Overflow Church Reports One Member Tested Positive for Coronavirus

MCKENZIE (March 23) — Overflow Church, located in the former Rural King building on U.S. 79 reports one of its members tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19).

The social media post indicates the person had a mild case and is rapidly recovering. The person sought medical treatment as soon as symptoms man-

ifested and self-quarantined before an official diagnosis was given.

Everyone who had contact with the individual is under mandatory quarantine for the remainder of the week.

The church said leaders in the church have prepared for weeks for such an event. The church is not meeting physi-

cally and is gathering virtually online.

The church is saying the patient is a victim and had no control over contracting the disease.

The church indicated it will continue to monitor the situation and asks for people to pray and support all families affected by this virus.

Huntingdon Animal Clinic Open with COVID-19 Protocol

Huntingdon Animal Clinic remains open to serve clients and has enacted protocols to protect staff and clients during the coronavirus pandemic. A statement released by the clinic reads:

Due to the recent development of a positive case of coronavirus in Carroll County, Huntingdon Animal Clinic is implementing an alternative routine to help protect our patients, clients and staff. These changes will take effect immediately and are aimed at minimizing human contact, as recommended by the Tennessee Department of Health.

During this time, we ask that you call to check in your pa-

tient(s) and wait in your vehicle until called upon by a staff member. At this point, we will allow one client in the building with the patient(s) with the help of a staff member, provided the client is showing no signs of respiratory illness or fever and would like to enter the clinic with their patient(s). If you prefer not to enter the clinic, the staff member can take your patient(s) into the clinic and any communication required from this point will be made through phone calls.

We ask that clients who are elderly or have children with them remain in their vehicle and a staff member will bring your

patient(s) into the clinic. Any communication required once your patient is in the clinic from this point will be made through phone calls.

Due to these changes, our phone lines may frequently be busy. Please be patient with us as we implement these changes and continue to serve you and your patient(s) as efficiently as possible.

As always, the health and care of your patient(s) will be our priority! Again, please be patient with us as we continue to adapt to this developing situation and thank you for your business!

Tennessee Department of Safety, Homeland Security's Driver Services Division Announces Service Updates

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security (TDOSHS) continues to monitor the COVID-19 outbreak closely. At this time, most State Driver Services Centers remain open and the Department is currently taking precautions to protect the health and safety of our customers and employees. To relieve as many customers as possible from needing to visit a Driver Services Center during the outbreak, the Driver Services Division is implementing the following changes:

-Starting March 20, 2020, the Department is waiving its requirement that citizens appear in person and have a new photograph taken through October 1, 2021. This will allow many customers with expiring credentials to renew online and not visit in person.

-Non-US citizens with Temporary driver licenses (Class XD and XID) will still need to visit in person to renew those licenses upon expiration of the current license.

-All Driver Licenses, Learner Permits, Commercial Driver Licenses, Photo Identification Licenses (ID), and Handgun Carry Permits that would expire between March 12, 2020, and May

19, 2020, will be extended for six months from the original expiration date. The Department will issue a letter of extension to the individuals affected. Affected individuals will be required to keep the letter with them during the extension period.

The Department is also taking the following precautions for the health and safety of employees and customers:

-Adopting Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines for cleaning and sanitizing all Driver Services Centers and equipment.

-Providing guidance to our personnel regarding precautions to minimize risk of exposure for themselves and customers.

-Stationing a staff member at the entrance of each Driver Services Center to ensure the number of customers entering the Center does not exceed CDC recommendations.

-Encouraging and allowing customers to wait in their vehicles using the Department's queuing technology (E-Ticketing) until notified by text or call to enter the Driver Services Center.

-Providing protective gear for examiners who interact with customers following TSA procedures.

-Encouraging customers to use credit or debit cards only to limit handling of cash.

We encourage everyone to utilize our e-Services portal for available online services such as renewals, duplicates, paying reinstatement fees, and changing your address. The e-Services portal can be accessed at <https://www.tn.gov/safety/driver-services/online.html>.

If you wish to obtain a REAL ID at this time, you will still need to visit a Driver Services Center. However, Gov. Lee has asked the federal government to delay the October 1 deadline to acquire a Real ID. That decision from the federal government is pending.

We ask that customers who are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms (coughing, fever, shortness of breath), have had contact with someone diagnosed with COVID-19, or have traveled to a high-risk area for COVID-19, please consider the health and safety of our employees and other customers and visit a Center at another time.

This remains an ongoing situation and any updates or changes to our services in response to the COVID-19 outbreak will be proactively shared.

He made the announcement on his Facebook page on Wednesday, March 18.

Holt explained to his constituents he never intended to be a career politician and after 10 years in office, he decided to step aside.

The 38-year-old state representative said he will leave office after the November General Election.

Holt's departure leaves the race open for those seeking his vacated post. As of press time, eight candidates have shown interest to enter the race for the 76th District in the Tennessee State House of Representatives. It includes five Republicans, one Democrat and two Independents.

Republican candidates are - Dennis J. Doster, Larry L. Gallimore, David Hawks, and Leon Ronald Huestis - all of Weakley County, and Keith Priestley of McKenzie. The lone Democrat on the ticket is Jean A. Little. Independent candidates are Dresden Mayor Jeffery T. Washburn and Rachel Denise Whites. As of Monday noon, Doster,

David Hawks are the two who have filed their petition to be on the ballot. The others' petitions are still outstanding.

Those interested in running for office have until April 2 to file their petitions with the Election Commission. More candidates might decide to enter the race for District 76 State Representative.

Those seeking the Tennessee State Senate 24th District seat are: Republican candidates - Casey L. Hood (from Obion County) and incumbent John D. Stevens of Huntingdon; Independent Yahweh Yahweh (from Gibson County); and Democratic candidate former Paris Mayor Samuel Tharpe (Henry County).

Seeking the unexpired term for Chancellor District 24 to fill the seat vacated by Carma McGee, who was appointed to another judgeship, are Benjamin Harmon and Vicki Hoover (R-Paris).

Carroll County Electric Temporarily Suspends Disconnects for Non-Payment

(March 19) — The Carroll County Electric Department announced Thursday that it would suspend disconnects for non-payment through April. The announcement provided by CCED follows:

As the COVID-19 pandemic expands towards our community affecting the local economy, CCED is implementing suspension of disconnects for non-payment through the month of April. This time of crisis is producing much uncertainty and anxiety in our country. CCED is mindful of this

and is hopeful the temporary suspension of disconnects will help reduce some of the stress at the local level for our customers. While services will not be disconnected, bills will continue to accrue as this is only a temporary suspension of disconnects for non-payment. We encourage customers to make payments as they are able. Suspension of disconnects will be re-evaluated on or before April 30.

A local energy assistance resource, to Carroll County resi-

dents, is the Northwest Tennessee Economic Development Council. The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps assist families with energy costs. This is an excellent resource for up-coming electric bills. Appointments are required and call wait times may be increased due to volume.

Federal Tax Deadline is July 15

WASHINGTON — The Treasury Department and Internal Revenue Service announced today the federal income tax filing due date is extended from April 15, 2020 to July 15, 2020.

Taxpayers can also defer federal income tax payments due on April 15, 2020 to July 15, 2020, without penalties and interest, regardless of the amount owed. This deferment applies to all taxpayers, including individuals, trusts and estates, corporations and other non-corporate tax filers and those who pay self-employment tax.

Taxpayers do not need to file any additional forms or call the IRS to qualify for this automatic federal tax filing and payment

relief.

The IRS urges taxpayers who are due a refund to file as soon as possible. Most tax refunds are still being issued within 21 days.

"Even with the filing deadline extended, we urge taxpayers who are owed refunds to file as soon as possible and file electronically," said IRS Commissioner Chuck Rettig. "Filing electronically with direct deposit is the quickest way to get refunds. Although we are curtailing some operations during this period, the IRS is continuing with mission-critical operations to support the nation, and that includes accepting tax returns and sending refunds. As a federal agency vital to the overall

operations of our country, we ask for your personal support, your understanding - and your patience. I'm incredibly proud of our employees as we navigate through numerous different challenges in this very rapidly changing environment."

This announcement comes following the President's emergency declaration last week pursuant to the Stafford Act. The Stafford Act is a federal law designed to bring an orderly and systematic means of federal natural disaster and emergency assistance for state and local governments in carrying out their responsibilities to aid citizens. It was enacted in 1988.

All Elective Medical, Dental Procedures Suspended by Governor

TENNESSEE (March 23) — Governor Bill Lee has suspended many non-essential, elective medical procedures in Executive Order 18, issued March 23.

The executive order reads:

Dental service providers in the State of Tennessee, including but not limited to dentists, pediatric dentists, orthodontists, oral surgeons, periodontists, prosthodontists, and endodontists, shall not perform any non-emergency dental or oral procedures. Non-emergency dental or oral procedures include hygiene visits, cosmetic procedures, and other elective procedures. Emergency procedures for patients with acute dental or oral needs may still be performed, including treatment for pain, swelling, trauma, or an abscess.

All hospitals and surgical outpatient facilities in the State of Tennessee shall not perform non-essential procedures, which includes any medical procedure that is not necessary to address a medical emergency or to preserve the health and safety of a patient, as determined by a licensed medical provider. All hospitals and freestanding surgical outpatient facilities must postpone through the expiration of this Order, at a minimum, joint replacement, bariatric surgery, and cosmetic surgery, except for emergency or trauma-related surgery where postponement would significantly impact the health, safety, or welfare of the patient. Medical procedures excluded from postponement include, but are not limited to, surgeries related to advanced cardiovascular disease (including coronary artery disease, heart failure, and arrhythmias) that would prolong life; oncological testing, treatment, and related procedures; pregnancy-related visits and procedures, including labor and delivery; organ transplantation; procedures related to dialysis; and emergency or trauma-related procedures where postponement would significantly impact the health, safety, and welfare of the patient.

Non-hospital healthcare providers impacted by this Order are requested and encouraged

censed medical provider. Non-hospital healthcare providers impacted by this Order are requested and encouraged

to provide necessary personal protective equipment in their possession and not required for the emergency care exempted in the Order, including, but not limited to, medical gowns, N95 masks, surgical masks, TYVEK suits, boot covers, gloves, and/or eye protection to the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency by delivering such equipment to the nearest open Tennessee National Guard Armory listed on the TEMA website (www.tn.gov/tema) between the hours of 9 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Any state or local law, order, rule, or regulation that would limit the application of this Order is hereby suspended.

This Order shall be effective and enforceable at 12:01 a.m., Central Daylight Time on March 24, 2020, and shall remain in effect until 12:01 a.m., Central Daylight Time on April 13, 2020, at which time the suspension of any state laws and rules and the other provisions of this Order shall cease and be of no further force or effect.

Gov. Bill Lee Issues Order for Open Meetings During COVID-19 Emergency

Governor Bill Lee issued Executive Order No. 16 to ensure government operations continue to function openly and transparently during the COVID-19 emergency while taking measures to protect the health and safety of citizens and government officials.

The order allows governing bodies, by following certain conditions, to meet electronically and provide electronic access to the public during the COVID-19 emergency.

“We at Tennessee Coalition for Open Government are very pleased with this outcome. The order allows essential government business to continue. We need to give governing bodies across the state tools to do this,” said Deborah Fisher of TCOG.

The order includes several key safeguards for public transparency that we think are important and reasonable considering the COVID-19 epidemic.

The order allows governing bodies to meet and conduct “essential business by electronic means, rather than being required to gather a quorum of

members physically present at the same location, if the governing body determines that the meeting electronically is necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of Tennesseans in light of the COVID-19 outbreak” subject to certain conditions.

The conditions for electronic meetings are:

The meeting must be open and accessible to the public by electronic means. Each governing body must make reasonable efforts to ensure the public access to the meeting via electronic means is live access, but if the governing body cannot provide such live public access despite reasonable efforts, the governing body must make a clear audio or video recording of the meeting available to the public as soon as practicable following the meeting, and in no event more than two business days after the meeting.

Governing bodies are urged to provide the public with clear notice of the meeting agenda and how the public can access the meeting electronically at a time and location reasonably accessible to all members of the public.

All meetings shall be conducted in a manner consistent with the Tennessee Constitution, Article 1, Section 19, which states

in part: “That the printing press shall be free to every person to examine the proceedings of the Legislature; or of any branch or officer of the government, and no law shall ever be made to restrain the right thereof.”

Many states across the country are beginning to issues guidelines for complying with the Open Meetings Act when physical presence of the governing body and the public could interfere with the containment of COVID-19.

The order issued by Gov. Bill Lee offers the clear guidance needed as we move into uncharted territory.

TCOG will continue to work on this issue. There are literally hundreds of governing bodies across the state. Some are large or have the capacity and experience in providing live audio or video feeds of their meetings. Some are not, and don't even maintain a website.

“We urge Tennesseans — and particularly Tennessee companies and individuals with expertise in technology — to offer their services to local governing bodies as a way to try to maintain open government to the largest extent possible during this period,” said Fisher.

Gov. Bill Lee Orders Changes for Restaurants, Gyms

Gyms are to Close, Takeout Only for Restaurants

NASHVILLE (March 22) — Today, Tennessee Governor Bill Lee signed Executive Order 17 calling for businesses across the state to utilize alternative business models beginning at midnight Monday, March 23, 2020 until midnight April 6, 2020. The order also outlines ways businesses and citizens should work to protect vulnerable populations.

“The COVID-19 pandemic has created both an economic and a health crisis and our response must continue to address both aspects,” said Gov. Lee. “Our goal is to keep the public, especially vulnerable populations, safe while doing

everything possible to keep Tennesseans in a financially stable position.”

Executive Order 17 prohibits social gatherings of 10 or more people and also enacts the following provisions regarding restaurants, bars, and similar food and drink establishments:

- Establishments are to exclusively offer drive-through, take-out or delivery options to support families, businesses and the food supply chain during this emergency.
- Establishments may sell alcohol by take-out or delivery (with the purchase of food) in closed containers to those who are age 21 and up.

Gyms and fitness/exercise centers or substantially similar facilities are to temporarily close and suspend in-person services until April 6, 2020.

In the interim, these busi-

nesses are encouraged to pursue digital programming if possible. The order also pursues additional measures to keep vulnerable populations such as the elderly and those with underlying conditions safe.

- Visitation to nursing homes, retirement homes, and long-term care or assisted-living facilities is now limited to visits involving essential care only.
- Businesses are encouraged to enact policies that take extra steps to assist vulnerable populations by considering measures such as shopping hours exclusive from the general public. “I urge every Tennessean to take these actions seriously - our physical and economic health depend on this as we work to beat COVID-19,” said Lee.

State Adds Resources to Process Unemployment Claims

NASHVILLE — Recent events in our state have impacted the employment of many Tennesseans. Because of this, the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development (TDLWD) has seen a large increase in the number of unemployment claims. This increase, along with public health concerns, has prompted a change in strategy for the agency.

To meet the current demand for unemployment benefits and address public health concerns, the Department will

limit access to American Job Centers and shift resources to triple the number of staff trained to process claim applications.

Starting Monday, March 23, each American Job Center across Tennessee began limiting access to facilities and is conducting business through phone and internet. This change will allow state-employed staff to switch their focus from workforce development tasks to claims processing.

Nearly 200 employees work

inside Tennessee's 23 comprehensive American Job Centers. This shift in job duties will bring the total number of staff focusing on unemployment to approximately 300, which is roughly one-third of the Department's employees.

“As a Department, we are shifting resources to align with our greatest need,” said TDLWD Commissioner Jeff McCord. “The changes we are making will go a long way in keeping up with the demand created.”

Town of Bruceton Releases COVID-19 Policy

My staff department heads have closely monitored the COVID-19 pandemic and its effects on our community. I have been in contact with state health officials and the Governor to stay informed of this health crisis. All city services are operational, and we continue to serve our citizens and customers in every capacity. The health and safety of our citizens, customers and our employees in every department are our top priority. In an effort to limit social contact to protect our citizens and employees, I am implementing the following protective measures and protocols:

1. Beginning Monday, March 23, 2020, Bruceton City Hall

will be closed to walk-in traffic, but our offices will continue to serve our customers during normal business hours by phone and drop box.

2. Water bills and property taxes can be paid via the night drop beside the door of City Hall. Please put your payment in an envelope to ensure that it is credited to the correct account with either a payment stub of something with the type of account and your name.
3. Customers are encouraged to pay by check or call to setup automatic bank draft as a convenient option to pay water bills.
4. Water bills and property taxes can also be paid online via www.webfeepay.com. Be aware that payment by this method is not instantaneous. We have to rely on email confirmation before it is accepted as paid.

5. Bill pay online through your banking institution should also be available, please call your bank for more information.
6. We are and will be available to answer any questions or service requests at 731-586-2401 during normal business hours.

The Bruceton City Hall remains dedicated and will continue to operate to provide vital water and sewer services along with police and street services throughout this event. staff during these closures. Thank you to the General Assembly for quickly addressing this issue and providing clarity to our educators and families.”

The amendment ensures that no school district, school, district employee or teacher is adversely impacted by school closures, student absenteeism or other hardships related to COVID-19 and the tornadoes.

Assessment and accountability is an integral part of the Tennessee education system that enables us to learn where students are excelling and how to best meet the needs of all students. In order to waive any requirements related to assessment and accountability, a federal waiver is required and the Tennessee legislature must make changes to existing state law. Passage of this amendment makes the necessary changes for the 2019-2020 school year only.

States. Risk of infection with COVID-19 is higher for people who are close contacts of someone known to have COVID-19, for example healthcare workers, or household members. Other people at higher risk for infection are those who live in or have recently been in an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19. The first case of COVID-19 in the United States was reported on January 21, 2020.

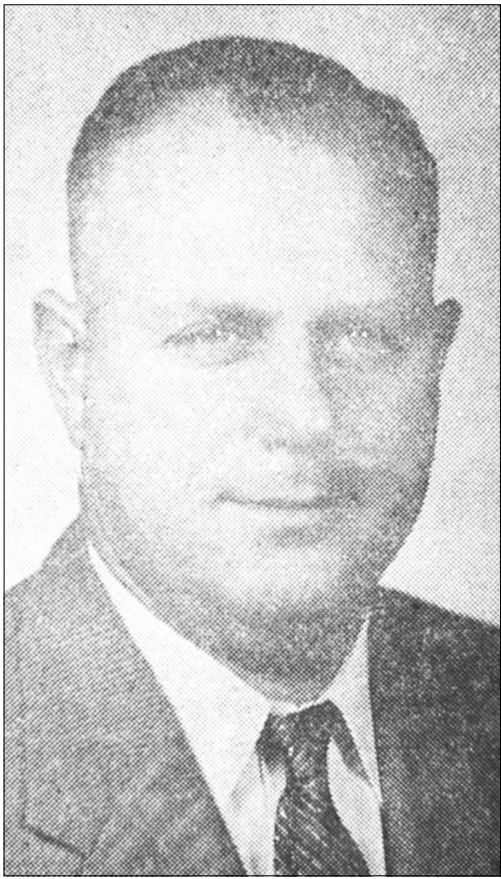
Two years ago, my father passed away. The practice he started suffered another devastating loss with the closure of McKenzie Regional Hospital. Times change, management changes, and at the end of the

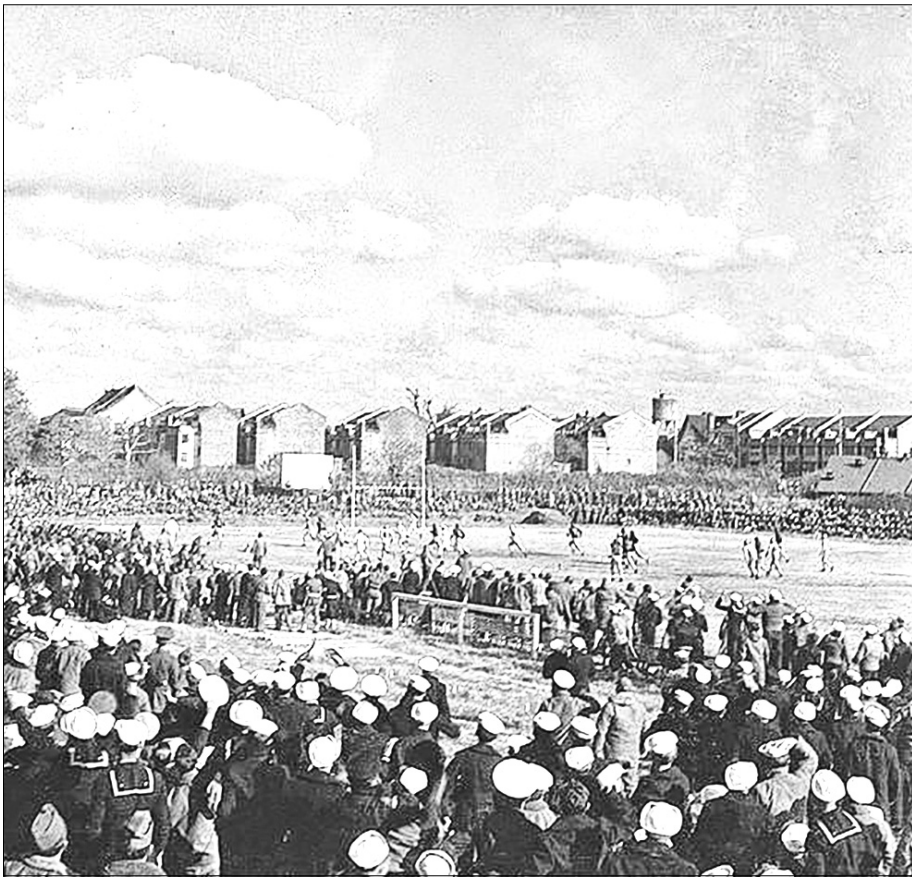

Celebrating McKenzie's oldest business and historical record

Casie Jones Vinson Star Athlete and Bethel Coach

As the COVID-19 has limited my access to the outside world, I dug through my boxes of archived stories from the 1950s and found a feature on Casie Vinson. I'd seen the name in a story about Demetra Perkins. From the little snippet in the story it seemed, Vinson was a basketball coach at Bethel and the responsible party for attracting a young Demetra to Bethel College.

After a little reading and digging, I quickly learned he was a very interesting and talented coach, but much to my chagrin I could not find much more than the Banner story and an obituary for his wife. So I ask for forgiveness now since this week's story starts to dry up around 1957, but not wanting to leave the confines of my office or home has put a damper on my research.

Casie Jones Vinson was born near Tupelo, Mississippi on November 5, 1917, to Lilly Bell and A. Walter Vinson. He was raised on a farm in a family of six boys and four girls.

He received his elementary education at Belden, Mississippi and graduated from Sherman High School. While in high school, he competed in all sports and was president of his junior class. In 1940, he graduated from Hinds Junior College at Raymond, where he had an athletic scholarship, playing football, basketball and baseball.

In the fall of 1940, he entered Union University in Jackson, Tennessee, where he played football and was a forward on the basketball team. While at Union, he was a member of the U Cub and was vice-president of his senior class. During his two years at Union, he pitched for Jackson's KITTY League baseball team.

The Kentucky-Illinois-Tennessee League (or KITTY League) was a Class D minor league baseball circuit. In 2004, the league was reincarnated as a summer collegiate league called the KIT League. Several of the names of the old Kitty League teams, such as the Fulton Railroaders, Owensboro Oilers and Union City Greyhounds, were brought back.

Vinson met and later married the woman that would be his lifelong companion, Doris Letty Stallcup of Dyersburg, Tennessee.

After graduating from college in 1942, Vinson began his teaching career, which was interrupted after a month with his entrance into the Army during World War II. Vinson married Doris on May 23, 1943, just before he was shipped out.

He served as an athletic instructor for the Air Transportation Command, spending three years in the service, with 14 months overseas in China, India and Burma Theater.

While in China, he played in the Army-Navy football game in Shanghai called the China Bowl; Vinson was listed on the

roster as #12 as an end weighing 200 pounds with a height of 6 feet. Stationed in the Assam Valley, his post basketball team was runner-up in the India All Service Championship.

After his discharge from the Army, he entered the University of Mississippi and received a Master's Degree in Health and Physical Education. In 1946, while still attending Ole Miss, Vinson accepted a position at the Batesville School District in Mississippi. He taught and coached there for three years. While there his football teams compiled a 23 and 3 record. They played in two post-season bowl games—in 1947, the Delta Bowl at Drew and the Rebel Bowl at the University of Mississippi in 1948.

His basketball teams had a record of 67 and 11, both boys and girls teams took the district championship three consecutive years.

In July 1947, Vinson came to Bethel College. He was to serve as the football coach and teach health and physical education. The next year he was named athletic director, as well as a teacher and coach of all sports.

Vinson's football experience at Bethel showed a small school trying to win against state schools like Western Kentucky State, Austin Peay and Southeast Missouri. With such a wide difference in squad size and manpower, football at Bethel, like a lot of other small colleges, was discontinued in 1953. He compiled a 6-25-1 record.

His baseball teams were a middle of the conference team most years, and held top-ranking a couple of times.

Under Vinson, basketball rose to the top perch in the Volunteer State Conference. Twice the Wildcats won second place in the conference. Three times the Wildcats made it to the NAIA playoffs. In 1957, they were defeated in an overtime game preventing them from going to the tournament.

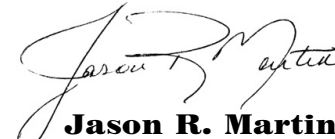
The marriage between Coach

Vinson and Doris produced two children; Casey Patrick and Mary Lauralyn. Coach Vinson and Doris had a passion for teaching and devotion to the church; Doris taught for 19 years in McKenzie, teaching every grade but first grade.

The Vinsons were members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. He served on the Board of Deacons and was a member of the Tennessee National Guard with the 203rd Transportation Company of Newbern, Tennessee.

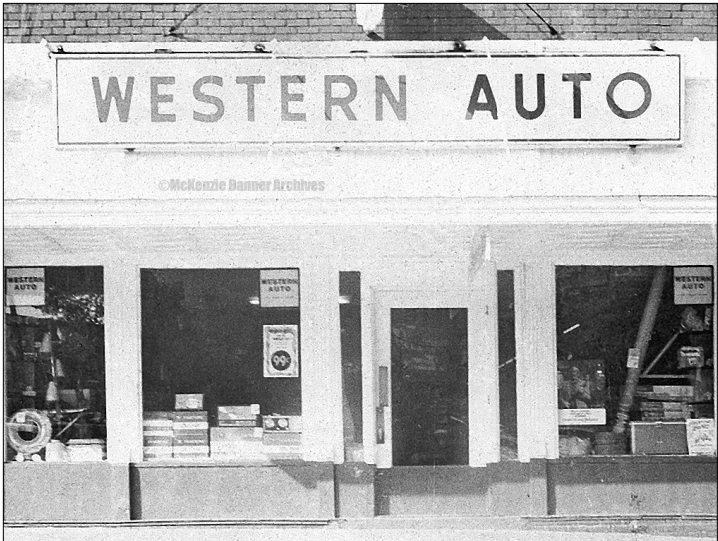
He was known as an enthusiastic gardener and had a great love for all sports from polo to ping-pong. He believed the goal for every game was to win, but he never lost sight of the ultimate object, building men; physically, mentally and morally. He stated his greatest satisfaction came from knowing that some of the boys whom he taught and coached did well in coaching positions in Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama and Kentucky.

On October 31, 1985, Vinson died at the age of 67. He was buried at Union Cemetery in Belden, Mississippi. Doris later moved to Las Vegas, Nevada living with son, Patrick. She was laid to rest next to her husband in 2009.

Miss Barbara Clark taught our freshman high school English class. Holy Cow, Goodness gracious, merciful Heavens, sakes alive, Mother Maybelle! It was without a doubt the most difficult—dare I say impossible—task ever assigned a person in the educational business!

I'm telling you with my hand up, at that particular juncture in our lives, me and Buddy Wiggleton didn't want no English! Pam Collins and Bobby Brewer were worse than we were! And on the days Squeaky Ridinger showed up, he was way more interested in how his hair looked than reading about some village blacksmith guy standing under a spreading chestnut tree.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow wasn't quite as high on our radar as he obviously was on Miss Clark's.

Believe me, in the fall of 1961, freshman English wasn't "where it was happening!" We had to get ready for football practice, there was always a weekend dance at Ann Carol McCalab's house and the new car models would be in the showroom any day now.

You think about it. We were almost fifteen. And "hip" to the gills. "Cool" personified! We had

things to do, and places to be... And none of it included subjugated verbs or dangling participles. We might read a Marvel Comic—hey, that was Literature—but don't give us any Shakespeare or Ralph Waldo Emerson. And poetry in any shape, form or verse was as "unhip" as a day old open bottle of Pepsi!

"Edna St. Vincent Millay" I repeated the name over slowly in my mind, "that doesn't even sound American!" Miss Clark had us kneel deep in "The Ballad of the Harp-Weaver."

She moved seamlessly from Edna to Nathaniel Hawthorne. She MADE us remember him! He's the dude from Salem, Massachusetts, who lived in the house with seven gables and wrote about that girl with the scarlet letter tattooed on her dress.

Miss Clark wouldn't give up, give in or slow down! Even if she didn't understand... We weren't studying anybody that wasn't named Chubby Checker. "Come on baby, let's do the twist..."

Our poetry was, "Duke, Duke, Duke of Earl, Duke, Duke..."

Charles Dickens WASN'T an American. He was English. And he wrote an entire book about a poor boy named Pip. Let me tell you, we got to know

little Pip like the back of our hand! Miss Clark's "Great Expectations" were a sight higher than ours.

She wouldn't lower them—and she drug us along...usually kicking and screaming!

My favorite line from that particular Dickens tale is, "Scattered wits take a long time in picking up." I saw a tad of humor there, plus it made sense to me. Miss Clark could somehow "teach" you to remember what you didn't even want to.

Girls, sports and convertibles were still way ahead of Henry David Thoreau, Stephen Vincent Benet and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle in our hearts and thoughts. But some of that old "stuff" wasn't half bad.

And then Miss Clark brought out Edgar Allan Poe. I'm telling you, this guy was touched.... in a bad/good way. He buried people beneath the floor; he put them in a pit with a knife bladed pendulum slowly moving toward a hapless victim; he bricked'em up in the dungeon; he "ushered" them into the big house on the hill...

I received a letter from Miss Barbara Clark this week. Amazing! You can not imagine the hundred wonderful thoughts that raced across my

mind before I could get the envelope open. Edna St. Vincent Millay spoke to me. I heard the hoof beats from Alfred Noyes' poem, "The Highwayman", clattering against the cobblestones.

The tears came as I recognized the handwriting, even though it wasn't on a chalkboard, from fifty-nine years ago.

She once again had turned aside, took the time—cared enough—to send along some most encouraging words regarding my small writing efforts. She didn't quit on me in 1961 and she wasn't giving up on me today. Now, that is some more teaching!

And I have already paid her the greatest tribute I possibly could. There is no telling how many times I have stood in high school and college classrooms, historical society meetings, PTA gatherings and running down the road absolutely by myself...and recited,

"Between the dark and the daylight, When the night is beginning to lower, Comes a pause in the day's occupation, That is known as the Children's hour. I hear in the chamber above me, The patter of little feet, The sound of a door is opened, And voices soft and sweet..."

I told you, Miss Clark was big on that Longfellow guy.

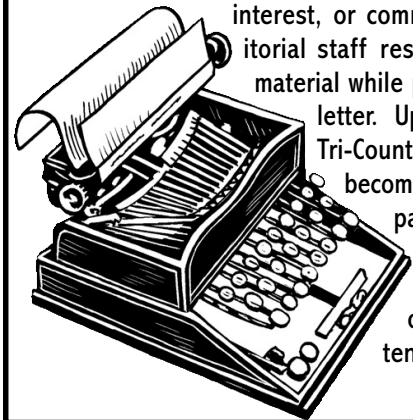

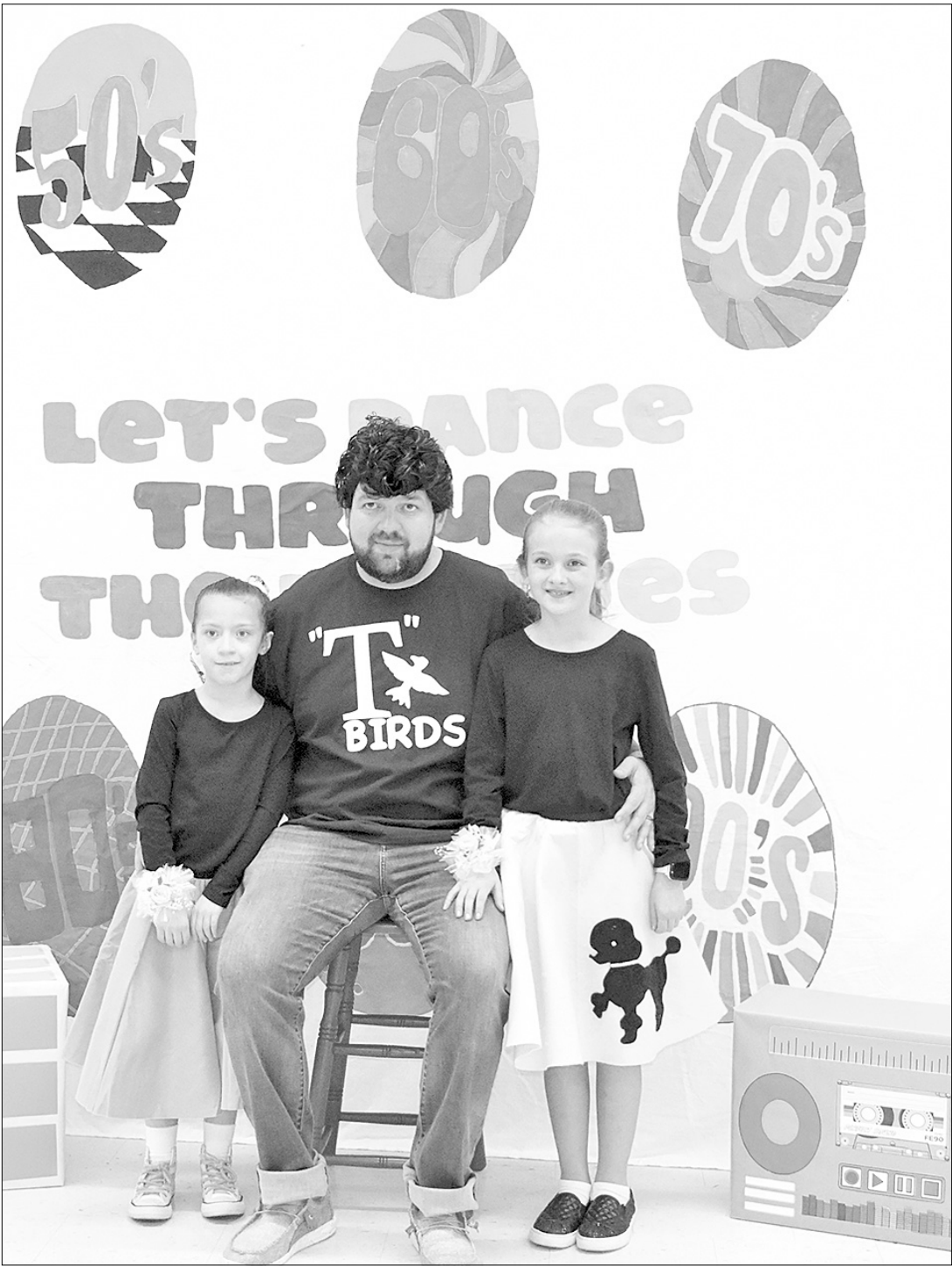

leader) because, “It's a great opportunity to be athletic, make friends and be involved.” She likes Bethel because “It's a great school with a great mission... Everyone is helpful and friendly. Plus, it's close to home.” She plans to join the Physician Assistant program.

The senior said that being a Huntingdon Fillie means “giving your best on and off the court and being the best that you can be.”

TSSAA Staying the Course on COVID-19 Response

As of Monday, March 23, the Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association is continuing with precautions in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes the postponement of the state basketball championships and concurrence with Governor Bill Lee's recommendations on suspending spring sports.

On Monday March 16, Governor Lee released the following statement:

“As the response to COVID-19 evolves, I urge every school district in Tennessee to close as soon as practically possible, with all schools expected to close by Friday, March 20, 2020 at the latest. Schools should remain closed through March 31, 2020 to further mitigate the spread of this infectious disease and we will issue further guidance prior to March 31. Superintendents and local leadership have the full support of my administration to determine effective dates for closure this week as they evaluate what is best for families within their respective districts. We understand the tremendous burden school closure places on families and we will continue to work with both the federal government and school districts to ensure we continue essential supports like meals for students in need. Every Tennessean has a role to play in preventing the spread of COVID-19 and I urge Tennesseans to be quick to help neighbors as new needs surface with the closure of schools.”

The TSSAA checked with

the Governor's office and confirmed his statement applies to all school-related activities including athletics.

TSSAA does not regulate the scheduling of regular season games or practices. However, consistent with the Governor's statement, and in the interest of the health and safety of competitors, coaches, officials, and spectators, TSSAA is urging every member school – both public and independent – to follow the Governor's recommendation and suspend interscholastic athletics through March 31, 2020. This suspension should include games, scrimmages, practices, and organized workouts or conditioning.

The TSSAA Board of Control met Tuesday, March 17. The meeting is normally held in

person, but was conducted via teleconference due to the numerous precautions being taken regarding the COVID-19 virus.

The Board discussed the current status of the state basketball tournaments and voted to continue with the current suspension of the state basketball tournaments and explore possible options to conduct the tournament at a date in the near future.

The Board voted to maintain the current policy that the regular season for spring sports' competition is still left up to school administrators, local boards of education, etc. If a school decides to not have any regular season games, they could not be prohibited from entering the postseason, if tournaments are held.
