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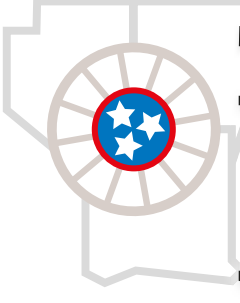

Emergency Dispatch Center Temporarily Goes Down to One Console

HUNTINGDON (October 22) — Carroll County Emergency Dispatch Center was temporarily operating on a single dispatch console and a single portable radio after a portion of the aged dispatch system malfunctioned. Fortunately, neighboring Madison County had a spare part to loan to Carroll County to temporarily get the second radio consoles fully operational. Kristy Meggs, 911 director, said the dated system is on “borrowed time.”

Sheriff Andy Dickson, chairman of the Carroll County Emergency 911 Communication District (911 Board) told his fellow members the antiquated system temporarily failed, leaving one fully operational dispatch position and a second dispatcher on a hand-held portable radio as a backup.

The sheriff said the dispatchers and their equipment were relocated to a new emergency dispatch center on the campus of the Sheriff’s Department approximately two years ago. Prior to the move, technicians warned the old system might not survive the move, but it did. Now, the system is on borrowed time leaving the county with the necessity to replace the entire system.

The 911 center dispatches for emergency services throughout the county. Backup dispatch centers at McKenzie and Huntingdon police departments also have consoles but not the full range of frequencies for every emergency department within the county. If needed, those two centers could only dispatch for a portion of the emergency services in the county.

“I told the mayor (Joseph Butler) that I’ve got to have a console.” said Dickson.

Two-month-old Willow Mae Pate awaits a heart transplant at Vanderbilt Hospital in Nashville.

Willow Mae Pate was born at Henry County Medical Center on August 20, 2019 to the proud parents Joel Pate and Amanda Tegethoff along with siblings Drake Pate, Sophie Pate, Olivia Pate, Jaden Pate and Gavin Hicks.

Joel Pate, a Carroll County Sheriff’s Department deputy assigned to the Federal Drug Enforcement

Carroll County Republicans to Caucus

Republican Party members meet Tuesday, October 29 to select delegates for a District 24 convention next month. The meeting is 7 p.m. in the conference room of the Huntingdon Police Department.

The meeting is in connection with the vacant 24th Judicial District Chancellor’s position, which covers Carroll, Henry, Benton, Decatur, and Hardin counties. Each county will hold meetings to select delegates and will meet November 23 for the district convention. The location and time were not announced at press time.

The chancellor position became open after Chancellor Carma McGee was appointed to the Tennessee Court of Appeals, Western

Section. Circuit judges Donald Parish and Creed McGinley are hearing many of the cases on the Chancery Court docket.

Delegates must be ‘bona fide’ Republicans who voted in three of the last four primary elections.

Each county’s number of delegates will be based on the number of votes cast in the last presidential election. One delegate is allowed per 100 votes cast in the 2016 election. Carroll County has 77 delegates going to the district convention.

According to Tom Aljancic, three persons announced their interest in the chancellor’s position at this time and more could announce prior to the district convention.

Brent Bradberry, of McKenzie, is a public defender in Weakley County and recently resigned as party chairman of Carroll County. Vicki Hoover, a Paris attorney, and Vance Dennis of Savannah, a 24th Judicial District assistant district attorney. Bradberry and Dennis were finalists for the appointment earlier this year when the third finalist, Jennifer King of Huntingdon was appointed chancellor by Governor Lee. King was appointed to fill the unexpired term of McGee until the 2020 elections. King resigned after the Republican party changed its method of selecting party nominees from a primary system to a caucus system. That occurred immediately after her appointment.

Palestine Church Vandalized, Arrests Pending

The Carroll County Sheriff’s Department received a call on Wednesday, October 16, that the Palestine Church on Highway 424 in Cedar Grove was vandalized. According to the report filed by Deputy Michael Seavarns, all of the storm windows of the church were broken including some metal frames. The lectern was thrown from the pulpit

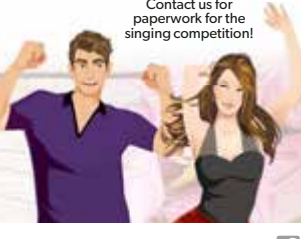

This past week, three separate events happened which honored the memory of Demetra Perkins.

Her family wishes to take this means of expressing our heartfelt appreciation to this community for their previous and continued expressions of love and appreciation for her life of service and faith.

FIRST, the local Rotary Club designated their "Polio Plus Campaign," the "Demetra Perkins Polio-Plus Campaign."

Rotary International has been working to eradicate polio for more than 30 years and they have, through inoculations worldwide, reduced polio cases by more than 99.9 percent.

The local Rotary Club, ever since the effort started, has conducted a yearly campaign and made substantial contributions to this effort to help continue world-wide immunizations and surveillance efforts. Thus far, Rotary has, with the combined efforts of the local club, helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries. The ultimate goal of ridding the world of this terrible disease is almost complete. The magnitude of this effort becomes apparent when realizing without this goal, 200,000 children per year would become paralyzed by this

potentially deadly infectious disease.

This designation recognized her as having polio, but honored her indomitability of spirit, her courage and her tenacity to meet the challenges of life with determination and optimism.

SECOND, for the past twenty-five years, Demetra both started and hosted the annual "Bethel Women's Basketball Dinner" to welcome the new team members as well as recognize the returning lady wildcats. The dinner was also designed to show the team that they were not only supported by the university but the entire community.

For the past few years, Dr. Tom Smith and Dr. Mark Smith helped sponsor this traditional meal.

At the dinner this past week, Coach Chris Nelson presented a very meaningful tribute to Demetra for her sponsorship since its inception, her love of the sport and her support of lady wildcat basketball, as well as other Bethel sports. She had, in fact, recently been named to the "Bethel Athletic Hall of Fame." Demetra always challenged the young women to enrich and cultivate their firm belief in God, themselves, their families and their teammates, as everyone joined together in great expectations for the upcoming season. She always congratulated the team for having earned a reputation

of sportsmanship, hard work, quality of life, personal achievement and for just being the kind of persons they were.

THIRD, The McKenzie Banner announced that at the "MHS Awards Day," they will be memorializing both Demetra Perkins and Lanier Mabry by special plaques given to an outstanding high school student with exemplary character who plans to pursue a career in education.

These awards will be presented annually to honor the outstanding teaching careers of these two beloved teachers who devoted their lives to teaching and positively impacting the lives of their students.

In addition to her love and caring for her students during her 34 years of teaching in elementary school, after retirement, Demetra taught at Bethel University and Union University and worked with their teachers.

Demetra was a strong woman of faith. Mary Sue Morrow joined her as being the first women elders ever elected in the McKenzie Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

At Easter last year, each church member was asked to write a letter to the church explaining their life of faith story. These letters were bound together as a booklet and distributed to the entire congregation. A copy of her letter is reprinted here. It is her testimony both as a child of God and a warrior of the faith.

Betsy
Demetra Perkins

"I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me."
Philippians 4:13

One of my most vivid memories as a young child was when I was following my father to the barn on our family farm, climbed the wooden fence on the way, fell, and broke my left arm.

Unfortunately, this was about the same time that I contracted polio, one of the most feared diseases of that time which was striking children all over the country in epidemic proportions.

As one of the first cases in Gibson County, the medical community didn't really know how to treat it.

I was taken to Memphis, placed in isolation, and found myself paralyzed from the neck down having no idea what the future would hold. I stayed in the hospital for a full year.

It was at that dark moment that I realized I could not face life alone. I

knew that God would have to walk with me every step, guide me, assure me, and give me the strength to face life unafraid.

My life changed when I fully accepted the biblical truth that, "I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me."

Eventually, my paralysis receded and only remained in my left arm. With the undergirding faith God provided, I then faced life as it presented itself.

I eventually played basketball, tennis, and golf, and led an active life. During my 34 years of teaching elementary school, one thing that never changed was the introduction each year of a very important member of the class - Betsy.

Betsy was there to teach every child about diversity, that one can still function well despite obvious differences.

"Betsy," I told them, was my polio souvenir. I explained the history of Betsy as a way to refer to my paralyzed left arm which became an educational tool to show the class that I didn't always do everything just the way they did, but I still did it. I challenged the class to understand they

could accomplish so much more than they thought they could if only they would expand their horizons.

After asking how many thought they would ever be able to tie their shoes with one hand and finding none who believed they could, I then showed them how and taught each class member how to do it. I explained that this gave them a life lesson that they could accomplish so much more than they ever thought they could.

My faith in God moved me from the depths of despair to the mountaintops of life.

I also learned, as my husband once told me, "Everyone has a Betsy, some seen and some not seen."

I find myself today with a rich, fulfilled life, due to the love, guidance, and strength given to me by my loving savior, Jesus Christ.

Local Bands Excel at State Competition

MURFREESBORO (October 26) — Carroll County was well-represented at the Division I Marching Band State Championship Saturday at Riverdale High School. Among the 24 participating bands were the McKenzie Marching Rebels, the Huntingdon Marching Mustangs, the West Carroll Marching War Eagles and the Hollow Rock-Bruceton Central Marching Tigers.

Watershed Authority Adopts Conflict of Interest Policy

HUNTINGDON (October 22) — Board members of the Carroll County Watershed Authority, the owners of the 1000-Acre Recreation Lake, approved a Conflict of Interest Policy during its Tuesday, October 22 meeting.

The action comes after auditors recommended the policy. It requires all board members to sign a policy indicating they will not have financial interest,

nor their families or associates in any matter related to the business of the lake.

Board Secretary Dale Kelley said the Authority had complied with standards of no conflict of interest even though there was no written policy.

In the coming months, the board will also consider a policy on mandatory attendance at the monthly board meeting. It is

to encourage attendance at the meetings.

In announcements, Chairman Tommy Surber said the Authority has implemented new internal controls over revenues and expenses to adequately segregate duties among the office staff as recommended by the Comptroller's office.

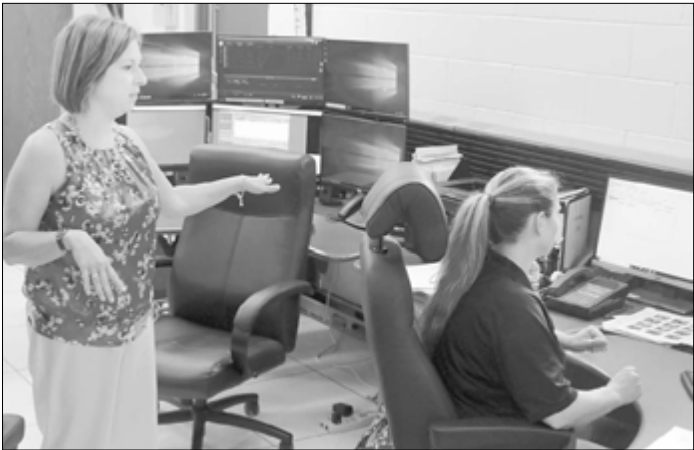
B&E Electronics presented bids for two configurations of equipment. The first bid was \$80,325 plus \$9,600 installation for a two-console basic system. The second bid was \$131,378 plus \$13,400 for three consoles with "all the bells and whistles."

After discussing the limitations of the smaller system, the board voted to gift the County of Carroll \$100,000 through an "impact payment" toward the purchase of the better system. Sheriff Andy Dickson said he would adjust his Drug Fund budget and other items in his department's budget to add \$50,000. The motion was made by Carroll County Fire Chief Terry Bradshaw and approved unanimously.

The county of Carroll will seek competitive bids for the equipment.

In other business, the board voted to lower the asking price for its former, vacant dispatch center located at 126 West Paris Street, Huntingdon. It was listed at \$186,000. The new asking price is \$145,000.

Kristy Meggs said the ongoing expenditures include in-



surance and utilities. Air conditioning was used to control humidity in the building.

Meggs said the Text to 911 system is ready and waiting for AT&T to implement the system in the county. It will allow a person to text 911 and a dispatcher to answer the call through a return text. The system will allow persons in the service area to text 911 to receive emergency assistance. It is especially useful persons unable to speak or in a situation in which making an audible 911 call might place them in additional danger.

Danny Brawner has requested to not be reappointed when his term of office expires next month. Max Anderson was

approved to be a cosigner on checks in Brawner's place.

The board approved to continue using a FirstNet cellular phone in the dispatch center. FirstNet is available to first responder personnel. The AT&T-based system allows first responders priority access to cell towers over other callers. Many times in a mass emergency situation, cell towers are quickly overloaded with cell traffic.

Sheriff Dickson said the bombing during the Boston Marathon proved a FirstNet-type system was needed. The cost of \$40 per phone. Dickson said his department's personnel are planning to switch to FirstNet instead of Verizon.

Administration, and Amanda have remained at the hospital since Willow's birth. Either has returned to work. Pate said he is using the 480 hours of sick time and 240 hours of vacation he had stockpiled. After that, neither he nor Amanda will have any income.

To donate directly to the family, one can contribute online to www.paypal.me/willowmaestrong. The funds are deposited into their bank account.

Joel and Amanda returned home just one evening last week to watch his daughter play middle school basketball in McKenzie and her son to play middle school basketball at Gleason. They left McKenzie after the girls' game to see her son play basketball in the boys' nightcap game at Gleason.

Pate said the community has provided a great outpouring of support for the family. A recent gospel singing and auction was a great benefit to the family. Friends of Joel Pate and associates of the Carroll County Sheriff's Department are also planning a fund-raiser for the family.

Joel and Amanda offered the following statement. "Our heartfelt thanks goes out to every single person that has been here for us during this journey, whether it be for Willow's care, support, prayers, monetary donations, visits, guidance or motivation. Also, we are truly humbled this donor heart treatment plan is an option but also extremely saddened by the circumstances that allow a donor for this treatment plan.

Willow's Journey

Willow was a full-term baby who weighed 6 lbs 10 oz and appeared to be a healthy baby girl. On August 22, 2019, Willow failed a pulse oximeter screening, which is an accepted test of a law established in 2013 that is required before discharge from the hospital, which showed that her complete body was not receiving enough oxygenated blood. The pediatric medical team at HCMC is partnered with TriStar Centennial Hospital of Nashville, it was determined Willow needed to be transferred to the Nashville Hospital for further evaluation. On August 22, 2019, Willow was transported by Tristar Centennial NICU ambulance from Paris to Nashville. Upon arrival there an echocardiogram was immediately conducted which revealed Willow had a rare congenital heart disease condition known as interrupted aortic arch and VSD. The aorta has three sections known as ascending, arch and descending. In Willow's condition, the ascending aorta was not connected to the descending aorta in the area between the two known as the arch. The diagnosis of VSD (ventricle septal defect) which is a hole between the lower ventricles of the heart was a more common diagnosis which often happens with other types of congenital heart disease. Willow had not shown any signs of this life-threatening defect

due to the PDA (patent ductus arteriosus) valve remaining open after birth and supplying blood flow to the descending aorta, which typically 24 hours after birth the PDA valve is no longer needed and will naturally close.

While they were conducting the echocardiogram at TriStar Centennial Willow's PDA valve closed which resulted in her losing blood supply to the lower part of her body. At that time Willow was placed on the ventilator and administered medicine which successfully reopened the PDA valve. All of this took place within only about one hour from arriving at Nashville. It was determined then that she would need to immediately be transferred to Monroe Carell Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt.

Once Willow arrived at Vanderbilt by the Vanderbilt NICU ambulance, she was placed under NICU care to become stabilized for open-heart surgery. On August 27, 2019, Willow was stable enough to have open heart surgery to repair and build the aortic arch to connect the ascending aorta to the descending aorta. Initially, the VSD and aorta surgery was a success but immediately turned critical when one of the sutures used in the newly built section of the aortic arch ruptured loose and caused complications. After 13 hours of surgery on that day, Willow was unable to regain enough heart function on her own to sustain her body so the surgical team decided that leaving her chest incision open and placing her on an ECMO life support machine along with the ventilator was the only option.

Willow was then moved to the Pediatric Cardiac Intensive Care Unit at Vanderbilt after surgery. Willow underwent another surgery on the following day because of more complications from the suture rupture. Willow remained on the ECMO support until September 2, which required yet another surgery to disconnect the machine from her heart. On September 6, Willow underwent another surgical procedure to close her chest incision.

Willow remained on the ven-

tilator support until September 10. From September 10 until September 17, Willow was able to sustain being off the ventilator support. On September 17, Willow had to be put back on the ventilator support due to a decrease in her heart function that was unable to be diagnosed with a specific cause. From that day until September 24, Willow continued to be in the PICU with no known diagnosis of the depressed heart function. A heart catheterization test was determined to be the last chance of finding a diagnosis, although a high risk of damage to the rebuilt aorta, it was performed. From the heart catheterization test and x-ray images it was determined Willow had a narrowing of the aorta at the aortic valve on the heart and calcium deposits in the left ventricle muscle.

On October 5, Willow underwent another open heart surgery to expand the narrowing of the aorta and attempt any procedure to help the lower ventricle muscle with calcium deposits. The aorta surgery was successful but it was confirmed the calcium deposits were inside the muscle tissue and nothing could be done to help that diagnosis.

From that surgery, it was determined the calcium deposits in the left ventricle muscle were from trauma during the first surgery and likely to be a contributing factor in the depressed heart function. On October 7, Willow underwent another surgery to close her chest incision from the October 5 surgery. Willow has remained on the ventilator support from September 17 until now while remaining in the Vanderbilt PICU.

Although all surgeries to date were necessary it was determined that only one treatment plan remained. On October 16, it was determined Willow was eligible for that treatment plan and she was placed on the waiting list for a donor heart transplant. At this time, it appears Willow will continue to remain in the Vanderbilt PICU for an unknown time while on the ventilator support.

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The Harris-Collier Family (Part II)

General John Williamson Harris, CSA

After going down the genealogy rabbit hole, I realized there was as slight omission to my research. During a lunch meeting, I discovered Dr. Harris Collier had more than the one child (Harris Fields) I had listed. There was a second child, Mary, born in 1922 to the Colliers. Mary went on to marry Kermit Holland. They had three children, Mary (Jill), Jack and Anne.

The three Holland children were raised on the same farm as their grandmother Ada Harris Collier. Mary C. Holland died in 1960.

I learned of another Harris descendant of recognition on Tuesday by the name of John Williamson Harris. He was the eldest child of Albert and Pernicia Gilbert Harris, making him Ada Collier's brother.

General Harris fought for the

Confederacy during the Civil War as part of Tyree Bell's 20th Cavalry Brigade which fell under the command of Nathan Bedford Forrest.

In 1938, the forty-eighth national United Confederate Veterans (UCV) reunion was held August 30-31, 1938 in Columbia South Carolina with the assistance of the American Legion and the United States Marine Band. The veterans elected General John W. Harris who had moved to Oklahoma City by this time, their Commander. The Convention ended with the grand parade—a march down Columbia, South Carolina's main street to the state capitol, which still bore the scars of shelling by General Sherman's Union army.

Digging as I do, I found an article from the now defunct The Press Scimitar that tells the tale of General Harris. I hope

you enjoy.

90-Year-Old Head of Confederate Vets, A Teetotaler, Will introduce Liquor Bill at Next Session of Legislature in Oklahoma

A 90-year-old teetotaler by choice, General John W. Harris, newly elected commander of the United Confederate Veterans, plans to introduce a local option liquor bill in the Oklahoma Legislature at its next session.

"We're drinking bad whiskey and drinking it illegally-feeling like we're stealing," General Harris declared yesterday. "We might as well drink good whiskey, drink it legally, and get for Oklahoma some of the whiskey revenue that's now going to Arkansas."

The general, guest of Mr. and Mrs. Ben C. Mathes, 1188 Minna, used the editorial "we," but he has no notion of partaking of strong drink, legally or illegally. "Drank so much as a young man that I'm preserved," he said humorously. "My stomach's copper-lined I do believe. But some years ago I decided I'd cut out drinking and I did-just like that!"-snapping his fingers.

Honored By UDC

Seven chapters of United Daughters of the Confederacy honored him with a reception at Hotel Gayoso yesterday. He "went home" to the Mathes residence to put on a white shirt for the event. Earlier in the day,

he saw the sights and visited (Memphis) The Press-Scimitar wearing a sporty blue plaid shirt and a polka-dot tie with his long-tailed, gold braided uniform and gold-banded felt hat.

The general was born at McKenzie, Tenn., and is proud of it. "Must you know how old I am?" he asked jokingly. "You see, I'm a widower! Born in '48 and this is '38. That makes me 90 years young."

General Harris farmed at McKenzie for some time after the war, then traveled for a Louisville wholesale firm before going to Oklahoma City, where he has oil interests and is commissioner of the state pension board. He works regularly from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. every day. His wife and three children died some years ago.

More Reunions? "Sure!"

"I want to do what I can for the veterans," he said. "Alfalfa Bill Murray cut the veterans' pensions in Oklahoma from \$40 to \$29 a month. I'm going to try to get it raised again. I'm also interested in making the next reunion a good reunion. Where it will be ought to be settled in the next two weeks. I favor Trinidad, Col. No more reunions? They've been saying that for the last 20 years--and we're going to have them as long as any of us is able to go."

The general had "an elegant time" at the joint reunion of

Confederate and Union soldiers at Gettysburg.

"We joshed one another," he relates. "I told those Yanks, 'There're 1500 of you and only 500 of us. We'll get in a bunch and forgive you all at one time. According to numbers present, we have to do three times as much forgiving as you.'"

The general gets winded when he gives the rebel yell, but he obliged with the Indian yell he and fellow soldiers used mostly. With friends, he visited Reelfoot yesterday, driving from McKenzie in two hours. The trip in war times took two days!

With Forrest

An orderly for Colonel Greer in Buford's Division under Forrest's command, General Harris carried hundreds of dispatches for General Forrest as well as his colonel. He lost one, but he was supposed to. It was a rise to throw off pursuing Union soldiers with misinformation.

"General Forrest was the greatest cavalry leader in the history of all wars because he didn't fight according to rules," he said. "He didn't have a military education and he made up his own rules as he went along. He fooled the enemy all the time. He didn't ask his men to go where he wouldn't go-he always led."

General Harris had a good horse and was a hard rider, frequently making 40 miles

overnight. He weighed only 96 pounds and today only weighs 116, but is 5 feet 10 1-2 inches tall.

"The war lasted as long as it did because our mothers, wives and sweethearts stayed home and encouraged us and we fought as long as we could get anything to eat," General Harris said. "I never drew a cent from the Confederacy--was never given a thing except a plug of tobacco and I didn't chew, so I gave it to some of the boys who did."

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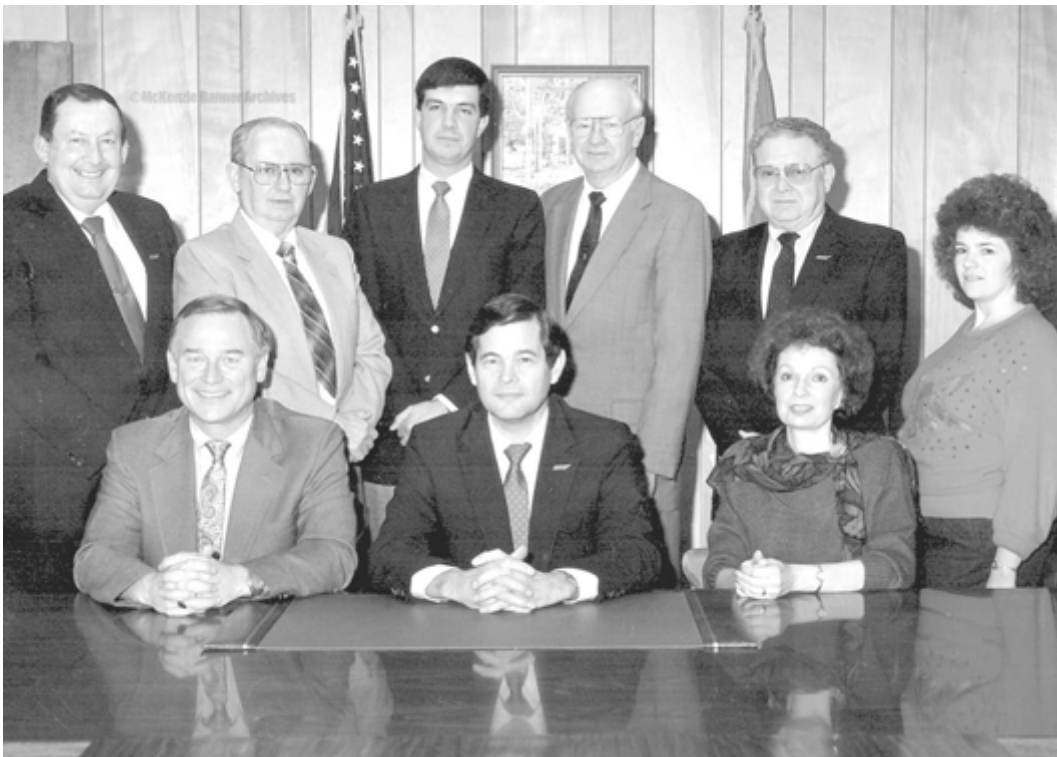

The Service of Angels

Angels are messengers with a clear job description. They are "ministering spirits, sent out to render service for the sake of those who will inherit salvation" (Hebrews 1:14).

The devil tried to tempt Jesus with the ministry of angels. He took Jesus to the pinnacle of the temple, told Him to jump, and quoted from Psalm 91. "If You are the Son of God, throw Yourself down; for it is written, 'He will com-

mand His angels concerning You'; and 'On their hands they will bear You up, so that You will not strike Your foot against a stone'" (Matthew 4:6).

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Equine Case of EEE Confirmed

NASHVILLE — A horse in West Tennessee has tested positive for eastern equine encephalitis (EEE), a virus that can be fatal for horses and humans. The Tennessee departments of Agriculture and Health (TDA and TDH) are advising citizens to take precautions to protect themselves and their livestock.

The horse in Gibson County showed signs of illness. Testing confirmed it was suffering from EEE, and the horse was euthanized.

Mosquitoes transmit EEE. An infected horse cannot directly transmit the virus to other horses or humans through contact. However, mosquito-borne diseases do pose a public health risk. Tennessee had the first documented human case of EEE in a resident of Hamilton County earlier this summer. This recent equine case serves as a reminder that mosquito season is not over yet.

“Mosquitoes may remain active across Tennessee until tem-

peratures fall below freezing,” said Tennessee Department of Health Deputy State Epidemiologist John Dunn, D.V.M., PhD. “The best ways for people to protect themselves from mosquito bites are to wear insect repellent, wear long sleeves and long pants, drain standing water around homes and businesses, and avoid peak times when mosquitoes bite at dusk and dawn.”

Although there is no vaccine for humans, the EEE vaccine for equines is particularly effective to prevent infection in horses. Every horse owner should speak with their veterinarian to develop an appropriate vaccination plan.

“EEE is a devastating illness, with up to 95 percent mortality in infected horses,” State Veterinarian Dr. Samantha Beaty, D.V.M. said. “While you may not be able to completely prevent mosquito bites on your horses, appropriate vaccines are vital to safeguarding their health and

protecting them from EEE and other insect-borne diseases.”

Livestock owners should always monitor their animals and contact a veterinarian if an animal appears sick. Equine symptoms of EEE may include lethargy, weakness, loss of appetite, fever, and/or colic.

To minimize risk of insect bites around your farm, use insect repellent for livestock and eliminate sources of standing water where insects congregate and breed.

TDA and TDA work closely together to help protect the health of animals and people as part of the Tennessee One Health Committee. One Health seeks to improve communication and encourage collaboration among veterinarians, physicians, environmental scientists, public health professionals, and others to find solutions to shared challenges such as emerging infectious diseases, antibiotic resistance, and emergency preparedness.

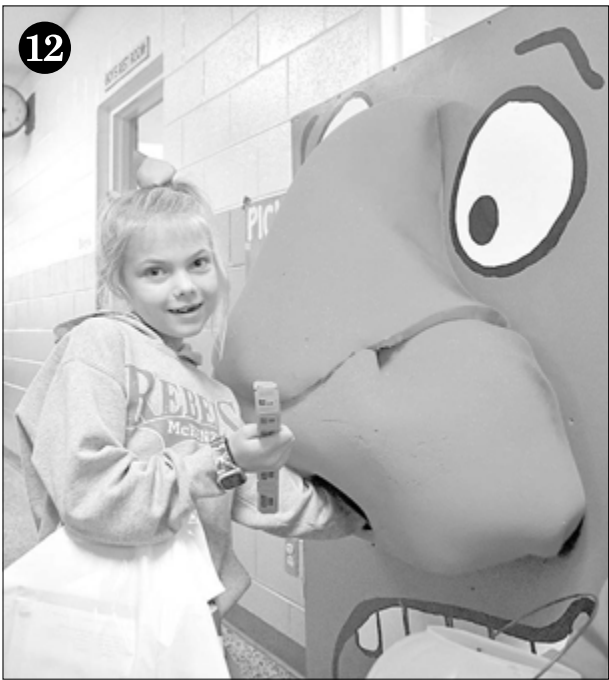

West Carroll War Eagles Win Nail-Biter at South Fulton

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SOUTH FULTON (October 25) — The West Carroll War Eagles traveled Friday to face the South Fulton Red Devils in a key region game as the regular season nears its end. The War Eagles trailed at the half, but pulled ahead by two scores in the third quarter. South Fulton mounted a rally in the fourth, cutting the deficit to four points in the final seconds and pulling off an onside-kick recovery. The Red Devils failed to score on a Hail Mary play as time expired, and West Carroll claimed a 34-30 road win.

South Fulton won the toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff. An eleven-play drive culminated in a one-yard touchdown run by Red Devil Greg Davis. Davis converted for two points, and South Fulton had an 8-0 lead half-way through the opening frame.

A short kick by the Red Devils started the War Eagles at their own 46. Quarterback Jeremiah Bryant kept for two yards, then jetted for a 52-yard touchdown. He ran it in for two points, and the game was knotted at 8-8.

South Fulton put together a promising possession, advancing to the West Carroll 33, but penalties on the last play of the first quarter and the first play of the second doomed the drive. The Red Devil punt was downed at the 13.

Starting deep, the War Eagles couldn't get anything going and went three-and-out. Their punt was downed at the West Carroll 37, giving South Fulton a short field.

The Red Devils ran three times to get to the 14, then a penalty moved the ball back to the 26. Three plays later, it was fourth-and-14, but quarterback Bryce McFarland threw to Dalton Gray

for a 19-yard touchdown. Gray ran for two, and South Fulton regained the lead, 16-8, with three and a half minutes to play in the half.

The War Eagles earned one first down before stalling out and punting. The Red Devils managed just one play before intermission.

West Carroll received the second-half kickoff, and Bryant kept the first snap for a 63-yard touchdown. Jarrius Weatherford was stopped short on the two-point attempt, and the War Eagles still trailed 16-14.

South Fulton earned a first down on the ensuing drive, but two penalties halted the progress. Facing fourth-and-seven at the West Carroll 37, McFarland's throw was broken up and nearly picked off by Bryant.

Taking over, Bryant ran for back-to-back first downs, then Weatherford ran for five. Bryant followed with a 15-yard touchdown. The two-point try failed, but the War Eagles had their first lead of the game, 20-16, with just under five minutes remaining in the third.

The Red Devils again earned one first down before turning the ball over on downs.

West Carroll immediately took advantage as Bryant kept the first snap for a 56-yard touchdown. He kept again for two points, and the lead was up to 28-16 with a minute to go in the third.

Davis earned a pair of first downs on three carries to finish the quarter, then moved the chains again to start the final frame. Nearly half of the clock ran off as Davis had all but one touch in an eleven-play scoring drive. Gray was stopped short on the two-point conversion, but South Fulton had cut the deficit to 28-22.

The War Eagles began the ensuing drive at their own 20. Bry-

ant gained 12 for a first down, but a penalty on the next play negated a gain by Weatherford. Bryant kept for a short gain, then repeated for 39 yards. Weatherford made a short gain, then Bryant ran for six. On third-and-two at the 15, Bryant kept for 13 and a first-and-goal. Two plays later, he punched it in. The two-point try failed, but West Carroll's lead was 34-22 with just over two minutes left in the contest.

Starting at the far 32 with time running short, South Fulton was forced to rely on the passing game to manage the clock. McFarland threw for a pair of first downs before three straight passes fell incomplete. A fourth-down throw earned just enough to move the chains. The QB tossed to Davis for eight, then missed on back-to-back attempts. The Red Devils had to risk a running play on fourth-and-two with 30 seconds left and no timeouts. Davis plowed forward for seven down to the 4, where McFarland quickly spiked the ball to stop the clock at 22 seconds. After on incomplete pass, he found Eli Carlisle for the score. Davis punched it in for two points, and the deficit was cut to 34-30 with six seconds to play.

South Fulton recovered the do-or-die onside kick, and had the ball near midfield with 3.9 seconds on the clock. McFarland heaved a Hail Mary, but it fell incomplete as the clock read all zeros.

War Eagle Jeremiah Bryant had 19 carries for 333 yards and five touchdowns. Cody Wildridge led the West Carroll defense with 15 total tackles.

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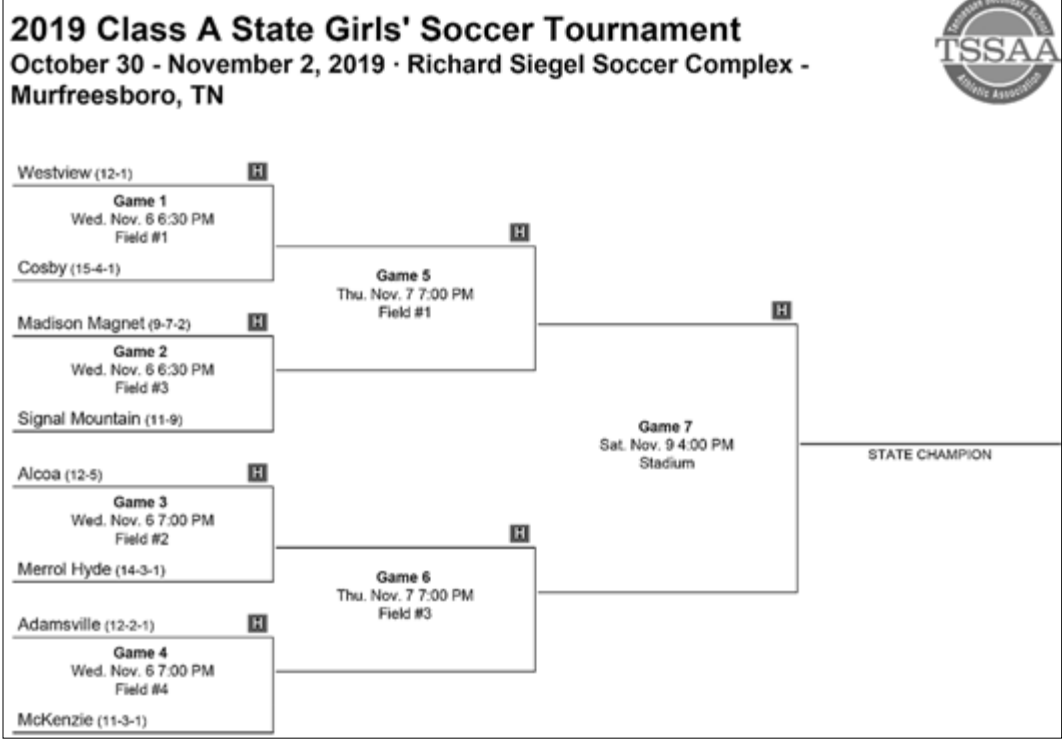

Ensley began the drive with a deep throw to Lawton in the end zone, but a Tiger defender grabbed Lawton as he went for the catch, resulting in a flag for pass interference. Malek Cannon ran for a 28-yard touchdown on the next play, but it was called back for a hold. Cannon repeated from five yards deeper, scoring on the same route. Edwards' PAT upped the score to 28-0 with 3:42 left in the first.

Another touchback by Edwards was followed by back-to-back sacks by McLemore, then a sack by Kee in the end zone for a safety. With 2:16 on the clock, the Mustangs

led 30-0.

Middleton kicked off from the 20, and Lawton returned it about 65 yards for a touchdown, but again the score was negated by a Huntingdon penalty. Ensley kept the first snap for a 42-yard touchdown. Edwards made it 37-0 with just under two minutes remaining in the first.

The Tigers went three-and-out again as the quarter ended and punted to start the second. Lawton returned it about 30 yards to the end zone, but a penalty negated another Mustang score.

Ensley kept on first down to take it from the 25 to the 6, then Pearson ran it in. Edwards kicked, and Huntingdon led 44-0 two minutes into the second frame.

Middleton had a decent kickoff return negated by a penalty and went three-and-out. A poor punt went out of bounds at the 15, and Mustang Aden Hutcherson scored from there on the first snap. After the kick, the score was 51-0 with five and a half minutes until intermission.
