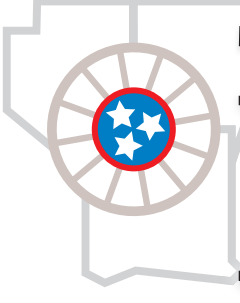

McKenzie Man Killed In Two-Car Accident

TREZEVANT (June 23) — A McKenzie man was killed in a two-car collision on Tuesday, June 23 on U.S. 79 near the intersection of Wingo Circle.

According to a report by the Tennessee Highway Patrol, Corey Douglas, 33, McKenzie was driving a 1999 Acura on U.S. 79 when he collided head-on with a 2017 Toyota 4-Runner driven by Amanda Crowe, 28, of Martin.

Douglas died at the scene while his daughter, Jovi Garner, 10 was injured and airlifted from the scene. Garner is recuperating with an injury to her arm.

The report indicates Crowe was also injured but does not list the extent of the injuries.

The highway was closed for an extensive amount of time.

Trezevant Fire Department, McKenzie Fire Department Rescue, THP, McKenzie Police, Carroll County Sheriff’s Department and Baptist EMS responded to the scene.

Douglas and Garner were extricated from the vehicle.

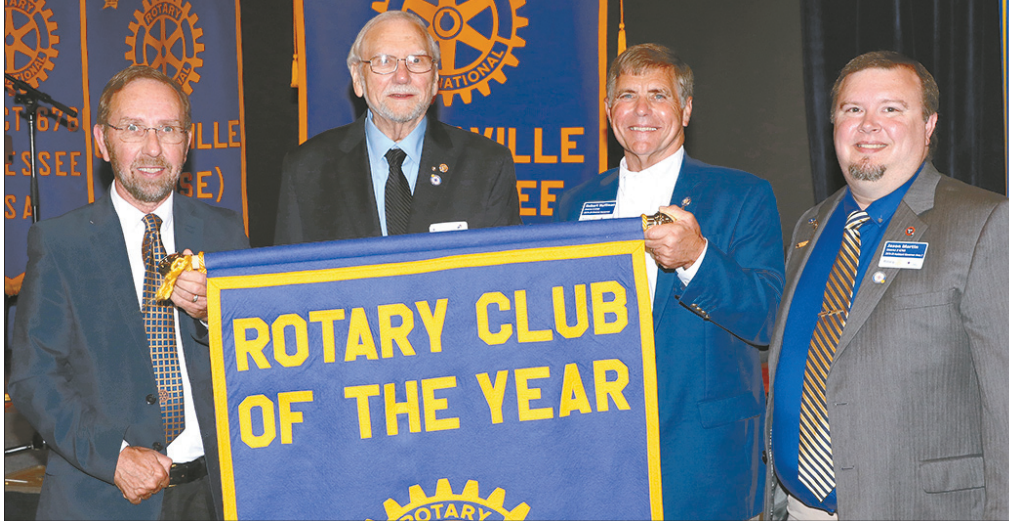
Douglas is a 2005 graduate of McKenzie High School. He is survived by a girlfriend, Misty Dennett, a daughter, Jovi A. Garner and a son, Cash Garner, two brothers, Ross Little and Lucas Little, two stepsisters, Beth Norton and Miranda Travis and two half-sisters, Summer Pegrim and Angel Perryman. Memorial services were Monday at Brummit-McKenzie Funeral Home.

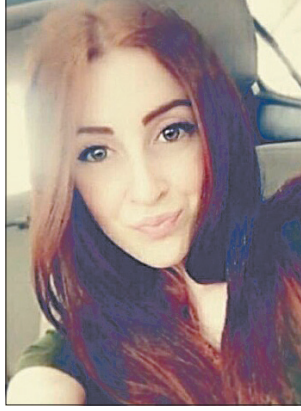

County Electric Department Receives FEMA Reimbursement

HUNTINGDON (June 25) — A March 2 tornado wrecked portions of the Carroll County Electric distribution grid and caused \$225,000 in damage. Danny Brawner, general manager of the system said the Federal Emergency Management Agency is providing \$168,000 in disaster relief funds toward that damage.

One of the major areas of damage was along State Route 22 near Carroll County Airport. The lines supplying the substation at the airport were toppled. A contract repair crew was called in to make the replace the tall utility poles and power lines.

Trio Faces Aggravated Child Abuse, Animal Cruelty, Weapons in Henry County

BUCHANAN (June 26) — A woman and two men are facing a multitude of charges including aggravated child abuse, animal cruelty, manufacturing marijuana, possession of firearms during the commission of a dangerous felony, and possession of drug paraphernalia after officers searched their home at 2465 Dale Cemetery Rd in Buchanan on June 25.

Arrested were Heather Scarbrough, 42, the mother of the child: her boyfriend, Thomas J. Brown, 46, and Thomas' dad, Charles E. Brown, 82, all of the same address. All three are incarcerated on \$300,000 bond each awaiting a Tuesday morning hearing in General Sessions Court. Charles faced additional charges of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

During a press conference on Friday, June 26, Sheriff Monte Belew said officers could not believe what they had encountered at the residence. They were summoned to the rural residence, near the Kentucky state line because of a report of possible animal cruelty. Sheriff Belew said when officers arrived, he personally looked in the single-wide mobile home and saw a 1.5-year old male toddler inside a 4-foot by 4-foot cage. He entered the home and saw eight pet snakes,

all very near the toddler's cage, dogs running throughout the house, empty pizza boxes on top of the boy's cage, plus feces and food waste on the floor.

Every toy of the child was inside the cage, said Belew. It was evident that was his lone place to play.

A female deputy took custody of the child, changed his diaper and fed him prior to the Tennessee Department of Children's Services arrival at the scene. Officers said the child welcomed

the deputy's attention to him.

The Sheriff's Department was assisted at the scene by District Attorney Matt Stowe, Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, Department of Children's Services, and Dr. Michael Neal, a veterinarian and his staff from the Paris Veterinary Clinic.

The following animals, in various states of health, were taken into custody: 56 dogs, 86 chickens, 10 rabbits, eight snakes, four parakeets, three cats, three sugar gliders, one pheasant, one gecko, and 531 mice, rats and hamsters.

Animal Rescue Corps, with 18 volunteers on the scene, took possession of the animals, except for the snakes, which are in the custody of TWRA, and the chickens, which the Sheriff's Department has. ARC documented each animal with photographs when they took custody.

D.A. Stowe said each of the defendants, if convicted, are facing 15-25 years each on the aggravated child abuse charges plus sentencing for the other charges.

"We are in uncharted waters here," said Stowe. A similar case was tried in Carroll County during a case called Noah's Ark, in which numerous animals were in various states of health, including dead, at a home in Atwood. A child was also in that home that smelled of urine.

HUNTINGDON — The Carroll County Library's Summer Reading program began June 1 and continues through July. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the majority of the programming is virtual, but there are some in-person events, held outdoors with social distancing, as well as "grab-and-go" activities.

Programming is posted live daily on the library's Facebook page. Monday is virtual crafting, cooking and creating for all ages. Tuesday is virtual STEM/STEAM videos and activities for youth. Wednesday is virtual Tot Time with guest readers, and take-home craft kits can be picked up curbside.

Thursday is virtual or in-person programming with special guests from the community. Friday is "unbedtime" stories for older kids, staff favorites and hometown history. Additionally each weekday, Director Jennifer Thornton or Children's Librarian Grace Hawkins read stories on Facebook Live.

Thursday, June 25, the in-person program was presented by the West Tennessee Public Utility District. Guests were Brent Dillahunt, general manager; Madison Endres, marketing manager; Chris Hunley and Brandon Perry, service technicians; and Katie Bennett, engineering intern. They taught attendees about natural gas, safety and calling 811 before digging. The kids got to take a closer look at a service truck and equipment and were given

goodies such as sunglasses, water bottles, hats and shirts. They were also given a scratch-and-sniff card with the smell added to natural gas to aid in detecting dangerous leaks.

Cox Oil Company, which owns Little General in Huntingdon, makes an annual donation to the program. Store manager Michael Crowley presented a check for \$1,500 to the library on Friday, June 19.

There will be no programming this week, June 29-July 3, leading up to the July 4 holiday, but Summer Reading resumes Monday, July 6.

Weakley County Sees Spike on COVID-19 Cases

Governor Extends State of Emergency

NASHVILLE (June 30) — According to the Tennessee Department of Health, the number of positive cases of COVID-19 in Tennessee stands at 42,297 (35,553 last Monday, with 592 deaths (531 last Monday) in the year 2020.

In Carroll County, there has been one death, 31 recovered and 37 (36 last Monday). A total of 1,845 (1,769 last Monday) were diagnosed as negative.

In Henry County, 34 have recovered of 53 (36 last Monday)

positive cases and 2,345 (2,240 last Monday) tested negative.

In Weakley County, there is one death in a nursing home, 34 (31 last Monday) have recovered of 58 (43 last week) positive cases and 2,107 (1,879 last Monday) tested negative.

In the United States, as of Monday, a total of 2,545,250 (2,275,645 last Monday) positive cases were reported in 2020 with 126,363 (119,923 last Monday) deaths, according to Centers for Disease Control.

The increases in cases prompted Governor Bill Lee to extend the State of Emergency related to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic

to August 29, 2020.

The order allows the continued suspension of various laws and regulations and other measures in these orders to facilitate the treatment and containment of COVID-19 through regulatory flexibility, promoting social distancing and avoidance of large gatherings, and protecting vulnerable populations.

Gov. Lee also signed Executive Order Nos. 51 and 52, which extend provisions that allow for electronic government meetings subject to transparency safeguards and remote notarization and witnessing of documents, respectively, to August 29, 2020.

Ryan was part of the committee that sought the grant for the splash pad in 2015 as well as the committee to restore the Park Theatre.

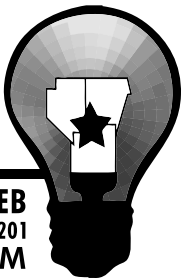

Huntingdon School Hosts Listening Session on Reopening

HUNTINGDON (June 25) — Huntingdon Special School District hosted a listening session Thursday at Huntingdon Middle School. The gathering was organized and led by Director of Schools Pat Dillahunty to hear input from teachers, parents, nurses and board members on the start of the upcoming school year and the COVID-19 pandemic.

Director Dillahunty began by reminding the approximately 30 in attendance that no decisions would be made at the unofficial meeting as that is not legally allowed.

She said that circumstances were changing often and that the district needed to have a flexible plan or set of plans that could be adjusted before or during the school year.

First to speak up was Melissa Thomas, high school nurse, who expressed concerns about busing. Dillahunty interjected to note that buses are operated by the county. Thomas asked, “If they’re going to be bunched up, what’s the point?”

School board Chairman Dr. Lee Carter posed a related dilemma: at what point in a child’s arrival to school to administer temperature checks.

Supervisor of Instruction Alan Eubanks provided an overview of the results so far from a survey distributed by the district online to parents.

He said that there were some respondents concerned about students falling behind academically because of the time lost. Dillahunty said the biggest impact of the time lost would be for high school students because of block scheduling.

Eubanks said there were even more concerns he classified as “preventative measures.” He said nearly all respondents on the subject didn’t want students to be required to wear masks. There were also questions about sanitizing, handwashing, class sizes, temperature checks, student gatherings, meal preparation and parking.

He noted there was one response inquiring about arrangements for families that don’t believe the pandemic is real.

Dillahunty said of masks, “I do think parents are going to have to decide what they want, and as teachers, we need to respect whatever [they decide].”

Kimberly and Adam Crews, parents of one primary and one middle school student, stated that they wanted the school to take “as many precautions as we need.” Kimberly works as a registered nurse at Jackson-Madison County General Hospital, and she expressed her concern about rising numbers in the area.

Eubanks continued his report of survey responses. He said several respondents claimed they would not take a vaccine once one was offered.

He noted some respondents were concerned about ensuring compliance and that parents would allow sick children to attend while others were afraid there would be too many restrictions.

Dillahunty acknowledged that people want things to be normal but said there would have to be a balance. She said the coming and going of parents would have to stop, class parties would likely not happen and there would need to be more prepackaged foods utilized.

Eubanks listed more concerns presented by survey respondents: internet access, outbreak protocol,

attendance, funds for cleaning supplies, buses, PPE for teachers, band instruments, sports, recess and lack of social interaction.

Dr. Jonathan Kee, high school principal, asked the educators to speak up with their ideas because “they know what’s realistic.” Dr. Carter echoed that, asking “What’s truly feasible?” and “How do we make it happen?”

Dillahunty indicated that the district would have to prioritize improving online instruction capabilities. She acknowledged that the schools are not ready yet. “The high school is closer, but we have to do more training.” She also admitted, “It’s not as good as face-to-face [learning], but we can’t not do it.” Eubanks noted that the district had enough devices available to provide one to each student.

Several teachers spoke up about the difficulty of social distancing and mask-wearing. One called masks “a battle we would fight all day long.”

Dr. Carter said that with the current level of cases in the area, the risk-versus-reward of masks would not be to their benefit, but if cases were to spike, “you might see the kids get a different attitude, because they don’t want to get sick. I hate to say this, but if we were to have one or two kids get sick, bad sick, it would scare every one of them, and we’d be struggling to get them into the building.”

He said that the board intended to have policies that give the educators “power and the strength to do what you do best...” I have no desire to micromanage what you are doing... We want to make sure you’ve got the tools.”

After a few more minutes of discussion, Dillahunty thanked everyone for coming and implored them to continue providing input as the district develops plans.

MCKENZIE FIREWORKS SHOW IS JULY 4

The City of McKenzie’s annual fireworks show is Saturday, July 4 at the city park.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there will be no ceremonies, music or food vendors.

Gates open at 7:30 p.m. and the show will begin around dark, approximately 9 p.m. depending on lighting and weather.

Those viewing the fireworks at the park are encouraged to practice social distancing by remaining in their own groups and supervising children as park equipment has not been sanitized.

For those in close proximity to others, face coverings are also recommended.

City officials are encouraging people to find a place outside of the park to view the show to decrease the density of the crowd in the park.

Bethel University has approved use of its parking lots during the event.

Parking is also allowed on University Drive, on a portion of Liberty Lane, and on Como Street.

Only vehicles with handicap plates or plaques are allowed at the top of the park.

Mayor Jill Holland told The Banner, “[COVID-19] cases are rising in the state. We’re committed to the health and safety of our residents and those who visit McKenzie to see the fireworks show.”

Of the changes, she said, “It’s

not the same, but we’re looking forward to next year returning to the celebration we’ve had in the past.”

Texas Man Charged After Woman’s Body Discovered In Container Floating on Kentucky Lake

PARIS (June 23) — A joint investigation by Special Agents with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, Kentucky State Police, Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife, Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, the Henry County Sheriff’s Office and the Texas Rangers has resulted in the Tuesday arrest of a man from Texas.

On Monday, at the request of 24th District Attorney General Matt Stowe, TBI Agents joined the investigation of a woman’s

body discovered in a plastic container found floating in the Kentucky Lake just north of the Tennessee state line Saturday night. An autopsy was performed by the Kentucky State Medical Examiner, and the cause of death was ruled homicide. During the course of the investigation, agents developed information that indicated Jeffery Rogers of Arlington, Texas, used a boat rented in Paris to dispose of the body in the Kentucky Lake.

Monday, agents signed arrest warrants in Henry County against Rogers for one count of Abuse of a Corpse and one count of Tampering with Evidence. Tuesday, Rogers was arrested on those charges by Texas Rangers in Fort Worth, Texas. His bond is set at \$1,000,000, and he awaits extradition to Tennessee. The homicide investigation remains active and ongoing.

Unemployment Decreases in all Tennessee Counties, Weakley Has Lowest Unemployment Statewide

TENNESSEE (June 25) — Record-high unemployment rates recorded in counties across Tennessee in April experienced sizable decreases as the state slowly reopened in May 2020, according to preliminary data released by the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development.

All 95 of Tennessee’s counties had lower unemployment rates in May, compared to the number of individuals who did not work in April when many businesses closed to help slow the spread of COVID-19.

Even with marked improvement, 42 counties had unemployment rates greater than 5.0 percent, but less than 10 percent. Fifty-three counties, more than half of the counties in the state, had rates greater than 10 percent, but less than 20 percent.

After reporting the state’s second-lowest unemployment rate for April, Weakley County now has the lowest jobless rate in Tennessee. The county’s new rate of 7.0 percent for the month of May is 2.5 percentage points lower than it was in April. It was 6.3 percent lower than the national rate of 13.3 percent, and 4.3 percent less than the state average of 11.3 percent. Out of a total countywide labor force of 15,180 workers in Weakley County, 14,112 were employed and 1,068 were unemployed.

Sevier County continued to have the highest rate of unemployment in Tennessee. Still, the county’s new rate of 18.5 percent is a staggering drop of 10.6 percentage points from April’s record high of 29.1 percent.

The statewide unemployment statistic from May also decreased significantly. The new preliminary rate of 11.3 percent is down from the revised April rate of 15.5 percent.

Nationwide, unemployment decreased to 13.3 percent in May, down from the 14.7 percent rate recorded the month before.

In bordering counties, Gibson registered 9.0 percent unemployment for the month of May, which is 3.0 percent lower than the previous month’s rate.

At 7.7 percent, Obion County’s unemployment rate fell by 2.6 from April’s rate of 10.3 percent.

Carroll County’s unemployment rate was 9.7 percent, which is a reduction of 4.1 percent.

Henry County recorded a jobless rate of 9.7 percent. This is 4.9 percent less than the previous month’s rate.

The Northwest Tennessee Economic and Community Development Region, which includes the counties of: Benton, Carroll, Crockett, Dyer, Gibson, Henry, Lake, Obion and Weakley, registered an average of 9.1 percent unemployment for the month of May, which is a 3.4 percent decline from the previous month’s rate of 12.5 percent. This region of the state normally has the highest jobless rate in Tennessee, but it recorded the lowest unemployment rate of any of the regions of the state. The region has a combined labor force of 107,669. Of this number, 97,859 were employed and 9,810 remained unemployed.

According to Huffman, “As the medium size club of the year, McKenzie Rotary marked high on the metrics showing it was deserving of the distinction. in five new and/or returning members to the club.

The Rotary Year 2019-2020 was met with numerous challenges including tornadoes across much of West and Middle Tennessee, increased awareness of social injustices and the COVID-19 Pandemic. The issues at hand only brought the club together as it faced the challenges.

During the Rotary year, the club relocated meetings from Bethel University to Lakeside Senior Community and then to virtual meetings held on ZOOM.

Most importantly the club became a 100% Paul Harris Club. In order to be considered a 100% club all members must be Paul Harris Fellows. This is a one-time recognition. To become a Paul Harris fellow a individual gives \$1,000 or more to the Rotary Foundation or is recognized by a club member with contribution in the person’s name.

The club’s PolioPlus fund was renamed in honor of Demetra Perkins and the club had 100% giving to the international Polio Plus campaign; there are only two countries with new infections (Afghanistan and Pakistan).

The McKenzie Rotary Club rebuilt the 15-year old rest areas along University Drive, helped with food drives in Trezevant and Gleason, provided food to

Bethel’s international students, provided \$1,000 to Carroll County Electric for customers who were struggling with electric bills and provided two scholarships to McKenzie High School students, one exclusively to Bethel University.

Money from the club’s Fannie Baxter and Neumie Moore Memorial Fund helped United Neighbors in its service to those less fortunate in the community and aided in the purchase of computers at the Webb School after-school tutoring program.

With 80 years of service, the club has entwined itself within the McKenzie community serving as its premier service organization. On July 1, Matt Lane takes over as club president.

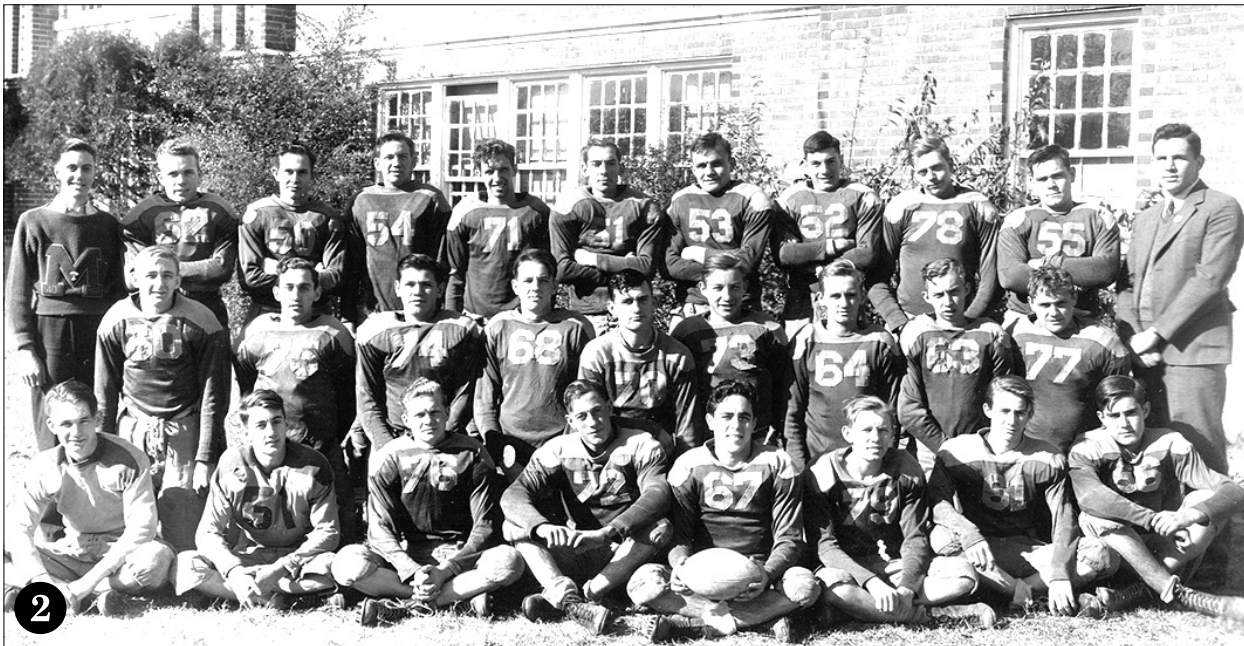
Washburn said of Lane, “He has the energy and drive to move this club forward.” He added, “Tuesday is my last meeting as president, and I say thank you to our members. Thanks to past president Krista Martin for helping establish a refreshed vision. Thanks for the long-term members for sharing their history and wisdom, thanks for a great year. Paul Thomas Carroll

From Farmer to Real Estate Developer

The Great Depression and World War II molded the group known as the Greatest Generation. They are the parents of the "Baby Boomers" and are the children of the "Lost Generation" (those who grew up during World War I). Their grandchildren are members of Generation X, Generation Y, and their great-grandchildren tend to be Millennials and Gen Z. News anchor and author Tom Brokaw popularized the term that marked a generation that brought some of the greatest changes to the twentieth century.

Over the last two years, I have written quite a few features that included members of the Greatest Generation. I feel

the greatest pride in researching and writing about the individuals because they brought about so many changes especially in McKenzie. These were the business men and women I remember as prominent figures McKenzie in my youth.

As I looked through the Banner archives this week, I came across a story on Paul Carroll and I thought how fitting for a feature for the July 4 weekend.

Paul Thomas Carroll was born to Harry and Lucille Carroll on February 2, 1925, on a farm near Peppers Ford in McKenzie. He was the oldest child amongst his two sisters Betty and Nell.

He was quoted as saying his mother spoiled him while his father put him to work on the family farm. There he learned about raising cotton and food

crops, milking cows and keeping hogs. Sunday was his day of rest while attending church services at the Cumberland Presbyterian Church on Shiloh Road.

Following graduation from McKenzie High School, Paul made one last crop with the family, then "disgusted with farming" he joined the United States Army. He was shipped to Tyler, Texas for his induction training followed by stints in New York and a few other camps. He requested to be transferred to the European Theater.

"I opened my big mouth to the wrong fella then 'cause he sent me down to the 100th Infantry Division," he said. After two weeks crossing the Atlantic, his convoy reached the French shores. The Luftwaffe (German Air Force) bombarded the incoming ships looking to dock forcing the American troops to jump overboard and swim to shore.

Carroll's assigned division trained as mountain troops in the Alps. Wintering in the mountain caves, he once remarked, "For about a month there we had to stop and just try to sway warm; all the rest of them did too. We had two winters to live through that thing."

The 100th Infantry Division was part of a four American and one French division operation responsible for laying mines. Later they were charged with the task of mine removal. Originally sent as replacement troops, Carroll was one of only two survivors in the anti-tank platoon.

After World War II, he remained in Europe as a member of the occupation forces working as an MP (Military Police).

Back stateside, Carroll taught agriculture courses to veterans who were also home from the war. The program was sponsored by the general government as a way to provide jobs and skillsets to returning veterans.

It was around this time he began dating Nellie Vick. After a year of going to the movies, dances and ice cream parlors they were married. They had two sons, Michael and James.

Carroll left his teaching position to operate and manage the McKenzie Seed Company with partner Billy Vawter. He later sold his shares to childhood friend John Moseley. He found employment with the Wallace Seed Company as a traveling sales representative. Being on the road every day took its toll on Carroll and he began looking for a career change.

After reading a book on insurance, he decided to make the leap. In 1960, he partnered with Billy Bryant to purchase Leach's Insurance Agency. They remained partners for 25 years until 1985 when he bought out Bryant.

Carroll was more than an insurance agent to McKenzie. For many years, he was an active board member on the McKenzie Industrial Board since its creation in 1960. Working closely with men like Hoot Gibson, McKenzie showed an increase in growth and industrial development.

Two major accomplishments that can be attributed to Carroll and others during this period is the construction of the McKenzie Industrial Park and McKenzie Hospital.

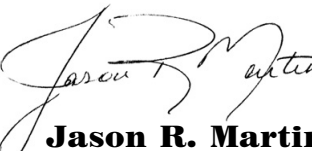
Carroll also served as a Carroll County magistrate (commissioner) holding the position of finance chairman. During Ned McWherter's tenure as Tennessee Governor, he was part of a delegation who traveled to Nashville to work with the governor on improvements to Highway 22 from McKenzie to Gleason and Highway 79 from McKenzie to Paris.

In 1990, he sold his insurance agency to his son, James, and daughter-in-law, Ruth. Though out of the insurance business, Carroll stayed active.

In the 1980s, he purchased a farm from his aunt's estate. By 1989, he took an active role in tending to the land. The farm

was used to raise beef. He later subdivided the farm and developed the land for the Holly Hills Subdivision.

In 1993, his wife, Nellie, died. Carroll continued to live in town and work on his farm. He said in an interview, he built and lived in the house his wife wanted to build after seeing plans in the books she enjoyed reading. On Friday, May 31, 2002, he died at age 77. Carroll is interred next to Nellie at Mount Olivet Cemetery.

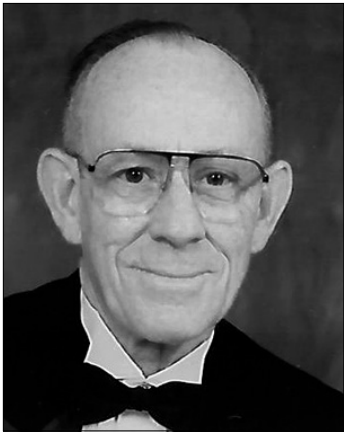

Huntingdon Council Approves Budget Amendments

HUNTINGDON (June 23) — The Huntingdon Town Council met for a very brief meeting Tuesday. The only item on the agenda was the second reading of amendments to the current budget.

While year-end budget amendments are routine and necessary for government entities as each fiscal year comes to a close, these are notable as they reflect reduced tax revenues caused by the COVID-19 shutdown.

Prior to the first reading at the meeting two weeks earlier, Mayor Dale Kelley explained, "General Fund revenues are significantly lower than the original and mid-year budgets

due to recent events affecting sales tax and other state shared taxes."

He said that General Fund revenues are under expenditures by \$73,800, but that a balance of \$81,750 from a Local Parks and Recreation Fund grant match carried over from the prior fiscal year would leave revenues over expenditures by \$7,950.

Mayor Kelley said that a \$31,200 Drug Fund deficit would be funded from prior-year reserves. The Dixie Carter Performing Arts Fund and Utility Fund each have surplus revenues. The Solid Waste Fund remains balanced as it serves merely as a paper trail for the billing of customers and payment to Waste Management.

Before the vote, a public hearing was held to receive input from citizens, but none was

offered.

Board members unanimously approved the second and final reading of the amendments. Councilmembers Tim Tucker and Andrew Maddox were absent.

During the meeting, Mayor Kelley offered appreciation to those who have beautified the downtown area. "We want to thank Peggy Allen for her dedication and hard work though the years with the planters in the downtown area. We also want to express appreciation to the Crews family (Tommy and Paulette), Jason Reeves and the sponsoring businesses for the new planters around the Court Square area. The planters enhance the beauty of our Court Square and downtown area."

The meeting adjourned after three minutes.

Bethel's Football Season Begins September 12

BOWLING GREEN, Ky. — Mid-South Conference Commissioner Eric Ward announced today the conference will revise its football schedule for the upcoming 2020 season following return to play guidelines established by the NAIA.

NAIA President Jim Carr's announcement on June 4 regarding return to play guidelines for all fall sports has necessitated a schedule adjustment for all Mid-South Conference football teams. As recommended by the conference Football Oversight Committee and approved by the football athletic directors and head coaches, the conference schedule will officially begin on September 12 with all 22 teams in action.

"The Mid-South Conference football athletic directors and head coaches have vetted and approved a revised 2020 conference football schedule," Ward said. "With the lingering uncertainty regarding many of the details surrounding a return to play in the fall, our conference leadership, in accordance with the NAIA guidelines, felt it would be prudent to move forward with a contingency plan for football, the sport with the largest student-athlete participation and the most procedural complexities from the start of preseason practice through completion of the regular season schedule. Our schools will face a number of challenges this fall, and the revised football schedule will make some of those challenges easier for our members to address."

"The reasons this change in scheduling was deemed necessary are primarily two-fold," Ward said. "First and foremost, we are committed to and 100% focused on the safety, health and well-being of our student-athletes, coaches and staff. Pushing the conference start date back to September 12 gives our coaches more time to get student-athletes acclimated and assess and focus on their appropriate physical conditioning after such a long, unprecedented period with no supervised work-outs.

"The second reason for the scheduling change was out of

concern for the fiscal health of our member institutions," Ward added. "The COVID-19 pandemic has and will continue to place financial pressures on our members, whether due to increased costs and/or restricted revenues as a result of adherence to state and local guidelines for appropriate testing and prevention of the spread of the virus on their campuses and in their local communities. The revised schedule dramatically reduces travel for all teams, which means fewer hours riding on buses, fewer nights in hotels, and fewer meals in restaurants. Conference leadership felt it was important that we anticipate some sort of alteration or interruption in these and possibly other facets of team travel, particularly when considering the various states where our schools are located and the different responses and guidelines within each."

Teams will play primarily within their divisions in 2020, including playing some opponents in a home-and-home series. Only one of the games -- as determined by the conference -- will be considered a divisional game and count towards the divisional standings.

Bethel Associate Athletic Director Brad Chappell offered his thoughts. "I'm really excited about this fall football season, not because of our abbreviated spring sports schedules but it is also more of a regional schedule. It will allow our team and our fans to make fewer overnight trips. At the same time, it is a

very challenging schedule, which will afford us the opportunity to strengthen our team and prepare for a deep playoff run. I know coach Jasper and his staff will have our football team ready to go when the time comes."

Bethel Head Coach Michael Jasper said, "In light of the COVID-19 situation the Mid-South Conference has opted to revise our 2020 schedule. I am excited to even have this opportunity with all the uncertainty that has been surrounding our season. Rather than playing our Sun and Appalachian division opponents we will play both Cumberland (TN) and Lindsey Wilson twice respectively. September 12th we face Cumberland in Lebanon, Tennessee and the following week we will welcome Lindsey Wilson here in McKenzie, Tennessee. Neither of which will count towards the division title. This is a step towards sports returning this fall and I am fired up. I can't wait to have our guys back on campus July 31st and myself and the athletic training staff are working to ensure our student-athletes remain safe upon their arrival."

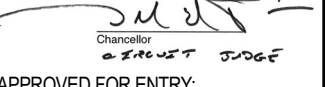
