





## McKenzie LED Lighting Installation Begins

McKENZIE — Light-emitting diode ‘LED’ street lighting will soon blanket the city of McKenzie as part of a plan to install LED lighting throughout the city and in all city-owned building. Contractors installed LED lighting

along Banner Row and three other small test areas in the city to test the intensity of the 96-watt lighting. Along with LED lighting, wi-fi will be installed throughout much of the city for the use of citizens.

## Huntingdon Woman Faces Child Abuse, Neglect Charges

A Huntingdon woman was arrested back in May after her newborn infant and her 16-month-old child both tested positive for illegal drugs. Brehanna D. Porter, 28, was charged with two counts of aggravated child abuse and neglect. According to the report by Huntingdon Police Officer Christopher Cole, Porter gave birth to a baby girl on April 18 at Jackson-Madison County General Hospital, and the infant was admitted to the Newborn Intensive Care Unit that next day due to complications. A laboratory test detected the presence of methamphetamine and marijuana in the infant’s system. Cole was notified on May 15 by the Department of Children Services (DCS) Porter’s 16-month-old son had tested positive for meth after the boy had been removed from Porter’s custody. Porter was arrested by HPD officers at her home on May 20.

## Junior National Championship Fishing Returns to 1000-Acre Lake

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — National championships for one of the fastest-growing youth fishing circuits in the country will be held on outstanding Tennessee River fisheries, B.A.S.S. announced recently. Three hundred high school teams are expected to compete on Kentucky Lake August 8-10 for the high school championship crown. Each two-angler team is accompanied by a coach who runs the boat and can give advice on fishing techniques and patterns. Student anglers qualify for the championship through four High School Opens. “They are the best of the best among 13,000 high school B.A.S.S. members representing more than 1,300 high school fishing clubs nationwide,” Weldon said. “In addition to the 900 anglers and coaches, we expect at least 2,000 family members and friends in attendance, cheering on their favorite teams.” “We are thrilled to once again host the High School National Championship here in Henry County at beautiful Kentucky Lake,” said Tara Wilson, administrative coordinator, Henry County Tourism Authority. “We welcome all the anglers and their families to our community and wish them all the best of luck!” Bethel Director of Athletics Dale Kelley added, “We are honored as a school and county to be involved and serve as hosts. It provides an opportunity for both Bethel and Carroll County to make a difference and be a part of something special. This introduces so many people to

our great lakes and, of course, our university. We wish everyone much success and a safe week here in West Tennessee.” Another fast-growing tournament program is the Junior Bassmaster Division, which will field up to 50 teams in that group’s championship Aug. 6 and 7 at Carroll County 1000 Acre Recreational Lake. As in the high school competitions, they will compete as two-angler teams accompanied by a coach. “We are excited to welcome the young anglers and their families to Carroll County and west Tennessee,” said Brad Hurley, president of Carroll County Chamber of Commerce. “This is our sixth year to be a host, and our enthusiasm for the Bassmaster Junior National Championship is only growing. ## Four More Animal Abuse Charges For Former Atwood Residents

PUTNAM COUNTY — The Putnam County Grand Jury has issued indictments for animal cruelty against Tara Neutzler and Donald Schoenthal, the same couple who were charged with hundreds of counts of animal abuse in Carroll County earlier. The couple was being held in the Putnam County Jail on \$10,000 bond each. Neutzler, age 44, and Schoenthal, age 53, are charged with three counts of animal cruelty and one count of aggravated animal cruelty. The indictments follow a seizure by Putnam County deputies in May of more than 40 animals from what Sheriff Eddie Farris called “inhumane conditions” at their Locust Grove Rd. home. The Putnam County Sheriff’s Office called it “Operation Storm’s End” and were alerted to the situation when they served

a warrant on her for Tenn Care fraud earlier in the day and observed “numerous dogs and cats crammed in cages” in the yard and could smell a “distinct odor of urine, feces and decomposition.” The sheriff’s office contacted Animal Rescue Corps of Lebanon, which organized the animal rescue of their Atwood home in Carroll County earlier. In the weeks following the May raid on their Putnam County home, Carroll County Circuit Court Judge Donald Parish ordered they be banned from owning or possessing animals for 10 years. The couple entered into a plea agreement in Carroll County and they agreed to surrender their animals from both the Carroll County and Putnam counties to the Animal Rescue Corps.

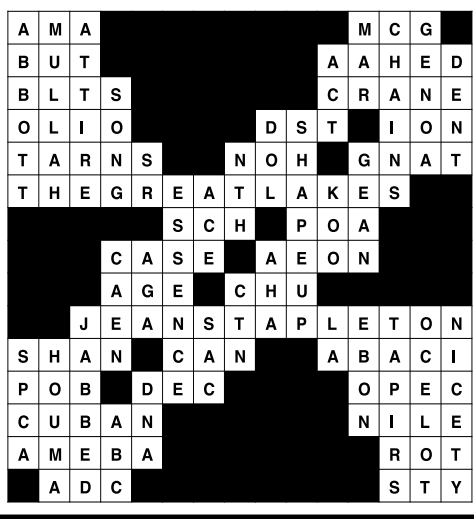

MCKENZIE (July 9) — McKenzie Rotary Club members heard a program on Carroll County Electric Department and its deployment of new electronic meters. Danny Brawner, general manager, and Ryan Drewry, business manager were the featured speakers. Terry Howell was the program sponsor.

The two spoke about the history of the department, the number of personnel employed with the department, and the new meters, which will be read automatically without the need for the door-to-door meter reader.

CCED was founded in 1938, has seven substations, and 48 employees. The system recently mapped all of its assets throughout the county with designated GPS coordinates.

The most recent addition is the Honeywell ELster electric meters, which communicate through a mesh system to the substations, where the data is then transmitted via fiber option to the main office in Huntingdon. Advanced Meter Services has installed approximately 200 daily since early in 2019. The system has 15,400 meters to install. Once the system is fully implemented, customers can review their usage via a computer app and/or pay in advance, similar to fueling one's car.

LOUISVILLE, Ky (July 8, 2019) — Joey Meeks, from Sharon, Tenn. and a student at Tennessee College of Applied Tech-McKenzie (McKenzie), was awarded the college bronze medal in Major Appliance and Refrigeration Technology during the SkillsUSA Championship in Louisville on June 26 and 27.

More than 6,500 students competed at the national showcase of career and technical education.

The SkillsUSA Championships is the largest skill competition in the world and covers 1.4 million square feet, equivalent to 20 football fields or 25 acres.
