Lodge at Paris Landing State Park Opening Fall 2021

BUCHANAN — The Lodge at Paris Landing State Park is estimated to open this fall, according to park officials. The 90-room lodge will provide hotel resort-style vacation rentals on Kentucky Lake near Land Between the Lakes. Features of the lodge include a modern room design, conference space, a full-service restaurant, a bar and a lounge overlooking Kentucky Lake.

Paris Landing State

Park stands on the western shore of the Tennessee River and is the perfect location for water sports such as boating, swimming, fishing and water-skiing. On-land activities in the park include hiking, golfing and enjoying nature and wildlife.

The lodge is accepting applications for conferences, weddings and meetings in 2022. For an event request form, visit tnstateparks.com/lodges/

The construction of the Lodge at Paris Landing State Park follows the 2017 decision to demolish the Paris Landing Inn and rebuild it. Demolition of the inn began in fall 2018, and construction of the lodge was planned to end in the summer of 2020. Construction halted due to COVID-19 restrictions and complications, pushing the opening date to fall of 2021.



McKenzie, Huntingdon Fireworks Ordinances

The City of McKenzie amended its ordinance regulating the shooting of fireworks. In recent years, the city received many complaints about noise and late-night shooting of fireworks. The ordinance, approved in November 2020, addressed some of the complaints. At one time, the city prohibited the shooting of fireworks after a teenager's eye was damaged and he lost sight in that eye.

The new amendments to the fireworks ordinance in-

dicates fireworks may only be sold on a seasonal basis from June 26 through July 5 and December 30 through January 1. The fireworks may be fired from June 26 through July 5 and from December 31 through January 1. The fireworks can be shot until 10 p.m., except for December 31 when they are allowed until 1 a.m. the following morning. Those found in violation of the ordinance are to be cited in city court.

In Huntingdon, the city allows for the public

sale and use of fireworks during the periods of June 20 to July 5 and December 10 to January 2. Fireworks shall not be exploded or ignited within six hundred feet of any business or storage area, church, hospital, school, asylum. Fireworks are restricted for use between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. during the permitted calendar period. No one shall throw any fireworks from any motor vehicle.

McKenzie Police Reports

DUI — Susan C. Coplin, 56, Walnut Circle, McKenzie, was charged with driving under the influence and violation of implied consent on June 14 after she disregarded a stop sign at Walnut and Main.

Officer Ryan White witnessed the failure to stop and clocked the vehicle at 51 in a 30 mile-per-hour zone. The vehicle stopped on Highland Drive. The report indicates Coplin did poorly on field sobriety tests. She was arrested for

DUI and refused to submit to a blood-alcohol test. She was charged for speeding and failure to yield, violation of implied consent and DUI.

Domestic Assault — Melissa K. Robinson, 42, Cherry Avenue, McKenzie, was charged with domestic assault on June 16 after she reportedly threw her boyfriend to the ground.

Officer Trey Boucher took the report. The boyfriend said Robinson grabbed the back of his

shirt. The victim had scratches and his shirt was stretched.

Violation of Order of Protection — Ricky J. Lott, 38, Main Street, McKenzie was charged with violation of order of protection on June 17 after an incident on Main Street at around 8:30 p.m.

The victim stated she was in the car speaking to another man when Lott pulled up to the car, while he was riding his lawnmower and started cursing her. Officer Trey Boucher located Mr. Lott at around 2 a.m. and arrested him.

Shoplifting — Amber Barton, 37, of Humboldt was charged with shoplifting after an incident at Merchants Outlet Mall on June 10. According to the report filed by Officer Jeremiah Brooks, store employees noticed Barton wearing leggings while she was at the cash register. She did not have the leggings when she entered the store.

West Carroll High School Announces Boys' Head Basketball Coach

Coach Ryan Mansfield, a 2013 graduate from West Carroll High School, was announced June 14 as the West Carroll War Eagles' high school boys' basketball head coach for the 2021-2022 season.

While in college, Mansfield played basketball at Bethel University. He also worked as a student assistant coach for two years, helping with individual workouts and player development. His first year as a student assistant coach, the team made it to the Conference Championship and were runners-up. His second year, the Wildcats lost in the quarterfinals of the Conference tournament but got a bid to the NAIA as a five-seed. The team upset the four-seed in the first round and lost to the number-one ranked LSU Alexandria in the second round, losing by four points.

After graduating from Bethel University in 2019, Mansfield began his career at Decatur County Middle School, coaching junior high basketball and teaching eighth-grade so-

cial studies. In 2020, he returned to West Carroll as a physical education teacher and a junior high basketball head coach. He was also a high school assistant basketball coach, and he helped the War Eagles win a district title, a regional title, win substate, and go to the first round at state.

On accepting the head coach position, Coach Mansfield said, "I am looking

forward to coaching these returning players and the upcoming youth. I plan on us doing great things as a team. It will be a long season; I hope to keep the players healthy, focused, and keep them growing as teammates and individuals throughout this season on the court and in their academics...These young men are amazing individuals, and better teammates to one another. I could not ask for a better group of young men."

His goal as a head coach is to build young athletes into great people by building character, work ethic, morals, team basketball, and faith.

Ryan Mansfield is from McMoresville, Tenn., and lives in Sharon with his fiancée, Kristin Bates. Kristin is a seventh- and eighth-grade math teacher at Dyer Middle School. The couple share three dogs and are getting married in December. The two are looking to move back to the West Carroll community after they are married.

911 Board Approves 2021-22 Budget

HUNTINGDON (June 15) — The Carroll County Emergency Communications District (911) Board approved its 2021-22 fiscal year budget in a short meeting on June 15.

There were few budgetary changes for the new year. Director Kristy Meggs said she much of the major expenses for a Computer Assisted Dispatch and recorders were

expensed in the past two years and did not expect the major expenses in the new fiscal year beginning July 1.

The district purchased real estate for an anticipated new headquarters. Those purchase was made for land adjacent to the current A-frame office on Dilahunty Lane, Huntingdon. Presently, construction is not being considered be-

cause of the high cost of construction material.

John Wright CPA presented a financial statement indicating the district is in good financial condition. For the 11 months of FY21, the district has revenues over expenses of \$243,808 and \$1,772,469 in current assets on its balance sheet along with \$2,758 in current liabilities.

Huntingdon Approves Budget, Tax Rate

Water Rates To Increase

HUNTINGDON (June 15) — The Town of Huntingdon's Mayor and Council approved the first of two readings of the 2021-22 fiscal year budget and tax rate during a called meeting on Tuesday, June 15. Additionally, the Council approved year-end amendments to the 2020-21 FY budget and increased water rates by 3.6 percent in line with the consumer price index.

The budget is funded with a \$1.2487 per \$100 assessed value tax rate, the same as last year. It includes the purchase of a pumper truck for the Fire Department, two tandem axle dump trucks for Public Works through capital outlay notes and four vehicles for various departments. City employees will

receive a 30 cents per hour raise on July 1 plus continuance of their insurance premiums, a health savings account, and life insurance for the city employees.

Mayor Dale Kelley said the budget continues its financial commitment to the Huntingdon Industrial Development Board and the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce. The budget indicates \$61,500 for economic development activities and a \$273,000 transfer from the General Fund to the Dixie Carter Performing Arts Center Special Project.

Kelley said, "By working together over the past 29 years, we have accomplished many upgrades for our town, including street and sidewalk improvements, additional park facilities and renovation of existing parks, water and sewer extensions and upgrades, improvement to the downtown and business districts, lower the ISO rating (for fire protection) reducing the cost of property insurance within the city

limits and continuing to provide excellent police and fire protection for our hometown."

The Council also amended its 2020-21 budget to include an increase in local taxes of approximately \$91,000 in local tax collections exceeding the original budget, \$166,500 in state grants exceeding the original estimate, and expenses of \$323,000 in economic development activities transferred to the Carroll County Watershed Authority, and \$84,550 in extra expense for the 2016 Safe Routes to School Grant, a project that bore more expense in the fiscal year because the project's final expenses were placed in this fiscal year and completed ahead of schedule. A request will be made to Tennessee Department of Transportation for funding on the project. The Water and Sewer Department also had an improved financial outcome of \$193,000 ending with \$663,200 revenues over expenses as compared to \$469,700 estimated.

State Penitentiary when they discovered Watson had gone missing while on farm work detail as a trusty.

Watson was captured in Henning, Tenn., after remaining at large for five days with 300-400 law enforcement personnel searching for him. Harvey and Ann Taylor of Henning spotted the escapee going through their outside refrigerator and called

911. Officers throughout the Henning area teamed up to find Watson shortly thereafter. Six officers and two tracking canines from the Henry County Sheriff's Office assisted the search. Atwood resident Natt Moore, a special agent with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation had Watson in custody, assisted by his partner, TBI agent Joe Hudgins, also from Carroll County.

On Monday, Curtis Watson pleaded guilty on counts of especially aggravated burglary, aggravated rape, felony escape, theft

over \$10,000, burglary, theft under 1,000, aggravated criminal trespassing and felony murder in perpetration of rape.

Debra Johnson's family called Monday's sentencing bittersweet, but they were glad that the chapter had closed. They said steps will be taken to better protect female correction employees.

The Tennessee Prison for Women is named in memory of Debra Johnson and in honor of her 38-year career. It is now the Debra K. Johnson Rehabilitation Center for Women.

James C. Harding (born June 27, 1934) is a retired United States Air Force colonel and pilot. He served two tours, during the Vietnam War and flew a total 596 missions, all in propeller aircraft.

He served as squadron commander for a 400-person unit at Lackland Air Force Base and as an A-1 Skyraider combat squadron commander. Harding is one of the top 25 most decorated American veterans. Harding was born on June 27, 1934 in Brookville, Pennsylvania, one of five children into a dairy farming family.

He attended Pennsylvania State University studying for a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture. While at university he played lineman for the Penn State Nittany Lions football team. He turned down an offer to play for the Los Angeles Rams, as well as an opportunity to work International Harvester. On graduation he was commissioned, on June 9, 1956, through the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps program which he passed with distinction, according to Wikipedia.

Harding served as an instructor pilot and aerial demonstration pilot at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, until September 1962. He flew with the 558th Tactical Fighter Squadron at MacDill Air Force Base, from September 1962 to July 1963, and then transferred to the 313th Air Division at Kadena Air Base in Okinawa.

Harding flew 442 combat missions in the Cessna O-1 Bird Dog and U-10, of which 101 missions were over North Vietnam.[2] He served as an Instructor with Squadron Officer School at Maxwell Air Force Base from 1967 to 1971, when he began training at Air Command and Staff College.[1]

Harding returned to the U.S. in July 1967 and served as an Instructor with Squadron Officer School at Maxwell Air Force Base, until January 1971. Harding attended Air Command and Staff College from January to November 1971, and then returned to combat in Southeast Asia as the Commander of the 1st Special Operations Squadron at Nakhon Phanom Royal Thai Air Force Base in Thailand, where he flew another 154 combat missions in Douglas A-1 Skyraider.

1972 Mission To Rescue Major Clyde D. Smith

A-1E Skyraider of 1st SOS

In 1972, he was engaged in the rescue of U.S. Marine Corps A-6 Intruder pilot Major Clyde D. Smith and bombardier/navigator, 1st Lt. Scott D. Ketchie, who were shot down over North Vietnam.[3] 1st Lt. Ketchie was not rescued and was subsequently declared Missing in action. For his effort in leading the rescue mission, Hard-

ing was awarded the Air Force Cross.[2] The rescue effort is depicted in History Channel.[4]

Shoot-down and Evasion

He was shot down in Vietnam in 1972 northeast of Qui Nhon and just south of the DMZ — an area overrun by the North Vietnamese Army. He successfully evaded capture by the North Vietnamese and was rescued by U.S. Army helicopters.

Post War

After Vietnam, Harding then served with the 23rd Tactical Fighter Wing at England Air Force Base, from November 1972 to November 1973, followed by service at Randolph Air Force Base, where he served until June 1976.

The resolution approved by the General Assembly will be presented to Colonel Harding by State Representative Curtis Halford. It reads,

WHEREAS, our nation was conceived by individuals who were willing to sacrifice their personal safety and concerns to ensure our individual and collective freedom, and the Volunteer State is especially proud to be the home of so many valiant men and women who have performed above and beyond the call of duty; and WHEREAS, while the heroic deeds of Tennesseans have been extolled throughout the history of our State and nation, the distinguished military service of every proud Tennessean should be illuminated, shared, and properly honored; and WHEREAS, one such individual is Colonel James C. Harding, a gallant veteran of the United States Air Force, who now resides in Huntingdon after a highly distinguished military career; and WHEREAS, a distinguished graduate of the Penn State University Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC), Colonel James Harding enjoyed an extensive military career that saw him complete a variety of flying assignments and serve in various command positions; and WHEREAS, Colonel Harding served as squadron commander for a 400-person unit at

Lackland Air Force Base and as an A-1 combat squadron commander at Nakhon Phanom,

Thailand, in Southeast Asia; and WHEREAS, a veteran of the Vietnam War, Colonel James Harding flew 596 total combat missions, 139 of which were over North Vietnam; as a command pilot, he has nearly

5,000 hours of military single-engine flying time and has attained master parachutist rating with sixty-nine total jumps.

WHEREAS, during his service in Vietnam, Colonel Harding was shot down by a SA-7 Surface-to-Air Missile (SAM) while directing a rescue mission in 1972; he was rescued by United States Army helicopters after evading North Vietnamese troops and directed the rescue of his wingman who had also been shot down; and WHEREAS, upon retiring from active duty, he entered general aviation in Texas and later was instrumental in the organization and implementation of the Air Force Junior ROTC program in the continental United States

and the Department of Defense schools overseas; he has also served as an advisor to the Royal Saudi Air Force; and WHEREAS, in 1998, Colonel James Harding retired from the Air Force Junior ROTC and became a tree farmer in Texas; he later moved his tree farming operation to Tennessee, where he has also served as a substitute teacher in Carroll County; and WHEREAS, a member of twenty national service organizations, Colonel Harding holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Penn State University and a master's degree from Auburn University and is a graduate of Squadron Officer School, the Air Command and Staff College, the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, and the Air War College; and

WHEREAS, the twenty-fifth-most decorated hero in U.S. military history, Colonel Harding was awarded a number of medals, ribbons, and commendations for his service to our country, including the Air Force Cross, the Silver Star with two Oak Leaf clusters, the Legion of Merit with one Oak Leaf cluster, the Distinguished Flying Cross with eight Oak Leaf clusters, the Bronze Star with Combat V and one Oak Leaf cluster, the Purple Heart with three Oak Leaf clusters, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Air Medal with thirty-nine Oak Leaf clusters, the Air Force Commendation Medal with one Oak Leaf cluster, the Presidential Unit Citation with four Oak Leaf clusters, the USAF Outstanding Unit Award with Combat V and four Oak Leaf clusters, the Combat Readiness Medal with two Oak Leaf clusters, the National Defense Service Medal, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal with eight Bronze Service Stars, the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star, the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Palm, the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal, and the Royal Thai Supreme Command Forward Badge 1st Class; and

WHEREAS, an honorary captain for the Penn State Veteran Appreciation Game, he has received the Tennessee Baptist Ambassador for Christ Eagle Award and been inducted into the Pennsylvania Veterans Hall of Valor and the Brookville Area High School Hall of Fame; and

WHEREAS, while no offering can properly relay our gratitude for his bravery and dedication to preserving the blessed freedom that is inseparable from our American heritage and ideals, it is most appropriate that we should honor Colonel Harding to the full extent of our ability, as he has made untold and innumerable sacrifices to preserve the liberties we enjoy today; now, therefore,

Dwayne Pearson

World War II POW

Born in 1923, Homer Dwayne Pearson grew up during the Great Depression. When he was old enough (around 17 years old), he enlisted with the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). He left the Terry Community of Carroll County and was shipped out west to work in the state parks and forests of Oregon and Washington.

Working in the rigid structure of the CCC prepared young Pearson for his next adventure. With the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, Pearson like many others his age enlisted in the U.S. Army. He returned to Tennessee and was sent to Camp Croft, South Carolina. From there, he was assigned to the 34th Infantry Division (The Red Bulls).

After completion of training, Pearson along with 12,000 other troops were en route to North Africa. As

their transport ship reached the harbor at Casablanca, a portion of the German Air Force (Luftwaffe) attacked the ship as the troops disembarked. The Red Bulls made their way across Western Sahara to join forces with the British 8th Army.

Trekking through the heat and unforgiving terrain, the joint expedition was tasked with engaging Erwin Rommel's Afrika Korps. From November 1942 through the spring of the following year, the Red Bulls and the British 8th Army fought from the Kasserine Pass to Tunisia. The Allies suffered numerous casualties at the hands of the German Panzer units but were able to record their mission a success after taking 130,000 Germans as prisoners.

From North Africa, Pearson and the 34th Infantry took part in the invasion of Italy, landing at Salerno Beach in September 1943. It was at Cassino, where Pearson was

wounded for the first time. He was shot in the chest while trying to take the Benedictine Monastery. The bullet struck a rib and exited through his back, missing all his internal organs. In twenty-four days he was back on the front line.

From Cassino, the Red Bulls made their way to Anzio, 40 miles south of Rome. The German's artillery shelled the Allies every day. Pearson along with the others in the division dug in along the front lines.

From an interview in 1999, Pearson recalled taking refuge near an abandoned ranch, which provided their troops their evening meal. Every evening after dark, each platoon would send a squad for water, ammunition, rations and a box of steak sandwiches.

"The most guarded guy in the Army was the guy carrying the steak sandwiches. I know, because I was him one night. That was the funniest thing I can remember about Anzio Beach; the rest of it was bad."

Pearson and his squad of machine gunners along with two rifle squads were ordered to go on patrol. The day after Thanksgiving 1944, they rested at an abandoned house, the American troops awoke to a blizzard and a German attack.

The Allies were holding off the German's until a panzer knocked down much of the house. Retreating to the basement, the lieutenant was

killed by a grenade. Pearson, firing his weapon as he ran from the basement, was knocked unconscious by a German rifleman. Of the 22 men who entered the house, Pearson and one other survived the attack.

Now a prisoner of war, he was forced to endure the abuse of his captures. The guards took everything from him except his wallet and Bible. A German major questioned Pearson. When the officer realized the questioning was fruitless, he began slapping him in the face with his leather gloves.

He was moved to an airfield in Mantova, Italy. During his three-week stay at Mantova, he was placed on work detail until one day he decided to knock a guard in the head with a lead pipe and escape. Pearson and a British paratrooper hid in the hills. They avoided capture for 24 hours.

When they were caught, they were taken to an old dungeon and were beaten. Hungry and weak from the beating, with broken ribs and teeth they along with 40 other troops were loaded onto a boxcar and shipped to Stalag VII-A in Moosburg, Germany (the largest prisoner-of-war camp in Nazi Germany during World War II). The American POWs fared better than the Russians in the camp.

A German sergeant asked one day who knew how to milk cows, Pearson's hand

shot up into the air. The chance to volunteer turned out to be a great decision as he was sent to work on a farm on the German — Czech border. He lived with the old farmer and his family; he was allowed to eat with the family.

After German troops left an anti-tank gun in the farmer's pasture, Pearson and the old farmer drug the gun into the creek fearing a bombardment from American forces. The following day, General George Patton's 3rd Army came through with their Sherman Tanks. Pearson was in essence liberated.

He was sent to Paris, France where he received clothing, cigarettes and back pay. He then awaited his return stateside. Pearson received a 60-day furlough and as a POW he was not allowed to return to combat. His last nine months were spent serving as an MP in Washington, D.C. before being discharged.

From the nation's capital, he moved to Michigan and began working for General Motors and as a part-time police officer. While at GM, he met and married Evelyn.

After retiring in 1976, they moved to Carroll County. Pearson joined the Carroll County Sheriff's Department as deputy.

Pearson was often reluctant to tell his war stories. Some of his memories were hard to relive, "There's two things you never forget in combat. Laying in a foxhole

under artillery shelling; everybody's praying to the Lord. And the other thing, when you stick a bayonet in a German soldier; look at his eyes when you pull it out. You never forget that feeling either. You feel like a murderer; really, only you have to do it. No one can ever know what combat is like unless they live through it, and you have to live it to survive.

"I saw things over there the Nazis did that you wouldn't even believe unless you'd seen it. It was evil. They killed people indiscriminately, mowed them down for nothing."

Dwayne Pearson died September 19, 2006, and was buried at Obion Chapel Church Cemetery in Cedar Grove, Tennessee with full military honors. His widow, Evelyn, died on May 1, 2020.

Summers were the best. Now, we understood the importance of school from an early age. All of us. Even Buddy Wiggleton admitted it was a "necessary evil."

Chamber of Commerce Announces ‘Adopt-a-Shad’

Following the Carroll County Watershed Authority's May 25 unanimous decision for the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce to help manage the fish population in the Thousand-Acre Recreational Lake and raise funds to stock 20,000 threadfin shad into the lake, the Chamber announced the “Adopt-a-Shad” initiative.

A noted fish care expert described the Thousand-Acre Recreational Lake as what biologists call “bass crowd,” meaning there are too many predators for the amount of prey. The bass in the lake find enough food to survive but have stunted growth. The lake is a little bass factory, pumping out more and more each year. The lake has a lack of harvest by anglers and insufficient forage to feed the population of bass.

Adopt-a-Shad is the Chamber's plan to bring more prey into the lake. A \$1 donation to the Chamber Fish Care fund will provide five threadfin shad, relatively small fish that are a favorite food for many

game fish, as feed to bass at the Carroll County Thousand-Acre Recreational Lake.

The Chamber will purchase in quantities of 10,000 fish. The cost is approximately \$2,050 for every 10,000 shad purchased. To adopt a shad, make checks payable to the Chamber Fish Care account. You can send a check to P.O. Box 726, Huntingdon, Tenn. 38344.

June 16 COVID-19 Update

In the week of June 9 through June 15, there were a total of three positive COVID-19 cases in Carroll County. In that week, the county averaged 16.4 tests per day, with 1.7% of those tests being positive. As of June 16, there have been zero new cases in the area.

Positive cases continue to fall in Carroll County. In the last two weeks, there have been nine positive COVID-19 cases. In the two weeks prior, there were 23 positive cases.

Adults above the age of 81 lead COVID-19 cases in Carroll County, averaging 16,043.2 cases per every 100,000 residents. Next in line are adults aged 31-40 years old, averaging

16,002.7 cases per every 100,000 residents.

Everyone eligible for a COVID-19 vaccine is encouraged to get one. To find clinics, pharmacies, and other locations across Tennessee offering COVID-19 vaccines, visit vaccinefinder.org. Vaccines are free and available to everyone ages 12 and up.

The Pfizer vaccine is available for everyone 12 years of age and older. It requires two doses taken at least 21 days apart. Protection against COVID-19 begins 14 days after the second dose. Pfizer has a 95% prevention rate.

The Moderna vaccine is offered to adults 18 years and older and has a 94% prevention rate

against COVID-19. Moderna requires two doses taken at least 28 days apart. COVID-19 protection begins 14 days after the second dose.

The Johnson & Johnson vaccine is available for adults 18 and older and has a 72% prevention rate. This is a single-dose vaccine, with COVID-19 protection beginning 14 days after the first dose.

If you are unable to receive the COVID-19 vaccine at this time, the CDC recommends you to continue social distancing, wearing a mask when around others, washing your hands, avoiding being around others who are sick, avoiding crowds, and avoiding poorly-ventilated spaces.

HUNTINGDON — Shooting Hunger will host its fifth annual sporting clays shooting event Friday, June 25, at Carroll County Shooting Sports Park located at 680 McAdoo Cemetery Lane. The event begins at 7:30 a.m. and ends at 4 p.m.

This all-day event consists of five-person teams shooting shotguns at multiple stations with a 9:30 a.m. or 1 p.m. start time. The entry fee (\$110 for a single shooter, \$500 for a team) includes 50 targets on the course, lunch and a goody bag, plus eligibility for door prizes.

Besides the sporting clay stations, the event includes fun games. Lunch is provided by the Tyson-Obion County Complex. There will be a specialty knife auction beginning at 12:25 p.m.

Why Are My Pine Tree Needles Turning Brown?

The main pine tree in northwest Tennessee is Loblolly Pine. There are a few other pine species: Virginia, Shortleaf and White, but 95% of the pine are Loblolly. Loblolly Pine needles (like all pine) need sunlight. If sunlight is not available, the needles will not work and are not needed. The tree will eventually shed these needles. This shedding of needles is why pine are planted for erosion control. The needles develop a sort of carpet that helps reduce erosion in numerous ways.

What I am saying (in possibly a roundabout way) is that shedding of needles is a natural process that happen every year.

This year has been a little different, in that it has been wet. As a matter of fact, the past couple years have been wet. This dampness has affected our Loblolly Pine with a thing called Needle Cast. Needle Cast is like normal tree shedding, except it is from a fungus. Trees with this fungus are kind of like normal shedding on steroids. There are many more browned up needles present. These affected needles will release spores that

will infect young needles and show up on them the following spring.

Needle Cast in usually not serious and rarely does a tree die from it. Raking up and/or burning infected dropped needles should help reduce its spread.

Huntingdon Police Reports

Attempted Burglary — The HPD is investigating a recent attempted break-in at Huntingdon City Hall.
