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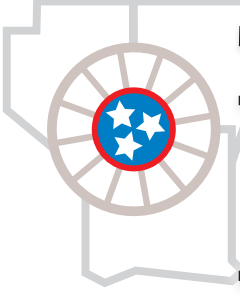

Charges Reduced In Cedar Grove Murder Case

HUNTINGDON (June 5) — Joseph Wert, 21, of 660 Moss Creek Road in Cedar Grove now faces Second Degree Murder charges, reduced from first degree, after a preliminary hearing in Carroll County General Sessions Court on Friday, June 5.

Judge Larry Logan ruled Wert did not premeditate the murder of Larry Watkins, Jr., 46, when he admittedly shot him after an altercation between the two neighbors. Wert was bound over to the September term of the Grand Jury of the Carroll County Circuit Court.

Wert is free on bond and confined to his home, where he lives with his parents. Logan expanded the geographic region for Wert to travel with his parents to include medical appointments and church. Otherwise, he cannot travel beyond State Route 220 in this very rural part of Carroll County.

During the hearing, the defendant, his attorneys, and representatives from the D.A.'s office all wore face masks as part of the court's safety protocol during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Assistant District Attorney Jimbo Webb presented evidence for the State, which included the playing of the 4:56 p.m., January 14, 911 emergency call to the Carroll County Sheriff's Department. Joseph's mom made the call and the dispatcher kept her on the open phone line as long as possible to get as much pertinent information as possible. In the recording, one can here Joseph admit he shot Watkins, who Wert said was waving a gun.

Four Carroll County deputies arrived at the scene including Mike Mulligan, Scotty Davis, Jason Walker and Steven Scott. They secured the area and erected perimeter crime scene tape. Sheriff Andy Dickson and

West Carroll School Board Approves Chromebook Bid

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ATWOOD (June 4) — The West Carroll Special School District Board of Education met Thursday at the junior-senior high school. Board members took a crucial vote to approve a bid for Chromebooks and discussed plans for action on the new budget.

At the recommendation of technology coordinator Sheila Brawner, the board unanimously approved the lowest received bid of \$36,000 for 150 Lenovo Chromebooks from Konica Minolta. The units include rubberized cases.

The 150 laptop computers, when added to the current stockpile, will achieve the district's goal of having enough for each student in grades three through 12.

After much discussion, the board agreed to meet for a budget work session on June 15. If possible, the session will be attended by Brad Davis, regional finance

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Fifty-Three Indicted by Carroll County Grand Jury

Resident, Two Staff Members Test Positive for COVID-19 at HCHC

PARIS — During the last week of May, Henry County Healthcare Center tested 179 residents and staff for COVID-19 as required by Governor Bill Lee and the State of Tennessee. HCHC received notification that one resident and two staff members have tested positive for COVID-19, but all three cases are asymptomatic. The one resident has been retested and results are negative for COVID-19.

Since the first guidance from CMS and the CDC, which came out in March, HCHC has taken all the appropriate actions to ensure the safety and wellbeing of residents and staff to prevent or reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19. This included altering the normal operations of the facility and creating a separate wing with separate staff.

HCHC continues to provide face masks for residents and social distancing is enforced. In addition, all staff is using personal protective equipment as recommended by the CDC. HCHC has notified our local and state public health official and continue daily monitoring and education regarding hand hygiene, cleaning of equipment used for patient care and continued restrictions on visitations, dining and group activities.

“We are doing everything we can to help prevent COVID-19 among our residents and partners,” said Sandra Ray, Administrator at Henry County Healthcare Center. “We are in contact with our residents’ families and we have recently updated our website to provide information dedicated specifically to HCHC COVID-19 information and updates. We want to assure everyone we have

our residents’ safety on the forefront of all we are doing.”

Due to government privacy requirements, HCHC cannot divulge specific information about any individual who has confirmed or suspected COVID-19, except to the specific family members who have permissions to receive such information.

HCHC understands that connecting with family members is incredibly important to its residents. Family members are encouraged to connect with their loved ones through video chat, calling, texting, email or on social media. NASHVILLE — Secretary of State Tre Hargett recently announced a new statewide campaign to recruit poll officials for the August 6 State and Federal Primary and County General Election. Tennesseans can apply now to join the campaign, Be a Patriot. Become a Poll Official.

“Poll officials are the backbone of successful elections across Tennessee,” said Secretary Hargett. “By raising your hand to become a poll official, you will have a front-row seat to democracy during early voting and on Election Day.”

Poll officials perform various tasks to help polling sites run smoothly, including greeting voters, answering questions, processing voters, explaining how to cast a ballot and counting votes. Any voter

is eligible to apply, regardless of political affiliation.

Qualifications to be a poll official include: be a registered voter if 18 or older; be at least 16 years old; not be a candidate or close relative of a candidate; and be able to read and write in the English language.

The following government employees can also serve as poll officials: city, county or metro employees, unless working directly under the supervision of an elected official on the ballot; State of Tennessee employee; and federal employees. Consult your Human Resources department to ensure eligibility.

Poll officials are compensated for working during early voting and on Election Day, as well as for attending required training sessions.

Tennessee COVID-19 Cases, Deaths Rise over Week; One New Case in Henry County

NASHVILLE (June 8) — According to the Tennessee Department of Health, the number of positive cases of COVID-19 in Tennessee stands at 26,944, with 17,563 of those recovered and 421 died in the year 2020.

As of Monday, there are 26,944 (up from 23,554 last Monday) positive cases and a total of 421 (up from 367 deaths last week). The numbers represent

the total number of positive cases during the 2020 pandemic.

In Carroll County, there has been one death, 24 recovered and 28 (unchanged from last Monday) positive cases. A total of 1,486 (1,380 last Monday) were diagnosed as negative.

In Henry County, 29 have recovered of 32 (31 last Monday) positive cases and 1,789 tested negative.

In Weakley County, 25 have recovered of 26 (unchanged from last Monday) positive cases and 1,551 tested negative.

In the United States, as of Monday, a total of 1,938,823 (1,787,680 last Monday) positive cases were reported in 2020 with 110,375 (104,396 last Monday) deaths, according to Centers for Disease Control.

Thelma Kee was born to Ken Kee and Eunie Pinkley Kee on January 14, 1908, on a farm in Yuma just outside of Clarksburg, Tennessee. She had two brothers, Ray and Ben, Jr.

Growing up on a farm, she was no stranger to hard work. Many days she walked almost a mile to the back of the farm to pick blackberries for jelly and canning. The family did not have a car, going to church and school meant traveling by foot, buggy or wagon. It wasn't until she was teaching school that her father bought his first car, a Model T.

She attended country schools in her early grades, finishing at Clarksburg in 1924, graduating at age 16. Her father wouldn't let her go to college until the following year. Thelma then went to West Tennessee State Teachers College later known as Memphis State University. She eventually earned her bachelor's degree from Bethel College in 1950.

She obtained a four-year teaching certificate after one year of college, so at age 18, Thelma began teaching at the little country school called Argo. The school was located about four miles west of Trezevant. Her older brother, Ray, taught grades five through eight while she taught grades one through four at the school.

After a year at Argo, she taught at Center Ridge, a school west of Clarksburg. In the winter she boarded with the Cecil Wall family living at home with parents the rest of the year.

It was while she was living at home she met Otis Cox. He had moved to Clarksburg to teach agriculture around 1928. She taught at Hico for a couple of years before they married in 1930.

The couple remained in Clarksburg for the first seven years of their marriage, it was during this time they had two children; James William "Bill" and Joan.

In 1937, they moved to McKenzie when Otis accepted a position at McKenzie High School to teach agriculture. After the birth of their daughter, Thelma took a hiatus from teaching. After Joan completed the fifth grade, Thelma returned to teaching and taught for 26 years in the McKenzie system. She started teaching at McKenzie at the fifth-grade level, teaching in eight different grades over her tenure. She finished her career with seventh-grade math and science.

She joked, "I wouldn't teach high school for love nor money. They'd put me in jail the first week because I wouldn't let them talk back to me and they do that now and parents take up for them, and I think that's sad. Teaching school is nothing like it used to be - they didn't do me that way, or they didn't do it but once."

"I still have my paddle. I never did use it much but all I had to do was take it out of my desk drawer and put it up there on the desk and never say a word."

One year space was limited at the elementary school so she and her class were assigned next door to the high school. Some of the students she had that year were Jackie Hall, Charlene Penick and Kent Jones; Kent and Charlene later married.

Otis Leon Cox was born in Kirksey, Kentucky on June 18, 1899, to James William Cox and Mary Paulina Killebrew Cox. He was the sixth of ten children, six girls and four boys.

He graduated from high school and received two years of college at Murray State University. He then began teaching school in Southern

and Central Kentucky. In 1929, he received his Bachelor of Science degree in agriculture from Western Kentucky and began teaching at Clarksburg.

His life as an ag teacher was a busy one. He was ready to help the farmers of the community with friendly advice. In addition to regular classwork, he taught night classes for farmers. Otis loved the soil and worked to teach soil conservation. His dedication and kind disposition made him a valuable assist to McKenzie and Carroll County.

In 1954, he was elected Superintendent of Education.

Otis's career spanned over 35 years in Tennessee. He taught eight years at Clarksburg, 17 years at McKenzie and served as Carroll County Superintendent for eight years. After he retired he finished out a school year in Paris and then taught part of a year in Trezevant.

Otis was an elder at the McKenzie Church of Christ and a member of the Lions Club. He died in 1983. Thelma was eight years younger than her husband and continued to live in their home on Magnolia Avenue.

She later moved to Lake-side Senior Living Community where she enjoyed passing the time playing cards, reading and playing her piano. Thelma remained in McKenzie until 2001 when she moved to Hickory Woods Retirement Center in Murray, Kentucky. In October 2005, she moved back to McKenzie until her death on April 18, 2006.

Both are buried at Carroll Memorial Gardens in McKenzie.

As a concerned citizen of Big Buck Community, I am opposed to the construction of two wean-to-finish hog barns on Bright Road off Renfroe Road in Huntingdon, Carroll County. I am writing this from the perspective of a dietitian with an advanced degree in community health.

Corporate livestock facilities, known as concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs), threatens the health of communities and pollutes the air and water. CAFO-related pollution is more than a nuisance, it is dangerous. Manure from CAFOs contains more than 150 pathogens that have the potential to contaminate water supplies, while fumes and particulate matter elevate rates of asthma, lung disease, and bronchitis among farm workers and people living nearby. Confining large numbers of animals in

close proximity requires routine antibiotic regimens, and this, in turn, exacerbates the global crisis of antibiotic resistance.

Today the pork, broiler chicken, and beef sectors are highly concentrated in the hands of a few companies that exercise enormous market power, and control the practices used across these facilities. CAFOs are tailored to produce vast quantities of meat, eggs, and dairy that can be sold to consumers at low prices. However, these low consumer prices hide true cost of production. Supermarket prices do not account for the fact that the public heavily subsidizes CAFOs through the United States' vast system of agricultural price supports and subsidies.

This proposed site will house two hog barns, each holding 2,600

head (5,200 total). Each barn will generate 800,000 gallons of manure (1,600,000 gallons total) annually. Manure will be applied to field around the barns and injected and applied spring or fall prior to crop planting.

Localized harms include impaired drinking water, antibiotic resistance, air pollution and waste spills. More than 150 pathogens are found in animal manure. Six of these, *Campylobacter*, *Salmonella*, *Listeria*, *E. coli*, *Cryptosporidium*, and *Giardia*, account for 90 percent of all human foodborne and waterborne diseases. Though healthy people who are exposed to these pathogens often recover after a bout of diarrhea, more vulnerable groups, and those with weak immune systems are at risk of severe illness or death.

Odors can harm a community's quality of life, preventing people from spending time outside, and even impacting mental health.

I am fighting for clean water and breathable air in my community. Citizens concerned with the environmental and health threats that CAFOs pose to their communities must demand much more from their representatives at the local, state and federal levels. Just because it's not illegal, it doesn't make it right.

The Issue About Police, Guns

There are no laws which properly cover the prosecution of police officers, and it would be very difficult to create laws which could.

Police are protected by the fact (ideally) that they act at the behest of the State to enforce its laws. This is a requirement for having police. Without that protection, they would be unable to enforce the laws.

All anyone would have to do is walk away and the police would be unable to arrest him/her for fear of assault and battery charges. This is why it's so incredibly difficult to get

convictions such as the case in the Freddie Gray incident, where all of the charges resulted in either acquittals or were dropped.

That said, how do we go about "fixing" what is in and of itself a fundamental requirement of the police? You can hire all the "good" people you want, but eventually they will have to be the "bad cop" and force compliance because there will inevitably be a situation where talking doesn't work. That's the nature of the beast.

Physically restraining another individual involves risk. You could probably develop a set of laws specifically governing law enforcement, which require certain minimum standards of safety be maintained, and have punishments associated with not meeting those standards. But if you tie the hands of law enforcement too much, laws will not be enforced.

On the issue of eliminating

police...This puts the anti-gun crowd in a bit of a pickle. Their claim is you don't need a gun because the police are there to protect you. Now there is talk of eliminating police in some cities. Will they then claim everyone needs guns?

Concealed Carry Permits and Castle Laws enable a lot of people to police themselves. Where I (we) live CC Permits are relatively easy to obtain. Along with that your car is also considered part of your castle. It is legal to have loaded handguns in your cars and any loaded legal guns and any number of them in your house. No permit(s) required. That is not the case everywhere. Criminals are not all stupid. They know the difference between easy and hard targets. If you think cities are lawless now, wait till you take away the police.

MCKENZIE — Pope's Concessions of Greenfield set up several of its food trailers at the McKenzie Plaza shopping center over the weekend.

The business, which has provided concessions and rides for events in the region for 90 years, was deeply affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Fortunately, she says, most of the fairs in west Tennessee are still set to occur, but that depends on the conditions as the events approach.

To keep the business running

and to provide some of the beloved treats people are missing, Pope's has set up some of its concession trailers in towns including McKenzie, Trenton, Milan, Humboldt, Union City and Alamo, though Pope laments that their many rides must sit idle.

Pope noted that the business is also giving back by giving a percentage of profits to food pantries and other charities in the towns where they set up.

Pope said, "We feel for those that have been sick, and we feel for those that haven't been able to do anything during this time."

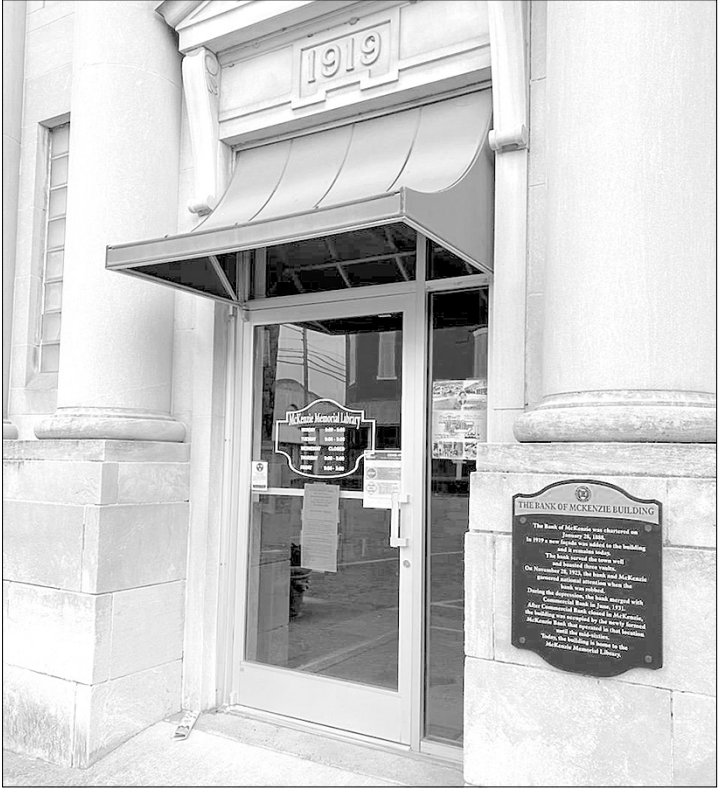
Guests may come in on a first come, first served basis. When there are five people inside, others will be placed on a waiting list.

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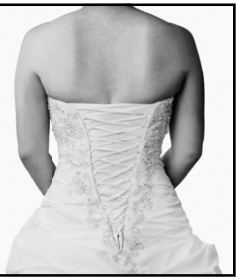

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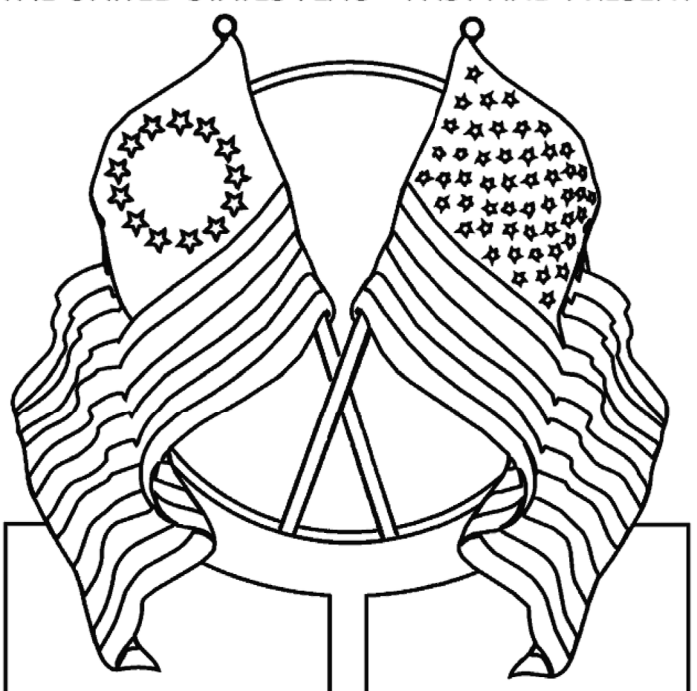
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THE UNITED STATES FLAG - PAST AND PRESENT
