the Finance, Ways, and Means Committee, and a member of the Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee.

Tri-County Unemployment Rates Continue to Decrease

NASHVILLE (March 28) — The percentage of persons unemployed in February decreased from the January rate in the tri-counties of Carroll, Henry and Weakley. Carroll posted a unemployment percentage of 4.6 in January compared to 5.5 in January and down from the February 2018 rate. Of the 12,150 in the labor force, 11,580 were employed and 560 were unemployed. Henry County had slightly more unemployed at 610 persons. In February, the number of peo-

ple in the labor force was 14,470 with 13,870 employed for a rate of 4.2 percent, down from the 4.5 rate one month earlier and 5.0 one year earlier. Weakley County posted an unemployment rate of 3.5 percent in February, down from 5.1 in January and 4.0 one year earlier. Of 16,570 in the labor force, 16,000 were employed and 570 were unemployed. Two counties in West Tennessee are in the top ten in unemployment. Lake County leads the state with a 5.9 percent un-

employment rate. Lauderdale County is tenth with a 5.2 unemployment rate. The Northwest Tennessee region of Benton, Carroll, Crockett, Dyer, Gibson, Henry, Lake, Obion and Weakley counties has the overall highest average unemployment at 4.1 percent. Tennessee has a 3.2 percent rate of unemployment and the United States has 3.8. Williamson County has the lowest rate at 2.2 percent, followed by Davidson at 2.3.

agenda, however, commissioners delayed for one month to investigate the viability and service record of Red River. Republic Services, the current provider, has had the contract for approximately 25 years and asked commissioners to re-search Red River, the low bidder, for its service record. With the new contractor, the

resolution calls for the customers' rate to remain unchanged for five years at \$18 monthly, which is the current rate. The difference in costs of \$13.23 and the final cost of \$18 is administrative charges and monthly billing. In other resolutions, the county approved the sale of .038 acres of land for \$900 to the Tennessee Department of Transportation to facilitate the new section of State Route 76 (US 79) which will bypass both Atwood and Trezevant and reconnect to the existing route

north of Trezevant at Cutlip Lane. Approved appointments of Rita Jones and Billy Smith to the Board of Zoning Appeals and Carroll County Regional Planning Commission. A resolution was approved to apply for a 100 percent USDA grant to fund a pilot program for adult education. Mayor Joseph Butler said the funding would be in the \$30,000 to \$35,000 range to purchase equipment. If the grant is approved, the first pilot program would possibly be in the Bruce-ton area.

A hotel on the present “stand”.

Blest Be the Tie that Binds...

Richard met us at the door. I could see the loss of sleep in his eyes. I could see the concern. I could see the heartache. I could see he had aged “more than a little” since we’d eaten at Anne’s Diner the summer before. But mostly I saw the love.

He married Kathy Sue Kennedy in June of 1972. I didn’t tell him at the time, but he was getting the very best we had. I figured unless he was a complete idiot, he already knew that!

He smiled and ushered us into his home like we were first cousins....which is exactly what David and I were. And let me educate you a little here on country cousin terminology. It’s no trifling matter among the uncomplicated but astute folks that grew up out along Sugar Creek in Lawrence County, Tennessee.

There are natural cousins. Kathy’s father and our Mother were brother and sister. You’re kind of stuck with that cousin no matter the disposition, inclination, temperament or political persuasion. It’s cousins for life....for better or worse....richer or poorer....horse thief or henchman....

Richard had “married in.” There is an option involved here. If the “new” member was deemed OK, worthy, one of us—the “marrying in” tag is never, ever used. If the “by marriage” person was a half-way scoundrel, didn’t treat any member of the family with the utmost respect or his granddaddy voted against Franklin Roosevelt, he wasn’t actually a cousin; he was here only by

marriage. I don’t care if “this one” had been living amongst us for fifty years; they were still referred to as having “married in.” Every time!

Richard is our cousin. Kathy looked weak. But she smiled as she greeted us. And seemed genuinely pleased that we’d come. Her older sister, Martha, was there along with both brothers and Joe’s wife, Wanda. Wanda, in case you are wondering, has also never been considered as “married in”. She’s one of us!

We sat around in a family circle talking about the days most of them were working at the local Murray Ohio Manufacturing Plant, putting together bicycles and lawnmowers. They called it, “hurryin’ for Murray!”

Doctors, hospital visits and endless tests were not mentioned. Hopefully, for everyone’s sake, they were regulated to the back burner for a brief respite. Martha detailed how she weaved bicycle spokes into hubs. Richard had us laughing about interviewing “different” applicants for jobs at Murray. I never left the conversation but my mind time-warped back to the 1950’s.

We spent a lot of summers visiting with J. C., Joe, Martha and Kathy. We’d rummage through the barn, take a bath in the creek and throw crabapples at the cows when Uncle Clifford wasn’t looking. Us boys would wrestle a mite and try to think of ways to annoy the baby sisters. They were hard to rile! Both Martha and Kathy would just nod and grin at us.

Those are the special days you cling to later in life when things get out of kilter....

Kathy was the youngest. We all counted her as the sweetest and most thoughtful of the

whole bunch—and the prettiest, inside and out! Her curly hair and quiet disposition was inherited from Aunt Delia. As was her smile, which started somewhere close to her heart and spilled out through the eyes before drifting down to her mouth.

As the Murray chronicles, and laughter, continued I kicked myself for moving so far away. A paying job, raising children and life in general, can keep us busier and more occupied than we ought to let it.

But I’m telling you, family transcends miles, years, floods, famine, pestilence and heartache.

The world thinks it’s not worth telling if the “story” is not about greed, avarice, political shenanigans, border crossings, failed drug tests, police shootings or Hollywood activists telling us how to live our lives.

How sad. As we laughed our way through the afternoon, the overriding thought was our precious Kathy. She was the reason we had gathered on this day. AND I guarantee you ten times as many in our family were thinking about her in absentia.

Even as Richard shared in the conversation, his eyes kept moving back to his wife. He appreciated that we had come, but his concern never left Kathy. Not for one second.

We thought he was a great guy when he joined our family back in ’72....but I realize today, we all underestimated him.

And family gathering to be family.....now, that’s a real story!

McKenzie School Board Hears Student SCOPE Delegates

McKENZIE — McKenzie’s School Board met Tuesday, April 2, with a short but active agenda on tap. After adopting the regular and consent agenda, High School Counselor Sheila Ridley addressed the board about a recent student trip to the Student Congress on Policies in Education (SCOPE) held in Murfreesboro.

According to Ridley, the annual SCOPE conference is an all-day session involving 300 students from across Tennessee including the four who attended from McKenzie High School. The students representing MHS were Drew Beeler, Isabella Colotta, Momi Deloach, and Cameron Kee. Each was involved in different groups debating different topics involving education such as students getting PE credit for being

involved in school athletics, the various consequences for fighting on school grounds, and high school graduation pathways allowing more flexibility with classes. The Board presented the four with certificates for their participation in the SCOPE conference.

The board unanimously approved amendments to the MSSD Policy Manual regarding Tobacco-Free Schools along with Promotion and Retention. Prior to the vote, School Director Lynn Watkins advised board members the amendment to the Tobacco-Free Schools policy added electronic or battery operated devices and vapor products to the existing policy. On the Promotion and Retention amendment, Watkins advised that the amendment was to make a more realistic retention policy than what already was in existence.

The board also approved the local textbook adoption committee’s

recommendations for Social Studies, Spanish, CTE, Marketing, and Computer Applications. They also approved High School Principal Tim Watkins’ recommendation allowing varsity basketball practice during the school day for the 2019-2020 school year. Typically, the girls practice fourth block during the first semester and boys practice during fourth block during second semester.

Schools Director Lynn Watkins had several announcements for the board including the McKenzie Middle School Honors Banquet being set for April 16 and Teacher Appreciation is May 2. He reminded board members they needed to be thinking about when to hold their annual budget workshop and meet to approve the school budget for next school year and get these dates set. The next school board meeting is May 7 at 5:30 at the board office.

Peay, University of Tennessee-Knoxville, Union University who was ranked 12th, and Vanderbilt University. These were schools that were ranked in the Top 20. Bethel was also ranked ahead of University of Memphis, Tennessee State University, Freed-Hardeman, Middle Tennessee State University, East Tennessee State University, Lipscomb University, and Belmont University.

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Who Is Your Neighbor?
Jesus tells the story of the good Samaritan in the context of being asked by an "expert in the law" what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus throws the question back onto the man, asking him "What is written in the law?" to which the man replies "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind; and, Love your neighbor as yourself." (Luke 10:27 NIV) After telling the man that he has answered correctly, this expert then asks "And who is my neighbor?" The well-known story of the good Samaritan follows, where a priest and a Levite both ignore a man who has been beaten, robbed, and left for dead on the side of the road, but who is then helped by the Samaritan. In a study done with seminary students at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1973, Darley and Batson found that students, even after being reminded of the story of the good Samaritan, were likely to ignore a person in need if they were in a hurry. This doesn't speak highly of our altruistic impulses if we are only willing to help when it won't inconvenience us, but we all know the struggle of wanting to help someone but feeling that our other obligations are a higher priority. Perhaps the moral of this story is not simply that we should be willing to help a stranger in need (who is after all, our neighbor), but more importantly that we shouldn't be in such a hurry. Slow down and take time to notice the needs of those around you. — Christopher Simon

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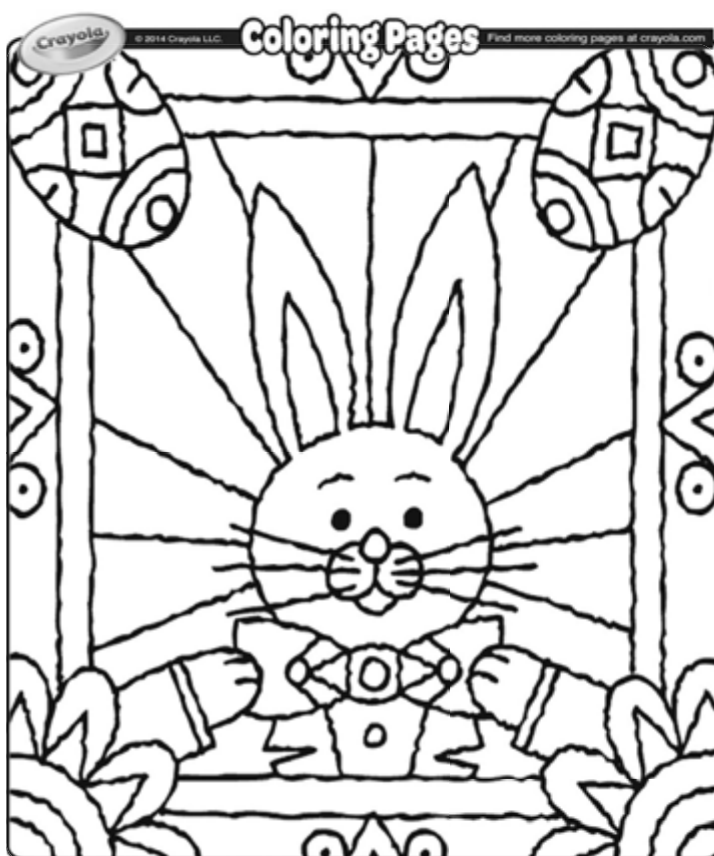

WHEREAS, it is necessary and in the public interest of the City of McKenzie, Tennessee (the "Municipality" or the "City"), to incur indebtedness (the "Indebtedness"), through the execution with The Public Building Authority of the City of Clarksville, Tennessee (the "Authority"), of a loan agreement (a "Loan Agreement"), for the purpose of financing public works projects, as hereinafter more fully described.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of McKenzie, Tennessee, as follows:

SECTION 1. The indebtedness evidenced by the Loan Agreement shall be payable from funds of the Municipality legally available therefor and to the extent necessary from ad valorem taxes to be levied for such purpose on all taxable property within the corporate limits of the Municipality, without limitation as to time, rate, and amount and for the punctual payment of said principal of, and interest on, the Loan Agreement, the full faith and credit of the Municipality will be irrevocably pledged. The portion of the indebtedness evidenced by the Loan Agreement used for the water system projects shall be additionally payable from, but not secured by, the revenues of the water system, subject only to the payment of reasonable and necessary costs of operating, maintaining, repairing, and insuring such water system and to a prior pledge of such revenues in favor of other obligations of the Municipality payable from revenues of the water system.

SECTION 3. The Loan Agreement shall be executed pursuant to the provisions of Title 9, Chapter 21, Tennessee Code Annotated, as amended (the "Act"), and Title 12, Chapter 10, Tennessee Code Annotated, as amended.

SECTION 4. After the adoption of this Resolution, the City Recorder is directed to cause this Resolution, with the notice prescribed by the Act, to be published in full once in a newspaper published and having general circulation in the Municipality.

SECTION 5. This Resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption, the welfare of the Municipality requiring it.

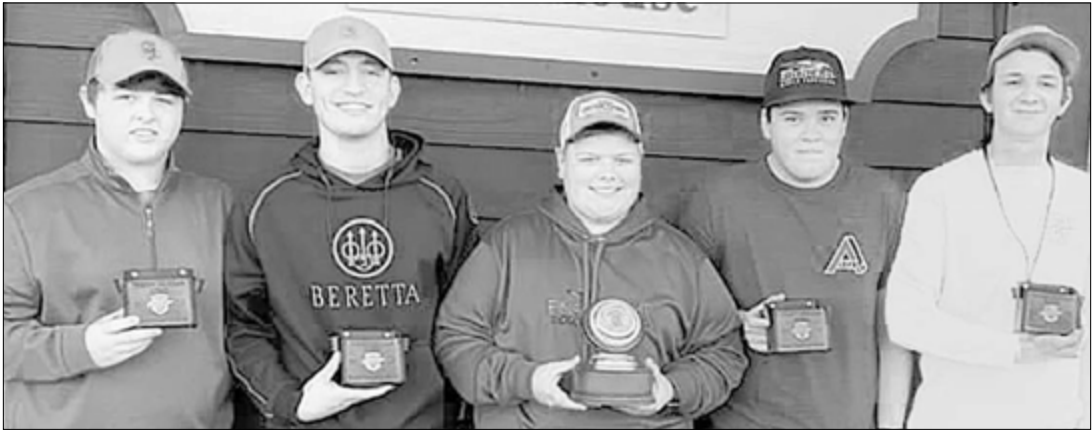

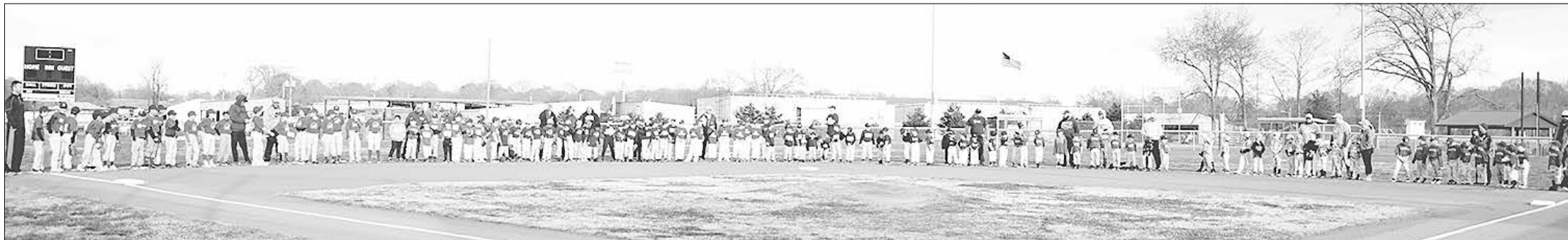

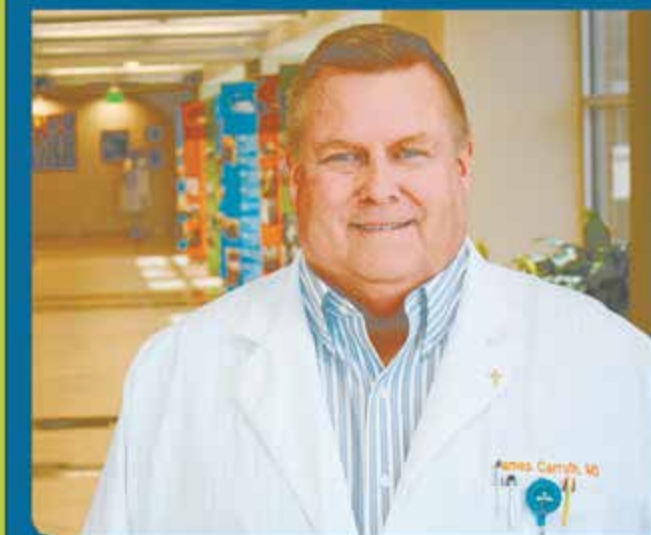
