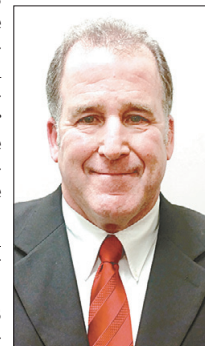

Carroll County Election Commission

5,580 Vote Early in General Election

HUNTINGDON (November 4) — During an interview with The McKenzie Banner, Carroll County Administrator of Elections Peg Hamlett said that 5,580 registered county voters voted early for the upcoming November 8 General Election.

Early voting for the November 8 General Election concluded on Thursday, November 3 at 5:00 p.m.

She said, "Although Assistant Administrator of Elections Al-jancic and I are weary this morning from the stresses produced by the early voting process, we are very pleased that a large number of early voters cast their votes at the election office. Our veteran poll workers did an excellent job as usual in assisting voters and conducting the process in a respectful, timely manner. Our new poll workers also did an outstanding job. I am proud of their efforts."

Hamlett continued, "I would roughly estimate that 260 absentee voter applications were picked up along with around 60 permanence voting applications for voters who live in nursing homes and assisted living residences. We also distributed quite a few absentee applications for actively-serving military

personnel. We will receive absentee voting applications until the end of General Election voting at 7:00 p.m. on November 8."

Hamlett noted that the volume of early voters caused some voting equipment glitches.

She said, "We experienced more glitches than usual with voting equipment due to excessive pressure being placed on the equipment over extended periods of time. However, the glitches were resolved quickly and our polling workers kept things moving in an orderly and efficient manner."

Hamlett noted that some voters were disgruntled about having to wait in line to vote.

She said, "The line of voters at the peak of early voting stretched about halfway down the hallway in front of the election office, resulting in an approximate fifteen-minute wait. I want to stress, however, that the wait for voters was not the fault of temporary equipment glitches or people serving at the polls. The wait some voters experienced was caused by voters in front of them not having proper identification credentials with them at the time they sought to register."

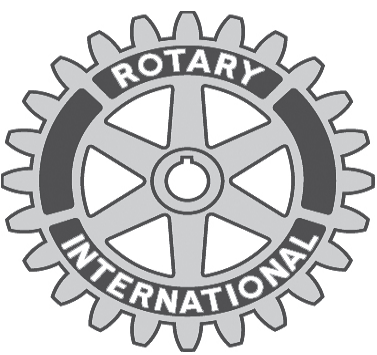
She continued, "Our poll staff works with voters one at a time, and voters need to understand that it is their responsibility to

have proper credentials with them when they arrive to vote. They should also be willing to respectfully accept assistance when needed by polling attendants if they are unsure about how to utilize voting equipment."

She added, "Some voters would not allow poll workers to help them enter their ballot identification numbers which led to their improperly using the machines and invalidating their ballot. Then, they would angrily demand to vote again, leading to our having to supply them with a paper ballot. This happened more than a few times, and some voters exhibited rudeness and anger towards poll workers who were only trying to help them to initiate the process."

Hamlett concluded, "Voters need to know what is expected of them when voting. They should be prepared to provide proper credentials when registering and have some idea of whom they are going to vote for once they enter the voting booth. Their being prepared to vote lessens the wait for other voters and ensures a more respectful, civil voting process for all involved. Voting is a two-way street. Please understand that we are here to help."

Carroll board extended the contract of interim director Betty Wallace through May, and will offer a three-year contract to Hughes. Earlier this year, Hughes was offered the same position in Milan, where he resides, but negotiations failed to yield an agreement.

The Thursday meeting began with the board interviewing for a second time the three finalists for the position. Hughes went first, followed by West Carroll Junior/Senior High Principal Dexter Williams and Bradford High School Principal Shane Paschall.

Board members asked each candidate the same series of questions in the follow-up interviews.

Patrick Lindsey asked the men to identify the strongest quality they would bring to West Carroll. Hughes pointed to his integrity and the way he cares for teachers and students. Williams referenced his loyalty and love for West Carroll, his alma mater. Paschall stated that he would create a good environment by letting people know that he wants them involved.

Kyle Foster asked for each candidate's opinion on the importance of vocational and technical programs, lamenting the lack of those types of opportunities at West Carroll. All three echoed back that sentiment, committing to working with local farmers and skilled trade workers and especially TCAT-McKenzie. Williams specifically stated that it would be one of his first priorities, while the other two spoke about the strong vocational programs at their respective current schools.

William Robinson asked Hughes and Paschall why they would come to West Carroll. Hughes granted that it would be difficult to leave

Gibson County, but welcomed the opportunity to serve in a greater capacity. Paschall said that the West Carroll environment is very similar to both Henry County, where he grew up, and Bradford, in that the people are spread out in several communities. He added that he felt very comfortable in his potential new location.

Mike Foster asked each about their ability to effectively communicate. Hughes said that it was important to communicate in a consistent, frequent, and fair manner. Williams pointed to his personality, noting that many would say he talks too much. "I talk to everyone," he said. He added that he has good relations with the media, helping to bring attention to the district. Paschall stated that as a director, "you have to be a liaison to the community." He went on to say that you have to take the time to listen so that you can understand. He also emphasized that "surprises aren't typically good. We want information to spread."

Patrick Lindsey inquired about how each would be involved in IEPs (individualized education programs) for special education students. Each candidate expressed that they are deeply involved as principals and would continue that habit as a director.

Misty Mitchell asked each if they believed in performance-based pay. Hughes was generally supportive of the idea, but noted that some measurements of performance can be misleading. Williams agreed with the concept, but said the system would have to find a way to make those incentives available to all instructors, not just those who teach "testable" subjects. Paschall supports performance-based pay, but said that it's "crucial how you do it," echoing Williams and adding that in Bradford, all teachers have an opportunity for incentives.

Kyle Foster wanted to know

how each candidate would retain teachers and staff. Hughes said that turnover was low at his current school, and credited that to a good culture, backing up teachers, and being present. Williams said that teachers need to feel like they can be a teacher and run their own classroom. He added that when you hire someone to do a job, trust and support them, go the extra mile, and stand by them. Paschall echoed the points of caring and creating an environment of support, and added offering competitive salaries.

The three candidates left the meeting after the interviews, and after other business, the board took action. Chairman Jimmy Halford said, "I feel like all three could do the job, now it's time for [the board] to hash it out."

There was no discussion, and after a brief silence, Lindsey made a motion to hire Hughes. There was another, more lengthy silence until Mike Foster finally offered a second. On a roll call vote, Robinson, Lindsey, and both Fosters voted in the affirmative, while Mitchell and Halford dissented.

The three-year contract that will be offered to Hughes includes a salary of approximately \$90,000.

In other business, the board took first action on extensive requests for upgrades at the baseball and softball fields. Specifications will be drawn up and bids taken on the fence and dugout projects. Also approved was an overnight trip to a big baseball tournament in Florida during Spring Break. Coach David Dillard is footing the bill, and cites the event as a major opportunity for his players to be seen by college scouts.

The board also approved several policy updates as well as the annual employee bonuses of \$500 for full-time and \$250 for part-time employees.

The meeting adjourned in just over an hour and a half.

Participating counties (and cities in these counties) will be eligible for a four percent discount (for eligible projects) on both the business development and community development ability-to-pay calculations (CDBG and FastTrack) each year the county fulfills the requirements of the ThreeStar program. Additionally, only cities located in a county that is an active participant in the ThreeStar program will be eligible to participate in the

Tennessee Downtowns program. Finally, there is an annual grant for Tier 2 and Tier 3 counties to serve as seed money for activities (not to offset general operating expenses) focused on improving at least one of the measured areas of the program: health and welfare, public safety, and education and workforce development. Each year, TN-ECD will provide participating counties with a scorecard that documents progress indicators in the five focus areas: • Jobs and Economic Development, • Fiscal Strength and Efficient Government, • Public Safety, • Education and Workforce Development, • Health

and Welfare. These indicators are used to aid the county in evaluating these key areas, the scorecard will document progress toward achieving the community goals set by local community leaders and JECD Boards. The scorecard and activity plan is designed to assess and reward each county on its unique progress in the three scored areas identified in their ThreeStar Activity Plan. It is not a competitive system; counties compete only with themselves. Each county can address local issues through proven solutions by collaborating with other communities to share best practices and pool resources.

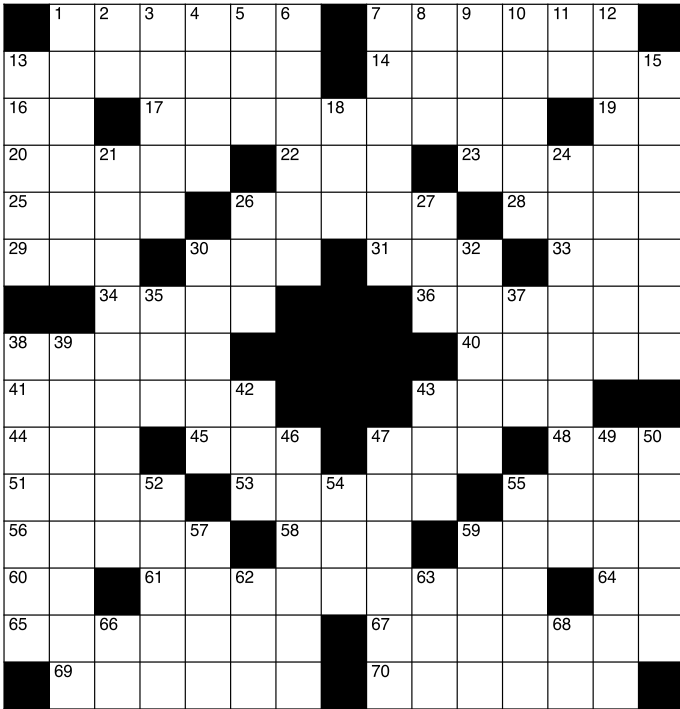

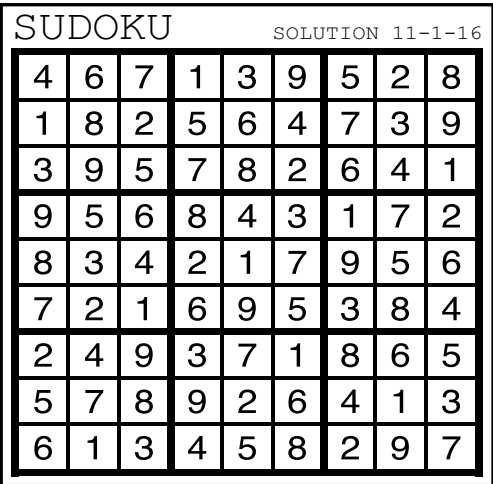
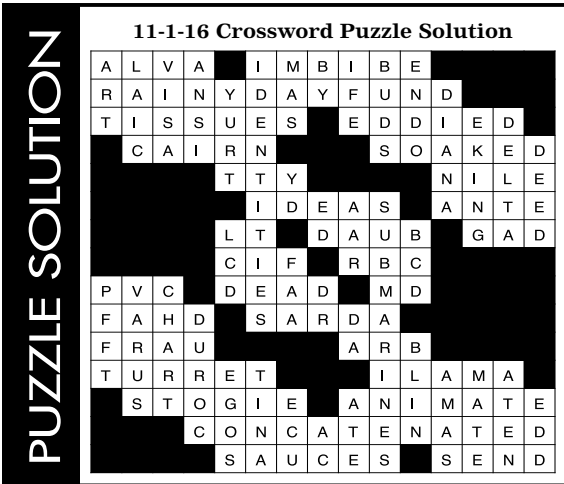

Hunker Down with Kes

Unconditional Love

He blinked to clear his eyes. He couldn't do anything about the lump in his throat or his racing heart. He stared incredulously at the sea of red parading below him. It was a bit warm for June he thought as the afternoon sun bounced off the barrel of his long rifle. It was going to get a lot hotter.

General Gage had scoffed at his fighting ability. "Those farmers will run at the first musket shot. They will not stand before the king's army!"

Colonel Prescott himself had sent him over to this small hill. He wasn't sure if it had a name. He was so close to the British troops that he could clearly see the first wave of Red Coats moving toward them. He tried to wet his lips but his tongue held no moisture. His hand trembled ever so slightly as he eased back the hammer on a gun he'd borrowed from his uncle.

The word up and down the line was to not fire until you could see the whites of their eyes. He wasn't sure he could wait that long!

History records the young patriot didn't run that day. Neither did his friends. They repulsed the first two attacks from the mighty British army and would have held that hill till Gabriel blew his horn except they ran out of ammunition. They retreated reluctantly over the higher hill behind them and left the Boston peninsula still in the hands of the enemy.

That same history will record a British victory at Bunker Hill. But the heart of the young minuteman told him otherwise...

The charge came early on a crisp September dawn across David Miller's cornfield. This time the uniforms were blue. But you could hardly distinguish them in the morning fog rising off nearby Antietam Creek. The Gray Coats countercharged later that morning and retook Mr. Miller's field. But the Union Army fought back and regained the ground.

And so it went till there was not a cornstalk left standing and it was said you could walk across that field stepping on the bodies and never touch the ground. It's what happens when two armies meet...and not one soldier on either side blinks.

He gazed up San Juan Hill and asked himself what he was doing in "this man's army". He wasn't protecting Charleston Harbor or defending Fort McHenry for goodness sakes! He was standing on foreign soil! Why couldn't Cuba fight its own battles?

He cursed his bad luck, the food, the ever present mosquitoes, the heat, the heavy uniforms, the all day

marches, the Spaniards... but when General Hawkins waved the 1st Brigade forward he unlimbered his Springfield rifle, leaped to his feet and charged up the hill...right into the teeth of the enemy!

He didn't get left "down on the farm". He was in a trench in the Argonne Forest in France. Or maybe it was Luxembourg. It was kinda hard to tell for sure. The Western Front stretched out for miles. Here's what he did know and he lived with it everyday; you stick your head up and the Germans were quick to blow it off!

This was a different kind of war. Barbed wire was strung out everywhere to impede any advance, airplanes overhead dropped all matter of evil things on top of you, snipers laid in wait to get one clear shot and, let me tell you, those machine guns rained down death and destruction at a rate never before seen on a battlefield.

But he was there, still dug in, as stubborn and determined as ever, ready to see it through to the finish when the announcement came that on the "11th day of the 11th month" a peace agreement had been signed.

The small landing craft hit the coral reef a mile out from the designated beach. This wasn't the plan! They were supposed to be delivered right up to the sand. It was too late to complain. The marine leaped into the blue Pacific and started to swim toward Tarawa Island. The Japanese bullets raked the water. The defenseless soldiers didn't waver. They swam, walked and finally crawled ashore under withering fire!

Rear Admiral Keiji Shibazaki had been preparing the island for the American invasion for twelve months. He'd placed fourteen large coastal guns in concrete bunkers to protect his shores. Five hundred pill boxes adorned the tiny island. The Admiral proudly boasted it would take "one million men one hundred years" to take the island.

It took thirty-five thousand United States Marines four days!

He was in Korea, Vietnam, Cambodia, Iraq, Panama, Afghanistan...he went where he was sent. The cold didn't bother him, nor the heat, rain, snow or the dark of night. He often found himself looking both ways down the barrel of a gun. And he was easy to spot when the firing started. He was the guy standing in, or running toward, the front lines.

We call him a "Veteran". And we thank them politely. And sincerely. But we really don't have any idea...

The snugness of a warm blanket or a roof over our heads happened because someone cared enough to believe that this country was worth fighting for.

And finally, the article of promise that our troops fought for and continue to fight for was the American Flag. I'm told it flew and continues to wave wherever our military serves. Tattered, sometimes beyond recognition and torn until nothing but a shred was waving on the pole gave encouragement to otherwise hopeless situations. So, my children please stand and gentlemen please remove your hats as we honor the playing of the National Anthem at any public event we are privileged to attend and remember the men and women who made it possible. 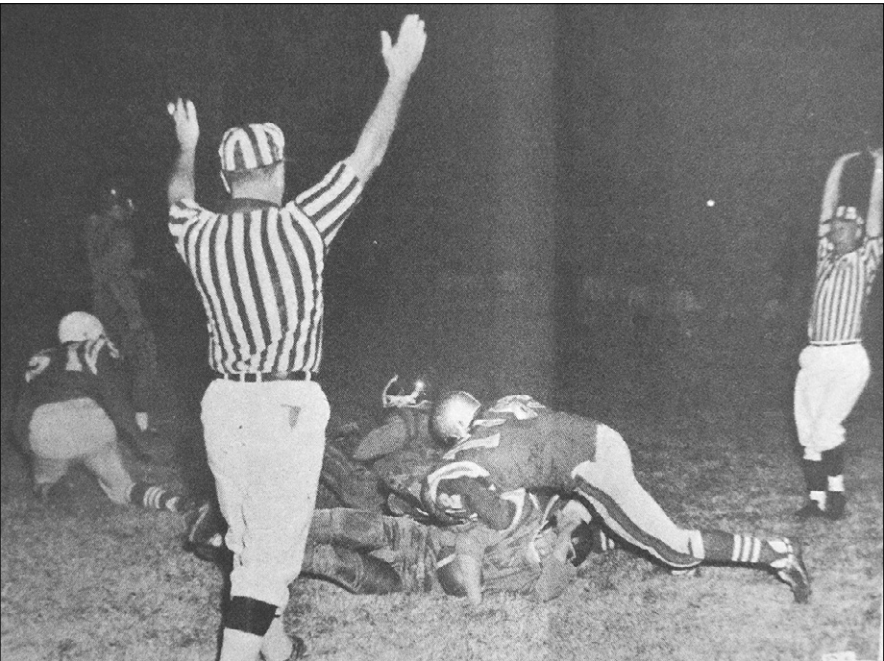

County Officials Seek Non-Partisan Elections

CARROLL COUNTY — The county of Carroll could possibly abandon its party caucus system and party labels for candidates for countywide office.

A resolution is on the November 14 County Commission agenda asking the General Assembly to create a private act to eliminate partisan elections.

All ten of the countywide elected officials sent a letter asking Carroll County commissioners to request a private act eliminating party affiliations for the offices of county mayor, clerk, trustee, circuit court clerk, road supervisor, sheriff, assessor of property, and General Sessions judge.

Presently, the Republicans and Democrats each caucus every four years to select their nominees for each of the above offices.

Mayor Kenny McBride said Hardeman County has already approved a similar non-partisan resolution and Obion, Henry, Weakley and Benton are also in the process of voting on the resolutions.

Carroll County's resolution reads, "Whereas, the Carroll County elected officials are required to identify themselves with a political party affiliation or declare as an independent candidate in the county elections, and many of the Carroll County elected officials have made it absolutely clear that their political party affiliation has no bearing on their service to their constituents, and whereas, it is the feelings of the Carroll County elected officials that political party affiliation, on the local level, only divides us

where we need unifying, and whereas anyone running for an elected county position will not have to choose a political party."

County commissioners run as non-partisan candidates.

During the commission meeting, three persons will be administered the oath of office. Gaylon Sydnor, District 8, Lori Nolen, District 5, and Darrell Ridgely, District 1 are all running unopposed to fill unexpired terms of office.

In other business, the commission will consider:

* tightening the provisions for establishing a tent campground at the 1000-Acre Carroll County Recreation Lake.

*appointing Commissioner Steve Parker to the Carroll County Audit Committee to fill the unexpired term of the late Wayne Kirk.

*approving a budget amendment to the Office on Aging to acknowledge the receipt of a \$5,000 from Granges America

*approving a budget amendment to accept \$36,433 from Carroll County Electric Department for one-third of the cost of a new communications tower for the Sheriff's Department, Fire Department, and Electric Department. It will be located on the campus of the Carroll County Jail.

*amending the Highway Department budget in the amount of \$1,027 as reimbursement from the Huntingdon Industrial Development Board for gravel hauled to the Carroll County Shooting Range.

Commissioners convene at 7:00 p.m. November 14 in the Conference Room of the Carroll County Office Complex.

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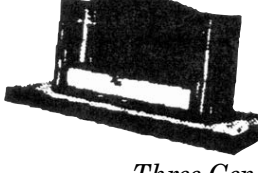

He added, "This experience has been so rewarding. I'm proud of our accomplishments on the golf courses but I'm even more proud to see how our squads



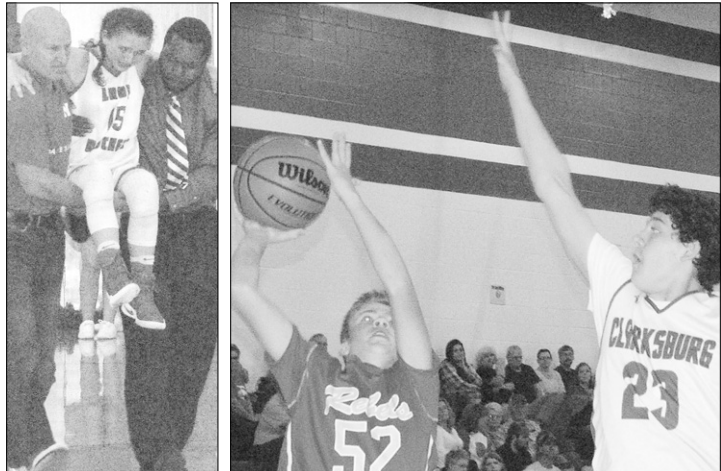

CLARKSBURG (November 1) — In middle school basketball action, the McKenzie Lady Rebels, hampered offensively by Clarksburg's aggressive full-court pressure and scoring of Emily Peterson (9), rallied from a 13-8 third quarter deficit via the scoring of Lilly Bennett (9) to earn a hard-fought, 19-15 road victory. In the nightcap, McKenzie, fueled by the scoring of Johnathon Moore (15 points including three treys), held off a fourth quarter rally led by Rocket game-high scorer Jordan Morris (22) to defeat Clarksburg, 38-28.

Lady Rebels 19, Lady Rockets 15

In a points-deprived first period, Clarksburg utilized full-court pressure and the production of Emily Peterson (treys) and Brooklyn Williams (deuce) to lead McKenzie, 5-0.

As Clarksburg continued to apply defensive pressure, Lady Rebel Ashleigh Britt swished a trifecta from the left corner at the 3:41 mark of the second stanza to cut the Lady Rocket lead, 5-3. Three minutes, later, Lady Rocket Sarah Derryberry weaved through Lady Rebel defenders to score in the paint and increase Clarksburg's lead, 7-3, with 39 seconds remaining in the first half. Responding, Lady Rebel Kennedy Green netted a two-pointer off the glass as McKenzie trailed Clarksburg at the break, 7-5.

Resuming play in the second half, strong defensive play by both squads thwarted scoring until Lady Rocket scored in the paint to increase Clarksburg's lead, 9-5, at the 3:26 mark of the third frame.

Fouled on the ensuing Lady Rebel possession, McKenzie's Anna Callahan swished one of two charity tosses as Clarksburg's score was cut to 9-6 at the 3:08 mark. Battling beneath the boards, Lady Rebel Lilly Bennett snared the rebound and raced coast-to-coast for the lay-up as Clarksburg called timeout clinging to a narrow, 9-8 lead. Receiving the inbound pass, Lady Rocket Peterson raced down court and was fouled attempting a deuce from the left side. Stepping to the line, Peterson swished both charity attempts as Clarksburg led at the end of the third quarter, 11-8.

At the 4:11 mark fourth frame, Lady Rocket Peterson stole the ball and scored as Clarksburg widened its lead, 13-8. Answering, Bennett scored off the glass to cut the Lady Rocket lead to 13-10 at the 3:55 mark. Receiving the ensuing inbound, Lady Rocket Peterson crumpled to the floor after sustaining a knee injury. As players and fans looked on quietly, McKenzie volunteer assistant coach Brian Craddock and Clarksburg coach Porsche McClerkin gently carried Peterson from the court.

Following a timeout by McKenzie, Bennett weaved right side to score off the glass. Fouled on the ensuing play, Lady Rocket Derryberry netted one of two free throw attempts as Clarksburg led, 14-12 at the 1:56 mark. Rebels End Season with First-Round Loss at Waverly

WAVERLY (November 4) — The McKenzie Rebels' emotional roller-coaster of a season ended Friday night with a first-round loss to the Region 5-2A champion Tigers. The Rebels found themselves in a 21-0 hole early in the second quarter, but battled back to within a touchdown twice before falling, 42-27.

Waverly won the coin toss and deferred to the second half. Rebel Joseph Miller took the opening kickoff near the 5, returning it to the 17. Eric Robinson ran 12 yards for a first down, then gained six. Quarterback Zach Jarrett threw to Lucas Waddell for another first down, then Robinson picked up three. Jarrett grabbed an awkward snap with a knee down for a five-yard loss, then threw in-

complete on third down. Michael Floyd punted, and Waverly took over at the Tiger 33.

Tiger Daisuan Whitfield rushed for a pair, stopped by Floyd, then quarterback Gavin Stanfield tossed to Carson Short for a 65-yard touchdown. The PAT was good, and Waverly led, 7-0, with 8:23 remaining in the first frame.

Starting at the 30, Rebel Tyler Spivey took a handoff to start the ensuing drive. He fumbled and recovered the ball for a loss of nine. Jarrett then passed to Spivey, but incomplete. After another failed pass attempt, Floyd picked up a low snap and was forced to scramble instead of punting. He was stopped for a loss, giving Waverly a first-and-goal at the 9.

Tiger runningback Montez Bradley ran for four yards, then Stanfield scored on a keeper. Another good PAT extended Waver-

ly's lead to 14-0.

The Rebels started deep in their own territory at the 18, and Robinson lost a yard. Jarrett then found Donavon Foley open for eleven and a first down. A lateral toss to Spivey went out of bounds for a huge loss, and Jarrett's next pass was incomplete. A false start pinned McKenzie back even deeper, but Jarrett went back to Foley for a 32-yard completion to move the chains. Spivey caught the next throw for another first down, then Robinson and Spivey each carried for a short gain. Back-to-back incomplete passes turned the ball over on downs at the Tiger 45.

Bradley gained a pair to start, taken down by Miller and Sean Beck. Then, Stanfield scrambled for a first down. Whitfield ran for five, then Stanfield threw incomplete. A pass interference penalty gave Waverly the first down anyway, and Bradley was stopped

short on a pair of runs. On third down, an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty moved the chains again, setting up first-and-goal at the 10. After losing a yard, Bradley picked up six. Then, Stanfield kept again for another five-yard touchdown. The kick was good, and Waverly was coasting, 21-0, early in the second quarter.

The Tiger kickoff sailed out of bounds, and McKenzie started at the 35. Jarrett threw incomplete twice, and Robinson picked up just three yards to bring up fourth down. Floyd was forced again to pick up the snap and run, losing yards again instead of punting away.

Starting at the Rebel 32, the Tigers fumbled on first down, and Rebel Julius Owens came away with the ball.

TSSAA Round One Football Playoffs

Mustangs Eliminate Yellowjackets, 52-27

HUNTINGDON (November 4) — In TSSAA Region 61A opening round high school state playoff action, the Huntingdon Mustangs, fueled by exceptional offensive line play, pummeled Trousdale County's defense for 437 yards rushing and 51 yards passing to eliminate the Yellowjackets, 52-27.

Utilizing its multiple-quarterback / runningback combination and "student body" overload blocking scheme, Huntingdon produced big rushing performances from senior Zach Dodson (23 carries for 217 yards, touchdown touches of 78, 1, and 1 yard), junior Kade Pearson (8 rushes for 104 yards, 51-yard rushing score, 14-yard touchdown pass to Michael Arnhold, 37-yard scoring pass to Keeton Bailey), and senior Dylan Johnson (13 rushes for 98 yards, nine-yard scoring dart).

Defensively, Huntingdon was again led by the tackling and pass rush of Marvaughn McClerkin, Clay Carver, Kade Pearson, Bryce Johnson, Corey Leavitt, and Michael Arnhold. Huntingdon's defensive secondary, led by Tyrese Mebane and Johnson, consistently nullified the Yellow-jacket's aerial attack.

Trousdale County's offense was limited to 173 yards rushing and 3-13 passing.

This Friday night, Huntingdon (8-2) travels 100 miles east along Interstate 40 to Nashville Christian for a second round

showdown with the Eagles (9-2 overall, 8-0 region play). Game time is 7:00 p.m.

Huntingdon, having won the coin toss and electing to receive, saw its initial offensive possession result in a "three-and-out" as Yellowjacket defenders Easton Stacy and Colton Gammons stopped the Mustang rush and forced Tyrese Mebane to punt with the ball being downed at the Trousdale County 45.

After Michael Arnhold and Marvaughn McClerkin stopped Yellowjacket runningback Tanner Lannom for a loss of one, Lannom gained six yard right side via option and Isaiah Harper fought for a gain of two to bring up fourth and one. Gambling early, Trousdale County quarterback Keyvont Baines followed his offensive line surge to net a first down at the Mustang 43. Hammering straight up the middle, Lannom gained three yards and Harper moved the chains at the Mustang 33. Answering, Huntingdon linebacker Kade Pearson perfectly read Trousdale County's sweep and drilled Harper for a loss of five, Chase Snider then stopped a Yellowjacket bubble screen for a loss of one to bring up third down and 16 at the Huntingdon 39. Following a pass incomple-tion by Baines, a Huntingdon player dropped the Yellowjacket punt as Trousdale County recovered the pigskin at the Mustang 13 at the 5:53 mark of the first frame.

Seizing momentum, Baines kept right side to net a first-and-

goal at the 3. Baines followed his line surge to the one before scoring left side and adding the PAT boot as Trousdale County led at the 4:47 mark of the first quarter, 7-0.

Zach Dodson returned the Yellowjacket kickoff to the Mustang 16. Pearson pounded inside to the 22 before Dodson ignited the Mustang faithful by taking the pitch right side and jetting 78 yards to paydirt. Johnson was stopped short on the two-point conversion rush as Huntingdon cut Trousdale County's lead, 7-6, at the 3:57 mark of the first canto.

Responding in-kind, Yellow-jacket Baines received Orry Hodo's booming kickoff at the Trousdale County 13 and stung Mustang defenders by racing 87 yards to score. Baines added the PAT boot as the Yellowjackets widened its lead, 13-6.

Determined, Huntingdon's Dodson returned Baines' kick-off to the Mustang 28. Yellow-jacket linebacker Braison Raney stopped Johnson in the backfield for a loss of two before Dodson took the counter right side to move the chains at the Mustang 38. Following a Huntingdon false start, Dodson battled back to the original line of scrimmage to bring up second and 10. Pearson barely overthrew Mebane on a play action pass before Johnson stormed across midfield and carried Yellowjackets for a gain of 33 to the Trousdale County 29. Dodson netted a tough three inside and Pearson spun through tackles

for a gain of nine. Johnson added a first down burst to the Trousdale County 19 as time expired in the first quarter with the Yellow-jackets leading Huntingdon, 13-6.

Resuming play in the second stanza, Yellowjacket Gammons tackled Johnson for a loss of one before Dodson swept left side for a gain of five. From there, Trousdale County slowed Huntingdon's advance to force the Mustangs to gamble on fourth and five at the 14. At the 10:43 mark of the second frame, Pearson took the shotgun snap and fired a touchdown strike to blocking back Michael Arnhold. Johnson added the two-point conversion as Huntingdon took its first lead of the contest, 14-13.

Hodo's kickoff sailed into the endzone for a touchback as the Yellowjackets began its next offensive series at its own 20. Following his line surge, Harper netted gains of four and five yards before moving the chains with a gain of seven to the 35. Harper was tackled by Corey Leavitt for a gain of one before Baines complete a first down strike at the Huntingdon 49. An unsportsmanlike conduct penalty against Huntingdon at the end of the play moved the ball to the Mustang 34.

Ramping up defensively, freshman Hunter Ensley dropped Lannom for a loss of two and Baines pass attempt to Austin Ford was defended by Mebane.

Head Coach Paul Carroll said that the team improved throughout the season, and that they were very coachable and played as a team.

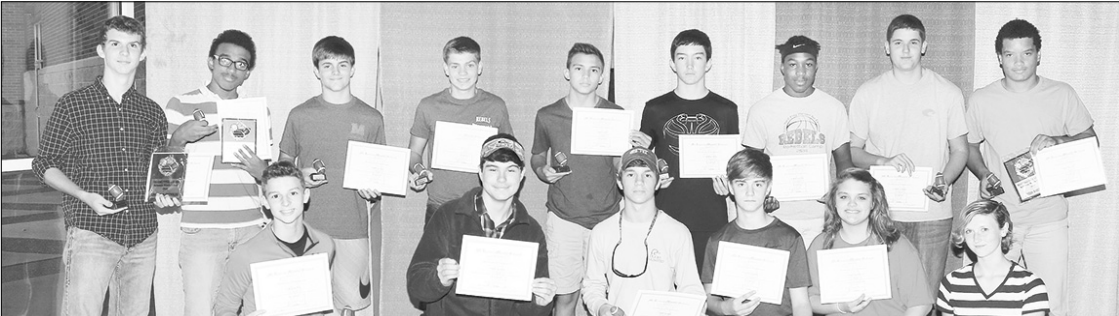
They ultimately only played six games, going 3-3, but tried to schedule more. Their last game, a victory over Camden, proved the team's overall improvement.

Carroll encouraged players to continue playing though high school and to play as many sports as possible.

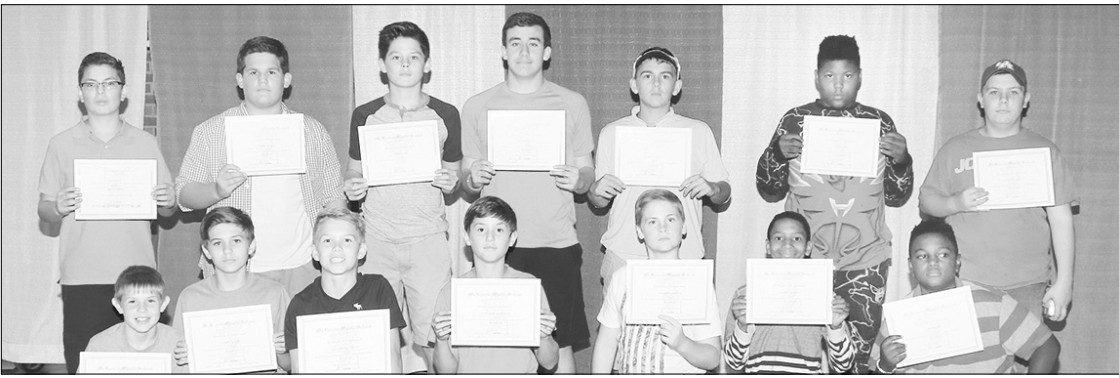
All players received certificates, and eighth graders received trophies. The coach asked his players to thank the football booster club and the people of the community who support the Rebels.

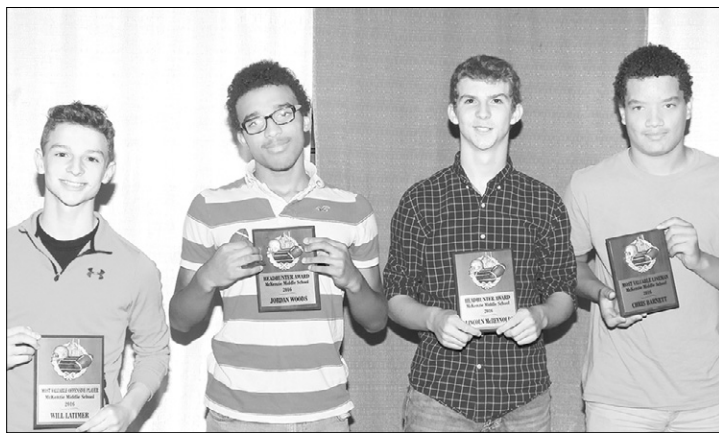

Next, Robinson burned through the Tiger defense for a 45-yard touchdown. The sure-footed Waddell again cut the deficit to seven, as Waverly led, 28-21.

Waverly and McKenzie traded quick three-and-outs, and the Tigers took over at their own 40. Stanfield kept for a two-yard gain, then Bradley struck again for a 58-yard touchdown. The kick made it 35-21 Waverly with 5:09 left in the third.

A deep kick left the Rebels starting at the 26. Jarrett threw to Foley for a first down, then Robinson ran three straight times for four, three, and three to move the chains again. Jarrett tossed to Robinson for nine yards, then to Foley for another eleven. A sideline throw to Spivey netted just two, and then a deep pass was picked off in the end zone.

Waverly took over at the 20, and Bradley took off for a 80-yard touchdown. The PAT put the Tigers up 42-21 with seconds left in the third quarter.

The Rebels would start at the 25, and Jarrett made the final play of the frame count with a 41-yard strike to Rawls. Robinson began the fourth with a six-yard run, then Jarrett recovered his own fumble for a loss of ten. Two incomplete passes turned the ball over on downs at the Waverly 35.

Bradley couldn't gain more than a few on three tries, and the Rebels caught a break as the Tiger punter had a knee down as he fielded a bouncing snap.

Starting at the Tiger 28, Robinson was stopped at the line of scrimmage, then Jarrett threw incomplete. The next throw was also incomplete, but Foley was interfered with by the Tiger defender. From the 15, Robinson made a short gain, the Jarrett picked up a few more on a quick pass. Robinson lost a yard to bring up fourth-and-five at the 8, but Jarrett found Foley in the end zone. A two-point try failed, and the Rebels still trailed, 42-27, with 5:36 left in the contest.

Waverly started at the 31, and Bradley hit a wall on first down. Stanfield's screen pass to Bradley was complete, but Floyd was right there for a takedown three yards deep. The same play saw Bradley scramble for the first down, and then he took a handoff for another first. Bradley tried three more runs, but Waverly was forced to punt with a minute and a half left in the game.

A deep punt pinned the Rebels back at the 8. Jarrett threw incomplete, but followed with a completion to Waddell for a short gain. He

then threw to Robinson for a few more, then Robinson converted on fourth-and-one. The final play of the game was a Jarrett pass to Robinson, who ran out of bounds near midfield as time expired.

The 42-27 loss ends the season for the Rebels (5-6).

McKenzie topped the Tigers in total yards, 359 to 312.

Rebel quarterback Zach Jarrett was 24 of 40 passing for 276 yards and a pair of touchdowns with one interception. Donavon Foley led the receivers with six catches for 107 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Tyler Spivey caught seven throws for 44 yards. Lucas Waddell pulled in five passes for 39 yards, Eric Robinson caught four for 40 yards, and Cameron Rawls had a pair of catches for 46 yards.

Tiger quarterback Gavin Stanfield was five of eight passing for 81 yards and a touchdown with one interception. He threw to Carson Short twice for 68 yards and a touchdown, while Montez Bradley pulled in one pass for 15 yards.

McKenzie was outrun on the ground, 232 to 83 yards despite Eric Robinson's 22 carries for 116 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Montez Bradley led the Waverly rushing attack with 19 carries for 216 yards and three touchdowns.

The Rebel defense was led by Sean Beck with four tackles (one for a loss). Lucas Waddell, Lorenzo Haynes, and Joseph Miller each had a pair of takedowns.

Tiger Jarrett Neblett led his team with four tackles, including one for a loss. Johnny Krzesimowski had three tackles.

MATTER OF RECORD / SPORTS

McKenzie Police Reports

HUNTINGDON (November 4) — The Huntingdon Police Department executed a search warrant at 170 Browning Ave in Huntingdon occupied by Ronnia J. Deniker, age 56, and her son, Wesley P. Deniker, age 25.

Wildcats Battle, Bow to Lindsey Wilson

COLUMBIA, KENTUCKY (November 5) — The 23-ranked Bethel Wildcats trailed 14-0 early in their game at No. 10 Lindsey Wilson but fought back to take a 38-31 lead late in the third quarter only to see the Blue Raiders score the last 21 points and beat Bethel 52-38.

Bethel had trouble stopping the LWC running game yielding 228 yards to Jalen Sublett. It was a single-game high for the Blue Raider senior. He scored the last three touchdowns for the Raiders who matched a program high ten wins in a season.

Both teams traded leads in the first half with quarterback Dylan Beasley and Blake Ingleton scoring on rushing touchdowns. Bethel senior signal caller Kerry Sellers II brought Bethel to within one point with a 48-yard run down the right sideline to pull the Wildcats to within 14-13 with 1:27 left in the first stanza. It was the first of two rushing touchdowns by the Bethel quarterback. Sellers ended the game with 106 yards rushing in the wild affair.

Lindsey Wilson pushed the lead to 21-13 early in the second period. Beasley found Ingleton on an 11-yard touchdown pass to cap a three-play, 61-yard drive — Beasley's only passing touchdown of the game.

Casey Kammerzell's 27-yard field goal made it 21-16 with 7:25 left in the first half.

Quincy Walden returned a punt 64 yards for another score with 5:35 left in the half as Bethel grabbed their first lead at 22-21.

A 23-yard field goal by Jared Dougherty gave LWC a 24-22 advantage at halftime. The score came with just 20 seconds left in the half.

Lindsey Wilson scored first in the third quarter on a Beasley 16-yard run and Bethel was behind 31-22. Sellers hit tight end Vonte Owens with a 10-yard TD pass and the Cats made it 31-29. Marcaous Bailey sacked Beasley in the end zone for a safety and the game was knotted at 31 each.

Bethel marched 64 yards on 11 plays in the ensuing drive. Sellers II scored on a two-yard keeper to give the Wildcats a 38-31 advantage.

The LWC defense put the clamps on the Wildcat offense in the fourth quarter and along with the three unanswered touchdowns runs by Sublett the Raiders prevailed.

The Blue Raiders picked off four passes on Saturday.

Lindsey Wilson out-gained Bethel 485-450 in total offense. Anthony Patrick led Bethel with 14 total tackles. Brain Reynolds followed with 13 total stops. Trey Von Brown had 11 tackles while Gregory Hancock had eight on the day.

LWC finished their regular season at 10-1 and 4-1. They will await their bid to postseason play with teams finding out their fate on November 13. The Wildcats are now 7-3 and 1-3 after dropping their third straight game.

Coach Chris Elliott commented, "We had great effort as always but just came up short. We fought back and gave ourselves a chance to win but just did not make the plays at the end we needed to pull out the win. We have at least another game to play and we will work hard in preparing for a great Reinhardt team."

Bethel returns home to face No. 3 Reinhardt on Senior Day next Saturday at Wildcat Stadium. Kick-off is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. with senior ceremonies taking place before kick-off.

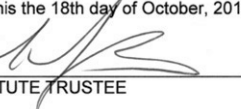

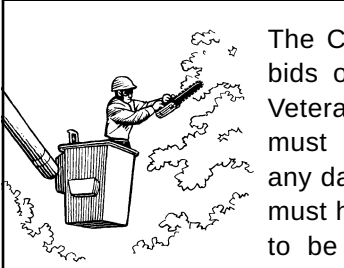
