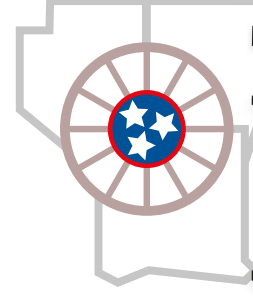

GLEASON, Tenn. (May 25) — A one-vehicle accident Saturday morning claimed the life of an 11-year-old girl and injured three others on Old State Highway 22 in Gleason.

According to the Tennessee Highway Patrol report, Carlie Burton of Gleason was killed in the accident. The accident occurred when driver, Carlie's mom, Kammy Huguely of Gleason drove off the right side of the roadway, overcorrected and drove into a tree. She was driving a GMC SUV.

Huguely was injured along with her two other children in the vehicle. Her four-year old remains in the hospital. Their ages are listed as nine and three. The report does not indicate the extent of their injuries.

Unemployment Rates Improve in Tri-Counties

NASHVILLE — The percentage of persons unemployed in the tri-counties continues to decline, indicating an overall improving economy in the area.

According to the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development, the unemployment rate in 94 counties declined while one county remained unchanged.

In Carroll County, the unemployment rate hit 3.9 percent

in April, as compared to 4.6 in March.

The rate is down from the 4.4 percent in April 2018. From a labor force of 12,190, 11,710 were employed and 480 were unemployed.

In Henry County, the unemployment rate dropped to 3.4 percent, down from 4.1 one month earlier, and 3.7 one year earlier.

From a labor force of 14,540,

there was 14,050 employed and 490 were unemployed.

In Weakley County, the unemployment rate dropped to 3.1 percent, down from 3.6 one month earlier, and 3.4 percent one year earlier.

From a labor force of 16,580, a total of 16,070 were employed and 510 were unemployed.

The northwest Tennessee region of Tennessee had the high-

est unemployment percentage (4.2 percent) of all the regions in the state.

Williamson County had the lowest unemployment rate at 1.9 percent, and Clay County had the highest at 5.6 percent.

West Tennessee counties in the top 10 in unemployment include: Lake, Lauderdale, Haywood, Hardeman and McNairy.

McKenzie to Retain Republic Services

MCKENZIE (May 23) — McKenzie’s City Council met in a called session to award the solid waste contract for once weekly residential curbside garbage pickup within city limits.

Republic Services retained the contract bidding 10.49 per cart. Red River Waste Solutions who bid 11.41 per cart.

The contract is good for five years. The bids were opened earlier this week.

Councilman Jason Martin made the motion to approve Republic’s bid while Councilman Brian Winston seconded the motion. Approval was unanimous with Vice-Mayor Randy Callahan and Councilman Bobby Young absent from the meeting.

No other action or discussion took place during the session prior to adjournment.

New Rural Solid Waste Contract Begins July 1

HUNTINGDON — Rural residents in Carroll County should receive a letter with their monthly billing to provide details about the new contractor for rural residential curbside collection of solid waste.

Jeff Heyduck, manager of the county’s Solid Waste and Recycling, said Red River Waste Solutions of Union City was the selected contractor to provide for the collection and disposal of solid waste for a five-year period beginning July 1.

It ends the 25-year run of service provided by Republic Services, previously known as Barker Brothers.

The mailed letter explains that each person will receive a new 96-gallon rolling cart for the disposal of the residential solid waste.

That cart should arrive in mid-June and should not be used until July 1.

The existing blue or green cart issued by Republic Services should be used exclusively until the final pickup in June, when Republic will dispose of the solid waste and retrieve the cart.

Maps will detail the pickup days, which might change from the current days.

A color-coded sticker on the rolling trash container will indicate the weekday of pick up.

Heyduck said residents along the dividing areas might have Tuesday pick up on one side of the highway, and Wednesday on the other side.

Red River is attempting to streamline the routes.

The new carts are shorter and fatter than the current carts, but both are 96-gallon containers.

The monthly rate of \$18 will remain unchanged for the five-year contract period with Red River.

one son, a lieutenant in the Navy. When the country called, they served, said Commander O'Bryant. He was speaking of the men and women who served in the armed forces. It is the last Monday of each May that Americans honor the memory of those who did not make it home alive. Some remain behind. Some 82,000 are missing in action since World War 1. O'Bryant, himself, was spared from one certain fatal accident. O'Bryant and Stuart Ivey, both Naval aviator, switched assignments. Ivey never made it back alive from that training mission. Stu had a wife, one infant child, and another on the way.

Fewer than two percent of Americans volunteer to serve in the armed forces. He asked the audience to honor their actions and to remember their service. O'Bryant said he works to serve the needs of the veterans and their widows in Carroll County. It might be to help with paperwork, offer a kind word, or to obtain a U.S. Flag. Boy Scout Troop 73 presented the colors to open the ceremony and laid the wreath at the war memorial at the war memorial to close the event. Mayor Dale Kelley welcome the gathering and introduced the gathering of veterans, who were seated separately and each had a red carnation. Henry Simpson performed the National Anthem and Tim Parish offered the closing prayer. Brayden Campbell played "Taps" on the trumpet.

strengthen those brave souls who selflessly give of themselves without asking anything in return." Mayor Holland spoke again, saying, "Today, we pay tribute to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice. We pause as a nation to honor and mourn those, who generation after generation, coming from every corner of our great nation, have shed their blood in this country and in foreign lands across the globe so that we may have our liberty still today."

A medley of the hymns of each military branch was played, and veterans and active members present stood during their respective hymns. Holland then thanked the participants in the program, Jennifer Waldrup, the Parks and Recreation Department, American Legion Post 37 and the Women's Auxiliary and Veterans from VFW Post 4939. She introduced the Memorial Day speaker, Emily Bolin. Bolin is a 2019 MHS honor graduate whose Voice of Democracy essay, "Why My Vote Matters," won the local, district and state contests. She recently returned from Washington, D.C., where she represented McKenzie and the state of Tennessee in the

Veterans of Foreign Wars Voice of Democracy Contest. She finished 39th out of 53 contestants. Bolin then recited her award-winning essay, beginning with a quote from Abraham Lincoln, "Elections belong to the people. It's their decision. If they decide to turn their back on the fire and burn their behinds, then they will just have to sit on their blisters." She lamented that the U.S. is ranked among the worst of all developed nations in voter turnout. "Millions of oppressed people worldwide would give anything for the right we enjoy to go to the polls and vote for or against their leaders. This right, envied by so many, is sometimes taken for granted by those of us who

enjoy it." Bolin continued, "My vote matters because my country matters. My vote shows the love I have for America and my commitment to do my part to continue to make her strong... By exercising my right to vote, I honor those who paid such a terrible price to give that right to me." She concluded, "Many, and most notably President Ronald Reagan, often spoke of America as 'a shining city on a hill.' That light must necessarily be fueled by the courage and the willingness to honor this great land we call home. May she forever be our beacon of liberty so that, for generations to come, her people may bask

in her beautiful glow. So, yes, indeed my vote matters." Mayor Holland presented Bolin with a proclamation from herself and the city council. Sgt. Major Roditis then recited a Memorial Day poem, "Stand Proud, Stand Tall," by Ron Tranmer. It begins, "The flag of our nation, a flag under God. To our flag we will always be true. Stand proud, stand tall with hand over heart, as we honor the red, white and blue." and concludes, "May this land always be strong and free and protected by God from above." Next, Tony Lany of VFW Post 4939 and Dana Deem of American Legion Post 37 placed the memorial wreath in front of the Veterans Memorial, and the

colors were retired. Mayor Holland then concluded the ceremony, saying, "Never, never forget those who made the ultimate sacrifice. Never let your children of their children or their children forget. For when we cease to remember, we dishonor all who came before us and we doom all who come after us. America deserves better... May God bless each of you and your families. May God bless all those who have served and are currently serving and may God continue to bless the greatest nation the world has ever known." Attendees were invited to remain for refreshments served by the VFW Ladies Auxiliary.

charge carries a sentence of 1-2 years with a fine of up to \$3,000 while the Animal Cruelty charges will carry a sentence of up to 11 months/29 days each with a fine of up to \$2,500 for each offense. All counts will run consecutive to each other and a sentencing date has been set for July 22. All other counts have been dismissed according to the plea agreement. Circuit Court has imposed a 10-year ban on the two owning or possessing animals. There will be zero restitution. The defendants will voluntarily dismiss appeals filed in the Court of Criminal Appeals. The state will withdraw a recent motion to revoke bond and will not refile it unless criminal conduct occurs after today's date (May 22). Neutzler and Schoenthal will surrender any remaining animals in Carroll County and Putnam County.

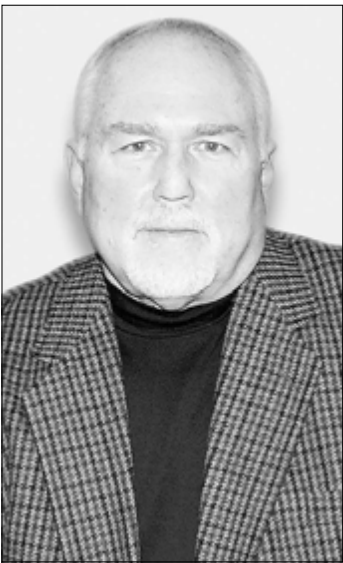
The two were initially charged with over 300 charges including 2 counts of aggravated child abuse, neglect, or endangerment, 30 counts of aggravated cruelty to animals and 122 counts of animal cruelty. The child abuse charges were later dropped for lack of evidence. The charges were filed after a raid on an Atwood residence in, April 2018, during which an estimated 43 large and medium breed dogs, including puppies, 37 cats, including litters of newborn kittens, 17 rabbits, 10 geese, eight chickens, six ducks, six goats, five sheep, five chinchillas, four ferrets, and two alpacas were found without adequate food or water. Several dead animals were found around the property. Animals were found running loose and in cages around the property, inside a barn, and in the suspect's house and garage. The animals were all extremely dirty and suffering from heavy infestations of internal and external parasites, broken bones, extreme matting, eye and ear infections, and respiratory issues. The Carroll County Sheriff's

Department with assistance from the Animal Rescue Corps and Redemption Road Rescue worked to assess the status of the animals and transport the living animals to rescue centers. The case was scheduled to go to trial in Circuit Court in mid-July before arriving at the Best Interest Plea Agreement. Numerous motions were filed in the case including the reduction of the initial bond of \$391,994, a large part of which was supposed to care for the rescued animals, down to \$50,000. This plea agreement comes on the heels of new charges against Nuetzler and Schoenthal in Putnam County, where sheriff's deputies arrived at their residence to serve non-related warrants for Tenn Care Fraud and Felony Theft and found over 40 animals suffering from lack of drinkable water and food along with a range of medical issues. The Putnam County Sheriff's Department is still investigating the animal neglect charges.

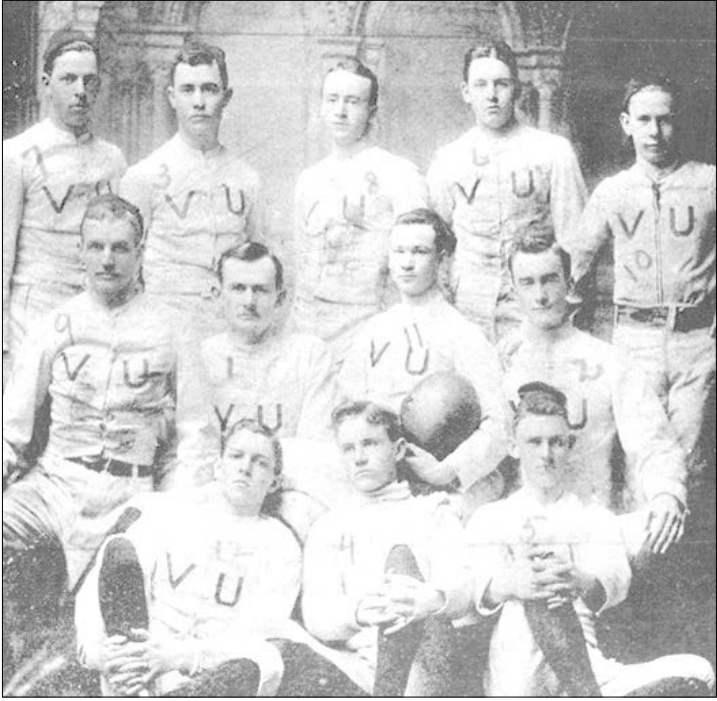

James 'Mr. Jim' Robins

Builder of Men

After flipping through the archives and old newspaper clippings, I found something of interest about James Robins the former principal of the McTyeire School in McKenzie. I decided to use Google to see if anything popped up about Jim Robins. Naturally there was plenty of results about "Mr. Jim" has the principal but then I searched Jim Robins with Vanderbilt and hit pay dirt.

Much to my surprise the University of Vanderbilt named an award after Jim Robins. The Vanderbilt website states, "the James A. Robins award is given annually to perpetuate the memory of Jim Robins, class of 1892, whose life and teaching exemplified selfless devotion to learning, to honor, to participate in sports and service to youth and Vanderbilt. 'Mr. Jim' became a Latin and Greek professor and it is said he never missed a game and even attended some practice sessions. This award has been presented for 55 years to the senior student-athlete in whose life these virtues are most evident. A plaque hangs on the first floor of the Sarratt Student center beyond the Baseball Glove Lounge to celebrate this award and honor the legacy of Jim Robins."

From various newspaper clippings, Robins was on the first football team at Vanderbilt in 1890. A fact worth noting, Vanderbilt and the University of Nashville played the first college football game in the state of Tennessee in 1890.

Robins had a true passion for education and a love for Vanderbilt. After retiring from McTyeire in 1931, he returned to Nashville and became a fixture on the Vanderbilt campus. It was said that Robins sat on the bench at home football games, often accompanied the team to away games, and rarely missed practice.

Ray Morrison recalled, "one day in the football dressing room at the stadium a player remarked that he was having trouble understanding his college algebra. 'Mr. Jim' heard him and took him in the coaches' room and there on the blackboard instructed him for half an hour. The boy later told the coach he learned more algebra in that thirty minutes than he had in the fall term."

For those who are not familiar with the name Ray Morrison, Morrison was as graduate of McTyeire School who played quarterback at Vanderbilt, then became the first head football coach at Southern Methodist University (SMU), he also served as head football coach at his alma mater Vanderbilt and later went on to coach at Temple and Austin College.

Robins' passion was noted by his students along with his distaste for keeping up with the time of day over his tenure:

"The members of the senior class of the McTyeire School would be sitting - if it was a mild October - out in the open in our split bottom chairs, perhaps discussing a difficult passage in the Virgil assignment, or more likely, speculating on how we were going to come out of the football game with our old rival, McFerrin, next Saturday. Then someone would sight "Mr. Jim" walking up the



hill, his bird glasses in hand, a little late today, but not hurrying to take charge of our Latin class: the headmaster never hurried. Someone would sign out, "Fourth year Latin is up; Fourth year Latin's up."

During a homecoming celebration Robins was given a watch in honor of his service as headmaster. In an article about the celebration, the Press-Scimitar noted the gifted watch was considered utterly useless...as principal, Mr. Jim had little respect for the time of day. Classes began when the teachers were read and ended when they were completed. The only use the school had for a timepiece was to mark off the 15-minute periods in football games."

Robins was so admired and respected that on his 90th birthday, President Dwight D. Eisenhower sent him a telegram:

"I hope you will permit me to join with your friends and former students in felicitations on your 90th year and on your splendid record of teaching and inspiration you have been to so many people. My very best wishes for your continued health and happiness."

American literary critic and professor Cleanth Brooks wrote of his old headmaster, "I see him now as a saint, one of that not inconceivable band of provincial saints that the South produced around the turn on the last century, the kind that often impress only a small group of people in a small community and who are soon forgotten, because they left no permanent work. They did not publish a book nor build a building. They worked in a more fragile and impermanent material, for they worked to build men."

That seems to be very true of Mr. Jim. He was a builder of men, he loved his school, his students and his Commodores.

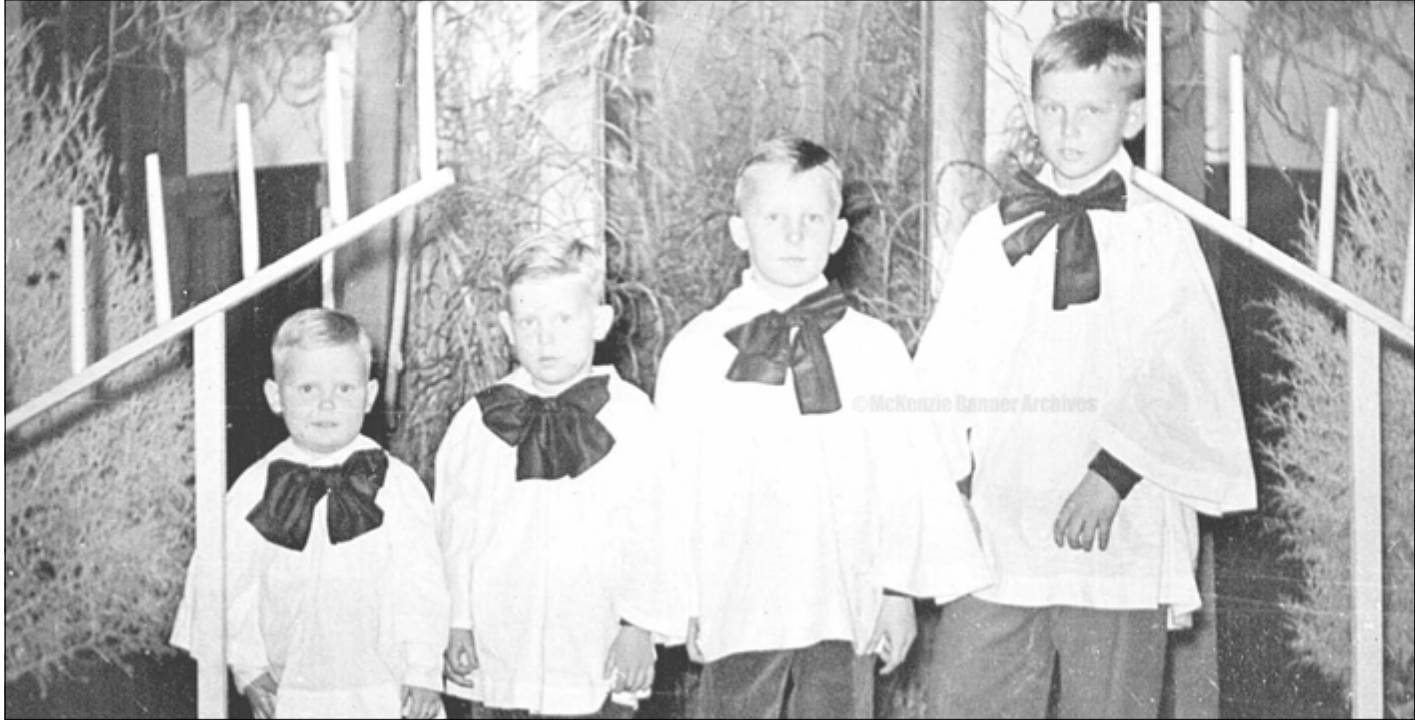

HUNKER DOWN WITH KES

Blessed are the Peacemakers

I leaned in close, peering at the grainy black and white pictures of the shaven heads, taunt faces and ultra skinny frames of the just freed Holocaust victims. Tears slid silently across my face. You didn't have to wonder what these survivors thought of the American soldier!

The World War II Museum in New Orleans is not so much a string of exhibits as it is an "experience".

We arrived with the sun so as not to miss a thing. My friend laid his veteran card on the counter and they near 'bout saluted thanking him for his service and immediately waved his admission fee. I'm telling you, it didn't cost him one penny to get in! And he didn't even mention his time in Vietnam: or his Green Beret, his Combat Infantryman Badge, his Paratrooper Wings or the Bronze Star.

When they discovered that I had never served a day in the military, they were still nice but I didn't exactly get the same treatment.

AND I SHOULD'N'T HAVE! So much gets blurred in our hurry up, it's all about us, let the good times roll society....it's easy to forget that citizen soldiers like my friend paid their admission price at Bunker Hill, Valley Forge, the Argonne Forest, Pearl Harbor, Guadalcanal, Pork Chop Hill, Khe Sanh, Iraq, Afghanistan...

They charged me the full admission fee.

AND THEY SHOULD HAVE! I ought to be paying something. It's always been a one way street for me. I have received every blessing

America has to offer...without lifting a finger. I never left a wife and baby to take an Uncle Sam mandated trip abroad. I've never eaten a K-ration. Slept in a leaky tent in a hostile land. Stormed a fortified beach...

If you are wondering how a museum can be an "experience" let me give you one example. When their extraordinary movie on World War II got down to the Battle of the Bulge, the last ditch counteroffensive by the Germans in the freezing cold of December, 1944—it started snowing inside the theater!

When we walked by the Battle of the Bulge exhibit later in the tour, I swear to you, the temperature dropped twenty-five degrees as we huddled around picture after picture of determined GI's fighting across the frozen ground. Uncle Clifford was wounded in this battle. He never talked about the shrapnel that ripped through his body. But he did mention that he had on seven shirts when he got hit.

The Museum is an invaluable step back in time. It is authentic and unfiltered. The Life Magazine picture of the three dead soldiers on Buna Beach published in September of 1943 was prominently displayed. It was a stark reminder then, and now, of the eternal silence....even amidst the roar of the cannons.

They didn't just have original uniforms on display. They gave you the name of the soldier who wore it. They told his story. Some ended with a safe return to family and friends, a victorious war hero. Many didn't...

I scanned the faces as if seeking an old buddy. I looked closely at the M1 Garand or the Thompson machine gun cradled casually in a hand or thrown over a shoulder. I read letters they'd received from a mom or girlfriend back home. I read the last letter some of them ever wrote.

I looked up the one hundred foot cliff at Pointe du Hoc and wondered if I could have made that climb with the Army Rangers under the unrelenting fire they faced on D-Day. My mind raced eight miles east to Omaha Beach. You'd think it crazy to storm such a fortified position under any circumstances! You want someone to remember and honor on this Memorial Day, how about the twenty-five hundred Americans who paid the ultimate price on that damp, dismal June 6, 1944, morning.

We were looking at medals on an Eisenhower jacket when I asked my friend how he "got" his bronze star. He gave me that far away look that only a combat soldier knows and replied, "Mostly for just being over there."

That's what they all say. I will tell you the one thing I did not see in the full day we spent at this special World War II remembrance: A WORLD WAR II VETERAN. If we are going to thank any of them for their service to our nation, we'd better get to doing it! In a hurry!

Clarksburg Approves First Reading of 2019-20 City Budget

CLARKSBURG (May 20) — Financial reports and city budgets dominated Clarksburg's Mayor and Aldermen meeting on Monday night, May 20. First reading was given to the City's proposed 2019-2020 Budget along with first reading of finalization of the current 2018-2019 City Budget. State law requires budget amendments throughout the year to be reconciled and adopted prior to June 30 to ensure a balanced budget. Second and final reading will be June 24. A budget hearing is 6 p.m. on June 24 for the second and final reading of the Proposed \$351,000 City Budget for 2019-2020.

Mayor Howell Wayne Todd commented that there is little change in the proposed budget from the current year's budget.

"We have examined every line item in the budget to determine any areas where we can reduce expenditures. The City is in good financial shape, and we want to stay that way," said Todd. "There are modest increases in areas we can't control such as utility costs or fuel costs, and there are always going to be surprised during the year. However, we feel good about where we are." The budgets are posted on the City's website, www.clarksburgtn.org for any citizen to review.

Todd continued to express some concern with the wastewater account. He commented "We passed the increase in rates in February, but we don't have enough history with the increase to determine if we made the

proper adjustment. We are barely in positive balance territory, and I surely hope it stays there. We should know by late summer or early fall if we have to make any further adjustment." Todd noted that the lengthy response to the State Wastewater Board had been submitted, and he hoped that it would suffice for the Board's review. "It is important that we as elected city officials handle this issue locally rather than having it handled for us in Nashville." Todd said. Financial reports for April 2019 were approved.

In other business, approval was given to proceed with the pre-application process for the upcoming TDOT Multimodal Access Grants. Todd noted that these grants are highly competi-

tive because they award 95% of a project's cost leaving only 5% to be funded by the City. Early consideration is being given to a proposed sidewalk extending from J&J's General Store to the Dollar Store. "We really need to begin to think about making our town a little more pedestrian friendly," he noted.

Todd announced the employment of two new police officers. Labe Ezell and Jackie Allen, currently employed in Huntingdon, will work part-time in Clarksburg. "Both are experienced officers, and I am happy to note that Officer Allen is the City's first female officer," according to Todd.

The next meeting is Monday, June 24 at 6 p.m.

Carroll County Sheriff’s Reports

Bethel Fishing Duo Repeat as Champions

FLORENCE, Ala. — “First feeling, man it’s awesome. To do it one time is a big deal, but to do it twice is even bigger,” said Carter McNeil of Bethel University. For the first time in the history of the Boat US Collegiate Bass Fishing Championship presented by Bass Pro Shops, a school has repeated as champions. Not only that, the team that manages to go back-to-back is comprised of the same two anglers. Cole Floyd and Carter McNeil take home the victory this year on Pickwick Lake with 45.65 pounds.

Floyd and McNeil entered this week as one of the key teams to watch. Following day one, they quickly asserted themselves at the top of the leaderboard with over 22 pounds. The pairing worked several key deep water areas, and knew that they were around the fish to win. “We gave ourselves an opportunity to catch a big bag. I really didn’t think we were on what we were on. You know, it all fell in place and we had a good time,” added Floyd.

One of their go-to baits was a purple colored ribbon tail worm. Fishing along deep water structure in 15-25 feet of water, they quickly sacked up a limit. By roughly 10 a.m. in the morning, Floyd and McNeil had over 20 pounds of bass in the boat. This mirrors the exact same scene that played out on day one as they

struggled to upgrade later in the day. It proved not to matter, as they were able to ride their morning wave of fish catches to another national title.

Today’s victory not only makes back-to-back titles for Floyd and McNeil, it is also the third time Bethel has won this particular event. The program has grown into one of the true powerhouses of the sport. At each and every event they enter, teams represent-

ing Bethel University are considered to be among the favorites. Today, Cole Floyd and Carter McNeil cemented their place among the best in program history. “When we first came to Bethel University, we knew we had big shoes to fill. Today, we’re fortunate enough to win two times. I can’t say enough about how awesome of a program it is,” said McNeil.

Winn ran a 2:14.77 in the 800, a 5:10.76 in the 1600 and a 11:43.70 in the 3200 to complete the sweep. Her high school career began in 2016 with her finishing 2nd in the 800 and 1600-Meter Runs. As a sophomore, she finished 3rd in the 800 and 2nd in the 1600. Winn won the 800 and 1600-Meter runs last year as a Junior.

Dresden Junior Ashlyn Bright medaled in the state discus competition finishing 8th with a 93’00 foot throw. Freshman Paige Mallon came in 3rd in the 3200 Meter Run with a time of 12:27:36. Winn, Mallon, Parker Ferrell, and Anna Lackey finished 10th of 15 in the 4X800 Meter Relay.

with Nick Startsten finishing 7th in the 1600-Meter Run with a time of 4:50.84 and Paxton Davis medaling 8th in the 3200-Meter Run with a time of 10:50.69.
