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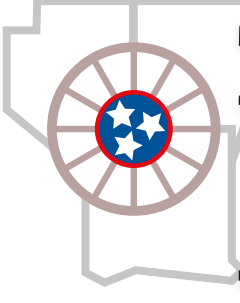




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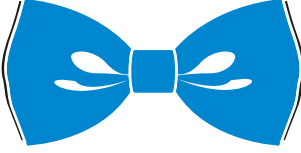

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Young St. Jude Cancer Patient Participates in ‘Casting For A Cure’

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McKENZIE (June 8) — Steve McCadams calls his annual fishing rodeo “Casting For A Cure”. For one young lady who participated in this year’s fishing rodeo, that couldn’t be more true. Miss Kinley Adams not only was a participant but she caught the biggest fish in her age group with a 4.22 pound catfish. Adams is the daughter of Brandi and Patrick Adams of Atwood and was taken to the fishing rodeo by her Uncle Greg Mauldin.

Kinley is a patient at St. Jude Children’s Hospital and suffers from a rare disease called Dicer ONE. This disease makes the body susceptible to tumors and she goes to St. Jude every three months for treatment for the disease. She is also being treated for ten different tumors in different parts of the body some malignant some benign. These tumors affect her eyes, lungs, kidneys, pituitary glands, and ovaries.

Her mother, Brandi, said “We just wanted to make memories for her, so her uncle Greg and his girlfriend, Ambere Lane took her to the fishing rodeo.”

Sheriff’s Department Involved in Four Pursuits

Carroll County Sheriff’s Department, Tennessee Highway Patrol, and the McKenzie Police Department were involved in various pursuits over week.

A McKenzie man was arrested last Friday after he led authorities on a two-county chase after assaulting his girlfriend and her child in Huntingdon and then fleeing from authorities through Carroll and a portion of Gleason in Weakley County.

Da’lon Z. Boyd, 19, of McClure Street, McKenzie broke in his girlfriend’s house in Huntingdon, assaulted her and her child, and left the scene. He is under a \$75,000 bond in Carroll County Jail.

He was arrested in McKenzie after troopers deployed spike strips that blew the suspect’s tires. The vehicle came to a stop on U.S.79/Highland

Drive in front of Hospital Drive.

Carroll County Deputy Steven Scott was at the county fueling station on State Route 22 north of Huntingdon when he saw the vehicle pass. He fell in behind it, ran a check on the license plates, and activated his blue lights near Mayo Bottom. A southbound THP officer turned north and joined in the pursuit. Deputy Scott moved his car in front of Scott’s vehicle in an attempt to box him between the deputy’s and trooper’s cars. Boyd bumped Scott’s patrol car and avoided being blocked. He led officers into McKenzie, where McKenzie Police Department Sergeant Andy Weaver participated in

County’s New Solid Waste Contractor to Begin July 1



Rural residents now have two 96-gallon rolling trash carts. The Republic Services (Barker Brothers) cart should be used until the last pickup of June. Red River’s cart should be used beginning July 1.

HUNTINGDON — Rural residents in Carroll County, who reside outside of all eight municipal city limits, should now have two 96-gallon rolling carts for their weekly curbside solid waste collection. The old one should be used until June 30 and the new one July 1 and later.

Jeff Heyduck, manager of the county’s Solid Waste and Recycling, said Red River Waste Solutions of Union City was the selected new contractor to provide for the collection and disposal of solid waste for a five-year period beginning July 1. It ends the 25-year run of service provided by Republic Services, previously known as Barker Brothers.

A letter, recently mailed to all of the county’s customers, explains that each person received a new 96-gallon rolling cart for the disposal of the residential

solid waste. That cart should not be used until July 1. The existing blue or green cart issued by Republic Services should be used exclusively until the final pickup in June, when Republic will dispose of the solid waste and retrieve the cart.

Red River takes only three holidays: Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year’s. The company will pick up on July 4, 2019 on the first week the company begins collections.

A color-coded sticker on the new rolling trash container indicates the weekday of collection.

Heyduck said residents along the dividing areas might have Tuesday pick up on one side of the highway, and Wednesday on the other side. Red River is attempting to streamline the routes.

McKenzie Precinct 21 Voting Venue Changed

McKENZIE — Voters in Precinct 21 recently received notification from the Carroll County Election Commission that the voting location for the precinct has been relocated from Bethel University’s Baker Fieldhouse to the McKenzie Church of Christ.

The notice cites parking issues and increased student activity due to the university’s rapid growth, saying, “The change will make voting on Election Day more efficient and, hopefully, less stressful for you.”

In the notice, CCEC Administrator Peg Hamlett emphasizes that the location of Election Day voting is the only change. “Your precinct (#21), district(s), ward, school board, etc. have not changed. Your ballot will have the candidate-positions specific to your residential address on you voter registration. And, of course, you still have the options of Early Voting in the election office [625 High Street, Suite 113, Huntingdon] or for qualified voters there is Absentee Voting.”

Enclosed with the notice is each voter’s new voter registration wallet card, which includes all of the pertinent information.

Commission Approves Budget Amendment

Ten resolutions on the agenda of the Carroll County Commission address fiscal year-end budget amendments to the 2018-19 budget.

Commissioners convene June 10, 7 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Carroll County Office Complex to address those resolutions plus one to purchase tractors and mowers for the Highway Department and appointments to the Library Board.

Lori Dillahunt and Christy Brandon were both reappointed to the Carroll County Library Board with terms ending June 2022.

A resolution was approved to authorize capital outlay notes of \$220,000 for the purchase of two new tractors and boom mowers.

Other resolutions deal with intradepartment transfers to balance the 2018-19 budget.

Resolution 6-1-19 transferred of \$10,284.11 from the insurance recovery account to the liability claims account for the Sheriff’s Department.

Resolution 6-2-19 is to transfer \$1,920.95 reimbursement from insurance recovery to a liability account due to damage to a radio repeater in the Cedar Grove area.

Resolution 6-3-19 makes intradepartment transfers of the Highway Department in the amount of \$42,609. The funds will be pulled from Fund Balance.

Resolution 6-5-19 makes a

Traffic Accident Injures Two

A two-vehicle accident Saturday night, June 8, at the intersection of Hwy 22 and Shiloh Road sent both drivers to the hospital and heavily damaged both vehicles. According to the report, a red Dodge Ram truck driven by Austin Gierhart of McKenzie was stopped at the four-way stop sign and then accelerated across the Hwy 22 bypass pausing in the middle section and failed to see a red Chevy car driven by Trenika Johnson of Lexington and struck her in the driver's side of her vehicle. Due to the damage to Johnson's vehicle, the McKenzie Fire Department Rescue Team used the Jaws of Life to cut her out of her vehicle. She was transported to Baptist Hospital while Gierhart was transported to Henry County Hospital. Gierhart was cited in the incident.

Kids, Catfish Team Up; Another Great Rodeo In The Books

Despite the threat of heavy rain and potential thunderstorms last Saturday across West Tennessee a big crowd of young anglers with parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles in tow showed up at McKenzie's City Park Lake with fishing on their mind. Young boys and girls weren't about to let the weatherman deter them from a morning of fishing at the 19th Annual Steve McCadams Casting For A Cure Kids Fishing Rodeo. Filling the shoreline and pier were some 84 youngsters eager to do battle with feisty catfish silently swimming in the placid waters. Skies were dark as rolling clouds passed over the area but the army of future fishermen didn't let the gloomy looking morning dampen their spirits. After a stop at the registration table each angler received a fish stringer and a nice yellow fishing towel courtesy of The Nashville Predators. Additional prizes such as hockey pucks and a handsome engraved Predator's jersey were also donated to the rodeo. From several surrounding counties they showed up to fish and that's just what they did. As soon as the whistle blew the show was on and one youngster---11-year old Bryson Whitaker of Paris---landed a hefty 3-pound channel catfish on his very first cast!

Apparently his bait, a big fat nightcrawler, was just what the doctor ordered and the hefty fish opted for a quick breakfast before any other fish could beat him to it. Several kids across the lake saw quick action as the fish were sporting an appetite. Squeals of excitement here; screams of joy there. A cry or two as well when that big one slipped away and rolled back into the lake when either a line broke or the jumping fish just used all his wits to find his way back into the drink. "I was well pleased with the event and thankful the weather cooperated," said McCadams, host of the annual fishing rodeo that started 19 years ago at Carroll Lake. "I worried all week about the forecast and wondered what we could do if lightning and rain descended. Thankfully, the Good Lord held an umbrella over us!" "It was another successful rodeo as several volunteers helped me pave the way for a fine fishing day for the kids as we battled cancer and fish at the same time. Thanks to donors who opened their hearts and pocketbooks again we had several door prizes that put big smiles on little faces!" Each year the rodeo makes a donation to the American Cancer Society through Carroll County Relay For Life. Handsome engraved plaques and nice bicycles were awarded to the youngster in four separate age brackets who either caught

the most fish or biggest fish. Taking the top spot in the 5 and under age bracket for the biggest fish was Jaxon Hochreiter of McKenzie for a dandy weighing 2.56 pounds. Landing the most fish was Ryker Cherry of Atwood. In the 6-8 age bracket it was Kinley Adams of Atwood who landed the big one courtesy of a channel catfish that tipped the scales at a whopping 4.22 pounds! Turns out it was the biggest fish caught in this year's rodeo. Earning the most fish honors was Creek Coleman of Slidell, Louisiana, who was visiting with his grandad Dale and great grandfather Ted of McKenzie. In addition to winning the most fish honors he and his brother won a rod and reel combo for traveling the longest distance to fish in the rodeo this year. Another youngster from Illinois barely missed out. From the 9-12 year age bracket came another big fish weighing 4.10 pounds caught by Aydan Ayers of Camden. Casten Brock of Gleason had the most fish thanks to a stringer of 15 fish. Kylan Borneman of Gleason had the big fish in the 13-15 year age bracket with a nice catfish weighing 3.96 pounds. Most fish went to Dixie Bennett of Henry. "It was indeed a great day in the outdoors for these kids and their families," continued McCadams. "The cloud cover filtered out the sun and heat so that really

helped." McCadams paid tribute to McKenzie City Parks and Recreation for their assistance. Mike Beasley and his crew helped make the rodeo a success as did Mayor Jill Holland for the city's hospitality. Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency stocked the lake with catfish on Thursday prior to the rodeo and several donors such as Pepsi, Wal-Mart and McDonalds helped out as well. Without these folks we couldn't have a rodeo. With next year's 20th anniversary fast approaching plans are already underway to host a big event. Carroll Lake will reopen in 2020 but McCadams said he wasn't sure if the rodeo would move back to its original home or stay at McKenzie City Park. "We'll see how things go in the months ahead but holding the rodeo at McKenzie's City Park Lake has worked well for us. We've had great cooperation from the city as to a pavilion, bathrooms, trash cans and courteous staff. The small lake keeps the fish concentrated in an area where the kids really do well!" "When the smoke clears and the rodeo is over I'm sort of worn down but lifted up by the hopes we introduced kids to the great sport of fishing while fostering time outdoors with friends and family for a good cause," he said.

The consent agenda also included a number of personnel transfers will be taking place with Erica Boone moving from the Elementary School to the Primary school, Jennifer Hames from the Primary School to the Elementary School, Debbie Reed from librarian to 6th grade English, Beth Bridges from 6th grade English to 3rd English, Kim Allen from 3rd grade English to 4th grade English, Jackson Poole from custodian to Primary School Secretary, Jordan McDade from HS History to 7th grade History,

Schools Director Dexter Williams announced that the new school handbooks would be available for the board to review by the June 27th meeting.

the pursuit.

Boyd traveled through McKenzie on State Route 22, then to Gleason, where he turned onto Byrd Road and then Janes Mill Road before heading back toward McKenzie on S.R. 22. Deputy Scott attempted to box him in and keep Boyd on State Route 22. Boyd reached the intersection of State Route 22 and U.S. 79, where he exited onto U.S. 79 and head into the highway business district. A trooper deployed spike strips across the highway and deflated the tires. Boyd stopped his vehicle in front of Hospital Drive, where he was quickly arrested without incident.

According to a report by Sgt. Weaver, Boyd’s speed reached over 100 miles per hour.

Sheriff Dickson said Boyd faces charges by Huntingdon Police Department. Those are aggravated burglary, domestic assault, child abuse, and vandalism. The Sheriff’s Department charged him with felony evading arrest, driving on a revoked license, and aggravated assault – for striking the deputy’s car, and possession of Schedule VI drugs. He also had an AK47 rifle in his possession, but has not been charged in relation to the weapon.

Three other pursuits are as follows:

High Speed Pursuit

•A Henry County man was arrested June 3 following a high-

speed police chase in Carroll County.

Craig A. Shank, 35, of Puryear was charged with felony evading arrest. According to the report by Deputy Michael Seavarns, troopers with the Tennessee Highway Patrol advised dispatch that they were in a high speed pursuit of a black jeep towing a trailer coming from Benton County on Rowland Mill Road. Seavarns joined the pursuit as the jeep turned onto Maytown Road toward Huntingdon. Officers with the THP discontinued their pursuit at the Huntingdon City limits, but Seavarns continued chasing the Jeep as it turned onto the bypass and then onto Highway 22 heading toward Clarksburg, reaching speeds of up to 102 m.p.h. At one point, the jeep pulled off the highway, and the driver, identified as Shank, got out of the vehicle and ran toward a residence. While chasing Shank on foot, Seavarns fired a taser gun, subdued Shank, and took him into custody.

High Speed Pursuit

•Authorities are looking for a Madison County man who led officers on a high speed chase on May 25.

Christopher B. Cutting, 31, of Jackson faces charges of felony evading arrest and driving on a revoked/suspended license. According to the report by Deputy Michael Seavarns, he responded to Highway 114 in Hollow Rock to assist another officer on a traffic stop when it turned into a high speed pursuit of a Buick Lacrosse, which continued from Hollow Rock to Huntingdon on Highway

70, then on Highway 22 to McKenzie, reaching speeds of up to 128 mph. McKenzie police officers joined the chase, but officers discontinued their pursuit two to four miles into Weakley County. Then on May 26, a person identifying himself as Cutting called the Sheriff’s Department and said he was the suspect involved in the high speed chase. During investigations, officers found and spoke with the registered owner of the vehicle, who told officers that Cutting was in the process of purchasing the vehicle and that Cutting was in possession of the car on the night of the pursuit.

Felony Evading

•Warrants have been issued for the arrest of a Huntingdon man who allegedly fled from a deputy during an attempted traffic stop on June 2.

James Robert Tummins, 38, of 450 Blue Bird Lane is facing charges of felony evading, reckless driving, and driving on a revoked license. According to the report by Deputy Michael Smith, he observed a 2005 Ford Taurus while patrolling on Humphreys Road, and when he did a check on the tag numbers, he was advised that the vehicle was listed as stolen and that Tummins was named as the person who had stolen the car. Smith attempted to pull the vehicle over, but it increased speed, turned onto Ledsinger Road, and then turned onto Bluebird Lane, where it went off the roadway and into the backyard of a residence. A man Smith identified as Tummins exited the car and fled on foot into the woods.

The new carts are shorter and faster than the current carts, but both are 96-gallon containers.

The monthly rate of \$18 will remain unchanged for the five-year contract period with Red River.

County commissioners approved the change in contractors to save money. The first year savings is \$71,280 to the county and its citizens over the current rate charged by Republic Services. Based on the

proposed rate increase by Republic, the savings are \$221,040 in year five by using Red River as compared to Republic.

Soon, rural county residents will be able to pay with credit cards and ACH through automatic bank draft in addition to check. The use of the credit card will bear a small added convenience fee. Persons can still pay at the office in Huntingdon at Carroll County Office Complex. At first, use of credit cards will only be available at the service window at the County Office Complex.

The change in contractors does not affect solid waste collection services in any of the mu-

nicipalities. All municipalities, except Huntingdon, presently use Republic Services. Huntingdon uses Waste Management.

Recycling is available in the county. However, curbside pickup services is not available for individual homes. Individuals can bring aluminum cans, used motor oil, newspapers, cardboard, scrap metal, automotive batteries, and magazines to the Recycling Center at the former Cannon School outside of Huntingdon. Curbside pickup of these items is available to businesses and industries. Market pricing to sell recyclable cardboard is the lowest since 1996 and 1997, said Heyduck.

Without community newspapers, where would you find this information?

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Mary Ball Holmes

The Matriarch Of The Modern Woman

After working on the story featuring Dr. J.T. Holmes, I came across a great deal of information focused around his wife, Mary Ball Holmes. The deeper I dove the more fascinated and enamored I became with her accomplishments. The reader has to remember this was a time where most women especially the wife of a successful doctor were expected to be lady of the house and did not have a career of their own, but Mrs. Holmes shattered the stereotype.

Born in Lexington, Tenn. in 1908, to Reverend Dr. Fleetwood and Flossie Lee Ball, Mary Elizabeth Ball was the oldest of four daughters. After graduating with honors from Lexington High School at the age of 16, she attended Union University where she received her Bachelor of Arts degree and was a member of the Chi Omega Sorority.

At Union, she served as the editor of the school's newspaper and was named queen of the S.A.E. Fraternity and queen of the Doctor's Club. In her senior year, Mary was voted "Best All-around Girl," in school. Mrs. Holmes continued her education studying two semesters at the University of Chicago before earning a masters degree in English at Union University.

After college, she started out on a teaching career that led from a two-teacher country school to college level. These stops included Pentecost-Garrison Preparatory School for Boys in Memphis, as a literature and Latin teacher at McKenzie High School, and an associate professor of literature and psychology at Bethel College (University) for 25 years.

In 1934, she married Dr. James Thorburn Holmes after a 13-year courtship. The couple were married by Mary's father at the First Baptist Church in Lexington.

The Holmes family moved to McKenzie in 1941 where Dr. Holmes opened his practice. It was noted in Mary's writings that her husband delivered over 3,500 babies in McKenzie most of which were delivered for a fee of \$25.

Her contributions to the McKenzie community were countless. She was a charter member of the Business and Professional Women's Club, organized in 1950, serving as the club's second president. In 1954 she was named "Woman of the Year" by the chapter. Mary served on various boards including the city's Library Committee.

She was an active member of the McKenzie P.T.A., Carroll County P.T.A., Mentor Club, Inglenook Book Club, and Mothers-of-Youth-Club, where she was past president of the clubs.

She also belonged to the Daughters of the American Revolution, Delta Kappa Gamma, and numerous other local organizations. Mary was active



in the Girl Scout, Cub Scout and Boy Scout organizations in McKenzie. Both her sons, Jim and Lewis, were Eagle Scouts.

In 1932, she served as a delegate-at-large from Tennessee at the Democratic Convention in Chicago. Even more impressive, in 1948, she managed Estes Kefauver's successful campaign for the Senate in the seventh district (In 1956, Kefauver was selected to be the running mate of presidential nominee Adlai Stevenson).

In 1960, Mary was a Tennessee delegate to the National Congress on Children and Youth held in Washington, D.C. For forty years, she taught a women's Sunday School class which bears her name at the First Baptist Church.

She was a renowned public speaker and book reviewer who was very much in demand. Her talks were known to be inspirational and entertaining. Mary not only devoted her time and talent to her community, she was a devoted mother and wife. For many years, she served as Dr. Holmes' bookkeeper and office manager, and served as president of the West Tennessee Medical Auxiliary.

The Holmes children all worked in the health field. Jim did academic work at Rhodes College, Harvard Medical School and Yale University. Lewis attended Princeton and Duke University. Elizabeth attended Wellesley and Yale University.

Mary died in 2004 at the age of 95 in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania and was interred next to her husband in Mount Olivet Cemetery in McKenzie.

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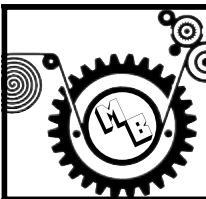

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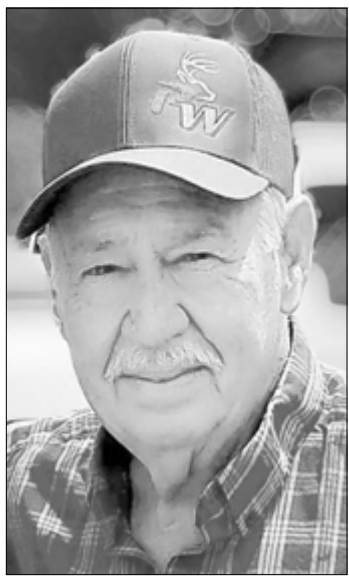

Chamber Hosts Annual STEM Inspire Program

In 2013, the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce created the STEM Inspire Program. “The STEM Inspire Program exposes our young people to different aspects of STEM,” said Brad Hurley, president of the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce. “We believe this program is a key component of workforce development.” STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) is a program designed to promote student achievement and academic excellence through hands-on experimentation and open-ended thinking. Students are encouraged to think beyond challenges placed in front of them by using their critical thinking and problem-solving skills. STEM sessions are available to high school freshmen in Carroll County at no cost through the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce’s STEM Inspire program. Each high school is allowed to send four students. In 2019, seventeen students were enrolled. They met on six Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. until 12 noon, beginning February 9 and concluding April 27. This program exposes students to some of the best minds in science. Through the years, the demographic has shifted to include more female and minority scientists. The Chamber was fortunate to have two such accomplished women leading STEM this year. Sessions were facilitated alternately by Dr. Carla Thompson and Dr. Letimicia Fears, both from the Center for Science Outreach at Vanderbilt University in Nashville. Ana-Kate Welsh was the student helper.

McKenzie Memorial Library's Summer Reading Program has Colorful Kickoff

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McKENZIE (June 5) — McKenzie Memorial Library's Summer Reading Program kicked off Wednesday at the Park Theatre with a colorful presentation by Russell Orr about the science of rainbows.

Orr is an education specialist for Discovery Park of America in Union City as well as a NASA Solar System Ambassador. The Solar System Ambassadors program consists of volunteers across the nation with the goal of engaging the public in their communities to the science and excitement of NASA's space exploration missions and discoveries.

Wednesday's program focused on rainbows and their scientific implications. Orr began by pointing out that not all rainbows are seen in the sky. He noted that a rainbow can be seen in a puddle of water and oil, and showed kids directly that bubbles are covered in rainbows by firing a swarm of bubbles from his bubble gun. He also brought from DPA bis-

moth rocks to show that oxygen reacts with the surface of the bismuth to create a layer of bismuth oxide with a rainbow sheen.

Orr explained that visible light is not white, but consists of the seven colors seen in a rainbow: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet. The colors are not all the same size and travel through things at different speeds.

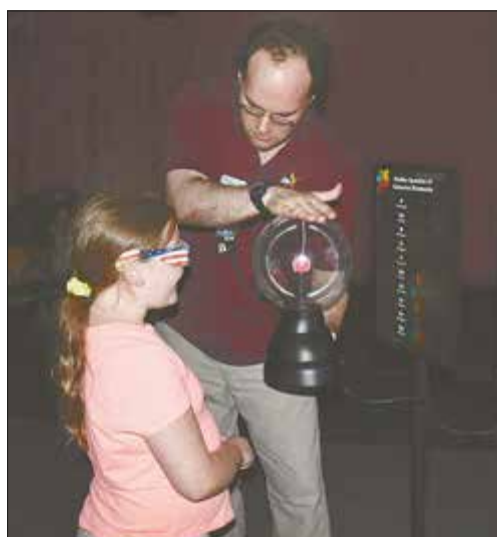
He told the kids about two scientists, Gustav Kirchhoff and Robert Bunsen, whose discoveries around color included the fact that different chemicals burn in different colors and that the seven distinct colors of light can be seen by looking through tiny holes. The latter is known as diffraction.

Orr gave everyone a pair of special glasses designed to diffract light, and he also explained that the same effect can be achieved by looking through a feather.

The scientists developed a device called a spectroscope to observe diffraction and shared it with other scientists. This soon reaped dividends as some used the spectroscope to ob-

serve a total solar eclipse in 1868, leading to the discovery of a new element, helium.

For his final demonstration, Orr had a volunteer, Izzy Epperson, view a beam in a plasma globe through the special

glasses. She noted the colors she saw and compared them to a chart to correctly identify the chemical in the globe as neon.

To end the event, a drawing was held for two tickets to Discovery Park of America.

Orr remained afterward until everyone had their questions answered and saw his demonstrations up close.
