

Lake Wheel Tax to be Addressed At County Commission Meeting

HUNTINGDON (October 7) — Cyril and Jan Ostiguy of Huntingdon, both retired private citizens, received approval Monday to address the full body of the Carroll County Commission on Monday, October 14 concerning the \$10 wheel tax to construct and develop the Carroll County 1000-Acre Recreational Lake. The Resolution Committee, consisting of Joel Washburn, Lori Nolen, Manuel Crossno and John Mann voted to allow the Ostiguy's to address the commission. Commissioner Larry Spencer was absent.

The lake, which was estimated to cost \$10 million, actually cost \$27,272,500 to date. That cost continues to expand as the lake's owner, Carroll County Watershed Authority, continues to add enhancements to the lake. Carroll County Watershed Authority members are appointed by the governor. Members include Chair-

man Tommy Surber, Secretary Dale Kelley, Bob Clark, Natalie Porter, Joseph Butler and Joe Smothers.

A referendum in November 2000 was approved by the voters by 5,441 to 4,851 to add the annual \$10 wheel tax for each registered motorized vehicle in the county. The referendum indicated the local taxpayers would pay 30 percent of the cost of construction and development. In January 2003, when the wheel tax started, Carroll County Commission approved a resolution indicating the county will collect the \$10 wheel tax to fund up to \$3,000,000, which was the estimated 30 percent of the lake's cost of construction and development. Since 2003, approximately \$4 million has been remitted by the county to the Carroll County Watershed Authority. The wheel tax is expected to continue until 2034.

Additionally, the county of Carroll transfers approximately \$50,000 in "growth funds"

annually as part of the growth in taxes from improvements to real estate in the lake region. That growth fund was approved by the County Commission via a resolution.

According to an audit filed with the Tennessee Comptroller's Office, for the year 2017-18, a total of \$246,902 was collected in wheel tax and another \$52,785 from the growth tax. The total revenue for the CCWA was \$430,326 and had net losses of \$347,566, which varies according to amounts of state grants and other expenses.

The town of Huntingdon holds the bonds on the lake and has guaranteed up to \$12,000,000 in the event the Watershed Authority is unable to make the payments on the indebtedness. Bonds are payable through 2055.

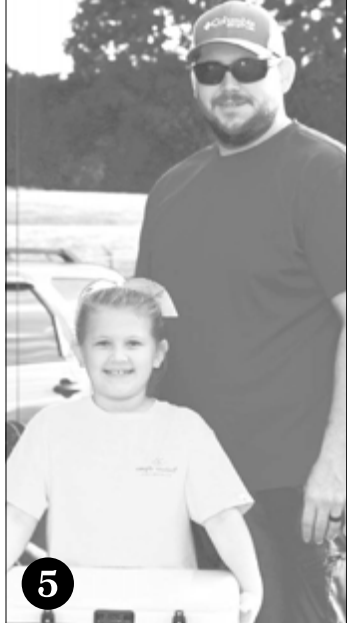

Jim Alexander (Part II) A Man for All Seasons

Throughout his career, Jim Alexander held a position on numerous boards and never sat idle. He served as a member of the McKenzie School Board, served as the Seventh District Director and later president of the Tennessee School Boards Association. He also represented the Southern Area States for the National School Board.

He was a member of the Board of Trustees of Lambuth College in Jackson, McKenzie Industrial Board, Carroll Coun-

ty United Way, City Planning Commission, Elks Club and the University of Tennessee Athletic Board. He served as president of the McKenzie Rotary Club, treasurer of the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, president of the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce, president of the Bethel College Alumni Association and director of McKenzie Banking Company.

He was a member of the VFW, the American Legion and served as Eighth District

Commander. He also served on the finance committee for the Tennessee American Legion for many years.

Jim was state chairman for the Heart Fund Drive as well as the regional vice-president of the Middle Tennessee Heart fund.

Alexander accepted the position as executive director of the Insurers of Tennessee, a trade association of about 550 independent insurance agencies across the state. He served in the position for seventeen years and then as director of Governmental Affairs for Insurers, retiring from the position on December 31, 1987.

He was president of the Tennessee Society of Association Executives and was active in the National Independent Insurance Agents of America. In 1982, he was named Insurer of the Year for the Tennessee Association. He established the Young Agent Group and created INSURPAC for the state.

He was an avid sports fan and was well known for unwavering support of the Tennessee Volunteers and the New York Yankees.

His devotion to home and family, his concern for the welfare of others and his desire for the betterment of all religious, education, patriotic, cultural and civic affairs caused Alexander to serve honorable and diligently for many years in the interest of the state he loved.

In 1992, a state resolution honored Alexander for 50 years of service to the State of Tennessee. State Senator Lou Patten personally presented the joint resolution to the former commissioner. The resolution, co-sponsored for the entire delegation of state senators, and passed by both houses commended Alexander for "providing unexcelled leadership in insurance legislation, charity, education and patriotism for the benefit of the great State of Tennessee."

The Tennessee General Assembly named the section of State Route 22 between Huntingdon and McKenzie in Alexander's honor.

During all his years working around the state, Alexander kept his home in McKenzie. He said, "McKenzie always has been, and I plan for it always to be my hometown."

After undergoing heart surgery and a continuing battle with congestive heart failure, Jim Alexander died February 2, 1992. He was laid to rest at Mount Olivet Cemetery in McKenzie.

Posthumously, Alexander became a charter member of the Musto Tennessee Insurance Hall of Fame at Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro. The award was accepted by Alexander's son.

Jim Alexander should have been considered a rock star for the McKenzie community. He never put himself or Nashville ahead the place head called

home. An American patriot, a dedicated father, a true McKenzian and guiding light for progress. We sure could use another Jim Alexander right about now.

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Jason Martin is a life-long resident of McKenzie. He graduated from McKenzie High School in 2000; earned a Bachelor of Science in History from Bethel College in 2004; a Masters in Education from Bethel University in 2009 and a Masters in History and Humanities from Fort Hays State University in 2011.

A childhood friend who listened to the jukebox with me, Red and Jack up at the City Café two eons and a light year ago wanted to know if the documentary got it "right" about the time Johnny Cash spent at Sun Records.

Cindy North, from Baltimore, Maryland—of all places—called to inform me she had watched all eight episodes from start to finish. She gave the address where she wanted me to send her Country Music Certificate...

I've got some sad news for Cindy; and maybe a few others also. It's not that easy!

If you want a Certified Document attesting, confirming and officially stamping you as a true country fan...you've got to do more than wear a tight pair of jeans, buy some gaudy boots and watch a PBS special.

You've got to take the country music quiz!

I CAN help you get started. There have been at least eight guys named, or called Hank, who have made significant contributions to the country music field. You've got to know them, their biggest hits and where they hailed from.

And to show you how much I'm pulling for you, I'll give you the two that are usually the most difficult to recall; Hank Penny (My Little Red Wagon) from Birmingham and Hank Garland

(Sugar Foot Rag) from Cowpens, South Carolina. You are on your own for the remaining six. If you grew up in Tennessee or Texas, you must give them in alphabetical order...

Which country music legend was born Muriel Deason?

Here's a multiple choice question. Carl Perkins' first guitar was made out of: (A) a cigar box, (B) hollowed out from a box elder tree trunk, (C) pieces of a Gene Autry model ordered from Sears and Roebuck his father found in a trash pile.

You've got to pick a favorite back-up band. There are hundreds to choose from: Gid Tanner and the Skillet Lickers; Sam and Kirk McGee and the Fruit Jar Drinkers; Ernest Tubbs and the Texas Troubadours; and my personal favorite, Hank Thompson and the Brazos Valley Boys.

You need to know the difference between a Martin D-28 and a Gibson Hummingbird.

It doesn't hurt that you know Hank Snow's hair didn't actually belong to him. You also must be able to name his number one hit and biggest selling country record of 1950.

You must love Loretta Lynn unconditionally.

You've got to appreciate the songwriting ability of Hank Cochran and Harland Howard as Patsy Cline sings "I Fall to Pieces". And you've got to understand Hank Jr. is spot on when he belts out, "I'm just carrying on an old Family Tradition".

You've got to know hillbilly from bluegrass, western swing from cowboy, honky-tonk from rockabilly and the difference in the Nashville and Bakersfield sounds.

Please don't ask if Kitty Wells is a place a cat goes to get water; or if Ferlin Husky was some type of Eskimo dog.

Be True

What is the purpose of an oath or a vow? “Men swear by one greater than themselves and with them an oath given as confirmation is an end of every dispute” (Hebrews 6:16).

God confirmed His promise to Abraham with an oath. “By Myself I have sworn,” declares the Lord, “I will greatly bless you” (Genesis 22:16 and 17). The New Testament verifies this. “When God made the promise to Abraham, since He could swear by no one greater, He swore by Himself” (Hebrews 6:13). God interposed “an oath” (Hebrews 6:17).

Frivolous oaths and vows do not confirm our words. I swear on a stack of Bibles. Does the strength of our word depend upon the number of Bibles in the stack? Cross my heart and hope to die. Will we be struck dead if we are not true?

Lawful vows imposed by proper authorities are stabilizing. They call us to truth and fidelity. They remind us to be true. “When you make a vow to the Lord your God, you shall not delay to pay it (Deuteronomy 23:21). Are you a husband or wife? Keep your marriage vows. Do you serve on a jury? Remember your oath. Are you a church pastor, attorney, or physician? Consider your professional vows. Are you an elected official? Think about your oath of office. Be true to your word.

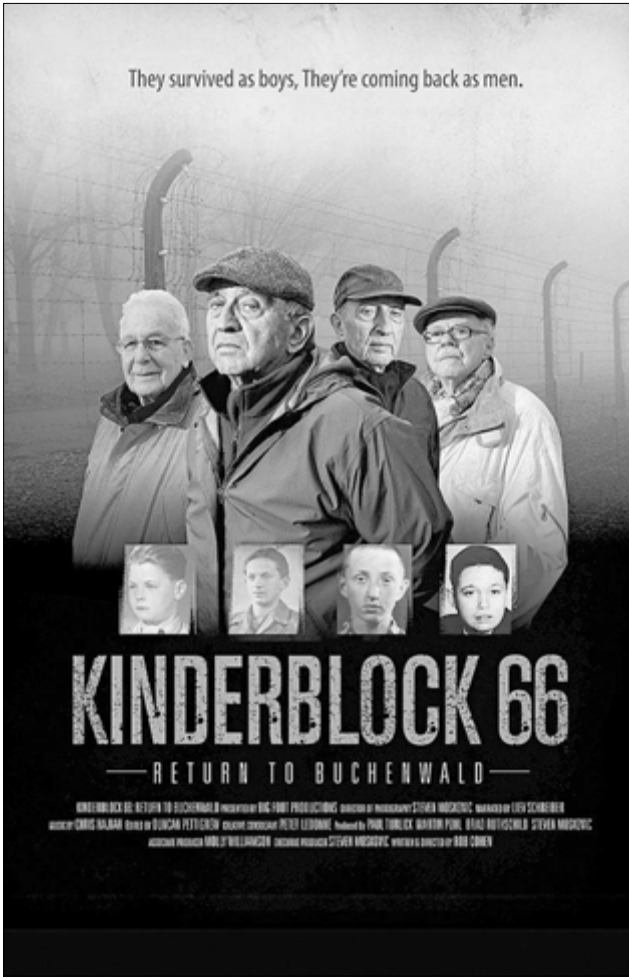
Laddie Lollar Symposium on Human Rights Features Documentary Film

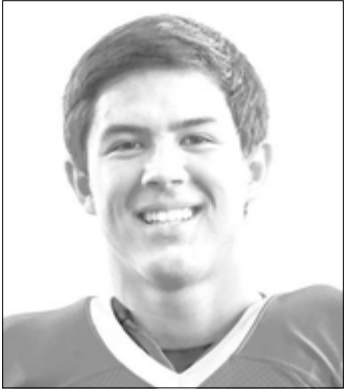

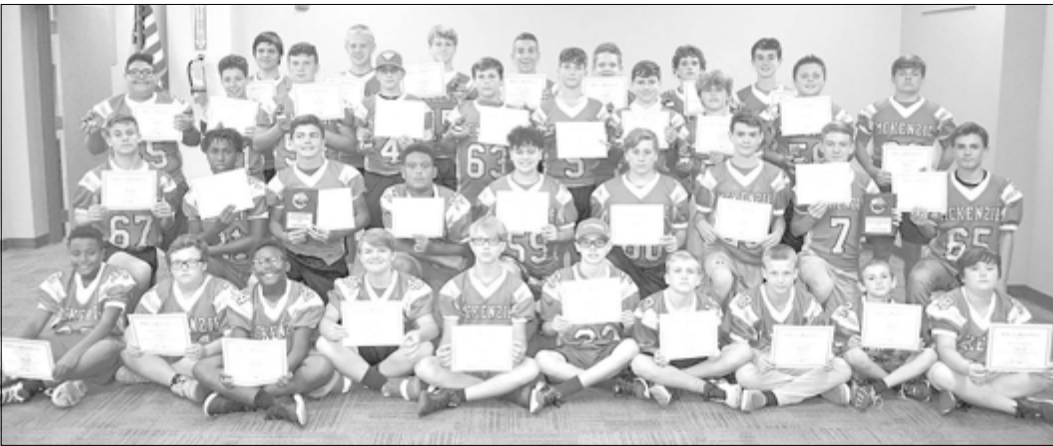
and scored on the first play of the fourth quarter on a 2-yard Micah Austin touchdown. The two-point conversion failed but McKenzie still took a 13-7 lead.

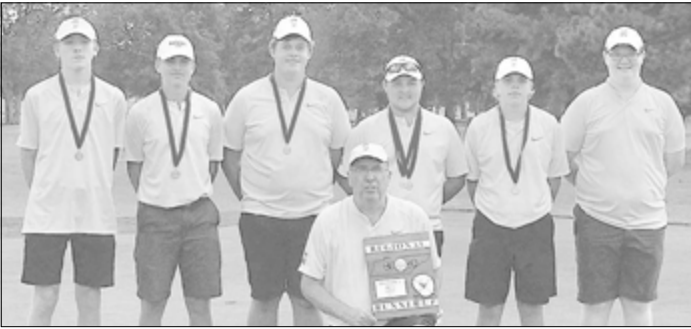
