Huntingdon Still in Turmoil Over Water Department

HUNTINGDON (June 5) — Brown water and grinder pumps continue to take center stage in the Town of Huntingdon. During the Public Works Committee Meeting, the press and non-Public Works Employees were requested to leave the meeting temporarily as the board moved into an executive session with the town's attorney Robert Keeton, III.

While the press was not made privy to the discussion, it was later learned through second-hand knowledge the discussion focused on Ordinance No. 531 on grinder pumps. Currently, The Banner has not been made aware of pending lawsuits or a threat thereof.

In order to declare or move into an executive session, "a governing body can go into

McKENZIE/Henry County (June 10) — State Representative Tandy Darby (R-Greenfield) and representatives for the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development visited Haven Steel on Monday to tour the manufacturing plant and its new upgraded machinery.

Carol Holt, plant manager, along with Tom O'Brien, Executive VP of Haven Steel-Kansas and Tennessee, provided information to visitors, who were in attendance to tour the plant.

Haven Steel purchased Cutting Specialist, Inc. in 2021 and expanded the operations of the manufacturer of cutting blades.

Many of the older machines were removed and replaced with newer, more efficient machinery.

Carol Holt welcomed everyone to the McKenzie facility, located on State Route 22 North in McKenzie. The 18 year veteran of the company rose through the ranks to the title of plant manager.

She showcased the new equipment to Representative Darby,

Dresden Man Killed by Train In McKenzie

McKENZIE (June 8) — A Dresden man is dead after being struck by a train in McKenzie around 5:18 a.m. on June 8.

McKenzie Police Officer Timothy Dillon filed a report indicating Christopher Austin Tyler Jackson, 30, of Dresden was laying on the railroad track when he was struck by a train at the intersection of Hamilton Street.

Dillon, Investigator Beauchamp, Sergeant Jones, Patrolman Raspberry, McKenzie Fire/Rescue and EMS responded to the scene. The body was located about six train car lengths back from where the engine was able to stop. The TBI and CSX Railroad police were also requested to make the scene.

Jackson was indicted by the Weakley County Grand Jury in May on charges of Theft of Property.

McKenzie Police are requesting anyone with additional information to contact the department.

West Carroll Board Votes To Approve Renovations to Elementary, Primary Schools

West Carroll School Board met on June 6 and discussed renovations to improve safety at all three schools in West Carroll Special School District.

Mr. Greer Lashlee from Lashlee-Rich Construction was at the meeting to present the proposal and answer questions from the board about the project. Lashlee-Rich will serve as project manager for the renovations.

The renovations would be done to improve security at the schools, including replacing doors and windows as well as constructing secure vestibules for all three schools.

The board voted to have the architect draft plans for all three schools, however they are only going to approve construction for the elementary and primary schools due to a higher need for security improvements in those buildings. The high school is a newer building

and the need for updates is not as great.

This project will include replacing all interior and exterior doors at the affected schools as well as all of the windows and making sure that any windows include security film on the glass.

The total cost of the project for the elementary and primary schools totals just over \$1 million. This will come out of the fund balance which currently has about \$5 million in funds available.

The project will start as soon as they could get competitive bids. The principals of both schools expressed a desire for updates to be completed as soon as possible, which could possibly mean construction is on-going while students are in the building.

The board also voted to approve the contract agreement with Carroll County School District for student transportation, Career Technical Education (vocational school) and alternative school.

The Open Meetings Act or the Sunshine Laws

A Guide to Government Transparency

As a way to educate the public and some local officials. The Banner is providing a crash course in the Opening Meetings Act or what is also known as the Sunshine Law. Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis said over a century ago, “Sunlight is said to be the best of disinfectants.” This simply means that transparency provides for good governance.

First let’s begin with defining the **Sunshine Laws** — In enacting the Tennessee Open Meetings Act (TOMA), the General Assembly declared it to be “the public policy of the state that the formation of public policy and decisions is public business and shall not be conducted in secret.” T.C.A. § 8-44-101. As recognized by the Tennessee Court of Appeals, “Our Open Meetings Law is perhaps one of the most comprehensive and extensive in the nation. There are no exceptions except those situations which may be in conflict with the constitution.” Lakeway Publishers, Inc. v. Civil Service Board, 1994 WL 315919 (Tenn. Ct. App.). Ironically, the General Assembly itself is not subject to this law. See Mayhew v. Wilder, 46 S.W.3d 760 (Tenn. Ct. App. 2001).

In short, you have a right under Tennessee public meetings law, Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-44-101 through § 8-44-111, to attend any meeting held by a governing body where a quorum of members is required to make a decision, except where otherwise provided in the state constitution.

Who enforces Opening Meetings or Sunshine Law?

Enforcement of the Open Meetings Act has been left to citizens and the press through lawsuits in local Chancery and Circuit courts. But the public had no way to get authoritative guidance on potential violations of the law outside of a lawsuit until 2008 when the Office of Open Records Counsel was created.

The Counsel’s office has more authority to deal with local public records issues than with the sunshine law, but the legislature made the office responsible for monitoring local open meetings problems, too.

Is a Parks and Recreation Board or the Library Board subject to the Opening Meetings Act?

If a board or committee appointed by your governing body is authorized to make recommendations to the governing body that may affect policy or decisions, the committee or board is a “governing body” subject to the TOMA. Such boards include planning commissions, beer boards, boards of zoning appeals, and economic

development boards.

What happens if the Opening Meetings Act is violated?

Any action taken at a meeting in violation of this part shall be void and of no effect; provided, that this nullification of actions taken at such meetings shall not apply to any commitment, otherwise legal, affecting the public debt of the entity concerned.

From T.C.A. § 8-44-105:

(a) The circuit courts, chancery courts, and other courts which have equity jurisdiction, have jurisdiction to issue injunctions, impose penalties, and otherwise enforce the purposes of this part upon application of any citizen of this state.

(b) In each suit brought under this part, the court shall file written findings of fact and conclusions of law and final judgments, which shall also be recorded in the minutes of the body involved.

(c) The court shall permanently enjoin any person adjudged by it in violation of this part from further violation of this part. Each separate occurrence of such meetings not held in accordance with this part constitutes a separate violation.

(d) The final judgment or decree in each suit shall state that the court retains jurisdiction over the parties and subject matter for a period of one (1) year from date of entry, and the court shall order the defendants to report in writing semiannually to the court of their compliance with this part.

Here’s a little case law to wet your whistle.

Knoxville Sentinel vs. Knox County — The most notable voided action came in 2007 when a Chancery Court jury found several Knox County commissioners had deliberated in private before voting to fill eight vacancies on the commission and four vacant countywide offices, including sheriff.

After a two-week trial, the Knox County judge accepted the jury’s verdict and tossed all 12 officials out of office. It was the first such jury trial under the sunshine law. Members of the commission had to testify about their conversations under oath.

In addition to invalidating the action, the court can “permanently enjoin any person adjudged by it in violation” from repeating that illegal conduct. As the Supreme Court has noted, the term “impose penalties” in the law means contempt citations against officials who violate the injunction.

The goal is to protect the public from actions taken in circumvention of the policies and procedures set out in the statute and case law. It

is designed to correct those actions, not penalize individual members of governing bodies. They can only be punished for contempt if they violate an injunction, or ultimately at election time.

Neese v. Paris Special School District — In Neese v. Paris Special School District (1990), the Court of Appeals introduced the idea that a governing body that violates the Open Meetings Act can “cure” that violation by “new and substantial” reconsideration of their actions, essentially doing it over by following the law.

Although the court found the school board deliberated on a rezoning plan at a retreat in violation of the Open Meetings Act, it ruled that the school board’s eventual vote in public was legal.

The court reasoned the actions of the school board after the retreat but before a formal vote fixed the violation. The board scheduled a public meeting, gave adequate notice and then allowed a three-hour public question and answer session on the issue. The court said:

T.C.A. § 8-44-105 provides that “[a]ny action taken at a meeting in violation of this part shall be void and of no effect...” We do not believe that the legislative intent of this statute was forever to bar a governing body from properly ratifying its decision made in a prior violative manner. However, neither was it the legislative intent to allow such a body to ratify a decision in a subsequent meeting by a perfunctory crystallization of its earlier action. We hold that the purpose of the act is satisfied if the ultimate decision is made in accordance with the Public Meetings Act, and if it is a new and substantial reconsideration of the issues involved, in which the public is afforded ample opportunity to know the facts and to be heard with reference to the matters at issue.

Here are some Fun Facts provided by the Tennessee Comptroller’s Office.

What constitutes a meeting of a governing body?

The Tennessee Open Meetings Act defines a “meeting” as “the convening of a governing body of a public body for which a quorum is required to make a decision or to deliberate toward a decision.” A “governing body” is “any public body [consisting] of two or more members, with the authority to make decisions for or recommendations to a public body on policy or administration.” Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-44-102.

Meetings to make a recommendation to a single individual, such as a county

mayor or dean of an educational institution, are not “meetings” covered by the Open Meetings Act. On-site inspections, chance meetings, and informational workshops are also not considered “meetings” under the Act, so long as there is no discussion or deliberation toward a decision that must be voted on by a quorum of a governing body. Advisory meetings with attorneys regarding anticipated or ongoing litigation are also exempt from the Tennessee Open Meetings Act, but actual decisions regarding litigation must be made at an open public meeting.

What is adequate public notice?

Adequate public notice is not defined in the Tennessee Open Meetings Act. Tennessee courts have determined that adequate public notice is sufficient notice under the circumstances that would fairly inform the public of the meeting. Memphis Publ’g Co. v. City of Memphis, 513 S.W.2d 511, 513 (Tenn. 1974).

Can I participate in a public meeting?

The Tennessee Open Meetings Act grants the public the right to attend and observe public meetings. It also requires governing bodies to provide a period for public comment at every meeting where there is an actionable item on the agenda. The public comments must be germane to items on the agenda. The governing body may put reasonable restrictions on the period for public comment, such as the number of speakers or the time period for public comment. A governing body must ensure opposing viewpoints are fairly represented. 2023 Public Chapter 0300.

What are the requirements of the Tennessee Open Meetings Act?

The Tennessee Open Meetings Act declares that the formation of public policy and public business must be transacted transparently and not in secret. Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-44-101(a). To accomplish this goal, the Tennessee Open Meetings Act requires that all meetings of a governing body be open to the public, that a governing body provide adequate public notice of the meeting, and in certain circumstances, that the governing body provide a period for public comment regarding agenda items. Local government legislative bodies are required to provide an agenda in advance of a meeting. Tenn. Code Ann. §§ 8-44-102, 8-44-103, 2023 Public Chapters 0213 and 0300.

What must be included in the notice of a public meeting?

The Tennessee Open Meetings Act requires governing bodies to provide adequate public notice of their

meetings. Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-44-103. Although local government legislative bodies must make the agenda of a public meeting available at least 48 hours prior to a meeting, TOMA does not require the meeting notice to include the contents of a regular meeting. Lewis v. Cleveland Mun. Airport Auth., 289 S.W.3d 808 (Tenn. Ct. App. 2009); 2023 Public Acts 213. Notice of a special-called meeting must include the purpose for which the meeting is being called. Fisher v. Rutherford Cnty. Reg’l Plan. Comm’n, No. M2012-01397-COA-R3CV, 2013 WL 2382300, at *1 (Tenn. Ct. App. May 29, 2013). For meetings requiring a period for public comment, the meeting notice must disclose how a person may indicate their desire to provide public comment at the meeting. 2023 Public Acts 0300.

Can members of a governing body meet via electronic means?

The Tennessee Open Meetings Act generally only allows members of state governing bodies to participate by electronic means. Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-44-108. Such authority does not generally exist for city and county governing bodies. Elected governing bodies of counties, cities, metropolitan governments and school boards may establish an internet forum as provided in Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-44-109. However, such internet forums cannot act as a substitute for decision making by a governing body at a meeting held in accordance with the Tennessee Open Meetings Act.

What happens if there is a violation of the Tennessee Open Meetings Act?

Actions taken at a meeting in violation of the Tennessee Open Meetings Act, other than actions related to public indebtedness, are void. Tenn. Code Ann. § 8-44-105. If a court finds that a violation occurred, the court’s findings regarding a violation must be filed with the meeting minutes and the governing body must file semi-annual reports while under the court’s jurisdiction for one year.

Do we need to publish an agenda before a meeting?

An incorporated city, town, metropolitan government, or county legislative body must publish an agenda forty-eight (48) hours prior to a meeting. The agenda must reasonably describe what will be deliberated or acted upon at the meeting. The agenda can be published on the legislative body’s website.

The legislative body can still discuss or act on items that are not on the agenda, as long as the body follows all of its bylaws, rules, and procedures. If a body is found to violate the requirement to publish an agenda, a court may find the body to have

violated the Tennessee Open Meetings Act.

Here are a few more fun facts to know!

Can officials text and email each other on a matter that leads to a discussion?

Telephone calls, emails, text messages and all other electronic communications exchanged between multiple members of a governing body related to a public business are generally prohibited.

Can the board take a secret ballot vote?

At meetings, all votes must be public. Secret ballots are not permitted.

What is an executive session?

Multiple members of a governing body can go into a closed gathering with the city/town attorney when:

The discussion concerns a pending lawsuit; The governing body is a named party; and The members of the governing body provide facts about the lawsuit to the city/town attorney and the city/town attorney provides the members legal advice based upon the facts presented.

However, the governing body must deliberate towards and/or make decisions related to the subject of the executive session in an adequately noticed public meeting.

What is the Media’s Role in Opening Meetings?

The Media serves as the watchdogs. It has become increasingly imperative that the media serves as the watchdogs of government. An independent news media uses its watchdog role to investigate and report on government overreach and wrongdoing and hold those in power accountable for their actions.

In this way, watchdog journalism protects democracy on a day-to-day basis, calling out bad behavior when it happens. And by informing citizens, it also helps to protect the integrity of elections and the health of democracy in the long term. The very presence of watchdog journalism is also a sign of a healthy democracy. When journalists are free to scrutinize politicians and businesses, and free to publish their findings without influence or fear of reprisal, that means the country has a strong and independent media. And it’s no coincidence that authoritarian-minded leaders make investigative journalism a top target once in power.

The key to watchdog work, shining a light on government and holding public officials accountable. Preventative measures to keep the watchdogs at bay comes down to a single word, transparency.

executive session with the city/town attorney. Multiple members of a governing body can go into a closed gathering with the city/town attorney when: the discussion concerns a pending lawsuit; the governing body is a named party; and the members of the governing body provide facts about the lawsuit to the city/town attorney and the city/town attorney provides the members legal advice based upon the facts presented."

So the question remains of the legitimacy of the executive session and a possible violation of the Sunshine Law or Tennessee Open Meetings Act. A board or governing body can not meet in a closed-door/secret meeting because they fear the threat of public input or recourse.

In business conducted before the press, Board Chairman Carl Byars stated/read Ordinance No. 531. The ordinance reads, "For areas outside the city limits, individual applicants for a residential or business grind pump connection, the minimum fee for one grinder pump connection shall be \$3,500. Should the actual cost to the town for said connection exceed the minimum charge, there shall be added to this minimum fee a sum representing the ac-

tual cost of labor and materials in excess of \$3,500."

Attached to the agenda were the parts and fees listed for grinder pumps. It was advised to provide some paperwork regarding warranties to the customers purchasing the pumps.

The sewer rate was discussed for individuals outside the city limits. The current rate is approximately \$61 a month. The purpose of the discussion came from residents near or around Lake Halford. Huntingdon provides the sewer utility and the water utilities are based out of Cedar Grove.

Councilperson Kelly Eubanks requested clarification from the previous council meeting on the 3% water rate increase. Eubanks asked if the rate increase was a mandate from the Tennessee Comptroller's Office. Mayor Smothers replied it was a "hard recommendation." The reason for the recommendation is a preventative measure from having the Comptroller set an extremely high water rate in the future as a way to stop revenue losses.

Discussion was had on the pre-treatment audit. In the audit, it was stated that at the request of Granges, there was a need for revisions.

Ammonia levels in the water were also noted as being "high" but the issue was resolved with aeration to the lines.

Tim Strnad took part in a Lead Copper Rule We-

binar. Strnad stated the Town of Huntingdon did not need to worry as there were no lead lines that fed into galvanized lines. He was also recognized by Mayor Nina Smothers for receiving multifaceted Wastewater certifications.

Mayor Smothers made a statement on the State Water Infrastructure Grants (SWIG), "We are currently in the process of finalizing the Agency-Managed Projects Fiscal Year 2023 grant opportunity. We expect the AMP grant will be open for solicitation during the summer. Once the solicitation is open, it will remain open for approximately 30 days before it is closed. After the solicitation period, SWIG will take 60-90 days to review the applications before announcing awards. Once awards have been announced, there is approximately a 60-90 day period to finalize and execute contracts. Once the contracts are executed, the grantee can start their AMP project.

"I apologize for not being able to provide you with definitive dates. The SWIG team is working to finalize the grant along with the expected timeline. We expect to release information regarding specific dates in the future."

New hires were noted. Mike Lowe is joining the Water Department on a three-day basis. Austin Prater is joining the department and has experience with other municipal utility districts.

At the request of 24th Judicial District Attorney General Neil Thompson, TBI agents joined the investigation into the device, which had been discovered Wednesday morning when deputies responded to a 911 call from Robby Basham (DOB 9/1/1970),

stating he was suffering from a drug overdose. After first responders transported Basham for medical treatment, deputies found a PVC pipe with black wires taped to it on the home's front porch.

Agents soon notified explosive teams from the Jackson Police Department and Tennessee Highway Patrol, who ensured the safety of the scene and rendered the device safe. Authorities later determined

it contained Tannerite and multiple nails and, after securing a search warrant for the home, found more components to make similar devices.

This afternoon, agents arrested and charged Basham with one count of Prohibited Weapons - Explosive Device. At the time of this release, he remained in the custody of the Henry County Sheriff's Office on \$1 million bond.

Huntingdon Police Reports

DUI; 1st Offense — Robert Lyles, 37, was arrested on June 1 for driving under the influence and violation of implied consent law. On June 1, a 911 call came in about a vehicle swerving multiple times and almost hitting oncoming traffic. After Officer Townes located the vehicle matching the description and witnessed it cross the center line multiple times and initiated a traffic stop. After speaking to the defendant operating the vehicle, Townes noticed a bottle of orange juice in the center console along with a plastic cup with orange juice and ice that looked diluted. The driver exited the vehicle and did poorly on the standard field sobriety tests. There was a half-gallon bottle of Gordon's vodka found in the passenger floorboard of the vehicle and the plastic cup smelled like alcohol.

Harassment — Clemens F. Bornreger, 24, was issued a citation and given 10 days to book himself into jail on May 29. Officer Roberts responded to a home on Tower Road, Huntingdon

in regard to a dog barking and the owner of the dogs, Clemens, shouting threatening statements towards neighbors. The dogs were clearly barking and the defendant was shouting at the neighbors when officer Roberts arrived on scene. After speaking with the victims and watching the recording of the defendant's harassing behaviors it was decided to charge Clemens with harassment.

Burglary — Eddie Reyes, 52, was transported to Carroll County Jail for booking on June 2 for theft of property from Walmart. On June 1, Walmart security contacted the police department. Officer Brad Allen reported there and spoke with store security, and they said on April 28, Eddie Reyes came into the store and took a spray can of deodorant without paying. Then he came back on May 27, and once again took a spray deodorant. On May 25, Reyes signed a ban notice in Paris Walmart stating he would not come on any Walmart property. Reyes was then issued warrants for theft of

Officer Townes located the vehicle and initiated a traffic stop. Once the vehicle stopped, the defendant was ordered to step out of the car and an odor of marijuana came from the vehicle. In the vehicle, in Hick's purse, was a cigarillo package with five different colored pressed pills with a Bitcoin image on it. The pills tested positive for methamphetamine with an additional substance of fentanyl. Hicks was transported to Carroll County Jail.

Late Night Crash Leaves 1 Dead, 7 Injured

8 Air Ambulances, Multiple Agencies Assisted

CLARKSBURG (June 3, 2024) — One person is dead and seven are injured after a two-vehicle crash late Monday evening that required multiple aircraft and emergency personnel on scene to assist.

Hayden Blankenship, 26, was traveling on Clarksburg Road around 11 p.m. on Monday when his 2013 Dodge Ram 3500 struck a 2006 Chevy Express Van with 10 total occupants driven by Antonio Guerrero, 49.

In Antonio Guerrero's vehicle: Angel Flores, 51, is deceased; Cirilo Guerrero, 55, was not injured; Cesar Garcia, 34, was not injured; Miguel Angel, 39, was injured; Danery Martinez, 24, was injured; Juan Guadalupe, 56, was injured; Antonio Enciso, 42, was injured; Iran Hurta, 30, was injured; Alfredo Campos, 35, was injured; and the driver, A. Guerrero, was also injured.

Blankenship was not injured. Emergency personnel

from Carroll County Sheriff's Office deputies and dispatch, Clarksburg Fire Department, Westport Fire Department, Carroll County Rescue Squad, Carroll County Fire District 1 Huntingdon, Priority Ambulance, Air Evac-Henry County, and Tennessee Highway Patrol worked into the early hours of Tuesday morning securing transport of seven injured occupants and one deceased.

Air Evac - Henry County and Vanderbilt Life-Flight assisted with a total of eight air ambulances; Priority Ambulance provided ground assistance with three ambulances.

According to the preliminary report from Tennessee Highway Patrol (THP), undisclosed charges are pending for A. Guerrero.

According to eyewitness reports, occupants of the van operated by A. Guerrero were working at the nearby poultry farm in the 1900 block of Clarksburg Road.

More information will be provided at a later date if or when available.

Dear McKenzie City Council Members:

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a letter from the co-owners of Tri-County Publishing, Inc. dba The McKenzie Banner, Jason and Brittany Martin, that will be delivered to members of McKenzie City Council prior to the meeting and read during the meeting. This is also meant to serve as an additional attempt to contact the city council prior to the meeting on Thursday, June 13.

We understand that it is difficult to weigh all the information during the meeting time and then make an informed decision. We humbly ask that you review the information provided and please vote no on Ordinance 569.

Dear McKenzie City Council Members:

I am writing to you regarding the upcoming second reading of Ordinance 569 to convert Broadway Street to a one-way street.

It has recently come to our attention that some of you may be under the impression that you have to vote yes because you will be "voting against the law" if you vote no.

First of all, let me assure you, you are not required to vote yes. You are not breaking any laws. You didn't create this issue.

Mayor Ryan Griffin decided to change the street without any requests, investigation, surveys, public input, prior notice, an ordinance, or anything else.

When it was recommended at the May meeting to table it until June to give the public a period for public input, the council, ignoring the advice of the city attorney, pushed forward; then, the mayor placed the tie-breaking vote.

The change affects more than just the businesses on Broadway Street. It affects Banner Row.

If it did not affect Banner Row, why does the lone sign indicating the change of travel face Banner Row? There are/were no other supporting signs.

Jason and I address this plea to the city council while metaphorically wearing two hats: 1. As advocates for all the citizens that do not want Broadway to be a one-way street and 2. As downtown business owners affected by the change.

The McKenzie Banner has been in the same location on Banner Row for over 100 years. Banner Row is a one-way street that dead ends into Broadway; so everyone on Banner Row is affected by the change on Broadway.

My family has been involved with the newspaper at that location since 1948, 76 years; and owned the business for three generations, since 1968, 56 years.

Williams Furniture, Maytag (now Hudgins Appliances), and Carroll Insurance have operated their businesses downtown for decades.

Yet, none of these businesses were consulted prior to the change.

The lone business owner on Banner Row (The McKenzie Banner) is asking you to please vote No on Ordinance 569 and keep Broadway Street two-way.

So far, 76 people, mostly residents of McKenzie, have signed the petition to keep Broadway Street two-way. Countless others have called The Banner or stopped us on the street to say they are against Broadway being one-way and in no uncertain terms have expressed their disgust.

One person said, "thank you for having the courage to do this. Everyone I've talked to is upset about the change, but they don't have the courage to address the council."

As you may be aware, for every person that has the courage to speak up there are many others, that were affected, but remained silent.

The newspaper's role is to be the watchdog, to amplify the voices of the people, and be an advocate for the citizens when their elected officials fail to act in their best interests.

We were happy to continue operating our newspaper and print shop in the location we've held for the last 100 years; and the thing to note about The Banner (and myself) is that if you follow the rules, you won't hear from us.

But when your actions suggest a disregard for sunshine laws, the public's safety, a violation of the oath you took to serve the public, and a blatant disregard of the public's wishes, then we take notice.

Then, we have to start thinking about what we're going to do next now that this has happened.

So this is us fulfilling our duty to the citizens.

We talked to the owner of Dem

Cookiez, and she said every one of her customers has complained about the changes.

In the almost two months since the change, we have only heard three reasons for the change: 1. It was changed for safety. 2. The road is too narrow. 3. The furniture trucks are sticking out.

Regarding the claim that this was done for safety, as Joel Washburn said, it is a solution to a non-existent problem. There was no safety issue with Broadway as a two-way street, the safety issue was created by changing Broadway to one-way.

Regarding the claim that the street is too narrow, Broadway is still wide enough for three lanes of traffic. I say three lanes because occasionally, since the sidewalks have been in place, there have been trucks parked in the middle of the street and vehicles were still able to travel on both sides of the truck.

Regarding the furniture truck sticking out into Broadway, the truck mentioned is pointed straight out, if the truck was aligned with the parking stripes it would not be an issue; also, a movable vehicle does not constitute a long-term roadway issue. The vehicle can/will be moved, but changing the road to a one-way street will make the roadway an issue forever.

During the last meeting, the mayor said that the intersection of Cedar and Broadway Streets is difficult to navigate because of sight lines; then added that it was a safety issue because someone had already run over the new concrete islands; but the incident mentioned happened at the opposite end of Broadway, near Lee Street, the new proposed route for all Broadway traffic.

I submit that there are many streets in town that have difficult sight lines. At the intersection of Lee and Main Streets it is difficult to see around the former WHDM building.

At the intersection of Cedar and Main Streets (at the traffic light), it is impossible to see around the Park Theatre when turning right onto Main (traveling toward the railroad crossing).

Since the parking lines on Broadway were sanded down and re-striped in the opposite direction, the parking now protrudes into Banner Row. When trucks park in the spaces closest to Banner Row, motorists on Banner Row cannot see around the vehicles.

However, I agree with the city's attorney, Beau Pemberton, it is up to the motorist to exercise due care when operating a vehicle.

It is not the sole duty of the council to try to legislate every move motorists make in McKenzie, there are many other matters that require your attention. Although, if the council wishes to focus on street issues, several citizens have mentioned that the streets need to be repaved not just re-patched.

Joel Washburn made an interesting point when he contacted Councilman Bobby Young last week, Broadway Street and The McKenzie Banner building are both located in the historic district of McKenzie.

If he, as the owner of the building, wants to make any changes to his property, he has to request permission to do so and have the plans approved by the historic preservation committee and the planning commission.

Yet, this street, that has historically only ever been two-way, was changed without consulting either of those bodies.

Many times throughout the year, access to my business is blocked for festivals and events downtown. We lose revenue on those days, but to my knowledge we have never publicly mentioned it.

The Banner has accepted those temporary inconveniences in good faith, knowing they were only temporary and not meant to permanently impede our ability to do business.

However, changing Broadway Street to one-way has so far shown to be a permanent hindrance on the flow of commerce and I believe it will impede the success of downtown businesses.

According to the Federal Highway Administration and MTAS, one-way streets cause more travel times and confusion.

When tourists visit downtown they won't remember exact details, but they will remember the feeling.

So if the feeling was frustration and confusion, that will leave a lasting mark on any hopes of tourism or population growth.

Unfortunately, the proposed route directs all Broadway traffic to drive past some of the worst kept buildings in town.

Lee Street is frequently blocked because it is used as a loading zone for McKenzie Station, Williams Furniture, TCP Print Shop/The McKenzie Banner, as well as Bethel Renaissance.

The Waldren Street STP Lighting project, which was finalized during Mayor Jill Holland's tenure, invested in updating sidewalks, ADA compliance and the beautification of Waldren and Broadway Streets.

So, you've put all this money into beautifying Broadway only to undo the intended impression when you reroute all Broadway traffic onto Lee Street.

Hand in hand with tourism is industry. Industrial leaders visit a city before deciding whether to invest millions in the community and oftentimes many cities are competing for the industry. Quality of life is a factor in their decision-making.

I believe that business owners will ultimately choose to invest in a city that follows the law and conducts the city's business in the sunshine. (See Sunshine laws on page 2 of the June 11 edition of The McKenzie Banner).

I am concerned that this decision has exposed the city to liability and future litigation. I can appreciate admitting one's mistakes, it is a necessary step on the path to personal growth; but saying I'm sorry will not undo the years of damage and financial ruin inflicted on the owners of the small businesses downtown if you continue on the current path.

At the last meeting, legal counsel advised to table it and seek public opinion, but the council surmised that one day of prior notice was sufficient for the public to get their newspaper in the mail, read it right then, see the agenda, make an informed decision about the matter, gather their courage and request to speak at the meeting before close of business that same day.

I say one day because the agenda was submitted for publication on Monday, the newspaper published on Tuesday, it was received in the local mail on Wednesday and interested parties had to contact the city on Wednesday (that same day) in order to speak at the meeting the next day, Thursday, May 9.

So, less than one day of notice. In addition to that, on Wednesday, May 8 Carroll County was under a tornado watch for most of the day as severe weather moved through. So residents' thoughts were understandably elsewhere that day.

What about the residents that live outside the 382 zip code area, but own a business or property in McKenzie?

Their newspaper goes to Memphis first, so they received no notice.

I say all this to suggest that an agenda published in the meeting week's newspaper is not adequate public notice. It is arguably a violation of the sunshine law.

Voting yes on this ordinance will surely be a stain on the McKenzie council's reputation.

The city is dangerously close to the edge of an open meetings act violation, based on multiple issues, not just the ones mentioned here.

Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis said, "Sunlight is said to be the best of disinfectants." This simply means that transparency provides for good governance.

The Banner strongly urges the city of McKenzie's board of mayor and council to familiarize yourselves with the sunshine laws.

Please, in the future, be more welcoming of input from the citizens you serve.

History has shown, if you ignore the voice of the people, the people will make their voices heard either at the ballot box or through the court of law.

Without small businesses like The Banner and others, the downtown would just be an endless expanse of vacant buildings.

If you change this street to one-way, it will dissuade potential businesses from locating downtown, it will repel industries from choosing McKenzie, and it will contribute to the shuttering of existing downtown businesses.

I ask you to thoughtfully consider the information I have provided today and please vote No on Ordinance 569.

Keep Broadway Street two-way. Thank you.

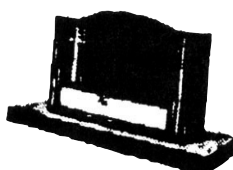

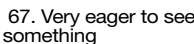

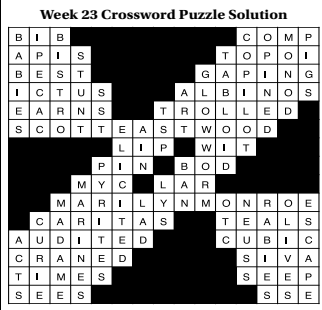
