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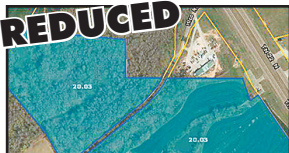

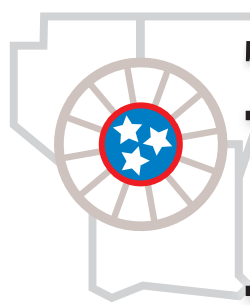

Presidential, Local Elections Are Today

McKenzie Candidate Dies

CARROLL COUNTY — Tennessee voters as well as voters throughout the nation can vote in national elections today, Tuesday, November 3. One local election includes the name of Deborah Wynn (Newman) Riley for McKenzie City Council. She died October 30. Her funeral arrangements are Wednesday November 4, 2 p.m. The graveside service are at Archer's Chapel United Methodist Church in Halls, Tenn. Her husband, Larry, died May 5, 2016. He was the retired pastor of the First United Methodist Church-McKenzie. Her vacancy will be filled by the Mayor and City Council through appointment. In Carroll County, voters can vote in-person on election day between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7

p.m. at their local voting precinct. Voters should have their photo identification and voter registration card with them. No campaign signage or clothing are allowed within 100 feet of the polling places by candidates, campaign workers or voters. The Banner will also release the results of polling on Tuesday evening as the Carroll County Election Commission releases the totals. Look for those on the Banner website. Early voting for the November 3 local, state and national elections began Wednesday, October 14 and ended Thursday, October 29, 2020 throughout Tennessee. Any registered voter may participate in early voting held exclusively at the Carroll County Election Commission in the Carroll

COVID-19 Report for November 2

NASHVILLE (November 2) — Tennessee has 264,587 total cases in 2020 and 3,379 deaths related to COVID-19 as reported on Monday, November 2. In Carroll County, there are 1,208 (1,148 last week) total cases for the year 2020, 27 (26 last week) deaths. In Henry County, there are 888 (796 last week) total positive cases for the year and 12 (11 last week) deaths. In Weakley County, there are 1,648 (1,561 last week) total positive cases for the year 27 (26 last week) deaths. According to the World Health Organization, in the United States in the year 2020, there are 9,032,465 (8,485,747 last week) cases and 228,998 (223,328 last week) deaths because of the Coronavirus. In the world, there are 46,403,652 (42,966,344 last week) cases and 1,198,569 (1,152,604 last week) deaths during the year 2020.

The District 2 seat is vacant on the Carroll County School Board after no one sought election during the August general election.

The new system provides accessibility for three dispatchers and replaces the 30-year system. The EOC dispatches for all emergency services in the county to some extent. All 911 calls initially come through the EOC. McKenzie and Huntingdon have full-time dispatching for police and fire, however, often the emergency call first originates at the EOC, where six full-time and eight part-time dispatchers work.

County Seeks Grant For Firefighter Turnout Gear

HUNTINGDON (October 30) — New turnout gears for the more than 120 volunteer firefighters is being sought through a federal-state CDBG grant to fund the needed equipment. The county's Rural Fire Committee voted

to seek a 90 percent grant to fund the \$391,682 plus \$19,000 fee for writing the grant through Northwest Tennessee Development District. Jennifer Zimmerman will lead the grant application. The grant requires door-to-door surveys of rural

residents, letters of support, competitive bids and public hearings. If awarded, it could be the summer 2022 before the new

Surber Leaves Watershed Authority Board

HUNTINGDON (October 27) — Tommy Surber, chairman and an original member of the Carroll County Watershed Authority, asked not to be reappointed to the authority and presided over his final meeting on Tuesday, October 27. Surber, of McKenzie, was a member of the Authority since its inception in 1985. He was appointed chairman in 1988, a position he held until last Tuesday, when Natalie Porter was elected to the post. Surber, the son-in-law to Dale Kelley, secretary of the Authority, said the board set out to create a first-class project in the creation of the Carroll County 1000-Acre Recreation Lake. He said he saw the entire process from permitting, land purchases, clearing the lake, RV parks, boat docks, and establishing a 300-acre mitigation site to comply with

wetland requirements. Kelley joked that Surber became his son-in-law during that tenure. He was presented a plaque for his 35 years of service. In other business, the board welcomed new member Brad Chappell from McKenzie. He was appointed by Governor Bill Lee. The board approved the construction of two private boat docks. William Coates of Klye Road and John Ulen of Sportsman Cove. Kelley announced the Junior High Bassmaster Tournament was a great success and generated approximately \$400,000 in economic impact to the county. The next meeting is November 24, 2 p.m. at Huntingdon City Hall.

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West Carroll to Appoint New Member

ATWOOD — West Carroll Special School District Board of Education is expected to appoint a new school board member during its November 5 meeting. Board member Kyle Foster resigned from the board as the Trezevant precinct representative. His yet-to-be-appointed replacement will take the oath of office during the meeting.

In other business on the agenda, the board will hear a report of resignations of Linda Hodgson (retiring) and Dakota Noble. Hodgson joins other retirees Lynn Grimes, Sherri Cooper and Dorothy Rimmer during the meeting.

Two teachers will be rec-

ommended for tenure - Nicole Andrews and Keshia Jackson by Director of Schools Dexter Williams.

The board will also review the contract of Director Williams.

Also on the agenda is consideration of approval for the Beta Club field trip to Nashville and a softball trip to Cookeville in April.

The board will consider approval of its five-year plan, plus board policies concerning tobacco-free schools, fundraising activities, Title IX and Sexual Harassment, student concerns, complaints, and grievances, and physical examinations and immunizations.

The board meets at 6:30 p.m.

Carroll Electric Board Approves, Contributes To Second Round of TVA COVID-19 Fund

HUNTINGDON (October 29) — The Carroll County Electric Board met Thursday at the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce with a lengthy agenda.

Board members approved a second round of the TVA Community Care Fund. Established in April as a partnership with local power companies, the fund provides assistance to power customers who have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. TVA matches funds raised by providers up to \$10,000 in each round.

Carroll County more than met the goal during the first round through donations and carries over \$2,050 to the second round. The board also approved a \$1,000 contribution by the electric department to the fund.

Ryan Drewry presented the audit report from Alexander Thompson Arnold, which included no findings in the current or prior years, and the board approved the report.

The board approved a \$100 hole sponsorship for the annual Chamber Golf Tournament to be held on Thursday November 19.

Also approved was a \$100 donation to the Carroll County Habitat for Humanity. The board usually sponsors a hole in the Habitat golf tournament,

which was canceled this year due to the pandemic.

Board members discussed the annual electric department Christmas dinner and ultimately decided to cancel it. Instead, all current and former employees and board members will receive a \$50 gift certificate that can be used at any Chamber member-business.

The next two board meetings were rescheduled due to holiday conflicts. The November meeting will be on the 19th and the December meeting on the 16th, both at the Chamber.

Danny Brawner reported that a department truck for sale had received no bids that met the \$14,000 reserve. He will look into putting the truck on govdeals.com, a government surplus auction website.

Drewry updated the board on the status of the department's application to join the Tennessee Consolidated Retirement System, which provides employees a defined benefit as opposed to the current system's defined contribution. The process began in April, and Drewry reported that everything requested for the application had been submitted as of that morning. The board has not yet made a final determination on joining TCRS.

The meeting adjourned in just over 45 minutes.

TSSAA Classification Moves McKenzie Football to 1A, Huntingdon to 2A

Huntingdon Up to AA in Basketball, Baseball, Softball

Districts and regions will be set and released by TSSAA at a later date. Schools that disagree with their placement will have the opportunity to request an appeal before the Board of Control at the November scheduled meeting.

Huntingdon Approves Amendment to Agreement for Sewer Extensions at Lake

HUNTINGDON (October 27) — The Town of Huntingdon approved two amendments to existing contracts for engineering services for water and sewer services.

The first was an amendment to the contract to extent 2,500 feet of pressure sewer main along Eskew Road around the Carroll County 1000-Acre Recreation Lake. The contract amendment is for \$7,500 to J.R. Wauford to engineer and design the specifications to receive competitive bids for the

construction of those lines.

The second project with J.R. Wauford is engineering on sewer collection improvements. The total contract is \$90,000 for engineering to renovate an 18-inch gravity sewer along Beaver Creek and to correct the gravity sewer bottleneck under the railroad.

A third agreement is with Community Development Partners, LLC for the 2020 CDBG — sewer collection system improvement for a total of \$40,500.

Demetra Perkins (Part II)

More Than a Classroom Teacher

Now known as Mrs. Perkins to McKenzie, Demetra once again proved she was not run-of-the-mill. The new teacher became a fixture in the life of her students. Before the beginning of the school year, she made home visits to each of her students. She wanted to make the connection early with the student and learn about his or her home life. Demetra knew that teaching was an art and a science. She understood a master teacher does not use a one-size-fits-all approach. By going into the homes, she learned of the students' needs and she could adapt the material in a meaningful manner; this enabled every student to achieve success. Demetra took the time to help the student grow. She showed encouragement and never had discipline problems in her classroom. "I helped set up the remedial reading program in McKenzie in the late 1960s (around 1967) then got pregnant with Dee Anne and stayed out for six years. Probably the happiest, and most exciting

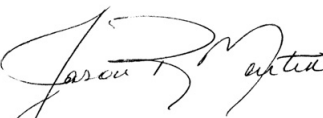
thing that ever happened to Ed and me was the day Dee Ann was born," said Demetra. Teachable moments were also important to Mrs. Perkins, especially when it came to Betsy. Her arm affected by polio. "During my 34 years of teaching elementary school, one thing that never changed was the introduction each year of a very important member of the class, Betsy. Betsy was there to teach every child about diversity, that one can still function well despite obvious differences. "Betsy, I told them, was my polio souvenir...I named it because people always referred to it as 'your little arm', 'your little paralyzed arm' or 'your crippled arm', so I just decided on Betsy...I explained the history of Betsy as a way to refer to my paralyzed left arm which became an educational tool to show the class that I didn't always do everything just the way they did, but I still did it. I challenged the class to understand they could accomplish so much more than they thought they could if only they would expand their horizons." After thoroughly teaching her

students about Betsy on the first day of class, she gave them free reign throughout the rest of the year to ask any questions that came to their minds. "They treated Betsy almost like another student. It was so cute, one little boy raised his hand, and I thought he was going to ask a question about social studies student but he said, 'Now I forgot, did you say Betsy has feeling in it or not?'" She summed up her teaching philosophy of education in three elements: "Love and care for your students, teach them how to read and teach them how to study. That makes them independent learners and I think this is two of the best things you can do for them." Both Ed and Demetra continued their education, attending doctoral classes at the University of Kentucky over two summers after which Ed obtained a doctorate in psychology. While staying home with Dee Ann, Demetra taught teaching methods classes through Bethel College's education department. "I loved that; it was fun because a lot of the students I had were teachers and knew what they wanted and needed. I really enjoyed teaching the college age," she remarked. In her first year back in the McKenzie Special School District, she began teaching fifth grade at McKenzie Elementary. With her return, she along with Emily Archer, Ann Conquest and Pam Seymour began the annual fifth-grade play. For several years the play operated "at rock bottom" using record players and borrowed costumes. The play gained assis-

tance from music teacher Charlene Jones and volunteer Glynn Mebane, who became the play's sound manager. The players acted out the history of the United States from Columbus and the Pilgrims to modern times singing and dancing in addition to performing interactive parts with all the children in costume. When the fifth grade moved to the middle school building the play was discontinued. "I always tried to make learning fun. We played Hollywood Squares and other television games adapted to the classroom and the academic work I was teaching; Password always seemed to be the favorite." Demetra was selected teacher of the year by her peers twice during her career; once in the mid-90s and in 2000. "I'm not bragging but I'm proud of it," she shared, "I taught for 34 years and I loved it. Even as a little girl, I wanted to teach, I loved children. If you're going to teach you need to love teaching children. I always feel they're a little bit mine. If I had my life to relive, I'd be a teacher again, and I'd want to teach the same children I had the privilege of teaching. After retiring from the classroom, Demetra found other ways to stay busy including observing and evaluating student teachers for Union University. By helping student teachers, she felt she was "indirectly still helping students." Outside of teaching, golf was a passion for Demetra. In 2000, Ed surprised her with a trip to watch the Masters Golf Tournament in Augusta, Georgia. "Walking around the course

with Tiger and the big boys was fun... I love to play golf. I wouldn't call me a golfer, though, that's using the term too loosely." She credited her long time friend Virginia Clare Edwards with her introduction to the game. Before her passing, Virginia Clare shared her story about Demetra wanting to learn golf. "She said, 'I want to learn to play golf,' and I said, 'You can't play golf!' She said, 'Would you go with me and just show me the course and teach me the basics?'" Virginia Clare paused for effect and then said, with a toss of her hand, "She beat me and I never played golf again." First and foremost, Demetra was a Christian. She along with Mary Sue Morrow were elected the first female elders of the First Cumberland Presbyterian Church in McKenzie. Her church family was just as important as her natural family. She wanted everyone to know and develop a love for Christ just as she had done at an early age. Diagnosed with cancer, she was given six months to live. Demetra, the warrior, refused to accept the death sentence. She stayed positive and challenged death. With her mental and spiritual strength, she fought her battle for five years, showing she could do anything through the strength of Christ. There is no way to sum up the life of Demetra Perkins in a quantitative sense. For 80 years,

she lived her life to the fullest. Her husband said, "Demetra lived her life by four priorities; God, family, helping others and friends. She left a legacy of a caring life well-lived. She was a spiritual warrior!" Demetra Perkins was a testament of Christianity for McKenzie, Bethel University, First Cumberland Presbyterian Church and all those who came to know her. She is an irreplaceable gem in the community. She taught the world to excel and accept nothing but excellence through her unparalleled love and faith. I feel it would be remiss not include a series of testimonials and anecdotes about Demetra. 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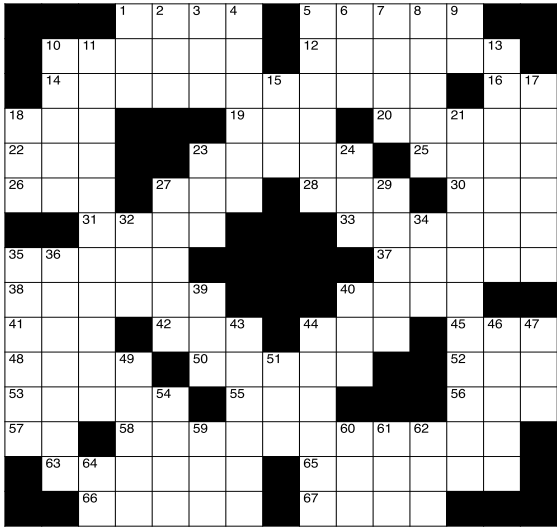

War Eagles Topple Undefeated Yellowjackets in Season Finale

ATWOOD (October 30) — The West Carroll War Eagles hosted undefeated region foe Greenfield Friday to wrap the regular season and handed the Yellowjackets their first loss of the year, 33-14. After a scoreless first quarter, the War Eagles scored twice in the second and led by as much as 27 en route to the win.

Greenfield had already clinched the Region 7-1A title, but West Carroll needed the win and a Dresden loss to move from fourth to third.

The War Eagles won the coin toss and elected to defer.

Yellowjacket Kiah Reynolds received the opening kickoff and returned it to the Greenfield 40. The Yellowjackets earned three first downs before turning the ball over on downs at the West Carroll 15.

War Eagle quarterback Xander Moon kept the first snap for 62 yards. Three plays later, West Carroll came up short on a fourth-down attempt and turned the ball over at the 24.

Greenfield went three-and-out, and Samuel Thum's punt was downed at the War Eagle 35.

After a five-yard penalty, War Eagle Deven Rader ran for seven. Moon kept for six, and a Greenfield penalty gave West Carroll a first down near midfield. Moon threw to Jack Barrow for 17, then Malik Lee ran twice for two total yards as the first frame ended. Moon started the second quarter with a 12-yard keeper, then threw incomplete. Lee ran for six, then lost a yard. On fourth-and-five, Moon threw to Barrow for a 16-yard touchdown. Moon threw incomplete on the two-point attempt, and the War Eagles led 6-0 with ten minutes to play in

the first half.

The Yellowjackets started at their own 30, and, after three plays, a fumble was recovered by War Eagle Timothy Gilford at the Greenfield 39.

Moon kept for a short gain, then threw to Seth Edwards for 32 yards down to the 4. Moon kept several times for short gains with the teams swapping penalties in between. On fourth-and-goal from the 2, Moon's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Yellowjacket Hayden Smith for a touchdown.

Greenfield earned a pair of first downs before quarterback Baker Porter threw an interception to Blankenship at the 34.

Rader started the drive with a three-yard gain. After a false start, Moon scrambled and threw to Barrow for eleven. On third-and-one, Moon kept and pushed the pile forward to move the chains. The QB threw to Barrow for five, then to Lee for 17 down to the 1. Moon spiked the ball to stop the clock with 14 second remaining in the half, then kept for a two-yard score. The two-point try failed, and West Carroll led 12-0.

The Yellowjackets managed just one play before time expired.

The War Eagles got the ball to start the second half, but the teams swapped three-and-outs.

West Carroll got the ball back at the far 26. Lee ran for six, then for nine to move the chains. Lee earned another first with two carries, then Moon kept for a 45-yard touchdown. After two War Eagle penalties, Moon threw to Blankenship from the 22 for two points and the lead was 20-0 with 6:31 to play in the third.

Greenfield got on the board with an eight-play, 57-yard drive capped by a two-yard run by Smith. A fumble spoiled the two-point conversion, and the

deficit was cut to 20-6 with 2:30 remaining in the third.

The War Eagles started at the 37 and moved the ball across midfield as the quarter ended. Moon started the final frame with two keepers for another first down, then threw to Blankenship for 28 yards. Moon kept for seven, then punched it in from the 1. Jose Martinez kicked the PAT, and West Carroll led 27-6 with just over ten minutes to play.

The Yellowjackets moved the ball to midfield, but Porter threw an interception to Blankenship, who returned it to the War Eagle 45.

West Carroll kept the ball mostly on the ground to run off as much time as possible, leading to a third-and-13 at the 14. Moon kept and was stopped just short of the goal line, but repeated on a fourth-and-inches for a one-yard touchdown. Martinez missed the point-after, but the lead was 33-6 with two-and-a-half minutes remaining in the contest.

Playing for pride, Greenfield scored on a five-play, 60-yard drive ending with Porter keeping from the 24. The two-point conversion was good, and the West Carroll lead was 33-14 with a minute left.

Blankenship smothered the outside kick attempt, and two kneels ran out the clock.

Greenfield (8-1, 5-1) finishes as region champion, and West Carroll (6-3, 4-2) ends up in third thanks to a Dresden loss (20-12 to Humboldt). All Region 7-1A teams have first round byes as Region 8 (Memphis) did not play this season.

The two teams will meet again in the second round, this time at Greenfield, on Friday, November 13. Dresden travels to Lake County. Kickoff is 7 p.m. for all playoff games.

Rebels Drop Season Finale in Overtime to Cardinals

ADAMSVILLE (October 30) — On Friday night, the McKenzie Rebels closed the regular season on the road against the Adamsville Cardinals. The Region 7AA match-up went down to the wire as the Cardinals won 23-17 in overtime.
