Tigers Lose Their Bite at Paul Ward Stadium

HUNTINGDON (August 11) — Friday night, the Huntingdon Mustangs welcomed the Lexington Tigers for the annual Quarterback Club Jamboree at Paul Ward Stadium. The preseason match-up showcased both junior varsity and varsity Mustangs with each team competing through two quarters of play. The spectators who took the opportunity to preview Huntingdon High School football were not disappointed as both Mustang squads dominated the visiting Tigers.

The junior varsity Mustangs opened the evening

with a 16-6 victory over the Lexington junior varsity. In the first quarter, Broox Bennett scored on a 7-yard run for Huntingdon's first touchdown score. Bennett followed with a two-point conversion for an 8-0 lead. In the second quarter, Braylin Dearmon completed a 39-yard pass to Alec Jordan for a second score. Dearmon ran the ball for the second two-point conversion of the game. Although Lexington scored one touchdown in the second quarter, the Tigers failed to convert.

In two-quarters of play, the Huntingdon junior varsity gained 141 yards on 15 carries and completed one pass for 39 yards.

The second half of the

Jamboree pitted the two varsity teams. Huntingdon dominated with a 21-3 victory. After the Tigers scored first on a field goal for an early 3-0 lead, Huntingdon scored 21 unanswered points for the remainder of their match-up. For the Mustangs, Ashton Hutcherson scored first on a 3-yard run. Cole Chafin added the extra point for a 7-3 Huntingdon lead. In the second quarter, Meal Leavitt scored on a 4-yard run with 3:50 remaining in the game. Cole Chafin added his second extra point for a 14-3 Huntingdon lead. With 1:14 remaining, Brady Warbritton scored on the longest run of the game, a 58-yard scamper to the end zone. Chafin ended the

Jamboree with a perfect 3-3 extra point attempts.

In two-quarters of play, Huntingdon accumulated 206 rushing yards on 18 plays, compared to 15 yards for Lexington after 12 rushing attempts. Warbritton led the Mustangs with 91 yards rushing in 4 attempts, and Hutcherson added 51 yards in 6 attempts. Huntingdon also posted 36 yards passing while Lexington completed 6 of 9 passes for 65 yards.

Next Friday the Mustangs open their regular season against rival McKenzie Rebels. This non-region matchup begins at 7 p.m. at Randy Thomas Field in McKenzie.

Stax Records

A Soulful Legacy

In the heart of Memphis, Tennessee, a musical revolution was brewing that would leave an indelible mark on the world of soul music. What began as Satellite Records would soon evolve into Stax Records, becoming a pivotal force in shaping the cultural and musical landscape of its time. The story of Stax Records is one of triumph over adversity, of a close-knit community that defied social norms, and of the artists who turned their struggles into soulful melodies that continue to resonate to this day.

The origins of Stax Records can be traced back to a modest record store in Memphis, established by siblings Jim Stewart and Estelle Axton in 1957. Initially named Satellite Records, the store was located in a racially diverse South Memphis neighborhood. The name "Satellite" was chosen in part due to the excitement surrounding the launch of the Soviet Sputnik satellite, symbolizing the label's aspiration to reach for the stars in the music industry.

At the time, Stewart was an avid country music enthusiast, but it was the rich tapestry of Memphis's musical heritage that would soon capture his imagination. With the purchase of recording equipment, the Stewart siblings transformed a former movie theater into a makeshift recording studio. The the-

ater's sloping floor was ingeniously converted into a sloping recording floor, giving Satellite its unique acoustics that would later become synonymous with the "Stax sound."

As Satellite Records continued to grow, the label underwent a transformation that would forever change its trajectory. In 1961, Stewart and Axton made the fateful decision to rename the label Stax Records, derived from a combination of their last names, "STewart" and "AXton." This rebranding marked a significant turning point, reflecting the label's evolving identity and its newfound commitment to soul music.

Under the Stax banner, the label's mission became clearer: to create a space where artists from all backgrounds could come together to create music that transcended racial and social boundaries. Stax quickly became a haven for African American artists seeking an outlet for their musical talents, a place where their voices could be heard and celebrated.

One of the most defining features of Stax Records was its exceptional roster of artists. Stax launched the careers of numerous legendary musicians, including Otis Redding, Isaac Hayes, Rufus Thomas, Carla Thomas, The Staple Singers, Wilson Pickett, Booker T. & the MG's, and Sam & Dave, among others. These artists brought their own unique styles to



the Stax sound, infusing it with raw emotion, passion, and an unmistakable southern flavor.

Stax Records quickly gained a reputation for producing soul-stirring hits that resonated with audiences worldwide. Songs like Otis Redding's "Try a Little Tenderness," Isaac Hayes's "Theme from Shaft," Sam & Dave's "Hold On, I'm Comin'," and The Staple Singers' "Respect Yourself" became anthems of an era, capturing the essence of the civil rights movement and the changing cultural landscape.

Despite its successes, Stax faced its share of challenges. Financial troubles led to the label's distribution deal with Atlantic Records ending in 1968, resulting in the departure of several key artists. Stax filed for bankruptcy in 1975, marking the end of an era. The original Stax studio was demolished, and the label's assets were sold off.

However, the legacy of Stax Records endured. In the late 1980s, a group of music enthusiasts and philanthropists, including Al Bell and Jim Stewart, worked to revive the Stax brand. A new Stax Muse-



um of American Soul Music was established on the original site, preserving the history and spirit of the label. In 2003, the Stax Music Academy was founded, providing young musicians from underserved communities with the opportunity to learn, create, and perform.

Today, the legacy of Stax Records continues. The Stax Museum stands as a testament to the label's enduring impact on American music and culture. It showcases a vast collection of memorabilia, exhibits, and interactive displays that chronicle the journey of Stax and its artists.

The Stax Music Academy remains a vibrant hub of musical education, offering young talents the chance to develop their skills and find their own voices. The academy's commitment to fostering diversity and ar-

tistic expression ensures that the Stax legacy will be carried forward for generations to come.

In recent years, Stax's influence has reverberated across various genres, with contemporary artists drawing inspiration from the label's soulful sounds. The "Stax sound" has transcended time, continuing to resonate with audiences through its authenticity and emotional depth.

The transformation of Satellite Records into Stax Records encapsulates a journey of musical evolution, social progress, and cultural impact. What began as a small record store with a big dream ultimately became a symbol of unity and artistic expression. Stax Records, born from humble beginnings, forever changed the face of soul music and left an indelible imprint on the world. Through its artists,

hits, and enduring influence, Stax Records remains a soulful testament to the power of music to bridge divides and inspire generations. With its roots in Satellite and its legacy in Stax, this remarkable label continues to shine brightly as a beacon of soulful creativity and human connection.

Bring water and salt to a boil; stir in grits. Return

to a boil; reduce heat. Cook 4 minutes, stirring occasionally. Combine grits and cheese in large mixing bowl; stir until cheese is melted. Combine eggs, milk, thyme, and garlic salt; mix well. Add a small of hot grit mixture to egg mixture, stirring well. Pour into a 12x8x2 inch baking dish. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Remove from refrigerator; let stand 15 minutes. Bake at 350 degrees for 50-55 minutes. Garnish with tomato roses (if used) and parsley. Yield 8 servings.

Oven Fried Chicken

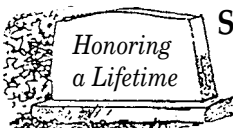

Rebels Look Strong with Jamboree Win Against McCracken County

PARIS (August 11) — In the final pre-season match-up before the start of the regular 2023 season, McKenzie scored early and held on to defeat the 6A Mustangs of McCracken County, 20-14. In the three-preseason game, McKenzie has been able to hold McNairy County, Lexington and McCracken County to a combined 20

points. Offensively, the Rebels have totaled 64 points in the three scrimmages. The Rebels played two twelve-minute quarters. McKenzie started the game with a seven-yard pass from Tate Surber to Drew Chappell. That was followed by a five-yard first-down run by Timmy Arline. Seven plays later a 25-yard pass from

Surber to Stafford Roditis resulted in a Reel touchdown. With 6:26 left in the quarter, Roditis kicked the extra point. McKenzie led 7-0. McCracken went on a seven-play drive that resulted in a turnover on downs at the Rebel 30-yard line. It took the Rebels four plays to hit the end zone. Surber took to the air, finding Roditis for 43 yards. Then Arline picked up a couple of yards on the ground before picking up the first down on a six-yard pass.

On first-down, Surber found Roditis for the second touchdown of the night. With 2:03 to go in the first quarter, Roditis booted the PAT. McKenzie led 14-0. The Mustang offense opened up via the pass. Picking up large chunks of yardage in the air, McCracken County was able to score on a 19-yard touchdown pass as time ticked away in the first quarter. The PAT narrowed the McKenzie lead 14-7. McKenzie's next possession ended in four plays. After a 32-yard punt, the Mustangs took over at their 42-yard line. Five plays later the game was tied up at 14-14 on a quarterback keeper and a successful PAT.
