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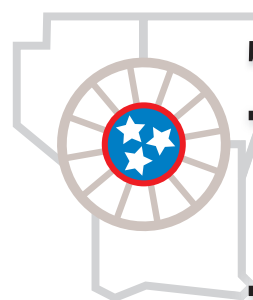

Following the December stabbing death of Summers family relation, Clayton Beathard, the Beathards are making news again. Brother, C.J. Beathard, in his third year with San Francisco 49ers, will play in Super Bowl LIV against the Kansas City Chiefs this Sunday.

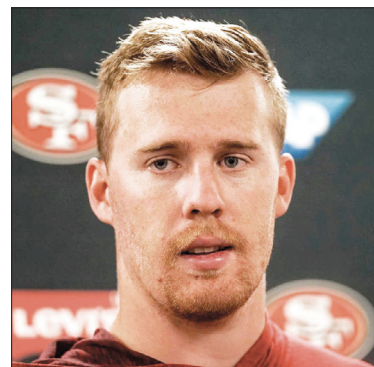
Susan Williams Beathard, C.J.'s mother is a native of McKenzie. Beathard's maternal grandparents are Cindy Summers and the late Jerry Connell of Dresden. Summers, a retired professor, still resides in McKenzie as does his great-uncle Joel Summers.

Beathard was selected in the third round of

the 2017 NFL draft by the San Francisco 49ers. As the 104 overall pick in the draft, the 6'2" quarterback was a speculative sixth or seventh-round pick. 49ers Head Coach Kyle Shanahan traded up for the Iowa QB.

Beathard always had football in his blood. One of his early Christmas gifts growing up was a football used in a Super Bowl. The ball, a gift from his grandfather, Bobby Beathard, former NFL general manager, was from the 1994

## McKenzie Police Make Arrest After High-Speed Chase

McKENZIE — A Jackson man was charged with multiple offenses January 19 after Officer Chance Townes attempted a traffic stop on a black Ford Mustang for not coming to a complete stop at a stop sign. The vehicle took off at speeds in excess of 100 mph down University Drive.

According to the report filed by Townes,

the Mustang blew a tire hitting a curb and traveled down Hwy 140 and finally wrecked on Ben Smith Road in Henry County. The driver, identified as Steven Miller of Jackson, ran off into the woods and was later located by Townes and two county deputies. Miller was found with a bag containing needles, a glass pipe, and small plastic bags. The car

was reported stolen out of Henry County.

Officers searched the vehicle and found the items which led to the charges.

Miller was charged with Theft of Property \$10,000 - \$60,000, Reckless Endangerment, Felony Evading Arrest, Unlawful Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and was also cited for Driving On Suspended License.

## McKenzie Officials Issue Concern Over Police Communications

HUNTINGDON (January 21) — McKenzie police and fire departments continue to experience difficulties with two-way radio communications on the county's radio network. Mayor Jill Holland and Police Chief Craig Moates addressed the monthly meeting of the Carroll County Emergency Communications District (911 Board) asking for financial assistance to alleviate the problem.

For months, the city has experienced problems with communications between the officers in the field and dispatch.

Chief Moates and Mayor Holland in-

icated it is a matter of safety of the officers and general public when radio communication is not reliable. When an officer is on the scene of a disturbance or has made a traffic stop and radios a request for assistance, that request might not be broadcast on the new digital radios. Because the elevated radio tower is located in the Hico community, past Carroll Lake in a low-lying area, the signal does not reach the entirety of the city of McKenzie, especially the McKenzie Elementary School area and the northern area of McKenzie. It also does not have redundant power in case

MARTIN — For the seventh consecutive year, UT Martin is represented at America's biggest sporting event, Super Bowl LIV (that's Super Bowl 54 for those of you not good with Roman numerals).

Dr. Dexter Davis, associate professor of sport business, will take 11 students this year, including three international student-athletes and two graduate students, to work hospitality at the big game and gain the kind of hands-on, real-world experience that can be found nowhere else.

The group also worked the 2020 Pro Bowl at Camping World Stadium in Orlando, Florida, on Jan. 25 before returning to Miami to work the Super Bowl Experience, Super Bowl LIVE and associated media events leading up to the big game.

Davis and his students will also attend the University of Miami's Sport Industry Conference on Jan. 30, a unique opportunity for them to hear presentations on a variety of industry issues and network with students, faculty and professionals from schools

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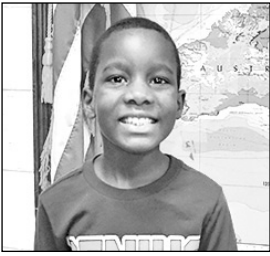

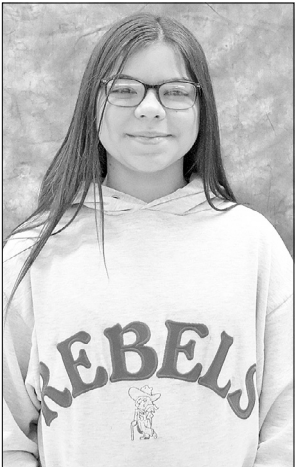

of an electrical outage. Mayor Holland noted the county of Carroll purchased the digital radios and gifted those to the city for the police and fire departments. McKenzie was the last city in the county to receive the radios free of charge from the county. The Carroll County Emergency Communications District provided the funding to the county for the entirely new digital radio network, which replaced an aging analog system. Every local law enforcement agency and fire department in the county received new radios. The county installed new transmitting equipment at tower sites and will soon install a new tower in south Carroll to better serve Clarksburg, Westport and Yuma. Originally with the roll out of

the digital network, the transmission antenna serving the McKenzie area was to be located on the elevated water tower behind city hall. However, construction crews were performing rehabilitation of the elevated tank, including sandblasting and painting of the exterior. All antennas were temporarily removed during the rehabilitation work. During that time, the county's antenna was installed in Hico instead of in McKenzie. The Hico antenna serves as an important function for the county for that geographic region, but does not adequately serve McKenzie. Chief Moates said a new antenna platform was installed on the water tank during the rehabilitation work. That platform is for the county and city network and will serve both the city and county units. Additionally, a new transmitter will have backup power service from the city's generators.

Max Anderson asked if the city's digital radios were updated to the newest firmware since the county deputies radios will work in location in McKenzie where the MPD's will not. Moates said the firmware was updated, however, it is a different software version than the county's because the McKenzie radios are newer. Moates provided Anderson with a list of locations of "dropped" communications for additional testing. If any funding is appropriated, it will come from the County of Carroll. In the past, the 911 Board has provided financial resources to upgrade local governments' communication systems by gifting the money to the county. In other business, the board honored Danny Brawner for 16 years of volunteer service on the board. He was presented a gift to commemorate his service by Chairman Andy Dickson.

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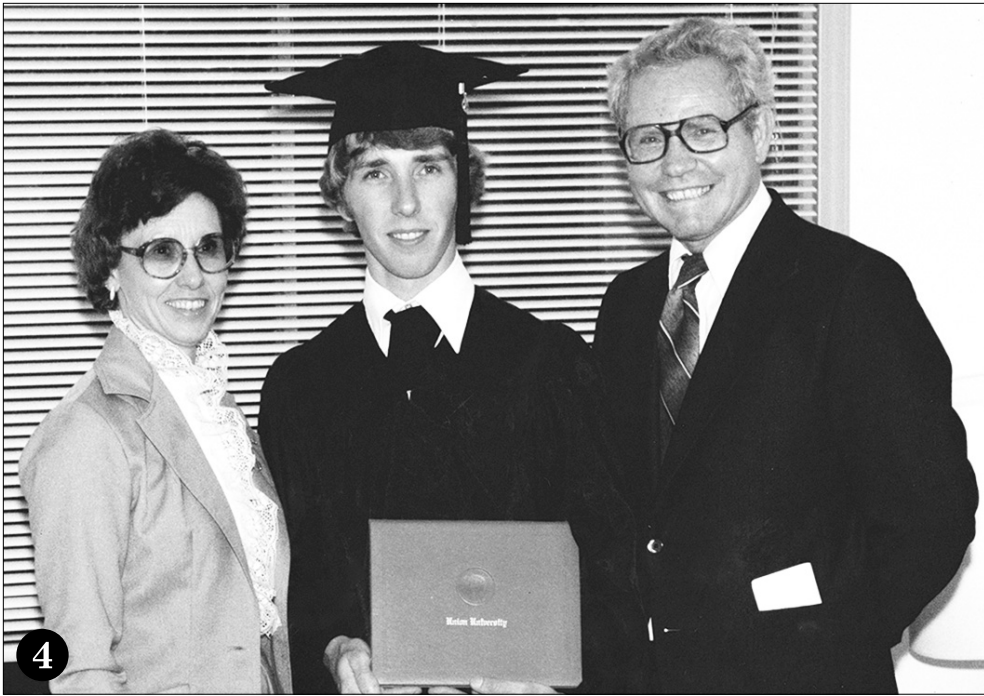
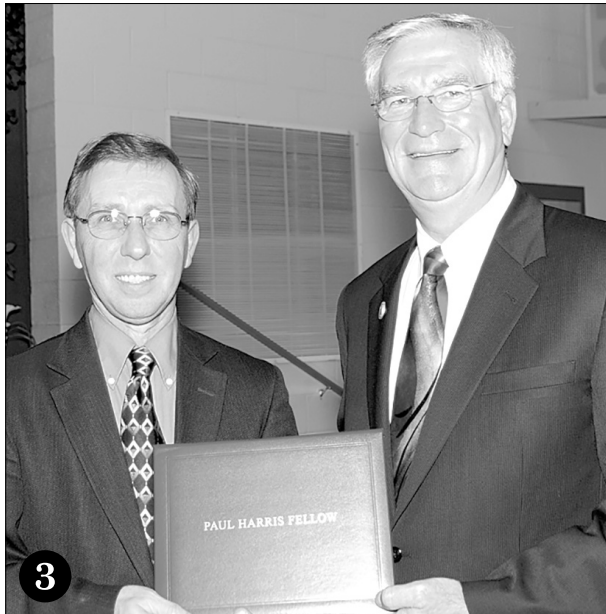

The Washburns (Part III)  
Joel Trent Washburn

The Washburn family legacy started in 1948 when James L. Washburn returned home from his military service in Japan and took employment under J. Frank Barlow. The second generation of newspaper publishing Washburns brings the story to James and Ramona's second son Joel Trent Washburn.

Joel was born January 26, 1957, in Dr. Edwards' office across the street from the Banner office. He often jokes about being born across the street, "I was born in the back of a service station across the street and made it this far."

His career at The McKenzie

Banner began in the 1960s where he swept the floors once a week. From there, he was promoted to a bicycle paper route and selling copies of the paper at the pajama factory. Eventually, he would do odd jobs around the print shop that included running the hand-fed letterpress (now located in front of the office and used as a mailbox).

While attending McKenzie High School, Joel made pictures of school events with his Mamiya camera. He carried the camera to school every day so the paper didn't have to send anyone.

His responsibilities included covering basketball games. His girlfriend at the time, Teresa Brawner, would sit in the stands

watching her future husband take photos.

He was not only the school photographer; he was a member of the marching band, student council officer, and represented McKenzie High School in 1974 at the American Legion Boy's State.

Joel graduated from McKenzie in 1975 and continued his education at Union University in Jackson. Before arriving on the Union campus, in June of 1975, he was a Congressional Page in the U.S. Capitol for Congressman Ed Jones.

While still attending Union, he began working at The Moore Studio under Mitch Carter. Everyone in West Tennessee knew Mitch and with his new "partner in crime", soon everyone knew Joel Washburn. While with The Moore Studio, Joel was a general photographer serving as year-book photographers for 21 West Tennessee high schools and the pageant photographers for the Miss Tennessee Pageant in 1977 and 1978.

In 1979 Joel graduated from Union University with a degree in business administration with a double minor in journalism and computer science. Following graduation, he was pursued by

his father, James, to join him at The McKenzie Banner. He was responsible for advertising, news writing, and photography. With a steady job, Joel married his high school sweetheart on April 18, 1981.

In 1982, James began treatment for his brain tumor. Joel was promoted to managing editor of The McKenzie Banner, managing the papers day-to-day responsibilities. The same year, the elder Washburn transferred a few shares Tri-County Publishing, Inc. (TCP) to the two sons, Jeff and Joel.

In February 1985, with the death of his father, Joel took on more responsibilities with TCP. It was his responsibility to continue paying his father's banknote following buy-out of co-owner Karl Barlow, and continue the integrity of the McKenzie publication. The same year, the Washburn family grew with the birth of Joel and Teresa's daughter Brittany.

Throughout his life in McKenzie, Joel has worn many hats. These include president of the Tennessee Press Association (2014), adjunct professor of Bethel University - teaching business and photography, vice-chairman of the McKenzie Industrial Board, original stockholder of Briarwood

Inn now the Best Western-McKenzie, original stockholder Internet Services of West Tenn (the service that brought Internet to Carroll County; now Earthlink), founding member of the Board of Carl Perkins Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse — Carroll County, founding member of the Board of United Way of Carroll County. He has served as chairman of the Chamber of Commerce when the new headquarters was constructed, a trustee of Union University, an EMT, a volunteer firefighter, a graduate of WestStar Leadership (class of 1991), first chairman of Youth Leadership Carroll County.

As a civic leader in McKenzie, he was a member of the McKenzie Lions Club and served as president of that organization in 1983-84. Currently, he is the president of the McKenzie Rotary Club serving since July of 2019. Joel is the second generation of four to be named Paul Harris Fellows by the McKenzie Rotary Club; this includes James and Ramona Washburn, Teresa Washburn, Jason and Brittany Martin, and Charles "CJ" Martin.

In April 2015, Ramona sold her shares of Tri-County Publishing to her sons, Joel and Jeff. Joel took over the position of pub-

lisher of The McKenzie Banner and Dresden Enterprise. Four years later, in September 2019, Joel became the sole owner of Tri-County Publishing, Inc.

The legacy of the Washburns at The McKenzie Banner still grows. Next week, I will conclude the Washburn story with a third and fourth generation of Washburns to work and grow up in the newspaper industry.

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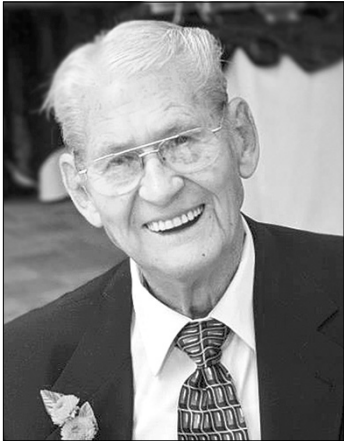

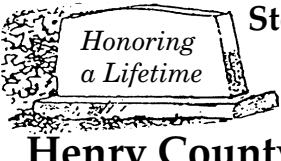

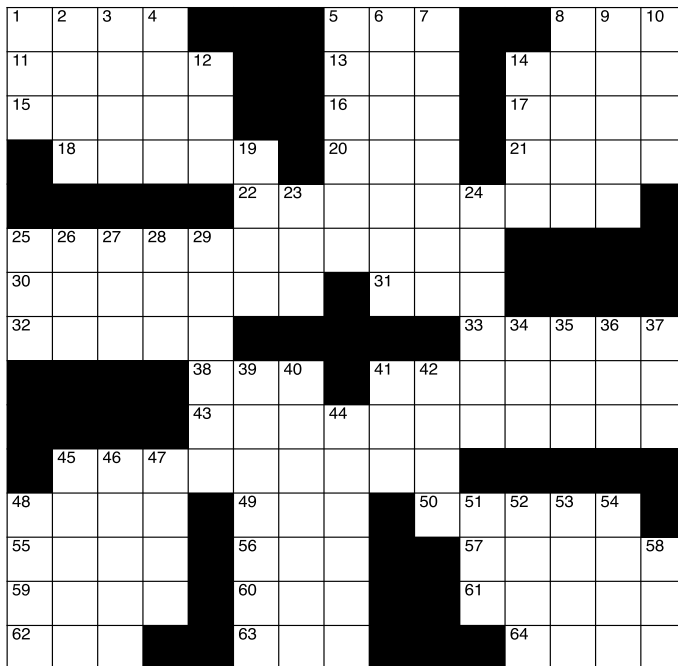

Carroll County Sheriff's Reports

**Multiple Charges** — Stephen Ray Milton, 22, of 2958 Cotton Creek Road, Bruceton, was charged with two counts of domestic assault, aggravated assault, aggravated criminal trespass, and vandalism following a January 24 incident in Bruceton.

According to the report by Deputy Steven Scott, Milton kicked in the front door of a residence at 102 Enterprise Street and threatened his mother, Christina Milton, and his girlfriend, Jessica Hutchinson, with a knife. # Bethel Dynasty Grows With Victory At Bassmaster College Series Event

MANY, LA. — Cody Huff and Dakota Pierce finished what they started and clinched a wire-to-wire victory on Saturday in the Carhartt Bassmaster College Series at Toledo Bend presented by Bass Pro Shops.

The duo from Tennessee's Bethel University bagged another five-bass limit, weighing a tournament-high 20 pounds, 15 ounces. That gave them a three-day total of 60-7 and sealed a convincing victory at this famed 185,000-acre reservoir on the Louisiana/Texas border.

Huff and Pierce earned more than \$3,000 for the Bethel bass fishing team with the win. They also earned a spot in the College Series National Championship, which is scheduled for later this year at a date and location to be determined.

"This is awesome," Pierce said, still clutching his tournament title trophy. "We went out there and worked our butts off all week to do it. It wasn't easy." They made it look easy, though, after grabbing the lead with a 19-11 limit on Thursday and following with a 19-13 bag a day later. That gave them nearly a 4-pound cushion over the 11 other teams that survived Friday's cut. Their final margin of victory was an impressive 6-7.

There were no giants among the 15 bass Huff and Pierce weighed this week. Instead, they relied on a steady stream of 3 1/2- to 4 1/2-pound largemouth. "We'll take those" any day of the week, any week of the year," Huff said.

The Bethel duo targeted larg-

er ditches and channel swings where baitfish were concentrated all week. Their best bites came during the afternoons in 20 to 60 feet of water.

"We caught them on jigging spoons," Pierce said. "There wasn't much to it, we just had to get it down there quick. Those fish are always moving and following shad. All we had to do was get it in front of their face."

The win continues a tremendous run for Huff, who now has led on six consecutive days in Bassmaster tournaments. He previously won all three of his matches in the Bassmaster College Series Classic Bracket event on Tennessee's Watts Bar Lake last August, and that qualified him for the 2020 Academy Sports + Outdoors Bassmaster Classic presented by Huk which will take place March 6-8 on Alabama's Lake Guntersville.

Huff said it wasn't difficult to maintain focus at Toledo Bend, despite the fact he'll compete in the biggest bass tournament in the world in six weeks.

"Everything's just one week at a time right now," he said. "I'm just going fishing and enjoying the year while it's here."

Huff and Pierce are both 22-year-old seniors, and they grew up together in Ava, Mo., which is five hours from McKenzie, Tenn., where Bethel is located. They credited the program's culture of success and said they've become better anglers since enrolling at the school.

"It's cool to be around a bunch of guys who know what they're doing," Pierce said.

Brett Clark and Cody Ross of East Texas Baptist placed second

with 54-0, and the Kent State duo of Tanner Ward and Rory Franks were third with 53-12.

In all, 248 teams from 26 states entered the tournament, and the Top 12 tandems split a total purse of \$10,625 for their school fishing teams. The top 25 pairs in the standings advanced to nationals.

Stevie Mills and Baylor Howell of Bethel won the \$500 Carhartt Big Bass Award for the 7-8 largemouth they caught on Thursday. Huff and Pierce won the Bass Pro Shops/Nitro Boats Big Bag Award and the \$250 in merchandise that goes with it for having the biggest bag of the tournament (the 20-15 limit on Saturday.)

The Mossy Oak Fishing Bassmaster High School Series at Toledo Bend presented by Academy Sports + Outdoors is Sunday, as will the Mossy Oak Fishing Bassmaster Junior Series event. Takeoff for both fields is set for 7 a.m. CT at Cypress Bend Park. Juniors will weigh in back at the park at 1:30 p.m., with the high school anglers scheduled for 3 p.m.

All three tournaments are presented by the Louisiana Office of Tourism, Toledo Bend Lake Country, the Sabine River Authority, Desoto Parish Tourist Commission and the Vernon Parish Tourist Commission.

# Former Bass Cat Garrett Begins Pro Career

2020 is a massive step for John Garrett Fishing, it's that leap of faith, believing and counting on my skill set to earn a living as a professional angler. Transitioning from the bass team at Bethel University to fishing the 2020 Bassmaster Eastern and Central Opens successfully will be a monumental undertaking. I'll be the guppy going against the sharks... Thank goodness bass don't know stats. To the bass, I'm on equal standings, but in reality, I'll be going against a field of the best local and professional anglers on the water. Hundreds of anglers, including a mix of Bassmaster Elites, will be vying for a very limited number of spots. I have years of experience coming up through the Obion County Central High School and Bethel University bass fishing programs, but I will not have any home court advantage as I would on Kentucky Lake or Reelfoot Lake. But that's not a deterrent; it is just a challenge to make the most of practice days, to study the lakes for structure, cover, water clarity and temperature. I will also study the weather patterns, the moon phases, and most of all, try my best not to do anything stupid. You can't win on the first or second day, but you can lose the tournament on any day. A bad day on the water will be hard to recover from with the level of competition I will be facing.

Having a keen sense of sight, bass can see in every direction except back and down. They will see the bottom of my Skeeter FX21 bassboat and hopefully they'll be interested one of my favorite lures, such as the Strike King Red Eye Shad lipless crankbait on the grassy flats, the Strike King Ocho stick bait around shoreline cover or for bedding bass, or maybe a Strike King Rage Space Monkey punched into the thicker grass mats using a heavier weight (I generally will use a range of

Strike King's Tungsten bullet worm weights, anywhere from .75 to 1.5 ounces, for punching depending upon the thickness of the surface layer of grass). One or all of these might be just the trick for enticing and landing a limit of trophy bass from the tournament waters of Kissimmee Chain of Lakes.

Fishing in Florida in January offers a myriad of new challenges for the first Bassmaster Eastern Open starting on January 15. I'm keeping an open mind on what might work best for the different conditions. And of course, my actual results from the three official practice days will help me finalize the baits and patterns that I will use starting on the first day. I'll probably start with my Strike King Red Eye Shad as it should work well for offshore areas and flats, especially if I can locate a good patch of underwater grass, either hydrilla or milfoil. Fingers crossed that spawning bass haven't all

been picked off and I can work beds using the Strike King Ocho.
