McKenzie High School's Rebel Golf team has garnered a new first after team members Johnathan Moore and Maggie Glass and Coach Larry Joe Smith each won their respective divisions in 2019 local golf club championships.

To participate in a golf course's annual club championship event, golfers must be members of a course/club. Local club championships are the premiere event at each club with each setting specific methods of play. Winners hold the title of Club Champion for one year.

Glass, a member of Persimmon Hills Golf Course in Sharon, captured the Women's Club Championship title on September 7 after going undefeated in round robin match play against the women's field. During the finals match,

Glass won on hole 18 one up.

Huntingdon School Board Approves Board Policies

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HUNTINGDON — The Huntingdon School Board met in a short session and approved a number of changes to the board policies recommended by the Tennessee School Board Association (TSBA).

After approving the consent agenda, Board members went over each individual policy change and approved each one.

The policy regarding the Role of the Board of Education was updated to be more specific about the board's functions including specific legal responsibilities. The Duties of Board Members policy was revised to focus on legal duties outlined in state law. The Boardsmanship Code of Conduct policy was updated and relates to board member conduct.

The Policy on Board Minutes was updated to allow for emailing of board minutes to members as opposed to mailing them which was required in the past.

The Policy on Alcohol and Drugs in the Workplace was renamed from Drug Free Workplace and better defines terms in the policy.

The Surplus Property Sales policy raises the limit for items that may be declared as surplus from less than \$250 to \$500.

A change in state law caused the policy on Emergency Preparedness Plan to be updated. Previously state law only required high schools to maintain Automated External Defibrillators but the new state law requires all K-12 schools to maintain AEDs.

Another new state law requires students to pass a civics exam in order to graduate which led to updating the policy on Graduation Requirements.

Policies concerning Bus Safety and Conduct were also updated along with a new policy added regarding Students from Military Families.

Before adjourning, the board set the next meeting for October 17 at 7 a.m.

McKenzie School Board to Meet October 1

The McKenzie Special School District Board of Education meets Tuesday, October 1 at 5:30 p.m. at the board office at 114 Bell Avenue.

The agenda includes several items of new business.

Members will consider approval of a budget amendment and of the annual Report of School System/School Compliance for 2019-2020. The school district is in compliance with the state board rules, regulations and minimum standards.

Also to be considered is approval of the McKenzie Special School District Disciplinary Hearing Au-

thority: Nick Lowe, SRO; Tonya Brown, McKenzie Elementary Principal; Dorethea Royle, McKenzie Middle School Principal; and Kelly Spivey, McKenzie High School Principal. Members of the DHA are appointed to one-year terms and are subject to reappointment as stated in Student Disciplinary Hearing Authority Policy 6.317.

The board will also consider for approval, on first reading, an amendment to the McKenzie Special School District Board of Education Policy Manual (6.300 Code of Behavior and Discipline).

You’d think a guy that played in half a dozen Homecoming football games and coached another thirty-eight or so would naturally recall certain plays, big wins or any number of special moments surrounding the game. But Homecoming week mostly reminds me of big hair.

I enjoyed every Homecoming as a young fan and player. I didn’t enjoy them as a coach. The difference is easy to understand. The hoopla, fanfare or “gooblygock” as Coach Scott called it when we were in high school, was soooo much fun as a kid. As a coach, it was just another distraction.

Coach Scott would be mad all week, “I catch you guys working on those floats, strutting around like peacocks or standing within one hundred yards of any girl in this high school, I’m going to run the whole bunch of you till your lungs fall out your navels!”

It took a dark night and three of us to work on the class float. One player got to nail the goal post in place. One player was out front watching for Coach Scott and the third was in the woods behind the barn scouting out an escape route in case he showed up!

The fun really started at noon. School would get out early and the girls would rush downtown to Clyde Phillips’ Style Center. Some would hustle over to Nadine’s Beauty Salon. Imogene’s Shop was also a popular choice.

You couldn’t show up on the Homecoming court, or the dance for that matter, with a pony tail for goodness sakes!

I think it was that Annette with-the-funny-sounding-last-name Mouseketeer that got this big hair trend started in one of those “Beach Blanket Bingo” movies. I know it was a big (no pun intended) deal in 1964 in our little town. The trick for the hairdresser was to tease the

hair up and out in every direction as far as it would go.....and then pour the starch to it!

Phillips was on Broadway. We’d pick a park bench on the square across the street and settle in for the show. It was better than a Saturday matinee. If Barnum and Bailey had figured this out, they’d still be in business.

Pam Collins would go in with her locks plastered to her face. It would take a while. But she’d come out with hair stretching toward the sky! It looked like she’d been plugged into an electric outlet. “Little Orphan Annie, with eyes” is the way her cousin Rick put it.

LaRenda Bradfield’s hair wasn’t as long as some. But, I’m telling you, they could grow hair in those places. We thought she was going to tip over before she got to the car but her dad caught her.

The wind lifted Ann Carol McCaleb right off the ground.

We got word that Charlotte Melton had been in Imogene’s since 10:00 AM. We broke and ran across town hoping there were some good seats left.

Charlotte had hair BEFORE she went into the salon. Buddy swore that Imogene had a machine that would blow up each individual hair. Charlotte had to turn sideways coming out the door. She wouldn’t fit in the car. You talk about a memory that will live in infamy—Charlotte tied to the top of a Ford Fairlane, her mom slowly turning that corner up by the movie theater.

The Homecoming parade started in front of the elementary school and proceeded slowly up Stonewall Street. Somehow the Trojan horse on the sophomore float toppled off the wagon as it made that wide curve in front of the First Baptist Church.

Rollin Trull, in the convertible behind, hit his brakes and took a hard left to avoid the mess. A member of the homecoming court riding with Rollin tumbled across the hood and landed head first on the pavement. Her mom got her upright and was asking her if she was alright when Imogene rushed out of the crowd and starting combing out the dent in her hair.

Hey, the girl might be crowned Homecoming Queen and Imogene figured her reputation was on the line.....

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Dr. Roy N. Baker
The Man Who Grew Bethel

When I was on the Bethel College campus, I always took note of the names on the buildings. As an athlete I spent a great deal of my time in Baker Fieldhouse which predates the Vera Low building in what feels like a lifetime ago. In the six years I spent on campus, I am just now researching Dr. Baker; so I feel this week’s issue should focus on the college’s late president.

Roy Newsome Baker was born and raised on his family’s farm near the Hatchie River in Hardeman County, Tenn., near the little town of Whiteville. He was the third of twelve children born to William and Blanche Newsom Baker.

Graduating from Whiteville High School in 1926, he attended Memphis State University. In 1934, he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree. Before obtaining his degree, he taught and coached at Adamsville High School (1927-1928); Middleton High School (1929-1930); Whiteville High School (1931-1941). Baker left Whiteville High School at the end of the 1941 school year and became the first principal at Martin Elementary School. The next year became the superintendent of schools in Martin (1942-1945).

On August 2, 1933 he married Janie Mullen of Whiteville. They had three children; Brenda, Barry and Newsom. In 1944, Baker earned his Master of Arts degree by George Peabody College for Teachers (now part

of Vanderbilt University).

In 1945, he became the twenty-fourth president of Bethel College. Baker was the first secular or layman president of the college. The previous presidents had been preachers within the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

The total enrollment in 1945 was 75 students. Bethel had substantial growth and numerous changes under Baker. In 1956, he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Literature Degree. Dr. Baker led Bethel until his death in 1968.

The twenty-three year period saw Bethel’s enrollment grow from 75 to over 800. The college budget grew from \$38,850 to more than \$1.5 million for the 1968 school year. Total assets of the college were more than \$4 million at the time of his death. The endowment grew from \$82,000 to almost \$1 million. Under his direction, Bethel was recognized and accredited by the Southern Association of College and School (SACS).

During his tenure, Dr. Baker broadened the curriculum and created new facility and administrative positions. This led to a higher quality of professors arriving on campus (including two of my mentors, Dr. James Pott and Dr. Jerry Wilcoxson). At the time of his death, Bethel had five new structures constructed on campus and two other major projects were in the planning stages.

Dr. Baker was a member of Phi Delta Kappa, a professional educational fraternity. He was a member of the West Tennessee Historical Society, the National Education Association (NEA) and the Tennessee College Association (serving as president in 1955). He was a member and past-president

of the Martin and McKenzie Rotary Clubs. Baker served as an elder in both the Martin and McKenzie Cumberland Presbyterian Churches.

He had a great love for sports, especially football and basketball. He played in college, coached high school and refereed high school basketball for many years. When Bethel College built its new fieldhouse at the time, it was only appropriate to name it the Roy N. Baker Physical Education Center (now just Baker Fieldhouse).

Dr. Baker died October 29, 1968 and was buried at Melrose Cemetery in Whiteville. His wife, Janie, was buried next to him in 1986.

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Jason Martin is a life-long resident of McKenzie. He graduated from McKenzie High School in 2000; earned a Bachelor of Science in History from Bethel College in 2004; a Masters in Education from Bethel University in 2009 and a Masters in History and Humanities from Fort Hays State University in 2011.

The convicted couple threw themselves on the mercy of the court. “We understand our crimes. We promise the court we will reform. No more car-jacking and no more convenience store robberies.” The judge takes pity. “Thirty days and five hundred dollars.” It’s short time and a small fine.

The Bible makes an interesting statement with regard to courts and judges. “You shall not show pity: life for life, eye for eye, tooth for tooth, hand for hand, foot for foot” (Deuteronomy 19:21). Ouch. When evidence is clear, pity should be in short supply.

The scene shifts. Billy Joe smacks Michael across the cheek. The anger swells. “Not to me you don’t.” Michael’s left cross blackens Billy Joe’s eye.

Jesus makes the counter argument. “You have heard that it was said, ‘An eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth.’ But I say to you, do not resist an evil person; but whoever slaps you on your right cheek, turn the other to him also” (Matthew 5:38-39). It’s easy to misuse directions for the courtroom and apply them to personal relationships.

We turn the Bible upside down. We are wishy-washy in the courtroom and harsh in individual relationships. It’s the way of the world.

The gospel of Christ upends the world (Acts 17:6). We learn lessons of love with friends and enemies (Matthew 5:44).

President Ward introduced our speaker, Elaine Williams, whose subject was American author Kristin Hannah, writer of more than 20 novels. Her most successful to date is Firefly Lane, which became a popular New York Times best-seller in 2009. It tells the story of two unlikely friends who become inseparable over the course of a summer. It spans 30 years of the characters’ lives and details the trials and tribulations of their friendship.

Hannah was born in 1960 in California and comes from a long

line of adventurers. Her grandfather left Wales at 14 to become a cowboy in Canada. Her father spent his life in search of the extraordinary, the remote and the unusual. He decided California was becoming too crowded, and the family of wife, three kids and the family dog spent a summer driving around America in a VW bus, looking for a place to belong. They found it in the beauty of the Pacific Northwest.

Years later, her dad searched for adventure again, this time in Alaska, on the shores of the Kenai River. Along with a mother-daughter homesteader team, they formed a company in the early 1980s that would become known as the Great Alaska Adventure Lodge. Three generations of her family have worked at the Lodge and have fallen in love with the Last Frontier.

Kristin Hannah graduated from law school in Washington and practiced law in Seattle. Her mother was diagnosed with cancer during Kristin’s final year of law school and confessed that she had always thought her daughter would become a writer. For the

next few months, Kristin and her mother collaborated on a historical romance novel.

After her mother’s death, Kristin packed away all those notes and stored them in a closet. She gave up the idea of writing and continued her studies. She married and began practicing law. During pregnancy, she was confined to bedrest for five months. To keep herself occupied, she began writing and by the time her son was born, she had finished a first draft.

The rejections came, and they stung for a while, but each one spurred her on to try harder and work more. In 1990, she got “the call,” and in that moment went from being a young mother with a hobby to a professional writer and has never looked back. She feels truly blessed to be a wife, a mother and a writer.

Hannah has won many awards, among which are The Golden Heart, The Maggie and the 1996 National Reader’s Choice Award. The Nightingale was voted Best Book of the Year in 2015 by Amazon, Buzzfeed, iTunes and The Wall Street Journal. Among her favorite authors are Alice Hoffman, Michael Connelly, Harlan Coben and Stephen King.

Other blockbuster hits are

Winter Garden and Night Road, in addition to Firefly Lane. The Nightingale has been published in 43 languages and is currently in movie production at TriStar Pictures, which also optioned her novel, The Great Alone. Her novel, Home Front, has been picked up for film by 1492 Films, which also produced the Oscar-nominated movie “The Help.”

She currently lives in the Pacific Northwest with her husband.

"In everything I did, I showed you that by this kind of hard work we must help the weak, remembering the words the Lord Jesus himself said: 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.'"

The pastor Andy Stanley has defined generosity as the “premeditated, calculated, designated emancipation of personal financial assets.” Many of us think that we are being generous when we spontaneously give because our heartstrings are pulled or our conscience nags us. But Stanley’s point is that we should think about and therefore have a premeditated, calculated plan to give our money to people or organizations that will do the most good with those resources. Pastor Stanley also points out that this planned generosity has the virtue of freeing us from our money, or as he puts it, “Freeing your money frees you from your money.” There is indeed something liberating in knowing that we are going to give it all away. Mother Teresa often spoke in a similar way about the freedom of poverty. There is wisdom in the vows of poverty which many religious orders require of their members. Having only the clothes on their back frees them to devote their lives to the spiritual and material needs of others. We can be preoccupied, tied down, and virtually enslaved, by our wealth and possessions. Whether you have much or little to give, reflect on how you can do the most good and have a plan to emancipate your assets. — Christopher Simon

Burn Permits Required for All Outdoor Burning

NASHVILLE — With hot and dry weather leading into the fall fire season, Tennessee's state forester is requiring a burn permit for all open-air outdoor fires beginning Sept. 23.

Typically, burn permits are required statewide Oct. 15-May 15. While Tennessee has not experienced an increase in the number of wildfires and indices right now don't suggest a high fire danger, the Tennessee Department of Agriculture Division of Forestry is requiring burn permits early as a precaution. If current weather conditions continue as leaf fall begins, fire danger may escalate.

"This precautionary measure will be beneficial as we continue to monitor fire risk," State Forester David Arnold said. "The burn permit system focuses attention on safety, and it's important for citizens to know when, where, and how to safely burn debris. Caution and conservative judgment should always be used when working with fire."

Obtaining a burn permit is free, fast, and simple. If you are burning a leaf or brush pile

that is smaller than eight feet by eight feet in size, the online system provides a quick and efficient way to apply. For a larger burn, call your local Division of Forestry burn permit phone number Mon. through Fri., 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. The online system and phone numbers can be found at www.BurnSafeTN.org.

More than 300,000 permits are issued each year, and those are only issued when conditions are conducive to safe burning. If you live inside city limits, there may be additional restrictions. Check with your municipality before you burn.

For a list of materials that may not be burned, check the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation's open burning guidelines at www.tn.gov/environment/program-areas/apc-air-pollution-control-home/apc/open-burning.html.

Burning without a permit is a Class C misdemeanor punishable by up to 30 days in jail and/or a fine. Wildfires caused by arson are a class C felony punishable by 3 to 15 years in prison and up to \$10,000

in fines. Anyone with information about suspected arson activity should call the state Fire Marshal's Arson Hotline at 1-800-762-3017. The hotline is answered 24 hours a day, and you may remain anonymous when providing information. Cash awards are offered for information leading to an arrest or conviction. To report illegal burning, please call 1-888-891-TDEC.

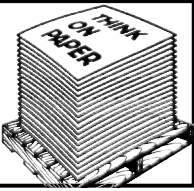

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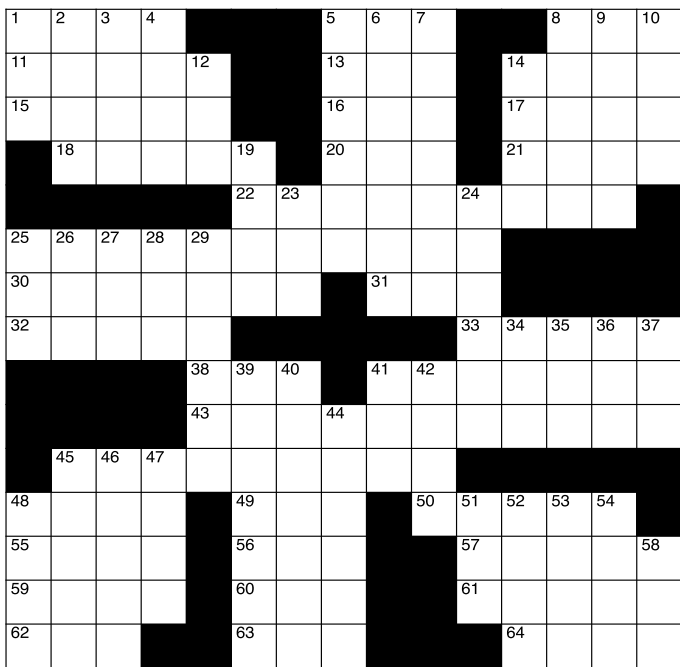

War Eagles Coast to Homecoming Win Over Bulldogs

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ATWOOD (September 20) — The West Carroll War Eagles celebrated Homecoming Friday with a 48-8 region win over Gleason. Earlier in the afternoon, the Homecoming Court was presented on the field, and senior Ashton Worrell was crowned Queen.

In the parking lot, several classes of West Carroll alumni held tailgate parties with food, fellowship, music and games. Participating were the classes of 1986, 1989, 1995, 1996, 2002, 2003 and 2004. Some current students also up their own tent in the lot for tailgate activities.

On the field, the War Eagles set the tone with touchdowns on their first two possessions. They

continued to dominate with four scores in the second quarter to lead 40-0 at the half. Gleason got on the board with a touchdown to start the second half, and West Carroll answered at the end of the third. A quick fourth quarter was scoreless as the Bulldogs controlled the ball until time expired.

West Carroll won the coin toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff.

War Eagle Cody Wildridge fielded the low kick and returned it to the West Carroll 35. A delay of game penalty before the first snap moved the ball back five yards. Quarterback Jeremiah Bryant threw across the backfield to Jack Barrow for a six-yard gain, then Jarrius Weatherford dragged a pile of Bulldog defenders for eight more. On third-and-one, Bryant kept and ran it into the end zone, but an illegal block in the back ne-

gated the touchdown and brought the ball back to the Gleason 30. Weatherford took it in on the next play, and Bryant kept for the two-point conversion to give the War Eagles a quick 8-0 lead.

The West Carroll defense forced a three-and-out on Gleason's first drive. Zach Perry led a host of War Eagle defenders to stop Bulldog Dawson Arnold for no gain on first down, then quarterback Kolton Crochet threw incomplete twice. Carson Tidwell's punt was downed at the West Carroll 38.

Xander Moon took over at quarterback for the War Eagles and threw to Bryant for a six-yard gain. Weatherford rushed for 13 to move the chains, then Moon connected with Jacob Blankenship for a 40-yard reception. Bulldog Mason Fuzzell made a diving tackle at the 3 to keep Blankenship from scoring. Moon handed off to

Bryant for a two-yard gain, then kept for the one-yard touchdown. Moon scrambled on the two-point attempt, but was chased down by Hagen Hodges. With six minutes to play in the opening frame, West Carroll led 14-0.

Bulldog Cody O'Callaghan fell on a low kick at the Gleason 44. Isaac Denton ran for two yards, then Crochet kept for four. Arnold gained three on third down, just short of the first-down marker. Gleason went for it on fourth-and-one, but the snap was high and Crochet was stopped for a loss.

The War Eagles took over near midfield, but a first-down penalty for holding doomed the drive to a three-and-out. Devin Rader's punt was downed at the Bulldog 44.

Gleason went three-and-out, but a good punt by Tidwell was downed at the West Carroll 25.

Weatherford started the drive

with a five-yard run, then gained 15 more to end the first frame. Bryant threw to Perry for 29 yards to start the second, then kept for 16. Rader was stopped for a loss by Bulldog Elijah Young, then Bryant kept for a 13-yard touchdown. Bryant missed the PAT, and the War Eagles led 20-0 early in the second quarter.

The Bulldogs started the ensuing drive at their own 46. Crochet kept for seven, then Austin Clark ran for just enough to move the chains. A penalty on the next play pushed the Bulldogs back into their own territory. Crochet completed a pass to Young, but his next pass was intercepted by Bryant and run back for a touchdown. Dakota Saunders missed the PAT, and West Carroll led 26-0 with eight minutes left before the half.

Gleason started near midfield with a run by Arnold, who was

stopped by War Eagle Jay Long for a short loss. Crochet fell on a fumble on second down, then threw to Young on third. The Bulldogs went for it on fourth-and-two, but the play resulted in a fumble recovered by Bryant at the Gleason 48.

Bryant scrambled on first down, but was dropped for a seven-yard loss by Young. Weatherford gained 12, then repeated for eight and a first down. Bryant tossed to Barrow for seven, then threw incomplete. On third down, Bryant kept for a touchdown, but it was called back on a holding penalty. He found the end zone again on the second try, and after a failed two-point try, West Carroll led 32-0 with 2:38 remaining in the half.

The Bulldogs started near mid-field again, but quickly turned the ball over on downs at the 50.

With just under a minute before intermission, Bryant threw to Perry for nine yards, threw incomplete, then kept for a 41-yard touchdown. He threw to Barrow for two points, and the lead was 40-0 with 26 seconds on the clock.

Gleason received the kick, but managed just one play before half-time.

The second-half kickoff sailed out of bounds, and the Bulldogs started at their own 35. A ten-play drive resulted in Gleason's lone touchdown. Denton ran twice for 21 total yards, then Clark gained three. Denton made a short gain, then Brady Witherspoon ran for six and a first down. Denton moved the chains again with an eleven-yard carry, then Witherspoon lost a yard. Denton gained three, but on third down, Crochet lost two on a keeper. On fourth-and-ten, he threw to Young for a 25-yard score. Crochet connected with Young again on the two-point conversion, and the deficit was cut to 40-8.

The War Eagles began the next drive on their own 33, with Moon at quarterback once again. Rader ran for 27 across midfield, then Moon kept for eight. Rader gained nine to move the chains again, then gained three. A penalty on the next play set West Carroll back, but Moon threw to Perry for 18. On third-and-two, Rader lost five yards, stopped by Crochet. Moon kept for 13 to convert the fourth down, then kept again for a seven-yard touchdown as the third quarter ended. Rader crossed the goal line for two points, and the War Eagles led 48-8.

A line-drive kickoff was fielded by Crochet, who was stopped at the Bulldog 10. Gleason kept the ball for the entire final frame as the clock ran, earning three first downs including a fourth-and-six conversion. The Bulldogs managed to get to the West Carroll 21 before time expired.

The War Eagles had 390 yards of total offense, 283 on the ground and 107 in the air.

Starting quarterback Jeremiah Bryant was four-of-seven passing for 51 yards. Xander Moon was under center for several drives and was three-of-three for 56 yards. Zach Perry led in receptions with three for 48 yards. Jacob Blankenship had one catch for 40 yards; Jack Barrow caught two for 13 yards; and Bryant was on the other end of one throw for six yards.

Bryant led the team in rushing with eight carries for 126 yards and three touchdowns. Jarrius Weatherford had eight touches for 93 yards with one touchdown. Moon rushed four times for 29 yards and a pair of touchdowns, and Devin Rader ran it five times for 35 yards.

Gleason had 224 yards of total offense, 176 on the ground and 48 in the air.
