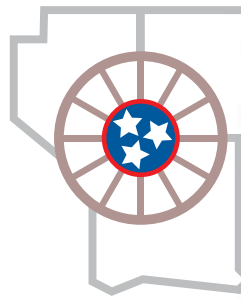

Local, State Races Plus Liquor Referendum on Ballot

Early voting for the November 6, 2018 Election starts Wednesday, October 17 through Thursday, November 1, 2018. The hours are weekdays 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturdays 9 a.m. to noon. The early voting location is the Carroll County Election Commission Office, 625 High Street, Suite

113, Huntingdon, Tenn. 38344

Any elderly voter or disabled voter whose polling place is not accessible may vote at the Election Office on Election Day. The voter must complete an affidavit stating that the voter's polling location does not comply with the provisions of Public Law 98-435 of the 98th Congress. The affidavit must be received in the Election Office by October 27, 2018. Alternatively, you may

vote during early voting in the Election Office or request an absentee ballot.

Locally, there are council races in every municipality along with some mayoral races in Carroll County along with a referendum for retail package liquor in Huntingdon.

Here in McKenzie, Mayor Jill Holland is

Distribution Headquarters for Zline Kitchen and Bath to Locate Facilities in Carroll County

NASHVILLE — Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development Commissioner Bob Rolfe and ZLINE Kitchen and Bath officials announced the company will locate its new distribution headquarters in Bruceton. The kitchen range and hood manufacturer and distributor will create 74 new jobs and invest \$3 million in Carroll County in a 202,539 square-foot building on Rowland Mill Road.

A PILOT – payments of lieu of taxes was approved for the new company. The company agreed to fixed property tax payments over seven years of \$17,982 annually divided as follows: County of Carroll \$5,335, Town of Bruceton \$7,564, and Hollow Rock-Bruceton Special School District \$5,083. The plan calls for a forgiveness of ad valorem taxes for a seven-year period. The company will also pay all taxes in ar-

rears amounting to approximately \$100,000, according to Brad Hurley, president of the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce. He also said the company will operate a warehouse and distribution center and pay an average of \$18 hourly plus benefits. He said the business model can be adversely affected by tariffs.

Trezevant Hears Proposal to Sell Water System

Trezevant's city council met in their regular monthly session Tuesday, October 9 with a number of different items on the agenda and a decent audience on hand for the meeting.

No action was taken on a presentation from Tennessee American Water. Two men, Casey Allen and Drew Watson, were in attendance from the East Tennessee based company to introduce their company and what they do for municipalities that are having issues with their water systems.

According to Allen, Tennessee American Water is one of the largest privately-owned water and sewer companies in existence and are the fourth largest water system in the state of Tennessee. Their biggest customer in Tennessee is the city of Chattanooga where they invest approximately \$20

million annually into that system. They have had no violations and have a good safety rating with the state. Allen indicated that American Water is a community oriented company giving back to the communities that they have investments in which include large and small communities.

Allen stated the reason they were in the area was that four communities within an hour's radius of Trezevant had approached their company about assisting with water system issues. He indicated how they work is if a community was interested in selling their water system assets, the company would come in and do their due diligence checking the financials and physical condition of the system and make an offer to purchase either water assets or sewer assets or both. If a purchase price is agreed upon,

1000-Acre Lake, McKenzie Receive Parks Grants

NASHVILLE (October 16) — Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation presented matching grants to the city of McKenzie and the Carroll County Watershed Authority for the 1000-Acre Recreation Lake on Tuesday, October 16 at Chickasaw Park.

McKenzie received a \$60,000 grant, which will be matched by \$60,000 local funds or services, for commercial playground equipment and an engineered wood fiber surface for Mulberry Park and City Park. Additionally, funds were provided for outdoor musical play elements, engineered wood fiber surface and landscaping for the downtown Splash Pad.

Carroll County Watershed Authority will receive \$250,000, to be matched locally by \$250,000 for the construction of a paved walking trail, pavilion, and parking at the pavilion and at the comfort station, plus additional site amenities – all at the new RV park, constructed on the dam.

McKenzie Water Bill to Increase, Council Authorizes PILOT Program

McKENZIE (October 11)— During its regular monthly meeting, the City of McKenzie Board of Mayor and Council voted in favor to increase the water department's maintenance and rehab fee by \$3 a month.

Water Superintendent Billy Wood explained the department could not show two fiscal years of financial loss without the State's intervention. Increasing the public's bill by a flat monthly rate of \$3 would accrue approximately \$71,000 showing a minimal profit for the department.

If the State were to intervene

McKenzie to Amend City Charter

McKENZIE (October 11) — For the second year in a row, the City of McKenzie looks to request legislation to amend the city’s charter. In a formal workshop, municipal management consultant Dana Deem provided his recommendations for the amendments.

A large portion of the proposed changes are cleaning up of some language allowing the charter to better coincide with the laws of the State of Tennessee such as fines can not exceed \$50 unless authorized by general law.

A point of interest occurs with the recommendation of adding wording to the charter allowing the city to move towards creating the position of a City Administrator. The purposed amendment states:

The Council may, by 2/3 majority vote, appoint a City Administrator who shall be under the control and direction of the Council. The City Administrator shall report and be responsible to the Council. The Council may, by ordinance, require the City Administrator to perform any or all of the following duties:

1. Administer the business of the Municipality;
2. Make recommendations to the Council for improving the quality and quantity of public services to be rendered by the officers and employees to the inhabitants of the municipality;
3. Keep the Council fully advised as to the conditions and needs of the municipality;
4. Report to the Council on the condition of all property, real and personal, owned by the municipality and recommend repairs to replacements as needed;
5. Recommend to the Council and suggested the priority of programs or projects involving public works or public improvements that should be undertaken by the municipality;
6. Recommend to the Council specific personnel positions as may be required for the needs and operations of the municipality, and propose personnel policies and procedures for the approval of the Council; and
7. Serve as the Certified Municipal Financial Officer of the Municipality.
8. Perform such other duties

as may from time to time be designated or required the council.

If, in the future, the council were to move towards appointing a City Administer, the position of City Mayor would be that of a board chairman of the council.

An additional charter change will make the city in compliance with the State as an employment at-will municipality. The wording will read:

...the Mayor shall have authority to make appointments, promotions, and transfers, and to make demotions, suspensions and removals of officers and employees for reasonable cause.

The wording removed allowed for the terminated employee to request an appeal before the City Council within a ten day period.

The November 8 regular meeting will mark the first steps of adopting the charter amendments. If the council votes in favor of the proposed changes, the document is forwarded on to State Senator John Stevens and Representative Andy Holt requesting sponsorship of the legislation before the General Assembly. If the General Assembly signs off on the amendments, the document returns to council for final acceptance.

Morning Glory Garden Club Meeting

The Morning Glory Garden Club held its October meeting in the beautifully decorated home of Mrs. Lucille Russell with Mrs. Sharon Ray serving as co-hostess. Following a delicious brunch, Vice-President Judy Davis called the meeting to order and introduced our guest speaker Hayes Brummitt who demonstrated how to create beautiful table centerpieces using various sized pumpkins, colorful fall leaves, Viking Palm, Painted Daisies, Black-eyed Susan, Butterscotch palm and Blue Statix.

He suggested the following steps to successfully create the design we want: 1. Spray clear lacquer on the pumpkins to help preserve them so they will last longer. Cut a hole in the center to hold water. 2. Save the piece (the pumpkin head) removed and add it to the design later. 3. Using artificial fall leaves for color, arrange them around the pumpkin. 4. Think about a triangle as you design and use foliage to fill in to give thickness to your design. It doesn’t have to be perfectly arranged-think haphazard like a yard. 5. Put a stick in the center

of the pumpkin head and add it to the front of your design.

Hayes then presented the arrangements he had made to Mrs. Lucille Russell and Kay Wilson to be used as centerpieces for their tables. Vice-President Judy Davis thanked Hayes for his presentation and invited him to stay for the rest of the meeting. Since he was helping prepare for an up-coming wedding, he graciously declined.

Following his presentation, Mr. Jim Newton, Landscaper and Garden Center operator spoke to the club. He does maintenance/ routine gardening/and designs in his landscaping business. His suggestion is that less is more and that randomness is an important part of design as you landscape around your home. Also, you should consider how much light is available in the area you wish to plant. He gave many other useful suggestions and then members were urged to ask questions regarding any plantings around their homes.

After Mr. Newton completed his program, Vice-President Judy Davis thanked him for his

time and also invited him to remain if he would like to. She called the club to order for the business meeting and thanked Lucille and Sharon for serving as hostesses. This was followed with members reciting the club collect and the Pledge of the Flag. Chaplain Judy Winters read two poems she had written, one entitled “Butterflies-Ethereal Flowers”. Recording Secretary Zia Locke called the roll and read the minutes of the last meeting. Treasurer Judy Davis gave the treasurer’s report and moved on to committee reports. 2018 Athletic Hall-of-Fame Induction, Alumni Awards Ceremonies are Saturday

McKENZIE — Bethel University will honor four former athletic greats and two contributors with inductions into the prestigious Bethel Athletic Hall-of-Fame Saturday, October 20. This year Bethel will also celebrate the inaugural presentation of the Bethel University’s Lifetime Achievement Award to Dr. James Cantrell. The Alumni Awards and Athletic Hall-of-Fame Inductions will be held in the Vera Low Center for Student Enrichment, Crisp Wing. The awards brunch will begin at 9 a.m. with reservations required.

Prior to this year, eighty-five people and three teams had been enshrined into the hall. The 2008 National Championship soccer team was the first team to be inducted at the 2013 ceremonies. The 1970-1971 Men’s Basketball Team was enshrined in 2016. The 1982 Men’s Basketball squad was inducted last year.

Here is a look at the 2018 Athletic Hall-of Fame Class:

Terrance Bell is a 2011 graduate of Bethel. He came to Bethel after graduating from Huntingdon High School in Huntingdon. He was an outstanding player for the Wildcats from 2004-2007. The second all-time leading rusher in Wildcat history with 3, 982 yards was a three-time all-conference performer for the Wildcats. He rushed for a career high 223 yards against Campbellsville in 2006. He is only one of six Wildcats to rush for 200 yards or more in a game. Bell scored 45 touchdowns in his career which is second most in Wildcat history. He and teammate Adrain Smith were one and two in the country in yards per carry two years in a row. He resides in Murfreesboro and is a physiotherapist. Former Bethel Coach Dino Kaklis said Bell and fellow Hall-of-Fame inductees Adrian Smith and Brent Dearmon were building blocks of the Bethel program.

Brent Dearmon is a 2008 graduate of Bethel. He is a graduate of Vigor High School in Prichard, Alabama and played four years at Bethel (03-06), where he re-wrote the school’s record book en route to the school’s first conference title, first playoff appearance, and first playoff victory. He remains the school’s career and single-season record holder in passing yards and touchdowns. He finished his Wildcat career with 7, 045 passing yards and 77 touchdowns. Dearmon spent time after college playing in the arena and indoor football leagues as a quarterback. He began his coaching career at his alma mater in 2007, where he served as a student assistant, coaching the defensive backs as the Cats posted an 11-2 record.

After Bethel Dearmon spent three seasons as the offensive coordinator at Vigor High School before taking the reins of the program at B.C. Rain High School for two seasons. Dearmon won a state championship at Vigor in 2008 as his offense averaged 36 points per game.

In his first year at Arkansas Tech, the Wonder Boys produced the biggest offensive turnaround in college football - including a 360% increase in rushing yards from the previous season. Tech’s offense was the second-rated offense in the GAC, racking up 36.5 points and 458.8 yards per game.

Dearmon was on the staff at Auburn University in 2013 and 2014 and served as a Running Back Analyst and Wide Receiver Analyst.

Dearmon is the 11th head coach in Bethel football history.

Hollie Hudson McAfee is a graduate of Dyersburg High School and played for the Lady Wildcat women’s basketball program from 1992-1996. She graduated from Bethel in 1996. Her career records rank her 2nd all-time in points scored with 1,986. She remains second in career field goals made with 613. She is second in rebounds with 968, third in field goal percentage at 54.4 percent. Hudson McAfee was recruited by former Bethel coach and legend Buddy Wiggleton. She led the TCAC averaging 23.5 points and 10.5 rebounds per game. In the 1994 season she led the Lady Cats to an upset over NAIA top five ranked Union University scoring 30 points and grabbing nine rebounds in the 104-98 overtime win at Baker Field house. She currently resides in

Hernando, Mississippi.

Adrain Smith is originally from Jasper, Florida and attended Bethel from 2004-2007. He received his degree from Bethel in 2013. Smith’s name appears in the Bethel record book 39 times.

He remains the all-time leading rusher in program history with 5, 275 yards. He rushed for 66 touchdowns which remains No. 1 in Bethel history. Smith rushed for 200 yards or more in a game five times during his Wildcat career. He rushed for 150 yards or more 14 times in his career. Adrain was a three-time MSC All-Conference performer. He was a two-time NAIA All-American and the MSC-West Division Offensive Player of the Year during his tenure for the Wildcats. His career at Bethel is recognized as one of the greatest in NAIA Football history.

Ed and Demetra Perkins “Ed and Demetra are as much Bethel as the Purple and Gold or the Wildcat,” commented Bethel Director of Sports Information Dave McCulley. “Their love and support of Bethel and the athletic programs has been phenomenal.”

Ed has an interesting footnote concerning Bethel basketball. He holds the distinction of being the play-by-play announcer describing the aggressive defensive and smooth offensive skills of Dale Kelley when he was a prime force as a Wildcat. Perkins said, “It all started here Dale.”

Ed was an involved student at Bethel, serving as student body President before he graduated in 1961.

He went on to earn three additional degrees including a doctorate from the University of Kentucky. He then served as the clinical psychologist at the Paris Mental Health Center and wound up as a full-time faculty member at Bethel teaching psychology courses. He ultimately became Bethel’s Vice-President for Development. He is currently serving on Bethel’s Board of Trustees.

Ed worked his way through Bethel working at the local radio station which he later owned. He has also been active in several business pursuits in McKenzie, Carroll County and West Tennessee.

His unwavering support of Bethel Athletics has been strong and continuous since his days as a Bethel student.

Demetra’s love of basketball was cemented when she made the roster of the Gibson High team.

Her connection with Bethel basketball, however, started at age twelve when she came with her parents from Gibson to watch the Bethel men’s basketball team because her brother, Harold was the starting center for the Wildcats for four years. The colorful Coach Casey Vinson left quite an impression on a twelve year old.

When it came to college there was no doubt she was going to Bethel. She was elected “Miss Bethel”. She served as secretary to the student council before graduating in 1960.

Her first teaching job was at Cannon Elementary in Carroll County where she was also the girls’ basketball coach. Demetra

said, “We will not discuss the won-loss record.”

Demetra later taught at McKenzie Elementary and was there 28 years.

She received her Master’s from Murray State and did additional graduate work at the University of Kentucky specializing in reading. She set up the remedial reading program at McKenzie Elementary. She later served as adjunct teacher working with student-teachers at Bethel for five years and at Union University for three years.

She sponsors a yearly dinner for the incoming Bethel Lady Wildcat basketball squad to show them the entire community is interested in them and supports them.

Ed and Demetra met at Bethel and have one daughter Dee Ann who is also a Bethel grad. They have one granddaughter, Drew.

Supporting Bethel has and continues to be a vital part of Demetra’s life.

This year Bethel will also celebrate the inaugural presentation of the Bethel University’s Lifetime Achievement Award to Dr. James Cantrell. Dr. Cantrell is a 1953 graduate of Bethel College with a BS in Mathematics and a Chemistry minor. Dr. Cantrell continued his post graduate work by earning a Masters Degree in Mathematics from the University of Mississippi in 1955, followed by his PhD from the University of TN at Knoxville where he became interested in Topology and where his 1961 Doctoral Thesis came to the Attention of the American Mathematical Society. After completing his Doctorate, Dr. Cantrell joined the faculty of the University of Georgia where he continued his work in the field of Topology.

In addition to his academic achievements, Dr. Cantrell’s work has been published in American Mathematical Society Publications, he was selected to be a fellow of the Sloan Foundation, was invited by, Robert Oppenheimer to be a member of the Institute for Advanced Study and founded a yearly Georgia Topology Conference which, after fifty one years, is now one of the longest running geometry conferences in the world.

In 1993 Jim retired and became Emeritus Professor and Head, Department of Mathematics, University of Georgia. Endowed in his honor, the Cantrell Lecture Series continues to give a concatenation of lectures on topics of historical and research interest. In 2012 Dr. Cantrell was inducted into the Fellows of the American Mathematical Society. In notifying him of his selection the AMS, President stated, “You have been chosen for this honor in view of your distinguished contributions to Mathematics.”

It is with great pride we present The Lifetime Achievement Award to Dr. James Cantrell at the 2018 Athletic and Alumni Hall of Fame Awards Brunch. Congratulations to each of these Bethel icons.

Commission Denies Addition of Belew Lane

HUNTINGDON (October 8) — Belew Lane, just outside of Trezevant, was not added to the county’s road maintenance system following a unanimous vote by Carroll County Commissioners.

The rural road was requested to be added to the county’s road system, however, after learning the road was substandard and

the person requesting the addition had somewhat misled the Highway Committee, the commissioners chose not to add it.

In other business, commissioners tabled a resolution concerning a request by McKenzie Industrial Board to allow the Board to grant PILOTs - Payment in Lieu of Taxes to new industries. PILOTs have been

issued by McKenzie, Huntingdon and the county’s industrial boards for years without the formal approval process requested by McKenzie Industrial Board. Differing legal opinions is why the action was instead moved to the McKenzie City Council, the governmental authorizing body of McKenzie Industrial Board.

Medical Doctor and Ironman Mentor

Tragically and unexpectedly, this year Dr. Volker Winkler died in February. Dr. Winkler was the caring and highly competent medical doctor who practiced in Carroll County. Volker was the crazy and strong endurance athlete who competed all over the world.

I first met Volker at local 5K and 10K races, when he would run off and leave me. Eventually he became my marathoning friend and long run training partner. Volker led Dr. Gwin Anderson, Jimmy Crossett, Bonnie Elam, his daughter, Kirsten and others of us on two- and three-hour runs.

Then 13 years ago, Volker cajoled four demented marathoners into doing our first Ironman triathlon. In 2005, he told Gwin, Jimmy, Kirsten and me we should do an Ironman. He recommended the Ironman in Wisconsin, which he already had done, because it would be cool up there.

He "forgot" to mention that the

112-mile bike ride would be hilly as heck.

Volker was delighted that when his four disciples got to Wisconsin, we were surprised — and even dismayed — to learn about the hills.

And while heat was hard on that tall, muscular native of Germany, he still chuckled that even way up north, on that fall day we also would get unusual heat. So, on a 90-plus degree day, a couple thousand of us teamed up to set a world record for the highest percentage of DNFs -- Did Not Finishes -- of any Ironman. Anywhere. Ever.

That day there weren't enough ambulances and medical personnel to attend to all the athletes collapsed on the side of the roads. Almost 20% of the fittest people I'd ever seen didn't finish. But Volker and his four followers did. He had trained us to finish. And none of us wanted to suffer his teasing and taunts if we didn't.

Through the years I did other Ironmen. None were easy, but some were "Volker Special." Like

one in Louisville in August. When I finished the bike and started the marathon run/walk/slog, it was a humid 97 degrees.

And four years ago, Volker led our gang to Chattanooga for what may be the world's longest Ironman. Other Ironman courses are based on the original Hawaii distances, a 2.4-mile swim, 112-mile bike, and 26.2-mile run, for the standard 140.6-mile total.

But not Chattanooga, which gives you four extra miles on the bike. Of course, Volker was there for all the fun. He finished ahead of me. Once again leading the way.

Two months after Chattanooga, one morning I felt chest pain. Bad genes. I was five years older than my father when he had his first heart attack. My heart attack, with 100% blockage of a major artery, could have killed me. Especially when the Kentucky hospital waited almost 12 hours before having a cardiologist see me.

But the years of running, biking and triathlons with Volker and our friends saved me. And

the doctors and nurses fixed me.

So, one stent and ten months later, thanks to Volker I returned to Chattanooga and did that 144.6 miles again.

Last fall, Volker led a West Tennessee delegation to Florida for yet another Ironman, his last. Probably none of the ten or so of us would have been Ironmen without Volker. I know I wouldn't have been.

This year, Ironman Maryland was September 29th. After I finished, I drank a chocolate milkshake toast to Dr. Winkler. Without Volker, twenty or more West Tennesseans never would have done what we thought impossible.

Volker knew, however, not only what was possible, but what was, following his leadership, fun.

Thanks, Volker. You inspired us. You inspire us still.

(Dr. Volker Winkler died February 24, 2018 in a cycling accident near his McKenzie home.)

The 2018 McKenzie Rebels completed their golf season last week at the TSSAA Small Division Golf State Tournament at Willowbrook Country Club in Manchester.

There were a total of 43 lady participants and 63 gentleman participants from across the state in the tournament.

The ladies finished their season by placing fourth at the state tournament. Maggie Glass concluded her sophomore season with an individual tie for tenth place, shooting 86/84 over the two days. Small Division schools, 107 field a gentlemen's golf team. Our gentlemen finished seventh. Those numbers elevate the success of our golf teams this season.

The 2018 season concludes with the ladies posting a final season record of 50-11-2. The gentlemen end their season with a record of 64-11, with both teams claiming District and Region Championships this season and the gentlemen not losing a nine-hole match the entire season.

The dual District and Region Championships in the same season by both teams were a first in school history.

Mustang Dallas Willis received the opening kickoff and returned it to the Huntingdon 45. Konnor Pearson took the first snap 55 yards for a touchdown. Cole Edwards kicked the PAT, and Huntingdon led 7-0 just 18 seconds into the contest.

The ensuing kickoff by Edwards went into the end zone on one bounce for a touchback to start the Vikings at their own 20. Gage Deavers ran three times for a net loss, and Perry County punted. Mustang Daquon Robinson

picked up the punt and returned it about 60 yards for a touchdown, but a penalty brought the ball back to the Viking 32.

Mustang quarterback Hunter Ensley scrambled to the outside on first down. Under pressure, he threw a low pass which was tipped and intercepted by Viking Walker Wright.

Taking over at the 30, Perry County again went three-and-out despite a sharp third-down pass from quarterback Tyler Dudley to Payne Coblentz. The punt by Bryson Fuqua sailed out of bounds at midfield.

Robinson made a short gain on first down, then went to the outside on second down for 42 yards. On first-and-goal at the 6, Konnor Pearson ran for two. Ensley kept the next snap and dove for the four-yard touchdown. Edwards kicked, and Huntingdon led 14-0 with six minutes remaining in the opening frame.

Edwards kicked off for another touchback, and the Mustang defense forced a third straight three-and-out. Robinson grabbed the Fuqua punt around the 30 and returned it to the Huntingdon 46.

Ensley started the drive with a long pass to Kelby Pearson, who tacked on extra yards for a gain of 42. Ensley went right back to Pearson for a 12-yard touchdown pass. Edwards split the uprights, and the Mustangs led 21-0 with 4:31 still to play in the first quarter.

Edwards' kickoff was shorter, but resulted in even worse field position for Perry County

as Gunter Baker fell on it at the 17. The staunch Mustang defense again yielded a three-and-out, and Fuqua's punt was downed at the Huntingdon 45.

Ensley took to the air again, this time targeting Dallas Willis for a 55-yard touchdown. Edwards booted the point after, and the lead was up to 28-0 with just over three minutes left in a long first.

Another touchback started the Vikings at the 20, and again the drive fizzled into a three-and-out. Fuqua's punting continued to be a strong point for Perry County, setting the Mustangs back at their own 38.

Ensley threw deep to a wide-open Kelby Pearson, who would have scored easily had an off-balance catch not sent him into the turf. Still, the 42-yard catch meant a first down at the 20. Dejuan Smith carried for six, then went the last 14 for the score on second down. The PAT by Edwards gave Huntingdon a 35-0 lead with ten seconds to go in the first frame.

The quarter ended with Edwards' kickoff picked up by Baker and returned to the 29. Yet another three-and-out was highlighted by an eleven-yard sack by Mustang Bo McLemore. The Fuqua punt went out of bounds at the Viking 36.

Willis ran to the outside on first down for another quick score. Edwards kicked for a 42-0 advantage early in the second.

Next was another Edwards touchback, another Perry County three-and-out and another strong Fuqua punt, downed at

the Huntingdon 34.

Konnor Pearson started the drive with a 22-yard carry, then promptly finished it with a 44-yard touchdown run. Edwards added the point-after, and the Mustangs led 49-0 with just over five minutes left in the first half.

Edwards kicked for another touchback, but Huntingdon jumped offense on first down for a five-yard penalty. Dudley then threw to Wright for 15 yards to move the chains for the first time in the game. The Mustangs shut down the drive there, and Fuqua's punt was downed at the Huntingdon 39.

The Mustangs made numerous offensive substitutions and ran three plays for short gains before the half ended.

With a fresh set of downs, Deavers ran for three, then fumbled on the next play. Mustang Blake Reeves recovered at the Perry County 45.

Huntingdon committed a pair of penalties on the ensuing possession to bring up third-and-21, then turned the ball over on a fumble.

Taking over at the Mustang 48, Dudley again connected with Wright for a first down. From the 24, he then threw incomplete

three times. On fourth down, Reeves and Noah Belew swooped in for an eleven-yard sack.

Huntingdon took over at the 35, but fumbled the ball away again on the first play, ending the third quarter.

Perry County started the final frame with a false start, then Dudley threw three incomplete passes. On fourth-and-long, he found Wright, but not for enough yardage to prevent the turnover on downs.

The Mustangs took over at their own 44. Malek Cannon ran for three, then for another eight to move the chains. Grant Bartholomew gained four; then Ethan Reliford scored from 44 yards out. Edwards completed a perfect night with his eighth PAT, and Huntingdon led 56-0 with under seven minutes of running clock remaining in the game.

The ensuing kickoff sailed out of bounds, starting the Vikings at the 35. Deavers made a short gain, then Dudley threw to Wright for a large gain. Dudley followed with another first-down pass to Brier Brown, then threw to Coblentz for a 27-yard touchdown. Deavers failed on the two-point attempt, and the Mustang lead was 56-6.

Fuqua kicked off for Perry County as time expired.

The Mustangs (9-0, 5-0) will wrap the regular season Thursday at Middleton, then enjoy a bye week to prepare for a November 2 home playoff game.

War Eagles Suffer First Region Loss, Postseason Appearance Secure

ATWOOD (October 12) — The West Carroll War Eagles suffered their first Region 7-1A loss Friday at the hands of the Lake County Falcons, 36-7. With two weeks remaining in the regular season, they are guaranteed one of four playoff slots, but which one is yet to be determined.

Greenfield (4-0) sits atop the region and Lake County (4-1) moves to second with Friday's win. West Carroll (3-1) is currently in third, but could still end up anywhere in the top four. Friday, the War Eagles will host the South Fulton Red Devils (2-2) and can lock up at least third place with a win. Dresden (1-3), already having lost to both West Carroll and South Fulton, can't move above the War Eagles, but could earn the fourth playoff spot with two wins combined with two Red Devil losses.

West Carroll's lone path to the region title is for Greenfield to beat Lake County then fall to the War Eagles. If Lake County defeats Greenfield, the Falcons will be region champions and Greenfield and West Carroll will play for runner-up (and a home playoff game), assuming the War Eagles beat the Red Devils.

The War Eagles received Friday's opening kickoff and started at their own 19. P.J. Odom ran twice for a total of eleven yards and a first down. Quarterback Trace Fuller then lost yards on consecutive keeps. On third-and-long, Jeremiah Bryant was

stopped in the backfield for another loss, and Devin Nash punted.

Lake County started near midfield. Dezmon Johnson ran twice for two yards each, stopped by War Eagles Darrell Williams and Armoni Bonds. Quarterback Tanner Snyder kept the next snap for a 49-yard touchdown. West Carroll blocked the point-after attempt, and the Falcons led 6-0 with 7:38 remaining in the first quarter.

A short kick allowed the War Eagles to start at their own 44. Jarius Weatherford gained two yards, then Fuller kept for just enough to move the chains. Weatherford was stopped at the line of scrimmage, then Fuller threw incomplete. Lake County jumped offense to make it third-and-five, then Fuller threw to Bryant for a 21-yard gain. Odom ran ten yards to set up first-and-goal at the 8, then made a short gain on two consecutive carries. Fuller kept on third down for a loss of a yard. Going for it on fourth down, Fuller was forced out of the pocket and scrambled toward the sideline. Under heavy pressure, he tossed it to the back corner of the end zone, where Blaine Howell made a leaping catch for the touchdown. Nash nailed the PAT, and the War Eagles led 7-6 with three minutes left in the opening frame.

On the ensuing kickoff, Falcon Larry Tubbs let the ball get past him, but recovered for a big return to the West Carroll 38. War Eagle Zach Perry stopped Johnson for a three-yard loss. Snyder kept for a gain of six, then Johnson ran for two consecutive first downs into the red zone as the first quarter ended. Snyder threw incomplete

to start the second, then Lake County was flagged for a false start. On third-and-long, Snyder's pass was nearly picked off by Shae Crocker, and he threw incomplete again on fourth down.

The War Eagle offense couldn't capitalize on the big defensive stop, going three-and-out. Nash's punt was downed at the West Carroll 47.

Tubbs moved the chains on two carries, then Johnson gained nine. Snyder kept for another first down, then Tubbs gained six down to the 13. Snyder took it in on the next snap. The QB kept again for the two-point conversion, and Lake County took a 14-7 lead with seven minutes to play in the half.

The Falcon kickoff went out of bounds to give West Carroll the ball at the 35. A false start stifled the drive, and it was quickly third-and-16. Fuller completed a pass to Jack Barrow just short of the first-down marker, and Bryant was stopped for a loss to turn the ball over on downs in War Eagle territory.

The West Carroll defense gained some confidence by forcing a three-and-out. Lake County's punt went out of bounds at the 5.

The bad field position turned into disaster as Fuller fumbled on the first snap and the Falcons recovered at the 2.

The War Eagle defense again faced a daunting situation. Blake Davidson stopped Johnson for no gain, then a host of defenders pushed Snyder back for a short loss. Nash took down Johnson at the 9 to force fourth down, and Snyder threw incomplete under pressure from Hunter Wadley.

With under a minute to play in the half, Fuller took a knee and West Carroll was content to go to the locker room down one score with two huge defensive stops to build on.

Johnson received the second-half kick for Lake County and made a solid return to the Falcon 43. Tubbs crossed midfield for a first down, then Johnson gained seven. He followed with a 39-yard touchdown. Snyder kept again for two points, and the Falcons led 22-7 early in the third.

The War Eagles went three-and-out again, and Nash's punt went out of bounds at the Lake

County 40.

The Falcons ate up the majority of the third quarter with a 14-play drive including four first downs and one fourth-down conversion, capped by a one-yard touchdown by Johnson. The PAT attempt was no good, but the Lake County lead increased to 28-7.

The Falcon kickoff went out of bounds again, and Bryant gained nine as the quarter ended. He carried for a first down to start the final frame, but a holding penalty negated the play. Two power runs by Weatherford made it fourth-and-one, but he was stopped short on the next try.

Trenton Peabody Golden Tide Swamps McKenzie Rebels

Trenton's Golden Tide clearly was on a mission against the McKenzie Rebels Friday night swamping the Rebels 55-7 in a Region 7AA contest. It's a good bet they remembered getting upset by the Rebels 22-20 last year combined with just getting beat at home two weeks earlier by Gibson County and they had two weeks to prepare for the Rebels. On the other hand, McKenzie was coming off a road win at Halls and a solid home win against Adamsville last week and starting to get some of the injured Rebels back into action.

Just barely a minute later, after the Rebels went three and out again, Trenton was on the board again with a 51-yard TD pass from Baugus to Noah Halbrook with 1:34 left in the first quarter. The extra point was no good but the Tide extended their lead to 27-0.

McKenzie started their next possession with Eli Surber getting sacked and leaving the game

briefly. Joseph Miller became the quarterback and completed a 12-yard pass to Tyler Spivey to jump start the offense. From there, Baugus found Jerel Dickson on first down for a 27-yard touchdown with just 14 seconds left until halftime. Extra point was good for a 41-7 halftime lead for the Tide.

McKenzie opened the second

half with a big kickoff return by Spivey that was nullified by a penalty. Miller got a big 22-yard gain on first down but the drive stalled forcing another Rebel punt. Trenton took over near midfield and were in the endzone three plays later on another Jaquez Wilkins 1-yard touchdown with 7:46 left in the third quarter. Extra point was good for a 48-7 lead.

The Rebels went three and out on their next possession but Trenton was good for one more score on a short two-play drive with Wilkins going 46 yards for the final score of the night. Extra point was good for a 55-7 lead. Both teams began subbing in younger players into the contest with both teams swapping possessions during the final quarter.

McKenzie comes home for their final two games of the regular season with playoff possibilities still on the table. First up is Union City this week for Senior Night as 11 senior football players are honored with their parents along with senior cheerleaders and senior band members.

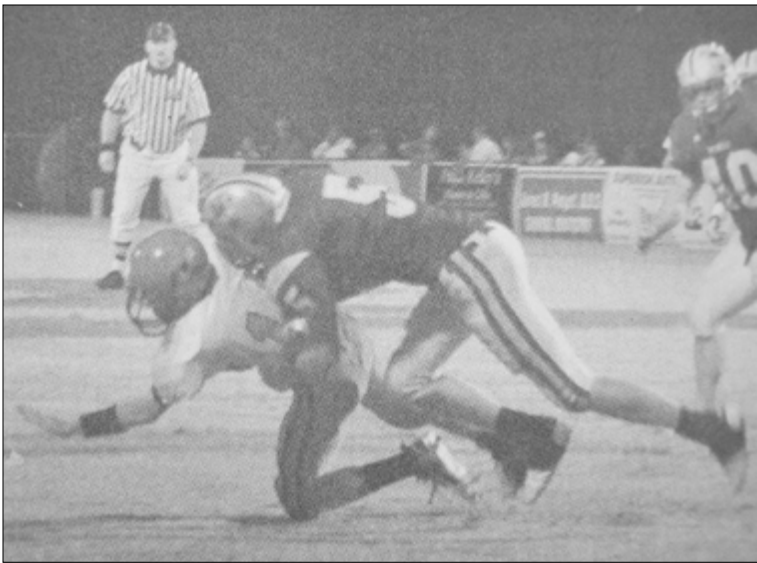

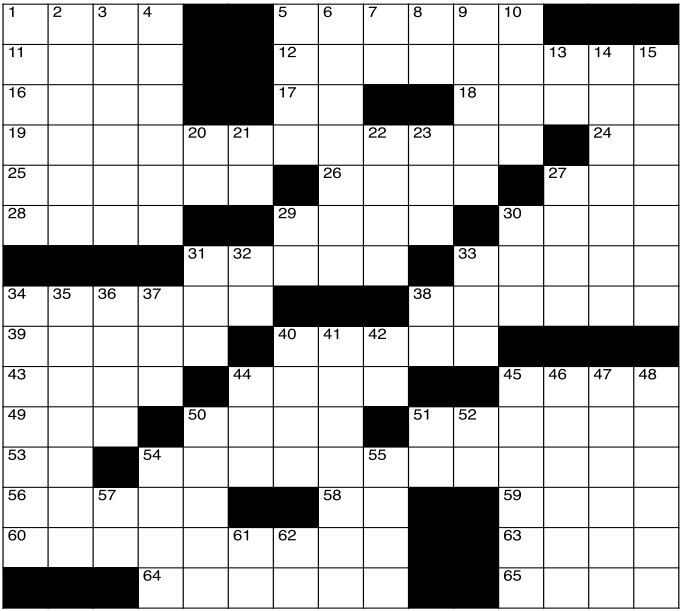

SOME DEANE SHORT STORIES

Dear District 76 Neighbors:

As our general election nears, you will hear more and more about the candidates, what each believes in, and what they want to get done. So my main position are shown in the pictures: However, I also want to try something different, and share a few brief stories from my life. Story 1. Grandma.

For Grandma, voting was special, a way to honor her nation's heritage. *Response:* Our state currently has the lowest voting percentage in the country. We can help this by voting and encouraging other to do likewise. If elected, I will work to find ways for encouraging more citizens to participate in voting.

Story 2. Vision.

Susan and I were visiting the coastal village of one of my co-workers in Papua New Guinea when. I complained that I seemed to be looking through a sandstorm. Our church organist suggested I see Dr. Verma, a world-class volunteer from India working at the Port Moresby Hospital. Although a queue of 50 or more Papua New Guineas was waiting to see him, he waved me in. After a quick check he said "Your retina is detaching. Come in tomorrow and I will fix it." What he didn't tell me was how. The next day he put some anesthetic on my eye, after which he and his nurse led me to his surgery. He said, "If we were in Australia I would use lasers. But we not are in Australia, so I will use retinal cyroplasty." He took out the biggest syringe that I had ever seen, filled it with a liquid gas, and went into the eye to form scar tissue to reattach the retina. For 20 minutes I saw multicolored veins and gosh knows what else. It was the bravest that I had ever been. The result – no problems for the past 25 years. The cost? 10 kina (about \$4). I was lucky – I no insurance, but there was an affordable world-class doctor available. *Response:* Here in Tennessee we should not have to be lucky in order to have access to good medical care. I will work to find ways to enable all Tennesseans to be able to get good, economical health and hospital care.

Story 3. Third Grade.

I spent Grades 1-3 in a small rural school that contained Grades 1-8 in four rooms. There were about 18 students in each room. Surprisingly, it provided a great basis for my education. In Grade 1 picked up skills in reading and writing (even cursive) by paying attention to second grade lessons. But third grade gave me an even more profound boost. Our teacher specifically arranged for two girls and me to do the fourth grade lessons in arithmetic, history, and geography. But the greatest thing was reading poems of James Whitcomb Riley. I started writing poems myself, and

our teacher organized them into a book. Although that book disappeared long ago, and I eventually focused on mathematics. I have always appreciated her going out of the way to help everyone in our class to excel. *Response:* To this day I view public education as the foundation of our democracy, and I will work to see that teachers are well-supported and have a significant role in curriculum design and a focus on teaching as opposed to testing.

Story 4. Faculty Meeting.

In my second year of teaching at Whitworth College, I was elected by the faculty to chair the Faculty Economic Welfare Committee. I had no previous background in this area, but I worked hard to cooperate with the administration and board of trustees. I did background research, produced explanatory graphs, made enthusiastic presentations, and we ended up with a good pay raise. At year's end the faculty awarded me a pie graph – a pumpkin pie with whipped cream showing a small slice. The large remainder was labeled "Faculty Share" and the small slice "The Rest of the College". We all had a good laugh, but I was embarrassed. While my charge was to represent the faculty, there was no such group for the staff. As a consequence, in future years chairing the committee, I always insisted on equal treatment of all the staff. *Response:* My life has been focused on working for everyone and not just the elite. I expect to continue this practice.

Story 5. Non-Level Playing Field.

During 1989 I was a Fulbright Professor in Papua New Guinea, and participated in the local Bushwalkers group. At Easter we flew in a light aircraft to the remote village of Kagi on the side of a mountain along the famous Kakoda Track of WWII. Every night there was a heavy downpour, making the walking tracks thick mud. After Easter services everyone in Kagi gathered in the centre of the village for a mass soccer game. One side went downhill, and the other uphill. One team thus had a great advantage – giving a clear illustration of not playing on a level field. *Response:* We have a similar problem in our state electoral apportionment. Computers enable the legislature to design districts that insure one party's dominance and to provide safe seats for the privileged. This is one area in which we must be non-partisan and do better.

Story 6. Country Music.

When I was in junior high school, our family took a vacation in the Smokies, lodging in Gatlinburg. We stayed across the street from an outdoor music center that featured country music every night. That was my introduction to the good old music, an enjoyment that carries on today. One of my favorite groups, the Carter Family, had a song that sums up much of my life's direction: *Hello stranger, put your loving hand in mine. Hello stranger, put your loving hand in mine. You are a stranger, and you're a pal of mine.* We live in a wonderful state in which we have over 7,000,000 neighbors, most of whom are strangers to us. Our challenge, and especially that of our legislature, is how to reach out to strangers, and make their lives better. This is also a calling from the Bible. *Response:* If elected, I will do my best to maintain this as my own theme song, and work to help all people of Tennessee.
