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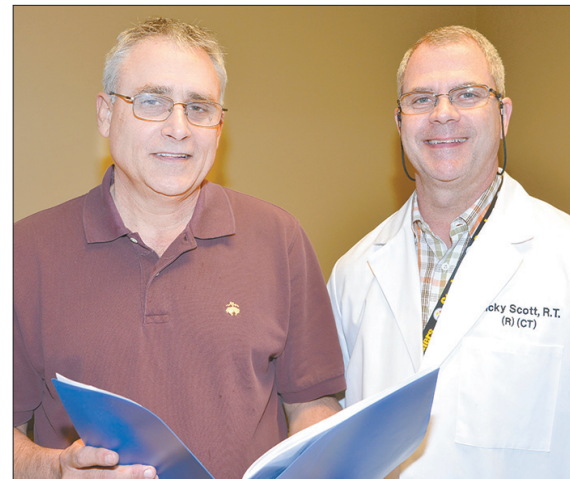

Mazza Painting Rehabs Facades

MCKENZIE (April 9) Downtown McKenzie business owners are taking advantage of Tennessee Downtowns Innovation Grant funding administered through the Tennessee Main Street Program to renovate their store fronts.

The \$15,000 grant is being divided among applicants for storefront renovation or marketing of their businesses through mini grants. Applicants can receive up to \$3,500 via 70 percent / 30 percent match.

McKenzie is one of three communities in west Tennessee and one of 12 in Tennessee to receive the grant.

Mike Mazza, a commercial / residential painter from Humboldt, is performing the lion's share of the grouting, brick replacement and painting to numerous building facades downtown including the Theatre, Jack Martin Jewelry, the Weezerie building located across from Lou Lou Belles, My Sister's Closet, the former Impressions building, and the

CES Principal Nunamaker to Retire

BRUCETON (March 26) — For Hollow Rock-Bruceton Central Elementary School Principal Jennie Nunamaker, the thought of retiring in September is bittersweet.

Smiling, she began, “I’ve enjoyed teaching and administrat-ing these last 30 years. Education has provided me with numerous blessings. It has been both in-teresting and fulfilling. And, as most teachers and administra-tors will tell you, no two days at school are ever the same. I like that my job is never boring.”

She continued, “As a teacher, I’ve been blessed with wonder-ful students, parents, and the support of the community. As an administrator, I have been blessed with a wonderful staff to work with and cooperative teachers who are dedicated to their children. But, having said all of that, I must admit that I am excited about retiring and entering into the next phase of my life. It’s time.”

Pausing, she added, “I know that there will be some sadness when my education career comes to an end, but, right now I am joyful and thankful. I’m really looking forward to traveling

some and living as stress-free as possible. But, then again, I would still like to work in some capacity three or four days a week. I like to stay busy.”

After graduating from Hol-low Rock-Bruceton Central High School, Nunamaker received her bachelor’s degree in education and Master’s degree in admin-istration from the University of Tennessee at Martin. She began her teaching career at Briarwood Elementary School in Camden before returning to teach at her alma mater. From there, she taught two years at Selmer Ele-mentary School before departing the education field to manage her families clothing store, Macs Bargain House, for nine years.

She said, “When I returned to education, I taught at Briarwood Elementary and Central Element-ary before being hired as CES principal. I’ve held that position for 17 years.”

Nunamaker said that although she will leave her position as CES principal on June 30, she will continue working at the school this fall as a mentor to the new principal and in the classroom.

She added, “On September 30, I will reach my 30-year plateau

in education. At that time, I will retire. So, I still have a little time left here at Central with the stu-dents and teachers. I’ll be here until then.”

Reflecting on her teaching and administrative career, Nunamak-er spoke about the joys and disap-pointments adherent to the job.

She said, “The most reward-ing part of being an educator is seeing a child really “get it”. To watch kids that are motivated to learn excel is thrilling to me. The flip side to that is seeing kids that are capable of succeeding choose not to try. That’s heartbreaking. Teachers want the very best for their students. But, in the end, students have to want the best for themselves. Unfortunately, some kids just don’t put forth their best effort. That is sad.”

The daughter of deceased par-ents J.W. and Ruby Lee McMillin, Nunamaker is the proud parent of two daughters, Lee, a teacher and coach at Chester County High School; and Jenna, a hair stylist at Profiles in Jackson, who is presently finishing her degree in mathematics. She is also the grandmother of eight.

McKenzie Senior Citizens Center Celebrates 30 Years

McKENZIE (April 12) — Di-rectors and members of the McKenzie Senior Citizens Center celebrated its 30-year anni-versary during a reception held Sunday, April 12 at the Main Street location.

The 3,600 square-foot build-ing, located at 172 Main Street, serves as a gathering place for members and visitors to play cards, exercise, shoot billiards, and share meals.

Charlie Cooper, president, said the center is owned by the City of McKenzie and operated by the McKenzie Senior Citi-zens organization.

In the mid-1980s, the former Western Auto building became available for purchase. Mayor Joe Morris worked with a new-ly organized group of senior

citizens who advocated for the building to be converted to a Senior Citizens Center. For-mer school superintendent W.O. Warren headed that fund-rais-ing project and was the first president. The street running adjacent to the Center is named in Warren’s memory.

Grace Johnson Beasley, age 89, was the first lifetime mem-ber. She presented a check to W.O. Warren in November 1984 – ahead of the membership drive scheduled to start in Jan-uary 1985.

McKenzie Rotary Club con-tributed \$10,000 to the cause. Keith Priestley was the pres-ident of the service club when donation was made. He helped celebrate the 30-year anniver-sary on Sunday.

Ray Lemonds, immediate past president, said the building has undergone renovations since it was first purchased. He said the flat roof was converted to a pitch roof, double doors were converted to a single door entry, and other aesethics were added.

Members pay a small annual membership fees to participate in the events.

MHS Students Tell of SCOPE Conference

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Four McKenzie High School students told of their experi-ences at the annual Student Congress on Policies in Educa-tion (SCOPE) in Murfreesboro. Students attending were: Lexie Bolin, Cecilia Sutton, Anto-nio Vega, and Dejan McNulty. They made their presentation to the Board of Education at the MSSD on Tuesday, April 14.

Guidance Counselor Shei-la Ridley said she drove the four to the campus of Middle Tennessee State University where the met with other stu-dents across the state to dis-cuss issues facing students and schools in Tennessee.

The morning drive started at 5:15 and the day ended at 5:50 when students returned to McK-enzie. All the students gathered for a general meeting and then split into groups, which dis-cussed the pros and cons of specific issues. They voted by text message, said Ridley.

Lexie Bolin said her group discussed mandating a class in computer coding language prior to graduation. The con – the cost for the school to provide undated programs and equip-ment. The pro – computer cod-ing would be useful in college and provide more job opportu-

nities. The students voted 148 – no, and 59 – yes as it relates to mandating the class.

Cecilia Sutton said her group discussed having all textbooks in a digital format. The group voted 119 – no, and 85 – yes as it relates to mandating the digital textbooks. The cons – eyestrain to students and cost of insur-ance and updating software. It would cost \$2.1 million per high school on average. The pros – it would be lighter than printed textbooks and tables are easier to use.

Antonio Vega spoke about benchmark testing shall replace high stakes testing. The vote was 141 – no, and 54 – yes.

Dejan McNulty spoke about the requirement for teachers to implement social media into classroom instruction. The cons – cheating would be easier and it would produce less face-to-face instruction, it would also be a disadvantage to students without devices or who have older devices. Pros – it would be more fun for students.

In other business, the board heard a report that Lynn Wat-kins, director of schools, had hired Lance McAllister of Can-non County to teach high school history and coach high school girls’ basketball. He will replace Coach Robert Browning in the coaching position.

Math textbooks were dis-cussed. Watkins said the two different paperbacks would be used instead of a hardback. The consumable paperbacks allow the school system to get updated versions as they are released instead of being lim-ited to a hardback that used in multiple years.

Instructional fees for high school instructional fees for the 2015-2016 school year are: -all science lab classes \$15.00; Computer \$5.00; Art \$15.00; End of Course notebook \$15.00; Ac-counting materials \$25.00; Driver Education \$45.00; Cap and Gown \$29.00; Diploma/Diploma Cover \$21.00; Health Science \$15.00; Health Science Scrubs \$40.00; Student Professional Health Liability Insurance \$15.00.

Middle school instruction-al fee for the 2015-2016 school year are: all science lab classes \$10.00.

Board members Lance Rider, Jon Davis, and Michelle Horton were absent. Board member Greg Barker said Mrs. Horton is continuing her post-op treat-ments in a Nashville hospital for her brain tumor.

trucks. The last improvement to the county's ISO rating was in the fall of 1984.

McBride said the county has worked 11 years to achieve this better rating. It has purchased pumper and tanker trucks for the 12 rural fire brigades and

worked with the municipalities for access to fire hydrants.

The county appropriates over \$200,000 annually to maintain the 12 fire brigades and upgrade their equipment. Each of the rural brigades raises funds for additional equipment.

Bradshaw said the 150 volunteer firefighters worked to achieve this better rating. He said he is still mapping areas in an effort to install additional "dry" hydrants to extend the better ISO rating to additional

property owners.

The county will construct the access road and install the dry hydrant without cost to the property owner.

McBride noted the rating does not affect the municipal fire departments' ratings or the people in their primary service area.

Property owners can contact their insurance provider to determine if their property is available for the new lower insurance rate.

Camera Act bill I am sponsoring. The bill is still alive and will be argued before the House Finance Committee on April 15. The bill, if passed, will stop traffic camera companies from issuing one-sided contracts to towns in Tennessee that generate millions of dollars in revenue for other states and countries. The best determination of pure reviewed data I've seen is inconclusive concerning whether traffic cameras reduce injuries or wrecks."

Huntingdon Mayor Dale Kelley responded, "The Town of Huntingdon conducted traffic safety data studies three years prior to installing traffic cameras in town and compared that data with research gathered three years after the cameras were installed. Our data proves that the cameras have cut speeding substantially and reduced wrecks and injuries by over 40-percent. Safety, not money, is our town's first priority. Why should two or three towns in East Tennessee misusing traffic cameras impact Huntingdon and Carroll County towns? Without the cameras, we would have to hire three officers to do the job that they do. That would cost Huntingdon over \$100,000."

Kelley opined that Holt's bill to ban traffic cameras is an unfunded mandate allowing for federal and state-level government entities to set policy on towns.

Holt requested that media present emphasize the merit of municipal concerns posed by Kelley, McKenzie Mayor Jill Holland, and Carroll County Mayor Kenny McBride.

He said, "My biggest problem with traffic cameras is one-sided contracts. In 2013, Murfreesboro's traffic cameras generated 1.16 million dollars. Of that amount, Murfreesboro collected \$289,000. The rest went to Arizona. Also, we are in an economically-depressed part of the state. There is an economic, emotional, and psychological cost linked to towns like Huntingdon, McKenzie, and Union City where out-of-town drivers are ticketed by traffic cameras. Those people may not want to return to towns once they are ticketed. It could hurt business."

Kelley retorted, "Hurt business? We have had the opposite effect of what you are talking about. We have had three new businesses open in the area where we use traffic cameras. It has not impacted us detrimentally at all."

Holt responded, "Mayor Kelley, I have spoken to as many law enforcement officials as citizens, and they are adamant in stating that cameras are not a replacement for officers. Cameras can't verify if a driver is drunk, impaired by drugs, or has been involved in criminal activity. Officers miss out on the opportunity to interact with people and apprehend dangerous individuals. The bottom line is that citizen response trumps everything else."

Kelley responded, "When state and federal legislators begin telling local governments what they can and cannot do, I see that as poor government in action. Local towns should have the right to set local policy."

Moving on, Holt informed McKenzie Mayor Holland that plans to restore Carroll Lake to pre-flood damage are on-going.

He said, "I have contacted the Tennessee National Guard and requested that they do all the dirt work necessary to restoring the lake. We will also petition for Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) and Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA) funds to repair the spillway, re-populate the lake and return it to a fishing lake. This will not happen overnight, but should be achieved in a two to three-year span."

Hollow Rock-Bruceton Special School District Director David Duncan, accompanied by school educators Theresa Scott and Sandi Walden, quizzed Holt regarding his support for a voucher program that will provide governmental funding to allow economically-disadvantaged students enrolled in the lowest five-percent performing schools to transfer to private schools.

Duncan said, "It's hard enough for our schools to embrace constant government changes to testing and so forth, but when you take one child out of our school, that represents

roughly \$5,000. You take out five or six students out, and that loss equals a teacher salary. Vouchers will definitely hurt public schools."

Holt said, "It's true that I am a big fan of vouchers. I am part of the push to stop students who can't read from being passed from one grade to the next without any foundation of education. We will not change the trajectory of education until we have changed the mindset."

Duncan countered, "We are using teacher intervention to assist students experiencing learning difficulties and are striving to provide the best education possible for all of our children. Our teachers are working harder than ever before, and, on top of that, they have to deal with constant changes and new demands the government places on them. A lot of folks in government that are pushing curriculum and testing changes have never taught in the classroom. That's a big part of the problem."

CHS educator Scott interposed, "I am nearing the end of my teaching career, and I can tell you that things are not changing for the better for students or teachers. It is not fair that students who have no interest in attending college are being forced to take upper tier classes. It's not fair to me either, because I teach upper-tier classes and my overall evaluation scores reflecting my effectiveness as an educator is tied directly to end-of-course scores. A technical-based educational path needs to be provided for students who are not interested in going to college. They shouldn't have to take the same upper-tier math and science classes that are required for college-bound students. It isn't fair."

Walden, a CMS math teacher, added, "I have taught for 19 years, and I know first-hand that the continual changes that are being imposed on teachers and students by the government is hurting education. I know that vouchers will hurt public schools. Something has to change very soon."

Commission Amends Budget To Accept Funds for Radios

CARROLL COUNTY (April 13) – Commissioners amended the County of Carroll's budget on Monday to accept \$487,501.20 from the county's E911 Board for the purpose of purchasing two-way radios for the county's Sheriff's Department and Rural Fire Department.

The new digital radios will be supported by a new system of repeaters throughout the county to assure two-way communication with the dispatcher and between mobile units.

The Impact Funds from the E911 Board will provide the lion's share of the cost of the

new communication system.

Mayor Kenny McBride said the funds have already been received and the Commission has approved the purchase of the radios, this was the final step to reflect the transfer of funds in the budget.

In other business, commissioners approved the following resolutions:

Appointed Don Reed of McMoresville to the Board of Equalization to fill the vacancy of Larry Fisher.

Appointed Carl Byars to the Carroll County Library Board to fill the vacancy of Nancy

Rush.

Reappointed Billy J. Smith the Carroll County Zoning Appeals and Carroll County (Lake) Regional Planning Commission. Larry Spencer was the lone no vote.

Approved a five-year reappraisal cycle for all real estate in the county. The State is requiring the change from four years to five years.

Approved notaries public Kellie Birdwell, Felicia Bush, Vickie Flores, Peggy Hamlett, Cindy Holladay, Braden Maddox, Otis Nesbitt, and Frances Snider.

The radiologists of Independent Radiology Associates, PLC will continue to interpret the images from the diagnostic imaging department;

MRH has engaged AlphaSleep to assist with the management of the sleep laboratory. The sleep

laboratory has the capacity to complete two studies each night. Kumar Yogesh, M.D., serves as the medical director for the sleep laboratory. Dr. Yogesh is board certified by the American Board of Sleep Medicine.

All diagnostic studies must be ordered by a physician.

Beer Board Issues Permit to Exxon Store

MCKENZIE (April 9) Members of the McKenzie Mayor and Council, sitting as the Alcoholic Beverage Commission, approved the off-premises permit to sell package beer at Paris 143, Inc. also known as the Exxon Food Shop, located at 17525 Highland Drive, McKenzie.

The permit was issued to Mr. Romeo Shati, the new owner.

The measure passed with affirmative votes from Gene Hale, Cassie Allen and Jessie Townes. Commissioner Kevin Gallimore abstained.

That led to the question of whether or not it was approved, since only three of the six total commissioners voted to issue the permit. Commissioners Charles Pruneau and David Hochreiter were absent.

City Attorney Laura Keeton declared that Gallimore could not abstain since the applicant had filed all the proper documents and complied with the city’s ordinances.

Gallimore remained unmoved and did not change his vote. Keeton then declared the measure passed with three votes.

MCKENZIE (April 9) Water and sewer rates are set to slightly increase to pay the amortization on a significant wastewater system improvement project in McKenzie.

McKenzie Mayor and Council, at its April 9 meeting, approved the first of two readings on an ordinance to increase water rates equal to the Consumer Price Index. The rates will be adjusted each July over a 20-year period. The second and final reading is April 30 during a special meeting of the Council.

In other business, the board approved the nominations of Dennis R. Coleman and Zia Locke to serve on the McKenzie Memorial Library Board.

In a non-agenda item, the board approved the opening of sealed bids for the mow-

ing around the water towers, sewer plants, at around the welcome sign on State Route 22S. K.T. Construction bid \$435.00 per mowing while Barksdale Law Service bid \$350.00. The Council voted to allow a committee to review the bids and award to the lowest bidder if all specifications were met.

In a non-agenda item, the board approved Community Development Partners to serve as administrators of the revolving loan for the upgrades to the sewer system.

Rosalind Winston, a resident of McClure Street, thanked the city for installing a Children At Play sign in the neighborhood. She said she would like to see more presence of police officers to help slow the traffic.

Councilman Charles Pruneau and David Hochreiter were absent. Pruneau is recovering from a medical procedure.

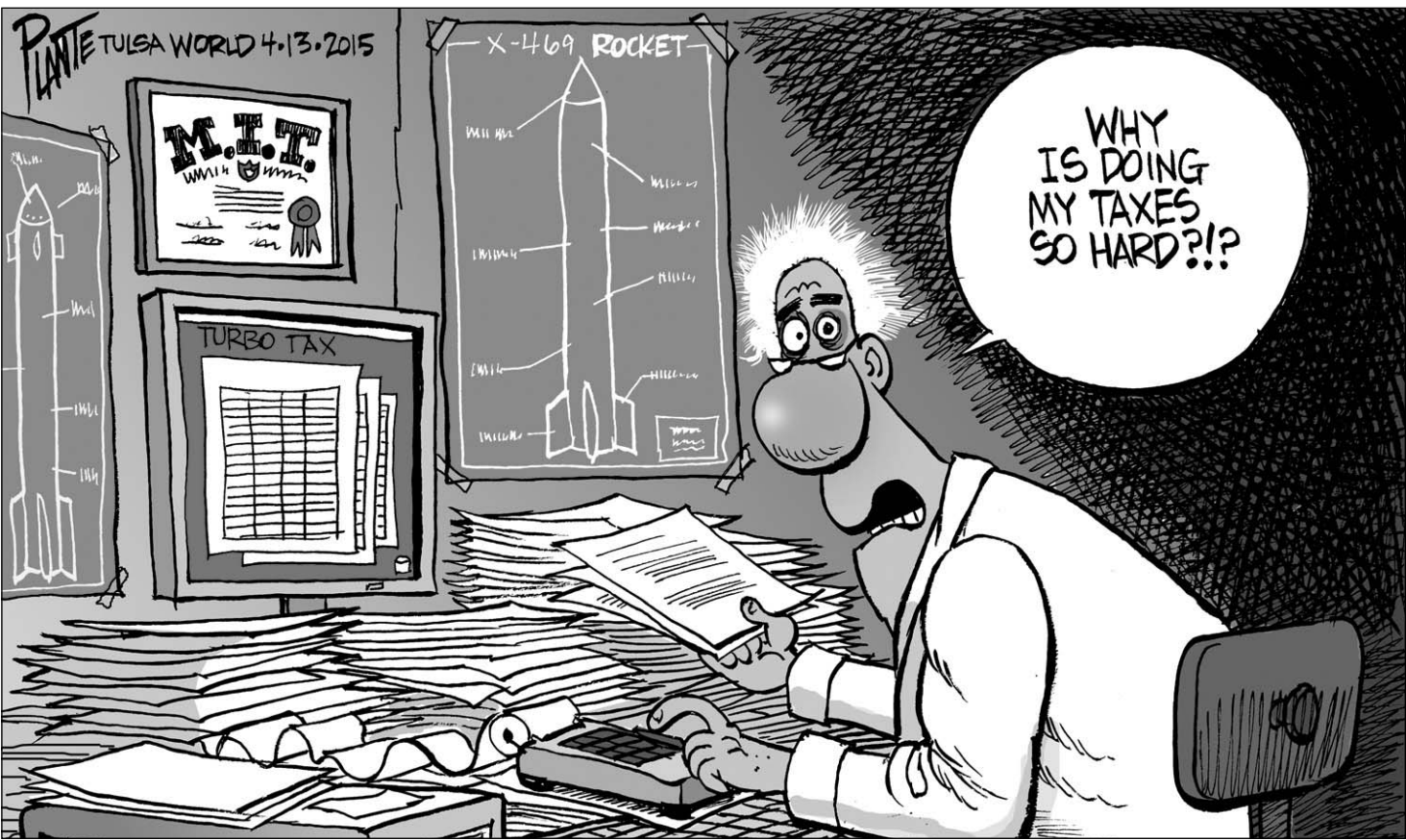

Local Leaders Talk Student Vouchers- A hotly debated bill is making its way through committee in Nashville that would allow students at under-performing schools in five districts in the state to attend private school at no cost to the student’s family. A group of decision makers met with Lee Barfield and Mark Gill from American Federation for Children, which has helped

implement voucher systems in 18 states including Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana and Georgia. The proposed bill would give 5,000 total vouchers, valued at \$6,500 each, to students at schools that fall in the bottom five percent statewide for standardized test scores. According to the Beacon Center of Tennessee, a nonprofit think tank in Nashville, \$846 will go back into the school system’s budget for every student who de-

I even remember the homerun Jim Elliot hit off me down at Brazil (the small West Tennessee town, not the country sporting the Amazon River). I threw him a high inside fastball in the bottom of the thirteenth inning; he promptly deposited it twenty-three rows deep in a cotton field doubling as the left field wall.

But the truth is, most plays, at-bats, game-winning this and that have faded from memory. The friendships have not. Oh, I don’t see those teammates nowadays. Time, distance—life has gotten in the way. Goat Hays threw a little cut fastball that tailed away from a right-handed hitter. Bobby Jack Cantrell grabbed a bat and advised me to do the same when the big fight broke out in the bleachers at Frog Jump. Ricky Hale used to bounce those high flies off Mrs. Boaz’s windowsill. James T. “Birdog” Reed would practice his auctioneering from his first base position...

I could go on and on, but you get the point. It turned out not to be so much the game as a gathering site; a tool, if you will, that brought us together in one place at one time in one accord. “Colbert”, I can still hear David Paschall’s voice lingering in my ear after half a century, “what did you throw Elliot?” We hadn’t even made it back to the loser’s dugout. “That is the longest homerun I’ve ever seen! He blasted that ball a country mile! I bet it’s still rolling. Did you see that thing take off?”

As a matter of fact, I did.

Miss Katie’s kindergarten was the origin of my formal education. You’d think I’d ap-

preciate the rudimentary aspects of reading, writing and arithmetic. I don’t remember one lesson. I was too busy fighting Bobby Brewer over who got the window seat in Miss Katie’s big station wagon. She would pick me up in front of the house and the pushing and shoving went on as she made the circuit back to her place on West Cherry Street. The funny thing was, Bobby lived next door to her; he didn’t have to “come pick us up”, he could have just walked across his driveway when he saw us pulling up!

I do remember those spelling bees in elementary school. And boy, how I struggled with the math problems. We had to learn the names of all the presidents IN ORDER! You talk about important lessons! But it was mostly the ordinary and mundane that got us through on a daily basis. Bob Edwards would roll a ball bearing across the floor. Joe Galloway would sail a paper airplane out the window. Buddy Wiggleton would toss a fake spider into Suzie Cozart’s hair. We managed to make the most of it... together.

Sure, the big thing was the education. But somehow it all intertwined with our relationships. We practiced fire drills, threw spitballs in study hall and blew up the chemistry lab “together”. On the worse day of my high school career, Diane Stoner sat down at lunch with me and quietly gave me hope. If I threw a horrible pass, somehow John Ingram ran over and caught it.

Graduation became the big thing for a moment. We laughed, hugged and cried our way through it. But we didn’t forget Miss Katie, the Blue Bird reading class, the lunchroom strike, Rollin Trull riding that big Harley

through the parking lot... or each other.

Sure, I remember my wedding. I don’t specifically remember saying, “I do”. But after forty-one years, more than likely, I did. I remember the big crowd, the big hats and the stifling heat; and Leon stringing the big “TEST, TEST, CAN YOU HEAR ME ALRIGHT” banner across the back of the church as I turned to watch the bride start down the aisle.

Later that day, Daddy gave me a gentle pat on the shoulder, as if to say I’d done ok. It was something he just didn’t do. Dad was from the old school. His pats were generally lower and much harder when you messed something up. I think it was difficult for him to realize we were growing up. That pat was a little thing on a very big day in my life... but it also lingers with me still.

Children are a gift from God. Having their eyes seek you out in the stands just after they doubled off the left field wall is priceless. Watching them marry and have children are milestones of the first magnitude. Calling now that they are grown and saying, “Dad, what do you think?” is... well, mind-boggling. They never did that when they lived at home!

I saw David Paschall at a reunion not long ago. His first words were, “Colbert, you remember that blast Jim Elliot hit off of you down at Brazil. Man, to this day it’s the longest...”

Appreciate the big events in life, but don’t miss the little things that make it worth living.

Both Air Methods and LifeFlight are involved in the installation of a permanent air ambulance base at Henry County Medical Center. Under the new agreement, the Colorado company will acquire three Airbus Helicopters ED-145 aircraft and medical equipment. The two will also enter into a 10-year agreement restructuring the LifeFlight program under the Air Method’s Alternative Delivery Service Model. Under this model, Air Methods will

provide fuel, maintenance, aircraft, dispatch, billing and EMS licensure. LifeFlight is one of two air ambulance bases planned for Paris. Air Evac of O’Fallon, Missouri, is in the process of setting up a temporary base at Henry County Airport while they search for land for a permanent base in Henry County.

SOUTHERN TURNIP GREENS AND HAM HOCK

1 ¾ pounds ham hocks, rinsed
2 quarts water
2 bunches fresh turnip greens with roots (about 10 pounds)
1 tablespoon sugar
Bring ham hock and 2 quarts water to a boil in an 8 quart Dutch oven. Reduce heat; simmer 1 ½ to 2 hours or until meat is tender. Remove and discard stems and discolored spots from greens. Chop greens, and rinse thoroughly; drain. Peel turnip roots, and cut in

half. Add greens, roots, and sugar to Dutch oven; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 45 to 60 minutes or until greens and roots are tender. Yield: 10 servings.

FRIED OKRA

1 pound fresh okra
2 cups buttermilk
1 cup self-rising cornmeal mix
1 cup self-rising flour
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon ground red pepper
Vegetable oil
¼ cup bacon drippings

Cut off and discard tip and stem ends from okra; cut okra into ½ inch thick slices. Stir into buttermilk; cover and chill 45 minutes. Combine cornmeal mix and next 3 ingredients. Remove okra from buttermilk with a slotted spoon, and discard buttermilk. Dredge okra, in batches, in the cornmeal mixture. Pour oil to depth of 2 inches into a Dutch oven or cast-iron skillet; add bacon drippings, and heat to 375 degrees. Fry okra, in batches, 3 to 4 minutes or until golden; drain okra on paper towels. Yield 4 servings.

A MESS OF PEAS

1 quart water
1 (8-10 ounce) smoked ham hock
8 cups fresh field peas
4 to 6 hot peppers in vinegar, drained
1 teaspoon sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper
Bring 1 quart water and smoked ham hock to a boil in a large Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Reduce heat to low, and simmer 30 minutes. Stir in peas and remaining ingredients; cover and simmer 25 to 30 minutes or until peas are done. Yield: 12 servings

McKenzie Police Reports

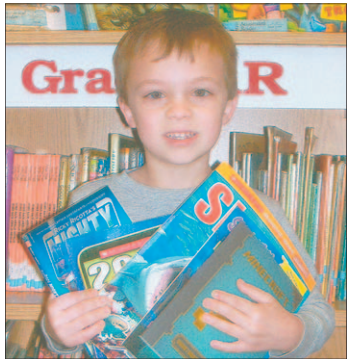

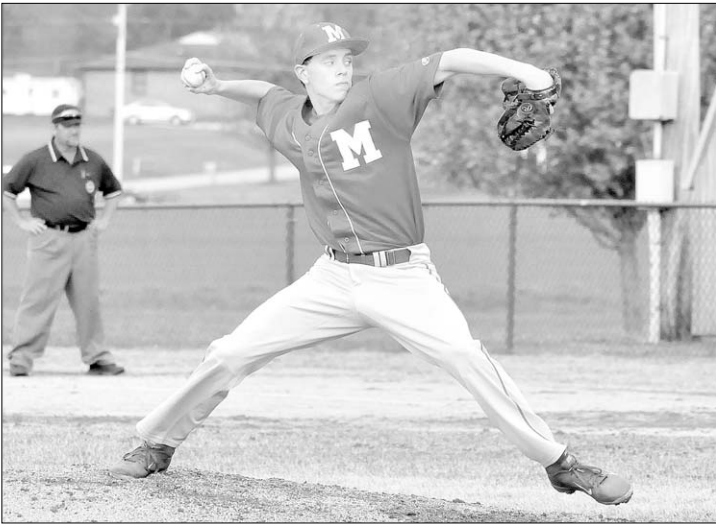
