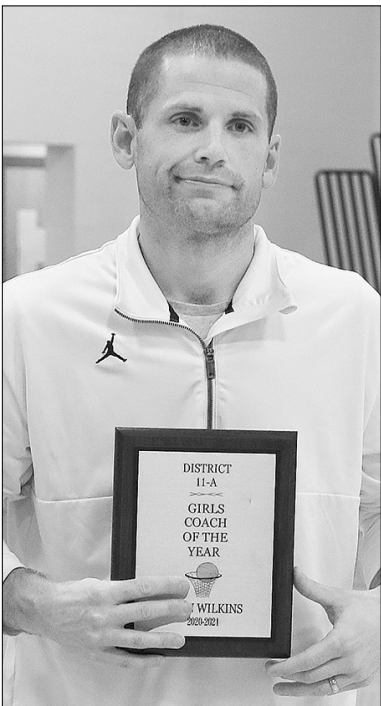
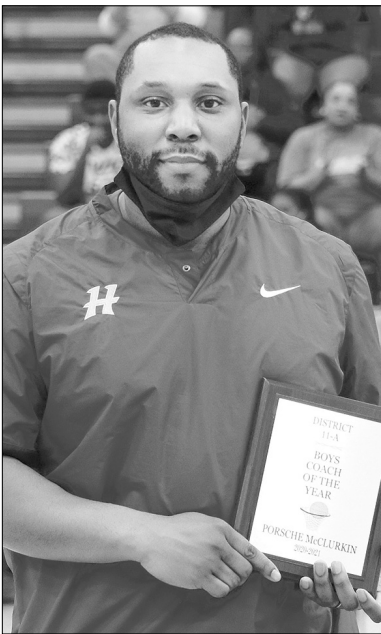

County Audit Reveals Two Deficiencies

The Tennessee Department of Treasury audited the County of Carroll's 2019-2020 fiscal year budget. "We have audited the basic financial statements of Carroll County as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020. "Our audit resulted in two findings and recommendations, which we have reviewed with Carroll County management. Detailed findings, recommendations, and management's responses

are included in the findings and recommendations section of this report. The following are summaries of the audit findings: Office of County Mayor General ledger payroll deduction accounts were not reconciled with payroll reports and payments in the General Fund and, secondly, competitive bids were not solicited for inmate food. The audit indicated the county's fund balance (savings) increased from

\$6,712,389 in the 2018-19 year to \$7,336,629 in 2019-20 year. The Highway Department overspent its budget by \$249,078. Review of the audit by this newspaper was more difficult with the pandemic closing or reducing the services and personnel on duty and the influx of state and federal grants to offset costs associated with COVID-19 disruptions. The audit did not indicate any funds were missing.

Henry County Medical Center Revises Visitation Policy

PARIS (February 25) — With over a 16% vaccination rate among Henry Countians, a closed COVID-19 unit, and reduced positivity rate in Henry County, Henry County Medical Center implemented a more relaxed visitation policy on March 1. "Thank you to our patients, families, and visitors for your support and understanding of restricted visitation during the peaks of COVID-19," said Lisa Casteel, CEO of HCMC. "We are excited to announce we have very few to no patients with COVID-19 in the facility and that we are lifting many of the visitation restrictions. Please remember to bring and wear your masks."

General visitation for HCMC will be from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. Only two visitors are permitted in a patient's room at a time. In some cases, a friend or family member may stay overnight. This will be approved on a case-by-case basis. Children under the age of 13 are not allowed to visit unless otherwise noted.

Entrance Locations and Hours to HCMC: Emergency Department Entrance — Open 24-hours-a-day, 7-days-a-week. Patient Parking Lot/Bridge Entrance — Open 5 a.m. to 9 p.m., Monday through Friday; Open 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Visitor Badge, Universal Masking & Temperature Checks: Anyone entering the facility as a patient, support person or visitor of the patient must check in at one of the desks and receive a Visitor Badge and have his/her temperature taken. Anyone with a temperature higher than 100.4 degrees will be asked to leave the facility. Everyone entering the facility must wear a mask and we encourage each person to bring his/her own.

Same Day Surgery: Only one visitor will be allowed with a patient. Parent/Caregivers are allowed if the patient is under the age of 18.

Lake Haven Behavioral Unit: Visitation will be from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Wednesdays and Sundays only.

Other Unit Visitation and Restrictions are as follows:

Emergency Room All patients and visitors must be masked. Only one support person may be allowed with the patient based on age and condition and must stay in the room.

No children under the age of 13 unless a patient. Only the one support person allowed in the waiting room. No other visitors allowed.

All visitation policies in the Emergency Room are dependent on if COVID-19 patients are in the area.

Women's Center Visiting hours are general visitation hours, 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. with the following exceptions:

One overnight support person will be allowed with the patient, unless the patient is in labor.

During labor, 2 persons will be allowed. These visitors cannot be interchanged.

After birth of the baby and recovery is completed, 3 visitors at a time will be allowed to visit during visiting hours.

No visitors allowed under 13 years of age with the exception of siblings of the newborn.

No one with sickness will be allowed in the unit unless a patient.

Overnight visitors must remain in the room with the patient from 9 p.m. to 9 a.m.

Special Care Nursery Only 2 visitors at a time will be allowed at bedside.

No one with sickness will be allowed in the nursery.

Mother and father of the baby can visit at any time.

Mother and father can designate 4 persons who can visit at any time. They can take anyone off of the list if the need arises, but cannot add to the list. These persons will be expected to follow hospital visiting hours.

No visitors under the age of 13.

CCU/PCU Units Visitation will only be allowed between 10 a.m. - 11 a.m., 5:30 p.m. - 6:30 p.m.,

and 8 p.m. - 9 p.m. each day. Immediate family or support persons only are allowed to visit.

Only 2 visitors per day per patient.

Visitors will not be allowed if COVID-19 patients or suspected COVID-19 patients are in the unit.

No one under the age of 13 allowed.

Safety protocols put in place regarding care include, but are not limited to:

All individuals entering Henry County Medical Center facilities, including partners and providers, will continue to be screened for COVID-19 symptoms including temperature checks daily.

All individuals entering Henry County Medical Center will be asked to wear a mask. Patients and visitors are asked to bring their own masks.

Six-foot social distances will continue in public areas such as waiting rooms.

Extra cleaning and disinfection of high-touch, public surface areas will continue.

Infectious patients will continue to be cared for in isolation, away from non-infectious patients.

Surveillance statistics of our community and regional area will be monitored for trends and stability.

Utilization of hospital beds, ventilators, and PPE will be monitored to ensure ability if there is a need.

In addition to safety protocols, Henry County Medical Center remains prepared to cease non-essential procedures in the event a surge or peak of COVID-19 develops in the area.

To remain prepared, HCMC will monitor its supplies and its ability to procure supplies. HCMC will also maintain established guidelines for occupancy availability. We will continually evaluate and monitor to ensure patient safety and surveillance needs. In addition, HCMC will collaborate with the medical staff and the TN Department of Health and the Henry County Health Department to continually evaluate incidences and trends of COVID-19 cases within Henry County and the surrounding area.

Raffle tickets are \$5 for one, 3 for \$10, or 10 for \$20. You can purchase tickets from CCHS volunteers or at the shelter up until 7:30 p.m. on the night of the event.

Fire at Lake Haven Behavioral Unit

Minimal damage was reported, but for the safety of the behavioral health unit patients, Lake Haven transferred patients to other facilities or discharging those patients who are ready for discharge to their families.

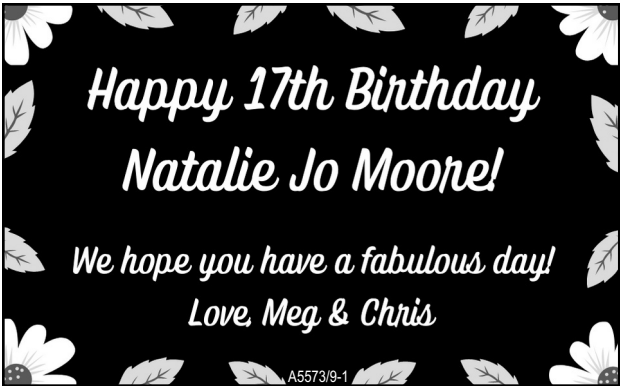
Currently, Lake Haven Behavioral Unit is closed to any admissions until an assessment can be completed of the unit to ensure patient safety and security. This only impacts our behavioral health unit patients.

Center official said, "The safety and security of all our partners, patients and visitors is our number one

priority at Henry County Medical Center. Unfortunately, today, we had an incident on Lake Haven Behavioral Unit that has caused us to evacuate our behavioral health unit patients."

"First, we are extremely grateful that no patients were harmed in this incident," said Lisa Casteel, CEO at HCMC. "We continue to investigate the incident and assess the behavioral health unit before we open it back to patients. We are thankful and grateful for our staff and the Paris Fire Department for their quick response and will work with the Paris Police Department regarding the incident."

The other floor of the unit will not be opened due to the proximity and smoke in the unit. All family members of our patients will be notified.

Danny Brawner, general manager of Carroll County Electric, said Carroll County Electric recently renewed a 20-year, long-term contract for exclusive service through TVA. With the contract, TVA can long-range plan and build infrastructure as needed in and around the county.

The majority of distributors of TVA power have signed long-term agreements with TVA.

Four TVA distributors are hoping a complaint filed with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission will force TVA to allow other providers to serve now-TVA customers through the TVA electrical grid.

According to cleanenergy.org, four Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA)’s utility customers, called Local Power Companies or LPCs, filed a complaint with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) claiming TVA is violating federal energy policy by not allowing them access to TVA’s transmission system to purchase cheaper power from a supplier other than TVA.

The possibility of LPCs buying energy from sources other than TVA could have significant benefits for ratepayers, according to the website. Memphis’ utility claims customers could save billions of dollars and transition to cleaner, less risky

energy supplies if allowed to buy from third parties.

According to the website, the four LPCs that filed the complaint are: Athens Utilities Board, a municipal utility that serves the city of Athens in east Tennessee, Gibson Electric Membership Corporation, a cooperative utility in west Tennessee, Joe Wheeler Electric Membership Corporation, a cooperative utility in northern Alabama, and Volunteer Energy Cooperative, a cooperative utility in eastern Tennessee that spans the state from north to south.

The Carroll County Board joined a majority of other TVA distributors to support TVA in its effort to prevent other providers from using the TVA infrastructure.

Brawner said TVA provided electricity “without a hitch” during the winter storm and 10 days of freezing temperatures. He said Carroll County Electric hit a new record of service demand during the extreme cold temperatures. The new record is for February only. A standing record in January exceeds the new February record.

In other business, Brawner announced two retirements, Jimmy Bennett, assistant foreman of the McKenzie line crew and James Simmons, Jr., with the central office in Huntingdon. With the retirements, Danny Toombs, foreman of the McKenzie line crew, will office in Huntingdon and serve as the assistant operation manager under the supervision of Mike Wil-

liams, operations manager, who plans to retire in a few years.

Justin Brown and Billy Webb will serve as the foreman and assistant foreman respectively of the McKenzie line crew.

After much discussion, Chairman Terry Howell recommended Brawner have a representative of the Tennessee Consolidated Retirement System to explain the actuarial study conducted on the department’s employees. CCED is considering switching its employee retirement program to TCRS. Brawner said one of TCRS’ concerns was 18 employees could retire immediately if the system chooses to buy back.

Board member Lori Nolen said the employees should have a representative at the meeting when TCRS makes its presentation and explains the costs associated with joining the defined benefit program.

A request for membership from the McKenzie Chamber of Commerce and Industry was postponed until the board can learn more information about the new Chamber. The membership dues are \$650 annually for the utility company.

Brawner said each of the five county school districts was given the opportunity to apply for a STEM - Science, Technology, Engineering and Math - grant. So far, McKenzie High School received a \$5,000 grant. Brawner said he is uncertain if the other school districts have applied.

COVID Relief Funds Budget Items on County Agenda

HUNTINGDON — Carroll County Commission’s agenda for Monday, March 8 includes budget amendments to accept grant funding from the state, along with an amendment to give each of the rural fire brigades a donation.

The first amendment for approval is to donate \$2,000 to each of the county’s rural fire brigades. That is \$1,000 over the budgeted amount because each of the brigades’ fundraising has been limited during the pandemic.

The second resolution calls for the COVID relief funds of \$294,210 from the state to be allocated

\$146,994 for emergency personnel salary reimbursement and \$147,216 to erect an emergency communication tower in the Westport community.

Without a full-time airport manager, the airport is staffed by three part-time staff members. A resolution amends the budget of \$30,000 for the manager and reallocates it to part-time personnel.

The Veterans Service Office budget is to be amended by \$315.00 to allocate additional funds for training during the former and new director transition.

Then on January 6, 2021 they both reversed their objections to the Electoral College results with no explanation to their constituents.

of Camden, Eva, Buena Vista, Huntingdon, McMoresville, McKenzie, Paris, and Henry. TEC will provide additional funding of \$2,598,231 for a total build-out construction project of \$2,883,923; this increased access will improve the quality of lives for these local communities.

“Building connections for the community is our goal. We are thankful for this opportunity to improve the quality of life for our neighbors, friends, and businesses in West Tennessee,” states Joey F. The news release did not indicate the exact location of the planned expansion.

ing approximately 55 miles of fiber with this funding and connecting over 900 businesses and residences in rural West Tennessee. Community members will have access to TEC’s Fast Fiber Internet with upload and download speeds of 1 Gig, plus phone services. Interested customers can fill out a simple form on www.TEC.com/SignUp for access to Fast Fiber Internet at their location, and are encouraged to ask their neighbors to submit their request.

Joseph Butler, mayor of Carroll County states, “We are very grateful to TEC for their continued investment in Carroll County. A top priority of Carroll County leadership is broadband expansion, especially to the more rural parts of our great county. 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Bethel's Old-Timers (Part I)

Memories from Joe McClure

A few months ago, I came across a story about Bethel's football glory days. As an alumni and fan of all things sports, I marked the story and it filled somewhere in the darker depths of my memory. By happenstance, I saw the place holder sticking out of the archives this week. After taking the time to read it, once again I came across a treasure trove of information. All the individuals mentioned including its writer are dead. So, this is just another story that needs to be recorded for the ages.

The story is from 1997 by Joe David McClure (1913-2008). He tells a set of stories about the "old-timers" at Bethel focusing between 1931-1936. Joe put out a disclaimer stating that the story "should not be taken as official history but simply as we remember." With some many great tales in the article, I felt it necessary to share as many as I could in this edition. Some of what was written seems like a stretch of the truth but whose grandparents never embellish on a story.

If you could find an old McKenzie Banner some 60 years or so ago, it just might have in bold print "Bethel Corporals Football Team Wins Over UT Martin." No misprint here since Bethel did beat the UTM squad in 1933. There were four of us who were very much involved in this game and we will tell you who these people are so you can personally ask any of them about this. However, you had better have plenty of time, since these old

boys enjoy talking about those days.

One might also find another report which states, "Bethel baseball team wins over Cumberland University as a Bethel player kick the longest field goal ever recorded in college circles." I will tell you who that kicker was and more. Other stories would highlight games with well-known schools such as Vanderbilt, Memphis State, Ole Miss, Delta State, Lambuth, Union University, etc.

I am going to tell you about a Bethel player who played every minute of every game of football for four years. I expect some of you may say you are way out of the park on this one - not so, it was common practice in those times for good players to play both offensive and defensive positions. As the number of players in some of the smaller schools was few, the boys just did it all...

Let me tell you about the historic day in 1933 when 15 suited out Bethel Corporals took the field at UT Martin and walked away with a 16-9 victory. It was said that UT had four or five full teams on that field that day.

At this point, let me briefly introduce some of those "old-timers" to you. Big and fast "Bull Ox" Guy R. Kirk (1913-1997) was one of those history makers at Bethel in 1932-33-34. He weighed 185 pounds then, was fast, played defensive guard and offensive backfield. Now, let me repeat, players were quite often shifted around and played both sides the entire game.

Now, if you have been around Bethel and certainly around McKenzie very

long, you know Kermit Holland (1913-2011), who was another of those history makers - both in football and baseball. We called him "dog" and I don't remember how he came by that nickname, but I think it was because when he got the football in his hand, he could just about outrun a greyhound dog. He was not a big boy as football players sometimes go, but he was fast and tough as a pine knot...

Kermit was not only a good football player, but he pitched for the baseball team. Many years later, he coached the Bethel baseball teams, I believe as a volunteer when Bethel did not have a full staff of coaches.

Another player well known around here now, as he was back then, is Hughlon "Swat" Scarbrough (1914-2003), who grew up around here... Swat played varsity baseball for Bethel four years and recently I asked him if he remembered his four-year batting average. He didn't hesitate before saying, "450."

He also played varsity football for Bethel for four years and just recently we were talking about those days at Bethel. Bethel was

playing Cumberland University on home turf and Swat was playing at back. The score was 6-6 with not long to play. Swat said he knew it was a very wide chance but something had to be done, so he called for Pete Hilliard (1913-1999) to try for a field goal kick.

Several on the team stated it could not be done, but big Pete said "let me try" and try he did - kicking a 57-yard field goal that won the game 9-6 and set a record of what was talked about in college football for several years.

Kermit said he was standing there, with his mouth open, and watched the ball clear the goal post by 10 to 15 yards. I would expect that Pete Hilliard was the best kicker ever at Bethel.

Now, I started out this article thinking about the boys who played ball for Bethel back then and are living here now, but I must include a McKenzie boy who lived here then and now lives in Chattanooga. His name is Herman Leach (1914-2011). He made his contribution by playing ball, and as I will mention later working over there with us for four years pay-

ing for his schooling.

One more baseball player we must mention is Bailess Simmons (1908-1999), who still lives here, although pretty much homebound because of his health. Bailess played baseball for Bethel in 1929-30-31, a little before the years we are talking about, but another of those local boys who, with a little break, could have made the major leagues.

As for myself, I was a little short of weight and ability to make a show, but I was the manager of the Bethel team that won the UT Martin game in 1933, and I have always been proud of those athletes and Coach Leo Davis, who deserves so much credit for his contribution to Bethel.

Others who played on that great team in 1933 when Bethel beat UTM was Bill Burkhalter (1914-1985), McFerrin Smith (1912-1981), Joe Fields (1907-1986), "Doc" Crow (1912-1998), Bill Algea (1914-1994), Roy Leach, Morris Beadles (1910-1984), Blue Burkhalter (1912-1996), "Jiggs" Latimer (1912-1991) and Jim Steele. With the exceptions of Crowe, who came from Dover, and Latimer, who

came from Union City, all the remaining team members grew up in McKenzie and remained here for many years.

Bethel College went on to capture the Mississippi Valley Conference Championship in football for three years in a row 1932, 1933 and 1934.

That makes a solid stopping point for this week. I've tried to the best of my ability to attach birth/death dates to the athletes Joe wrote about in his memories. Next week will conclude his story about the "old-timers".

Robert's Mom Set The Example

I heard the news about Tiger Woods' accident and immediately thought about his two kids. As the seriousness of it unfolded, I prayed he'd walk again. And I rolled over in my mind how long it would take to recover, and rehabilitate, from such injuries. Mr. Woods is headed down a long tough road for sure. My heart went out to him.

And then I wondered about his golf.

The sports anchor talking over the horrific pictures of the mutilated car lying a good distance from the road referred to Mr. Woods as a black athlete. Of course, he was exactly correct. But he was also indescribably wrong!

And maybe that is part, if not all, of the racial divide in our country today.

Listen closely here, I'm the last guy on earth to talk about such matters. I don't know nothing about nothing. I don't claim to. I don't know what black people think. I don't understand most of the time what white people think.

Tiger Woods is a man. A son. A father. A provider. He's got family. Friends. Aspirations. Hope. He is certainly a golfing icon. He's lived on the mountain top. And he's spent his time in the valley.

Good golly, there are a hundred things about Mr. Woods to know and understand and like or dislike and ponder over before you get down to the black part. Why are we always forced to get that first?

And you've got to hear my heart here, Tiger is proud of his heritage. I'm not down-playing that. I'm just saying let's take everyone at face value first. Don't hop with the crowd. Be a little smarter

about how we relate to everyone around us.

My ancestors came over from Ireland to escape the potato famine of the 1850's. I reckon that makes me part of the Irish-Catholic crowd. I've got O'Bannon's and Murphy's in my family tree. My Mom's maiden name is Kennedy. But I don't sit around all year waiting for St. Patrick's Day. And it's never crossed my mind to kiss the Blarney Stone.

We all have a unique and wonderful heritage. We should celebrate it and be proud of our past. But none of us needs to let that bog down our here and now or our collective future.

Robert was the first black person I ever met if you don't count the men that worked with Daddy out at the Tri-County Stockyards. We were ten or eleven. We met at the baseball field over by the pajama factory.

We got to throwing a ball back and forth. He had an easy way of gathering it in. And he tossed it back with a little zip to it—like you were supposed to!

He was always happy and friendly. One very hot summer day he invited me to lunch at his house. We're talking the Deep South in the mid 1950's. I was hungry. And at that age an empty stomach trumped most everything else.

To my everlasting discredit, I remember feeling like something wasn't right as we got to his front steps. It wasn't my upbringing. Mom taught us from birth that we were all God's children. Daddy judged everybody on whether they would work or not. He didn't care about anything else.

Maybe it was just the

times.

I do remember Robert's mother never batted an eye when we walked in. She told us to "wash up, the food was ready" like little white boys dropped by her house every day. I didn't realize what a lifelong lesson it was until years later.

I also remember it was the most disappointing meal that I ever sat down to. She had fixed cornbread, pinto beans and turnip greens. That is exactly what we would have had if we'd gone to my house!

I was hoping black people ate hamburgers, French fries and apple pie for lunch.

I had a passel of close friends growing up. Many of us spent twelve years together in school. I cherish each one of them. But think about this; how many more lifetime friends could I have had if the black kids would have been included?

That's my loss. That's everybody's loss.

I stood behind Tiger Woods on the fourth tee at The Masters one April several years back. The par 3 is over 200 yards long with a deep bunker guarding the approach. Tiger's shot sounded like a rifle off his iron as he ripped it over the bunker and landed it softly just a few feet from a front pin.

An unbelievable shot; the best I've ever seen, from the most accomplished golfer maybe of all time.

And it didn't add to or take away or make any difference if he were black or white or iridescent orange.....

The "content of your character" indeed!

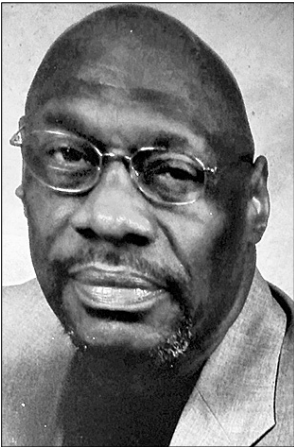

1 3.5 ounce can French fried onions

3/4 teaspoon salt
Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Combine eggs, sour cream, Worcestershire, and salt. Stir in cheese, crab meat and onions. Pour into pastry shell. Bake 55 to 60 minutes or until custard is set and knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serve hot.

1 cup tomato sauce
1-1/2 cup cheddar cheese (grated)

Add beef soup, beans and juice, corn, and tomato sauce. Stir well. Cook noodles and add to above mixture, stirring well. Let simmer 10 to 15 minutes. Top with cheese. Delicious with French bread and a tossed salad.

HUNTINGDON (February 23) — Kenneth and Jobina Gordon start each day by serving their community. The Huntingdon couple operate Big Mama’s House - a daycare center, and K&J Smokeshack, a barbecue business.

Jobina has a special passion for serving children with her daycare, which she opened at 206 Hawkins Lane, Huntingdon in her late grandmother’s house. Jobina said Ruth Jordan, her late grandmother, always loved children and loved her grandchildren.

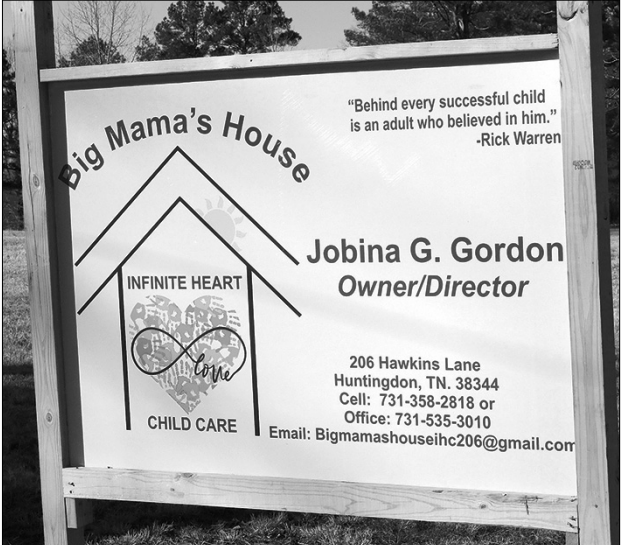
Kenneth and Jobina have six children, five of whom are grown, in their blended family.

With these contracts, Jones said they are looking to employ upwards of 18 new employees. There is a good probability of those jobs being permanent and would be considered as having high wages.

The Jones’ are working on jobs outside of Tennessee as well and can be

seen in Texas, Arkansas and Mississippi. Matt and the other electrical engineers begin their work by setting up machinery and the robotics in the McKenzie location, the former McKenzie Fire Department building on Stonewall. After everything is tested, everything is disassembled and transported to the job site where it is reassembled and any necessary adjustments are made.

Asked about finding suitable matches in regards to employment both Brad and his father stated it is difficult to find someone who can do all the gambits necessary in their company. They said it takes years of

on-the-job training before an individual could be considered a master electrician. With the automation portion, there is even a wider spectrum of learning and training necessary to learn controls. The Jones family has hired graduates of TCAT over the years, but they too require job experience.

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, business doubled in 2020 for Jones Electric. Serving as subcontractors and prime-contractors in the automation industry, the sky’s the limit for the company.

of a vegetarian restaurant in downtown Huntingdon is also the exception to the rural south in meat-loving country.

The 52-year-old grew up on the English-speaking St. Vincent Island, a British-ruled country in the

Caribbean. She and her siblings grew up poor with Lisa recalling, as a youth, sleeping on the floor and going to school, sometimes without the benefit of having lunch during the day.

She immigrated to New York around 1985 and spent 12-13 years in New York. Part of the time, she babysat for a family in New Jersey, saved her money, and took one college class at a time. While in New York, she met her future husband, Clay, who she dated while in college.

Clay, also from the Caribbean, lived in Tennessee. They married in 2005. The couple has twin boys, aged 23, and a daughter, Talisa, age 12, a seventh grade home-schooler.

As an immigrant, she got her green card and then became an American citizen in 2019.

The islanders eat lots of plant-based foods, Lisa explained. When she moved to Tennessee, there were few vegetarian restaurants in the rural south. She had been a vegetarian since her late 20s. She explains that plant-based foods taste good, are healthier, have no hormones, and are easier to digest.

"I'm 52 and have no health issues and have lots of energy," said Lisa. She does not eat eggs, milk, cheese, meat or chicken and does not serve those items in her restaurant, located at 19760 E. Main, Huntingdon.

Lisa started looking for a vegetarian restaurant when the family moved to the rural part of Huntingdon. There were none. So she started looking for place to open such a restaurant, because people had always told her she was a great cook.

She prayed about it and the Lord provided.

At first, people told her she was crazy and said a vegetarian restaurant will never survive. Nine years later, she said she has seen many restaurants come and go, while she remains the lone vegetarian restaurant in the area.

People are trending toward becoming vegetarians, said Lisa. The trend has increased with many people to Tennessee from areas, such as California.

"People are curious," said Lisa, when they first enter Living Well Restaurant. "Sometimes they try an item and then order."

For those unfamiliar with vegetarian food, she recommends vegetable lasagna or tofu. Other entrees include tofu vegetable stir, rice and beans, spaghetti and "meat" balls, pizza or an oat burger. Soups include lentil, white bean, east Indian dahl or vegetable. Desserts include cinnamon rolls, coconut spice bread, carob pie, carrot cake, banana bread, vanilla lemon cake, or vanilla ice cream (made from cashews).

Beverages include sorrel - a Caribbean drink that's high in vitamin C, fruit smoothie, pineapple lemonade, red raspberry tea (the best seller), or Irish moss - a species of red algae which, when boiled, forms a jelly that is used to make a creamy beverage.

The restaurant is exclusively curbside pickup during the pandemic. Lisa will reopen the dining room as soon as its safe. Customers can phone 731-535-3301 to place orders and she will gladly offer curbside pickup service. She is open Sunday through Friday and closed on Saturday, the day of worship of her Christian faith with the Seventh Day Adventist.
