War Eagles Lose in Overtime Home Opener

ATWOOD (August 21) — The West Carroll War Eagles suffered a season-opening loss 14-8 to Fayette Academy in overtime on Friday, August 21. At the end of regulation, the score was tied 8-8 with both teams only scoring in the fourth quarter. Fayette Academy's quarterback Luke Moore scored in second down to put the Vikings up by six. An attempt to tack on extra points fell short after War Eagle Hunter Lindsey made the stop.

An overtime attempt by West Carroll pushed the ball to the one-yard line, a failed snap ended the series and ballgame.

Both teams play under the TSSAA regulation, which prohibited much of the pre-season practice and no scrimmages because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The audience was limited in attendance because of the virus. Every visitor entering the stadium had their body temperature checked with touchless thermometers.

West Carroll was under the field command of Xander Moon, a junior quarterback.

After a West Carroll kickoff, the Vikings had the first series, earning two first downs and scoring a touchdown that was negated by a holding penalty. The series ended with a West Carroll interception.

West Carroll went three and out on their first possession followed by the Vikings' four and out.

Tyler Shaddon earned the War Eagles a first down and along with help from QB Moon before the series ended with a Vikings interception.

The Vikings earned a first down and moved to West Carroll's 27 yard line to end the first quarter.

West Carroll pressured the Vikings forcing an incomplete pass on second down and a quarterback sack on third down forcing the Vikings to punt it away on fourth.

Deven Rader gained six yards on the first down, but the War Eagles' action was stymied with a penalty and a fumble on third down. The team punted on fourth to mid-field.

The Vikings marched down field with two first downs before a fumble ended the series.

Xander Moon threw two incomplete passes before a third landed in the hands of Jack Barrow to earn the team a new set of downs. Rader, and Moom rushed for another first, and the possession ended with a punt from the Vikings' 42 yard line.

The Vikings earned three first downs and moved to their own 41 yard line before punting. West Carroll had one more possession to end the scoreless first half.

The Vikings started the second half with two first downs ending the series at West Carroll's 31 yard line. The War Eagles made good use of the possession, moving the ball on runs by Deven Rader, Tyler Shaddon, Moon, and a pass to Jack Barrow, earning five first downs and exhausting the clock on the third quarter. A pass on the first play to Jacob Blankenship in the final quarter netted the War Eagles their first touchdown,

and Tyler Shaddon punched in two points to make the score 8-0 with 11:52 remaining in the contest.

The Vikings earned four first downs and moved to West Carroll's one yard line before fumbling, giving the War Eagles possession at the two-yard line. Xander Moon moved the ball eight yards on first down before the remainder of the possession failed to produce needed yardage and led to a West Carroll punt.

The Vikings were soon in pay dirt on a Tanner Howell touchdown with 3:27 remaining in the quarter. A pass netted the extra two to tie the game.

West Carroll's next possession ended in a three and out. The Vikings had the ball at mid-field at the end of regulation and sent the game into overtime.

Next week, the War Eagles travel to McKenzie. Kickoff is 7 p.m.

McKenzie High School Golf Off to Winning Start

The McKenzie High School golf teams are off to a great start with six matches under their belts, boasting several individual and team wins as well as one record-breaking individual performance.

The teams traveled to Chickasaw Golf Course in Henderson on August 3. They played an 18-hole tournament with some skills challenge competitions on the side (putt, chip and drive).

Girls teams included McKenzie, McNairy Central, TCA, USJ, Jackson Christian, South Gibson and Milan. Maggie Glass shot a 78, which put her in third place. Juleyanne Weatherford shot a 97, putting the McKenzie team in fourth place overall.

Boys teams included McKenzie, South Gibson, TCA, McNairy Central, USJ, West Carroll, Jackson Christian and Milan. Johnathan Moore shot a 79 and claimed the fourth place, Logan Green shot a 92, Nathan Nanney shot 93, Nolan Renfro 103 and Matt Espey 120 to round out the team's score of 367 for fifth place overall. In the side competitions (putt, chip and drive), Glass came in third for the girls, and Moore claimed second place for the boys.

Carroll Lake Golf Course was happy to welcome back high school golfers on August 6. The MHS girls played Clarksburg, while the boys faced West Carroll.

The girls took the win over Clarksburg with a score of 86. Glass had a score of 30, which is a new girls high school record for nine holes on the course. Payton

Ognibene shot a 56. Clarksburg had a score of 100. Glass was the match medalist.

The boys team claimed the win over West Carroll. Moore shot 35, Green shot 37 and Renfro 41, rounding out the team's total of 113. West Carroll came in with a score of 145. Moore was the match medalist.

The teams again played at home on Carroll Lake Golf Course on August 11, hosting Riverside, South Gibson and Clarksburg.

With a score of 93, the ladies lost by eight strokes to Riverside with an 85 but claimed a win over South Gibson's 96. Match Medalist Maggie Glass shot a 35 and Payton Ognibene shot 58.

The gentlemen were victorious over their opponents by 19 strokes. Match Medalist Johnathan Moore shot 34, Nolan Renfro came in with a 40, Logan Green with a 41 and Nathan Nanney with a 49 to complete the team's score of 164. The ladies played although the others teams present did not have enough girls to compete as a team. Glass was the match medalist.

The boys team posted a score of 168 to claim victory over Gibson County with a 181. Match Medalist Green led the Rebels with a 39, Moore shot 40, Nanney with a 41 and Espey's 48 completed the team's score.

The teams traveled to Decaturville to play in the Tennessee

River Classic at the Tennessee River Golf Course on August 17. Teams included Perry County, Adamsville, Hardin County, Riverside, Hickman County, Summertown, Lewis County and McKenzie.

Glass led the ladies with a one-under par 70, Weatherford shot an 84 and Ognibene shot 116 to complete the team's score of 154. The McKenzie girls team claimed second place in the tournament. There was a tie for first place medalist for the girls between Glass and Kaley Campbell of Summertown. After a playoff hole for the top honor, Glass claimed the win.

Moore led the men's team with a 74, Renfro with an 88, Nanney with 89 and Green shot 91 to complete the team's score of 342. The gentlemen finished in fourth place, only one stroke behind third place and seven strokes behind second place. Moore won third place individual medalist.

The teams returned home to Carroll Lake on August 18 to host Camden, Henry County, Clarksburg and West Carroll.

The ladies swept their opponents with wins over Henry County and Clarksburg. Glass was match medalist, leading the team with a score of 38. Weatherford shot 41 to complete the team's score of 79.

The gentlemen also swept their opponents, claiming wins over Henry County, West Carroll and Camden. Moore was match medalist and led the team with a 34, followed by Green with a 36. Nanney shot 40 and Renfro shot 47 to complete the team's score of 157.

Tennessee’s Lost Wage Assistance Grant Approved

NASHVILLE — The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has approved the state of Tennessee’s grant application to receive funding to pay the Lost Wages Assistance (LWA) unemployment benefit, in addition to current benefits.

In conjunction with guidance from the U.S. Department of Labor concerning program administration, the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development (TDLWD), and its unemployment computer system vendor, are currently building the new program that will pay the LWA benefit.

Work on the latest federal unemployment program started during the application process and that proactive move will speed up the implementation of LWA in Tennessee. At this time,

there is no definitive start date as to when the state will begin dispersing the additional weekly benefit. The department will provide updates on LWA payments as new information becomes available.

TDLWD will add the \$300 to current Tennessee Unemployment Compensation, Pandemic Unemployment Assistance, Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation, or Extended Benefits payments.

The state’s maximum unemployment benefit is \$275. When combined with the new program, the maximum possible benefit in Tennessee will be \$575 per week, before federal withholding taxes.

The grant requires claimants to receive at least \$100 in state or federal unemployment benefits each week to be eligible for the

new LWA payment.

The LWA payments will be retroactive to Aug. 1, 2020. Eligible claimants currently receiving benefits do not need to take any action because the state will automatically add LWA to their weekly benefit payment.

Unlike the Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation Program (FPUC) that ended in July, LWA is paid for through a grant with a specific amount of funding. It is important to note when the federal program exhausts its grant funding, it will no longer have the resources to provide LWA payments and the program will end at that time. If the federal program does not exhaust the LWA grant funding, payments will end in Tennessee on Saturday, December 26, 2020.

probation.

According to the press release from the State Board of Professional Responsibility, Dempsey’s active suspension shall be retroactive to August 16, 2018. Dempsey is required to pay the Board for all costs in the disciplinary proceeding.

The release states:

“Dempsey admitted violating the Rules of Professional Conduct in two matters. In the first matter, Mr. Dempsey entered an Alford plea and was convicted of the Class B misdemeanor offense of simple assault by offensive touching. In the second matter, Mr. Dempsey was suspended for three (3) years by the United States Bankruptcy Court for the Western District of Tennessee for misappropriating funds, engaging in improper trust accounting, making misrepresentations to his client and the Court, and failing to refund fees to his

client in a timely manner.

Mr. Dempsey admitted his conduct violated Rules of Professional Conduct 1.3 (Diligence), 1.4 (Communication), 1.5 (Fees), 1.15 (Safekeeping Property and Funds), 1.16 (Declining or Terminating Representation), 3.4 (Fairness to Opposing Counsel), 5.3 (Responsibilities Regarding Non-lawyer Assistance), and 8.4(a), (b), (c), and (d) (Misconduct).

In 2018, the Supreme Court of Tennessee temporarily suspended Dempsey from the practice of law upon finding he misappropriated funds.

Huntingdon School Board Bids Farewell To Two Members, Welcomes Electees

HUNTINGDON (August 20) — The Huntingdon Special School District Board of Education met Thursday at the middle school, and, for two long-time board members, it was the last such meeting.

Jerry Morris served on the board for 37 years. He was first elected August 18, 1983 to serve out the term of Dale Kelley and has been reelected six times since.

Paul Stokes sat on the board for 12 years, serving two terms beginning in 2008.

Board Chairman Dr. Lee Carter and Director of Schools Pat Dillahunt each thanked the two for their service, and Dillahunt presented each with a Mustang statue.

Morris noted the word “special” in the district’s name and said the word means a lot to him as the community and school system has always been special to him and always will be. He offered a “special thank you” to his wife, Gwen, saying, “I wouldn’t be here this many years without you.”

Replacing Morris and Stokes on the board are Morgan Butler and Shawna Smith, who were elected on August 6. The two were sworn in during Thursday’s meeting by Director Dillahunt and will begin their service with next month’s meeting.

Also during the meeting, board members heard the annual report from Carroll County Coordinated School



Health Director Mandy Drelly, delayed from May due to the pandemic. She detailed the organization’s contributions to the schools over the year, including health screenings, walk-to-school days, a teen summit, an impaired driving simulator, exercise programs for all ages and, most recently, touchless water-filling stations for each school.

Director Dillahunt presented options for adjusting the 2020-21 calendar to account for the two-week (nine school days) delay in the start of school. Board members voted unanimously to eliminate an administrative day and use eight of the district’s 13 stockpile days to fill out the required instructional days

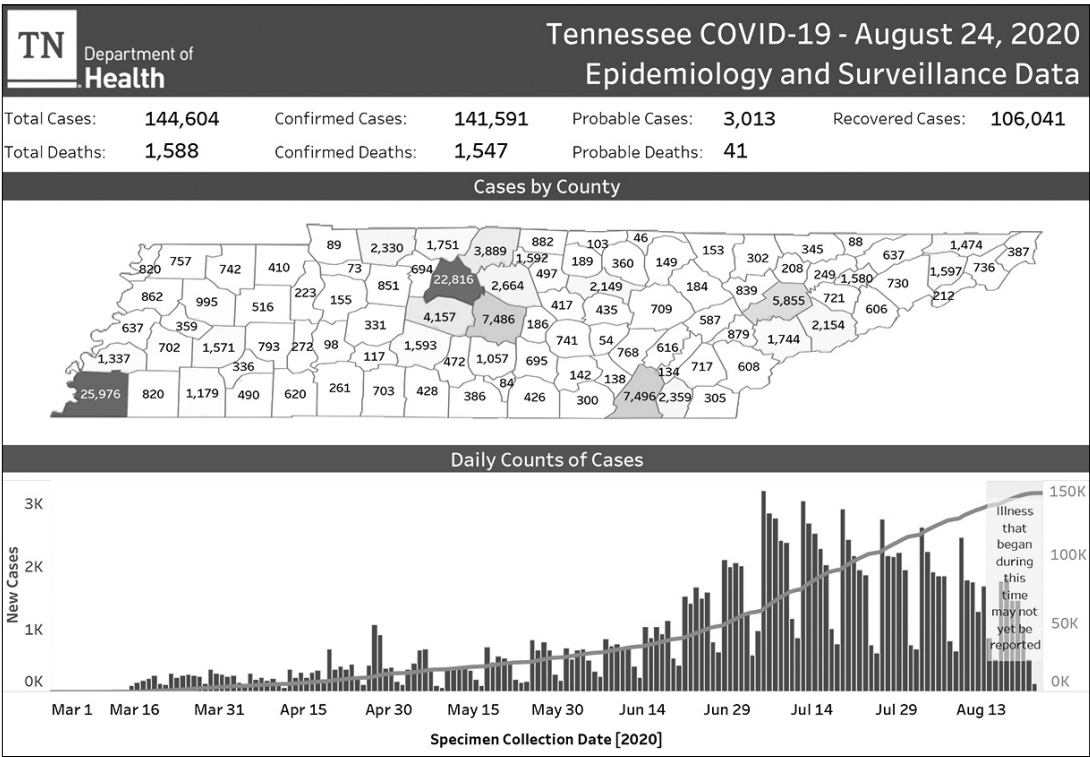
without extending the end of the school year.

The director also reported district enrollment numbers as of August 20. A total of 1,271 students are enrolled in the district, with 185 of those utilizing the virtual option. She noted last year’s final enrollment was 1,274.

The board approved the employment of Rachel Johns for high school Biology and Sheri Singleton as a primary school educational assistant. The resignations of Paula Colvett and Tina Shands were acknowledged.

The meeting adjourned in just under half an hour.

The board meets again Thursday, September 17 at 7 p.m.

Weakley County Mayor Jake Bynum and Henry County Mayor Brent Greer announced a mask mandate in the respective counties.

Tennessee now has 144,604 (134,744 last week) positive cases, 1,547 (1,387 last week) dead and 106,041 (94,812 last week)

recovered.

On July 1, Carroll County had 39 cases with one death; Henry had 42 cases; and Weakley had 61 cases with one death. The state had 45,315 cases, 609 dead, 2,715 hospitalized, and 28,283 recovered. Around the second week in July the case count started exponentially rising week over week.

Officials urge citizens to wear face coverings in public places; keep 6-foot distance from others; wash your hands for 20 seconds; use hand sanitizer when you can’t use soap and water; don’t

touch your face — especially after touching potentially infected surfaces; wipe down high-touch areas with disinfectant often; and avoid heavily congested public places whenever possible.

The U.S. has 5,682,491 cases and 176,223 deaths from the virus. The world has 23,311,719 cases and 806,410 deaths throughout 216 countries.

Investigator Captain Randall McGowan of the Weakley County Sheriff’s Department states on May 27, 2020, Canon Magourik, 18 was shot five times with a 9 mm pistol fired through the front door of his parents’ house located in the 1500 block of Union Church Road, just north of McKenzie in Weakley County.

Magourik’s parents and brother were also in the home at the time of the shooting.

The victim was treated at the scene by Weakley County’s Emergency Medical Services and transported to Jackson-Madison County General Hospital. He was later airlifted to a Nashville hospital.

Lee was captured May 29 during a traffic stop in McEwen, Tennessee, along with Katie Nicole Smith of Martin. Smith was charged with being an accessory after the fact for reportedly providing Lee with a vehicle used in his escape. Mary Beth Lyles of Martin was charged with filing a false report after allegedly lying to U.S. Marshals and making a phone call to warn Lee.

Charges against Smith and Lyles were also dismissed in court Wednesday.

According to Assistant Attorney General Colin Johnson, “Magourik refused to testify. We sat down and had a conversation and he said he was not interested in testifying. He gave no rhyme or reason. He just said he wasn’t going to testify, so we really didn’t have any other option but to dismiss the case. He was the only one who could identify the shooter. Without his tes-

timony, there was no way to prosecute the case.”

Regarding the decision by the district attorney’s office to also drop charges against the two women involved in the case, Smith and Lyles, Johnson said, “If I can’t identify the shooter, then I couldn’t prove they were assisting Lee in some way and being accessories after

the fact.”

“It’s unusual for this to happen, obviously,” Johnson said. “We were disappointed we couldn’t follow through with the prosecution. If additional evidence or other witnesses come forward, or if the victim decides to testify in the future, we still have the ability to pursue the case.”

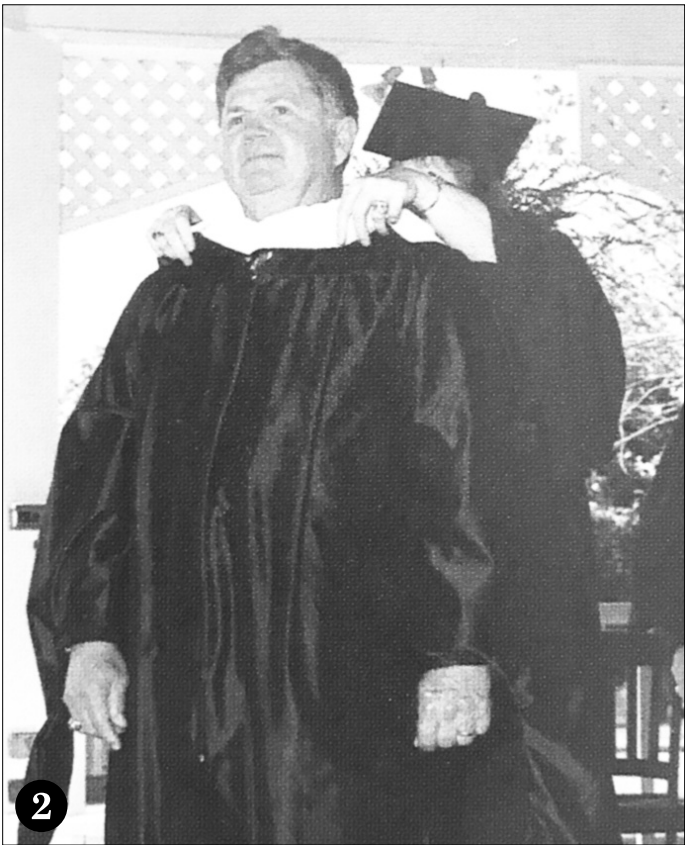
The bells, in Donne’s thinking and poem, tolled to announce the funeral of a lately departed villager. It was the death march.

E. Ray Morris (Part II) McKenzie's Benevolent Son

In December 1962, Ray Morris was 25 years old and was on his way to Atlanta. With \$1,300 to his name and still owing his father \$750, he began working for Eastern Engineering Company under Charlie Long.

Eastern's business was to design paper mills from concept to completion of construction. Morris lasted a year with the company before looking for a change. A call to Tom McCord changed his life.

Morris was hired as the company's project manager. With Tom McCord Construction, he was responsible for the construction of service stations. A three-year span of successful projects led to move to the larger construction firm of McDonough Construction.

After one year, Ray was ready for a change. He quickly learned he enjoyed the smaller style projects of McCord Construction. With a wife and family, he was looking for greater opportunities with a larger cash flow.

The summer of 1967 brought two changes to Ray. On the same day, he asked Linda Mayer to marry him and he became business partners with Felix Cochran.

The plan for the new company was the construction of apartments.

The initial idea brought by Felix to Ray was not well received. Morris wrote, “The scum of the industry builds stick frame apartments, and I didn’t want any part of it.” After promises of ownership and large potential profits, Ray became more interested.

He was persuaded to work for a year as job superintendent and “hated every minute of it.” After the initial year, Felix was able to present their combined talents and potential as they began their visit apartment development as Venture Construction Company near Stone Mountain, Georgia.

Hard work and persistence led to Venture Construction landing two additional construction jobs along with the initial Tahoe apartments near Stone Mountain. As 1969 drew to a close, Ray and Linda purchased their first home.

From 1972 to 1975, Venture Construction began growing as Ray and Felix made strategic hires. Then there were a series of conversations with Burger King which led to a long-lasting relationship.

Success begot more success for Ray, Felix and Venture. Next to come knocking was McDonald's and then Hardee's. The growth and expansion of McDonald's led Venture to open a branch office near Raleigh, North Carolina in 1977. In that year, Venture's construction volume was approximately \$7 million, by 1979 the volume was up to nearly \$14 million. This led the group to open a branch in Tampa, Florida.

The sky seemed to be the limit as volume grew exponentially. 1981 saw it at \$19 million, 1984 at \$51 million and by 2007 the volume was measured at \$223 million.

Ray stated in his autobiography he never envisioned himself as a philanthropist, but the sudden and untimely death of his younger brother Joe brought him down the path of benevolence. Bill Odom, President of Bethel College, called Ray to inform him of the institution's decision to name the new men's dormitory after his late brother. In 1987, Morris Hall was constructed and Ray was asked to join the college's board of trustees.

“At the risk of offending some of my friends who may think that philanthropy would always be kept anonymous, I can say that I am proud of my contribution to the construction of Prosser Hall. Tennessee Tech has also been a very important part of my career.”

In recent years, Ray and his wife, Linda, have gifted real estate to the city of McKenzie and McKenzie Industrial Board and have been major contributors to Bethel University. The Ray and Linda Morris Science Building on the campus of Bethel is

named in Morris' honor.

The life of Ray Morris is one based on family, business and friendship. Ray and Linda were married on November 18, 1967, in an ornate European style log cabin where he along with Felix Cochran and Dante Stephensen were living at the time. Their marriage brought two children, Courtney and Stephanie. Later the Morrises were blessed with grandchildren.

Venture Construction has had over 50 years of success with Ray currently serving as the company president. At one point, Ray had wanted an exit strategy when he reached 65. “We are still talking about it and nothing specific has been done, except that we have had several meetings and attended a few seminars.”

Now in his 80s, only time will tell what future successes lay in store for Ray Morris and Venture Construction.

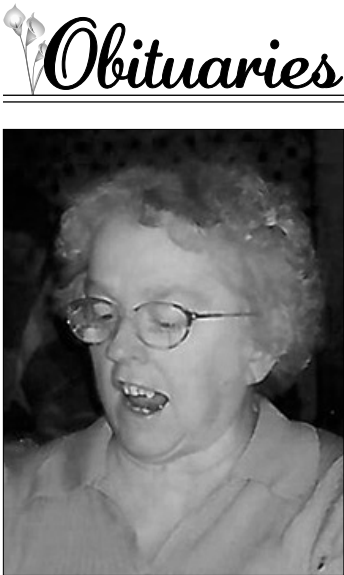

State Funds Available for Agriculture

Tennessee Department of Agriculture offers a program for producers and agribusinesses. It is targeted to businesses that did not receive federal money under other programs.

The CAFB Fund covers lost revenue and expenses incurred as a result of COVID-19. Requests for relief must match at least one of the following four categories.

Business Disruption — This includes requests for reimbursement-based funding for lost revenue, including export market

losses, or business disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Costs Associated with Pandemic Response — This category includes reimbursement of specific costs related to response to the COVID-19 pandemic. For example, this would include the costs of cleaning or purchase of personal protective equipment (PPE) needed to increase safety and reduce the transmission of COVID-19.

Supply Chain Enhancement — This category includes projects

that strengthen and/or safely build Tennessee's food and fiber supply chains. This fund will be for existing agricultural and forestry businesses and include costs associated with increasing production or processing capacity, increasing the number of employees to combat supply chain issues, as well as throughputs, inventory and raw materials capacity issues created by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Increased Meat Processing Capacity — This category includes projects that create or

expand meat processing capacity to solve the problems (facility expansion, fixtures, on-site job training, or equipment that will expand animal throughput, processing capacity, the amount or type of products produced, or processing speed) created by the COVID-19 pandemic.

If a business qualifies under more than one category, applicants should indicate so on their application. The CAFB Fund Committee will accept and review applications beginning August 17, 2020 and ending Au-

gust 31, 2020. Applicants will be evaluated and notified of the outcome of their request on September 15, 2020.

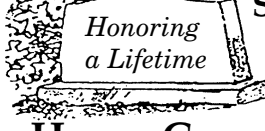

Easy Pecan Sticky Buns

Pecan Sauce:
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup water
1/3 cup butter
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Dough:
2 cup all purpose flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup evaporated milk
1/3 cup vegetable oil
To make pecan sauce, mix brown sugar, butter, water and pecans in small sauce pan. Boil gently for 10 minutes. Pour into

9 inch round cake pan and set aside. Mix cinnamon and sugar. Set Aside. To make the dough, mix flour, baking powder and salt. Add milk and oil. Blend well and form into a ball. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough into 12x10 rectangle. Sprinkle with cinnamon sugar mixture and roll up, starting at longer side. Cut into 12 slices. Place slices on top of pecan mixture. Bake 20 to 25 minutes at 400 degrees.

Down South Pecan Waffles

2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs, separated
6 tablespoons shortening, melted
3 teaspoon baking powder
3/4 cup chopped pecans
1 1/2 cup milk
Sift together dry ingredients and add pecans. Beat egg yolks until light; combine with milk and melted shortening and add

to dry ingredients, mixing just until smooth. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into batter. Bake in hot waffle iron.

Frozen Cherry Salad

1 can (16 ounce) cherry pie filling
1 can (14 ounce) condensed milk
1 can (14 ounce) crushed pineapple
1 carton (13 ounce) whipped topping
Mix all ingredients and freeze in 9x13 pan. Cut into squares and garnish with pecans.

Lime Jello Salad

2 package lime jello (small)
1 8-ounce pkg cream cheese
1 cup walnuts or pecans, chopped
1 small can pineapple, crushed
Beat cream cheese. Slowly add jello diluted in hot water. Add pineapple and nuts. Let set until firm in refrigerator

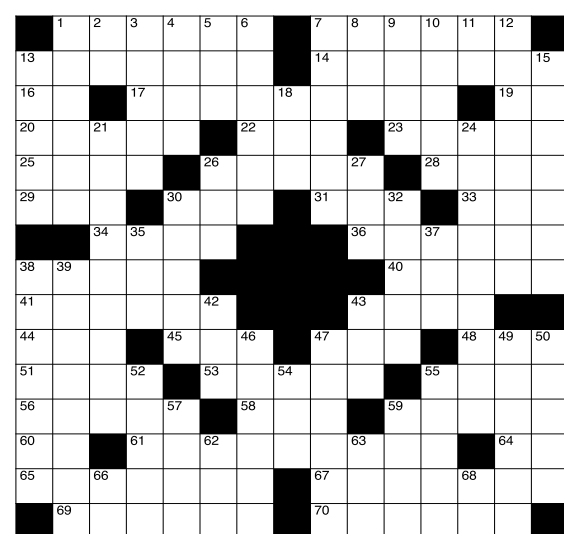

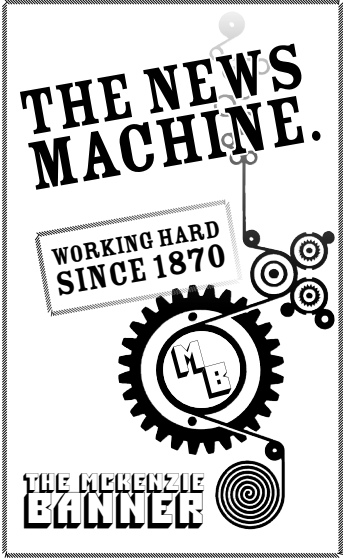

Rebels Stun Mustangs in Thrilling Season Opener

HUNTINGDON (August 21) — After a summer of uncertainty due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the high school football season got underway on schedule Friday, including the classic Carroll County rivalry game between the Huntingdon Mustangs and McKenzie Rebels. The Rebels shocked the host Mustangs for a 31-22 victory.

Usually, the contest is played before a capacity crowd, but safety guidelines forced attendance on both sides to be limited for an oddly understated atmosphere.

McKenzie got off to a hot start, capitalizing on back-to-back Huntingdon fumbles for a quick 14-0 lead. The Mustangs battled back to tie the game with under a minute remaining in the first half, but the Rebels stormed down the field to regain the lead with a field goal as time expired. Huntingdon scored on a McKenzie fumble to start the second half, but the Rebels took the win with 14 unanswered points down the stretch.

Unfortunately for the Mustangs, the loss meant the end of several impressive streaks. It was their first loss to McKenzie since 2014, their first regular-season loss since 2016 and their first back-to-back losses (going back to last year's playoff loss to Lake County) since 2014.

Huntingdon received the open-

ing kickoff, but the first snap from scrimmage resulted in a fumble, recovered by Rebel Brandon Boaz and returned to the Mustang 15. Rebel Logan Lyles ran for two yards, then quarterback Eli Surber kept for five. On third down, Caleb Gill found a gap up the middle for an eight-yard touchdown. Zach Aird kicked the point-after, and McKenzie led 7-0 with 10:17 to play in the first frame.

Aird kicked off for a touchback, and Huntingdon started at the far 20. It was quickly third down, but quarterback Blake Bradley kept for 29 yards across midfield to the 37. Two plays later, a holding penalty set the Mustangs back to midfield. A host of Rebels broke up the next play for a loss, and the next resulted in another fumble. Boaz again made the recovery, and McKenzie took over at the Huntingdon 38.

Gill gained seven on first down, then Surber kept for a 31-yard touchdown. Aird kicked the PAT, and the Rebels led 14-0 halfway through the first quarter.

Aird again kicked for a touchback, and the McKenzie defense pushed the Mustangs back on three straight plays. Bradley punted from the end zone, and the Rebels took over near midfield.

The first snap resulted in a fumble, and Mustang Cade Wood recovered at the McKenzie 47.

A first-down penalty set Huntingdon back five yards, but Bradley gained eight on a delayed run. Wood carried twice to move the chains, but it was soon fourth-and-four. The Mustangs came up short on the try, and the Rebels took over at their own 23. Gill made a short gain as the quarter ended, then slipped and lost a few yards on the first play of the second. Two plays later, Aird's punt was downed at the Mustang 34.

Huntingdon kept it on the ground during a seven-play, 66-yard scoring drive. Bradley and Aiden Hutcherson took turns

with the ball, culminating in a six-yard score by Hutcherson. Bradley threw to Luke Furr for two points, and the Mustangs cut the deficit to 14-8 with seven minutes to play in the half.

Mustang Blake Reeves kicked off to Rebel Will Latimer, who made a solid return to the 30. Gill made two short gains, then Surber threw to Lyles for a first down. The QB then tossed to Marquez Taylor for another first, but followed with an incomplete pass on the same play. On the next play, Bradley stripped the ball to give Huntingdon possession.

The Mustangs failed to capitalize and went three-and-out, but Bradley's punt took a favorable bounce to pin McKenzie back deep.

The Rebels also went three-and-out, and Aird's punt went out of bounds at the McKenzie 44.

Hutcherson ran for five, then caught a 22-yard pass from Bradley. After a false start penalty, Bradley kept for a 22-yard touchdown. The two-point attempt failed, but Huntingdon knotted the score at 14-14 with 46 seconds left in the first half.

Reeves opted for a squib kick, and the Rebels started at their 47. Surber threw to Latimer for four yards, then tossed to Gill for a first down at the 39. The QB followed with a long pass to Lyles for a 35-yard gain with time winding down. After a quick timeout, Aird nailed a 21-yard field goal as time expired to give McKenzie a 17-14 lead.

The Rebels received the second-half kickoff and started at their own 40. A promising drive turned to disaster after six plays when a fumble was recovered by Huntingdon's Tayshawn Rivers and returned 77 yards for a go-ahead touchdown. Bradley ran for two points, and the Mustangs enjoyed their first lead, 22-17 with 9:29 left in the third quarter.

McKenzie answered with a

nine-play, 67-yard drive, all on the ground to eat up as much clock as possible. Rashad McCreary ran three times for 33 total yards, Lyles carried four times for 16 yards, and Taylor finished the drive with two runs for four yards and a 14-yard touchdown. Aird hit the PAT, and the Rebels regained the lead at 24-22 with five and a half minutes to go in the third.

Huntingdon ran out the quarter with a long drive that extended into the final frame. Ten plays, all on the ground, ended the third on a first down at the Rebel 26. Bradley threw incomplete to start the fourth, and it was quickly fourth-and-nine at the 25. Bradley's throw to the end zone fell incomplete, and McKenzie took over with just under eleven minutes to play.

Gill pounded the ball for a first down and followed with a seven-yard gain. Surber moved the chains again on a delayed run, then Gill gained nine on three tries. McCreary converted the fourth-down, and McKenzie kept it on the ground, mixing in runs by McCreary, Taylor, Lyles and Gill before Surber kept for a two-yard score. Aird finished a perfect night on PATs, and the Rebels had a comfortable 31-22 lead with under three minutes to play.

Aird's squib kick set the Mustangs up with good position near midfield, but two runs netted just a yard. On third down, Bradley's pass fell incomplete. On fourth, he dropped back deep and was sacked by Boaz.

The Rebels took over with a minute to go, and Surber took a knee twice to seal the win.

McKenzie produced 324 yards of total offense, including 80 in the air and 244 on the ground, while holding Huntingdon to 186 total yards (22 passing and 164 rushing).

This week, the Rebels (1-0) host West Carroll (0-1) while the Mustangs (0-1) host Waverly (1-0).
