Cats Win Fourth in a Row with Win Over Thomas University

MCKENZIE — The No. 6 Bethel Wildcats scored a season-low 48 points Saturday but still won comfortably beating visiting Thomas University 48-14. Bethel entered the game as the nation’s highest-scoring team in the nation at 63.0 points per outing.

The Wildcats jumped out to a 17- 0 lead. Joaquin Collazo III and J. D. Dixon teamed up for a 37-yard pass to give the Cats a 7-0 lead on the first play from scrimmage. Demetrice Gilbert returned a punt for 59 yards for a score and Bethel lead 14-0 lead after Andrew Welch’s point after. Welch hit a field goal upping the Bethel margin to 17-0.

Those scores would be a precursor to what would follow. Collazo would throw four more touchdowns in the game. Dixon would catch two more giving him three on the day. Jaylen Taylor caught a pass for a score as well. Martize Smith had a rushing touchdown. Smith led the Wildcats with 64 rushing yards.

Collazo was 17 of 21 in passing for 231 yards. The senior is 44 of 54 in the air in the last two games.

Bethel rushed for 235 yards and passed for 270 and finished with 505 total yards. The Cat defense held TU to 110 yards on the ground and 93 in the air.

Bethel’s defense was led by Jerwin Young, Jamel Goulbourne and Brody Franks who had five tackles each. Javonte Carter, Tim Hamilton, and Christian Cantrell had four total stops each. Franks, Goulbourne, Young, Hamilton and Cantrell had sacks in the win. Ten Wildcats had tackles for losses in the game.

All stats remain under review.

Coach Michael Jasper felt his team did not play up to their potential but felt his team did what they had to do to win. “I have a ton of respect for Coach Mitjans and the entire Thomas program. That team is tough, disciplined, and well coached. I cannot say enough great things about their program and where they will be soon. We were inconsistent at times and didn’t execute at the level I would like, but it’s hard to win college football games. In the end, we found a way to get it done. I’m proud of my staff and these kids and look forward to getting to Mid-South Conference play.”

Bethel moved to 4-0 while the Night Hawks dropped to 0-2.

The victory was the 198th in program history.

It was Bethel’s 16th

Paris Man Arrested For Sexual Exploitation of a Minor

PARIS — An investigation by special agents with the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force of the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, with the assistance of partner law enforcement agencies, has resulted in the arrest of a man from Paris.

TBI agents received information of possible child sexual abuse material involving a young girl and an adult man distributed online. They immediately began investigating with the assistance of the Henry County Sheriff's Office, Paris Police Department, and Federal Bureau of Investigation. During the

investigation, agents and investigators developed information that Justin D. Farris was the person responsible for the creation and distribution of the image.

TBI agents secured and executed a search warrant for Farris' residence in the 100 block of Brooks Street in Paris. Based on information obtained there, Farris (DOB 2/10/83) was arrested and booked into the Henry County Jail on counts of Especially Aggravated Sexual Exploitation of a Minor and Aggravated Sexual Exploitation of a Minor. His bond is set at \$500,000.

in the amount of \$340,000. Kee said the service has been well received at each of the school sites.

Stakeholders in the Huntingdon Special School District have the opportunity to review and comment on the school's plans and goals. The comment period is September 15-October 15 and the information about the goals and the new TISA funding formula can be found online at the school's website.

Graduation for the class of 2024 is Saturday, May 11, 6 p.m. at Paul Ward Stadium. An alternate rain date is May 12.

A financial audit of the fiscal year 2021-22 was presented with a few adverse findings, but none that involved missing or misappropriated funds. Dr. Kee said some involved receipts not written in a timely manner, lack of segregation of financial responsibility, and one in which the auditor failed to

file a timely report.

Students and staff of the Huntingdon Special School District will be conducting off-campus evacuations for each school September 26-28. Families will have the opportunity to go through the process of picking up their child at a secure location off campus once students and staff have been safely evacuated.

According to Director of Schools, Dr. Jonathan Kee, when an emergency arises, it is important that we all understand our role in protecting each other and are acclimated to the procedures on how we will make sure students are reunited with their families safely. Planning of the drills have included bus transportation, first responders, and school staff. The state of Tennessee requires safety drills to be conducted for fire, tornado, intruder, and other types of emergencies. Dr. Kee said it is unfortunate of the possibility of some emergencies, but we must be prepared within our control because the safety of our students and staff are a top priority.

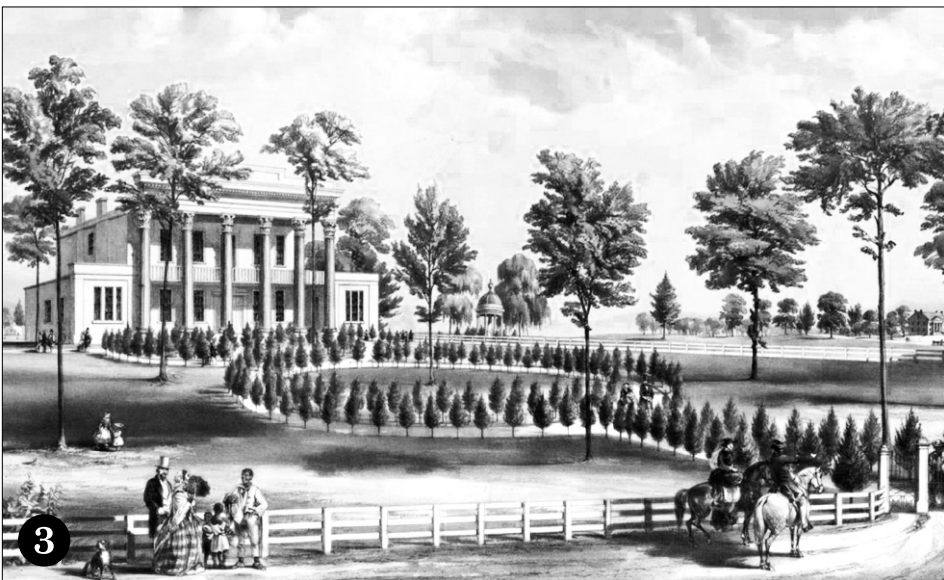
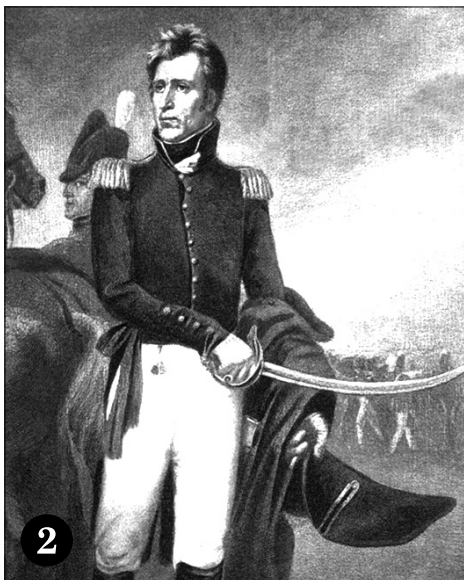

Andrew Jackson
Love, Land and Politics

The story of Andrew Jackson's life is inseparable from the passionate and tumultuous love affair that defined his early years. In 1788, Jackson met Rachel Donelson, while boarding at the family's tavern in Nashville, Tennessee. Andrew was instantly smitten, and their connection was immediate. However, there was a significant obstacle to their love story - Rachel was already married to Lewis Robards, a marriage plagued by troubles.

The emotional turmoil that ensued was the stuff of local gossip. Lewis Robards accused Rachel of infidelity with Jackson adding additional trouble to a marriage ready to fall apart.

At 17, while living in Kentucky, Rachel married Lewis Robards, of a prominent Mercer County family. His unreasonable jealousy made it impossible for her to live with him. In 1790, they separated, and she heard that he was filing a petition for divorce. In 1791, Jackson and Rachel married and believed that her divorce from Robards had been finalized.

Their union, which would become the cornerstone of Jackson's life, was filled with rumors and legal complications. It would be marred by controversy for years to come. The controversy surrounding Andrew Jackson's marriage to Rachel Donelson was a shadow that haunted him throughout his political career.

After two happy years,

they learned to their dismay that Robards had not obtained a divorce, only permission to file for one. He then filed a lawsuit on the grounds of adultery. It wasn't until 1793 that the divorce was officially granted. The Jacksons quietly remarried in 1794. The legal discrepancy gave Jackson's political opponents ammunition to attack his reputation.

Although the Jacksons never had children of their own, they gladly opened their home to the children of Rachel's many relatives. In 1809 they adopted a nephew and named him Andrew Jackson, Jr. They also reared other nephews; one, Andrew Jackson Donelson, eventually married his cousin Emily, one of Rachel's favorite nieces.

Jackson was a fan of duels, especially those when his honor or family's honor was in question. One of his more consequential was his encounter with Charles Dickinson in 1806. Dickinson was a fellow horse breeder and a man known for his quick temper. The feud between them began with a horse race dispute but quickly escalated into a bitter and personal rivalry.

The duel that ensued is etched in history as one of the most dramatic moments of Jackson's life. On May 30, 1806, on the banks of the Red River in Kentucky, the two men faced off. Dickinson's shot struck Jackson in the chest, perilously close to his heart. Jackson's first shot misfired and, according to the Code Duello, he should



not have been able to refire. Re-cocking his gun, Jackson fired and killed his opponent. Dickinson is buried at Old City Cemetery in Nashville. The bullet that struck Jackson would remain lodged in his chest for the rest of his life; he suffered chronic pain from the wound for the remainder of his life.

His early years were marked by a turbulent mix of personal crises and duels, but his destiny was ultimately tied to politics. In 1796, he was elected as Tennessee's first representative to the U.S. House of Representatives. His fiery disposition and dedication to the interests of the common man quickly made him a prominent figure in American politics.

In Congress, Jackson argued against the Jay Treaty, criticized George Washington for allegedly removing Democratic-Republicans from public office, and joined several other Democratic-Republican congressmen in voting against a Resolution of Thanks to President Washington. He advocated for the right of Tennesseans to militarily oppose Native American interests.

Jackson served in the House for just one year before being appointed to the U.S. Senate in 1797. However, his Senate career was brief, as he resigned in 1798 due to health concerns and a growing distaste for the political machinations of the capital. Despite his short time in Congress and the Senate,

his impact on the political landscape was significant, as he championed states' rights and agricultural interests.

Upon returning to Tennessee, Jackson was elected as a judge of the Tennessee Superior Court. In 1802, he was elected major general, or commander, of the Tennessee militia, a position that was determined by a vote of the militia's officers. The vote was tied between Jackson and John Sevier, a popular Revolutionary War veteran and former governor, but the current state governor, Archibald Roane, broke the tie in Jackson's favor. Jackson later accused Sevier of fraud and bribery. Sevier responded by impugning Rachel's honor, resulting in a shootout on a public street. Soon afterward, they met to duel but parted without having fired at each other.

In 1804, Jackson was nearly bankrupt and was forced to sell Hunters Hill property, as well as 25,000 acres of land he bought for speculation. He went on to purchase a 425-acre plot of land in Davidson County. At the time of purchase, it was a modest farm, but he had grand visions for its transformation. Over the years, he expanded the estate, increasing its size to over 1,000 acres. The name "Hermitage" was reportedly inspired by his desire for solitude and reflection, though he would hardly find peace and tranquility in his life.

When he acquired the Hermitage plantation, he be-



gan to rely on slave labor to cultivate and maintain his property. Over the years, the number of enslaved individuals at the Hermitage grew significantly. At the height of his wealth and power, he owned as many as 150 slaves. Jackson's personal views on slavery were complex. While he was a slaveholder, he also expressed concerns about the institution. He believed that enslaved individuals should be treated with "kindness and humanity" and argued for the maintenance of families, suggesting a paternalistic view of slavery. However, his actions did not always align with these sentiments.

In practice, slaves were treated as a form of wealth whose productivity needed to be protected. Slaves who disobeyed or ran away could be harshly punished. For example, in an 1804 advertisement to recover a runaway slave, Jackson offered "ten dollars extra, for every hundred lashes any person will give him, to the amount of three hundred." Jackson

also participated in the local slave trade. Over time, his accumulation of wealth in both slaves and land placed him among the elite families of Tennessee.

Even though he was a wealthy planter and a member of the elitist society of the South, Jackson foremost considered himself a patriot. With the onset of the War of 1812, he would become a national hero and a legendary/nefarious figure.

young person today without lowering myself down to their world. And I do it with the biggest and friendliest genuine smile I've got. I listen to what they are saying. I want to hear it eyeball to eyeball. And I want them to "feel" with ever fiber in their little hearts how special they are too!

It may be 70 years after the fact, but mostly I'm still practicing what Brother Hatcher was preaching....

Mother did most of the "teaching" as we grew into and out of our formative years. Dad didn't want to fool with it. He just expected us to do right. Wait a minute, I misspoke. He DEMANDED we do right! He never bothered to explain what was right and what was wrong, mind you. He simply thought the difference was so crystal clear...that even Leon, me and David Mark could figure

it out.

But if you blurred the two, he was quick to set you on the right path. Most times, even after the whipping, he didn't soliloquize you to death with the facts. Leon always maintained that was what the whipping was for!

I will say this, the very few times Dad disciplined me, I didn't need an explanation. Oh, I cried some, and tried to feign innocence. And sometimes, I'd give an academy award acting performance on how I had been falsely accused, wrongly sentenced and unlawfully punished!

Summer color can be attained by sowing flower seeds among the perennials. Fall color is generously provided by the trees (especially from the Maples) and Winter interest comes from our evergreens (and yes, Magnolias are evergreen! Leave them in their natural state) Also, consider Red Twig Dogwood.

Dan generously shared slides and information on the positive properties of both large and small trees before ending his presentation with a short question and answer period.

Twenty members answered the roll call, The minutes of both the July and August meetings were read and approved, as was the Treasurer's report for the month of August.

Emotions Run Strong as the Mustangs Dominate the Bulldogs

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MILAN (September 22) — Friday night marked the return to region play for the Huntingdon Mustangs (3-1) as they traveled to Milan to face the undefeated Bulldogs (5-0). Prior to the match-up, the Bulldogs were ranked number 1 in the state for the Class 2-A poll. Throughout four quarters of play the Mustangs dominated both defensively and offensively to win the game 32-14. Although tension between the local rivals erupted into a scrappy melee three minutes into the second quarter, coaches and officials quickly restored order, and the game continued without further incident. The travel win gave Huntingdon a 4-1 record for the season, 2-0 for region play. The Mustangs received the opening kickoff and began their first drive on their 40-yard line. A series of nine running plays utilizing the legs and power of triple-threat Gray Eubanks,

Ashton Hutcherson, and Brady Warbritton culminated with Huntingdon's first touchdown by Eubanks at the 7:17 mark of the first quarter. With a successful extra point attempt by Greyson Anderson, the Mustangs led the Bulldogs 7-0. The Mustang defense held Milan to a three-and-out possession for their first possession of the night, and a 5-yard shanked punt gave Huntingdon the ball on the Milan 41-yard line for their second possession of the game. Six plays later, Hutcherson drove into the end zone for Huntingdon's second touchdown of the night. A successful extra point gave Huntingdon a 14-0 lead over the Bulldogs with 2:20 remaining in the first. Milan began their second drive from their own 18-yard line and a series of seven running plays pushed them into the end zone for their first of two scoring drives for the game. The score was 14-7 after a successful extra point. After beginning their third drive of the evening

on their own 20-yard line, the Mustangs ground out another successful scoring drive with eight running plays that ended with a Eubanks 3-yard run and dive into the end zone. A missed extra point left the Mustang lead at 20-7 with 7:23 remaining in the first half. After a Milan turnover on downs, Huntingdon began another march down the field with good field position at the Bulldog 35-yard line. Although the Mustangs steadily pushed the Bulldogs backward once again, Milan recovered a Huntingdon fumble to stop the scoring drive with twenty-one seconds remaining in the half. Milan received Huntingdon's kickoff to start the second half, and steadily moved the ball down the field with a combination of pass and run plays that brought them to the Mustang 12-yard line. On the next play, Warbritton intercepted the Milan pass in the end zone to return the ball to Huntingdon. Nine running plays later, Eubanks scored from the Milan 31-

yard line to broaden the Mustang lead to 26-7 with 2:29 remaining in the third quarter. The two-point conversion failed. Although Milan scored on their next possession to narrow Huntingdon's lead to 26-14, this was their last point addition of the night. With 2:04 remaining in the game, Huntingdon scored one more time on a 22-yard Warbritton run to post the final score of the game, 32-14. Huntingdon gained 306 yards on 53 rushing plays, and were 1 of 3 passing for 4 yards. Milan rushed for only 174 yards with 29 attempts and were 6 of 10 for 104 passing yards. For the Mustangs, Hutcherson led the offense with 131 yards on 21 carries with one touchdown. Quarterback Eubanks ran 22 times for 123 yards and three touchdowns. This Friday, the Mustangs (2-0 in region play and 4-1 for the season) host Decatur County-Riverside for another key region match-up. Kickoff is 7 p.m.
