

McKenzie Native Saves Young Woman at Beach

GULF SHORES, Ala. (June 19) — Chris Taylor, a McKenzie native and Waverly Police Sergeant, saved the life of a young woman last month while vacationing with his family.

Sgt. Taylor was on the beach when he became aware of a young woman struggling in the water. Monasia Lee of Missouri was swept out by a rip current and had become exhausted attempting to stay afloat. Taylor swam out to Lee and pulled her to the shore, then stayed with her until emergency responders arrived to assist her.

Waverly Police Chief Grant Gillespie received an email from Pastor Rich Jenkins, a chaperone of Lee's church group, acknowledging Sgt. Taylor's selfless act. Chief Gillespie in turn presented Taylor with a Letter of Commendation, stating in part, "Your actions that day speak to your commitment to the public and your concern for others above your own and embody the high standards this community expects from its police officers."

Lee is said to have recovered from the event and is doing well.

Taylor is the son of Mike and Jennifer Taylor of McKenzie and a 2002 graduate of McKenzie High School.

AAA: Demand Wanes, Gas Price Increase Stalls

Tension in the Middle East Continues to Mount

NASHVILLE (July 22) — Tennessee's state average gas price is \$2.51 per gallon for regular unleaded, which is two cents less than last week's average, 16 cents more than one month ago, but nine cents cheaper than one year ago.

Today's national average of \$2.79, is three cents less expensive than last Monday, ten cents more than a month ago but eight cents cheaper than last year. This is the first time in four weeks that the national average has seen a weekly decline.

"Gasoline stocks remain

robust amid a recent dip in demand, which could be one reason we are seeing pump prices starting to roll back," said Jeanette Casselano, AAA spokesperson. "It is too soon to know if this is a long-term trend, but it is certainly a welcome relief for motorists."

Crude Oil

At the close of Friday's formal trading session on the NYMEX, WTI increased by 33 cents to settle at \$55.63. Crude prices mostly declined last week after the International Energy Agency (IEA) announced that it does not expect oil prices to rise significantly because demand is slowing and there is a glut in global crude markets. The IEA is reducing its 2019 oil demand

growth forecast to 1.1 million barrels per day (bpd) from 1.2 million bpd due to a slowing global economy amid the continuing U.S.-China trade dispute. Concerns over the current excess of oil in the crude market overshadowed concerns of increasing tension in the Middle East, following the United States announcing on Thursday that a U.S. Navy ship had "destroyed" an Iranian drone in the Strait of Hormuz. However, Iran captured a British-flagged oil tanker in the region late on Friday, dramatically escalating tensions. If tension continues to mount, oil prices could spike this week in response to concerns that global supply flows may be disrupted.

We will continue to offer K-12 Christian education at its best, and we will always have a special place in our school for students from Cottage Grove."

Henry County Approves Budget, Tax Rate

PARIS — The Henry County Commission recessed its meeting Monday night and will resume July 30 for action on the 2019-2020 budget. The budget was presented to the full commission by County Mayor Brent Greer with a sum-

mary that showed there will be no new property taxes in the new budget, which will also include a two percent cost of living raise for county employees.

The total \$155,097,320 budget includes a general fund of \$12,235,817. The tax rate required for the total budget is \$2.091, which is the same as last year.

Other categories in the budget are: debt service fund, \$2,979,217; drug control fund, \$30,450; Education Funds, \$35,221,035; Education Capital Projects, zero; General Capital Projects, \$251,258; Highway Fund, \$56,598,024; Medical Center, \$99,115,593, and Solid Waste, \$665,926.

Henry County Clerk Can Renew Handgun Permits

PARIS — The Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security has recently added the Henry County Clerk as an issuance partner for renewals of handgun carry permits.

The Henry County Clerk's office is located at 101 West Washington Street, Suite 102, at the Henry County Courthouse in Paris.

Clerk Donna Craig said these

services are currently offered on Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. The Clerk's office does not issue renewals during the lunch hours.

The new renewal services being offered are a result of Public Chapter 109 being passed by the General Assembly this past legislative session.

"We appreciate the opportunity to partner with the Depart-

ment of Safety and Homeland Security in being able to offer this convenient service. It will be very helpful for handgun carry permit holders in this county to be able to renew here in our office," Craig said.

State law allows a \$4.00 administrative fee to be added by the Clerk's office in addition to the cost of the renewed handgun carry permit.

Huntingdon School Board Approves \$11.9 Million Budget with No Tax Increase

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HUNTINGDON — The Huntingdon School Board met in their monthly session last Thursday evening July 18 and approved the budget for the new school year with no tax increase.

The budget calls for a total balanced budget of \$11,930,861 with no tax increase. The budget was based on a certified tax rate of \$1.2282 per 100 dollars of assessed value.

The budget shows an increase of \$228,806 over last year's budget and includes a 2.5-percent salary increase for certified

employees plus a one-time bonus of \$750 and also includes a 2-percent salary increase for non-certified employees plus a one-time bonus of \$500.

The budget breaks down into four categories which include the General Purpose Fund at \$9,825,122, Federal Projects Fund at \$930,040, Cafeteria Fund at \$706,805, and the Debt Service Fund at \$468,894.

Alan Eubanks reviewed the 5-year Strategic Plan for the Huntingdon Special School District as required by the state for every school system.

Eubanks highlighted the mission and vision of the school system along with belief statements.

The mission of HSSD is to produce informed responsible, productive, citizens who will be lifelong learners and successful contributors of society.

Huntingdon schools aims to accomplish this mission by cooperating with parents, the community, and other stakeholders while providing a high quality, dedicated staff for all of our students and providing a challenging curriculum within a positive, safe and disciplined learning environment.

Band Director Ben Martin made a proposal to the board to start a tradition of doing a band trip every four years with the first one to be in April 2020 to Washington, D.C. Martin also advised that West Carroll's band has requested to join Huntingdon on the trip. He told the board the more people that can go the less it will cost per person.

Martin felt the fundraising efforts that are in place should be sufficient to get everyone paid for. High School Principal Jonathan Kee added that he was pleased with Martin's fundraising plans and it will not require people to go door-to-door. The trip is scheduled for April 4-8, 2020. The board approved the trip.

In other action the board approved the purchase of a F350 truck for the Agricultural program which has been funded by a private donation.

The board also acknowledged the hiring of Zack Crocker for high school math along with Amy Atkins and Natasha Conrad to be primary school education assistants.

The meeting adjourned with the next one set for August 15 at 7 p.m.

Work on McKenzie’s Dog Park is Nearing Completion

Construction is nearing completion on McKenzie’s dog park and a grand opening will be announced at a later time. McKenzie was the winner of a grant for a dog park from the Randy Boyd Foundation. Randy Boyd, interim president of the University of Tennessee and his wife, Jenny, were in town Wednesday, August 8, 2018 to present a check for \$25,000 to Mayor Jill Holland and the City of McKenzie to construct a dog park adjacent to City Park on Como Road. Holland told the gathering, a group of citizens came forward with the idea for such a park. She acknowledged this

was not something high on the priority list due to McKenzie and other towns having to tighten their financial belts and likely would not have happened without this grant. Randy Boyd said the idea for the dog park and other dog parks across the state came from an insult. He was attending an event out of state where Tennessee was mentioned as one of the lowest ranking states in how pets were treated. He came home and did his due diligence and found the information was true and helped begin initiatives in his hometown of Knoxville. His goal is to help

make Tennessee the most dog friendliest state in the country. Dog Park Dash is the program which McKenzie won the grant for the park. Dog Park Dash is an initiative of the Randy Boyd Foundation that is giving \$1 million per year for three years broken down into one grand prize grant of \$100,000 and 26 grants of \$25,000 each per year. McKenzie competed against 50 other cities across the state who applied for these grants. On Monday, the city departments of Park, Street, and Water were on site making additions.

weekend are most clothing items and school and art supplies priced at \$100 or less and most computers priced at \$1,500. Anyone, not just students, can buy qualifying items tax-free. However, items purchased must be for personal use and may not be for business or trade use. Clothing items that qualify include general apparel such

as shirts, pants, jackets, socks, shoes and dresses. Items that are normally sold together, such as shoes, cannot be split up to stay beneath the \$100 threshold. Items that do not qualify and are still taxable include jewelry, handbags and sports and recreation equipment. School and art supplies that qualify include items such as binders, books, backpacks, crayons, paper, pens, pencils, rulers, glazes, clay, paint, drawing pads and artist paintbrushes. Computers that qualify include desktop and laptop com-

puters as well as tablets. Items that do not qualify and are still taxable include computer parts, such as keyboards and monitors, not sold with a CPU; storage media, such as flash drives and compact discs; individually-purchased software; video game consoles; printers and printer supplies; electronic readers and personal digital assistants; and cell phones, including smart phones. No Tax Increase for Carroll Budget

HUNTINGDON (July 19) — The proposed 2019-2020 budget for the county of Carroll is based on a tax rate of \$1.55 per \$100 assessed value of real property. That is the same rate as last year.

The proposed budget, which will be presented to the full Carroll County Commission on August 12, includes a two-percent raise for all county employees, a minimum of \$12 per hour for 30 of a total of 44 part-time employees, a minimum pay of \$30,000 for the head librarian, and a \$5,000 annual bonus for Stacey McCaleb and Jenny Gordon once they attain their Certified County Financial Officer certification.

Also included are approximately \$150,000 to erect a new communications tower in south Carroll County to aid fire and law enforcement, grant funds for the new Prevention Coalition coordinator, and funding for school resource officers which are funded by the individual school systems.

Mayor Joseph Butler announced the budget relies on approximately \$555,000 in reserve funds (savings) to balance the budget. That compares to \$861,000 pulled from reserves during the 2018-19 fiscal year on a budget approved by the previous administration and inherited by the Butler administration.

Butler said the county has manageable debt of which some could be attacked more aggressively if the county commissioners choose to do so. He said he will aggressively seek state and federal grants for local projects.

The annual donation to the Gordon Browning Museum was increased by \$1,000 to a total of \$5,000 at the request of Commissioner Manuel Crossno. That restores the funding to a level from several years ago.

Budget Committee members Manuel Crossno, Brian Winston, Darrell Ridgely, and Johnny Blount approved the budget to be sent to the full commission.

Commissioner Joel Washburn inquired about the level of funding for economic development administered by the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce. Butler said the county provides \$27,000 to the Chamber for economic development and another \$10,000 for membership dues.

Washburn also inquired about the funding going to the Carroll County Watershed Authority to fund the Carroll County 1000-Acre Recreational Lake. Butler said the “growth tax” applied to the lake is estimated at \$57,000, coming as a transfer from the county’s General Fund to the Water-

shed Authority. Commissioner Blount said the total funds coming from

the wheel tax and from the county’s General Fund is approximately \$325,000 annually.

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J.P. Cannon and Sons Drug Store

McKenzie's Early Pharmacological Family

In this week's edition, I started researching various McKenzie families. Through books, on-line searches and The McKenzie Banner archives I ran across the Cannon's, the family-owned J.P. Cannon and Sons Drug Store, which was one of McKenzie's earliest continually ran businesses until 1959. As usual, I came across a few interesting tidbits that I plan on sharing.

The story of Cannon's Drug Store goes back to 1843 with the birth of Jabez Pugh Cannon in Gravelly Springs, Ala. At the age of 18, J.P. enlisted in the Confederate Army in November 1861, serving in the 27th Alabama Infantry. He was discharged at the conclusion of the Civil War in 1865.

During his time in the Confederacy, he kept a diary, written in pencil in notebooks he carried with him. His diary was later published under the title of "Inside of Rebeldom: The Daily Life of a private in the Confederate Army."

The following is an excerpt from "Inside of Rebeldom":
"I enlisted in Co. C. 27th Ala., in the fall of 1861. Companies from other counties which were required to complete the regiment were slow and it was not until the latter part of December that we were ready for organization. As the eventful day approached we began to tell friends and sweet-hearts goodbye. Every young fellow who went to the war got a kiss from his 'best girl', and as it was the first that many of us had ever enjoyed, it is not surprising that a last farewell was repeated over and over again before we actually took our departure.
Our patriotism ebbed and flowed, we being anxious to get off, yet loath to leave home and friends who we might never see

again. It was trying time when the 24th day of December, 1861, came, the day, set for us to meet in Florence and be "mustered in." One other company from our county and eight other counties in North Alabama met us at the appointed time, and as each numbered about 100, we had a full regiment, and were sworn into service of the Confederate States for 12 months "unless sooner discharged."

If you Yankees could have seen that array of 1,000 long Bowie-knives-not keen, bright blades, as the story writers would say, for many of these bore the marks of the unskilled blacksmith's hammer, and the rust of years will clung to them, untouched by the stone which ground them to a sharp edge. Perhaps you would tremblingly folded your tents and marched back to your Northern Homes and left the Confederacy 'one of the nations of the earth'; but you did not see it, and the war went on, battles were planned and preparations for a movement up the Tennessee River were continued just the same as the 27th Ala., had not come into existence.

After the war, J.P. studied medicine (1866-1869) at the University of Louisville. He returned to his home in Lauderdale County, Ala. and practiced medicine there until 1874. It was in 1874, J.P. established Cannon's Drug Store in McKenzie. He retired in 1913 and succeeded the operator to his sons Lloyd and Turner.

It was noted that J.P. was a kind, gentle man, whose goal in life was to serve his fellowman. One of his best companions was his dog, Don, and one was seldom seen without the other.

Lloyd and Turner took over the family business with the

father's retirement. Both sons were born in McKenzie, Lloyd in December 1877 and Turner August 1885, and were educated in McTyeire School and before entering into pharmacy school.

The brothers worked and apprenticed for their father before taking over for the elder Cannon. In the 1920s, when Sunday newspapers came to the store to be sold, Lloyd drove out to the country on Sunday afternoon and gave the unsold papers to people who didn't get to town often. He couldn't bear for a child not get the funnies (comic strips).

Lloyd sold his interest in the company to his brother in 1943 as the tensions and demands of World War II increased, but still reported to work six days a week working seven hour days. Turner was married to Ruth Burns whose father, James T. Burns, along Benjamin P. Moore opened the Moore and Burns Dry Goods Store in 1882.

In 1947, Turner oversaw the pharmacy's move from the corner of Lee and Broad (the building used by Cannon's for 45 years) to what was the McDade Building on Broadway closer to the intersection near Cedar. The Cannon's Drug Store was a mecca for former McTyeire student returning to visit McKenzie. Many tall tales

were originated and enlarged at the pharmacy next to the old potbellied stove. Those that gathered around the stove area became the "fireside council." Turner's home was often a gathering place for friends and relatives returning to visit McKenzie.

In 1959, Cannon's Drug Store was sold to a family from Birmingham, Ala. the Lindsey's. J.T. and Robye Lindsey picked up where the Cannon family left often and became an intricate part of McKenzie.

When the Lights Dimmed...

In Paris, Texas, it was called the Lamar Theater. It opened in 1930. It would seat 452 downstairs and the upstairs balcony area would hold over 100 more. It had only one screen of course, and the old timers still talk about the long lines at 202 Bonham Street for the opening of "Gone with the Wind", "High Noon" and "Bad Day at Black Rock". The last movie shown there was in 1963. TV chased the bad guys (and the good) right off the big screen.

It was the Zia Theater in Ft. Sumner, New Mexico. It opened in the early '40's, would seat 350 people, all downstairs as it had no balcony. In Ferriday, Louisiana, the Arcade would seat 450 movie goers. In Pulaski, Tennessee, it was the Sam Davis Theatre. It had room for a whopping 754 seats!

The La Vista Theater opened in Hollis, Oklahoma, the year Charles Lindbergh flew the Atlantic and Babe Ruth belted 60 homeruns. The Garza Theatre entertained them for years in

Post, Texas. It was The Ritz in Hinton, West Virginia and Baxter Springs, Arkansas.

It didn't matter if you spelled it theater or theatre. A balcony was nice, but it wasn't necessary. Many had stages down front but most were seldom used. They were always built on the square.....or at least downtown if your little place happened to be square-less. Part of the excitement and attraction of the movie house was you got to "go to town" to see the picture show!

They are mostly gone now. Some completely demolished, others turned into restaurants, coffee houses, used book stores or flea markets.

For my generation, the physical plants might have faded..... but never the memories!

I don't remember life without the Park Theatre up on the corner of Cedar and Main Street. It was there I punched cattle with Joel McCrea and Randolph Scott, played cards in gilded saloons with Burt Lancaster, leaped tall buildings with Superman, waded ashore with John Wayne at Guadalcanal and Iwo Jima.....

My first trip to Mexico was with Gene Autry in "South of the Border". I was right there

when Sam played it again in "Casablanca". I covered my ears as the Austrian hills came alive with the "Sound of Music".

When the heat index jumped to triple digits in late July we'd pay to see anything....just as long as it got us into the only building in town that was air conditioned!

And sure, you can say the pace was a bit slower "back then"; the world maybe a tick more innocent. Some would have you believe that time stopped altogether on occasion....you know, like watching paint dry. But we didn't know that. And we didn't feel that!

We had the Park Theatre to guide us. If we saw a western on Saturday, we played cowboys and Indians all week. If Tarzan was the main attraction, we spent the next few days pulling ourselves out of quicksand or diving into the swimming pool looking for alligators.

We honed our own entertainment skills in the darkness of that old theater. We'd sit up in the balcony and accidentally drop popcorn on unsuspecting individuals below. We would sail Necco Wafers across the wide expanse of the room, listening for contact. We'd crawl under the seats and grab someone's leg

every time the "Creature from the Black Lagoon" rose up out of the water.

I fell in love for the very first time in the Park Theatre. Her name was Hayley Mills. I think we were both thirteen. A few years later I took Billie Jean to the Court Theatre over on the square in Huntington to see "Birdman of Alcatraz". I felt guilty the whole time I was there. It was like I was cheating on my hometown cinema!

You can't possibly understand the two-way loyalty unless you had been there. Nor could you feel the magic, the charm or the importance of such a lasting relationship.

Do We Need Local Libraries, Small-Town Newspapers?

With the world at our fingertips via the click of a mouse or the touch of a mobile phone screen, are libraries and newspapers necessary anymore, especially in small towns? It's a legitimate question that's being asked across the country, a question that's often driven by economics as the cost of newspapers increases and the strained budgets of cities struggle with funding a library.

How a person answers the question will be determined by two things: how they themselves use the two resources and what they believe the functions of local libraries and small-town newspapers are.

I will admit that I am now a senior citizen and that I have not checked out a book from a public library in decades, even though as a child I loved going to the library and checking out books. So, on the surface you would think that I would see no point in having a local library, but the truth is the opposite and that is because what libraries used to be a long time ago and what they need to be in the present and for the future are radically different.

According to a recent Pew Research study, 53 percent of Millennials (those 18-35) in the United States visited a library at least once in 2016, more than in any other generation. Why is that?

Books are more expensive than ever (even though there are hundreds of thousands of books on Amazon for 99 cents, it's important to remember that not all young people have the necessary technology nor the money to get them) Libraries offer quiet spaces for young people to gather and work on projects, do research, or do homework. Quiet, conflict-free spaces in homes are harder and harder to find.

Successful libraries are offering services that people can't find elsewhere: learning English as a second language, teaching how to build a resume, filling out a job application online, a place where self-help groups (like divorce recovery, grief recovery, 12-Step groups) can meet, mentors can meet with their mentees without being disturbed, parenting classes, classes on divorce recovery, meeting place for book clubs.

Children's libraries promote literacy through scores of specialized programs and events.

"Libraries are the great symbols of the freedom of the mind." — Franklin D. Roosevelt.

"If information is the currency of democracy, then libraries are its banks." — Senator Wendell Ford

"Freedom is found through the portals of our nation's libraries." David McCullough

My research on the topic of local libraries led me to the conclusion that people today who have wealth and position have less of a need for libraries than those who do not, which leads to the problem that the very ones who will have to help pay for a library don't want to because they think it is an unnecessary expense. However, it is vital in our narcissistic world of today to remember the obligation we have to help those who are less fortunate than ourselves, and supporting a local library is just one of the ways that can be done.

So, where do small-town newspapers fit into this discussion? First of all, to compare small-town newspapers to large metropolitan newspapers or national news organizations is to miss the point. Small-town newspapers are about me and my friends and neighbors. They are chock-full of good news (as opposed to the doomsday spin the national media puts on every story) and feel-good stories. It is there that I can learn what has been going on down the street or what is going to be happening soon. They make an effort to keep the local government honest by reporting on what happens in council meetings and board meetings. Citizens are invited to air their unedited gripes and concerns on the editorial page. A photographic record is displayed of children who have achieved success of every conceivable kind—sports, music, dance, reading, academics, beauty pageants. Local, small businesses are promoted.

If we lose our local library or small-town newspaper, then we lose a piece of ourselves and what connects us to each other. Therefore, both are worthy of our generous support.

They also place emphasis on the "priesthood of all believers," a doctrine found in the first epistle of Peter (1 Peter 2:9). After joining the Society of Friends, Grellet devoted himself to missionary and charitable work and was granted meetings with many rulers and dignitaries. By all accounts he led an exemplary life, encouraging charitable work and reforms in education, prisons and hospitals. He spoke out against what he saw as the evils of his age, such as slavery, and was a man of faith who put his faith into constructive action. 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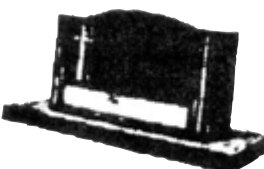

Adjustments Set for August 3 Duck Blind Drawings

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency is reminding waterfowl hunters of adjustments made for the Aug. 3 handheld duck blind drawings to be conducted at 10 locations.

On-site registrations for individuals will be conducted in the traditional format from 7-10 a.m. There will be a two-stage drawing.

For the first drawing, an application is drawn from the barrel. The successful applicant comes forward along with all sign-ons, creating a party. This is completed before the blind locations are selected. The person drawn (party leader) and all sign-ons will surrender their registration to TWRA officials.

The party leader drawn fills out a second registration card and places that card into a second barrel. This procedure continues until the required number of names in the second barrel matches the number of blind sites at that specific location. After this procedure is completed, the second stage of the drawing begins. No sign-ons

will be added during or after the second drawing.

A card is drawn from the second barrel and the party leader will pick a site. The "blind holder permits" for the pre-established party are completed using the information on the cards collected from the party during the first stage of the drawing.

The drawing from the second barrel continues until all names are drawn. Any unclaimed blind sites at the end of the second drawing will be designated as temporary blind sites and available on a first-come, first served basis throughout the waterfowl hunting season. Hunting from these locations will be by boat blind or wade-in only (no blind will be built). There are no changes in how blinds are occupied during the hunting season. (Information is detailed on page 48 of the 2019-20 Tennessee Hunting and Trapping Guide).

The two-stage process was announced at the June meeting of the Tennessee Fish and Wildlife

Commission. At its May meeting, the commission requested Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency staff review the handheld duck blind drawing process for consistency and ways to reduce the likelihood of buying/selling of blind sites.

Deadline Approaches for SBA Disaster Assistance for Tennessee

ATLANTA — The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) encourages businesses of all sizes, private nonprofit organi-

zations, homeowners and renters to apply for a disaster loan for physical damage before the Aug. 20 deadline. Anyone in the declared counties in Tennessee with damages caused by severe storms and flooding on Feb. 6-24, 2019 should apply for the SBA disaster loan assistance.

The declaration covers the following counties: Decatur, Hardin, Humphreys, Perry and Sevier and the adjacent counties of Benton, Blount, Carroll, Chester, Cocke, Dickson, Henderson, Hickman, Houston, Jefferson, Knox, Lewis, McNairy and Wayne in Tennessee.

Businesses and nonprofits can apply up to \$2 million to repair

or replace disaster damaged real estate, machinery, equipment, inventory, and other business assets. Loans for working capital, known as Economic Injury Disaster Loans, are available even if the business did not suffer any physical damage. Homeowners can apply up to \$200,000 to repair or replace disaster damaged real estate. Homeowners and renters can apply up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged personal property including automobiles.

Interest rates are as low as 4 percent for businesses, 2.75 percent for private nonprofit organizations, and 2.063 percent for homeowners and renters, with terms up to 30 years. The SBA

determines loan amounts and terms based on each applicant’s circumstances.

Applicants may be eligible for a loan amount increase up to 20 percent of their physical damages, as verified by the SBA for mitigation purposes. Eligible mitigation improvements may include a safe room or storm shelter, sump pump, French drain or retaining wall to help protect property and occupants from future damage caused by a similar disaster.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via the SBA’s secure website at DisasterLoan.sba.gov.

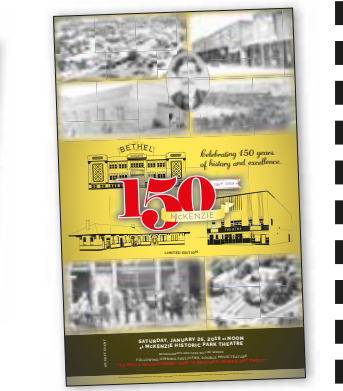
