Jail to Start Inmate Re-Entry Program

HUNTINGDON (January 19) — Carroll County will soon implement a program to help jail inmates to successfully return to society after completing their jail terms. It is called Evidence-Based Re-Entry Program.

Carroll County Sheriff Andy Dickson and Sergeant Dwayne Tordsen briefly explained the program to members of the Carroll County Budget Committee during the committee's monthly meeting on January 19.

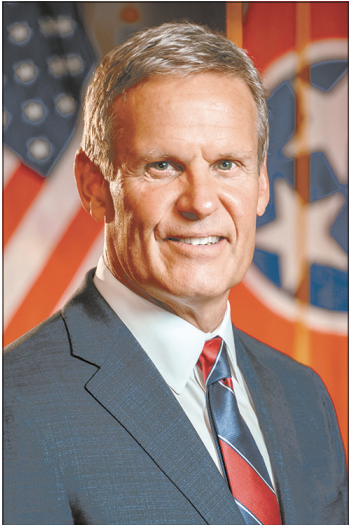
The county will pay \$107,706 annually for the three-year program. Sheriff Dickson said the remainder of the program is funded through a grant. The total project is estimated at \$1 million, said the sheriff.

Sergeant Tordsen applied for the grant and will be the local administrator of the program. It is to help with select inmates progress to return to society, reduce recidivism, and assist in gainful employment.

Tordsen said the program involves a full-time therapist from Pathways, computer equipment for training and education, help getting Social Security numbers and identification cards. The program will work with the new Tennessee Re-Entry Success Act, a program

ZLINE to Expand To Gibson County

Distribution Center Is in Bruceton

NASHVILLE — Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee, Department of Economic and Community Development Commissioner Stuart McWhorter and ZLINE Kitchen and Bath officials announced today the company will be investing in a multimillion-dollar expansion in its Northwest Tennessee distribution operations by locating a new facility in Milan.

Four years after establishing its distribution headquarters in Carroll County, ZLINE will expand as the company acquires the former Dura Automotive Systems building. As a result of the project, ZLINE will create 50 new jobs in Gibson County.

The additional back-office and logistics workforce at the Milan plant will support ZLINE's logistics headquarters in Bruceton by adding an additional customer service center and enhancing the company's distribution of ranges, refrigerators, stoves, ovens, microwaves and hoods. ZLINE will employ more than 100 people in Northwest Tennessee through the expansion.

Gasoline Prices Rise During Week

Average gasoline prices in Tennessee rose 18.9 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.12/g today, according to GasBuddy's survey of 3,821 stations in Tennessee. Prices in Tennessee are 42.6 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 11.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has risen 2.6 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.60 per gallon.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Tennessee was priced at \$2.49/g yesterday while the most expensive was \$3.99/g, a difference of \$1.50/g. The lowest price in the state yesterday was \$2.49/g while the highest was \$3.99/g, a difference of \$1.50/g.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 11.3 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.39/g today. The national average is up 30.2 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 7.3 cents per gallon higher than a year ago, according to GasBuddy data compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

"Gasoline prices continued their upward trajectory last week as oil prices pulled them higher across the majority of the country, and continued refinery challenges kept supply of gasoline from rising more substantially," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "Macroeconomic factors have continued to weigh on oil and refined products, as strong demand in China hasn't been slowed much by a surge in new Covid cases. In addition, releases of crude oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve have wrapped up. Concerns are increasing that without additional oil, supply will tighten in the weeks ahead, especially as the nation starts to move away from softer demand in the height of winter. Moving forward, it doesn't look good for motorists, with prices likely to continue accelerating."

Avian Influenza Detected in West Tennessee Poultry Flock

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee State Veterinarian is reporting a detection of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in a commercial broiler chicken flock at a farm in Weakley County.

Following a sudden spike in bird deaths, lab tests confirmed the presence of H5N1 highly pathogenic avian influenza. HPAI is a highly transmissible disease known to be deadly for domesticated fowl. Fowl can be exposed to HPAI through human interactions and through contact with wild birds.

Since September of 2022, HPAI cases in Tennessee have sickened domesticated chickens, geese, ducks, and turkeys in Bledsoe, Davidson, Obion, Tipton, and Weakley Counties. HPAI has also been found in wild birds, including ducks, geese, vultures, and eagles in Tennessee.

"Unfortunately, HPAI continues to spread to farms of all sizes," Tennessee State Veterinarian Dr. Samantha Beaty said. "There have been four previous detections in Weakley County affecting backyard flocks. It's apparent this disease remains a threat to the poultry industry. We want bird owners to know that their consistent practice of thorough biosecurity measures is the best way to protect the health of their flocks. Introduction of this disease can be from wild birds gathering on your property or you can carry it into your flock if

you are not wearing clean shoes and clothing."

Animal health officials have established a 10 kilometer (6.2 mile) control zone surrounding the affected facility. Within the zone, poultry will be tested and monitored for illness and poultry movement requires permitting until the zone is released. Animal Health staff are contacting poultry owners within the control zone to answer questions and provide information. If you have concerns about your location, please email Animal.Health@tn.gov or call 615-837-5120 and staff will help determine if your flock is within the zone.

Although HPAI does not pose a food safety risk, no infected poultry will be allowed to enter the food supply. Poultry and eggs are safe to eat when handled and cooked properly. The risk of human infection with avian influenza during poultry outbreaks is very low. In fact, no transmission to humans was reported during the outbreak that affected commercial poultry farms in Tennessee in 2017.

Tennesseans who own backyard flocks or pet birds are encouraged to sign up for TDA's email service, The Word on Birds. The service provides email alerts about health threats affecting domesticated birds in the state. Enroll at stateof.tennessee.gov/formstack.com/forms/2023_domesticated_bird_health_notifications.

Guidance for Bird Owners

Wash your hands thoroughly before and after interacting with domesticated birds.

Dedicate a pair of shoes to only be worn in coops or poultry houses and clean those shoes after each visit.

Regularly disinfect any equipment used in coops or poultry houses and vehicles used for transporting birds.

Deter wild birds from interacting with domesticated birds. Consider hanging pie pans or other noisemakers in trees or, if local rules allow, set off firecrackers intermittently or when you see vultures or geese on your property.

Look for signs of illness and report a sudden increase in the number of sick birds or bird deaths to the Tennessee State Veterinarian's office at 615-837-5120 and/or USDA at 1-866-536-7593.

These last few months have been hard on our family, but God is faithful. Maria and I have cherished your prayers for healing.

We are grateful for everyone who has supported us, and I’m grateful she’s here today – my wife and our First Lady, Maria Lee.

While Maria and I are in a time of struggle, we know that we are not alone in these hardships.

In fact, the last four years have brought unexpected challenges to many of us in this state – floods, wildfires, a pandemic, tornadoes, even a bombing on Christmas morning – in addition to personal challenges you could be facing right now that your fellow Tennesseans don’t even know about.

It doesn’t take away the tragedy, difficulty or fear, but in times of struggle, we can find great hope.

We saw that when Tennesseans converged on the Cumberland Plateau to help their neighbors after those devastating tornadoes.

We saw that when six brave police officers put their very lives on the line to protect their fellow man from that bomb on Christmas morning.

We saw that in Waverly. I was there the day after the floods, and wept with, prayed with and embraced people who had lost everything, even their loved ones.

Maria was there a few days later to help clean up homes that had been reduced to rubble.

For Waverly, that is clearly part of the story – tragedy, difficulty, and fear.

But I was also there one year later, as the community gathered in remembrance of all those lost. Once again, we wept, prayed and embraced, but this time, something was different. We also recognized the remarkable transformation that occurred in that community over the past year.

It was a stark picture of redemption and hope. Quite frankly, it’s a picture of Tennessee since our founding.

It’s a reminder, once again, that in this life there are only a few things that really matter, and Maria and I want our lives to be about those things.

That’s why I ran for Governor, twice now, and that thought’s been with me every day these last four years.

The halfway point of two terms in office has caused me to reflect even more on what matters.

There is a parable in the 25th chapter of Matthew about a man who is preparing to go on a journey.

Before he leaves, he gives a part of his estate to each of his three servants for them to manage, with the expectation that they would be good stewards.

When he returns from his journey, two of the three servants have doubled what they were given.

The man told them, “Well done. Because you’ve been faithful over a few things, I’ll put you in charge of many things.”

It’s been an important teaching to me – to whom much is given, much is expected.

And we know that Jesus wasn’t merely talking about money or material things, but about life.

We have been given a responsibility – an obligation to use our lives in a way that multiplies in the lives of others – to spend our

days considering how the work of our lives will reap benefits, not for ourselves, but for others. And each of us has been given much by way of that responsibility.

Each member of the Tennessee General Assembly, along with myself, have been given much to steward, and we have worked hard the last four years to steward those resources in a way to multiply.

We should stop at this halfway point and reflect on a few of the things that we’ve accomplished together.

We overhauled the way we fund public schools for the first time in 30 years, which means, instead of an old and broken system, a million Tennessee children are now funded based on their own individual needs.

Our innovative Medicaid waiver – the only one of its kind in the nation – means more Tennesseans now have access to dental care and maternal care, and Tennesseans with disabilities can live with the dignity they deserve.

With this waiver, we found a better way to serve the unseen, and – there aren’t many who can say this – we’ve worked with both the Trump administration and the Biden administration to get it done.

And thanks to some of the largest economic development projects in the nation, tens of thousands of Tennesseans already have new opportunities to provide a better living for their family.

The largest of them – Ford Motor Company – is happening in rural West Tennessee, at a site that’s been long for prosperity for 20 years.

And although Rural America has been in decline for decades, Rural Tennessee is proving to be the exception, thanks to historic investments in vocational, technical and agricultural education that are shaping Tennessee’s future workforce.

Tennessee is proof that the state with the workers will win every time.

These examples of bipartisan stewardship are but a few in a long list of ways that we, together with the General Assembly, have worked to multiply in the lives of the people we serve.

All the while, our state’s finances have been stewarded in such a way that affords us the lowest tax rate per capita in the nation, the lowest debt rate per capita in the nation, and the fastest growing economy of all 50 states.

And let me just say, when it comes to responsible fiscal stewardship, Tennessee has a history of governors – four in particular who are sitting on this stage today – who have built a foundation and a legacy of fiscal policy that makes it possible for us to lead the nation.

We are reaping the benefits today, and I want to say thank you, on behalf of the people of Tennessee, for operating in a responsible fiscal way that has created a balance sheet in this state that is the envy of America.

We have set an example for America of how to serve.

The halfway point of any endeavor is a good time to reflect, but it’s an even better time to plan – to focus on the work still ahead.

We need a transportation strategy and an energy strategy designed for one of the fastest growing states in America.

We need to enhance efforts to conserve our natural resources and preserve the environment of what I believe is the most beautiful

place in the world.

We need to protect children in our custody and in our state with a better foster care and adoption process.

We need to do these things and many more, but we can never abandon the standard of fiscal responsibility that makes our success possible.

We have been given much, and I believe that we have, together, responded to these gifts. But much is expected.

In the parable that I referenced earlier, there was a third servant. He was afraid of losing what had been given to him, so rather than take a chance, he buried it in the ground until the man came back from his journey. Because of his fear of failure, he multiplied for no one.

May that never be me – or you.

In our efforts to use our lives in the best way we know how – to make life better for other people – there will be those who criticize.

There will be decisions that come at great personal cost.

There will be mistakes that we make.

There will be times we fear failure.

But as you endeavor to serve other people – from whatever position or place you hold in life – remember the often quoted words of Theodore Roosevelt, and I’ll paraphrase:

It’s not the critic who counts, nor the man who points out how another man stumbles, nor when the doer of deeds could have done them better.

The credit belongs to those who actually strive to do the deeds, who know Great Enthusiasm and Great Devotion, who spend themselves in a worthy cause...

Those who, at the best, know in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if they fail, at least failed while daring greatly, so that their place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory, nor defeat.

Yeah, we will have critics – critics who thrive on toxic incivility and divisiveness.

But we don’t have to step foot into their arena. There is a better way.

We can disagree and stand firm for our beliefs and our principles, but we should never forget the dignity of the other human being. We should never believe differences are a platform for demonization, or that one man has any greater value than another.

Civility is not a weakness. In fact, it has been and it should always be the American Way. And I know it can be the way in Tennessee.

You and I, and this state, have been entrusted with treasures, not meant to be buried but to be spent on helping our fellow man.

and in 2014, the high school principal. He was the middle school and high school men’s basketball coach.

He graduated Huntingdon High School, Class of 2000; Bachelor of Science, Union University, Physical Education and Health, 2004; Master of Arts in Education, Trevecca Nazarene University, Educational Leadership, 2006; Education Specialist, Union University, Curriculum and Supervision, 2009; Doctor of Education, Union University, Educational Leadership P-12 School Administration, 2011. He was unanimously selected as director of schools in 2021.

The Board unanimously voted to purchase a parcel of land adjacent to the new Huntingdon Middle School playground. Kee recommended the school

system buy the property at \$50,000. Otherwise, the owner plans to renovate the existing home and sell the ‘improved’ property.

Dr. Carter said he hopes the school system can purchase additional property to create a safe zone around the school, located on Browning Avenue.

Dr. Carter provided an idea to fellow board members concerning a benevolence project to benefit teachers and students in need. He suggested involving area churches and citizens to support teachers and students financially. He noted teachers often use their personal funds to ensure students have needed items in the classrooms. Sometimes the students need personal hygiene care items or school supplies that their families cannot provide. He suggested speaking with church leaders and others to establish a benevolence fund.

Dr. Kee gave The Banner an update on the progress of renovation and construction projects at the three school sites.

At Huntingdon Primary School, a new roof is almost completely installed.

HPS construction plans include a renovated kitchen and an expanded cafeteria. Construction plans include classrooms and restrooms. Older windows will be replaced.

New construction should begin in approximately 60 days.

A new roof will be installed at the middle school.

The school board appropriated up to \$4.6 million for construction and renovation at the schools.

An LED lighting project includes interior and exterior lighting at the three school sites and the Board of Education office. A few exterior parking lots are excluded because the existing lighting is owned by Carroll County Electric.

The LED project costs are \$559,875 and the program savings are estimated at \$581,815. The program’s interest rate is .5 percent.

that provides compensation to Tennessee counties that provide evidence-based programming for inmates housed in county jails.

The program helps provide the tools necessary to help the inmate succeed following incarceration.

Committee members thanked Sheriff Dickson and Sergeant Tordsen for their work to improve the lives of inmates and to reduce recidivism.

In other business, Carroll County Mayor Joseph Butler said the Health Department needs CARE ACT funds to add awnings to the

Health Department building, add card reader for secure entry ways, renovate an exam room, and add a standby generator. All are reimbursable by the state.

A budget amendment was also presented to add funds for the purchase of new voting equipment for the Carroll County Election Commission. The original appropriation by the county for the equipment was \$250,000. \$210,000 was to be paid by Help America Vote Act (federal funds), with the remainder coming from state funds. The equipment was \$47,000 more expensive than originally estimated. Butler said the state would also cover the excess costs.

Sheriff Dickson said the health service provider at the jail is paid \$10,800

monthly based on an average of 130 inmates daily. The average increased to over 150 daily last year and with the recent drug roundup, the average is now over 200 daily. He expects the fee to increase to \$13,000 monthly. Along with the expected increase is an increase in nursing services from 40 to 56 hours weekly.

Chairman Darrell Ridgely said upcoming budget meetings are February 15, March 16, April 20, and May 18. His goal is to maintain the same tax rate, provide department directors with anticipated employee pay raises early in the process, and meet with department supervisors and elected officials during a day-long budget hearing on March 16. The new fiscal year begins July 1.

CARROT RAISIN MUFFINS
Diabetic/Low Calorie
1 cup flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup packed light brown sugar
1 cup carrots, coarsely grated
1/2 cup white wheat flour
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
2 large eggs

3/4 cup buttermilk
1/4 cup vegetable oil
1/2 cup raisins
Heat oven to 375. Lightly grease muffin cup or use foil or paper cups. Mix flours, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt in a large bowl. Whisk eggs and sugar in another bowl. When smooth, whisk in buttermilk and oil. Stir in carrots and raisins. Pour over flour mixture and fold in with a rubber spatula. Scoop batter into muffin cups. Bake

20 to 25 minutes, or until spring to touch in the center. Turn out on a rack.

PRIME RIB ROAST
Place a prime rib roast in a deep roasting pan. Cover the roast with rock salt and insert a meat thermometer. Cook roast at 325 degrees for approximately 20 minutes per pound. (ex.10 pound roast 3 hours 20 minutes). When roast is determined to reach desired doneness, uncover roast. Remove from pan, making sure all salt is brushed away. Carve and serve. There will be no aujus.

SWEDISH MEAT BALLS
1 1/2 pound hamburger
1/2 small carton sour cream
Salt, pepper, garlic salt, onion salt
1 onion
1 egg
Oatmeal
Crackers
Roll out hamburger and other ingredients into meatballs. Coat with flour and

brown in skillet. Put meatballs into deep casserole dish or pan and cover with mixture.

Mixture: Take 2 cans of cream of mushroom soup or for more flavor, 1 can cream of mushroom and 1 can golden mushroom soup and other half carton sour cream. Heat with 3/4 can of water. Pour over meatballs. Cover and bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes.

1 8 oz. cream cheese
1 pkg graham crackers
1 package reg lemon jello

2 tablespoon powdered sugar
1 can pet milk, chilled
2 tablespoon lemon juice
1cup sugar
Boil cup water, dissolve jello. Then add cream cheese. Set aside to cool in pan of ice water. Make crust of crackers, oleo and powdered sugar. Save some for top. Whip milk. Add sugar and lemon juice. Add to jello mixture. Pour in crust. Chill. Freezes well.

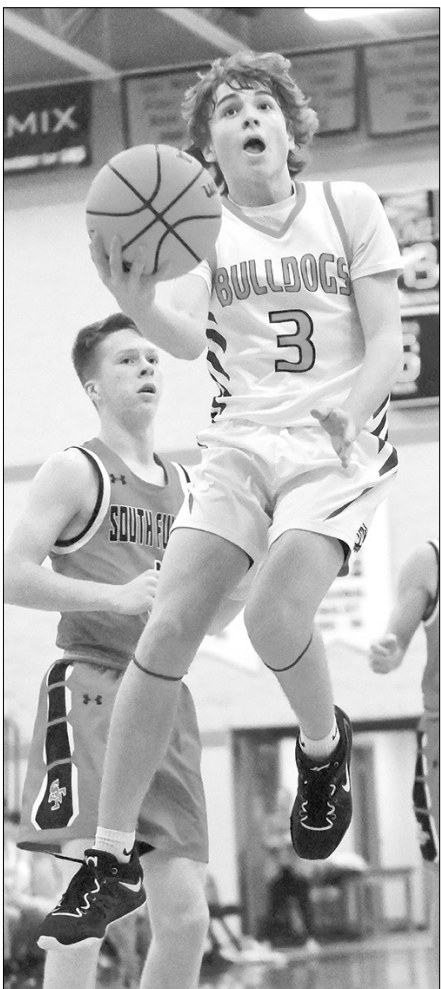

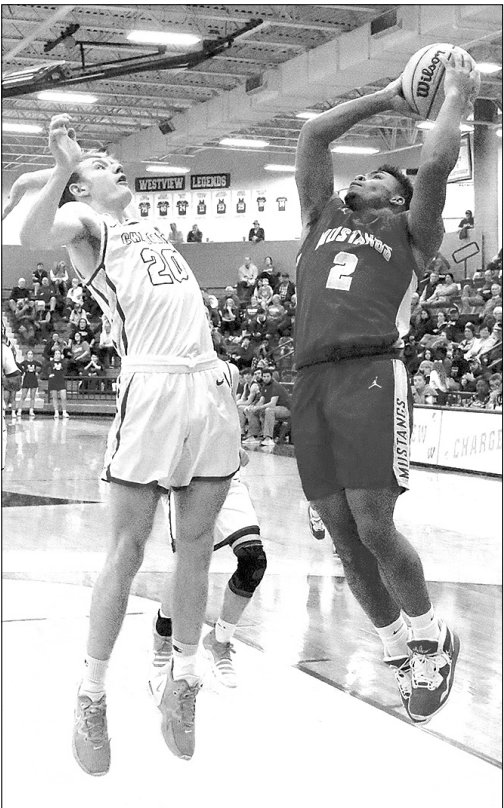
