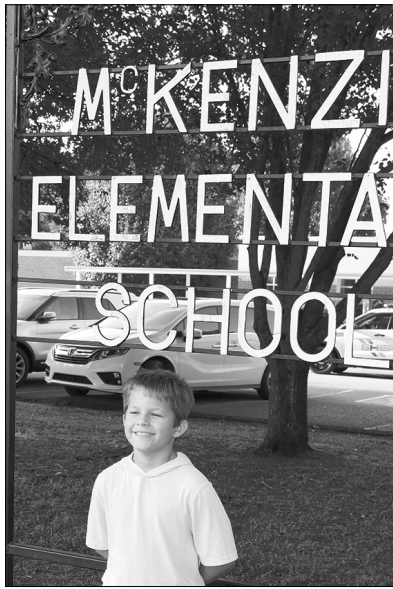

Open Carroll County Schools Report Enrollment

CARROLL COUNTY (August 10) — Three of the county's five special school districts opened for in-person learning last week, while the other two delayed opening day until August 17. McKenzie, Hollow Rock-Bruceton and Clarksburg began classes Tuesday and reported initial enrollment numbers, including how many students have opted for virtual learning.

McKenzie Special School District Director of Schools Lynn

Watkins told The Banner enrollment stands at 1208 for the three schools. McKenzie Elementary reported 472 students; McKenzie Middle School has 383; and McKenzie High School reported 353. Of the 1208, 131 students are utilizing the virtual learning option during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hollow Rock-Bruceton Special School District Director of Schools David Duncan reported total enrollment of 585 stu-

dents in K-12, with 65 of those enrolled in virtual learning.

South Carroll Special School District Director Lex Suite told The Banner Clarksburg School's enrollment stands at 322 students, and 45 have opted for virtual learning.

Huntingdon and West Carroll schools open for in-person learning Monday, August 17. Both districts offer virtual options.

McKenzie School District Board Approves Budget Amendments, Food Service Bids

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McKENZIE (August 4) — The McKenzie Special School District Board of Education held its regular board meeting at McKenzie Middle School Tuesday following students' return to school for half a day that morning. The board approved budget amendments, a policy amendment and food service bids and heard an annual report from Carroll County Coordinated School Health.

The three budget amendments made minor changes to the budget to account for the allocation of funds from a Safe Schools grant and federal projects money.

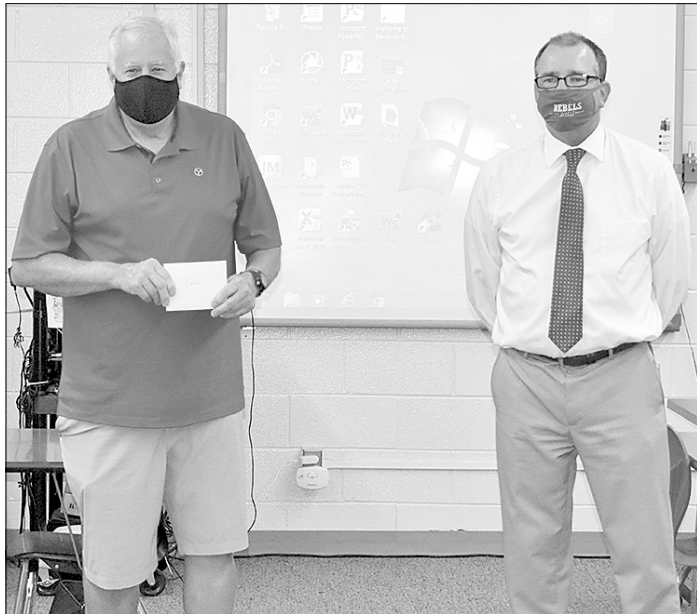
The board's policy for Title IX and sexual harassment was amended to establish Supervisor of Instruction Ladona Herrin as Title IX Coordinator, each school's assistant principal or counselor as investigators and Director of Schools Lynn Watkins as decision-maker.

Food service bids were approved: produce from HPS/GPS; milk and milk products from Prairie Farms; ice cream products from Turner Dairy; food and non-food products from HPS; and bread from Flowers Baking Company. All except the bread were bid through Volco, a cooperative of 30 school districts.

During the meeting, Mandy Drewry, director of Carroll County Coordinated School Health, presented her annual report of services and activities provided by the program. Several planned spring events were canceled with the closure of schools in March 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

She reported health screening results for the district, noting McKenzie saw a 4.2 percent decrease in overweight and obese students from the previous year.

Other contributions by Co-

ordinated School Health were health fairs and walk-to-school days at the elementary and middle schools, a teen summit for all Carroll County freshmen, the MHS Teen Health Council, a suicide awareness activity and the Yellow Dot program, which provides yellow dot windshield stickers to indicate health information is in the driver's glove compartment.

Director Watkins thanked Drewry and Coordinated School Health for their services, specifically for the touchless water bottle-filling station donated to each school over the summer.

Director Watkins's monthly report included several items.

He recognized five businesses that donated a combined \$5,300 for the district to purchase COVID-19 supplies: Smith & Smith Optometry, State Farm (Guy Grissom), Maria's Mexican Restaurant, Swalley Heating and Cooling, and Bennett Hardware.

The director provided a list

of 22 substitute teachers for the district.

He announced that 100 students registered for the district's virtual option and another dozen acquired information packets about the program.

Watkins said he visited the schools during the half-day and was pleased with what he saw.

Finally, he made a special recognition of Lance Rider as it was his final meeting as a board member. Rider did not seek reelection. Watkins presented Rider with a gift and said, "Your support has been outstanding... Thank you so much for your service to our district. You've certainly made us better." Rider said, "Thank you, it's been a pleasure to serve on the board. It's easy to do when you've got the good leadership that we do, the great school board members and our staff. The teachers are outstanding."

The meeting adjourned after 30 minutes.

Bethel University Receives Approval as a Continued Education Preparation Provider

McKENZIE (August 7) — On July 24, Bethel University, along with several other schools, received recommended approval from the State Board of Education (SBE) and the Tennessee Department of Education (TDOE) as an approved Education Preparation Provider (EPP).

An EPP prepares students to become licensed teachers, and all Tennessee Educator Preparation Providers that lead to licensure must be approved by the State Board of Education. To be approved, all licensure programs must ensure that candidates have the opportunity to attain the knowledge and skills, have clinical experiences, and meet all other standards, procedures, and guidelines established by the TDOE and the SBE.

"We are so thankful to our faculty and staff for the outstanding work they have done with the Tennessee Department of Education in getting our approval to continue to license students to teach," President Walter Butler stated.

"Bethel University is known for its outstanding K-12 teachers and want to continue to be a partner in students' education. I am so proud of our faculty, staff, students, the Tennessee Department of Education and the State Board of Education for working together to obtain this continued approval."

Bethel will have a comprehensive review in 2022 and will be working with the Tennessee Department of Education as that review approaches.

"The communication and collaboration with the Tennessee Department of Education leaders has been exceptional, and we look forward to working with them as we continue growing as an EPP," said Dr. Morgan Butler, Division of Education Chair.

The mission of Bethel's Division of Education is to uphold the mission of the University and to prepare candidates for careers in public education. The program is designed to instill a love of lifelong learning and service through teaching others.

Dr. Morgan Butler stated, "Students can be assured that they will receive an education that prepares them to succeed in a diverse range of classrooms after they graduate."

The Division of Education of-

fers a Bachelor of Science degree in interdisciplinary elementary education (K-5); exceptional learning and development interventionist (K-8); exceptional learning and development interventionist (6-12); and other licensure areas including biology (6-12); chemistry (6-12); English (6-12); history (6-12); mathematics (6-12); music (K-12), and physical education (K-12).

The Master of Arts in Education is a non-licensure program designed to offer professional growth and development of advanced skills. The Leadership Excellence Master of Arts is an advanced program for candidates seeking administrative licensure. The Practitioner Licensure Program offers eligible candidates an alternate pathway to licensure.

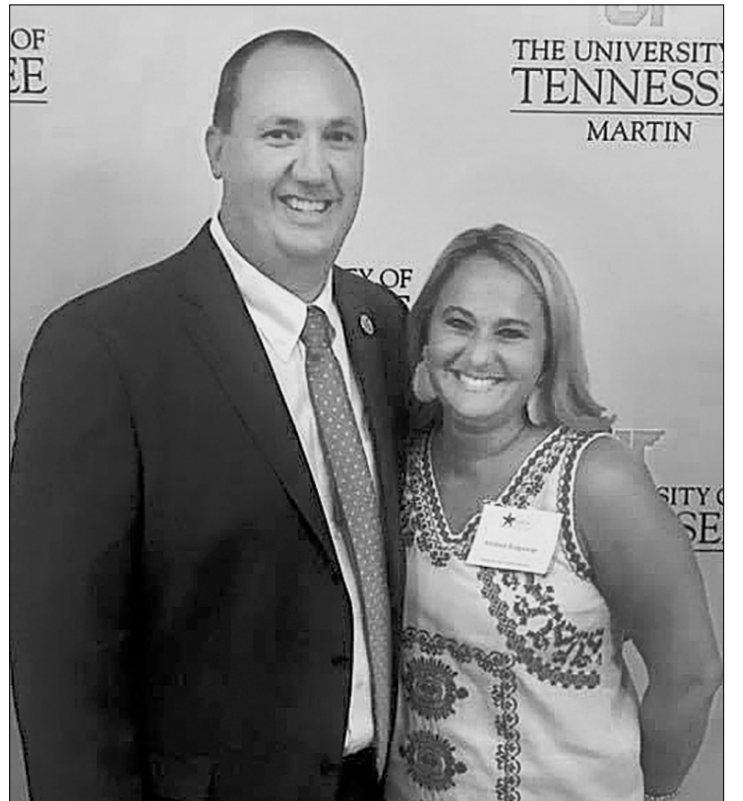
Ridgeway's announcement follows:

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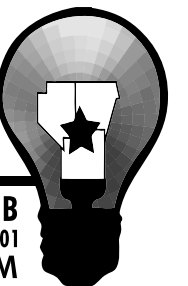

J.R. 'Bob' McDonald McKenzie's Kindest Soul

Some of my fondest memories growing up come from my recollections of me as a little boy spending time with my grandpa, Verdell Story. He was born and raised here, and when he returned home in the early 1980s after his career in California, it was as if he never left. Most of his friends and acquaintances welcomed him home.

I was glued to my grandpa's hip when we moved from California. Most mornings, he and I started our day at the coffee shop. From what I remember, we spent quite a few mornings on Highland Drive going to either Druthers or the Dixie Cup by the old Shannon Lee's motel.

I must have had breakfast before we left home because for the life of me I don't remember eating in either restaurant. What I do remember is spending most of my time going from table to table talking with my friends, all of whom were at least 50 to 60 years older than me.

Three individuals stick out in my mind all these years later: Max Manley, Joe Gooch and Bob McDonald. These morning visits with the cast of characters taught me the value of friendship and a quarter.

Thirty-plus years later, I still count Mr. McDonald as a friend. He has never failed to smile and provide a friendly greeting. As a senior in high school, he offered me the chance of a lifetime. He

was willing to hire me to work for him around his real estate office and would prepare me to take the real estate exam. Naturally, I decided against my best interest and didn't go into real estate but as they say, hindsight is 20-20.

This week, I am dedicating the Weekly 150 to one of the kindest souls in McKenzie, J.R. "Bob" McDonald.

The McDonald family came to the United States from Scotland in 1838. In 1838, David and Margaret McDonald in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina. Two of their children, John and Thomas Washington (1800-1859), migrated to Tennessee. Thomas settled near what would become Blooming Grove Church. In 1858, he donated six acres of land for the construction of the church and cemetery grounds. He would marry Susan M. Alexander; the union produced 10 children, one of whom was David Allison (1831-1901).

David was married twice. His first marriage was to Mary Alexander with nine children. His second marriage was to Kassar Ann Green (1851-1914) with four children, one of whom was James Milton McDonald (1889-1947).

Milton was married twice with a total of six children, three with Alta Cutler and three with Emma Alice Thompson. The union between Milton and Alice brought James Robert into the world.

Bob's family moved around in his early years, first moving to Michigan for work and then to Texas hoping the climate would aid his father's health. In 1937, five-year-old Bob McDonald first laid eyes on his new hometown, McKenzie.

Located in a wooded area, the family settled near Bethel University's old field house. Muddy roads lead their way into town. The McDonald clan lived by modest means, as a grade-schooler Bob's mother sewed him a corduroy jacket with buttons. Some of his classmates had similar jackets but with zippers and they made fun of him.

He and his brother, Paul, earned money by delivering newspapers. On rainy days their bikes would get stuck in the mud and they would be forced to clean them off to continue on the routes. Sometimes they used their mule, Old Kate, to make the delivery.

When he was eleven, he split his time working at Felts' Drug Store during the day and Covington's Drug Store in the evening. There was work to be done at home as well; Saturdays meant plowing until dinner with a treat in the afternoon when their father gave the children enough money for the picture show, which was located in the parking lot behind Super Drugs.

On school days, he walked home from school. During the fall season, he would fill his pockets with pecans from Doug Moor's pecan orchard. A few of the trees will remain on Stonewall Street near Moore Subdivision.

As he grew older, he noticed while he continued riding his bicycle and delivering papers, some of his classmates were driving cars. He seldom missed a day of work, but when he was 15 and a sophomore in high school, he missed two days in a row.

In an interview from December 2000, Bob reflected on one of the hardest days of his life. Mrs. Ruth Dinkins summoned him from class, telling the young

man of his father's death.

"Nobody took me home or anything," he said with a tone of disbelief. "I walked all the way home." When he returned to his newspaper route, a customer demanded, "Why in the world didn't you bring my paper?" Bob always the gentleman responded, "My dad died."

As the oldest son, responsibility came early. "I believe I was 15 when I borrowed my first money. I went to McKenzie Banking Company and sat down before Doc Bell and told him I wanted to buy a pig for \$15."

He secured the loan, bought the pig, and raised it as part of Mr. Otis Cox's agriculture program that sold pigs to the West Memphis Stockyard. Bob said of his pig, "I made a good profit. I was fond of that pig."

It was about that same time the McDonald home received electricity. Bob sold a horse for \$50 and used the money to pay Bill McElroy to wire the old house.

As a junior in high school, Bob was selected to attend Boys' State, where he became interested in Government.

After high school, Bob married the love of his life, Sarah Marie Maynard. Their union brought two sons into the world, Mark Edwin and James Michael.

He told the story of the first time he saw Sarah who was living in Paris at the time but was in McKenzie visiting her Aunt Polly Rucker. "She was walking toward Main Street and as she walked down the hill, I thought she was pretty; I never dreamed I'd later marry her."

The couple's first son, Mark, was a little boy when Bob hitchhiked to Memphis for work. The family later joined him after he found stable employment.

For two-and-a-half years he worked for the City of Memphis after he took a placement test by the personnel office. They sent him to John Gaston Hospital, working as an assistant food purchasing agent.

He later worked with a food

brokerage company where he met Charlie Lubin, founder of Sarah Lee. The opportunity finally arose to return to McKenzie after taking a job with the Tetley Tea Company.

He shared the story of his second son's birth at Dr. Edwards' office. "I was right there with her (Sarah) when he was born. I remember how happy I felt going across and sitting in the city park. I had a new son!"

After 18 years of service in the Kemper Insurance Group, he was "displaced, fired, however you want to put it," he said. "All the big companies were downsizing."

Bob and another associate were called to Jackson for a 1:15 sales conference, with the company "big shots" flying in on their company plane. The gist of the conference was their dismissal.

Having given his all to the business only to be let go after becoming the regional sales manager, Bob had no interest in returning to insurance.

"I had to have a job so I taught preparatory classes, preparing prospective agents for their jobs in all aspects of insurance." He also spent several years teaching Dale Carnegie classes.

Eventually, he worked with a local real estate office for four years before deciding to go into business for himself. He had always heard, "if you want something done, you need to go straight to the home office." With that in mind, he opened his agency "The Home Office."

From 1984-1988, Bob hosted a radio show, "Point of Opinion." The weekly, 30-minute show focused on a different guest each week. Bob recorded the shows to help preserve a piece of local history.

One such interview was with Dr. Marvin Alexander. The story tells how Dr. Alexander escorted a patient to Texas, while on the trip, the doctor met his future wife and brought her back to Tennessee; thus leading to their marriage and birth of Jim Alexander.

The life of Bob McDonald can not be summed up in 2000 words or fewer. He was played numerous roles in McKenzie including serving as a charter member of the McKenzie Jaycees, president of the Lions Club, president of the McKenzie Chamber of Commerce, chairman of the McKenzie Recreation Commission, vice-chairman of the McKenzie Housing Authority, a member of the McKenzie Planning Commission, member of the McKenzie Industrial Board, and served on board of directors for McKenzie Memorial Hospital. For ten years, he was a member of the McKenzie City Council and served as vice-mayor in his last term.

Bob provided a very important thought in his 2000 interview, "The history of the town is so important. I look back on my year in McKenzie, the people I've known, who have made McKenzie what it is, that's important to me."

Twenty years later, as I write these weekly stories, Bob's quote hits home. The names I come across and the memories I try to share truly made McKenzie what it is, and just like Bobby McDonald, that's important to me.

HUNKER DOWN WITH KES

If We All Had The Constitution Of Mr. Newbill...

This Covid-19 thing has spawned more ideas than you can shake a stick at. Some of them can leave you shaking your head...

Take the new "contactless" food service being offered by restaurants, corner eateries and national chains for instance. I can understand the concept. You order and pay by phone; the meal is delivered to the car, doorstep or underground bunker of your choosing boxed, hot and ready for consumption.

The idea here is the consumer can take comfort, and eat heartily, knowing the food has not been touched by human hands. It appears fool proof. Safe. Un-Contagious. And you have to admit,

it's pretty ingenious in light of the current circumstances.

But I do have a couple of questions. How do you break that first egg without a smidgeon of contact? Can you "pat out" a hamburger with just a spatula and a large mayonnaise lid? Is there a way to test for proper seasoning in the tomato sauce without touching it to somebody's tongue?

Oh, they are wearing gloves you say! Well, here's what the gloves do—it makes it impossible for the wearer to know how sticky or contaminated things are after they have opened the refrigerator door, laid their hands on the counter, scratched their face, retied a shoe, picked a loose

leaf of lettuce off the floor...

And statistically speaking, 85.7 per cent of rubber glove wearers blow on them to create the space needed to easily slide their hands inside.

Listen, it gets deeper. The various TV commercials hawking the new service say "contactless" like, perhaps it is a novel idea. That begs further investigation that has my stomach on edge. It suggests, if not overtly, at least sublimely, that all sorts of "contact" has been made in the past.

Boy howdy, that will send you on a gastronomical journey!

Any person considering their "eating out" history must ask themselves the five basic questions pertaining to "food con-

tact": who, what, when, where and how! And gosh, when you start considering all the joints you've ordered food in over the past half century or so...

In 1973 I asked for the "manager's special" in the only diner open past midnight in Post, Texas. They had a velvet picture of Elvis nailed to the back wall. There was more than a dash of sawdust on the floor. And the waitress was a dead ringer for the heroine in the "Creature From the Black Lagoon."

The jukebox played "Now and Then There's a Fool Such As I" while I waited for my food. The cook came through drinking something murky out of a dirty Styrofoam cup and smoking a cigarette as he headed for the bathroom. I don't remember if he was wearing gloves or not. An Australian Blue Heeler drifted in just as the faux movie star dropped the hash in front of me.

I was afraid I might offend Elvis if I didn't eat it all.

I don't think this is the first time something "fishy" is going on in the food industry. We all remember the fast food place a few years back publicly announcing that "from now on" they were going to use real chicken in their nuggets. Me and the rest of the known world immediately thought, "Just exactly what had they been serving us before in their 'semi-chicken' nuggets!"

Wasn't there another chain about the same time that proudly declared—like it was doing us a favor—they were going to start using 100 per cent beef in all their sandwiches...

Thank God for the City Café. We didn't have to worry about the food there. Big Jim Stavely ran a tight ship. And Miss Cora treated us like grownups when she came over to take our order. We'd see the men drifting in

and out of the kitchen while we waited for our food. Big Jim did some other type business back there in-between cooking cheeseburgers. Most every customer at the counter was enjoying a cigarette with their coffee. Bethel University, Mid-South Conference Postpone Fall Athletics

BOWLING GREEN, Ky. — Mid-South Conference Commissioner Eric Ward announced today the postponement of fall sports to spring 2021 due to concerns surrounding COVID-19. The decision comes following last week's administrative council meetings and subsequent approval by the MSC Council of Presidents.

Bethel Associate Athletic Director Brad Chappell addressed the announcement. "I was involved in meetings daily last week with our conference athletic directors and sport chairs from each sport. Throughout those discussions the theme was, 'What gives our athletes the best chance to participate safely and without too much interruption?' The general consensus was the plan that the MSC released this morning.

"We all want to play sports like normal but we also are forced to consider the well-being of all involved. In that regard I am confident that we have a plan in place that will give us the best opportunity to compete safely. That does not mean that there will not be



sports this fall. We still hope to do some things this fall as circumstances allow and that will be discussed and developed in the coming weeks. Ultimately this decision was in the best interest of the conference and member schools and has the support of the commissioner, the institution presidents, the AD's and the coaches."

The sports impacted by the decision are men and women's cross country, men and women's soccer, and women's volleyball. The regular-season conference schedule is slated to precede the championships in the spring.

Conference regular season and tournament dates will be announced following the NIAA's release of national championships dates.

While the conference schedule is adjusted, institutions are given the autonomy to play non-conference games this fall.

In football, each of the three divisions will independently determine conference play. With the football footprint spanning over seven states, each division's administrative council was given the authority to make the decision on fall play based on state and federal regulations within its geographical area. An announcement on the football schedule will come later this week once all three divisions' leaderships have met.

Bethel Football Coach Michael Jasper commented, "As fired up as I was to get back to the game, I am in full support of us putting the health and safety of our student athletes first. The time and ability to learn how to navigate during these times is so important, and I thank Eric Ward, the presidents, athletic directors, and great coaches of the Bluegrass division for fully understanding this. As I have told my guy's a ton of times already, it doesn't matter when or where, we have to be ready to go."

Human Trafficking Awareness Raised Through Red Sand Project, Carroll County Health Department

HUNTINGDON — The Carroll County Health Department partnered with Coordinated School Health and other stakeholders within the community to shed light on human trafficking during the week of July 27-August 2, 2020.

Human trafficking, also known as modern day slavery, is quickly becoming a major public health concern. Today, an estimated 40.3 million people are being trafficked worldwide, including 180 cases reported to the National Human Trafficking Hotline in Tennessee last year.

"Tennessee has been recognized for our progressive efforts for reducing human trafficking, and our mission to continue to work on this crisis until there are no more victims," said Tennessee Health Commissioner Lisa Piercey, MD, MBA, FAAP. "Human trafficking has to stop, and we are dedicated to providing resources and education to our communities."

The Red Sand Project is a participatory art installment designed to shed light on human trafficking. Due to COVID-19, participants in events in their neighborhoods, office groups and respective spaces around the state practiced social distancing and other precautions while pouring red sand in the cracks of sidewalks in areas with high foot traffic, to symbolize human trafficking victims that "fall between the cracks."

Although there was not a large gathering this year due to COVID-19, there were many red sand pours across Carroll County during the week of July 27 through August 2 to help increase the awareness for this important cause. Pictures were posted on social media using the hashtags #RedSandTN and #ItHasToStop.

Representatives throughout Carroll County participated this year, including students and McKenzie and Huntingdon Police officers. CCHD thanks Northwest TN Economic Development Center, Clarksburg Supermarket,

Trezevant City Hall, McKenzie City Hall, Huntingdon Police Department and West Carroll and Hollow Rock-Bruceton schools for allowing the red sand to be poured on their property.

"Even during the COVID-19 pandemic, human trafficking continues to be a concern. The Tennessee Department of Health will continue to work with our partners to educate Tennesseans on ways to identify human trafficking victims and support those who have been trafficked," said TDH Family Health and Wellness Division Deputy Medical Director Denise Werner, MD.

Carroll County Health Department is one of more than 90 organizations that partnered with the Tennessee Department of Health on this effort this year, each hosting events in their communities. The Tennessee Department

of Tourist Development also participated, with each of the 16 Tennessee Welcome Centers featuring information on the project and how to get involved in spreading awareness.

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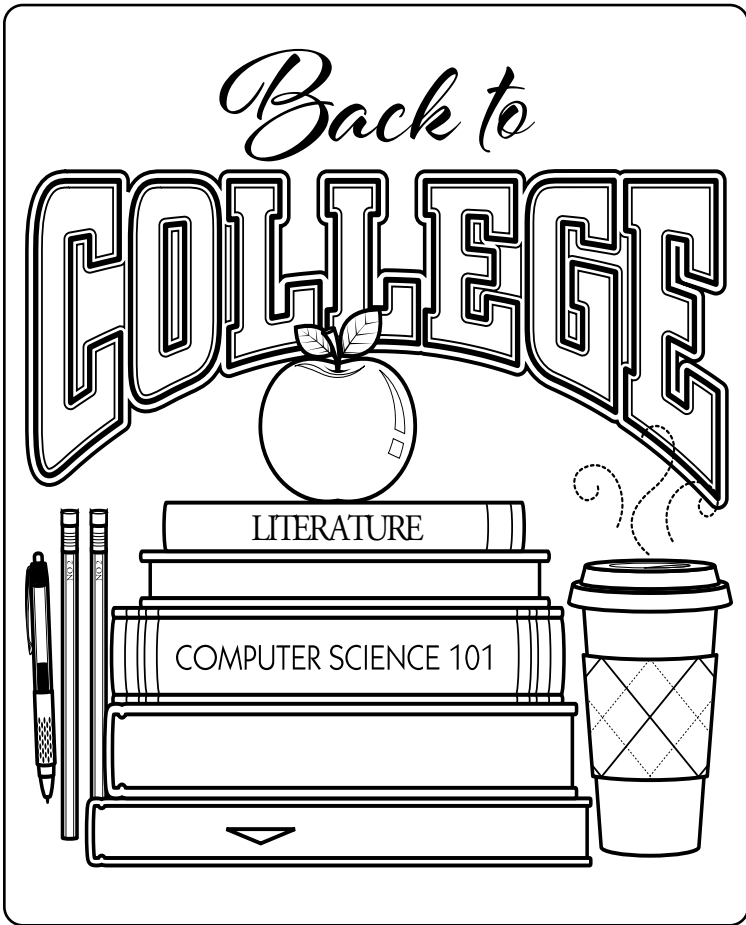

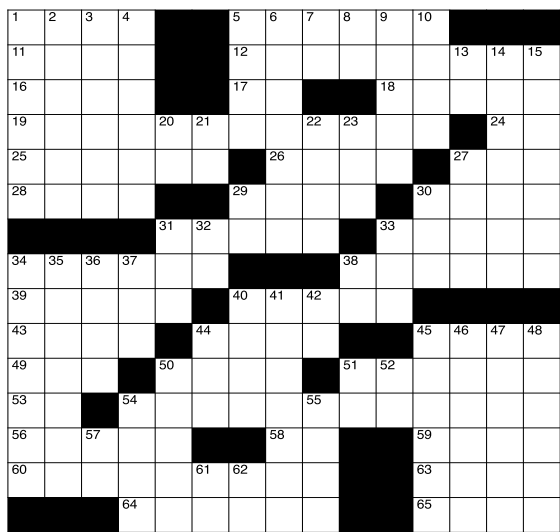
