HUNTINGDON (August 14) — The Carroll County Commission met Monday night with a short agenda with three resolutions dealing with the county budget. Chairman Pro Tempore Darrell Ridgley presided over the meeting as County Mayor Joseph Butler could not attend due to a prior engagement. Resolution 8-03-2023 to pledge \$500,000 of American Rescue Plan Act Funds to the Cedar Grove Public Utility District was approved with one “no” vote, that being Commissioner Cyril Ostiguy-Huntingdon. The Cedar Grove Public Utility District requested the funds

DYER (August 18) — West Carroll War Eagles earned a season-opening 45-28 victory over Gibson County Pioneers in Dyer. The War Eagles dominated the home team as the visiting team had 14 first downs, 305 yards rushing, and 59 yards passing. The Pioneers had 7 first downs, 110 yards rushing, and 103 yards passing. Freshman Zac Fowler was the quarterback in his inaugural high school regular-season game. Jay Allen of the Pioneers earned the first score at 8:45 in the first quarter. The PAT failed and Gibson County

led 6-0. West Carroll answered with a Jayden Milton 62-yard run and then added the two-point conversion for an 8-6 for West Carroll. In the second quarter, Zac Fowler passed to Daelon Drasal for a 26-yard TD. Jose Martinez added the PAT for a score of 15-6 at the 9:32 mark on the clock. Over the summer, local actors have taken the McKenzie High School Theatre stage to practice for the play, titled "Southern Fried Nuptials," and they are excited to show off their hard work this weekend. "Southern Fried Nuptials" is a family comedy written by Nashville duo Osborne and Eppler. The story starts several days before Harlene Frye (Chelsea Fuller-Brown) and Attie Van Leer (Mitchell Brown) are set to marry. drinking water, are more susceptible to brown water laden with iron.

During an emergency meeting of the Mayor and Town Council on Tuesday, they learned the Water Treatment Plant needs upgrades, especially to its aeration and lime-injection systems.

Tony Wyatt of the Tennessee Association of Utility Districts and a resident of Huntingdon, and Randy Crossett, supervisor of Huntingdon Public Works said they are working to solve the problem.

Huntingdon pumps and processes about 800,000 gallons of potable water daily. That water is pumped through both PVC and cast iron pipes.

Residents took to social media to complain about the water in their homes. Councilman Andrew Maddox said residents were sending him photos of their brown-colored water. The city flushed fire hydrants to reduce the iron

buildup and is working with engineers and other contractors to solve the problem long-term. Crossett and Larry Miller, both long-term associates of the Water Department, said the Water Treatment Plant needs upgrades to the system. Miller said the plant is reaching its capacity limit and the city needs to plan for the future. They agreed immediate repairs and updates are needed at the Water Treatment Plant.

The city is installing a monitoring system to track the Ph levels of the water better. That will help the city manage the system on a day-to-day basis. Wyatt said few area water systems have the Ph monitor that alarms when the alkalinity gets too far out of balance.

By Tuesday afternoon, the city had mitigated the problem.

As of 3:30 p.m. August 15, the Huntingdon Water Plant is running with appropriate PH levels. A plastic pipe in the lime administration system was found to be obstructed; the lime process is now working properly. Hydrants in the identified

areas have been flush since 12 noon today. Flushing will continue into the evening as long as tank levels will support flow. Aerator process has been verified for the best efficiency.

The Town of Huntingdon thanked Tony Wyatt with Tennessee Association of Utility Districts for his support and assistance. The city also thanked Barsto Construction, JR Waugford Engineering and WTPUD for their help.

“We sincerely apologize to our customers for the inconvenience and concerns related to their water supply. The utility department employees have worked diligently over the last 48 hours to diagnose and resolve water needs.”

Citizens may experience low pressure and some redness in the water, however the water is safe to drink and should clear up and be back to normal within forty-eight (48) hours, said city officials on Wednesday.

They encouraged residents to call the Public Utility Department at 731-986-2915 if they encounter a problem.

Single Car Accident Knocks Out Phones, Internet

McKENZIE (August 17) — A mid-day single-car accident destroyed a metal utility pole and blocked traffic along U.S. 79 on Thursday, August 17.

Utility lines, suspended over the highway, were compromised and hung down, blocking passage of vehicles on the highway near the intersection of Sydnor Road.

According to a report filed by the Tennessee Highway Patrol, Wayne Crook, 75, no city listed, exited the five-lane highway in his 2003 GMC Envoy, struck and destroyed a Carroll County Electric utility pole, and came to rest clear of the utility pole.

While the electric lines remained intact, Spectrum

and other utility companies suffered damage to their lines.

Carroll County Electric, Spectrum, McKenzie Fire, Carroll County Ambulance Department, Tennessee Highway Patrol, and Tennessee Department of Transportation responded to the scene.

Drug Investigation Leads to Arrests

HUNTINGDON — An ongoing, proactive joint drug investigation by special agents with the Drug Investigation Division of the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, Huntingdon Police Department, and 24th Judicial Drug Task Force has resulted in the seizure of drugs, drug paraphernalia, a weapon, as well as the arrest of two individuals in Carroll County.

Since February, agents and investigators have worked to target illicit drug activity in Carroll Coun-

ty. As a result of evidence gathered during the ongoing investigation, TBI obtained a search warrant for a home in the 300 block of Price Road in Huntingdon.

On Thursday, agents and investigators executed the search warrant and discovered methamphetamine, a firearm, marijuana, marijuana plants, prescription medicine, and drug paraphernalia. Two individuals inside of the home, at the time of the search warrant, were arrested and booked into the Carroll County Jail.

Tammy R. Brown (DOB: 3/27/69) and Landis L. Brown, Jr. (DOB: 8/17/69) are each charged with Possession of Schedule II (Methamphetamine) with Intent to Distribute, Possession of a Firearm in the Commission of a Dangerous Felony, Manufacturing of Schedule VI (Marijuana), Possession of Schedule IV (Pharmaceutical Pill), Simple Possession of Schedule VI (Marijuana), and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Each has a bond of \$50,000.

Household Hazardous Waste Disposal In Henry County on Saturday

PARIS — The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) mobile household hazardous waste collection service will be in Henry County on Saturday, Aug. 26.

The drop-off location is: Henry County Recycling Center, 450 Recycling Dr., Paris, Tenn., 8 a.m.-1 p.m. The contact is Ron Watkins at (731) 641-0018.

Tennesseans are encouraged to bring household hazardous waste – including cleaning fluids, pesticides, swimming pool chemicals and more – to a designated drop-off location. A person does not need to live in the county to participate.

“We are pleased to provide this opportunity to dispose of household hazardous waste properly,” Commissioner David Salyers of the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation said. “We want to make it as convenient as possible for Tennesseans to demonstrate their commitment to protecting the environment.”

Since the program’s in-

ception in 1993, more than 370,000 Tennessee households have properly disposed of more than 24 million pounds of material. There have been over 1,450 one-day collection events.

Household hazardous waste materials are considered flammable, toxic, reactive and/or corrosive and should not be placed with regular garbage. Typical items to dispose of include cleaning fluids, pesticides, mercury thermometers and thermostats, fluorescent lamps, lithium and button batteries, aerosols, adhesives, medications, brake fluid, swimming pool chemicals, paint thinner and used needles in sturdy containers. Items not accepted include ammunition, explosives, alkaline batteries, paint, electronics, and any empty containers that should be disposed in normal trash. There is no cost or appointment necessary for household hazardous waste collection.

While household waste may be disposed for free, there is a cost for disposal of Very Small Quantity

Generator Waste (i.e. wastes from non-household sources such as businesses, schools, farms, churches, etc.). An appointment is also necessary. Call (615) 643-3170 to request a price quote and schedule an appointment.

Many counties and municipalities meet the needs of local residents by providing collection of batteries, oil, paint, antifreeze and electronic scrap – or BOPAE, as it is sometimes called. When handled correctly, these BOPAE materials are minimally hazardous, but inappropriate for collection at household hazardous waste events. Tennesseans are encouraged to contact their local city or county solid waste department to find BOPAE collection sites in their area.

When transporting materials to the site, place containers in sturdy boxes lined with newspaper or plastic to prevent spills and cross-contamination in the trunk of a car or back of a truck. Be sure to keep materials away from children and pets.

to assist in paying for projects which include replacing 50,000 linear feet of asbestos water lines along with adding a new water tank near Lake Halford. The department recently received an 80/20 grant in the neighborhood of \$7 million. Without raising utility rates at an astronomical rate, the \$500,000 request would allow the utility district to meet the 2-year goal.

Members of the commission asked if there was a need for a new tower which was answered in the affirmative as it would serve residents near Lake Halford. It was also noted the utility district is doing an average of 6 taps a month, so line improvements and increased reserves are necessary.

Resolution 8-02-2023 to pledge \$20,000 of American Rescue Plan Act Funds to the McKenzie Industrial Development Board (IDB) for

signage at McKenzie Industrial Park South which is home to the Carroll County Airport was met with some static from some commissions. The \$20,000 pledge would purchase one of two signs for the IDB.

Questions were raised about why the IDB did not use grant money to purchase the sign as the County Chamber did a few months back. The answer was currently there is no available grant money. It was also asked who would own the signs which ownership would be long to the McKenzie’s IDB. Monica Heath, executive director of the IDB, informed commissioners the previous signs were past the point of repair and once the highway is widened near Rochelle Road then TDOT will inform the IDB of the best location of the signage.

The \$20,000 pledge for the signage was approved by a 13-5 vote. Commissioners voting against McKenzie receiving the funding were Philip Moore - Westport, Daniel Wilman - Huntingdon, Joey Simmons - Hollow Rock, Larry Spencer - Bruceton, and Daniel Thomas

- Hollow Rock.

Resolution 8-01-2023 to amend the General Fund Budget for Fiscal Year 2023-24 was approved. The amendment of the current budget was for the county clerk’s office to purchase office equipment in the amounts of \$720, \$1,010, \$1,907.34 and a bonus payout of \$7,200. Each expenditure comes at the recommendation from MTAS for the county clerk’s office to use some of its reserve funds. The line items were accidentally left off of the original budget by an accidental oversight.

The following were elected as notaries: A. M. Hand, Be Holmes, W. Scott Kolwyck, Karen Reeves, Lisa Stewart, James R. Taylor and Diana L. Williams.

Commissioners not present for the meeting were Joey Darnall and Lin Smith.

The next regular meeting of the Carroll County Commission is September 11 at 7 p.m. at the Carroll County Office Complete on High Street in Huntingdon.

storm and resulting water damage occurred.

Much of the damage was in the smaller, second-floor courtroom. Butler said wall plaster, ceiling tiles, lighting, carpets were damaged.

In the Chancery Court’s Clerk and Master’s Office on the first floor, sustained similar damage. The Juvenile Services Office on the first floor were similarly damaged.

Restore Rite arrived on July 19 and performed remediation work. Servall Restoration followed Restore Rite.

The County of Carroll’s insurance provider is the Local Government Insurance Pool - a service of many governments who use one provider to ‘pool’ their insurance risks.

Preliminary inspections indicate many exterior windows need replacing, including those on the third floor that are overlaid to block the windows. Butler said wiring, windows, and other repairs might be necessary.

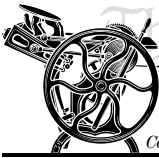
The Chancery Court and Juvenile Services offices have the option to move to Mustang Drive in the state-owned building occupied by Tennessee Department Labor and Workforce Development.

Butler said the county

will have to pay a portion of the costs of repairs along with any needed renovations.

The architect was Architectural Resources Group and the contractor was Barger Construction Company. The building was further renovated in 2005. The architect was TML Associates, Inc. and the contractor was Lashlee-Rich, Inc.

The county of Carroll retired the debt in 2012 for the 2005 remodel.

Pioneering a Legacy in Tennessee's Wilderness

In the rugged and majestic embrace of East Tennessee's untamed wilderness, a saga of courage, resilience, and determination began to unfold, with the Crockett family at its core. At the center of this narrative stood David Crockett, a legend in the making. Born on a balmy August day in 1786, within the rustic confines of a cabin aptly named "Limestone," David's arrival marked the dawn of an era defined by exploration, hardship, and triumph.

John and Rebecca Crockett, Maryland natives, embarked on a transformative journey, leaving behind their familiar shores to forge a new life amidst the sprawling landscapes of Tennessee. Their nine children, of whom David was the luminous fifth, bore witness to the dedication and grit that would come to define the Crockett name.

The late 18th century in East Tennessee was a realm of raw nature and unyielding challenges. It was a crucible that forged the Crocketts' resilience, as they toiled against the elements to carve out a semblance of stability. It was within this crucible that David's character took shape. The wild expanses of woods, fields, and streams became his playground and his classroom. It was here that he honed his survival skills, crafting a rifle with his own hands and mastering the art of marksmanship, a skill that would become emblematic of his identity.

When David was 12 years old, his father indentured him to Jacob Siler to help with the Crockett family indebtedness. He helped tend Siler's cattle as a cowboy on a 400-mile trip to near Natural

Bridge in Virginia. He was well treated and paid for his services but, after several weeks in Virginia, he decided to return home to Tennessee. The next year, John enrolled his sons in school, but David played hooky after an altercation with a fellow student. David then joined a cattle drive to Front Royal, Virginia for Jesse Cheek. Upon completion of that trip, he joined teamster Adam Myers on a trip to Gerrardstown, West Virginia. In between trips with Myers, he worked for farmer John Gray. After leaving Myers, he journeyed to Christiansburg, Virginia, where he apprenticed for the next four years with hatter Elijah Griffith.

In 1802, David journeyed by foot back to his father's tavern in Tennessee. His father was in debt to Abraham Wilson for \$36, so David was hired out to Wilson to pay off the debt. Later, he worked off a \$40 debt to John Canady. Once the debts were paid, John Crockett told his son that he was free to leave. David returned to Canady's employment, where he stayed for four years.

As David's footsteps led him further into adulthood, his heart found its echo in the spirited Mary "Polly" Finley. Their union in 1806 was a marriage of kindred spirits, forged by shared values and a mutual love for the untamed wilderness. Settling in Jefferson County, they embarked on a journey of their own, welcoming the births of John Wesley, William Finley, and Margaret. The Crockett family lineage began to intertwine itself with the fabric of East Tennessee, a testament to their endurance and commitment.

The looming specter of the War of 1812 cast a shadow over the young nation, heralding a turning point in David Crockett's life. In 1813, he heeded the call of duty, enlisting in the local



militia under the command of Colonel John Coffee. On the battlefield of the Creek War, Crockett's unflinching courage and natural leadership shone brightly, earning him the revered title of "Colonel." As the war's tumultuous echoes faded, Crockett returned to his family, his heart swelling with pride and determination.

Yet, destiny had more challenges in store. Financial troubles had besieged his father, John Crockett, threatening to tarnish the family's hard-earned reputation. marked by his unyielding commitment to military service. Ascending the ranks, he assumed the roles of Justice of the Peace and Lieutenant Colonel of the Fifty-seventh Regiment of Tennessee Militia. These appointments underscored his leadership acumen and unwavering dedication to his community and his country.

Through the intricate interplay of family legacy, unwavering resilience, and an indomitable commitment to honor, David Crockett's life emerged as an epic tale of courage and service. The flames ignited by his love for the wilderness, his unbreakable bonds with family, and his relentless pursuit of integrity continued to blaze a trail toward greatness. As the chapters of history unfolded, the story of David Crockett remains an enduring testament to the power of the human spirit. Next edition, I will conclude the story of David Crockett as things turn bad at the Alamo.

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Get Out That Record Player

Get out that old record player and join the current revolution of listening to music.

Vinyl records are making a comeback - in a big way.

In 2022, for the second year in a row — and only the second year since Luminate began tracking music sales in 1991 — vinyl albums outsold CD albums in the U.S. Vinyl continues to be the leading format for album purchases for the second straight year, according to figures announced in the U.S. 2022 Luminate Year-End Music Report. This is according to a story in Billboard Magazine.

Vinyl was the dominant format for album purchases in the U.S. up until the early 1980s. After that, cassettes took hold until the early 1990s, when the CD format blossomed and remained king until 2021.

As a child in the 1960s, my friend and I often walked into Marie's Cafe in downtown McKenzie to play the pinball machine. Marie's was where the The Nook park is located in downtown on Lee Street. It was just a two-mile bicycle ride from our adjacent homes in Moore Subdivision.

Keith Purvis and I would order a burger and slip a quarter in the jukebox as we played the pinball machine. It was fascinating to watch the jukebox search for that 45 rpm record, place it on the turntable and set the needle to begin playing the music. I remember playing the Beatles' 'Jo Jo' on Marie's jukebox. Occasionally, Marie bonused us some coins to

keep the music playing.

Vinyl records were in various speeds - 33, 45, and 78 RPM, the speed denoted revolutions per minute. The singles were generally 45 and the LPs - long plays were 33.

When I bought the old vacated WHDM studio building in downtown McKenzie, I also inherited some 45s to add to my collection. Amongst the "On Air" signs and the records, nothing else was left. The radio station had gone 'dark' (off the air) a few years following the death of the owner.

Kids of the late 60s purchased vinyl records from The Flip, a record store owned by Charles Dangeau. It was located on Main Street across from Smith and Smith Optometry.

My first record player was a clamshell, portable model. Later, the family purchased a piece of furniture with 8-track, record player and AM-FM radio inside. I inherited that as part of my mother's estate. Everything on it works, sans the record player, which needs a needle.

Through the years, I followed the trend of vinyl, 8-track, cassette and MP3s. Music purists do not like the compressed music formats, such as MP3s. There is certainly something lacking. And now you know why vinyl has made such a comeback.

So get out that turntable and listen to some quality recordings of music on vinyl to experience what you have been missing.

Writer Says Hog Barns Stink

Three years ago I wrote a letter to the editor about a CAFO (Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation) of two wean-to-finish hog barns that were proposed to be built in the Big Buck Community northwest of Huntingdon.

An applicant in our area was applying for USDA Farm Service Agency funding. In composing my letter, I chose to follow the approach that worked so well for over 43 years in research at Control Data. Just present the facts; and the answer, of course, will be obvious. For instance, I referenced a study by the University of California that revealed that people who lived within 9842 feet of a hog CAFO had an 81% increase in memory loss and a 73% loss of balance. Those two are just a smidgen from the pages of ill effects the residents suffered. I also pointed out that there are 220 homes within this 9842 foot circle for health issues. I also stayed away from emotional, non-quantitative statements such as Oh - it will smell. That choice was also backed up by as a youth working in a farm supply store where I delivered feed, grain, and concentrate to local farms.

The smell of cattle, hogs, and chickens (as a youth) did not seem objectional on these small family farms. Even my sister-in-law's family farm with a dozen pigs was no problem. I hate to admit it, but I was so incredibly wrong.

The hog barns in the Big Buck Community have now been in operation for about a month. Over five thousand (5,000) confined pigs produce a stench that is unbelievable. Anytime the

wind blows from that direction it stinks. In the evening or anytime the wind stops the odor builds to the point you can not stay outdoors. It penetrates into our barn, shop, and house. In fact, I am writing this now because I was driven out of my shop by the foul odor.

We have over an acre of gardens and fruit trees that are presently going to weeds because it is impossible to garden in such a terrible stinky environment. Being outside doesn't just burn the eyes, it makes you cough . . . a cough that gets deeper the longer you stay outside. In the last week, I have had three occasions where the cough had me doubled up and throwing up.

You might say, why should I care? I don't live in Big Buck. Well if you do a little research online you will find that when corporate farms discover a county that has no restrictions on CAFOs, they flock in like a bunch of vultures and overwhelm the area.

There is no place in those counties where you can go to get away from it. Presently Carroll County has no restrictions on placing CAFOs. The residents of the Big Buck Community had appeared at the County Commissioners' meetings and were only given 5 minutes. The commissioners did not even discuss the subject. Unless you want a CAFO built next to you, and totally destroy your life, take action and talk to your county commissioner(s) and get their position. Express your concern.

What's that old adage about not missing the water till the well runs dry.... It came to life when I woke up from the operation and couldn't see jack squat out of my right eye. A detached retina is not a thing of beauty.

Part of the "treatment" is lying face down 45 minutes out of every hour for the first week or so. Without moving! It sure gives you some thinking time. And most of that naturally dwells on the blurry (pun absolutely intended) future of your eyesight.

You'd think a little anger would be in order. Or at the very least, the ole "why does everything always happen to me?" syndrome would dance across your thoughts. I reckon I could blame it on God. Or bad luck....

But interestingly enough,

none of those things came to mind.

As I lay as motionless as possible staring at the fuzzy vacuum swirls in the carpet I began to see a robin "clear as a bell" building a nest in a mimosa tree. We had lots of better places for a nest. The cedar tree in the backyard was perfect. We had four elm trees along Stonewall Street that could support a home any bird would be proud of.

The robin chose the mimosa. For reasons known only to her. The nest certainly was not hidden by the sparsely placed branches and the small leaves. I was seven or eight years old. And from my front row seat on the side porch, I sat most of a whole day watching that thing being put together, twig by twig, in perfect 20/20 living color vision.

Without the imposed medical "time out" I doubt seriously the home building robin would have ever again crossed my mind. It was a sight to behold! And when I was young and life was fresh and full of wonderment, I beheld it! From that same porch I would sit in the late afternoons and watch the sun drop behind the cotton fields across the road. They take pictures and write books about those scenes today. We mostly took it for granted. It went down about like that every day.

I was standing on the brought-in sand at that little beach area in the Paris Landing State Park when Leon jumped off the bridge over the Tennessee River. I saw distinctly his arms and legs waving to us right before he hit the water.

There are just some times when you need good eyesight more than others. I was so blessed to have it when it really counted!

I saw the young girl in the blue bathing suit with

the yellow belt spring up out of the water with abject clarity. I was on the life-guard stand on the other side of the pool. And even with the bright sun reflecting off the bouncing waves I could tell she was the prettiest thing I had ever seen.

I stood back stage at the Grand Ole Opry and saw Johnny Cash mesmerize the crowd with, "I Walk the Line." I stood beside Mr. Cunningham's cabin just north of Jackson, Wyoming, and was just as mesmerized by the height and breadth of the snow-capped Teton Mountains. I stood with head bowed above the Arizona in Pearl Harbor's murky water and saw the oil leaking message from the heroes buried below.

I've seen sons and grandchildren reaching out to me like I was the most important person in their world....

These old eyes have been so faithful over the years. And, boy howdy, the sights we have taken in! I'm not about to start complaining now.

This momentary "time out" has reminded me again of how blessed we all are.

During one of the 15 minutes of not staring at the rug, I peered over at the girl that 57 years ago bounded up out of the water in that blue bathing suit. She has made a lifetime out of taking care of me. And she is still the most absolute, drop dead gorgeous, best looking, most beautiful girl on earth.... 'course, you've got to remember, I'm not exactly seeing very clearly this morning....

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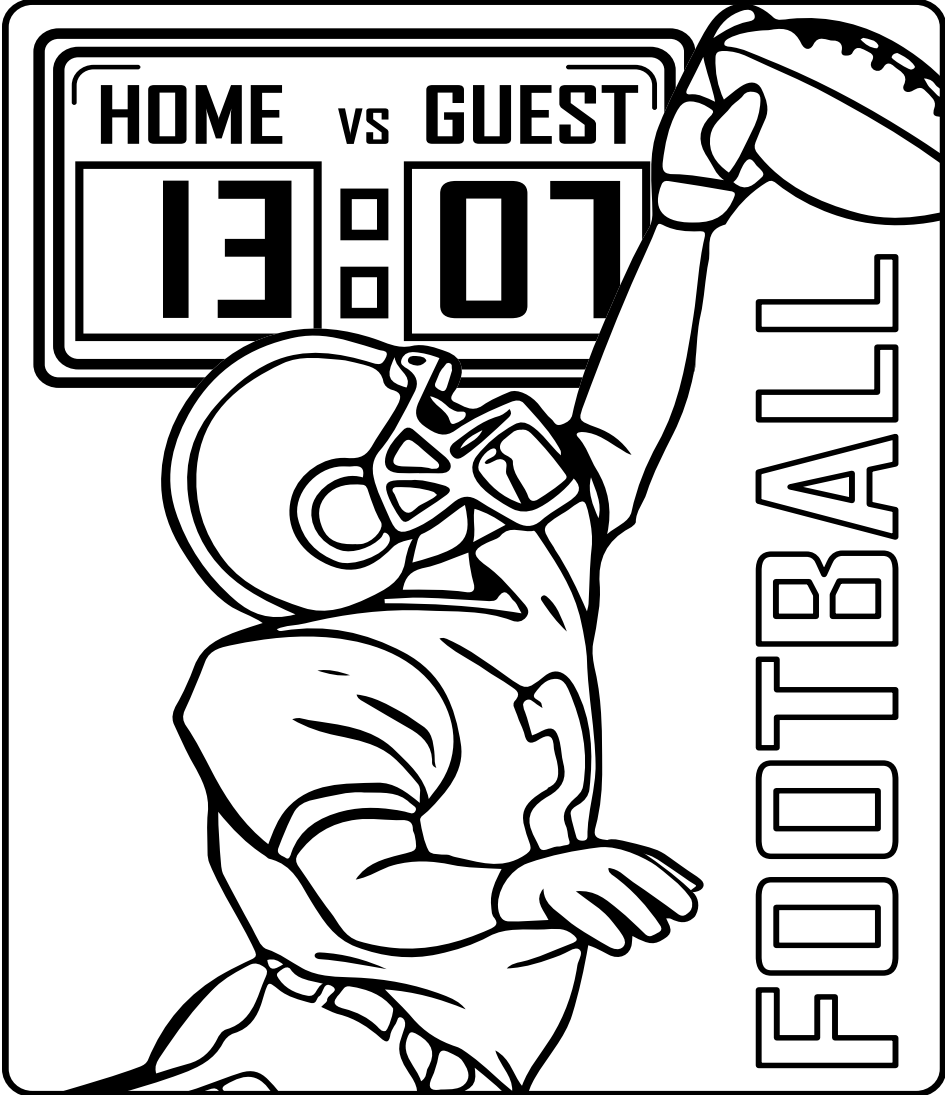

Rebels Break Mustangs in Home Opener

Errors Prove Costly for Huntingdon

MCKENZIE (August 18) — For the fourth consecutive season, the McKenzie Rebels have defeated their cross-county rivals, the Huntingdon Mustangs. The 28-12, week one, home opening, win put the Rebels on the correct path to defending their 2022 state championship.

The teams were evenly matched but turnover and penalties proved to be the Achilles heel for Huntingdon.

Looking at the stats, McKenzie ran 41 plays to Huntingdon's 65. The Rebels accumulated 285 total yards compared to the 252 yards by the Mustangs. In passing yards the Rebels led 134 to 46 yards but Huntingdon outrushed McKenzie 206 to 151. The Mustangs led McKenzie 15-7 on first downs with a 56% conversion rate on third down. Huntingdon had 3 turnovers.

In individual stats, for passing Tate Surber was 8 of 14 for 134 yards and two

touchdowns while Gray Eubanks was 6 of 15 for 46 yards and one touchdown. In rushing, leading the pack for McKenzie as Surber with 13 carries for 74 and one touchdown followed by Ryan McCreary with one carry for 62 yards and Drew Chappell with five carries for 12 yards. Stafford Roditis led McKenzie in receiving with four catches for 101 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, leading the way with tackles was Chappell with 9, followed by Surber and Craegen Travis with four each, then Dalton Hatley with three and Colt Norden with two.

The Mustangs won the coin toss and deferred to the second half feeling confident in their defense. Eubanks' kick was fielded by Norton with the tackle coming about midfield, Huntingdon was assessed with an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty after a Mustang speared a downed Norton. This gave the Rebels excellent field position at the Mustang 35-yard line. McKenzie relied on

the pass four straight plays picking up the first down. Surber picked up the second first down on second-and-six from the Huntingdon 16-yard line. On third-and-goal from the three-yard line, McKenzie was flagged for holding, the officials placed the ball 10 yards further from the goal line. One third-and-goal from the 15-yard line, Surber passed to Roditis for the first TD of the night. Roditis tackled on the PAT giving the Rebels the early lead 7-0 with 7:09 to play in the first quarter.

Huntingdon found themselves deep in their own territory to start their opening offensive drive. From the 15-yard line, the Mustang offense picked up one yard and was forced to punt on fourth down.

The Rebels went three-and-out on their next possession after Surber was sacked by Easton Byars and Kaleb Pearson. McKenzie punted the ball to the opposing 33-yard line only to be returned to midfield.

The Mustangs were able to score on their next pos-

session. With 3:20 to play in the opening quarter, Ashton Hutcherson led the rushing attack. On third-and-three, Hutcherson broke a tackle and looked like he was almost down but recovered, picking up a 44-yard touchdown. The extra point went wide as McKenzie held the first-quarter lead at 7-6.

The second quarter was a back-and-forth between the two well-matched teams. The Rebels were forced to punt on fourth-and-long on their opening possession of the quarter. Huntingdon, starting out at their 29-yard line, was able to cross midfield and eat up a tremendous amount of the clock. The drive stalled at the 41-yard line, forcing the Mustangs to punt.

With the ball down at the 9-yard line, McKenzie had a long way to go if they planned on increasing their lead before halftime. On first-and-ten from the nine, Surber hit Roditis with a hot pass for a 91-yard touchdown reception. Roditis added the extra point as the Rebel led 14-6 with 6:25 to play in the half.

Huntingdon looked to respond but an untimely penalty and an interception gave McKenzie the ball

back with less than five minutes to play.

Luckily for the Mustangs, their defense forced the Rebels to turn the ball over on downs. Starting at the McKenzie 40-yard line, Huntingdon was able to matriculate the ball down field at the perfect pace. With 13 seconds to play in the first half, Eubanks called his own number for the touchdown. Hutcherson looked to tie the game with the two-point conversion but it failed as McKenzie led 14-12. With about five seconds to play in the half, Surber took a knee.

The third quarter opened with the Mustangs having solid field position. Runs by Eubanks, Hutcherson and Brady Warbritton got Huntingdon to midfield. At the McKenzie 42-yard line, the drive came to an end with a turnover on downs from an incomplete pass.

While Huntingdon remained scoreless for the second half, the Rebels capitalized on the mistake in four plays. Out of the shotgun, Surber was flushed from the pocket and scrambled free for 51 yards before the ball popped out at the 7-yard line. On first-and-goal, Surber picked up five

yards and then the TD from 2 yards out. Roditis hit his third PAT as McKenzie's lead increased to 21-12.

Moving to the fourth quarter, the Rebels opened the final 12 minutes of play with the ball but were forced to punt with less than 10 minutes to play.

With time working against the Mustangs, the team hustled the ball down to the McKenzie 34-yard line. On third-and-three, Huntingdon fumbled the ball and the Rebels' Dalton Hatley recovered. Taking over at the Huntingdon 38-yard line, from the I-formation, McKenzie's McCreary busted through the middle on a fullback dive for the 62-yard touchdown. Roditis hit the final point of the night, capping the score at 28-12. Huntingdon had the ball for most of the remaining six minutes but was unable to capitalize.

Next week, McKenzie hosts non-region 1A for Dresden. Kickoff is at 7 p.m. Week two for Huntingdon is a bye week but they return to the field at home for homecoming September 1 to play the Adamsville Cardinals.
